*Christine Iverson* discovered a love of the hedgerows after moving to a Sussex Downland village, so she volunteered at the Weald and Downland Open Air Museum as an apothecary. She became fascinated by the superstitions of hedgerow plants. She runs a workshop at Tupenny Barn which teaches how to make the most of your common garden plants.

*Nigel Gossop* gave us a fascinating talk on the life of Mary Mitford, who was born in 1787 in Alresford, daughter of George Mitford and Mary Russell, a descendant of the aristocratic Russell family. As a teenager Mary won a lottery worth £20,000 but through her Father's reckless gambling and high living he squandered her fortune and that of her Mother too. The village of Three Mile Cross in Berkshire was Mary's home for 30 years and she drew on her observations of the location for many of her essays. She is best known for 'Our Village' which appeared in *The Lady*. After her Father died in 1842 a subscription was raised to buy off his debts, and she moved to Swallowfield and died after being injured in a carriage accident in 1855.

April found us hosting a Bridge Drive organised by our President, which filled twelve tables at Lavant Hall. The Committee served a full English Afternoon Tea of sandwiches, scones and cakes. A very profitable raffle was held and the afternoon provided a substantial sum for the Hospice, our President Jan's charity.
