This course is the general ISG overview of Disarmament, Demobilization and Reintegration (DDR). The content draws from the United Nations (UN) integrated standards and guidelines as well as non-UN examples of national DDR. The content is appropriate for individuals or organizations that will manage or support a DDR program in their home country or deploy to a country where DDR might be undertaken, for example as part of a UN Peacekeeping Operation (PKO), or African Union (AU) or North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) military operation.

OBJECTIVES

Participants will be able to:

- Understand the structures and processes in integrated DDR planning
- Know what programs and support are required to support DDR planning
- Understand social and economic reintegration and the challenges
- Know that cross-cutting issues such as deradicalization, gender, youth, and health impact DDR efforts
- Understand the roles and responsibilities of the various DDR related actors in successful DDR

TOPICS

The delivery format combines lectures, discussion and practical small group activities. Possible modules include:

- ♦ DDR support programs
- Social and economic reintegration
- Cross-cutting DDR issues (e.g., gender, youth, health, and radicalization)
- Roles and responsibilities
- Integrated DDR programs

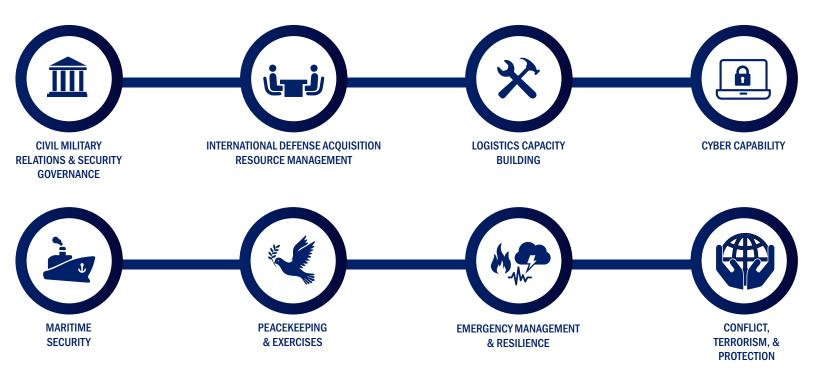
PARTICIPANTS

This course supports up to 30 participants. Host governments in consultation with US Embassies are asked to draw participation from a wide spectrum of female and male, mid- to senior-level officers in all armed services, and equivalent-grade civilian government employees whose work intersects with course topic areas. Participants may also include civil-society and NGO representatives.



ISG PROGRAM AREAS

ISG programming has been developed over 25 years by providing military and civilian officials with unique education and professional development programs. Courses are designed to cultivate individual understanding of complex issues, foster peer-to-peer learning, and build international communities of interest.



FACULTY

ISG has a diverse faculty team grounded in professional experience from academic, military, government, and civil sectors. The core faculty are augmented by experts drawn from other parts of government, and American and international subject matter experts drawn from universities, industry, think tanks, international organizations, and non-governmental organizations.

ENROLLMENT

Courses are conducted as part of the US Government security cooperation efforts. Interested partner nation personnel should contact their government's international cooperation section, or the relevant US Embassy's security/military cooperation office for selection processes and enrollment. Interested US citizens may contact ISG to discuss availability.

FUNDING

Educational programs are primarily implemented through Title 22 authorized programs (International Military Education and Training, Foreign Military Sales, Peacekeeping Operations) and various Title 10 authorized programs such as the Maritime Security Initiative (MSI) and Regional Defense Combating Terrorism and Irregular Warfare Fellowship Program (RDFP).
