

# The Ireland Funds **FLAGSHIP AWARDEES**

### and Small Grants Round 2019

### The Ireland Funds is delighted to announce our support of Flagship Grants Investment to these outstanding organizations.

The Ireland Funds Flagship Investments program provides grants for core funding, capacity building or program costs for non-profit organizations working within one of our key program areas of Arts & Culture, Community Development, Education and Peace & Reconciliation. Our aim is to improve the quality and sustainability of existing programs, or to help scale initiatives that are already having an impact. A total of €500,000 will be shared by six outstanding organizations over 2 years.

In addition to the Flagship Awardees, The Ireland Funds also distributed €500,000 to 90 organizations through its Small Grants Round. The Small Grants Round offers awards to small community organizations and for organizations that have not previously been supported by The Ireland Funds. These smaller investments of up to €10,000 support a wide range of not-for-profit and community organizations in the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland.

#### Autism Spectrum Information Advice and Meeting Point

AsIAm is an organization working to build an inclusive Ireland for autistic people, creating a society where every autistic person is accepted and valued "as they are." Support of €100,000 over the coming 2 years will enable AsIAm to improve outcomes for autistic people, and their families, by providing the tools, information and skills required in order to access the community.

## CANCER FUND FOR CHILDREN

Cancer Fund for Children works to provide practical and emotional support to children and young people (age 0-24) diagnosed with cancer and young people who have a parent with cancer, and their families. The Ireland Funds have awarded Cancer Fund for Children €100,000 over two years to develop the RISE Project, which will improve the mental health and emotional wellbeing of 40 young people aged 8-17 years old impacted by cancer.





## DEPAUL IRELAND

Depaul is a charity working with people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, focusing on serving and caring for those with complex needs. The Flagship Award of €100,000 over 2 years will allow Depaul to support the salary of a Resettlement Officer who will work to empower migrants, upon leaving Direct Provision, to fully exercise their rights and become deeply integrated into their new communities in Ireland.

## PIETA HOUSE

SELES

Pieta House provides free and freely accessible professional counselling to Irish men, women and children struggling with thoughts of suicide or self-harm and those who have lost a loved one to suicide. The Ireland Funds will be supporting The Resilience Academy, a 6-week evidence-based program targeting 12-13 year old students, delivered in schools with the aim to reduce child suicide/self-harm and increase resilience amongst Irish youth.

## SUAS EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Suas is one of Ireland's leading children's literacy charities, providing evidencebased reading and maths supports to struggling children whose needs are not being addressed by Ireland's education system. Support of €80,000 over 2 years will see Suas expand their services to cover the Island of Ireland, delivering their proven literacy mentorship model in disadvantaged communities in both Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.





## YOUTHACTION NORTHERN IRELAND

YouthAction NI has a 75-year history of working with young people in Northern Ireland and border counties to tackle inequalities; improve their life chances; inspire them as activists and contribute to flourishing communities in a peaceful, shared society. The Ireland Funds has awarded €70,000 over the 2 years to fund the 'One Small Step' campaign where YouthAction NI will engage and inspire young people on the margins, ages 14-25, to take actions to create change.

# **HOW** were the 2019 Flagship Awards Selected?

Grants workshops were delivered in five locations across Ireland and the grants team were on hand to give advice on eligibility and how to apply. 333 Letters of Inquiry (an increase of 50 from 2018) were submitted by organizations, each providing a proposal seeking support from The Ireland Funds. 25 organizations were then invited to submit a full application and site visits to each of the organizations were conducted 12 organizations were then selected based on the goals of the initiative, potential impact of the proposal, the organization's capacity to deliver, fit for The Ireland Funds, and long-term sustainability of the project following feedback from each panel combined with internal discussion and deliberation in The Ireland Funds, six organizations were selected as The Ireland Funds Flagship Awardees for 2019.

## Blossom Ireland

Creating New Possibilities for Those with Intellectual Disabilities

# For a Life

Blossom Ireland is an award-winning organization that provides skills-based training designed to prepare young people aged 14 to 20 years with an intellectual disability (ID) for life as an adult. It offers a practical education and life skills program – the Personal Empowerment Program (PEP) – which teaches the young people to be as independent as possible in the community, socially, and in the workplace. The program also provides bespoke support, advocacy and information for both the young person and their family during important transition periods in their life.



Here, Auveen Bell the co-founder and CEO of Blossom Ireland, shares how The Ireland Funds has invested in its success:

Blossom Ireland's relationship with The Ireland Funds began back in 2014 when we received our first grant of  $\in$ 3,000. Our program at that time was little more than an idea at the kitchen table.

We had built up no evidence of its impact, we had no proof that it would work but we had the power of our convictions and we believed 100% in what we were aiming to do. The Ireland Funds backed that belief, something no other funder did at the time. In addition to the financial boost it gave us, it also reassured us that our idea had potential. We knew what we were doing was right. We knew it was making a difference. We received two further small grants from The Ireland Funds in 2015 and 2016 of €3,000. In 2017 we were absolutely delighted to be awarded €100,000 for the Flagship Grant.

The financial support along with the endorsement from The Ireland Funds has been instrumental in allowing the expansion and development of the program to-date. The security that came with that Flagship Grant has allowed us to develop a program that is filling an important gap in educational provision for young people in Ireland with intellectual disabilities and one that is having very visible and measurable impact for them.

Thanks to the platform which the Flagship Grant provides, we were also introduced to a private trust who donated  $\epsilon_{75,000}$  p.a. from 2018 – 2020. Having two multi-annual grants has enabled us to change how we think and to increase our ambitions for the Personal Empowerment Program.

Our main target over the 2-year period of the Flagship Grant was for 14 participants to have completed the program. We achieved this and more. By 2021 we anticipate that we will have worked with 70 young people and their families along with over 20 employers and community-based organizations. In 2020 we will pilot Blossom PEP in a school. Should this prove to be a success we can then potentially access young people in all schools across Ireland to learn the vital skills to prepare them for adulthood – something schools are very often under-resourced to do. However, in order to achieve this we are seeking a small number of investors who are interested in supporting our work. One thing we pride ourselves in is being innovative in everything we do. We don't ever sit back and say, "That's done now." We constantly test. We constantly evaluate. We constantly adapt and change as we see fit. A funder like The Ireland Funds allows you to do that and in fact, encourages it.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone in The Ireland Funds both in Ireland and around the world who have supported us enormously on our journey from the kitchen table to one where we are planning to give every young person with ID a chance to live a life like any other.

#### BLOSSOM IRELAND

Taking the bus and train without mom and dad. Buying a coffee and snack with friends at the local café. These are steps to confidence and independence that most young people take for granted. But for young people like Howard, these are milestones to be especially proud of.

"Howard has a global developmental delay, explains his mom, Laura. "As a result, we found it difficult to get Howard into various clubs around the local area because he wasn't Down syndrome. He wasn't autistic. Blossom was inclusive and welcomed Howard first into the summer camp program and now into PEP. The program is always pushing and stretching our children and their goals. Howard has evolved every step of the way."

Howard began the Blossom program when he was nine years old and moved into the PEP program when he was fourteen. Soon he was learning skills and tasks that once seemed daunting. "He [Howard] couldn't order something in the café when he started with us," says Imelda Fitzpatrick, Program Director, Blossom Ireland. "I remember him just sitting on his chair watching everyone else go up to order and not move. Now he is the employee of the month and teaching others."

Today at age 19, Howard is one of three paid teen mentors with Blossom's PEP program. Along with Blossom staff he now helps conduct the program but brings a unique perspective having gone through the program himself. "Being a teen mentor is good for me because I help people," says Howard. "I show them how to take the bus. We have to help and train people. They may be nervous, but they are ready for it!"


NO MIND LEFT BEHIND IS AN INITIATIVE DEVELOPED BY THE IRELAND FUNDS AND LONGTIME IRELAND FUNDS' DONORS JOHN AND PAULINE RYAN TO GIVE PROMISING YOUNG PEOPLE AN OPPORTUNITY TO COMPLETE THIRD-LEVEL EDUCATION BY PROVIDING AN ANNUAL SCHOLARSHIP TO COVER THE COSTS OF BOOKS, ACCOMMODATION AND OTHER KEY EXPENSES.

All across the island of Ireland there are promising young people from areas of severe social disadvantage who need an opportunity to enter third-level education.

Although undergraduate tuition fees are covered by the Irish government, the current reality for students is that the additional expenses associated with pursuing third level studies are both extensive and burdensome. These unacknowledged expenses are often the cause for a promising student from a lower socio-economic background to abandon their studies. Once selected for the NMLB scholarship, the progress of the scholars is monitored as they must demonstrate successful progression through each year of their course. The Ireland Funds is proud that over 110 scholarships, to the value of €1,680,000, have been funded to date by our donors giving young people a chance to build strong foundations for their futures.

The No Mind Left Behind Program provides €3,000-€4,000 per academic year to ensure a student's full potential is met.

In 2019-2020, The Ireland Funds has 97 No Mind Left Behind Scholars in 23 colleges and universities across the island of Ireland.



We live in a small town called Buncrana in County Donegal. I'm currently studying biological and biomedical sciences here in Trinity. Hopefully after that I'd love to specialize in genetics and ideally go into research. I first heard about the No Mind Left Behind scholarship through my secondary school. In Buncrana there's just not a lot of job opportunities for people my age, because it's such a small town.

I applied and a couple weeks later my principal called me. I was over the moon. My parents couldn't believe it. I was thinking I was going to have to take out a student loan, I had already made an application and everything.

Coming from a family with five kids, my parents will eventually have to put four others through university. It's a weight off their shoulders and it has meant I can immerse myself fully in the college experience. It also means I can afford everything from books to a lab coat and occasionally go home and see my family.

I've heard from a lot of my fellow students that they find it extremely hard to balance studies with work, particularly in our course as it's very information-heavy. In that way the scholarship has benefited me as I'm able to focus solely on my studies without having to work long hours at night."

#### **"I WAS BORN IN NIGERIA**

and came to Ireland when I was three years old when my family was seeking asylum. My family lives just outside Drogheda. In secondary school I got good grades, was involved with sports and I just loved school! At the end of my time there, my principal contacted me and said, 'I was talking with your teachers and they tell me you are a great student. There is a scholarship for you...' I hadn't been working hard thinking it would result in that. The fact that my work had been noticed was so meaningful. I had always hoped to continue my studies but the logistics and cost of everything from accommodation to costs was overwhelming. I hadn't wanted to stress my family out with it.

When I told my mom about the scholarship, she cried. She knew how hard I'd been working. She knew how late I would stay up to finish just one more chapter. There is no way my parents would have been able to pay for my accommodation and expenses for college. The No Mind Left Behind scholarship allows me to focus on my academics rather than having to work during the weekends.

One day I was just thinking about this scholarship, 'Imagine. Someone I don't know is actually giving their money for people like me to study.'"

#### WOULD YOU LIKE TO ENABLE A DESERVING IRISH STUDENT TO FURTHER THEIR EDUCATION?

#### THE ORGANIZATION WAS FOUNDED BY KAREN LEIGH,

a mother who found she needed services for her son, Connor. Karen also found that they were on a government waiting list that was years-long for those services and therapies Connor needed immediately to help him get ahead. Private therapies were available but costly and out of reach to most families.

Some people might feel stuck, but Karen decided to set up Sensational Kids in 2007 to fill a need for families like hers. Today, Sensational Kids is providing occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, play therapy and educational psychological assessments to thousands of children. "Currently there are 45,000 children in Ireland on waiting lists for therapy services," says Karen. "Families are often looking at waiting lists of three years and more. We know that early intervention is crucial for children with additional needs. That's where Sensational Kids comes in. It bridges the gap between public and expensive private therapy services, and we ensure it is accessible for children who otherwise might not receive any therapies at all."

Sensational Kids is now providing once-unattainable services to families who previously had very little hope or chances for their children. "Our services are affordable thanks to our donors," says Karen. "Our ethos is that no child is ever turned away."



## SUPPORT FROM THE IRELAND FUNDS

Adding to an existing facility in Kildare, Sensational Kids tripled its number of facilities operated and opened additional child development centers in Cork and Mayo.
 Since its founding, Sensational Kids has now changed the lives of over 6,000 children, saving their families over €1.5 million in therapy fees.

"Support from The Ireland Funds has played an enormous role in setting Sensational Kids up as a national organization that can meet the needs of children with additional needs from all over Ireland. With continued support from the Flagship Award, we are now on course to exceed our targets and change the lives of 28,500 children over the next ten years, delivering 154,000 therapy interventions, saving their families €6.5 million in therapy fees." – Karen Leigh, Founder of Sensational Kids.

## WHAT IS POSSIBLE

#### WITH MORE FUNDING?

- Sensational Kids recently started hippotherapy, an occupational therapy using horses. It is seeking donors to help fund the costs of hiring the area and horses (current cost is €300 per week) to work with children.
- Sensational Kids has been awarded the Social Innovation Fund Growth Fund. For every euro/dollar raised up to €510,000, they will get 100% matched funding from the Irish Government, which would help increase their social impact and financial sustainability. It is currently seeking funding to make this possible.
- Continued investment in a new Kildare flagship HQ facility is a large-scale legacy project which gives a social impact investor the opportunity to do something meaningful and tangible
- Additional funding for phase two of the Mayo facility development in order to meet the great demand for services in that area.

# Jamie's Story with Sensational Kids

We first came as Jamie was having horrible thoughts and wanted to hurt himself, pulling terrible tantrums, and as an eight-year-old, they were very hard to handle. When I fang Sensational Kids to explain my case I was at my last wits. We were in for our first visit the next week and since then he has been going from strength to strength, from a child that wouldn't go into school, hated everyone around him and himself. Jamie has been doing play therapy with Yvonne. He loves it and can't wait to come in.

He loves working in the playroom because he can run, jump, be as rough as he likes to be and not get hurt. Jamie has since been diagnosed with dyslexia, dyspraxia, dyscalculia, dysgraphia, and sensory processing disorder. Since this and before, things have gotten much better as Yvonne has showed Jamie tricks he can even use during the day to ground himself and stop his anxiety. He now goes into school with no problem, knows his own body when he is starting to get angry, how to relax himself, and not have an outburst (this is a really good thing not even just for Jamie but for the whole family) Simple things like we couldn't bring him to a shop without an outburst and now we can, which means so much to us. As Jamie gets older these are life skills that he needs to know.

Basically, I could not thank Yvonne and Sensational Kids enough, because we were at our wits end with Jamie and hoping he would not hurt himself. All them thoughts are now gone, and we can relax a little."

# **"NOTHING ABOUT US...WITHOUT US."**

"We came up with the 5x5 concept in the summer of 2017," says Jen Coppinger, Head of Producing at the Abbey Theatre. "We put the call out to the community that year with the questions:

'DO YOU FEEL UNDER-REPRESENTED? DO YOU HAVE A STORY TO TELL? WOULD YOU LIKE TO DEVELOP THAT STORY IN FIVE DAYS?' We're not asking people to put on a full play, though some have. What we are asking is are there stories that haven't had an opportunity to be told before? How can we help change that?" The groups chosen are incredibly diverse and deliberately so. From those experiencing dementia to teenagers who are refugees to children on the autism spectrum, individuals from marginalized or rarely-heardfrom communities are finding the Abbey Theatre is a new outlet for creative storytelling.

# **CHANGING HEARTS, CHANGING MINDS**

"All too often we go and see shows about cultures that feel marginalized and locked out of the mainstream," says Graham McLaren, Co-Director of the Abbey Theatre. "But it's written by someone and performed by people who are certainly not locked out. There is a really simple mantra that I've encouraged the team to think about, which is, 'nothing about us...without us.' So, if we're going to do a show about Alzheimer's or a show about the Travelling community, or a project about mental disabilities, then let's include the people let's put their voice there. You must be open, and open to peoples' experiences and their truths. And even if that's uncomfortable and even if it's directly oppositional to you and everything that you hold dear. It changes hearts. It changes minds. And that changes communities...and that changes the world," says Graham. "That's why we do it. It's irrelevant how many see these 5x5's. There are some which will grow and come into big, mainstage shows. There's one right now which I think has the potential to become a phenomenon and will change thousands of minds. But if we only change one or two minds, then it's still completely worthwhile."

#### ABBEY THEATRE

Jacinta Dixon has lived in Dublin all her life and attended many performances at the Abbey Theatre over the years. Jacinta was diagnosed with Alzheimer's after working in the disability sector for 15 years. Today, she is an active member of the Irish Dementia Working Group, one of those selected to participate in the 5x5 initiative in 2019.

"In Ireland, dementia has been something that was kind of pushed to the side," says Jacinta. "It was a stigma and was considered something wrong in the family. People with dementia were told to sit down and have a cup of tea and be quiet, more or less...but there's only so much tea."

Coming to the Abbey Theatre, Jacinta was hardly sitting in the corner having tea. She and other members began to work. "The first day of walking into the Abbey, just the feeling of walking onto the stage, it was a great experience. The Theatre team was interested in our production of things. Because of that, it didn't feel like an exercise."

During the development week, theatre company Bow Productions worked with members of the Irish Dementia Working Group to explore issues of dementia and Alzheimer's which resulted in a piece representing the voice of those living with the conditions.

"There was camaraderie and a safe place for what we were doing," explains Jacinta. "Knowing that nothing was going to go out of the room was important. It was truly a safe space. But for me, this theatre is also an almost-holy place. It is personal. Even talking about it now, I feel goosepimply that I was there."

# THE IRISH DEMENTIA WORKING GROUP

A group supporting and advocating for people living with dementia. Group members are early in their dementia and campaign for a human rightsbased approach to the condition to make life better for the 55,000 people living with dementia in Ireland.

## **TAILTIU THEATRE COMMUNITY**

A group helping participants to find creative ways to explore their identities including working with people living in Direct Provision Centres (locations across Ireland where asylum-seekers and refugees live while their cases are reviewed).

# **SOLOSIRENS**

A group of women living in Tallaght, one of the largest suburbs in Dublin with a diverse migrant population and vibrant cultural life. They come together as a women's collective to share and present stories that are rarely told.

# **LISTEN UP!**

A group working with children on the autistic spectrum. During their development week, the team collaborated with a group of children on the autistic spectrum to create an interactive multi-sensory musical performance piece.

## **RUN OF THE MILL THEATRE**

A community-based theatre collective supporting people with intellectual disabilities. During their development week, they devised, created and developed Making a Mark with the support of a team of creative designers culminating in a rehearsed reading of the piece. Making a Mark went on to premiere at the 2019 Dublin Fringe Festival.

# WHAT'S NEXT IN 2020?

Five new groups will be participating in 2020. The communities represented include working class Irish women from Dublin City Centre, LGBT+ Irish speakers, blind and visually impaired people, those living in Direct Provision, and a men's shed based in Co. Louth. This strong group of participants for the second cycle of the project looks set to build upon the already strong results of 2019.

# CREATING THE LEADERS OF TODAT,

Enactus is an innovative program for university and college students interested in addressing social problems through social entrepreneurship solutions.

With support from The Ireland Funds, Enactus is enabling Ireland's future leaders to explore new ideas with an eye to social change. Or as Enactus says "CREATING A HEAD FOR BUSINESS AND A HEART FOR THE WORLD."

The program ensures that students involved don't just come up with great ideas but are equipped with the skills to execute them. Enactus programs run throughout the year across campuses offering training, mentorship, competition and networking. The organization offers third-level students in 10 Irish colleges and universities a chance to truly flex their entrepreneurial muscles, but for social good.

"Enactus has two very clear objectives: student leadership and social change," says Fiona O'Byrne, Enactus Ireland Country Manager. "The range of experience, and skills, and training all comes together to empower the students to be future leaders with a social conscience. That then complements the social change students bring about through their projects."

#### **NO FEAR OF FAILURE**

Each year culminates with a national competition where ideas are presented, and a national winner is chosen. Teams present months of work in a 12-minute pitch to peers as well as business and community leaders who can offer advice and often mentoring. From there, the winners go on to the Enactus World Cup with teams from 36 countries.

Issues ranging from mental health to food poverty to deforestation have been addressed with innovative approaches.

Not all ideas are viable. "You need lots of ideas to generate workable ideas." Says Fiona. "At Enactus 'encouraging ideation' is a cornerstone of the program and getting students to develop ideas. Not all of them will come to fruition. Not all of them will be implemented. Yet failure is a part of entrepreneurship: trying things, seeing what works and what doesn't. That is a natural part of business and entrepreneurship, and we've been very encouraging of that."

#### **REAL LIFE = REAL SOLUTIONS**

However, some Enactus initiatives in Ireland have gone on to become full-fledged companies. FoodCloud, a project supported by The Ireland Funds, began as an Enactus project in Ireland and today is a social enterprise that connects businesses with surplus food to charities in their local communities that need it via a software platform. It has helped to ensure the equivalent of 65 million meals have gone to people and not to waste with an estimated value of €81.8 million.

### INTERNET ENACTUS PROJECT

# GREENBREW

– as told by Enactus student Andrea Whelton

"Grain waste is a massive product output of the brewing industry and in Ireland, we make loads of beer, which means we have loads of grain waste. In Ireland, there are 760,000 tons of this stuff produced every year and it all gets either thrown out or used for animal feed. We asked, 'can we do anything with this?'

We then identified a problem with Direct Provision, which is the Irish governmental policy that provides for asylum seekers in Ireland. People living in Direct Provision are often isolated in centers with limited access to ingredients and cooking facilities. So, we developed vegan and refined sugar-free recipes using the grain waste and held workshops with people in Direct Provision to teach them how to produce baked goods. We provided health and safety food training, so they had all the resources and skills they needed. They were able to bring healthy products home for their families, and additional product was then sold at a profit to put back into the program. It was about six months from idea stage to actual implementation."

GreenBrew is now upcycling a once wasted by-product into highly nutritional baked goods sold across Dublin. The products are vegan and high in protein. The GreenBrew project won the People's Choice Award at the 2019 Enactus World Cup in San José, CA.

## **KIDS SPEECH LAB** 2018 WINNER

"As first-time entrepreneurs, participating in the Business Plan Competition gave us the tools to critically analyse our business plan and gave us the confidence to fully commit to the business."

Kids Speech Labs is the first digital health platform for children's speech and language development. They are using speech recognition and artificial intelligence (AI) to develop objective bench-marking and intervention applications for children's speech skills, enabling parents and clinicians to identify speech and language delays as early as possible. Their goal is to be the first stop for all stakeholders as a child begins to communicate, to ensure that no child misses out on the interventions they need to develop communication skills that are so critical for future development.

Since winning The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition, Kids Speech Labs has secured private funding as well as the highly competitive H2020 SME instrument phase 2 grant. These allowed the team to develop a prototype application which has generated one of the largest datasets of children's speech for a clinical application. They are more than half way through raising a seed investment from private investors and Enterprise Ireland, and plan to kick-off development of their first product in Q1 of 2020.

## SAFECILITY 2018 THIRD RUNNER-UP

"The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition taught us how to validate an idea and how to make sure we were building what customers wanted. We pivoted mid-way through the six-week program due to our customer discovery findings and Safecility is what emerged. We wouldn't be here without the Business Plan Competition. Since 2018, our customer base has grown, turnover in 2019 is 10 times 2018, we have developed patentable technology and are leading the way in automated, smart building safety testing and compliance globally. The Business Plan Competition was the best start for our company and has helped us to stay focused on what customers want."



Safecility helps to build safer communities through technology. Their sensors and automated emergency lighting system allows for wireless testing of key life safety equipment in buildings, savings thousands of man hours per year. This helps landlords to automate legally required safety testing, ensuring required fire-safety and life-safety testing is carried out. The software manages compliance for estates at scale helping their customers deliver safer homes

Since coming third in the 2018 Business Plan Competition, Safecility has grown to a team of 6 based in Dublin and has clients in Ireland and the United Kingdom. The company has secured innovation funding from the EU H2020 programme and the European Space Agency. Current customers include Limerick City and County Council and Vivid Homes—a UK Housing Authority. In 2020 Safecility plans to expand into the UAE and Singapore.



## 2018 FINALIST

"The Business Plan Competition helped connect jumpAgrade with a host of philanthropic funders which will play a significant role in meeting the social focus of our organization"

JumpAgrade is an online service that helps second-level students build their confidence and prepare for exams. Now in business for its third academic year, jumpAgrade has revolutionized private tutor services making them available to students from the comfort of their own home. It takes the hassle out of tutoring, allowing students to work at their own pace online with support from top level private tutors.

JumpAgrade was founded on the mission to make personalized feedback accessible to all students, regardless of ability, location or background. They work with organisations, local companies and university access programs to help make sure students from disadvantaged backgrounds can access support through the tutors that work with them. In a twelve-week jumpAgrade program working with a group of students from eight different DEIS schools in North Dublin, there was an average grade increase of 11.5%, with 85% of those students reporting an increase in confidence in their chosen subject.

Since participating in The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition, jumpAgrade was a finalist in the Google Adopt A Start-up Programme and was chosen as winners of the Social Entrepreneurs Ireland Award. JumpAgrade is quickly becoming the most recognized provider of private tuition to second-level students across Ireland and has plans to scale to international markets.

## MACHINE EYE 2018 INNOVATION AWARD WINNER

"The Ireland Funds Business Plan Competition acted as a springboard for Machine Eye, moving forward with greater energy and enthusiasm, and a knowledge that what we were doing was working. It also provided great connections, some of whom have opened massive doors for us."

Machine Eye is an innovative safety device for use on tractors, plant, and heavy machinery. It provides protection against accidents involving machinery for operators, bystanders and everybody on the farm. Machine Eye views the future and when an accident is imminent it automatically takes control, pre-emptively isolating or halting the machine to remove risk protecting operators, families and livelihoods.

Since winning the Business Plan Competition Innovation Award, Machine Eye has won both the Investor Pitch and the Health and Safety Award at the 2018 National Ploughing Championships, one of the highest platforms in the agricultural industry. The company now has full-time employees and is developing at a great pace. It has also led to great personal success for founder Brendan Digney who won Union of Students Ireland Student Entrepreneur of the Year and Queen's University Belfast Student Entrepreneur of the Year. He was also an Institute of Directors Student Director of the Year UK finalist.

It also offers a range of innovative features that maximize support for people with intellectual disability, complex needs and degenerative conditions. Seamless-CARE data analytics provides insights into patterns of care and a unique tool translates a set of sounds made by non-verbal people so that every care provider can understand a range of their vocalizations.

seamlessCARE recently received a prestigious Commercialisation Fund award from Enterprise Ireland. They are about to begin 18-months of research and development that will culminate in the launch of seamlessCARE's pioneering care planning platform. With potential partners already lining up form seven countries, seamlessCARE is well placed to improve the lives of care recipients, health care professionals and family carers all over the world.





# The Ireland Funds Great Britain Annual Grant Round

The Ireland Funds Great Britain (IFGB) awarded 37 deserving not-for-profit organizations working with and for the Irish community in Great Britain, Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland through its 2018/19 Annual Grant Round. The objective of the Grant Round is to contribute much needed funds to organizations across Great Britain and the island of Ireland with projects supporting community development, culture, peace and reconciliation and education. The number of applications for funding from The Ireland Funds Great Britain doubled from the previous year in the 2018/19 Grant Round. We are pleased to feature here four charities who were awarded funding through the 2018/19 Annual Grant Round and whose projects showcase the quality and scope of work being carried out across the Irish community in Great Britain.

**Irish Film London** Now in its 10th year, Irish Film London (IFL) continues to champion Irish Film and Animation across the UK. IFL hosts the largest international Irish Film Festival in the world over five days each year, which brings the full scope of Irish screen talent to London, with numerous UK premieres for Irish films, panel discussions and live director and cast Q&As. Led by Kelly O'Connor, IFL also runs a year-round program of screenings, industry and community workshops, the annual Irish Film London Awards, the St. Brigid's Day Film Festival each February and the St. Patrick's Film Festival each March.





**Void Gallery** Void Gallery is a contemporary art space located in Derry-Londonderry, Northern Ireland. Void has created an international reputation for its wide-ranging and challenging exhibition program, with a key element to the gallery being the Engage program, which places participation, engagement and learning at the heart of Void. Void received international attention in December 2019 when one of their pieces won the prestigious Turner Prize. Artist Helen Cammock jointly won this year's Turner Prize for The Long Note (2018), a film that examined the overlooked role of women in the civil rights movement in Derry. Mary Cremin, Director of Void Gallery, commissioned the piece. This was a historic win as the four artists nominated urged the judges not to choose a single winner and instead make a "collective statement" at a time when there was "already so much that divides and isolates people and communities."

**Leeds Irish Health and Homes** Based in Yorkshire in the North of England, Leeds Irish Health & Homes has been at the forefront of providing services to meet the current and developing needs of its community since 1996. It has supported thousands of people in their community over the years to help them regain and retain their independence and dignity. 2019 was an exciting year for Leeds Irish Health and Homes: it launched a Monday Fun Group, a social group for over 50s, it registered as an online center offering IT support to service users for computers and iPads, partnered with Life Story Network on 'My Home Matters' project, helping carers understand the importance of home and the impact of transitions in memory loss or dementia and held numerous events and workshops for the local community.





**Birmingham Irish Association** Birmingham Irish Association is the English Midlands' leading charity providing welfare and cultural services to the Irish community. The charity launched a new Irish Dementia Centre in January 2020 which will be the first of its kind in Birmingham specifically for the Irish community. This free of charge service will also provide transport and lunch for those attending. This vital service will provide an opportunity for the community (Irish people make up the oldest ethnic minority in England and Wales) and for the carers to have some much-needed respite.

#### The Emerald Ball

November, 2019 Over 300 guests, friends and supporters of The Ireland Funds Singapore gathered at **The St. Regis Singapore** for the 11th Annual Emerald Ball and a fun-filled evening of cabaret and fundraising. ### The Ireland Funds Monaco Residential Bursaries

Awarded biannually, The Ireland Funds Monaco Residential Bursaries were established to enable writers born or living in Ireland to pursue a current project during a one-month residency at the Princess Grace Irish Library in Monaco. We are pleased to present these personal reflections written by authors Dr. Tony McCarthy and Professor Thomas Bartlett on their experiences in Monaco.

# Dr. Tony McCarthy

Dr. Tony McCarthy was Writer in Residence at the Princess Grace Irish Library in March of 2019. An accountant by profession, Tony has spent most of his working life working in the investment business. He holds an MBA from University College Dublin, and a MA in history from Maynooth University. In 2017 he received his PhD from Maynooth University for his thesis 'From landlord to rentier: The Wyndham land Act 1903 and its economic consequences for Irish landlords 1903-1933'. His publications include *The Shaws of Terenure, A 19th century Dublin merchant family*, and *The Irish Land Act 1923 in A Formative Decade, Ireland in the 1920s*. He is currently working on a book on George Wyndham's time in Ireland and is co-editing a book on British and Irish Land Reform.

March of 2019 will live long in my memory as being a time of great fulfilment, adventure and personal exploration. Immersing myself in the magnificent literary delights of the Princess Grace Irish Library (PGIL) and the many wonders of Monaco gave rise in me of a sense of privilege and excitement for which I shall be eternally grateful to The Ireland Funds for providing me with the opportunity by awarding me the Writer in Residence bursary.

Arriving every morning to the PGIL was to me like entering Disney's Magic Kingdom before any tourists arrived, the picture postcard streets, the utter cleanliness of the Rocher could not but raise one's spirits.

For someone who has spent most of his life engaged in the cut and thrust of business the opportunity to immerse oneself in full time writing in such a beautiful and inspiring place can only be viewed as, a not to be squandered once in a lifetime opportunity. Whether it was this sense, the ambience of the PGIL whereby one is surrounded by so many great literary treasures or the realisation that you are following in such illustrious footsteps make it difficult not to be focussed on the job in hand. In my case, I completed an essay entitled 'A Sporting Politician: George Wyndham (1863-1913) which has now been published by Four Courts Press as part of the *Sport and Leisure in the Irish and British Country House* collection. I also wrote an essay 'From Landlord to Rentier: The Wealth Management Practices of Irish Landlords 1903-1933' which will be included in forthcoming publication by Edinburgh University Press relating to British and Irish Land Reform. Unlike many of my predecessors, my wife Anita accompanied me for the entire month in Monaco. I found this hugely beneficial in that it enabled me to settle-in very quickly and allowed me to share the wonderful experiences presented. It also meant that we were better able to integrate into the local environment through attendance at concerts in the Grimaldi Forum, in the Opéra de Monte-Carlo and travelling to various locations along the Côte d'Azur and the Italian Riviera at weekends.

In terms of highlights of my time in the Principality, the St Patrick's Day concert in the Library and the introduction to HSH Prince Albert II of Monaco was of great note. A private out of hours visit to the Casino in preparation for my talk to the Friends of the Library was also a highlight as indeed was the talk itself. In a month full of highlights, it is hard to be overly selective in terms of standout moments or events.

What does stand out however was the kindness shown by so many people associated with both the Library and The Irelands Funds in particular, Sile Jackson and the late Francis O'Hara who went out of their way to make me feel part of the community. It would however be singularly remiss of me not to thank the two rocks upon which the PGIL exists namely Judith Gantley and Géraldine Lance. From the moment I was awarded the bursary to the day I returned home, both Judith and Géraldine took enormous care of me thus ensuring that March 2019 and Monaco will forever live in my memory as 'a moment of forever.'

## Professor Thomas Bartlett


Professor Thomas Bartlett MRIA was Writer in Residence at the Princess Grace Irish Library in October, 2019 He is the author of *Ireland: a history* (Cambridge University Press, 2010) and most recently general editor of the four-volume *Cambridge History of Ireland* (Cambridge University Press, 2018)

A month in Monaco at the renowned Princess Grace Irish Library! What could be more exciting! The library holds extensive collections of modern Irish literature and history, with many being first editions, some from the late Princess Grace's own collection, and all freely accessible to the reader or researcher. There are also some manuscript collections – I was particularly interested in the McCarthy papers – and, of course, there is a huge repository of items relating to Princess Grace (née Kelly) – photographs, newspapers, magazines, and film. It struck me that Princess Grace's visit to Ireland in the early 1960s (fully documented here) is worth a study in its own right: she received a rapturous reception there and her visit (a 'Homecoming') preceded the much better known one by President John F. Kennedy.

My work in the library focussed primarily on the Irish military in France in the eighteenth century, known colloquially as the 'Wild Geese', or in French 'Les Oies Sauvages'. To that end I was facilitated in putting together a synthesis of recent work on these soldiers (origins, numbers, motivations, experiences in war and in peace, and reception by their French hosts). I was able to incorporate recent work by the young French historian Pierre Louis Coudray into the resulting talk which I delivered to the Friends of the Princess Grace Library (25 October 2019). As well, I was able to make use of the McCarthy family papers which trace the history of an Irish officer in French service in the 1780s and which shed light on his family's later peregrinations - his son was an accomplished cartographer in Algeria in the nineteenth century and other members of the family fetched up in Venezuela and New York. Fascinating stuff! In between researching Irish soldiers abroad, I was able to renew acquaintances with various authors that for various reasons I had neglected over the past decades. Louis MacNeice's poetry was something of a (renewed) revelation to me, as were the prose works of C. Day Lewis, both of which were conveniently housed at eye-level from my desk, and hence a welcome and easy distraction from my historical researches. And of course, the library is housed just yards from the royal palace with breath-taking views over Monaco, and with any number of cafes and restaurants in close proximity.

In addition to my lecture to the 'Friends', I was also privileged to speak with a class from Lycée Albert I (local High School) who were studying English: this was rewarding (and not a little nerve-wrecking – one question was: why is the prefix 'O' really only found in surnames in Ireland but not in Scotland?) A final stand-out occasion for me was a champagne reception, accompanied by a television documentary featuring Princess Grace, not seen since the 1960s, and now screened to mark the ninetieth anniversary of her birth.

If I conclude by saying that Judith (administrator) and Géraldine (administrative assistant) at the Princess Grace Irish Library did everything in their power to make my stay at the library both productive and rewarding, it will be evident that I will retain a great affection for the 'icy blonde' as Alfred Hitchcock dubbed Grace Kelly, and for the library that bears her name.





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
