

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Dear Residents of Doddington,

## Thoughts from the Rectory

### **Every One Loves a Hug**

I was at our church at Doddington last Sunday and having finished our time of quiet prayer Lynda and I headed off out side towards the car park only to be



met by the four or five people who had left the service before us. A strange, two meter distancing, facial masked meeting then took place as we all caught up on old news and people we have missed since the Coronavirus came upon our village communities and everything changed. One parishioner said 'I do miss sharing the peace', another said 'I miss the hugs' and yet another said 'I miss the hugs and a kiss'. Strange I've never presided at a service where people have shared the peace with a hug and a kiss, it doesn't happen when I'm there - I'm sure its nothing personal.

With the mentioning of hugs in our conversation I was reminded of a time when Lynda and I were walking through Hyde Park in London many years ago and came upon a couple who had taken up residence at Speakers Corner. They had a poster and written upon the poster in large letters was 'Free Hugs'. The couple had their arms outstretched to the crowd that normally gathers at Speakers Corner on a Saturday afternoon. People were not forming queues for a hug, but some folk did respond and some of the on lookers were suspicious. What's the catch? What will it lead to? What impression will I give? I have to say that I was so nervous about the whole thing that I was starting to look around for any hidden cameras or people filming what was going on.

In the end Lynda went forward for an embrace, so I then followed and I have to say the lady who embraced me gave a good old grip. It was just a few seconds of warmth and affection, no harm done and from what I could observe as others came up to be hugged and went on their merry way a great deal of good came out of it. I'm sure someone from a TV morning chat show would say that the concept that was adopted by this couple with their free hugs could have a positive effect upon the well being of those people who were hugged that morning at Speakers Corner.

A specialist family therapist has said: 'We need four hugs a day for survival, eight hugs a day for maintenance and twelve hugs a day for growth.' The theory being that touch is not only nice, but also needed. It has been known for years and there is loads of research out there that supports the idea that a tactile approach is absolutely necessary for our physical as well as our emotional well being and I would add our spiritual heath as well.

### **Methodist Church**

The Methodist Church has been open since the 5th July for Sunday Worship at 11.00 a.m. We have limited seating of 12 due to the virus, but we enjoy a relaxed hour of music and poetry and short stories with a bible theme. ### Doddington Village Hall



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#### Doddington Football Club – The First 50 Years

Football in its "modern" form had been played in March and Chatteris since the 1880's, but it was not until 18<sup>th</sup> September 1903 that a public meeting was called in Doddington to discuss forming a team. The meeting, which was chaired by Dr Cecil Stephens, agreed to form a team and the following officials were elected: President, Dr Stephens; secretary, Mr H Abel; treasurer, Mr R Wade; captain, Mr HJ Abel and vice-captain, Mr H Reeves. Committee: Messrs E Davies, F Dore, T Oakey, F Dunham, W Mason and H Beard. Messrs Goodman of Manor Farm agreed that their field on the corner of Childs lane and Wimblington Road could be used as the pitch and the team was to play in white shirts.

The first match was played on 3<sup>rd</sup> October, 1903 at Doddington when the Chatteris Church Lads Brigade were comprehensively beaten 5-0.

For the 1904/5 season it was agreed to change to red and black striped shirts and to enter some of the junior cup competitions.



The first competitive match was a bit of a disaster when they lost 0-11 to Grantchester in the 1<sup>st</sup> Round of the Cambs Junior Cup. The following year they joined Chatteris Engineers Reserves, March Town, Wisbech East Anglians and Upwell in the newly formed Isle of Ely Junior League. Upwell dropped out before the end of the season and Doddington finished the season in last place without winning a game.

Doddington captain H J Able was picked by the Cambs FA to play in a match against Huntingdonshire. A more dubious honour was achieved by my Great Uncle, Herbert Beard, who became the first Doddington player to be sent off, this during an Isle Junior Cup Semi-final 2<sup>nd</sup> replay against Upwell, which Doddington lost 0-1.

In 1907/8 Doddington reached the Cambs Junior Cup semi-final, but lost 0-3 to Shepreth on Parker's Piece, Cambridge. This first Doddington team folded towards the end of this season when only four players turned up to play a March team. After 30 minutes the match was abandoned when Doddington keeper Matthew Dack broke his leg with the team already 0-7 down.

The team was not re-formed until the 1912/13 season and now played in red and white stripes. They did not enter a league, but did win the Isle of Ely Lower Junior Cup, beating March Great Eastern Railway Reserves 2-1. The next year they joined the Isle Junior League, but again finished bottom of the six clubs. An attempt to start a reserve team was abandoned when they lost their first match to Manea 0-15!

No matches were played during the First World War, so it was not until 1919 that football returned to Doddington. Briefly two teams existed, one formed by returning ex-servicemen which soon merged with the old team to create the first Doddington United FC. The 1919/20 season ended with Doddington finishing seventh of the 8 teams in the Isle League and the Reserves losing the Isle Lower Junior Cup final 0-3 to Upwell.

A reorganisation of the leagues for 1920/21 led to Doddington winning the six club Isle Junior League (Central) Division and a first recorded match against Wimblington resulted in a 6-0 win.

1921/22 saw success in two cup competitions. Doddington secured their second Isle Lower Junior Cup beating Chatteris Town 2-1 and a few days later beat the same team 2-1 in the Chatteris Lower Junior Cup final.

Following a change of ownership at Manor Farm, 1922/23 matches were played at what is now the Newgate Pocket Park. The team won the Junior Central League and then beat the winners of the north and south leagues to take the Isle Lower Junior Shield Championship League as well, but they failed to retain the Chatteris Lower Junior Cup, losing the final 0-1 to Wimblington after two replays.

Little information can be found for the next two seasons, only three matches appear to have been played against Benwick in 1924/5 and the team withdrew from the Isle FA in 1925/6 when they were unable to find a ground.

The Club was re-formed for the 1926/7 season and returned to the Manor field and finished second of 8 teams in the Isle Lower Junior League (North). It was suggested at the beginning of the 1927/8 season that Doddington should merge with Wimblington, but no response was received from Wimblington. Doddington went on to finish second in a league of six.

The club tried to expand in 1928/9, entering the first team in the Isle of Ely League and a Reserve team in the Isle Lower Junior League (south), but after the first team lost their first match 4-10 to Upwell, they withdrew from that league and concentrated on the Lower League, which they won, but lost to the winners of the North league in the Championship match.

In 1929/30 Doddington tried a new league, finishing eighth of 17 in the Upwell and District League. There were only three teams left in the Isle Lower Junior League, which they won and they also won the Lower Junior Cup for the third time, beating Adelaide 1-0.

The 1930's saw mixed fortunes. The Reserves won the Isle Junior League in 1930/1 after the first team withdrew from the higher league due to lack of funds. In 1932/3 the first team had to be abandoned due to lack of players, for one match they had to pick seven people from the crowd to make up the team! However, in 1933/4 they again secured the Lower Junior Cup, beating March St Mary's 2-1. In 1935/6 they were again unable to find a ground, but competed in 1936/7 winning the Isle Junior League and Cup beating Co-op Wholesale Sports 4-1 in the final. No team was formed in 1937/8 or 1938/9 and the War put a stop to any further matches.

From 1943/44 play moved to the field behind the Hospital. Only friendlies were played that season between a March XI and the Doddington Searchlight Unit. In 1944/5 the Isle of Ely War League was formed and Doddington finished joint top, but lost the deciding play off to March Rovers 2-3, but they did beat them 2-1 in the new Doddington Nursing Cup final.

After the War, football returned to normal for 1945/6 and Doddington went on to enjoy a period of success. They won the Isle Junior Cup, beating March Rovers 4 -2 and retained the Nursing Cup by beating Parson Drove 3-0.

In 1946/7 the First team played in the Cambs League Division 1 and the Reserves were beaten in the Lower Junior Cup final 0-5 to Chain Bridge.

In 1948/9 the First team moved to the Peterborough League Division 2 with the Reserves in the Isle League Division 2. The Reserves shared the Isle League 2 Cup with Benwick after a 1-1 draw and lost the Robinson Cup Final 4-1 to Chatteris Town.

In 1949/50 the Reserves were very successful winning two leagues and two cups, athough they shared the Upwell League Cup with Leverington after a drawn match.

1951/52 the first XI began in Peterborough League Division One, but in November they dropped down to Division Three South taking over the Reserve team fixtures and finished in 11<sup>th</sup> place of 14. In July 1952 Doddington United FC were disbanded due to lack of support and were not re-formed for ten years.

#### Doddington United Football Club—The Next Chapter

Doddington United Football Club was reformed in 1962 after a gap of some six or seven years. The previous year a Doddington Youth Team had enjoyed success in the Isle of Ely Youth League and with many of the players reaching the maximum age of 18 they entered the team into the Isle of Ely League.

The headquarters for the club was established at the Three Tuns, with Mr Roy Kilby taking on the role of Chairman. The new President, Mr Thacker, offered his field in Wood Street for the club's football pitch. The club purchased red and white stripe tops, but the players had to supply their own socks and shorts! Each player had to pay a 5/- (25p) signing on fee and 1/- (5p) each week towards medical supplies.

Their opening game was at Wood Street against Wimblington, but the visitors won 4-2. After two more defeats, their first point was in a 2-2 draw at Leverington. A week later they had their first win. Michael Gull scored 6 goals in the 7-2 win over Manea Reserves. DUFC finished mid table in their first year.

In November of that first year nearly 300 people attended a fundraising dance. A "Miss Doddington United" competition was judged by "POSH" players Ellis Stafford and Ollie Hopkins and they selected Miss Carole Upex as the winner.

In 1965 a reserve team was entered into the newly formed Isle League Division Two. The number of clubs in this league was small, so two leagues were played, one before Christmas and one after. The reserve team did really well and won the pre-Christmas league, but they couldn't sustain their good form and they finished well down the table in the post-Christmas league.

It wasn't long before it was decided that the "dressing room" in Wood Street was just not big enough so after many discussions; the clubs' then Vice-Chairman, Norman Welcher agreed they could use his field in Hospital Road and the members erected new changing rooms ready for the start of the 1966/67 season.

The luxury of showers was added to the dressing rooms in1973 in preparation for the club's first season in the Peterborough League. The first XI really did the club proud and skipper Bill Bayes and his side won the Division Four at the first attempt.

In fact, the 73/74 season proved to be very successful with the club winning four trophies including a victory for the reserves in the Isle Minor Cup.

Members of DUFC have also enjoyed a very active "social" side to the club! In 1966 a party of club members went on an exhausting "tour" of Belgium which consisted of only **one** game!! Apparently, the activity in the bars of Ostend more than made up for the lack of football.

The "European" connection was renewed in 1972 when through the efforts of Heinz Miller and Robert Plater, the club began an association with a German football team from Tonisberg. This was a big event for the whole village as on alternate years a coach of players, family and friends would travel to Germany to play in friendly matches. When the Germans visited Doddington they would stay in the homes of local residents with many strong friendships being made. It is difficult to be sure how good the football was, but many would agree that the parties were certainly good. The 1970s were a busy time for DUFC and to raise funds a twenty-week pool was organised along with bingo. Dinner dances were held for the end of season celebrations. The football club also took over organising of the village sports, which were held at the school, providing afternoon tea and a wide selection of prizes and trophies. The club also held a Christmas party for the village children. All of this was possible as they enjoyed a large committee of round 30 people!

This year's Summer Show, as you may have seen, was a little different! 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# Women's Institute

Lettuce, Pea and Mint Soup - Serves 4

A useful recipe if you have a surfeit of lettuce in the garden.

Soften a large chopped onion in 20gms of butter. Add the equivalent of a large lettuce (shredded) and stir for a few minutes. Add 500gms frozen peas and 900ml of hot stock made with a vegetable stock cube or Marigold powder and simmer for 15 minutes. Add a small handful of chopped mint and season with pepper. Blend or liquidise.

This is ideal for cooler days or can be frozen for a taste of summer in the wintertime.

Serve with a swirl of cream or creme fraiche and chopped mint. Enjoy!

#### WARNING - Attempted "Dog Snatch" in the Village

There has recently been an attempt to steal a dog from an owner within the village. Dog owners are advised to keep their dogs safe when walking them or allowing their dogs to run free in open spaces.

#### **Abbey Recreation Ground**

The CCTV system, that overlooks the recreation ground and skate park, is now operational. Images from the equipment are automatically sent to a central control hub organised by Fenland District Council who can refer matters directly to the police if instances of vandalism or anti-social behaviour are noted.

#### **Cleaning of the Clock Tower**

The concrete edging stones and plinths of the clock tower have now been cleaned. The Parish Council is making arrangements to remove the two existing lights from the top of the tower and to install uplighters on three sides of the tower.

The training is simple, taking only about an hour and if we could get 6 more volunteers trained, we could treble the number of patrols once we are able to start again. ### Personal Experience of a scam telephone call!

I *(a local resident)* was recently working from home when I received a telephone call from someone who said they were calling from Scotland Yard Fraud Squad. They had apprehended a lady trying to purchase a laptop from Argos and she was using my credit card. This person said that the lady claimed she knew me so they were simply verifying that I knew her.

The "policeman" gave me a fake police telephone number 161 to ring so I could verify his badge number and the crime reference number, which I did. I was then asked if I could give them details of any bank accounts, ISA's etc and the balances, so they could put an insurance policy on them in the event of my accounts being hacked.

Fortunately at this point alarm bells rang, I put the phone down and rang the local police, who confirmed 161 didn't exist and it was a scam.

My advice: - Always ring on a different telephone to verify a number, as the fraudster could still be on the phone when you ring out.

Google the telephone number and ring the police yourself, if you are concerned that it is an authentic case.
