

We can use prefer/would prefer with rather than or instead of to show the

choices we have. I would prefer to be too early rather than be too late. I prefer to go with dad instead of staying here with mum. Note that we use rather than + infinitive without to Prefer + -ing verb We use prefer + noun or -ing verb to talk about general preference, i.e. what we prefer in general, on every occasion. I love running, but he prefers cycling. We can use prefer with to to show the choices we have. The word to is a preposition here, so if we use a verb after to, it should take the -ing form.
