The publisher desirous of placing so generally useful a work for business reference, at each city and town in the State for the general accommodation of their respective inhabitants, requests that Postmasters and Hotel keepers will assist in giving effect to this desire by hanging up the Directory in their offices, for public reference.—Editor.

PREFACE.

CITIZENS OF DETROIT, an effort has been made to produce for you as reliable a Directory of your city as present circumstances would admit. The stores and dwellings require to be numbered under the authority of an ordinance of the City Government—and much dissatisfaction prevails amongst all classes—whether their pursuits are in business or in private—that this cause of complaint against, in all other respects, a highly efficient Municipal Executive, has not before this been removed.

I express my grateful acknowledgments for the liberal advertising support so cheerfully rendered on an untried effort by the merchants, manufacturers and professional men of the city, which enabled me to produce a Directory, that from its general style and appearance, I feel satisfied will obtain some degree of approbation.

The members of the Legal and Medical professions are all, I trust, accurately included under their respective alphabetical letter.

A book like this, with a limited number of copies, demands that it be supported generously by advertising on its pages, so as to produce a fitting remuneration to the compiler for the great expense of its production. The advertiser, it is hoped, will receive advantages co-extensive with the circulation of the work. By reference to the statistical department of the Directory, it will be observable that the compiler has enjoyed no sinecure during its preparation.

2,000 Copies have been printed, of which **500** are in progress of free distribution to all the Hotels and many of the Post Offices in the State and elsewhere, with a view to place before strangers, and those who trade with our city, the peculiar advantages it enjoys and offers to reciprocate, and the entire capacity of our wholesale houses to supply merchandise of every imaginable variety to country traders upon terms as liberal and advantageous; nay more so, for many reasons not necessary here to allude to, than they could obtain in cities at the seaboard. *Our wholesale houses having generally partners at the East whose care is employed in IMPORTING and purchasing from manufacturers, and first hands.*

I annex to the Directory a lithograph street map of the city of Detroit, prepared at considerable expense, which will aid the stranger at a distance to form a correct idea of the judicious beauty of the street plan. Within the fire limits of the city, the leading avenues of trade are all built up, substantially and beautifully of brick, in blocks of chaste and elegantly designed buildings, ranging from three to six stories; while the suburban outlets are rapidly filling up within a radius of several miles, with princely residences. Including the river, the map will exhibit nine great highways leading to and from the comparatively innumerable thriving cities and villages of Michigan, and elsewhere on its borders.

Located as Detroit is upon one of the finest rivers of the purest water of which any country in the world can boast; of a constantly undiminished navigable depth, and beauty of prospect; in so desirable a latitude also, that it not unfrequently presents an uninterrupted navigation in winter,—the Detroit River may justly be regarded as the foundation of the acquired and growing wealth of not only the men

of purely commercial pursuits, whose trade transactions are centered in Detroit, but, collaterally, in a very perceptible degree, the producing and commercial population of the cities and villages of Michigan generally, and States adjoining, have cause to appreciate this great highway by which wealth is transported to their doors. But, regarding health as the most precious of all other earthly blessings, it is as the great sanatory conservator of the people's health, that citizens of Detroit have the greater cause to cherish grateful feelings, while they contrast their incomparably superior condition in this particular, with that of other cities of similar commercial and numerical magnitude.

As an European, the days of my boyhood, and more matured manhood, having been spent amongst the beauteous verdant plains, vallies, hills and mountains of Ireland, and its ever-to-be-loved lakes, streams and rivers, and health-bracing seacoast; still, I believe the climate of Detroit is more conducive and protective of general health. The Detroit River is destined to be the tributary to its city of inconceivable wealth. The inexhaustible treasures of Iron and Copper lying only a few hundred miles above Detroit in our highly favored State, with the most desirable facilities for their development—must in time travel to us, or be forwarded further eastward by us; and, without encountering the personal hazards and sacrifices of "gold diggings" and "nuggets," the world may be assured there is wealth enough in Michigan, only awaiting the organization of effective means for its enriching development, enough to satisfy the wealth-loving cupidity of hundreds of thousands. Amongst settlers at Lake Superior there are European friends of my own whose reports of the inviting agricultural advantages of the Country around them are very encouraging, and had almost been successful in tempting me to a new emigration. There is no hesitancy in recommending the region of Lake Superior to newly arriving emigrants, who can rapidly build up cities there upon their own free properties; any number of laborers in fitting season can find abundance of remunerative employment.

Michigan is indebted to the Messrs. Tappscott, of Liverpool and New York, for their recommendation of it as a highly favored State (if not the most favored) in the Union. Prior to my own embarkation for America I confidentially requested their advice, which was cheerfully given, by letter, intimating substantially the advantages of Michigan; which needs only the settlement of the Emigrant to convince him, that it invitingly presents to his enterprise all the encouragements, and incentives to the employment of his industry and capital, that he could expect. Settling down amongst a self-relying, kind and noble people—uncontaminated and unspoiled by European monarchical and aristocratic habits of education—independent above the causes of feudal and agrarian occasions of quarrel—wealthy as the reward of their intelligent industry and characteristic integrity—the outstretched hand of sympathy and friendship is extended to the down trodden sons of toil in misgoverned Europe—offering them the full rewards of labor, intelligence, integrity and general good citizenship—a land full of enriching advantages and comforts—a constitution and government founded and consolidated on the simplest, but most enduring of all foundations,—the intelligible doctrine of individual right,—and the republican equality of every citizen. Here the threadbare fancies—the worn out expedencies—the man-debasing superstitions—the ignoble feeling of subserviency to men, measures and influences, whether political, lay or ecclesiastical, quickly give place to the original freshness of untrammelled enterprise—individual independence and self-reliance, while the excellent provisions of the laws enable the few executive police of the country to find in every good citizen a cheerful auxiliary in their enforcement. But it affords happiness to record that crime is very rare indeed. No European country can compare at par with the social progress of Michigan and the rest of our northern states.

DETROIT presents very beautiful geographical aspects as well as advantages. No

intelligent stranger, or arriving resident, can float up its magnificent river in the daytime and remain indifferent to the beauteous landscape through which he is passing. Emotions of delight spring up spontaneously,—and before the individual is aware, enthusiasm will hold his affections for our city within its pleasing trammels,—his admiration will receive new incitements;—view succeeding view on both sides of the river, in continued variety; until he finds the curtain of this beauteous panorama has dropped, upon which he will find painted the delightful Islands just above the city. The view of the Lakes St. Clair and Huron are here intercepted, and the stranger's eye and ear are arrested by the commotions of commerce—by the active movements of the large fleet of steamboats and sail craft surrounding him—the noise of the ten thousand hammers which in the machine and workshops of the city are incessantly shaping the fortunes of employers and employed;—and the involuntary decision of his skilled judgment repeats the general prediction, that, within this generation, Detroit will have attracted to it, from the influence of its natural advantages, its salubrity, its invested and developed capital—and the moral, social and educational attractions of its citizens—a population which may approach *One Hundred Thousand*.

There are many inviting fields of enterprise which I should be inclined to allude to; the intended limits of a preface are however far exceeded. Let capitalists at a distance be, however, informed that our city offers just at this moment the labor of about *ten thousand unemployed boys and girls*. We have the weightier manufactures in successful operation,—and it would not deteriorate the morals or wealth of our city or State even if these continued unemployed to maturity,—as our agricultural interests would absorb them as producers. The field of labor is however open to the capitalist, and a presumption is reasonable that where all our cloths are imported to clothe the annually increasing thousands of Michigan and the more remote settlers of other States—Detroit may be safely regarded as a point at which may be successfully developed both woolen and cotton manufactures to any required extent. The State in a word may be independently its own producer, manufacturer and consumer, exporting its redundancy in staples, wheat, flour, beef, pork, hides, fish, &c. and bring in exchange an abundant currency as a large balance of trade in its favor. With its present population of nearly **40,000** embracing all the elements and varieties of skilled industry—it is only yet in its infancy. There can be no more inviting field for profitable investment presenting itself to the capitalist and manufacturer of almost every denomination of trade;—as well as to the masses of eastern citizens, and European emigrants, to whom fertile lands, obtainable at small cost, situated in remunerating markets, are an object of paramount importance. The State at large is crowned with success, it is dotted over its whole extent with thriving cities and villages, with comparatively innumerable schools, churches, post offices, &c., with an educated, religious, temperate, and already large population. Detroit may look upon the State, of which she must ever be the great commercial metropolis, with feelings of admiration; and gratitude to a Divine Providence for his favoring goodness. Europe may regard it as peculiarly wealthy, well-governed, happy and prosperous, amongst the *constellation* of states that form the family of nations, confederated under *the banner of the Stars and Stripes*, constituting the great empire republic of North America, which is destined to arbitrate, if not to dictate, a rational code of popular liberty to the decaying Monarchies of THE WORLD.

Census of the City of Detroit for 1853.

It should plainly be the duty of governments from time to time to ascertain the general state of the people as respects their social and moral condition, without attempting to present other incentives to personal conduct than those which bind men together in the common bond of virtuous republican brotherhood, and which the advanced state of civilization, by which our country stands pre-eminent in the approbation of the world, teaches our people from the democratic code of our common christianity :

"Do unto others as you would they should do unto you."

Here is true fraternization ; here is a great universal platform, common to all ; here is an altar at which all the seemingly discordant tongues of religious society may converge into one loud voice of love for humanity, and consent harmoniously to praise the Supreme Common Creator.

With nearly twenty different sections of distinct national characteristics, and nearly twice that many different religious denominational elements, which sum up the population of our favored city—where on the habitable earth can be found, amongst so many thousands, more order—more respect for constituted law—more decorous regard for public morality than here? Turn over the picture!—Face it towards Europe!—Let the eyes of its respective governments look upon, and study its features!—and learn the profitable lesson, that tyranny cannot long live in harmony with universal education, which in communities, as well as with individuals, will be the great governing element! A population of nearly 40,000, before whose cupidity there is presented every temptation—without a single armed executive officer, policeman or soldier—presenting the daily report of "Crime Unknown!" Aye! turn the picture towards Europe!—Let her governments take a leaf out of this useful book of Brother Jonathan's republican experience—

"He is the freeman, whom the truth makes free."

Standing armies, to crush popular liberty, and to enforce the legislation of tyrants are here unknown!—The laws of involuntary honor, the result of sound educational principles, leave no necessity for the existence of a lurking detective police!

Property, real and personal, to the amount of 3,000,000, consisting of Rail Road, Banking and other similar descriptions—is at present protected from municipal taxation—by the terms of the State legislative enactment, under which this kind of property commutes all tax assessments against it by paying to the State (for State purposes) one per cent on Capital Stock. A remedy against this evident wrong to the income of the city, is much and immediately required; and when accomplished will be found to add to the income of the city to an amount which must be greatly felt in lessening the direct taxation to which the present rateable property of the city is subject.

**EXTRACT FROM ORDINANCE OF THE CITY GOVERNMENT, REGULATING
FARES OF COACHES AND CABS.**

SECTION 1. Provides that a licence shall be obtained to keep hackney coaches, cabs &c.,—which licence must contain the number borne by such coach or cab.

SECTION 2. Provides that the following rates shall be charged for the use of such vehicles under the following regulations:

For conveying a single person for each drive less than an hour, 00 25

For the use of coach or cab by the hour, to carry not more than four persons each 00 50

Children under twelve years, half the above rates.

When a cab is taken by the hour, the owner or driver thereof shall receive the price fixed for a full hour, whether the same be consumed or not; and after the first hour the charge shall be for fractional parts of hours, rateably, and not for full hours.

For every trunk carried on said cab the sum of twelve and a half cents.

The above rates shall be charged between the first of April and first of October, from 6 A. M. until 10 P. M., and double these rates from 10 P. M. to 6 A. M. Between the 1st October and 1st April, the above rates apply from 7 1-2 o'clock A. M., to 10 o'clock P. M., and double these rates from 10 P. M. to 7 1-2 A. M.

Penalty for breach of statute, not exceeding ten dollars.

SALMON.—Salmon begin to enter the rivers of Scotland and Ireland more or less about the month of April; it is, however, in June, July, and August, that the greatest quantities arrive. It is immediately after its arrival from the sea that the salmon is in perfection. In fresh water it eats comparatively little, and its flesh becomes gradually less solid. Several of the salmon fisheries established on the Tweed, the Tyne, the Shannon, and the Eden, produce an annual revenue of £5,000, £7,000, £10,000, and £12,000, to the proprietors. Near the mouth of the river Eden, as many as 182,000 large fish have been taken in seventy-two days.

INFLUENCE OF BANKING ON THE PUBLIC MORALS. — Banking exercises a powerful influence on the morals of society; it tends to produce honesty and punctuality in pecuniary engagements. Bankers, for their own interest, always have a regard to the moral character of the party with whom they deal; they enquire whether he be honest or tricky, industrious or idle, prudent or speculative, thrifty or prodigal; and they will more readily make advances to a man of moderate property and good morals, than to a man of large property but inferior reputation. Thus, the establishment of a bank in any place immediately advances the pecuniary value of a good moral character. There are numerous instances of persons having arisen from obscurity to wealth only by means of their moral character, and the confidence which that character produced in the mind of their banker. It is not merely by way of loan or discount that a banker serves such a person; he also speaks well of him to persons who may make inquiries respecting him; and the banker's good opinion will be the means of procuring a higher degree of credit with the parties with whom he

trades. These effects are easily perceivable in country towns; and, even in London, if a house be known to have engaged in gambling or smuggling transactions, or in any other way to have acted discreditably, their bills will be taken by the bankers less readily than those of an honorable house of inferior property. It is thus that the bankers perform the functions of public conservators of the commercial virtues. From motives of private interest they encourage the industrious, the prudent, the punctual, and the honest, while they discountenance the spendthrift and the gambler, the liar and the knave. They hold out inducements to uprightness, which are not disregarded by even the most abandoned. There is many a man who would be deterred from dishonesty by the frown of a banker, though he might care but little for the admonitions of a bishop.

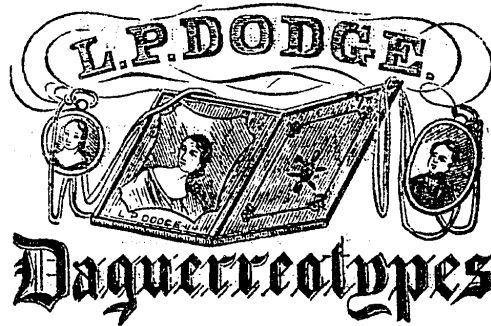



DESTRUCTIVE WORMS.—In less than a year after the commodious jetty built at Valparaiso was finished, those piles which were not defended by copper were completely reduced to a honeycomb state, by a curious little animal, called an auger worm (*teredo navalis*,) from the resemblance its head bears to a common auger. It is small, white, and almost gelatinous, with the exception of the head, which is armed with two movable plates of shell, by which it is presumed the animal perforates the wood. As it advances in the work of destruction, it lengthens and increases in size, constantly enlarging the cell in proportion to the demand for accommodation. The cell is lined with a calcareous coating (the secretion of the animal) similar to the shells of the molluscous tribes. The worm sometimes attains several feet in length, and an inch in diameter. From the havoc made on the jetty it may be easily inferred, what would be the fate of a vessel not defended by copper, were she to remain long in this port.

stopped suddenly when within about two inches of the floor. As this feat was again and again repeated, we have no doubt that it was an experiment to try the strength of his cord: At length he threw himself upon the back of the beetle, attached the web to the posterior extremities, and then retreated. 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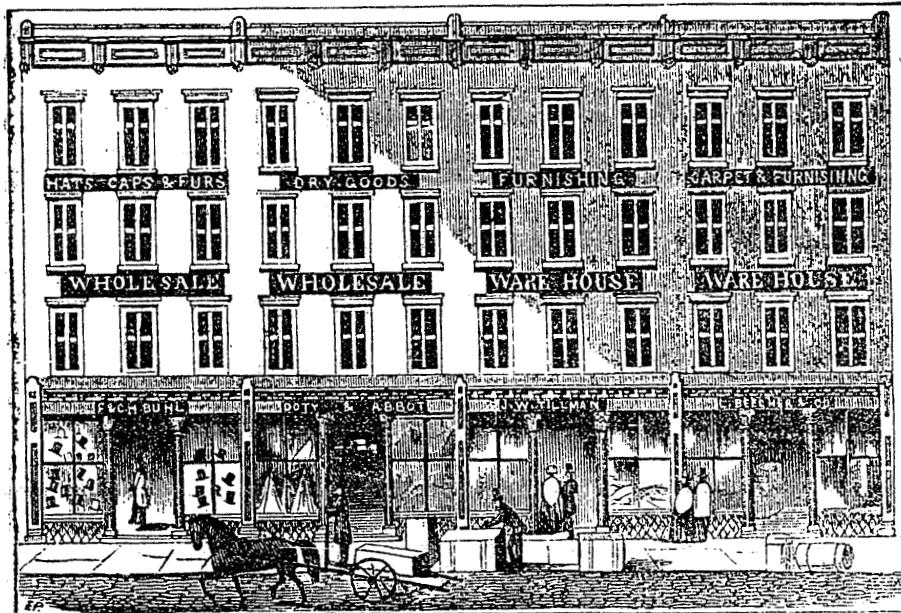

TO MANAGE A REARING HORSE.—In preference to the dangerous experiment of pulling a rearing horse backward, I recommend the adoption of the following method: Whenever you perceive the horse's inclination to rear, separate your reins and prepare for him. The instant he is about to rise, slacken one hand and bend or twist his head with the other, keeping your hands low. This bending compels him to move a hind leg, and of necessity brings his fore-feet down. Instantly twist him completely round two or three times, which will confuse him very much, and completely throw him off his guard. The moment you have finished twisting him round, place his head in the direction you wish him to proceed, apply the spurs, and he will not fail to go forward; if the situation be convenient, press him into a gallop, and apply the spurs and whip two or three times severely. The horse will not perhaps be quite satisfied with the first defeat, but may feel disposed to try again for the mastery. Should this be the case, you have only to twist him &c. as before, and

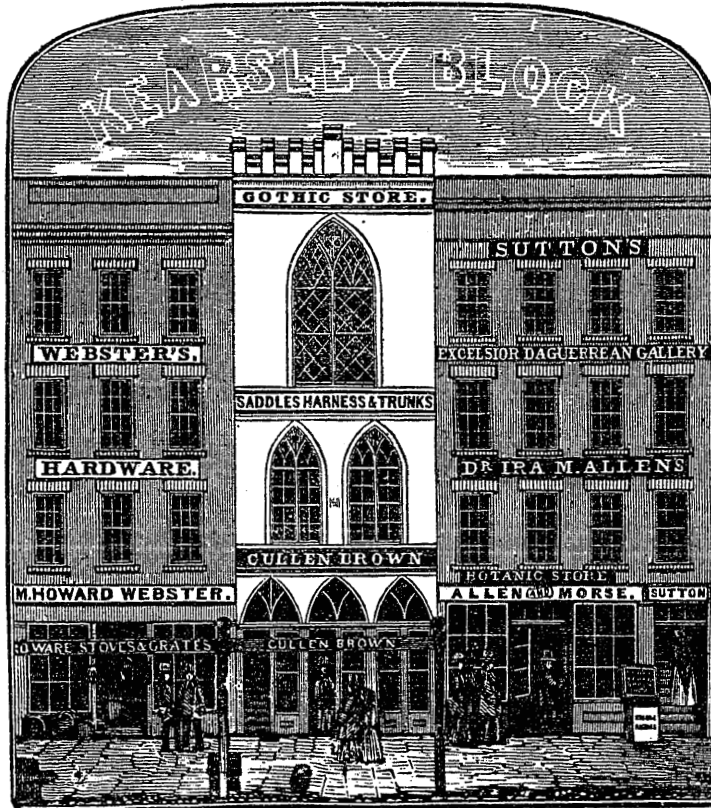

LONGEVITY OF TREES.—Decandolle holds that "trees do not die of old age, in the real sense of the word," by which he seems to mean that they would live for ever if provided with an unlimited supply of nourishment, and not destroyed by storms or some of the many accidents which trees are subject to. The baobab tree, according to Adanson's ingenious computation, might be 5000 years old, but it grows in climes unlike ours, where it escapes the hurtful vicissitudes of frost and heat. In our own country there are oaks, elms, and yews, still flourishing in all the pride of the forest, which probably have been the contemporaries of David and Solomon. Decandolle thinks that the yews of Fountains Abbey, near Ripon, may have stood 1200 years; those of Crowhurst churchyard, in Surrey, 1450; the yew of Fortingal, at the entrance of Glenlyon, Perth, 2500; and that in Braburn churchyard, Kent, 3000. These are startling statements, but they proceed from a high authority, and are based on observations that entitle them to respect.

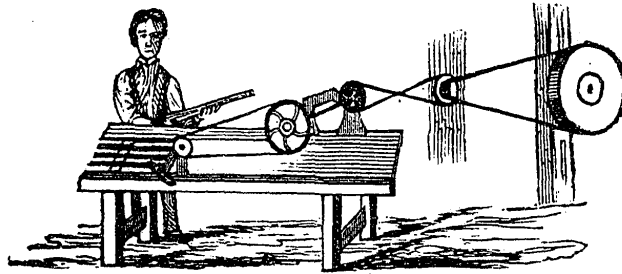

BARK.—An Indian, in a delirious fever, having been left by his companions by the side of a river, for the purpose of quenching his thirst, conceiving him incurable, drank large and copious draughts of the stream, which, having imbibed the virtues of the bark from the trees which grew upon its margin, soon vanquished the fever, and he returned to his astonished friends perfectly restored. The singularity of the circumstance excited their surprise, and waked their superstition; the indisposed crowded round the holy stream, as they termed it, and experienced its healing effects, without being able to discover the cause from which it was derived. The sages of the tribes, however, found out, at length, in what it consisted, and disclosed the important secret. In the year 1640, the Americans became acquainted with the use of this excellent medicine; and in 1649 its fame had extended into Spain, Italy, and Rome, through the representation of Cardinal Lugo, and other Jesuits, who had beheld its surprising and wonderful effects.

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INDIAN CANNON.—At Kubberpore na Jeal, in India, there is a cannon two hundred and thirteen inches long, sixty-six inches round the muzzle, and eighteen inches round the calibre. It has five, and had originally six equidistant rings, by which it was lifted up. This gun is called by the natives Jaun Kushall, or the destroyer of life, and its casting and position are attributed to the doosas or divinities, although its almost obliterated Persian inscriptions declare its formation by human means. But what is most extraordinary about it is, that two peepul trees have grown both cannon and carriage into themselves. Fragments of the iron, a spring, one of the linches, and part of the woodwork, protrude from between the roots and bodies of these trees, but the trees alone entirely support the gun, one of the rings of which, and half of its whole length, are completely hid between and inside their bark and trunks. A more curious sight, or a cannon more firmly fixed, though by the mere gradual growth of two trees, cannot well be imagined. The Indians assert that it was only once fired, and sent the ball twenty-four miles!!

sold the whole to a silversmith, who was also a watchmaker. The purchaser gave the full price for the coins, but refused to give more for the watch than the value of the silver case, 2s. 9d. The works, with the face on (which looked like iron,) were left in a drawer frequently opened. After a while the friction on the face showed it to be silver, with an inscription on it. This being deciphered by clearing the metal, was found to be "Jehanni Miltono, 1621," and contained also the name of the maker, a person in Pope's Head-alley, London, whose name appears in the tables of the Watchmakers' Company for that period. The watch is well made for the time, and would seem an appropriate present for a young gentleman on entering life. The present possessor had it as a token of gratitude for some former favor from the silversmith, and the relic has become an object of inquiry for purchase at a considerable price for the British Museum.

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ORIGINAL COST OF FURS.—By comparing the value given to the Indians for their furs, and the price they are sold for by the Hudson's Bay Company in London, we may draw our conclusions as to the oppression of those people. Three marten skins are obtained for a coarse knife, the utmost value of which, including the expense of conveying it to those distant regions, cannot be estimated at more than a shilling; and three of these skins were sold, last January, in London, for five guineas. With the more expensive furs, such as the black fox, or sea-otter, the profit is more than tripled; and, but a few years ago, a single skin of the former species sold for fifty guineas, while the native obtained in exchange the value of four shillings.

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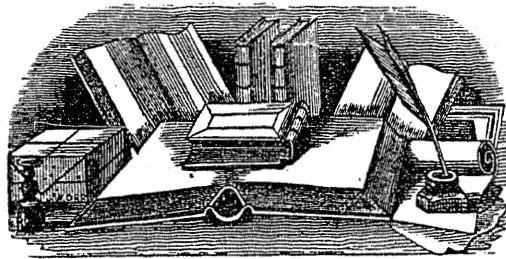

executed. Sleep was out of the question, and the whole body being deranged in consequence of this, medical art was called in, but nothing availed, and in six months the person died without having for one moment lost the strange sensation. We have heard of another instance of this in an aged person, who, from the year 1829, had the greatest difficulty in going to sleep, because he every evening feels an irresistible desire to hear an air which belongs to the mountains of Auvergne. He has tried reading aloud, thinking deeply, and several other means to get rid of it, but it is of no use, he is invariably forced, mechanically, to utter the words in the idiom of Auvergne. We ourselves have seen the most alarming effects produced upon children by music to which they were unaccustomed, and fevers ensue in consequence.

LIABILITY FOR WIFE'S DEBTS. — In a case which was argued three times in the Court of King's Bench, and the judges being divided, was adjourned to the Exchequer, nine of the judges held that a husband was not liable for the necessaries furnished to a wife during a separation without his consent, having given the plaintiff notice not to trust her, and notwithstanding that he did not allow her any maintenance. A tradesman supplying a wife with goods unsuitable to her station in life, without any authority from her husband, does so at his own risk. In an action for wearing apparel supplied to a married woman, without the husband's knowledge, and which she had received in quantities unsuited to her

rank, the husband was found not liable; and it was held to be unnecessary to prove that the wearing apparel was not required by the wife, in consequence of her being supplied with proper clothing from another quarter. These seem to be the cases which would apply to persons in the middle ranks of society, and it would appear that in all these (with the exception above mentioned) the husband was absolutely absolved from the claims of those who had trusted his wife, without being compelled either to give general or particular notice to tradesmen. It may perhaps seem unjust to fix a tradesman, who has supplied a woman he knows to be married, and who has before traded with him, with a knowledge of facts which it is very improbable he could be acquainted with; but it must be recollected that in every case it is the duty of tradesmen to make cautious inquiry as to the situation, capabilities, and liabilities of the fair one he may be induced to trust, as he could not recover from the husband beyond the extent to which a proper investigation would have shown him to be liable.

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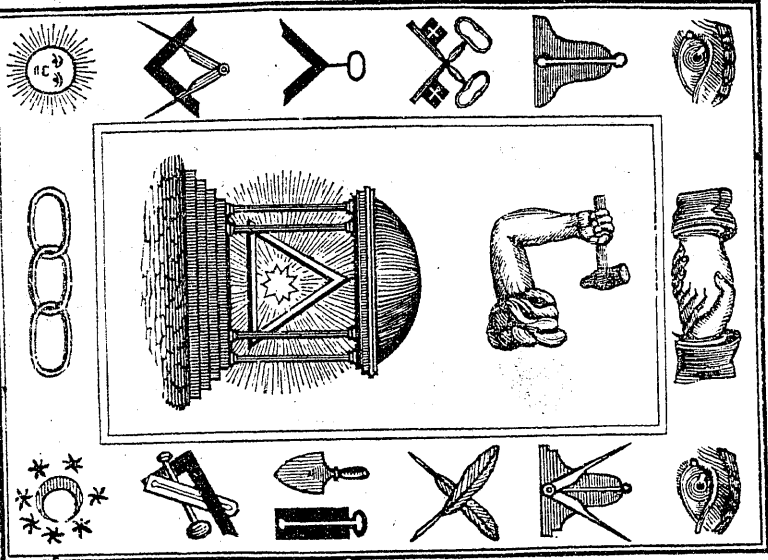

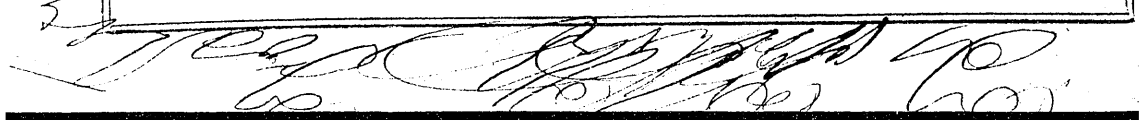

HOW TO DRY PEACHES.—Take those of the best quality, just as they are ripe enough to eat, halve them, remove the stones, and sprinkle over them, in the hollow from which the pit was taken, a little nice sugar, dry them on a brick oven, after the bread is withdrawn. They are far better than if dried in the sun, retaining their aroma and flavor, besides are totally free from insects. Prepared in this way from peaches fully ripe, they need no cooking, but are simply soaked in cold water. All the sugar they require, ranging of course with the variety, is added while drying. Peaches thus dried and prepared, are only inferior to the fresh fruit, of which they retain the flavor in a remarkable degree.

The water in the Schuylkill at Reading, the *Gazette* says, appears to have changed color within the last ten days. Its usual greenish hue is turned to blue, for some cause as yet unexplained. Some attribute it to the dregs of the coal mines which are emptied into the river in Schuylkill county, and others to the sinking of two boats loaded with lime, which occurred recently in Felix's dam, eight miles above us. Whether either cause would be sufficient to account for the change, we have not sufficient knowledge enough to determine. But that the water has become impregnated with some foreign substance, is evident from the fact of which we have positive assurance, that it has occasioned a great mortality among the fish. They are said to be found dead in great numbers along the river, for miles above town.

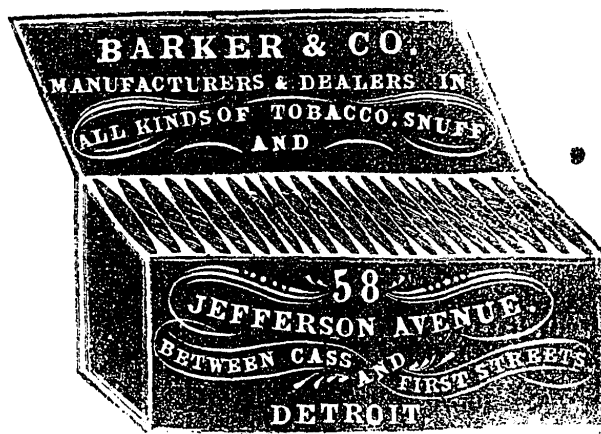

CHERRIES WITHOUT STONES.—Cherries without stones have been produced in France, by the following method: In the spring before the circulation, a young seedling cherry tree is split from the upper extremity down to the fork of its roots; then by means of a piece of wood in form of a spatula, the pith is carefully removed from the tree, in such a manner as to avoid any excoriation, or any other injury; a knife is used only for commencing the split. Afterwards the two sections are brought together and tied with woolen, and care taken to close hermetically with clay, the whole of the cleft. The sap soon reunites the separated portions of the tree, and two years afterwards cherries are produced of the usual appearance, but instead of stones there will only be soft pellicks.

THE BALLOT SYSTEM IN MISSOURI.—To guard against fraudulent voting in Missouri, the election law provides that the number placed opposite each man's name, when he votes, must also be put on his ballot before it is deposited in the box. By this means the vote of every man can be ascertained after the election is over. Or if after the votes are counted the number of ballots should not correspond with the number of names registered, the error can be easily corrected by comparing the numbers on the ballots with the numbers on the register.

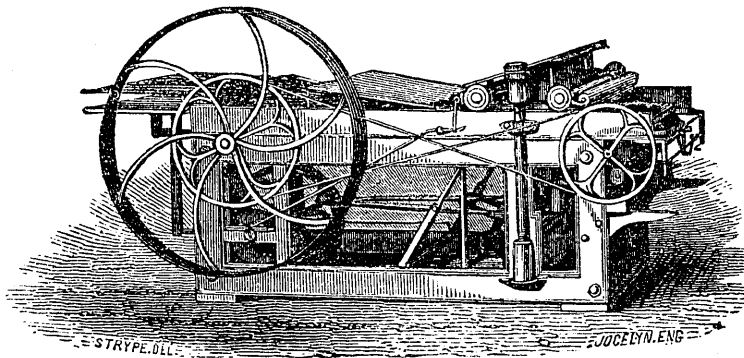

BLACKBERRY WINE.—All housewives are well acquainted with the medical effect of the blackberry. As the season of bowel complaint approaches, we give the following recipes for blackberry wine and cordial.

To make a wine equal in value to port, take ripe blackberries, or dewberries, and press them, let the juice stand thirty-six hours to ferment, skim off whatever rises to the top, and then to every gallon of the juice add a quart of water and three pounds of sugar, brown sugar will do, let it stand in open vessels for twenty-four hours, skim and strain it, and then barrel it until March, when it should be carefully racked off and bottled.

them, which latter was not above six weeks old. 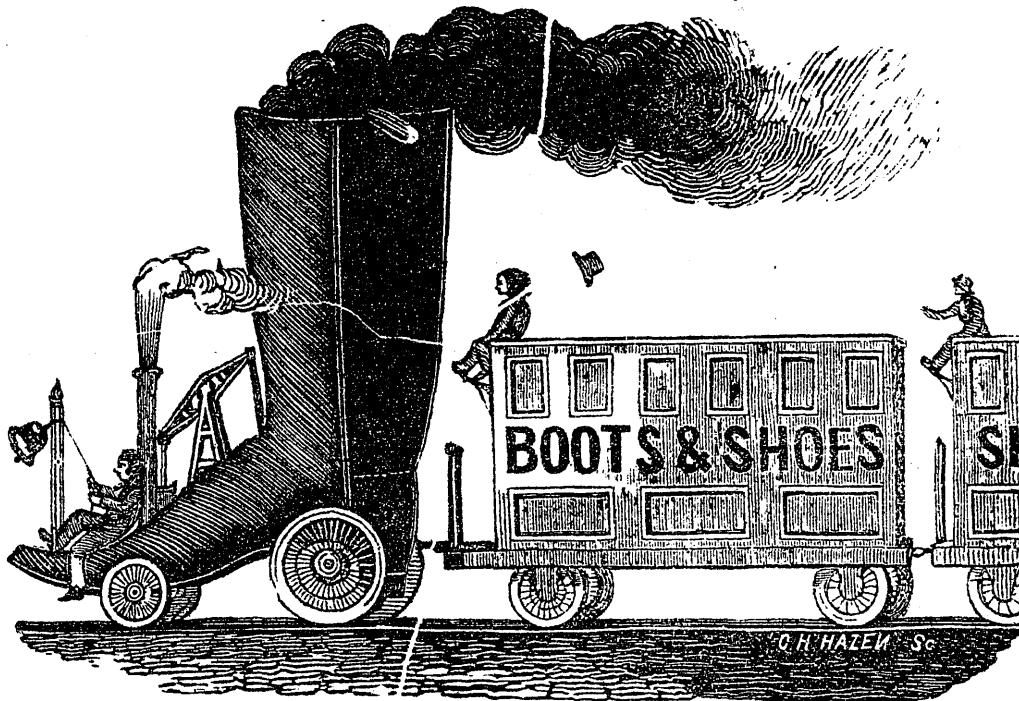

Afterwards we will have the oration printed, and I will depend on the proceeds of the sale for my pay." Mr. W. turned to me, "Jack, what shall I do?" "Prepare the oration," I said. The oration was prepared and delivered; and so much were the citizens gratified that a copy was urgently requested for publication. From the sales, the debt due the liberal merchant was paid, and a considerable surplus left for Mr. Webster's own use."

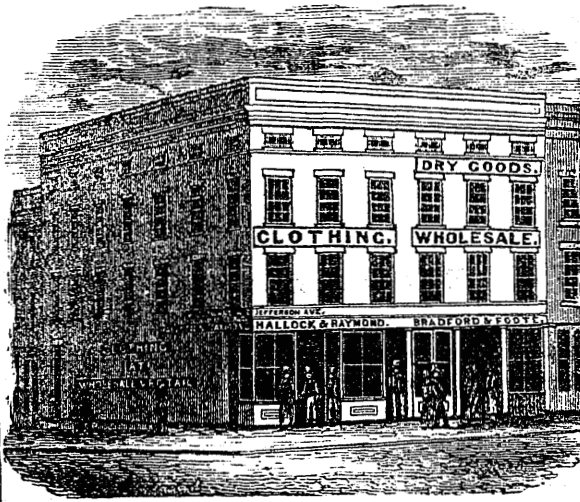

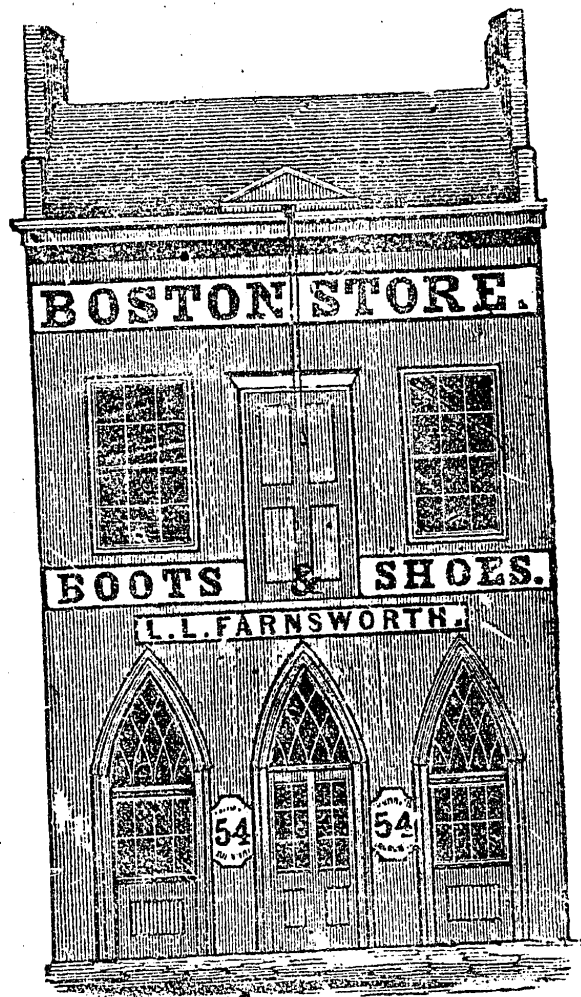

**PHILOSOPHY.**—Philosophers have been talking to us ever since the invention of language, and have been endeavoring to elucidate the phenomena of mind—and what have they ever taught, or what have we learned? What is called the science or philosophy of mind is not a whit forwarder than it was four thousand years ago; the acutest modern philosophers know nothing more of the matter than did the disciples of Pythagoras.

**STERLING MONEY.**—As to the origin of Sterling money, there are three opinions. The first is, that it is derived from Stirling Castle, and that Edward I. having penetrated so far into Scotland, caused a coin to be struck there, which he called Sterling. The second opinion derives it from the figure of a bird called starling, which appears about the cross in the ancient arms of England. The third, most probable, assigns its true origin by deducing it from Esterling; for in the time of Henry III. it is called Moneta Esterlingorum, the money of the Esterlings, or people of the East, who came to England to refine the silver of which it was made, and hence it was valued more than any other coin, on account of the purity of its substance. The denomination of their weights and their parts is of the Saxon or Esterling tongue, as pound, shilling, penny, and farthing, which are so called in their language of the present day.

**KNUD IVERSON,**  
**THE HONEST BOY OF CHICAGO.**

TO THOSE WHO WISH TO PERPETUATE THE REMEMBRANCE OF A NOBLE DEED.

*From the Chicago Daily Press.*

On the 9th day of August last, a party of rowdy boys, from fourteen to eighteen years of age, attempted to force a little boy about ten years old, named Knud Iverson, to steal fruit for them from the garden of Daniel Elston, Esq., of this city. On his persisting to refuse to steal, they "ducked" him in the river till he was drowned. He was a son of one of our most estimable Norwegian citizens—a member of the Evangelical Lutheran church. His little son was carefully instructed in the principles of Christianity; he was so intelligent, and had given such clear and decided evidence of piety, that he had been admitted as a member of the same church. His place in the Sabbath school was never vacant, and his lessons were always learned. Such was this noble boy.

A proposition to erect a monument to his memory with a subscription of ten dollars, came from Nathan C. Ely, Esq., President of the Peter Cooper Insurance Company, of New York; and was seconded by Thomas B. Bryan, Esq., of this city, with a subscription of one hundred dollars. The undersigned have been appointed a Committee, by a meeting of the citizens, to take this matter in charge. As others may wish to contribute to erect a monument to that noble little Norwegian boy, who would rather die than steal, we respectfully request those papers who have copied an account of this incident, and all others, to give this also an insertion. Who wishes to help perpetuate the principle, to maintain which this little hero lost his life. Contributions may be sent to the Treasurer, S. L. Brown, Chicago, Illinois. They will be duly acknowledged in the Chicago papers.

It is desirable that at least one thousand dollars should be collected, and five and even ten times that sum might be appropriately used. The Committee propose, with the permission of the Common Council, to erect the monument upon one of the public Squares of the City.

HOW TO DO UP SHIRT BOSOMS.—We have often heard ladies expressing a desire to know by what process the fine gloss observable on new linens, shirt bosoms, &c., is produced; and in order to gratify them, we subjoin the following recipe for making Gum Arabic Starch:—

Take two ounces of fine white gum arabic powder, put it into a pitcher and pour on it a pint or more of boiling water, according to the degree of strength you desire, and then having covered it let it set all night, in the morning pour it carefully from the drugs into a clean bottle, cork it, and keep it for use. A tablespoon full of gum water, stirred into a pint of starch made in the usual manner, will give to lawns, (either white or printed,) a look of newness, when nothing else can restore them after washing.

GENTLEMEN:—In conformity with your instructions, as contained in the resolution passed at your meeting of November 5th, 1852, I beg leave to submit the following report of the condition of the works, the receipts and disbursements, to December 1st, and an estimate of the cost of construction of new works.

Though yet entirely inadequate to the wants of our rapidly growing city, some considerable improvement has been made in the condition of the water works since the

control and management of them was transferred to you. For several years past there has been much and just complaint of an insufficient supply of water in different parts of the city. This had resulted from various causes, the most prominent of which was that the distributing pipes, which are principally logs of small calibre, were laid regardless of any system or plan. As the limits of the city extended, persons were permitted to lay the logs to their premises, and extensions have in many instances, from time to time, been made on the same lines, until lines of logs of 2 inches bore were ascertained to be supplying water to from 50 to 80 families. Also, in many instances the connection between these extensions was found to have been made with a lead pipe of 5-8 of an inch interior diameter. In one instance, in the 8th ward, three blocks of buildings were found to be supplied through a pipe of that size. In another instance, in the 1st ward, the same number of blocks were supplied in the same manner; and the entire supply to that portion of the 5th ward north of Macomb avenue and west of the Grand Circus and Witherell street, was supplied through three pipes of that size. With this defective arrangement of distribution it could not be supposed that the people using from these lines would be able to obtain the supply of water necessary to their health and comfort. This defect, to some extent, has been remedied by laying new lines of iron pipes into those districts during the past season, which has resulted in furnishing for the present a good and constant supply. It can, however, be looked upon only as a temporary relief, as the rapid increase of the city demands a more extended system of water supply.

As a proof of the increased demand, I would state that from May 1st to December 1st, 1852, a period of seven months, 358 new hydrants have been erected. Of these 48 only are connected with the iron pipes, and 310 are connected with the logs.

At the time the works were brought under our charge there had been laid iron pipes as follows:

So that the entire length of pipes now laid amount to 6 miles 1319 feet.

In addition to the iron pipes there are now in use from 30 to 40 miles of wooden logs, which, for the true interest of the works and the citizens, should be disconnected from the works and replaced with a proper system of iron mains and distributing pipes, as rapidly as means and economy may allow.

The objections to logs are that they can supply but a limited quantity of water ; that they are continually decaying, rendering the water unwholesome, and getting out of order, so that leakages are produced, and a large part of the water pumped is wasted. This increases the expense of every part of operating ; it increases the duty of the engines, the consumption of fuel, and the expenses of repairs. In the statement of expenses given below, you will observe that \$817,61 has been paid during the seven months ending December 1st, for the repairs of logs, cisterns, &c. This is but one branch of the expense ; and it would be difficult to say what proportion of the expenses of repairs and fuel at the Engine House should be charged to the same account.

Another cause of insufficient supply is attributable to the small size of the reservoir, and the construction of the engines combined. In proof of this, I would call your attention to the following tabular statement of the duty of the engines during the past seven months.

The capacity of the reservoir when full is 353,430 gallons, and the engines are generally stopped when the water is within 18 inches of the top.

The above table shows the average daily use of water during a period of seven months to have been 2 1-3 times the utmost capacity of the reservoir. Now, to give a full and ample supply, the water should be kept constantly at the same elevation in the reservoir, and the engine should be so run as just to supply the amount drawn off. But the construction of the engines will not permit this.

The two engines now in use, the larger being 150 and the small one 45 horses power, are both non-condensing, and are run at a high pressure of steam, and either of them, while being run, elevates into the reservoir a larger quantity of water than is drawn off for supply to the town, so that the only way of operating is to allow several feet of the water in the reservoir to be drawn off—to start the engine, and run until the reservoir is refilled, and then stop again, to go over the same routine. Thus there are several "runs" made during each day, and the head in the reservoir, varying at each "stop" and "start," effects the supply to hydrants connected with the pipes in the more elevated parts of the city, making the supply irregular and intermitent.

This mode of operating, caused by the incapacity of the reservoir, together with the use of steam at high pressure is only very expensive. The fires have to be kept burning almost constantly, and at each "run" the steam has to be raised with an extra expense of fuel.

By reference to the tabular statement above, the average daily consumption of water is shown to have been 826,505 gallons, which has been raised to an elevation of 70 feet at a cost for fuel of \$6 05. This is believed to be a more extensive duty than that of any other pumping engine used for supplying water to towns. The engine at the Cincinnati works elevates 1,700,000 gallon 180 feet high for \$5 70, and to elevate the same number of gallons only 70 feet high with the Detroit engine would cost \$12 46.—In Buffalo, a city twice the size of Detroit, the water is raised 88 feet high for \$5 per day. The number of gallons pumped daily in the latter city I have not been able to ascertain. Mr. Wicksteed's Cornish engine at the East London Water Works, does more than twice as much duty for the fuel consumed as the Cincinnati engine. From the examination I have been able to give to the subject, I am satisfied that we are operating the present works at a loss of more than \$1200 per year for fuel alone, and if continued upon the same plan, this proportion of loss will increase at the same rate with the increase of our inhabitants. The only remedy for this present and prospective evil, is the construction of a new reservoir and the adoption of the Cornish pumping engine, (low pressure,) in the place of the high pressure engines now in use.

In the estimate of the cost of new works which I give below, a new reservoir of the

capacity of 10,000,000 gallons is included. The design is to build it of earth embankments, with two compartments, so that either compartment can be cleaned without shutting off the supply from town as at present.

There is also included an estimate for two Cornish engines. You may consider it unnecessary to procure both of these at present, but one of them should be contracted for at the earliest possible period. The small engine at present in use, after another season will be entirely inadequate to any effective duty, as the probable increase of inhabitants will cause a greater consumption of water than it is capable of pumping. And as no works can be considered complete without two engines, one always being kept in reserve in case of accidents, you will readily perceive the necessity of procuring a new engine. The 150 horse power high pressure engine can be retained to advantage for the reserve engine at present. But in a very few years, you will probably find it necessary to replace it with the second Cornish engine.

While the subject of engines is under consideration, I would direct your attention to the following remarks upon "condensing and high pressure engines," taken from a valuable work upon the steam engine, published by the "Artizan Club:"

"Generally, all engines are made on the high pressure plan, where the carriage of condensing water would be inconvenient, or the first cost of the machine becomes a point of more importance than an increased consumption of fuel. High pressure engines are, *ceteris paribus*, necessarily more expensive in fuel than low pressure engines, as they occasion the loss of power derivable from a vacuum, and as the quantity of heat in the *same weight* of steam is nearly the same at all pressures, there is no countervailing source of economy to compensate for this deduction. The use of high pressure engines in circumstances in which the low pressure engine is applicable, is not to be commended; and the high pressure engine is rarely employed for other purposes than locomotion on railways, except in the case of very small engines required for some temporary or trivial purpose."

I would also call your attention to the following remarks upon Cornish pumping engines, taken from a report of J. H. McAlpine, Esq., Chief Engineer of the State of New York, made to the Water Commissioner of the City of Albany, in August 1850:

"The Cornish pumping engines have been regarded by mechanics as the most perfect structures which have been designed by modern engineers. Indeed they have been copied and applied to other works, where the peculiar circumstances of their ar-

rangement were quite inapplicable, although their economy and effect have been quite remarkable.

"Mr. Wicksteed, the Engineer of the East London Water Works, in 1843 took down a large and expensive Boulton and Watt engine, and substituted one of the Cornish engines, for that company's works, which was operated with one-half of the previous expense.

"The duty performed by each of the pumping engines at the mines in Cornwall, has been kept since 1822, and led to the most careful examination of every means of reducing the expense of working them.

"Other plans of pumping engines have been designed, some of which rival the Cornish engines. Among these, however, the gigantic engines erected in 1843, to drain the Harlaem Mere, in Holland, are the most celebrated.

"Many of the cities in the United States are supplied by water elevated by pumping engines; but these do not compare favorably with similar works erected in Great Britain and on the Continent.

"The Cornish engine may be generally described as a vertical, condensing, beam engine, with a large cylinder intended to use the expansive force of the steam to its most useful extent, with pumps driven by a direct connection from the engine beam.

"The great depth of the mines require plunger rods of great length and weight, and this circumstance is made available by using the power of the engine mainly to elevate the rods, which in their descent force up a corresponding weight of water.

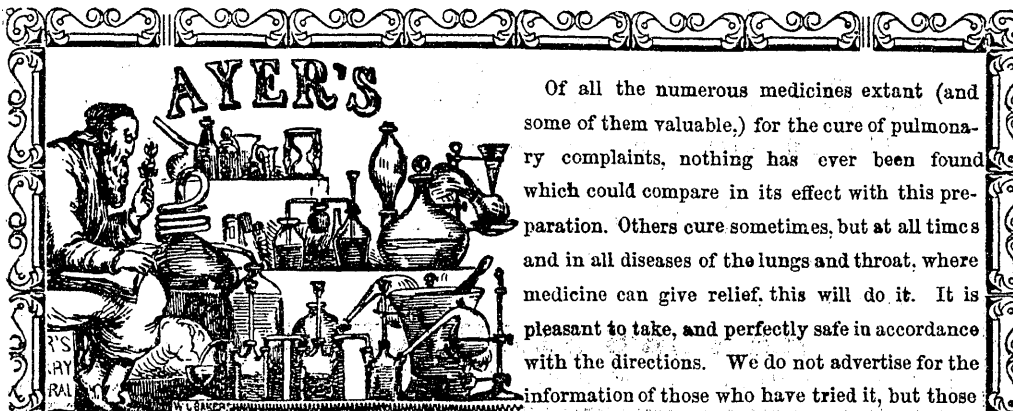
"When they are too heavy or too light to elevate the quantity of water required, they are adjusted with weights, added to the beam.

"From the examination which has been given to the subject, a steam engine constructed nearly after the approved form of the Cornish engine, and a plunger pump attached to each end of the arm of the engine beam, would be recommended."

I may add that another proof of the perfect adaptability of the Cornish engine to the purposes of water works is the complete control which the engineer can always have over the machine. The running of the engine can be so regulated as to make one or fifteen strokes per minute, and thus in cases of necessity, could be so gauged as to pump into the reservoir the exact amount of water being drawn off, and by that means retain a constant head.

The incapacity of the present works is also frequently felt in cases of fires. In the

upper parts of the city the feed pipes to the fire cisterns are so small, that one engine can be supplied only for a short time. At a late fire on the Woodward avenue, between State and Grand River streets, where two small frame buildings were burned, all the cisterns in the vicinity were entirely emptied, and as a last resort the firemen were compelled to form a line of engines from the reservoir on the corner of Campus Martius and Monroe avenue. The fire occurred at about two o'clock in the morning, and the feed pipes were left running, but the cisterns were not all refilled until the next evening! To about one half of the settled portion of the city, there is no adequate protection afforded from fire. To the well regulated Fire Department which we have, this state of things would seem to be but little encouragement.

In the economical management of the works, there is also one other matter which demands attention and improvement. Most of the hydrants now in use are defective in construction and material, and cause a large and unnecessary waste of water. In order to render the first cost as cheap as possible, it is the practice to use the lightest lead pipe in their construction. In addition to this, in order to save expense, the cocks or faucets are made without any regard to strength or finish. These cocks are placed in the ground, and the water is drawn by turning a rod connected with them. The cocks soon become impaired by use, in consequence of the sediment contained in the water, and many leakages thus occur, the water from which passes off unobserved through drains, while in other cases, cellars are inundated and the foundations of buildings undermined and weakened. The general adoption of the patent safety valve hydrant, invented by Mr. Bartholomew, and adopted and strongly recommended by the Croton Board in New-York, is very desirable, not only for the protection and safety of the works, but for the health and ultimate economy of those using water.

The first cost of these is more than of those now in use, but they will so seldom need repairs that the difference should not be thought of. Should they be generally introduced here, they can be furnished for \$6 each, being \$2 more than the cost of the hydrants at present used. This hydrant is self-acting, in part, shutting off the water when not in use, and permits of no escape of water, except above ground, at the common outlet. Another favorable consideration which this hydrant has, is the easy access which is afforded for making repairs when out of order, making it unnecessary to remove the stock or dig up the pavement or grounds, as is customary with the ordinary hydrant.

### Detroit Young Men's Benevolent Society.

This society, having now been in active operation for five years, it is supposed that its general character and objects are generally understood.

In few words, its object is to relieve the poor and unfortunate; to assist them to earn their own maintenance; to prevent the immorality of street begging; thereby protecting the public from imposture, and presenting opportunity to individuals to maintain themselves and families, by honorable labor. The first great object would be to relieve actual distress; the abodes of want are therefore personally visited, and public benevolence through the society's agency is with intelligent discrimination extended cheerfully to its object. A little timely aid, discreetly bestowed in this manner is, often not only the means of restoring an individual to thrift and good citizenship—but in the aggregated influences of such benevolent supervision, the operations of the society may justly be regarded as a great conservator of public morality and local tranquility. The successive annual appeals to the wealthy of the city to sustain this their great public almoner, have been met with generous and general approval—but the society wants increased means to be increasingly useful.

By the society's plan of operations the city is divided into a convenient number of Districts for visitation. A committee of three is assigned to each District—who become vigilant detectors of lurking poverty—ascertaining its cause and applying such remedy as may be available.

The relief afforded is usually either in fuel, clothing, food or medicine, or the care of a physician. In a few cases it has been necessary to procure stoves, and sometimes implements of labor, and occasionally the payment of a month's rent for a shelter for the homeless. Money, except under the most justifying circumstances, is rarely ever donated. These committees report their action, the amount and nature of their disbursements, with such facts and observations as may be interesting or useful at each month's meeting of the society. From these reports, those not accustomed to such researches, might derive much interesting and instructive information.

During the last winter and spring, the number of families visited and relieved was ONE HUNDRED AND NINETY-SIX, and containing about SIX HUNDRED PERSONS.

There were distributed 200 cords of wood in about 500 loads. The cost of provisions distributed from the society's depot, exclusive of donations in kind, was \$237 05, and the whole expenses of the depot, including provisions, rent, pay of storekeeper, and carting of wood, \$436 09. The cost of wood, \$460.

The number of sick visited by the society's physician, and the recipients of alms was 47.

## Detroit Public Schools.

These schools have been established under an act of the Legislature, passed in eighteen hundred and forty two, and several amendatory acts. They are under the charge of a “Board of Education,” composed of two *School Inspectors* from each ward in the city, one of whom is elected by the people in each ward, at the annual

charter election in March. The Inspectors hold their offices for two years, and sixteen members now constitute the Board.

These schools are sustained in the following manner; 1st, the proportion belonging to the city from the interest of the State Primary School fund, amounting in the year 1852 to about three thousand dollars; 2d, an annual tax authorised to be levied by the Common Council upon the taxable property of the city, not exceeding in each year one dollar for each child in the city, between the ages of four and eighteen years; 3d, an extra tax of fifteen hundred dollars annually for the purchase of lots, and for building purposes, provided the freemen at a meeting called for the purpose shall consent to the same; 4th, by an intelligent and sound public opinion which fully appreciates the importance of universal education in a free country.

There are twenty-eight schools under the charge of the Board, counting the different departments of the Union Schools, and there are thirty-nine teachers in the employ of the Board whose salaries range from one hundred up to six hundred-and-sixty dollars per annum. Teachers are appointed by the Board, after the applicant shall have undergone a thorough examination in public and received a certificate of qualification from the committee on teachers. The appointments are usually made in April for a year, and salaries are paid, one quarter at the end of the first term, one half at the end of the second term, and the balance at the end of the year.

The school year is divided into three terms, as follows: the first term commencing on the third Monday after the second Saturday in April, and ending on the fourth Saturday in July; the second commencing the fifth Monday after the fourth Saturday in July and ending on Saturday next before Christmas; and the third commencing on the first Monday after the first day of Jan. and continuing till the Second Saturday in April. This arrangement gives forty-four weeks schooling, and eight weeks vacation in a year, and is found to work well in practice. The hours of daily teaching are six for five days in the week.

The enrolled attendance in these schools is about three thousand; they are free, and it is estimated that about five thousand of the children of the city receive instruction in them in the course of the year. Among them there are three Union Schools, one in the eastern and one in the western part of the city, and one in the capitol building which is a central point. The schools are of all grades from the primary up to the highest departments of the Union Schools, and the Union

## RAIL ROADS.

### MICHIGAN CENTRAL RAIL ROAD COMPANY.

THIS COMPANY was chartered in the spring of 1846. In the autumn of that year, the company had consummated the acceptance of the charter and the purchase of the road by making their first payment to the state in compliance with its terms.—The Road, in the hands of the state had been extended as far as Kalamazoo, 146 miles from Detroit, but was ironed with flat bar, and much of the Road was in bad order, and worn out. The new company commenced extending the Road towards Lake Michigan, and re-laying the eastern portion of the old Road with heavy "T" rail.

In May 1852, the Road was completed and laid through the entire length with heavy T rail from Detroit to Chicago, a distance of 280 miles.

The company purchased in the city of Detroit about 22 acres of ground when they commenced operation, most of it being under water. This they filled in to low water mark, or the edge of the channel, and erected thereon their buildings &c., for the accommodation of the business at this end of the line.

They have on these premises upwards of twenty six hundred feet of dock front on the river, where vessels can lie in water from twelve to twenty feet deep. They have erected a large Freight Depot, one hundred feet wide, and extending eight hundred feet along the dock upon the river.

This building, in both stories, can store about ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND BARRELS OF FLOUR. In this building are some ingenious and expeditious apparatus for hoisting flour by barrel to the upper story, worked by a stationary engine.

The cranberry crop of this season has been unusually abundant in the vicinity of St. Pauls, Min.

Adjoining this is a Passenger Depot three hundred and twenty five feet long, and seventy five feet wide; in one end of which are the Ticket office, Ladies Room, Baggage Room &c., and, up stairs, the Superintendent's and Treasurers offices, Engineers Room, Local Superintendent and Cashier, and also the General Ticket offices and Duplicate Bill Department.

Below the freight depot, on the river front, are two large two-story warehouses, capable of storing twenty six thousand barrels of flour.

The twenty two acres are all inclosed by a fence, and have the river on one side for twenty six hundred feet, and the street upon the other side. In this inclosure is erected an engine house with sixteen stalls for engines. The building is circular, one hundred and thirty feet in diameter, surmounted with a dome eighty five feet high. Connected with this are two Machine and Blacksmith shops, one of which is one hundred and sixty feet long, sixty feet wide and two stories high, in which are twenty three blacksmiths forges, the other one hundred and eighty by fifty five feet, having thirty one fires, and both furnished with blast from a fan run by a stationary engine. In the second story of this building are a large number of lathes, planing machines, work benches &c., for turning and planing iron, and repairing and fitting up machinery.

This building and the Engine House are sufficiently capacious to give room for two hundred workmen. Adjoining these shops for iron work, is a large shop for building and repairing cars, one hundred and sixty nine feet long, fifty five feet wide; and two stories high, giving room sufficient for one hundred workmen. All the machinery in this shop and Machine shop is driven by a large stationary engine, placed in a building between the two. There is also between the two a large Smoke-Stock, thirteen feet square and one hundred and fifty feet high, by means of which all the smoke of the shops is carried off by underground flues. In the yard of this company, there is also a Wheat Warehouse, upon the river front, one hundred and twenty feet by sixty, and seventy feet high.

This is so arranged as to elevate the wheat from the cars into bins above, and spout it directly into the vessel lying along side the dock, without handling.

There are also a Lumber House, a house for storing iron and materials, and some other smaller buildings. The buildings, most of them are of brick, and fire proof from without.

**A MYSTERIOUS DISCOVERY.**—Yesterday afternoon as the workmen were engaged in digging a hole upon the Common, in which to set a tree, they came upon a brick arch, which, upon opening, and waiting awhile for the nitrous gas to escape, one of the workmen descended and explored this cave. It was about ten feet deep, fifteen feet in length, and six feet wide. Upon the North side was an iron door, from hence issued a flight of stone steps. This door was nearly decayed with rust. The bricks were of a very quaint mould, differing entirely from any we have seen or heard of before, being of a semicircular shape. Four small earthen jars or pots, of a curious form, with uncouth heads moulded upon them were found in one corner of the vault, one of which was filled with amorphous pieces of silver, covered with a yellowish brown mould or rust. The other three contained a motly assortment of jewelry, of the most singular form and make; consisting of heavy gold rings elaborately wrought with chasings of beads and antique armor, entwined in scroll work and flowers; bracelets buckles, earrings, &c. In a crevice between the bricks was stuck a dagger, which, upon touching, the blade immediately crumbled to pieces, being completely

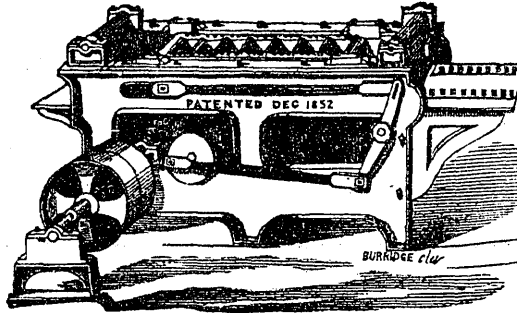

It is with pleasure that we call the attention of the public generally, and lumbermen in particular, to Mr. A. A. Wilder's late improvement in Planing Machines, for which letters patent were granted about a year since. It planes boards or planks with a series of reciprocal cutters, which are attached and adjusted to a reciprocating frame, which receives its motion by means of connecting rods. The stocks are so arranged on this frame, that the first knife in the series of planes (there are eight of them) is from three-eighths to a half inch further from the fixed bed, on which the lumber rests during the operation of planing, than the last, thereby being capable of reducing the lumber three-eighths to a half an inch, by once passing through the machine.

The permanent Mouth Piece of the stocks are so arranged with regard to the thickness of the shavings to be taken off, that the Mouth and Heel of the plane stock have a permanent bearing on the lumber during the cutting of the knife, which ensures a *perfect, true and even surface*. The difficulty heretofore experienced by the compression of the board or plank by the feeding rollers attached to all stationary or line cutters, has been *completely obviated* by this machine, as the plank remains perfectly stationary during the operation of planing, and is fed into the machine during the backward motion of the knives; consequently *all* the power is employed in taking off the shavings, instead of forcing the plank under the knives, as in stationary or line cutters, by the action of feeding rollers, which have a tendency to compress the lumber, rendering the plank unequal in thickness, after passing through the machine.

The power required to operate this machine is only one fourth, according to the work performed, that of any other machine now in use, it requiring only from eight to ten horse power to plane *three thousand feet per hour*. The machine is also provided with a tongueing and grooving apparatus, which performs the work in the most satisfactory manner, and with a degree of exactness and speed never before attained by any other machine.

One of these machines has now been in use in this city, at the Planing Mill of Messrs. T. C. Miller & Co., on Franklin street, where its operation has been witnessed by thousands, who have unqualifiedly expressed their approbation of the machine and its work. It also received a medal and diploma from the State Agricultural Society, at its annual fair last year. In the language of the examining committee, "This is one of the most important machines that has come under our notice, combining correct scientific and mechanical principles, strength & durability.



The first Temple was organized in New York city, December 5, 1845; the first Grand Temple (that of New York) February 21, 1846.

There are, at present, Grand Temples in fifteen States, and subordinate Temples in every State in the Union, except Vermont, South Carolina and California. They are also located in two British provinces.

The great, governing object is *the promotion of the temperance cause*. The pledge taken by every brother is, that he will abstain from the use of all alcoholic beverages *during life*; and in addition to this, use all honorable means in his power to *prevent their manufacture or use, or the traffic in them*.


Believing that virtue is the only true basis of friendship, all our ceremonies teach, and laws require the practice of a high morality. The belief in the existence of a God, and our accountability to him, are prerequisite conditions to membership. "Love to God, our country and our fellow man," are characteristics of every worthy Templar. These truths and principles are illustrated and enforced by pleasing and attractive ceremonies, and the most solemn requirements.

In addition to the initiatory Degree, three other Degrees are established, the object of which is to perfect the brethren in the principles, precepts and workings, of the Order—each successive Degree inculcating higher and still higher moral precepts.

The crowning grace of the Temple, however, is the Social Degree, where woman, whose province heretofore has been to "suffer and to wait," can join hands with us in our labor of love. Here father and mother, sister and brother, husband and wife, son and daughter, can all unite in one great family, having the same object in view, and consult together on the best means of attaining that object. All Templars in good standing, and all ladies of good moral character, are eligible to this Degree.

The Temple of Honor is also a beneficial organization. The receipts are ample, if properly cared for, to secure the promised benefits. The usual fees and dues of the Temples now in operation are as follows: Initiation, \$5; Dues, \$4 per year; Degrees, including Social Degree, \$9. The benefits are: in sickness \$3 per week. On the Death of a brother, \$25 are appropriated for a funeral benefit; on the death of a brother's wife, \$15. These are slightly varied, but are about the average rates.

The Detroit Ladies' Academy is pleasantly situated on Fort street, between Wayne and Shelby. This institution has been in successful operation since 1852, when a few friends of the enterprise, impressed with the necessity of a more vigorous effort in behalf of female education, than had yet been made in this section of the West, aided Miss Hunt in purchasing a suitable building for the school, which, during the last Academic year, has numbered one hundred and thirty pupils. The design from the first, has been to furnish a thorough and systematic course of education to young ladies, commencing with the preparatory studies and including all the branches usually taught in our first class seminaries and female colleges. At the commencement of the present year, Miss Hunt succeeded in making an arrangement, by which she will hereafter be associated with Miss M. E. Adams, well known in the state as a talented and efficient educator. Miss Hunt and Miss Adams, assisted by a competent corps of teachers, will, with the aid and encouragement of the Detroit people, do all they can to make the school what Detroit needs. At the same time, they will endeavor to keep the expenses within such limits, that the terms may be sufficiently low to enable those who are really desirous of obtaining an education, to avail themselves of its privileges. The Academic year is divided into three terms, of fourteen weeks each,—the first commencing on the second Monday in September; the second on the first Monday in January, and the third on the fourth Monday in April.

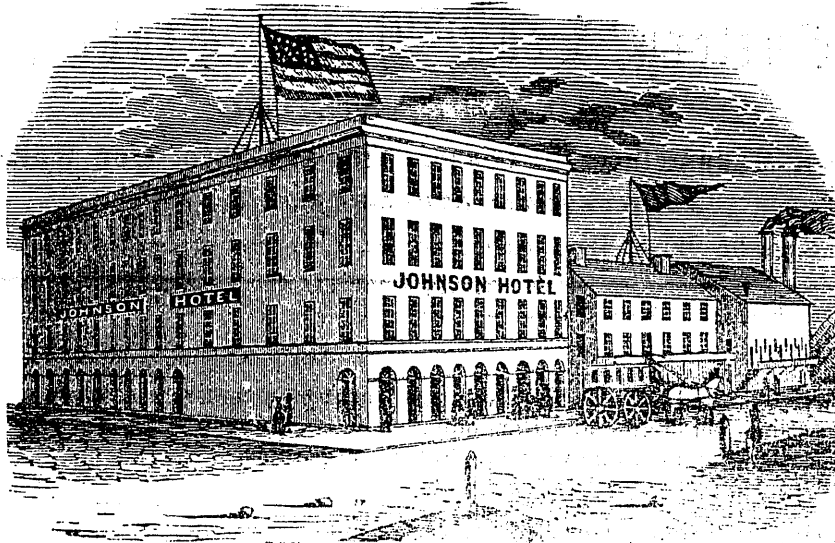

THE DETROIT WATER WORKS.

The following elaborate report of Mr. Robert E. Roberts, secretary of the Water Works Commissioners, is printed for purposes of interesting reference in the Directory.

The Compiler of the Directory, more than all other men, can better realise the arduous labors of Mr. R. in the discharge of the duties involved in this report.—Ed.]

Mr. Robert E. Roberts, the secretary to the Board of Water Commissioners, completed the assessments of water rates for the year commencing July 1, 1853, and ending July 1, 1854, and has furnished the following table as the result of his labors. The table contains a large amount of information as to the growth and progress of the city, which will bear examination.

The number of assessments for the present year are 5323. The amount received for assessments of water rates during the year 1853 over the previous year has been \$3,269 and the total increase during two years has been 8,861. This increase of income, while the rates have remained without change, must be very gratifying to the advocates and friends of this important improvement, and certainly proves that in asking from the Legislature the amendments obtained last winter, they were only influenced by a prudent foresight and a wise desire to meet the growing wants of the city.

Mr. Roberts in addition to the table showing the number of assessments in each ward, has added a table showing the increase in each ward during the two past years, which is very valuable for comparison. The following shows the estimated population of the city:
