Killin Local Cancer Research Committee (CRC) 60th Anniversary

2018 sees the 60th Anniversary of our local CRC.

It was set up

by Mary Stroyan in 1958 following the death of her husband aged just 57. It helps to try to do something positive in the face of heartbreak and tragedy and that is just what Mrs Stroyan managed to do and it is a very fitting legacy.

Amongst the early CRC members were Margaret McNee (Mollie McRobbie's Mum), Willie Allan, Jean McTaggart and Mrs Buchanan (Daldravaig). Judy Forster, who has been a committee member for over 40 years, remembers vividly the arrival of Mrs Mary Stroyan to ask if she would consider becoming involved. "It was like a summons from the Queen", remembers Judy and, of course, she didn't even think about refusing! Other long-standing committee members include Bunty MacGregor, Ellen Stewart, Jill Stroyan and Kathleen Blyth. The photograph shows members of the committee in the late 1990s.

In 2017 our local committee donated £10,900 to Cancer Research, so in the course of 60 years this village has contributed a very substantial sum in helping 'Stand up to Cancer'. The committee recognises the role that locals, businesses and visitors have had in ensuring that we continue to be able to make these sizeable donations.

We have, of course, had a lot of fun and hilarity along the way at many of the events including The Ladies Lunch, Cheese & Savoury, Jazz Nights and Flu Clinic!!!! 




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ObituarySandy Graham 24/07/1929 - 02/01/2018

My Dad, Sandy Graham, sadly passed away on 2nd January this year. He was born at Toward Point Dunoon in 1929 and spent a lot of his youth travelling up and down the West coast due to my grandfather's job as a ploughman. During that time he also ended up in Argaty, near Doune and left school at 14 to help his father. He had three brothers, John, Hughie, Donny and a sister, Jean. After his national service he got a job as a lorry driver along with his brother John and arrived in Killin in the early fifties working on the Lawers Hydro Scheme. This is where he met my mum, who was working as a wages clerkess. His brother John also met Maisie his future wife who was from Fortingall.

My mum and dad got married on 12th March 1955 and I came along in 1960. Dad then got a job with Stitt Brothers and worked there until he retired in the early nineties due to ill health. He did have a year out from Stitt during that time, when he got a job with the Hydro Board which involved maintenance of the grounds etc. including grass cutting. That is when he found out he had hay fever, so he didn't last too long there. After he retired he started volunteering for the hospital cars and was very



committed to it.

Mum and Dad spent most of their married life in Craiglea but moved up to Stewart Road a few years ago where they enjoyed the company of all their neighbours. They celebrated their Diamond wedding anniversary in 2015 with a family get-together in Inverness.

Dad's health wasn't great after he retired but he rarely complained. Latterly he visited most hospitals in the central belt with one ailment or another. Mum was starting to struggle with her health and then dad was diagnosed with dementia so, as a family we decided that it would be

best for everyone that they went into the Care Home. They were a bit hesitant about it but when they settled in wished that they had done it sooner. Mandy, Stephanie and all the staff looked after them so well. The village is very blessed to have such a facility that is so well run and we have nothing but praise for them. Mum passed away last Hogmanay and my dad took it very badly and it was very noticeable that his dementia got much worse straight after this. He managed to continue to attend the staff meetings at the care home, (uninvited I may add), wandering about with his zimmer or hurdy gurdy as he called it and it was only just before Christmas that his health really deteriorated.

He was a beloved husband to May, much loved dad to David, father-in-law to Val, papa to Scott, Michelle, Kimberley and Lee and great-papa to Ruby, Hamish and Emily. He will be sorely missed by all the family. The family would like to give our sincere thanks to all the staff at the home, GP's and District Nurses who made him comfortable in his last days.

Forgotten in the Snow

As this is being written, the heavy rain is washing away the snow which has caused so much havoc the last few weeks. It came as a shock to many as we haven't had any amount of snow for a good few years. I can remember our early years at Boreland when the snow blew up in banks to the edge of our low roof and we had weeks of sledging in the neighbouring field. This would never manage to match our 'Cresta Run' in Sutherland. We lived at a remote lodge, 12 miles from a road, and needed to be prepared for being cut off by snow for up to three months. Sometimes we didn't know that we were cut off until someone tried, unsuccessfully, to get in. This message would come via our radio phone in the stalker's house, which was the only link that we had - when it was working. The postie once dug his way along the track to bring our twice weekly delivery only about six hours late. Our Cresta Run was down a steep and winding path between large rhododendron bushes down from the stalker's house to the lodge below. The stalker, his wife and youngest child and myself would wait for my wife and the two children, whom she taught in the tiny school, to come running out of the schoolroom bang on 3, just as it was getting dark up there. The sledges were large old metal trays used when there had been a dairy and they were excellent for the job. The adults each lay on a tray and the children hung onto our ankles. As the snow came and came, we built up quite a course with smooth

banking on the bends.

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We shared a freezer, as we only had electricity from a generator which had to be fed by diesel brought in from a tank on the road. So we were careful in it's use, but our long life milk and meat running around on the hill kept us going. Hay and maize was piled up ready to feed the stags each day, quite often on a huge old sled, a bit like Santa's. This was in the early seventies when we expected bad weather, country people coped as best they could, but you knew that someone would be looking out for you and a snowmobile would bring in anything essential. The plough was not situated miles away but was run by Benny-the-shop. The plough was on an old army lorry and did a fabulous job. If you contacted Benny he would go along in front of you. He did once call in for a cup of tea along the strath and the lorry and plough had disappeared under snow by the time he came out. Country lanes and rail tracks were edged with snow breaks - long since fallen into disrepair.

Nowadays no-one seems to be aware of the plight of those who live up tracks or along rural roads. Not until the news had run out of traffic jams etc. did they begin to look to rural communities still cut off. Farmers need to move around to feed stock and milk has to be collected. Many gallons were thrown away recently as tankers could not get to the farms. That is when many rural communities had tried the best themselves. It becomes more and more evident that rural areas are not high on the official agenda and agriculture is given a back seat. It's

a matter of money they tell us, when £46million is being spent in the coming year in grants for new tree plantations. The government has 'ambitious woodland creating schemes' - 10,000 hectares to 2021. There is no information on what sort of land is being used for this - agricultural, moorland or ? And just what type of trees are they going to be? Many will be nonnative and just when they are wanting to cut down the beech trees at the Birks at Aberfeldy because they are non-native. I wonder if they will cut down the beech hedge at Meikleour.

Let's face it you can't eat trees. Though mice and voles can of course! So-called "new ideas" to encourage owls and other raptors to come into forests to eat up the little nibblers are not new at all. This is common sense and great for owl and friends. Unfortunately it has been found that 85% of barn owls have some level of poison in them. The use of mouse and rat poison causes non-targeted species such as voles and even small birds to eat it and also the raptors who feed on them to be poisoned. Please also remember this if you use slug pellets in the garden. The slugs are eaten by birds, hedgehogs etc. and they do actually entice slugs to your garden. It would seem to be much kinder to surround vulnerable plants with spent coffee grounds or give the slugs a good send off with beer traps. A robin or thrush may get a bit squiffy on them but no real harm will be done.

Strathfillan Community Council Minutes

Telephone & Broadband

Despite starting a costing exercise in August 2017 to bring 'superfast' broadband up the A82 to Strathfillan, Digital Scotland's latest communication at the end of last month was that they had no update to report. Bruce Crawford MSP has shared our disappointment at the lack of information coming from them. Cllr Martin Earl is going to ask Stephen Kerr MP to ask for clarification on our behalf. We continue to have problems with our landlines. At times, the whole of Crianlarich is unable to call out to anyone including 999 calls. There is a fault at the exchange. Unfortunately BT has not yet found the reason for the latest fault.

Update from DSSB (Digital Scotland Superfast Broadband)

"We remain committed to doing all we can to deliver fibre to Crianlarich within the lifetime of the DSSB programme. However, following further planning investigations, we are having to undertake extensive re-planning of the deployment of fibre to the area to ensure the best outcome for the people of Crianlarich, Tyndrum and the surrounding areas, within the parameters of this programme. As a result, it will be towards the end of the summer before we have any meaningful updates we can share. We understand how frustrating this is for the local community unfortunately with large scale infrastructure programmes such as this, we often encounter technical

and deployment challenges which take time to overcome. Throughout all of this, we are committed to communicating with the local community."

Shopper Bus

We are pleased that this service is being used by locals. It is worth noting that in order for the bus to get to Tyndrum, there is another service, 160, to allow passengers to travel from Stirling and arrive at Tyndrum before 10am. In addition, the Shopper bus becomes the 160 service, and can take passengers from Tyndrum back to Stirling at 6pm. This is not well known and we have asked for more publicity, particularly in VisitScotland I Centres, in Fort William, Oban and Stirling.

Transport

Our roads are continuing to disintegrate. We have been in regular contact with BEAR to ensure potholes and uneven roads are reported and repaired as quickly as possible. We would ask people to continue to report issues to BEAR.

Following a request from a local resident, Bruce Crawford MSP has highlighted the need for a 40mph buffer zone outside the 30mph sign of Crianlarich. This works exceptionally well in Strathyre and we agree that it is needed for our village too.

Mr. Crawford states that "The target area runs East of Crianlarich, just beyond the end of the 30mph limit, for around 400 metres.

Local residents have reported a number of near misses and have raised concerns of drivers reaching the 60mph speed limit within seconds from leaving the 30mph zone, making it nearly impossible for locals to merge safely onto the road. Concerns were raised with me by constituents that a 60mph zone in this area was not suitable. I have seen the positive impact that the speed buffer in Strathyre has had

and I have made representations to Transport Scotland to ask them to commit to exploring all available options to progress this proposal. The safety of residents and tourists is absolutely paramount and I trust Transport Scotland will view this request with the seriousness that it deserves."

Planning

Scotgold's mine at Cononish, Tyndrum was approved planning permission for their expansion plan. This will generate at least 50 new jobs. (See MSP article on opposite page)

Stirling MSP Praises Full Planning Permission For Gold Mine

Cononish Gold Mine has been granted full planning permission for gold mining operations following a decision from Loch Lomond and Trossachs National Park. Scotgold intend to extract half-a-million tonnes of mineral ore from 170,000 tonnes of rock over the next 17

years. The developer has said that it is convinced that it will meet the highest environmental

standards and will be a significant boost to the local economy in Tyndrum.

The firm has offered nearly half-a-million pounds in payments to support the local community and it is expected the operation could create as many as 52 local jobs.
Welcoming the decision, Stirling MSP Bruce Crawford said:

"This is a golden opportunity for the local area and I am delighted that the mine now has full planning permission. I was honoured to attend the official opening of the mine in 2016 and it was clear that the potential benefit to the local community was substantial. "With full permission granted, Tyndrum's Midas touch is now able to continue for many prosperous years to come."




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Killin Primary School

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Killin GP Practice Involved in New Scheme

Blood Pressure Monitoring From Home

Patients with high blood pressure in a number of GP practices across Forth Valley, including Killin, will soon be able to get their blood pressure checked without leaving the comfort of their home. Under a new scheme they will receive a text message from their local GP Practice asking for information about their blood pressure. They can then take their own blood pressure readings and text the result. All the readings will be collated on a secure web interface which can be viewed by their GP or practice nurse. Those behind the scheme say it feels just like sending a text message to a friend!

Crucially, if readings fall out-with certain parameters agreed in their care management plan, a text will be sent back to the patient advising them of what to do next. An alert can also be sent to clinical staff to support early intervention which can reduce the need for the patient to travel to their GP or

hospital.

The system is called Florence (Flo), after Florence Nightingale, the founder of modern nursing and is a more modern and convenient way to monitor patients. Although the 'back end' of Flo (the computer programming needed to make it work) is complex, what the patient sees and interacts with could not be more simple and familiar, given the prevalence of mobile phones and texting.

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












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Diamond Wedding Celebrations

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
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


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Outward Bound at Loch Eil

Matter Arising

Alan Milliken at Stirling Council has given no further contact. There are still problems when using the council call centre.

Martin Earl has asked about using the mobile CCTV unit at the bottle bank and bins because of the rubbish being left there, but the council appears to be reluctant to do so. There is a chance that the bottle bank will be taken away.

The gritting policy is to be reviewed with police input. There is a shortage of grit bins. Numbers will not be increased – if one is to be put in an area then one will be lost from another area. There needs to be more joined up thinking between services instead of each working in isolation. Recently police had to grit Fingal Road so that carers could get in.

Water Problems - Scottish Water has reported that they have reduced the pressure but it is still within the regulation limits.

Dochart Bridge - The Aberfeldy sign is still obstructed. The repairs to the damage on the bridge can only be done between April and September due to the need to use lime mortar. BioMass - There was no representative at the meeting but it is not yet in production. Fibre Broadband - BT have submitted plans for putting a box outside the school.

Patient Participation Group

Mhairi Kyle has been appointed as new practice manager. There will be a meeting on Jan 30th with council projects manager and a representative from a group in another area who have successfully re-established volunteer paid drivers

of hospital transport.

C60 bus service - is still continuing and there should be further updates. War Memorial – Quotes are being sought – ongoing.

Police Scotland Report

Road Safety – There have been accidents on A84/85, a contributing factor was adverse weather conditions. Hints were given about safer Winter driving and looking out for deer. There has been a report of dangerous driving on A84 which has been sent to the Procurator Fiscal. A car wheel was damaged on A827 as a drain hole cover had been removed. An operation to deter drunk driving was undertaken and no-one was found to be over the limit, this will continue to be monitored.

Other incidents of note - There was an incident of two males fighting outside The Courie Inn but this brought no complaints to the police. There have been complaints about bogus workmen at Strathyre. There was also a suspicious incident in Killin where someone was asking to check gas meters. The man was not traced and the public are reminded to always ask for I.D. An intoxicated female was ejected from the Citylink bus in Crianlarich. A vulnerable female on the same bus was returned to her home in Edinburah.

Mountain Rescue – Killin Mountain Rescue were called to a man suffering from hypothermia on Ben More. On Ben Challum a woman with a suspected broken ankle was able to walk off the hill. Concern over a walker at Strathfillan house leaving a vehicle overnight caused extensive enquiries but he returned next day. Advice to leave message in car or with police if intending to stay out overnight.

Application has been made for extension to Ardeonaig Lodge bungalow.

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

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Musings From the Manse

Friends have often asked me what it is like living in Killin. My answer varies but always begins with the comment "I'm living in Psalm 121 country!" Just in case you are not familiar with this Psalm, it opens with the majestic and evocative proclamation - I lift my eyes to the hills. Where does my help come from. It comes from the Lord the maker of heaven and earth. I have no doubt that visitors to Killin have their first stop at the Falls of Dochart, which can be very impressive especially when in spate! However, as they subsequently drive down Main Street the back-drop of the mountains usually takes their breath away. You can see this happen almost every day as cars stop and people disembark to point in the distance and take photos. On the pavement outside the Manse I have lost count of the numbers of walkers who again stop, look, photograph and then take time to drink in the marvellous vista before them. I can imagine that many of them have come from towns and cities with grey skylines and lots of noise, hustle and bustle, traffic fumes and stress. A visit here must seem like being in paradise which, of course, is why so many folks fall in love with this place and return again and again to this wonderful location.

But what of us who live here? Is it possible we can become a little complacent and matter of fact about the wonder all around us, even a little numb to it all? In January 2007 in the Metro Station in Washington DC, a busker found a space beside the stream of early morning commuters. He took

out his violin, set down his open case with a small container in it for donations and proceeded to play. He played for 45 mins and during that time covered six pieces by the composer Johann Sebastian Bach. Whilst he played no-one stopped or paused to listen although some deposited money in the case as they walked by. At the end he had received 32 Dollars for his effort but there was no applause. What these commuters didn't realise was that the musician was none other than Joshua Bell one of the world's most famous classical violinists. The instrument he played was valued at 3.5 million Dollars and the night before he had performed to a packed theatre in Boston where the tickets were 100 Dollars each! They missed something very special indeed. But who can blame them. They were all focussed on something else as they passed by. If only they had paused for a moment they might have realised they were witnessing something special...this was no ordinary busker! But instead they "heard" but didn't really "hear." Likewise it is possible to "see" but not really "see."

For me the scenery here in Killin is food for the spirit, but every now and then just to clock that in the midst of a busy day or, to tune into it for a brief moment, is a wonderful pick-me-up. Living in the country doesn't mean that we can't be worried, stressed and bruised by the struggles of life. However, we are in the midst of a wonderful environment that can provide a stimulus for renewal if we make use of it. When we think of the drab, soul-less environments that millions

of people throughout the world face every new morning (think of rushhour commuters) we realise that what we have here on our doorstep is a gift beyond price. In towns and cities people often have to get away from their area and into the country to recharge their batteries. We don't! We are already here! They say that familiarity breeds contempt. I would hope that this is something we never get used to in any casual or complacent way. Appreciation is a choice and counting our blessings is a deliberate attitude. Life is enhanced, enriched and sustained by disciplined habits. Make a habit of looking up and around from time to time and stealing a special moment in the midst of our work, duties and responsibilities. I call these "Condor" moments. My Grandfather used to smoke a pipe and one of the tobaccos he used was Condor, made popular with the series of adverts featuring various characters involved in different scenarios which always ended with one of them enjoying a peaceful puff on the pipe....and all was well with the world! I must admit that my Grandfather always looked so contented, lost in his own wee world when he smoked his pipe. I was jealous. I even tried pipesmoking myself a number of years ago but failed miserably. But that's another story! Now all I need are the mountains, a few moments of time, and the words of Psalm 121. Give it a try sometime.

Explorers


Explorers are aged 14-18 and meet on the last Wednesday of each month in The Lesser Hall, Killin, from 7-9pm.
