'Gas station heroin' found, charges filed

The manager of a local gas station is facing criminal charges after illegal substances were found in the store.

Bhagubhai Patel, 44, of Flemingsburg, is facing charges of trafficking in marijuana, less than 8 ounces and trafficking in a controlled substance, 2nd degree-drug unspecified.

Patel was charged on March 28 by ABC Officer, Justin Conley, who was inspecting the BP Gas Station on Ashbrook Drive in Flemingsburg, for Delta 8 products that contain cannabis.

Conley found18 packages that contained Delta 8 products of two mariiuana cigarettes each. He also found several bottles labeled ZA ZA Red, otherwise known as 'Gas Station Heroin'. Conley found 9 bottles containing 15 pills each of the illegal substance known as Tianeptine, which is found in Za Za Red.

Kentucky Governor, Andy Beshear, took emergency action to classify all products containing



Tianeptine, an unregulated drug known as "gas station heroin," as a Schedule I controlled substance, on March 22, 2023.

Tianeptine, which is available online and in convenience stores and gas stations in Kentucky, has no known medical use, Beshear said. It produces opioid-like effects and has been linked to serious harm, overdoses and death according to the Federal Drug Administra-

The drug is approved for use in other parts of the world, where it is marketed as Coaxil or Stablon. In the U.S., it's known as Za Za, Tianna, TD Red and Pegasus.

Side effects from abusing or misusing Tianeptine by itself or with other drugs include agitation,

drowsiness, confusion, sweating, rapid heartbeat, high blood pressure, nausea, vomiting, slowed or stopped breathing, coma and death.

"Today, Kentucky became a safer place," said Gov. Beshear following the March emergency order. "Until now, someone looking for a heroin-like high could walk into certain places or buy this harmful product online. We're committed to protecting Kentuckians from this kind of harm, and if someone is struggling with abuse, we're here to help."

Tianeptine, is an atypical antidepressant which is used mainly in the treatment of major depressive disorder, although it may

Remains identified as missing man

Human remains. which were found in a silo in Flemingsburg, on Fountain Drive, on Sunday, April 2, 2023, have been identified as those of a Flemingsburg man who has been missing since last May.

On April 13, 2023, The Flemingsburg Police Department released a press release that they had received notification that the human remains located on Fountain Ave on April 2nd, 2023 have been positively identified as Charles "CC" Prater.


Charles C. Prater, also known as C.C. Prater, was last seen in the Bluebank area of central Fleming County, near KY 32 (Morehead-Flemingsburg Road) on May 9, 2022. Prater was on foot, and dressed casually.

Investigators believe he returned to Flemingsburg immediately after that and spent his last minutes in the silo.

His cause of death has yet to be determined by officers with the Kentucky Medical Examiner's Officer, who are being assisted by officers with the Kentucky State Police.

No foul play has been suspected as a result of Prater's death, according to investigators.

According to multiple sources in law enforcement, the discovery of Prater's remains was made by two young teenagers, one of whom immediately told their mother. The mother then contacted Fleming County Sheriff, Tim Smith, who had Deputy Sheriff, Logan Mullins, go to the scene, verify if the remains were indeed human and then protect the integrity of the scene until Fleming County Coroner, Win-



Mullins arrived on the scene quickly and recognized the remains as being human.

Sheriff Smith soon arrived as did Flemingsburg Chief of Police, Brian Bowling and several officers with the Flemingsburg Police Department, along with officers with the Kentucky State Police (KSP) and Grannis.

KSP Detective, Matt Martin, is leading the

death investigation. On Monday, April 3, 2023, Grannis accompanied the remains to Frankfort for an autopsy and to begin the initial mission of identifying the remains through dental examination as well as DNA testing.

Charles CC Prater was born in Mason

County on March 5, 1986, he was the son of Caren Dawn Curotto Prater and the late Lowell Clayton Prater

He is survived by his mother Caren and his sister, Shae Lamar Prater.Funeral services for C.C. will begin at 2 p.m., Thursday, April 20, 2023, at the Flemingsburg First United Methodist Church with Pastor Robbie Shrout

officiating. C.C. will be laid to rest

in Martin Cemetery. Visitation will begin at 12 p.m. until the hour of service at 2 p.m., Thurs-

day, at the church. Boone-Nickell Funeral Home is caring for C.C. and his family.



Flemingsburg City Council votes to sell Princess Theater Property

Members of the Flemingsburg City Council voted unanimously in favor of offering the Princess Theater Property for public sale at a future auction on Monday evening, April 10, 2023.

Council members voted to list the property as "surplus poroperty' owned by the city, after City Attorney, Darrell Ruark, researched the property, which contains the building's front façade and parking places in the rear of the struc-

Flemingsburg Mayor, Ricky Hurst said he had =received inquiries about the property by individuals who wanted the parking area and who also might want to use the front façade as an advertising marquee.

It should be noted that, although the vacant shell of a building is desolate now, it was once a thriving center of Flemingsburg, and opened at its location in June 1937 by owner Mrs. G. Nelson Foxworthy, according to published reports. The theater initially showed many silent movies and

hundreds of patrons visited the theater.

In January 1942 a fire destroyed the theater and other buildings on Main Cross Street.


The theater was rebuilt and within a year movies showing once more. The theater closed to

the public in May 1968 with 'The Valley of the Dolls' being the last movie played there.

The city has not established a date when the property will be offered at public auction.


HISTORY:

Huge sign and other assistance provided "Doc" Blevins in his campaign for Judge-Executive. Variance requested from, and denied by, Rowan County Fiscal Court, to build gate and fence.

Received "Doc" Blevins' promise to make motion to Fiscal Court to grant variance, if elected.

Blevins elected Judge-Executive, and keeps his promise, making motion to grant the variance. Members of the Fiscal Court do not even vote on the motion. Buyer's cash and documents returned to him, as sale has to be cancelled. Consequently, our plans for early retirement, and rental Prevost tour of 49 states also cancelled.

Rowan County could easily, discreetly, meet this responsibility and take over this debt/interest; likewise someone on its behalf could also do so. Those responsible for the false affidavit/benefit from it need to pay the consequences, not us.

Flemingsburg man charged after allegedly raping child

A Flemingsburg man remains lodged in the mason County Detention Center, on \$100,000 cash bond, following his April 12, 2023 arrest after he allegedly raped his daughter, who is under 12 years old. Arthur Martin Dum-

mitt, 35, of McMullin Avenue, Flemingsburg was arrested by Flemingsburg Police Officer, Taylor Moore, after meeting the victim's mother at the Flemingsburg Police Station. The mother advised Officer Moore that her daughter had disclosed to her the night before that she had been molested by her father.

An interview with child advocates from the buffalo Trace Children's Advocacy center in Maysville indicated the father had molested his daughter, "on several different occasions and in various rooms" in the home.

The daughter's age was not given but only

identified as "under the age of 12."

The disturbing arrest citation further indicates there was information regarding, "multiple accounts of rape, 1st degree, multiple counts of sodomy, 1st degree, multiple accounts of sexual assault, 1st degree and accounts of incest."

Court documents indicate the allegations of the abuse have been ongoing for "14-16 months."

Court documents also indicate other charges are pending against Dummitt, who is scheduled to be arraigned in Fleming District Court on April 20.

All persons are to be presumed innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.



During the last few months, we have been in touch with several people who are doing research on their families. For some it is locating the graves of ancestors, and for others, it is finding out when the family members would have lived in the area, any notable or interesting facts that might be written about family members, etc. Here at the museum, we have

some cemetery records, some folders on individuals and families that we have collected over the years, and of course the Harriet Dudley Grannis scrapbooks. We also have some bound copies of newspapers, as well as single copies of some newspapers. We have some reference books and even some family Bibles. We have copies of the 1884 Bath-Fleming County Atlas which shows the names of land owners and businesses in various precincts. Sometimes we are successful in finding information and sometimes we are not. We are not very high tech—so that means it will take some time to look for certain details. But when we are able to share information which helps the person learn more about his/her family, it validates one of the reasons the museum exists, which is to help people learn about Fleming County and its people. Last Saturday, a gentleman from Rowan County came in to visit. He told me that he had relatives that had lived in Fleming County. As he toured the museum, we looked up areas in the Atlas where his family may have lived, we looked through Volunteer forms from the Civil War, and even looked through some school annuals. He found pictures of aunts and uncles in some of the Elizaville School annuals and was thrilled. This gentleman indicated that the family probably wouldn't have been able to purchase the annuals at the time and therefore didn't have copies of the pictures. Even though, it may seem to be a small thing, to he and his family

for me, it was satisfying

to be able to help someone find information (or in this case, pictures) of their family. It was a good

Over the last two weeks, I have been sharing an article that appeared in a weekly column written by Dr. J. J. Dickey. This article originally written by Robert S. Cotterill, detailed the "Battle" of Battle Run. Familiar names such as Col. John Fleming and Michael Cassidy were involved. Let's continue the article which appeared in 1932. "The ambuscade was a

hundred rods north of the Hull House and ran on the edge of a little ridge that ran out from the buffalo trail parallel with the river to Battle Run branch. A great many years after the battle, Holder came back with Cassidy, and the two identified the place of the battle and recorded it. It was on the south side of Battle Run Branch about 150 yards from its mouth. The battle ground was covered with beech trees. The Indians lay concealed just on the edge of the ridge with Battle

Run Branch at their feet. It is not easy to organize the details of the battle, even from circumstantial accounts of the survivors. The horsemen received a volley of lead as they rode up, and Col. Fleming, shot in his hips and groin, fell from his horse. He fell-or crawled-over behind a log, and the Indians probably thought him dead. The footmen ran up at the sound of the firing, but seeing the Indians in apparently overwhelming force began, after brief fighting, to fall back to the ford in order not to be surrounded. On their

way they regained their

horses where they had remained hitched, and soon outdistanced the Indians, who of course, were not mounted.

In the meantime, Cassidy and his party had proceeded down the river almost to the mouth of Battle Run, when they heard the firing from Holder's guns. They immediately left the trail and rode through the beech woods to the battle grounds. It was too evident the Indians has united. And their plans were well underway to beat the

white men in detail. Cassidy's men did not dismount and rode with all the speed they were able, but, prompt as they were, they came too late. Holder was already falling back and Cassidy could do little but save himself. As he rode up the Indians noticed Fleming on the ground and one of them came forward to tomahawk him. Fleming promptly shot him dead. Another came toward him, and Fleming with an empty gun, could do nothing but call on Cassidy for help. But that worthy also had an empty gun, having presented its contents to the first Indians he had seen. He called back to Fleming that his gun was not loaded; Fleming replied that the Indian didn't know that. This eminently practical suggestion apparently appealed to Cassidy and he boldly advanced with leveled barrel. The Indian at once set out for pastures new, Cassidy helped Fleming back on his horse, which had wandered to Fleming's side, loading him sack fashion with his feet on one side and his head on the other." A Ewing man has been named in a two count indictment in Nicholas County.

Ashley McCord, 45, of Ewing has been named in a two-count indictment by members of a March 20, 2023 Nicholas County grand Jury.

McCord is charged with tampering with physical evidence and being a persistent felony offender, 1st degree.

Heaven Is **A Lot Like Kentucky**

By Charles Mattox

'In 1786 I was under General Ben Logan and we went out under Captain Simon Kenton. We brought back 33 prisoners and 11 scalps. Hugh McGary killed Chief Maluntha there. I was within 25-30 steps at the time. Maluntha wasn't doing anything but cutting up tobacco in his hand to smoke with us in a pipe. After this the Indians were very trouble-

Andrew Thompson to Rev. John D. Shane as was recorded by Shane during an interview at Thompson's house in 1842. The interview appears in the Draper Manuscripts in volume 12 CC pages 235-236. Above, Thompson was speaking of the October, 1786 raid of General, Benjamin Logan, by Kentucky militia soldiers, northward to the Shawnee villages along the Miami River in Ohio, where the Makachack villages of Piqua and Wapotimica were destroyed.

For reasons I may never know, I have always been drawn to pioneer and Native American burial grounds.

As a child, growing up

VISITING ANDREW THOMPSON

along Fleming Creek, amid the long forgotten rural community of Martha Mills, I became interested in all things Native American and Pioneer, and I hunted obsessively for their artifacts, eventually seeking their spirits among their many ancient village and burial sites across northeastern Kentucky.

I began obsessing on pioneer studies and began recording the names on the ancient headstones within the Garr Pond Cemetery of Martha Mills. It is a small cemetery situated on a ridge across the creek from where the once thriving community of Martha Mills was established over 200 years

I would later find out, as my historic research continued, that I was not the first to take interest in such things, and was merely walking in the same footsteps as several historic researchers, including Dr. William Talley, among others.

Among the names I recorded over 40 years ago was Andrew Thompson.

Talley, I later discovered, also recorded his findings of the cemetery, which can be found on pages 49-51 of "Talley's Kentucky Papers".

Thompson was born on July 4, 1763.

He died on Sept. 3, 1843.

Kentucky historian and religious researcher Reverend John Dabney Shane visited Thompson at his house in Martha Mills when Thompson was over 70 years of age. Shane noted that at that

time Thompson had "just married a young girl" and was very enthusiastic about his visit and his recording of his deposition and interview, which Shane read back to him upon completion.

Shane was an obsessive researcher and he traveled through Fleming and Bath County in 1841-42, conducting interviews with some of the older citizens who gave first-hand accounts of their trials and tribulations in regard to settling Kentucky.

magnificent Shane's of Andrew interview Thompson can be found on pages 235-236 of volume 12 CC of the Lynam Draper Manuscripts.

Draper, an obsessive historian and researcher, purchased Shane's entire library for \$3,000 when Shane passed away in Cincinnati in 1865.

Draper's immense collection is viewable by volume on microfilm in several libraries across the state. They hold unequaled

value to historical researchers in my humble

In 1783, when Andrew Thompson was 20-yearsold, he floated down the Ohio River with Silas Dexter and others in Dexter's boat. Dexter was a pioneer entrepreneur who had established a holding pen for baggage near presentday Maysville, which was uninhabited at the time. He became wealthy by transporting families down the river and into the interior of Kentucky where they had land

Thompson and fellow passenger; Henry Marshall, a surveying friend of George Washington, who would be Colonel of the 3rd Virginian Regiment during the Revolutionary War, and who was appointed Surveyor General of the Kentucky lands in 1783, became fast friends.

Marshall was credited with saving the entire Continental Army during the armies retreat at The Battle of Brandywine during a low point in the Revolutionary War.

Upon landing Marshall and his many slaves, of which Thompson said he had a "parcel" traveled to the interior of Kentucky, while Thompson and Dexter and another family Dexter was moving, stayed near Limestone Point and made camp about two miles from where Washington would later be established.

Marshall would later become Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court!

The first year Thompson worked with Dexter in moving families by pack horses from the Ohio River into Kentucky.

Indians stole their horses in June 1784, so he and his partners: John Boyle and Peter Dewitt, who had each purchased land from Marshall, were guided to it by Simon Kenton, decided to return to Thompson's native, Monongahela River

Thompson returned to Kentucky in May of 1785 and became one of

Captain Kenton's spies, while residing with Dexter and family in the newly constructed town of Washington.

He accompanied Kenton on General Benjamin Logan's northern raid along the Mad River into the Machachak villages in the autumn of 1786.

The elderly Shawnee Chief Maluntha surrendered and held a peace treaty in one hand and had an American flag draped over his shoulder as a gesture of peace when Kenton's spies approached him.

Maluntha stood patiently with Thompson, Isaac Clinkenbeard, and others as the town around him was pillaged and burned.

Maluntha, his wife, and son, named Spemica Lawba, were standing together as Maluntha cut up a piece of tobacco and filled his pipe to share with Thompson and the others.

Major Hugh McGary walked up to Maluntha and casually asked if he had been at the 1782 Battle of Blue Licks.

"Yes," Maluntha answered.

McGary caught everyone off guard and struck Maluntha in the head with his tomahawk killing him within moments

Thompson Clinkenbeard were stunned.

"I was within 25 or 30 steps of Maluntha at this time," Thompson told Rev. Shane of the atrocity he bore witness too.

Some accounts say Thompson, Clinkenbeard and other spies threatened McGary with

a knife and were set on to killing him for his diabolical maneuver but Colonel Logan stopped them as McGary was a highranking officer in the Kentucky militia. Logan reprimanded McGary and took the terrible deed to heart with such regret that he adopted Spemica Lawba, who would become known later simply as Captain Johnny Logan.

Thompson and his partner, who he identified to Shane simply as "Parks" helped construct fortifications in what would become Fleming County for George Stockton, Michael Cassidy and John Fleming, and would later fall upon hard times, having to chop rails for split rail fences for Michael Cassidy for a bushel of corn per 100 rails.

"Parks and I were out

of bread," he told Shane. Thompson would later survey large tracts of land in what would one day become Fleming, Bath and Robertson Counties, before settling along Fleming Creek. We may visit him and his companions at a later date within the confines

of this column. I visit him sometimes, where he rests eternally on a hill in Garr Pond Cemetery, which overlooks that fertile, Fleming Creek valley and the community known as Martha Mills.





