Sales Tax Revenue Totaled Nearly \$3 Billion in November

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.998 billion in November, 7.7 percent more than in November 2017.

"While slower than the double-digit pace of recent months, state sales tax revenue growth in November was strong," Hegar said. "Increased tax collections continue to be led by remittances from oil- and gas-related sectors, but at a slower pace than in recent months. Growth from retail trade and restaurants, the sectors most dependent on consumer spending, was positive, but comparatively modest."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in November 2018 was up 9.8 percent compared to the same period a year ago. The sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

DPS Reminds Texans to Prepare for Winter Weather

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) encourages Texans in all regions of the state to make preparations for staying safe as we approach the official start of winter.

"As we know all too well, Texas weather can change in an instant," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Every year, Texas faces serious dangers brought on by winter weather conditions, including freezing temperatures, ice, sleet and even snow. Taking extra safety precautions now could make all the difference during these potentially severe weather events this winter."

Texans can prepare their vehicles for the winter by checking the battery, windshield wipers (including appropriate freeze resistant-fluid), tire pressure, tire tread and fluid levels, as well as taking time to lubricate door and trunk locks to prevent freezing. In addition, the following is a list of emergency supplies drivers can keep in their vehicle:

Blankets/sleeping bags; Extra clothing, including gloves and a hat; Cell phone, radio, flashlight and extra batteries; First-aid kit and pocket knife; High calorie, non-perishable food and bottled water; Bag of sand or cat litter to provide traction for tires; and windshield scraper, tool kit, booster cables, tow rope and a shovel.

December 4, 2014

Friona High School junior Josh Barnett has been selected to participate in the online distance learning portion of the Texas High School Aerospace Scholars (HAS) Program at NASA Johnson Space Center. Josh is the son of Ricky and Erin Barnett. Josh was chosen by a selection panel based on his outstanding application profile, including the essay composition and letter of recommendation. "The applicant pool was very competitive and Josh is to be commended on being selected for this program," stated Pam Ray, Friona High School Principal. "He joins more than 150 students from across the state in this advanced science program." As a scholar, Josh is required to commit to the online distance-learning component of the project, which includes 8 modules with reading and research assignments, quizzes, simulations, and discussion forums. He will then participate in a final project. Upon completion, he will apply to the summer experience onsite at NASA Johnson Space Center in Houston. After high school, Josh plans to attend Oklahoma State University and study aerospace engineering. Josh also holds the distinction of being the youngest licensed pilot at Clovis Municipal Airport.

On Wednesday night, November 18, Friona Police stopped a car on Highway 60 because it had one headlight. The officer noticed the driver seemed nervous and in a computer check, found out the man had prior arrest on marijuana charges. The driver, Myles Stillman, 49, of Lubbock, gave the officer permission to search his car. in the trunk were three "bales" of marijuana weighing a total of 82 pounds. Officers also found cocaine inside the car. Stillman was jailed and booked on charges off possessions of marijuana over 50 pounds and felony possession of cocaine. He is presently in Parmer County jail. Bond was set at \$50,000. Police Chief Randy Geries said the DPS lab in Amarillo estimated the marijuana had a street value of \$1,000 per pound, making the Friona PD's catch at over \$80,000 worth of marijuana.

Add Garlic Salt, Paprika & Dry Jerk Seasoning. Stir the ingredients. Rub the chicken with the Jerk Seasoning/Marinade. Be sure to rub under skin and in cavities. Marinate overnight in a ziplock bag. (Pour any leftover seasoning in the ziplock bag). Preheat oven to 200°F & precook the chicken for 30-45 minutes. Light the coal in the barbecue grill (The barbecue grill must have a lid). Pimento (allspice) branches (this is what is used in Jamaica) mixed with charcoal is best. If not try to use an aromatic wood in the barbecue grill to enhance the flavor. Move the chicken to a barbecue grill when the fire is at it's lowest. Cover the barbecue grill with the lid. Grill the chicken over the low flame for 2-3 hours until done. Chop meat into pieces, and serve. Jerk Chicken is served traditionally with any of the following Jamaican hard-dough bread, Rice & Peas, Fried Ripe Plantains, and Festival. Roast 50 minutes.

Baste with pan juices.

Roast another 25 minutes, basting with pan juices again.

Roast another 10 to 15 minutes, or until meat thermometer placed in the deepest part of the thigh without touching the bone reads 170 F.

Place roasted chicken on plate loosely tented with aluminum foil and let rest for at least 10 minutes.

Carve and serve with lime wedges and rice or white kidney

Options: For those who do not want to chop up a hot pepper. it can be replaced with 1 teaspoon or more (to taste) of dried, crushed chili flakes. For less fiery taste, use 1 or 2 small-to-medium-sized jalapeños instead of the scotch bonnet, habanero, or Serrano peppers.

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 8.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.15/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. This compares with the national average that has fallen 10.0 cents per gallon versus last week to \$2.43/g, according to GasBuddy.

Including the change locally during the past week, prices yesterday were 10.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago and are 34.2 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has dropped 31.4 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 2.7 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"Motorists finally have something to be excited about: gas prices plummeting, with at least one gas station in 27 states offering a gallon of gasoline at \$1.99 per gallon or less. The national average stands at its lowest point of 2018 having fallen nearly 50 cents since the start of October, keeping nearly \$200 million in the pockets of Americans every single day, acting as an economic stimulus ahead of the holidays," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While OPEC will be meeting this week to discuss the possibility of cutting oil production in light of the \$25 per barrel drop in prices since October, Americans will likely see falling prices at least for one more week. In addition, the promise of a trade deal with China may boost confidence in the economy, pushing global oil demand back up and driving prices higher. Motorists are encouraged to continue shopping around to find the best deals at the pump and prices under \$2 per gallon while they last."

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar Announces Transfer of Nearly \$1.4 Billion to State Highway and Rainy Day Funds

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced today he recently completed the transfer of \$2.77 billion into the State Highway Fund (SHF) and the Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF; commonly known as the "Rainy Day Fund"). Each fund received more than \$1.38 billion, or 50 percent of the total transfer.

"Texas' Rainy Day Fund is an important tool established to help our state weather difficult economic circumstances," Hegar said. "This transfer pushes the balance in the fund to more than \$12 billion. It is crucial that Texas use this amazing asset to maintain our strong fiscal position and our state's AAA credit rating. That's why I have asked the Legislature to authorize me to invest a portion of the fund in a more prudent and responsible manner and use the returns to address the types of long-term liabilities that have crippled the finances of states such as Illinois and New Jersey. Significant portions of this money have not been keeping up with inflation, and we must not allow the power of this asset to erode

over time."

The transfer amounts are based on crude oil and natural gas production tax revenues in excess of 1987 collections. If either tax generates more revenue than the 1987 threshold, an amount equal to 75 percent of the excess is transferred.

In November 2014, voters approved a constitutional amendment allocating at least half of these severance taxes to the ESF, with the remainder going to the SHF for use on non-toll highway construction, maintenance and rightof-way acquisition.

"Legislators and voters have taken crucial steps to address the infrastructure challenges of our fast-growing state,"

Hegar said. "The 50 percent split that flows into the State Highway Fund is critical to address the transportation needs of a dynamic and growing economy that serves a rapidly expanding population."

According to the Texas Constitution, the ESF transfer must occur within 90 days after the end of the fiscal year. When fiscal 2018 ended on Aug. 31, the ESF balance was \$11.04 billion.

With this most recent transfer, the new balance is \$12.48 billion, not accounting for currently outstanding spending authority. The balance in the ESF will decline as agencies spend down this remaining appropriation authority.
