

PRINCIPAL'S INTRODUCTION

'Sow your seed in the morning and at evening let your hands not be idle, for you do not know which will succeed, whether this or that, or whether both will do equally well'. Ecclesiastes 11:6

Our Leaving Certificate class of 2023 chose a striking image for their graduation mass and booklet – a dandelion flower sending forth its seeds; each with its own feathered parachute to catch the winds of life. The image captures that sense of their setting forth on the journey of life and the open possibilities that lie ahead for them. I wish them well on their journeys. The image also suggests a useful metaphor for education in our school.

As with the gardener, the educator's task is not so much to determine how growth will turn out, but to provide the optimal conditions for development to occur. In Mounthawk we strive to provide good soil, and like seeds sown in good soil and tended well, the potential in individual students finds expression and blossoms forth with the individuality of each as the pages of this annual newsletter testify. It has been a wonderful year of growth in Mercy Mounthawk.

The core academic work of the school continues with focus and quality as is evident in the success of our Leaving Certificate candidates from last year. As you will read, 10% of our students (22 students) achieved over 600 points in the leaving certificate against 6% nationally and 38% achieved over 500 points against 27% nationally. On the extra-curricular and co-curricular front, seeds have been sown and the potential of students certainly blossomed in so many different arenas. In January we were treated to a wonderful production of 'High School Musical'. Students have featured in Munster debating finals, Texaco Art Awards and cookery and fashion competitions. One of our Young Social innovator teams won their category at the National awards as did our Eco-Unesco environment group.

This year saw new clubs and societies take root – ranging from a Song Writing club to a Coding and Robotics team. The latter, having won their All-Ireland title, represented Ireland at an invitational championship in California. I want to note the tremendous success of students in the BT Young Scientist competition and as overall winners of Scifest in MTU, along with a host of other team and individual awards. On the playing fields, our Senior Girls Football team won the Munster Senior 'B' Championship, our U14 Boys Basketball team are All-Ireland Schools 'A'

Champions. We won our first U16.5 Munster Camogie Championship – a great breakthrough for the school and upholding tradition we came home again the Best Boys and Girls school shields in Kerry Athletics.

To continue the metaphor, a very important initiative this year to provide optimal conditions for educational growth and development in the school was the introduction of Yondr. Initial reflections from staff and students indicate that it is making a difference to concentration and focus in the classroom. We are sowing the seeds and understanding among our students that we do not need instant access to phones to function. While internet and Al can support education, learning and wisdom come from attention and undistracted focus. Quality teaching and learning requires uninterrupted focus in classrooms. Being present in the moment is a key to being grounded and to the quality of any effort we make. We will conduct a fuller survey of the impact in the new school term.

In terms of improving facilities in the school, it is uplifting to have the first phase of the multi-million euro extension for the school announced by the Minister last month. This phase of extra accommodation will provide more space for our current student population and address SEN needs. We look forward to the announcement of Phase two of the extension which will provide for enhanced technology, engineering, ICT and science facilities. This will be a tremendous development in the school and add to optimal conditions for growth (to continue the garden metaphor).

It is with a positive reflection on the quality and holistic nature of learning taking place in the school that I end this school year and I look forward to the next season in the Autumn. In the meantime, I wish all the school community a welcome break from the toil of the 'education garden' and a sunny and bright summer ...

GUIDANCE COUNSELLING

With June and the state exams fast approaching, another school year draws to a close. It has been a productive and very busy few months in the Guidance Department. All applications to the C.A.O. were submitted by the 1st February deadline, while Educational Impact Statements for D.A.R.E. applicants were supplied by the 15th March deadline. Information on Post Leaving Certificate courses, apprenticeships, maintenance grants, scholarships, career events and preparing for life after school was circulated to students both in guidance classes and on their Google Classroom. We continued to deliver the 'Reach+ Career and College Preparation Programme' to 5th and 6th years through their guidance classes.

There were a number of invaluable information evenings facilitated by the guidance department addressing subject choice for incoming first years, for 1st years going into 2nd year, and the senior cycle subject options for 3rd and 4th years going into 5th year. Thankfully, with Covid restrictions removed, our sixth years were afforded the opportunity to visit many College open days in person with the school. We visited University College Cork and University of Limerick in October, MTU Kerry in March and the Careers Fair in November. Visiting these College campuses is invaluable to the students in helping them decide their future career path. We also gave our sixth years the opportunity to attend the Kerry College open day and brought a group of students to see the incredible facilities and courses on offer in the Monavalley and Clash campus.

To initiate the process of getting students to think about their future career paths, the 'Pathways' programme was administered to all 4th year students. This programme asks a series of questions relating to the student's hobbies, interests, passions and unique decision-making style in order to discover which college courses and apprenticeships would best suit the



student. The Differential Aptitude Test was also administered to all 4th years, 3rd years (going straight into 5th year) took the Career Decision Making test and Cognitive Abilities Test (CAT4) was administered to incoming 1st years in February.

This year saw the introduction of a new initiative by the Guidance Department. Our aim is to reach out to former students who are now pursuing various careers with the hope that these past students will record a short video about their career journey to date since leaving school. The goal is to create a bank of interviews to aid our Senior Cycle students in making career decisions and assist in completing their CAO. Currently we are reaching out to past students who may be interested in getting involved in this initiative. If you are interested or know of someone who may be interested please contact the guidance department at careers@mercymounthawk.ie to find out more.

Finally, we would like to thank our colleagues, parents and management for their continuing support. We wish both the Junior and Leaving Certificate students well in their upcoming exams and we bid farewell to another group of Leaving Certificate students. We hope that they will be happy and fulfilled on the individual paths they have chosen. As they begin both their exams, and their journey on from here, we leave them with Winston Churchill's famous words "Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts" - believe in yourself and never give up.

Participation in the programme gives both first and fourth years the opportunity to develop friendships and increase their confidence and interpersonal skills.

The participants met once a week during Monday lunchtime. During this time the students had a chance to chat over a hot chocolate, play board games and card games, go for a walk, solve a murder mystery, partake in a cookie decoration competition and get to know others in the group.



Fourth year students also helped first years with any questions they had about school, homework, study or lockers, but the main aim of the programme was to have fun. Both first and fourth years said they really enjoyed their participation in the programme.



The Lee Strand Garda Youth Achievement Awards took place in Ballyroe Heights Hotel on Friday 30th October. This year marked the 25th Anniversary of the Awards and there was a great turnout on the night. There were 25 Awards given on the night - Twenty Merit Awards, a Community Safety Award, a Special Achievement Award, a Group Award and the overall winner.

Mercy Mounthawk was represented in great numbers with three of our students receiving individual Merit Awards. Aoife Bourke was recognised for raising thousands of Euro for Breast Cancer Research and for her commitment in training basketball teams in the community. 
Museum for a free visit or outreach visit to the school.

Mercy Mounthawk's long-standing tradition of being involved with debating continued this year. The Debating Club meets every Thursday during lunch time in the Library.

The Debate Club is open to all students and welcomes new members. It is mentored by students and overseen by teachers. It is a fun way to make new friends, develop communication skills and instil confidence in students. Students gain a deeper awareness of global issues and sharpen their analytical thinking skills. Students are challenged to think outside the box when preparing



arguments and sometimes present arguments they disagree with, adding to the enjoyment. The Debate Club organised a challenge debate against St Brendan's Killarney this year which proved to be a great opportunity for students to practice their skills of research, reasoning and public speaking.

This year the following TY students were afforded the opportunity to be involved with the Concern Debates, Sadhbh Cadogan, Cian Hennessy, Noah Edwards, Brendan Linnane, Conor O' Sullivan and Anuska Saha. September saw the commencement of the first of three debates. In the first round, the TYs met an experienced team from Mungret Community College and it was unfortunate that they were unsuccessful. However, they learned from the first debate and prepared a compelling and succinct argument that won them a victory against North Monastery, Cork.

Patrician Secondary School was the final school they faced where the students from Mercy Mounthawk proposed the motion that "HIV/AIDS in the global south is a forgotten pandemic". The motion was successfully carried, however the TYs did not accumulate enough points overall to enter the knockout stages. All in all they got a taste for debating and enjoyed the opportunity to absorb some new skills.

Munster Schools DEBATING

It was, once again, a very successful year in senior debating in Mounthawk as we reached the final of the Munster Schools competition for the third year running.

The Munster Schools' competition is the most prestigious and, indeed, difficult competition available to our students. Hosted by the UCC Philosophy Society, debates feature eight teams of two in each early round, with teams coming from all over the province. Teams progress as a pair, but an individual can be promoted as a single if adjudicators wish.

The first round saw us entering 3 teams and, of these, 2 teams and one individual advanced to the next round. This was our most successful opening round ever and we were thrilled to have so many superb debaters still in the mix. Eventually, one team (Tadhq Galvin and Clara O'Dowd) and 2 individuals (Laura O'Reilly and Layla Hannafin) made it all the way to the semi-final stage.

The standard of the semi-finals was possibly the best the debating coaches had seen, with motions such as support for the human extinction movement, the notion of a centralised global government and mandatory Religion classes, being vigorously debated. One candidate was left standing, as Tadhq Galvin made it through to the final. Getting better each round, this was a well-earned accomplishment for Tadhq. He put in a



superb performance on the day arguing in favour of the motion: "That This House Would Implement Harsher Sanctions Against EU Member States in Non-Compliance with EU Law and Regulations", just losing out narrowly on the individual prize.

Well done to all the students who took part during the year and to Mr Fleming, Mr Mc Eligott and Ms Fitzgerald who coached them throughout.



The team was formed in late December and they have been hard at work ever since. In February, the Mounthawk Masterminds showcased their skills at the regional competition in Galway, where they left a memorable impression. The teams's performance earned them the prestigious Robot Performance Award, achieving the highest score across 11 regional events in Ireland and Northern Ireland. Their remarkable efforts also led them to secure the Overall Champions Award, recognising their excellence in all aspects of the competition.

Fueled by their success at the regional competition, the Mounthawk Masterminds embarked on an exciting journey to the All-Ireland Finals. Competing against the finest teams in the country, they once again shone brightly. Their exceptional robot design garnered them the Robot Design Award, showcasing their ingenuity and technical expertise. Additionally, they triumphed in the intense Robot Knockout Challenge.

As a testament to their achievements at the All-Ireland finals, the Mounthawk Masterminds received a coveted invitation to compete at the Western Edge Open Competition in California. In May, after weeks of fundraising, they travelled across the Atlantic, eager to pit their skills against 22 international teams and 53 teams from across the United States. Their participation in this prestigious event is a testament to their dedication and talent.

The competition in California was a thrilling experience for the Mounthawk Masterminds. Surrounded by a global gathering of bright young minds, they showcased their extraordinary abilities and represented both our school and Ireland with distinction. Their innovative solutions, teamwork, and unwavering determination left a lasting impression on judges and fellow competitors alike, forging unforgettable memories and establishing lasting connections.

MAKERSPACE CLUB

It has been a very busy and productive year for our 30 Makerspace club members. The club meets every Friday after school and on some occasions we even meet twice a week.

The Makerspace Club is a place for hands-on learning. It promotes innovation through practical experimentation and it fosters a maker mindset in students. This club encompasses all aspects of STEAM education and has enabled students to make a number of different projects, both digital and physical. The Makerspace Club incorporates learning in a number of different areas including coding, robotics, science, engineering, designing, 3D printing and inventing.



SOME OF THE PROJECTS THAT HAVE BEEN COMPLETED SO FAR THIS YEAR INCLUDE:

Astro-pi Mission zero - The European Astro Pi Challenge is an ESA Education project run in collaboration with the Raspberry Pi Foundation. It offers students the amazing opportunity to conduct scientific investigations in space by writing computer programs that run on Raspberry Pi computers on board the International Space Station (ISS). Twenty Makerspace students took part in this year's challenge and will have their code running on board the ISS this summer.



The design and construction of students' Jack-o'-lantern boxes -

To celebrate Halloween, students learned some woodworking skills and created their own Jack-o'-lantern boxes. As part of the project, students had to code a micro:bit which worked as a "candle" inside the lantern.

Hydraulic labyrinth - Students designed their own individual labyrinths and then used cardboard to create them. Students then used syringes and pipes to create a hydraulic system that moved a ball around the labyrinth.

Laser-cut Christmas ornaments - Students used CAD to design Christmas ornaments and then used the school laser cutter to bring their creations to life.

3D printing - Students have been using CAD to create their own objects to be 3D printed.

LEGO League - For the first time ever, 7 of our Makerspace students took part in the International First LEGO League Robotics challenge. As part of the challenge, students engaged in research, problem-solving, coding, and engineering - building and programming a LEGO robot that navigates the missions of a robot game.

Microbit Coding and Electronics - Students used microbits to create their own "buzz the wire" games. This involved coding programs, transferring them to microbits and creating circuits to complete the game.

Game Design & Development - Students used software such as Scratch and Makecode Arcade to design and develop their own computer games. Some students even worked on developing python programs.



We would like to congratulate 2nd

year Makerspace and Junior Cycle Coding student, Samuel Garvey. Samuel worked tirelessly throughout the year to code and develop his own game on Scratch called

"Grim Hallows". His talent and hard work earned him a spot at the National Scratch Competition Finals in the 1st-3rd year category which were held in May at the University of Limerick.

His game greatly impressed his peers and the judges. Well done Samuel.





Engineering/STEAM

ENGINEERS WEEK:

This was Mercy Mounthawks' second year celebrating Engineers' Week. The event this year was even more successful than last year with great numbers of students engaging in events throughout the week. Students from all year groups, many who do not study Engineering as a subject, got involved in the activities of the week.

There was much activity around the school for the week and there were trips and guest speakers also. We had guests from Munster Technological University talking about the different Engineering courses they offer and showing how they use

virtual reality in day-to-day Engineering.

There was a trip to Liebherr Container Cranes Killarney, where students got first-hand experience of Engineering in action. Two of our TY students, Billy





 Doyle and Forat Al Janabai, were accepted to the week-long STEPS Engineering Your Future in Liebherr.

ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY TEACHERS ASSOCIATION (ETTA) STUDENTS AWARD:

Adam Doyle who was a Leaving Cert student from 2022 was recognised for his excellent Engineering project.

Adams' project gained him a H1 in his Leaving Certificate and the standard of his project was so high that he won the ETTA's region 2 Student Award.



CANSAT:

A team of TY students were assembled this year to embark on a mission to construct a

miniature satellite as part of a competition organised by the European Space Education Resource Office (ESERO) and Science Foundation Ireland. A CanSat is a simulation of a real satellite, contained within the volume of a 330ml soft drinks can.

The Primary Mission of the CanSat is to remotely measure temperature and pressure and transmit



the data to the ground-station (laptop computer). During the descent after the launch, they could transmit their data wirelessly back to the ground station. The Mercy Mounthawk team was the only school to represent Kerry in the provincial final and successfully launched their CanSat. It was



Our All-Ireland Journey






2nd Year Geography students went on a field-trip to Killarney, visiting a number of different sites and enjoying a wonderful day out.

FARM VISITS



On Tuesday 23rd May the Student Council Environment Committee visited two farms on the outskirts of Tralee. The thirty students firstly travelled to a large dairy farm and later on the same day they had a brief visit to an Organic farm.

The first part of the trip took us to Kilgulbin near Ardfert. We were welcomed to the home and farm of Maurice and Eva Costelloe for a wonderful and engaging few hours where we saw, first hand, the workings of a large scale dairy farm. The Costelloe's farm has a herd of over eight hundred animals with nearly five hundred milking cows.

Mr. Costelloe explained the workings of a modern dairy farm from beginning to the end of the 'milk cycle'. Basically, the students got to witness the arrival of the cows into the state of the art automated milking parlour and at the other end we saw the tanker from Lee Strand arrive to collect the milk. We were amazed to have a peek into the 24,000 litre milk tank, emptied by the tanker every day or two, we saw the milking parlour which had room for 50 cows on a rotating turntable, the cows walk on themselves and when finished they back themselves out and go on their way. We were taken to see the new arrivals, the young calves, in their sheds and we even had an encounter with the Bull.

Students learned that all the water, tens of thousands of litres, comes from wells on the farm, that the heat from the cooled milk gets transferred into the house for heating and hot water, that the automated milking parlour is capable of taking 50 cows at a time and that up to 24,000 litres of milk are produced for Lee Strand every day or two. What also impressed students is that all the cows could be milked in just under two hours. It was interesting to note that nearly all of the fodder for the farm comes from the locality and that the milking parlour was designed and manufactured up the road at Dairymaster in Causeway.

It was a real eye-opener and a pleasure to witness how a modern dairy farm operates. They even kept a few cows behind for our students to have a go at milking, which was a real treat...even if Lewis was on the receiving end of a 'bovine accident'...the shirt came out well in the wash!

We would like to thank Maurice, Eva and their family for their time and their hospitality during and after the visit. We were very taken aback by the tables of treats laid on by the family, a wonderful experience of good, old fashioned hospitality. Many of the students had never before been on a

farm and we are sure that the day will stand out for them in their memories of school life.

After visiting Costelloe's farm we travelled to Gortbrac Organic farm for a very quick visit of about an hour. In Gortbrac, Ian McGrigor showed us around and we saw his poly tunnels growing everything from figs and nectarines to cabbages and potatoes. Ian then took us on a walk up the hill on the old bog road where students saw two of our indigenous carnivorous plants the Butterworth and the Sundew and in the meadow we also saw a proliferation of pyramid orchids. Students sat by the lake which is used to water the poly tunnels as well as providing water for the toilets. Sadly we had to return quickly to the school but it is hoped that we will have a longer visit in September.

Student Climate Conference



On Wednesday, the 10th of May over 80 students from five second level schools in Tralee met for a conference to discuss, debate and take action on climate issues.

The conference took place at Mercy Secondary School Mounthawk and brought together students from Mercy Mounthawk, Tralee CBS, Presentation Secondary School Tralee, Coláiste Gleann Lí and Gaelcholáiste Trá Lí. During the course of the event students, working in groups, discussed the effects



of climate change under the headings of Energy, Transport, Global Food Systems, Biodiversity, Water, Litter and Climate Justice.

Each of the working groups comprised students from the five secondary schools and throughout the course of the conference the groups adopted resolutions and devised action ideas which will be carried out by the schools going forward into next year.

The action ideas included the following proposals from the school students: sensor taps to reduce waste water to be installed in schools, food miles on canteen food menus should be displayed in the school canteens and school canteens should promote vegan or vegetarian food at least one day per week. Students will be involved with school authorities and parents to help devise tasty, nutritious and meat-free meals.

All litter in the schools should be segregated and disposed of sustainably. The climate justice committee proposed that schools should have a climate justice week to raise awareness of the fact that it is the poorer nations and peoples of the



world that will, in the short and medium terms, bear the brunt of climate change. It is felt that wealthier nations should help thes

wealthier nations should help these countries in mitigating the effects of climate change.

The energy group proposed the idea that all schools should have a blackout day every week or every month. During blackout day lights in the school would be turned off and an increased awareness of energy usage would be promoted. The action projects will be carried out in the individual schools who will decide themselves which areas of the environment to focus on through the action projects.

At the end of the day the conference agreed that all schools in Tralee should carry out and promote two action projects together. The first of these, it is proposed, would be a blackout day across all schools in the town. The second of the action projects involves the area of transport. All students present felt that promoting cycling and walking to school is something that the schools in town could achieve together. It was recognised by the conference that many students who have bicycles do not cycle to school and it was felt that, if promoted properly, many more students would get on their bikes or walk to school instead of getting lifts in cars.

At the end of the day it was agreed among all present that schools would reconvene in September to devise a safe and workable action project around the area of safe cycling and walking to school. It was felt that the promotion of sustainable transport to schools, namely walking and cycling, would not only enhance the environment, but would also increase the well-being and engagement of students after they got to school in the mornings.

After four hours of intense discussion and presentations, the conference came to an end, with the aim to meet again in September to plan what to do next. It is hoped that the student climate conference will become an annual event and that all students in town will work together to achieve success

in changing habits of students, teachers and parents when it comes to the environmental and lifestyle issues that affect us all.





Eco-Unesco Young Environmentalist

NATIONAL AWARD WINNERS

On Friday, the 26th of May the Students' Council from Mercy Secondary School Mounthawk took part in the finals of the Eco-Unesco Young Environmentalist Awards in the convention centre in Dublin. The group had been entered under the Community Development category for their work throughout the school year 2022 to 2023.

The group were delighted to win their own category which was the Junior category. However, there was even more excitement to come and our group came out overall winner on the day and received the National Overall Junior Award. This is the first time that Mercy Mounthawk has won the national award at the Young Environmentalist Awards.

During the school year 2022 – 2023 the student council held a battery drive during which they collected the equivalent of 12,000 AA batteries, in all about 240 kg worth and sent them for recycling. During the battery drive the students promoted recycling in general and also developed resources including a video highlighting how cobalt is mined for batteries in countries such as the Congo.

The Cobalt mining video, which highlights the use of child slave labour, was shown to all junior cert students in the school. Students learned that a significant percentage of world cobalt, an active ingredient in many batteries including those for cars and phones, was mined by children as young as six or seven years of age. It is estimated that the majority of batteries for phones and electric cars probably contain cobalt mined by children.

Students also produced a video highlighting the unsustainable practices upholding the fast fashion industry, while at the same time suggesting alternatives to clothing that is worn only a few times before being discarded.



At the end of the school year the students held an environment conference to explore climate and sustainability issues under the headings of energy, water, fast fashion, global food systems and transport. The resolutions and action projects devised on the day included actions on promoting safe cycling and walking to school. The school secured an initial grant for €45,000 towards cycling infrastructure which it is hoped to have in place during the 2023 – 2024 school year.

This first student environment conference held in May 2022 also proposed to hold a follow up conference inviting all secondary schools from Tralee town. This multi school conference took place on the 10th

of May 2023 and all schools present expressed the desire and need to promote cycling to school throughout the town. It was proposed at this conference that the secondary schools in Tralee would reconvene in September to begin working on an action plan to promote cycling as a mode of transport to and from all schools in the town.

Mr. Kissane, Deputy Principal, expressed his delight at the school receiving this National Award and said that 'students had been taking part in the YEA's for quite a few years and it is great to see this effort rewarded in such a fashion. Our girls and boys had been working on the Battery Drive/Child Labour, Fast Fashion and Climate Conference initiatives for over a year. The resolutions and action ideas adopted at the conferences will point the way forward for the school environment committee for the next few years. The idea for all of the secondary schools to come together and work towards promoting cycling to school is something that the students should be commended for. It is hoped that Kerry County Council will further their engagement with the schools in Tralee to help improve road infrastructure to the point

where cycling and walking become viable, fully utilised and safer modes of transport to and from school'.


5th Year Spanish Immersion Trip

SCHOOL SELF-EVALUATION (SSE) and SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLANS (SIPs)

Report to the school community for 2022/23

NEW SSE CYCLE 2022 - 2026

School Self-Evaluation (SSE) is designed as a process of collaborative, internal school review that is focused on school improvement. The Department of Education published two documents this year: Circular 0056/2022 and the document School Self-Evaluation: Next Steps 2022-2026 which outlined two phases for school planning. Phase 1: (2022-2023) was to involve a 'Review Year for Schools' of the impact that COVID had on the experiences of their students and a space to initiate a wellbeing review and development cycle. In Phase 2: (2023-2026): schools have the autonomy to choose their SSE focus areas but should follow through with a plan that focuses on wellbeing.

In Phase 1 (2022/23), part of our review of the impact of COVID on our students' experiences was to harvest and collate the experience and voice of our students during the pandemic in our publication 'Wow, what just happened?' The book holds the authentic voice of our students about what they experienced during those years and it is a wonderful production by the teachers and students. It is available to purchase on the school's website at: http://www.mercymounthawk.ie/

We also surveyed the teachers, parents and students as to their perceptions of the impact of Covid on students. Similar themes emerged across the surveys, albeit with different emphasis between the groups. The most significant factor teachers observed was a more frequent use of social media (67%) by their students. 20.6% of the parents mentioned this as a consequence on their sons and daughters, whereas only 6% of students felt that there was an increase in their social media use. Teachers noted increased levels of anxiety amongst the student population (62%). 22.1% of parents noted this and 16.5% of students agreed - being one of the highest noted consequences among students. Poor attendance was a factor of concern for 59% of teachers who select it as being the most direct influence on students. They also discerned their students having a shorter attention span (49%). 14.7% of parents mentioned a reduced academic performance and 11.3% of students noted this impact.

The groups were also asked for suggestions on what they would like to see happen, which ranged from a focus on teaching coping skills, self-esteem and social skills, help with home study plans, study techniques, Revision Sessions/ Catch-up Classes whose purpose is to cover sections of the course missed during COVID, quiet time, less emphasis on exam pressure and tackling the impact of social media. The Wellbeing Committee are currently considering what strategies we can adopt in the coming years to address these needs.

'YONDR'

One of the initiatives we have already implemented in response to the impact of social media on students is the introduction of Yondr pouches for phones during the school day. This project had a long genesis, reflecting the ongoing concerns of parents and teachers around the increasing dependence and focus by students on media and the negative impacts reported in research such as the 'My World Survey 2' (2019). The National Study of Youth Mental Health in Ireland (by UCD School of Psychology and Jigsaw)

reported a significant relationship between time spent online and higher levels of depression and anxiety and lower levels of self-esteem, which reflects the increased anxiety levels reported in our own Covid survey.

We are very satisfied with the levels of buy-in by our students into the new system introduced in March this year and we will be investigating the impact of strengthening the 'Phone free' environment of the school on the wellbeing, social engagement and class focus of students in the coming year.



ANTI-BULLYING SIP

A further factor adding to anxiety and impacting negatively on the wellbeing of certain students is the negative impact effect of bullying. Based on the finding of surveys last year, we continued our SIP on anti-bullying and progress has been made. Our goal this year was to work on the level of awareness among students and staff of the processes around reporting and tackling bullying and of the responsibility and efficacy of everyone (staff and students) in intervening and supporting students in appropriate ways if and when they see bullying.

A newly formed anti-bullying committee was established and initiated strategies. One strategy was to explore the impact of bullying through cross-curricular work and this was done through new modules in CSPE, SPHE, English and History classes. Health Promotion Week in October last focused on how to intervene when we see bullying, with inter-class debates and videos at assembly which focused on intervention. In relation to on-line bullying and safety on-line, the Lockers Programme by webwise was undertaken in SPHE classes. We have engaged with a number of intervention programmes, namely the FUSE programme, which was introduced in 2nd year. Core teams of teachers have been trained this year in both Restorative Practice and Helping Hands models of intervention and this will allow us as a school to implement these strategies in the coming academic year.

PHASE 2 - 2023 FORWARD:

Looking towards next year, we will continue our SIP on Antibullying, developing the initiatives begun this year, focusing on the upskilling of staff in interventions, embedding strategies and exploring the involvement of parents. Based on the feedback from our surveys this year, an improvement plan on Attendance will be initiated. We will progress with Yondr across the whole school. In addition, the SSE team will explore and seek to identify other strategies in relation to the promotion of Wellbeing in the school.

Young Social Innovators

Young Social Innovators (YSI) is a Social Innovation Education Programme that inspires and empowers young people to become "active citizens" in their local communities and beyond. It encourages students to use their talents, insights, passion and creativity to take action and come up with innovative solutions to social challenges and issues that exist in society today.

Here in Mercy Mounthawk, there is a strong tradition of engaging with the YSI programme that has seen a wonderful collection of awards and achievements. And this year, we were absolutely delighted to continue this tradition.

This year, thirty-five teams of student innovators from all over Ireland, including four from Kerry, were shortlisted to compete for a range of YSI Challenge Awards as well as the overall Gold, Silver and Bronze Young Social Innovators of the Year Title Awards.

Our TY YSI project "Catch My Drift" was nominated in the "Make Our World Safer" YSI Category Challenge Award. The project focused on the issue and social concern of the current lack of education and awareness that exists around the area of essential water safety and drowning prevention in schools and local communities. The team dedicated their year to the importance of being "water and beach safety aware" by providing access to basic and essential information as well

as drowning prevention awareness through their campaign in person and on social media.

The team's main goal was to be as proactive as possible in changing attitudes and behaviours around this social issue. They wanted to contribute to the prevention of future waterrelated accidents or fatalities from happening in Kerry and beyond so that local aquatic environments can be enjoyed with confidence and safety.

Since September, the team has been extremely busy coordinating a variety of innovative actions, activities and events to raise awareness. Students carried out a series of research surveys, set up information stalls, decorated halls and notice boards with visual displays of "Information, Facts & Statistics" that surround this topic. They ran a successful social media campaign, held a fundraising event in aid of their chosen charities: the Fenit RNLI branch and Water Safety Ireland, by selling "Mermaid's Purse" sweet bags and proudly raising over €450 euro for these essential services.

Students engaged with the Water Safety Ireland WISE (Water Insight, Safety & Education) programme and used their learning and upskilling in water safety strategies and risk assessment information to create a series of workshops for Junior Cycle students from 1st to 3rd year. The workshops, which were delivered during "National YSI week", provided important strategies from specific water based activities to hazards. CPR education was also provided to help students to know what to do when faced with potential unforeseen accidents. In May, the students organised a guest speaker event in collaboration with the Fenit RNLI branch to ensure the students in their school community were equipped with essential beach safety and drowning prevention knowledge and strategies in advance of the summer months ahead.

In March, the team travelled to the Lime Tree Theatre in Limerick where they had the opportunity to come together with other young people to share their ideas and actions for change

and perform their excellent YSI Speak Out showcase in front of a panel of judges and an audience of their YSI peers and invited guests. They lifted the roof with their wonderful Speak Out Performance including vital facts, information, prevention strategies as well as a fashion show and interpretative recreation of the song "I follow Rivers"!

In April, the team were thrilled to receive the news that their project had been shortlisted for the National YSI Awards being nominated for the National Challenge Category Award: "Make Our World Safer".

Students travelled to Dublin early on Tuesday 2nd May to attend the YSI national finals, which took place in Croke Park. Five students represented the team (Conor O'Sullivan, Meghan Rusk, Tyler Hanafin, Caitriona Doyle O'Brien and Sarah Jane Hoffman) pitching their project innovation to a panel of 5 judges which included a questions and answer section.

The official YSI awards ceremony took place at 1.30pm where it was revealed that the team had won the national challenge award for the category "Make Our World A Safer Place". We were absolutely delighted to have the honour of receiving such an award for raising awareness and seeking to tackle such a vital social issue.
