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3. Summary

This document presents the results of analyses to ascertain the potential of the Natura 2000 network to conserve crop wild relatives (CWR). We obtained distribution data of European priority CWR from large international biodiversity databases and filtered the records to obtain a high quality georeferenced dataset. This dataset contains over 2.8 million records of 568 different priority crop wild relatives. To lay the foundation for the design of a network for the conservation of crop wild relatives in Europe, we analyzed the presence of priority taxa in the Natura 2000 network. We also consulted the Habitats Directive to identify priority crop wild relatives that are characteristic of the protected habitats under Annex I of the Directive, as well as those listed in Annexes II, IV and V.

The results show great potential of the Natura 2000 network for the conservation of crop wild relatives, with 519 priority taxa within just 31% of its sites. In addition, 84 priority CWR taxa have been identified as characteristic species of 83 priority habitats of the Directive, and 17 of them are also listed in Annexes II and IV. These findings support the value of using the existing biodiversity conservation infrastructure in Europe for crop wild relative conservation *in situ*. With very little additional cost involved, the *in situ* conservation of European priority crop wild relatives could provide added value to the Natura 2000 network through their important contribution to the maintenance of food security.

4. Introduction

Crop wild relatives (CWR) are wild plant taxa closely related to cultivated plants, recognised as a valuable source of genetic variation for crop improvement (Vaughan, 1994; Maxted, Ford-Lloyd, et al., 1997; van de Wouw et al., 2001; Maxted et al., 2006; Hajjar and Hodgkin, 2007; Heywood et al., 2007; FAO, 2008; Millet et al., 2008; Brozynska et al., 2016). Evolved under natural conditions and occurring in a broad range of habitats, they can provide useful adaptations for the development of new, improved varieties of crops (Prescott-Allen and Prescott Allen, 1983; Maxted, Hawkes, et al., 1997; Hajjar and Hodgkin, 2007; Hodgkin and Hajjar, 2008; Sonnante and Pignone, 2008; McCouch et al., 2013). In the current context of global change, they are now acknowledged worldwide as a fundamental resource to support food security (Tyack and Dempewolf, 2015). As wild species, CWR suffer from the same threats as any other wild plants, such as habitat fragmentation and loss, changes in land uses, invasive species and climate change (Bilz et al., 2011; Kell et al., 2012, 2015; Magos Brehm et al., 2017). Their conservation must be undertaken in an efficient and systematic manner that preserves the maximum amount of genetic diversity. Although their conservation ultimately requires an integrated response from both the agriculture and environment communities, the implementation of CWR conservation *in situ* depends on the involvement of the environment ministries of the EU member countries, which are already responsible for conserving wild plant populations.

The Habitats Directive was implemented in 1992 through Council Directive 92/43/EEC (European Commission, 1992). It explicitly identifies and designates important habitats and species that are a priority for conservation. The Habitats Directive commits EU members to keep their protected habitats and species in a favourable status and to periodically report on their condition.

The Natura 2000 network is the largest network of protected areas in the world (https://ec.europa.eu/environment/nature/natura2000/index_en.htm) and it was established to implement the Habitats Directive (Council Directive 92/43/EEC) and the Birds Directive (Directive 2009/147/EC). The implementation and development of the Natura 2000 network has required a significant coordination effort among European Union country members, as well as a strong economic investment. Gantioler et al. (2010) reported an expenditure of more than €5.8 billion per year and described the large associated benefits of sustaining such a network.

EU member states are committed to meeting their obligations under international policies and legislative instruments relating to the conservation and sustainable use of plant genetic resources for food and agriculture (PGRFA), including crop wild relatives (CWR). In this context, the Farmer's Pride project, funded by the Horizon 2020 Framework Programme of the European Union, aims to promote the conservation and use of plant genetic resources through the design and development of a European network for *in situ* conservation and sustainable use. For this purpose, one first logical step is to assess the coverage and potential use of existing European conservation infrastructures for conserving European biodiversity.

In this report, we assess the potential of the Natura 2000 network to secure CWR diversity. We present results of analyses showing the priority CWR populations that occur within the limits

of Natura 2000 network sites and analyse the coverage and efficiency of the Natura 2000 network as a tool for CWR *in situ* conservation. In addition, we identify European priority CWR that are specifically identified by the Habitats Directive to be a priority for conservation. These results will contribute to the development of a strategy for the conservation and sustainable use of CWR in Europe.

5. Methods

5.1 Target CWR taxa

The target taxa are defined in an inventory of European priority CWR. This inventory includes 863 taxa (Appendix A) related to human and animal food crops (485 species and 378 subspecific taxa)¹.

5.2 Distribution data

The geographic scope of the Farmer's Pride project is Europe (as defined by Hollis and Brummit 2001), EU territories outside of Europe (i.e., Azores, Canary Islands, Cyprus, East Aegean Islands and Madeira), and Asiatic Turkey. However, in this study we focused on the *in situ* coverage of CWR by the greatest European biodiversity infrastructure, the Natura 2000 network. Therefore, the analyses performed only involve European Union member states and the United Kingdom where the Natura 2000 network is displayed.

Distribution data were downloaded from two large international biodiversity databases: the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF – www.gbif.org) and Genesys (www.genesys-pgr.org/). GBIF is a worldwide repository of chorological data of wild species fed by a large number of data providers worldwide, including genebanks, botanic gardens, museums, and universities. Genesys is a database holding information on *ex situ* accessions conserved in genebanks worldwide and is also fed by numerous national and international data providers.

The download of occurrence data for all target species was performed using a programming script developed in R environment (R Core Team, 2013), using rGBIF and genesysr packages (Chamberlain and Boettiger, 2017; Obreza, 2019). The taxonomy and nomenclature of Euro+Med PlantBase (www.emplantbase.org/home.html) were used as a reference. More than 2,500 synonyms of the target species were also included in the search. The obtained data were filtered and cleaned according to the criteria shown in Table 1.

The System-wide Information Network for Genetic Resources (SINGER) was an information exchange network of the Future Harvest Centres of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR) and associated partners (<https://www.gbif.org/dataset/8581aea-f762-11e1-a439-00145eb45e9a>). The data it contained is now fully integrated in Genesys.

To create a high quality dataset, additional filters were applied to the downloaded data. This involved:

- 1) eliminating records dated before 1950
- 2) removing duplicates
(keeping the occurrence records that *a*) have locality field information, *b*) are most recent, *c* have more fields completed (in this order))
- 3) removing records that are thought to be incompatible with CWR occurrence: urban areas, water bodies and sites with permanent snow and ice, according to the land use map of ESA CCI Land Cover project (2017)
- 4) removing records of the same taxon found to be within a 1 km buffer radius, as these could be considered to be part of the same population.

The complete process was carried out using a novel programme created using R functions and the following R packages: ‘CoordinateCleaner’ (Zizka et al., 2019), ‘countrycode’ (Arel-Bundock et al., 2018), ‘data.table’ (Dowle and Srinivasan, 2019), ‘devtools’ (Wickham et al., 2020), ‘dplyr’ (Wickham et al., 2019), ‘magrittr’ (Bache and Wickham, 2016), ‘spocc’ (Chamberlain, 2019), ‘stringr’ (Wickham, 2019), ‘sp’ (Pebesma and Bivand, 2005), ‘ggplot2’ (Wickham, 2016), ‘tidyverse’ (Wickham and Henry, 2020), ‘readxl’ (Wickham and Bryan, 2019), ‘rgeos’ (Bivand and Rundel, 2019), ‘maptools’ (Bivand and Lewin-Koh, 2019), ‘rgdal’ (Bivand et al., 2019), ‘rworldmap’ (South, 2011), ‘rworldxtra’ (South, 2012) and ‘raster’ (Hijmans, 2019).

5.3 Presence of European priority CWR in Natura 2000

Filtered and cleaned data were transformed into a shapefile using package ‘sp’ and visualized in a map using ArcGIS v. 10.4 (ESRI, 2016). Natura 2000 layer, a vector file containing polygons of Natura 2000 sites until 2018, was downloaded from the European Environment Agency website on 21/08/2019 (<https://www.eea.europa.eu/data-and-maps/data/natura-10/natura-2000-spatial-data/natura-2000-shapefile-1>, last accessed 02/03/2020). This layer contains polygons for Sites of Community Importance (SCI) designated under the Habitats Directive and Special Protection Areas (SPAs) designated under the Birds Directive (D 2009/147/EC) (European Commission, 2009). All sites were considered for analysis and the layer was incorporated into the ArcGIS software.

The ‘selection by location’ tool in ArcGIS allowed the selection of CWR populations that are within the limits of any of the polygons of Natura 2000. To those populations that occur within the boundaries of the polygons of Natura 2000, information related to each of these polygons was added through the ‘join’ function in ArcGIS. These new shapefiles were then saved and analysed.

In addition, we extracted information for taxa having 20 or less populations in total and identified Natura 2000 sites hosting populations of any of these taxa, so they can be highlighted as a high priority for conservation action.

5.4 CWR in the Habitats Directive

Using the Interpretation Manual of European Union Habitats (European Commission, DG Environment, 2013), Annex 1 of the Habitats Directive (Council Directive 92/43/EEC), (European Commission, 1992) was consulted to search for European priority CWR that are listed as characteristic species in any of the protected habitats by this normative. More than 2,500 synonyms of the inventory of European priority CWR, according to the taxonomy used in the Euro+Med Plantbase (<https://www.emplantbase.org/home.html>) were also considered. Subsequently, information on the presence of these taxa in the Natura 2000 network was obtained. In addition, Annexes II, IV and V of the Habitats Directive were consulted to identify European priority CWR that are listed. The importance of these Annexes stems from the fact that these sites must be managed in accordance with the ecological needs of the species (Annex II), that strict protections must be applied to the species within or outside Natura 2000 sites (Annex IV) and that the exploitation or wild harvesting of the species are compatible with the maintenance of a favorable conservation status of the species (Annex V). Finally, the populations of the priority CWR included in Annexes II, IV and V falling within the limits of Natura 2000 were identified.

6. Results

6.1 Target species and distribution data

The query to GBIF and Genesys databases and the subsequent filtering processes generated a database with information from the European Union countries plus United Kingdom containing more than 2.8 million data records for 568 taxa (384 at the species level and 184 at infraspecific level) (c. 66% of the taxa included in the inventory of European priority CWR).

6.2 Presence of CWR in Natura 2000




Figure 1: Distribution of populations of 568 European priority CWR taxa in the EU and the UK, showing the occurrences of 519 taxa in Natura 2000 in green

The analysis shows that 404,351 populations of 519 European priority CWR taxa (351 species and 168 taxa at infraspecific levels) occur in the Natura 2000 network—c. 14% of the populations recorded in the database (Figure 1) and 91% of the 568 taxa with high quality distribution data. Notably, all the populations of 49 priority CWR taxa recorded in the database occur outside the Natura 2000 network (Appendix B).




Figure 2: Natura 2000 sites that host populations of European priority CWR

Regarding the effectiveness of Natura 2000 in covering CWR populations, we found populations of at least one European priority CWR taxon in approximately one third of the Natura 2000 sites (8,712 of the 27,856 Natura 2000 sites, Figure 2). For those taxa found in Natura 2000 sites, the mean number of taxa per site is close to 15 and the median 6. In total, 25% of the sites with CWR populations contain more than 19 taxa and another 25% contain only one or two. Serra d'Espadá, in Spain, (site code ES0000468, containing 3,830 priority CWR populations) is the site with the highest number of European priority CWR taxa (121). On the other hand, Veluwe, in The Netherlands, (site code NL9801023, hosting 95 European priority taxa) is the site with the highest number of populations (4,606).

The list of European priority CWR taxa with high quality georeferenced locations, the number of Natura 2000 sites where they are found and the number of populations occurring in Natura 2000 sites is shown in Appendix B.

Sites of special interest in this analysis are those hosting populations of priority CWR taxa with a low number of high quality records. These sites are very valuable for the establishment of genetic reserves because they hold populations of CWR poorly represented in the database and, thus, difficult to find in Europe. Their presence in the Natura 2000 network provides at least passive protection to these populations. Of the 173 taxa that have 20 or fewer populations recorded in the database, 125 (c. 72%) have at least one of their populations within Natura 2000 sites (with a total of 450 populations). The results show that 267 Natura 2000 sites contain these populations, with a maximum richness of five taxa (Table 2).

6.3 CWR in the Habitats Directive




Figure 3: Distribution of 84 European priority CWR taxa that are characteristic of the main habitat categories listed in Annex I of the Habitats Directive . The sum of taxa in the different main habitat categories is greater than 84 because some taxa occur in several habitats.

Annex I of the Habitats Directive lists 233 habitats types for which special sites must be designated for their conservation. Of these, 83 habitats types – which represent all nine habitat categories of the Directive (Figure 3) – include at least one European priority CWR amongst their characteristic species (Table 3). Together, these habitats include 84 European priority CWR as characteristic species (Table 4). Seventy-three taxa out of these 84 are represented in the high quality occurrence database, and 72 have at least one of their populations within the limits of Natura 2000 sites (Appendix B), although all of them must be present in the Natura 2000 sites by definition.

Seventeen European priority CWR taxa are listed in both Annexes II and IV of the Habitats Directive (Table 5), but none in Annex V. Seven of these are given the status of priority species in the Directive, which means the Community has particular responsibility in view of the proportion of their natural range which falls within the territory. Information extracted for populations of the 17 taxa protected by Annexes II and IV, show that three are represented in the high quality occurrence database by more than 50 populations: *Lactuca watsoniana* Trel. (369 populations), *Brassica insularis* Moris (62 populations) and *Coincyia monensis* subsp. *cheiranthos* (Vill.) Aedo, Leadley & Muñoz Garm (57 populations). The remaining 14 taxa are represented in the database by a maximum of four populations, and six of them did not have any records at all. Finally, all taxa with occurrence records had at least one of their populations within the limits of Natura 2000, with the exception of *Diplotaxis siettiana* Maire and *Crambe arborea* H. Christ.

7. Final considerations and conclusions

The database developed for the EU and United Kingdom in the context of the Farmer's Pride project is the largest CWR database with high quality occurrence data currently available. The meticulous filtering and rigorous cleaning of the dataset greatly improves its value for conservation planning as it increases the chances that the target taxa will actually be found at the localities indicated by the records. However, there are some limitations that require further attention. First, the GBIF database provides an uneven distribution of plant occurrence records across Europe because the countries have different degrees of collaboration with GBIF (www.gbif.org/the-gbif-network), some of the chorological records are not digitized, and there is a different intensity of botanical exploration in the territories. Thus, the scarce number of CWR populations in some countries or N2000 sites cannot be directly associated with a lower occurrence of CWR in these territories. Therefore, the results provided here are conservative in the sense that we can assure that there are at least these populations of European priority CWR in the Natura 2000 network, but there are certainly many more that have not been recorded in this work.

Taking into account that these estimates are conservative, the potential role of Natura 2000 in conserving European priority CWR is significant, with 31% of the sites in the network including at least 519 taxa (351 species plus 168 taxa at the subspecies, nothosubspecies or variety levels). Although Natura 2000 targets the conservation of species that are threatened, vulnerable, rare or endemic, it also shows good suitability for the conservation of CWR. While the representation of European priority CWR in Natura 2000 is very high, we can expect it to increase with a more complete occurrence dataset (i.e., including records for taxa for which we were unable to obtain high quality data from GBIF and Genesys, and from countries that are not well covered in this dataset). This assumption is also supported by the high number of taxa found in Natura 2000 with a low number of occurrences in our dataset – 0.96 % of the network sites encompassing 72% of taxa for which we have records of 20 or less populations. However, it is still unknown to what extent the network conserves within-taxa diversity of CWR.

The results of the analysis of European priority CWR that appear as characteristic species of the Habitats Directive Annex I protected habitats also highlights the potential value of Natura 2000 for the conservation of CWR taxa. Eighty-four taxa (c. 10% of the taxa in the European priority CWR inventory) are characteristic plants of around one third of the protected habitat types, representing all the main habitat categories described in the Directive. Furthermore, 17 priority CWR taxa are listed in Annexes II and IV of the Directive. The actions taken either to maintain or improve the status of the protected habitats or species may already be contributing to the conservation of European priority CWR taxa.

Based on the results of this research, we can conclude that the Natura 2000 network provides an important foundation for *in situ* CWR conservation in Europe, and that there is therefore great potential to implement *in situ* CWR conservation actions under the legal framework of the Habitats Directive. This would not require substantial further investment from EU member countries – only recognition of the valuable plant genetic resources that exist in Natura 2000 which are already under some degree of conservation management. This would provide a priceless contribution to food security in Europe and other world regions.

Finally, the results of this research provide an opportunity to establish pilot genetic reserves for active conservation management of CWR in the Natura 2000 network. A next step to

improve knowledge on the occurrence of CWR in the network could be for site managers to identify CWR in their botanical inventories and take into account their unique value when designing, updating and implementing the site management plans.
