




Procedural Writing: Cheese cake recipe



600g cream cheese

1 tsp vanilla extract

(20 biscuits)

12 Kinder Bueno bars

1 packet hazelnut wafer biscuits

300ml thickened cream

Ingredients

If you're a sucker for the sweet milk chocolate and velvety hazelnut cream of a Kinder Bueno than this might just be the dessert of your dreams - it's mine!

You will need:

- Square baking tin
 - Baking paper
 - Scissors
 - Mixer
 - Knife
 - Spoon

Method

Step 1 Line a square baking tin with baking paper and cover the bottom in wafer biscuits. You may need to cut some to ensure the entire base is covered.

Step 2 In a stand mixer (or with a handheld mixer) beat cream cheese until smooth. Add the thickened cream and the vanilla extract and continue to beat until thick and creamy.

Step 3 Roughly chop three of the Kinder Buenos and stir through the cream cheese mixture.

Step 4 Spoon mixture over the wafer biscuit base, pushing it into the very edges of the pan.

Step 5 Use remaining Bueno bars to cover the top of the cheesecake, again cutting where necessary to cover the entire pan.



Step 6 Place cheesecake in fridge for 4 hours to set.




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
<u> History – story of Tuatha Dé Danann</u>




Long, long ago, before the Celts arrived, there lived a group of people called the 'Firbolg'. It was said that the Firbolg had come to Ireland from Greece, where they had been treated badly by a mean king. The Firbolg divided Ireland into five provinces: Munster, Ulster, Connacht, Leinster and Meath. The Firbolg ruled peacefully over the provinces for almost 40 years.




Then a new people called the 'Tuatha Dé Danann' landed in Ireland. From their landing place in Ulster, the Tuatha Dé Danann marched through Ireland and made camp at a place called Moytura, in Connacht. When the Firbolg heard of these new visitors, their king, Eochaid, sent his best warrior, Sreang, to speak to them. Sreang was a giant of a man with huge, bulging muscles. He had a mighty spear, with which he could pin a man to the ground from 200 paces away. When Sreang arrived at the camp of the Tuatha Dé Danann, he found that they had many great warriors, just as fierce as himself. He also found that they were great artists, builders, poets and singers. He went back to King Eochaid and told him that it would be better to give away half of Ireland than to fight the new arrivals. King Eochaid was stubborn and he would not listen to Sreang. He called all of his warriors together and set off to fight the Tuatha Dé Danann.





A great battle began between the Firbolg and the Tuatha Dé Danann, which lasted for several days. Healers went around each night fixing bones and putting herbs and pastes onto deep cuts. The dead were cleared from the battlefield each evening and the fighting began again in the morning. The king of the Tuatha Dé Danann was called Nuada. King Nuada was a mighty warrior, who led his army from the front. King Eochaid chose to lead the Firbolg from the rear.




During one vicious battle, King Nuada came face to face with Sreang. There was a mighty clash between the two and neither was willing to give way. Just when it seemed like neither could win, Sreang lashed out with one final blow and cut off King Nuada's right arm. Luckily, one of King Nuada's greatest warriors came to help him. Soon afterwards, King Eochaid went to a nearby well for a drink. He was set upon by three warriors of the Tuatha Dé Danann and killed. That night, there was much sadness in both camps.



The great warrior, Sreang, was chosen to lead the Firbolg and wisely he decided to end the fighting. The Tuatha Dé Danann agreed to let the Firbolg have the province of their choice and to live in peace. Sreang and his followers chose Connacht and the Tuatha Dé Danann were given the rest of Ireland. The Tuatha Dé Danann realised that they needed a new king. King Nuada had lost his right arm in battle and it was said that a man could not be king if he had any type of injury. Bres was chosen as the new king. At first he was a popular choice, because he had fought bravely. However, Bres's father was a Formorian. The Formorians were powerful, magical people who lived on the islands off Connacht. The Tuatha Dé Danann soon found that they were no longer free, but living under the rule of the Formorians.





In the meantime, the Tuatha's greatest medicine man had made a new silver arm for Nuada. Once again, Nuada became king and Bres was told to stand aside. This made the Formorians very angry and they gathered an army to attack the Tuatha. The chances of the Tuatha improved greatly with the arrival of an unknown warrior called Lugh of the Long Arm. King Nuada was so impressed by Lugh's skill in battle that he asked him to lead the army.



Once again, a battle was fought at Moytura. This time, the Tuatha Dé Danann were faced with the dreaded Balor of the Evil Eye. Balor's eye was so big that it took four men to raise its lid. When his eye was open, its poisonous gaze could destroy an army. As soon as Lugh saw the eye opening, he threw a huge stone.



The stone knocked Balor's eye right through to the back of his head. Balor's poisonous eye now looked on his own army, the Formorians. He ended up destroying his own army! With the battle over, Bres and the rest of the Formorians went back to their islands. They never went near the Tuatha Dé Danann again.


