APA-NJ Walking Tour: Roosevelt, NJ













Originally known as Jersey Homesteads, Roosevelt Borough was one of ninety-nine communities across the country created by the federal government as part of a New Deal initiative.



Certification Maintenance

The walking tour will focus on the unique history of the founding of Roosevelt and the efforts over the past 20 years to maintain the original plan of the community featuring communal open spaces surrounded by a greenbelt of farmland and forests. The presentations will include the development history of the Borough, the architectural history, the successful efforts to preserve the greenbelt and a discussion of other unique land use issues the Borough has faced in the last 20 years. Highlights will include access to a famous New Deal art mural by Ben Shahn in the school building that depicts the founding of the Borough

on three large panels as well as a discussion of one of the earliest experiments in ecologically aware affordable housing, the Roosevelt Senior Citizens' Housing, which set out to incorporate energy-efficiency within traditional designs.

SPEAKERS:

Gail L. Hunton is Supervising Historic Preservation Specialist with the Monmouth County Park System and maintains a consulting practice in historic preservation, specializing in work with municipalities and historic preservation commissions. Ms. Hunton is a founding Trustee of the Fund for Roosevelt, a land trust established to preserve Roosevelt's historic greenbelt, and served on the Planning Board for fifteen years.

Alan Mallach is a senior fellow of the National Housing Institute, a senior fellow at the Center for Community Progress, a non-resident senior fellow at the Metropolitan Policy Program of The Brookings Institution in Washington DC and a visiting scholar at the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia. He has been engaged in housing, planning, and community and economic development as a public and private sector practitioner, advocate and scholar for over forty years.
