





Bridelia exaltata - family: EUPHORBIACEAE

BRUSH IRONBARK

A medium sized rainforest tree +10 metres Small green-yellow flowers, sex segregated, in winter Fruit a yellow drupe maturing to red then black in autumn attracts birds

Cultivation: Verv hardv and fast growing; moderately aood conditions will improve growth rate.

Commonly seen in lower altitudes of and sub-tropical rainforests drier from Seal Rocks on the mid-north coast of NSW to Gympie in Qld the Brush Ironbark often appears as regrowth. Under good conditions it develops dense bushy foliage. The fruits, which ripen slowly in autumn, are especially bird-attracting and readily disappear from the canopy



immature brown ones taste nasty and astringent; the ripe black ones have an insipid but not unpleasant flavour of dates.

Good park tree attractive to birds. Has a tendency to sucker. Said to withstand the poisons of Camphor Laurels.
