Eddy Wajon "A Year in Hyden"



Eddy Wajon is well known for his series of West Australian wildflower guide books, and his February talk to our branch was based on his latest – A Year at Hyden: the Wildflowers of Hyden and Wave Rock. This commissioned work is available from various outlets in the Hyden area and is a great colour guide to common and not so common species. Eddy told us that the book covers a 50 km




radius from Hyden, an area largely cleared on the feralproof fence side but still with substantial areas of nature reserve and natural forest. Informative maps in the book also make a flora trip to the Hyden area that much easier.


Eddy took us on a photographic journey through a year in the Hyden region and it was quite amazing to see how many species were flowering in every month of the year and also to see a 'signature' photo for each month of a typical animal or landscape scene. So, in January/

February the Crested Dragon (*Ctenophorus cristatus*) heralded summer-flowering species, including the Dwarf Inland Bank-

sia (*Banksia audax*), a smallish shrub or tree with goldenorange to brown flowers and the White Mallee (*Eucalyptus phenax*), a small to large mallee with white flowers emerging from a round, conical cap on a cupshaped fruit. Both of these can be found at Dragon Rocks Nature Reserve, south-east of Hyden township.



smallish shrub with deep magenta to purple starshaped flowers with a yellow centre, found in March just east of Hyden on Duck Rock Road. In April, the Tangled Daisy Bush (*Olearia incondi*ta), a white flower, 25-35mm across with a yellow centre surrounded by purplish woolly scales, grows through other plants at Hippo's Yawn and Wave Rock. From May and through Winter, the



flower (*Isopogon pruinosus*), a tall shrub with blue 'icy frosty' leaves, produces pink or white tubular flowers with a tuft

of hairs at the top.

The blue and yellow Mitchell's Diurnal Cockroach pointed to the profusion of Winter flowers in June, July and August. Blue Boronia (*Boronia coerulescens*) first flowers in June, then right through to the end of Spring. A small shrub with rigid, wiry stems and white to pale








blue or pink flowers, this is one of many long-flowering species. The very common Matchsticks (*Drummondita hassellii*), a small shrub with tubular, hairy, red, white and yellow flowers, also flowers across a wide range of the Eastern Wheatbelt from July into late Spring.

So, the year, and this small summary of the flora Eddy showed us, ended in December with another banksia — Swordfish Banksia (*Banksia elderiana*) — a small tree with prickly, sawtoothed leaves and a typical yellow banksia flower on a nodding, cylindrical head.
