60-DAY NOTICE OF INTENT TO SUE DUPONT CHEMICAL COMPANY UNDER HEALTH & SAFETY CODE SECTION 25249.6

Consumer Advocacy Group, Inc. hereby notifies **DuPont Chemical Company** (hereinafter referred to as "Violator") that it has violated the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act (Health & Saf. Code, § 25249.6 et seq.) (hereinafter referred to as "Proposition 65").

Consumer Product Exposures

While in the course of doing business each and every day between May 16, 1999, and May 16, 2003, Violator violated Proposition 65 by exposing its customers and other foreseeable users to Tetrafluoroethylene (TFE) without providing clear and reasonable warnings of the exposure as required by Proposition 65. TFE is released when Violator's **Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-coated cookware** are heated to high temperatures, which occurs when such products are used by consumers. TFE is designated by the State of California under California Code of Regulations, title 22, section 12306 to cause cancer (hereinafter referred to as "§12306"). Violator failed to provide clear and reasonable warnings of such so that persons would know that if they used **Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-coated cookware** in normal usage of the products, they may be exposed to the carcinogen.

A "Consumer Product Exposure" is an exposure that results from a person's acquisition, purchase, storage, consumption, or other reasonably foreseeable use and/or misuse of a consumer good. **Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-**

coated cookware are consumer products that release TFE, which is designated under §12306 to cause cancer. The reasonably foreseeable use and/or misuse of Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-coated cookware will result in exposure to TFE through inhalation. When Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-coated cookware are used in the normal course of cooking, these products come in contact with a heat source, whether on the stovetop, in the oven, on the grill, on an open flame, or any other heat source. During the normal course of cooking, Teflon-coated pots, pans, and any and all other Teflon-coated cookware may be heated to temperatures high enough to release TFE into the ambient air. When this occurs, persons will naturally inhale TFE particles, thus exposing persons to the carcinogen.

Proposition 65 requires that a notice of violation and intent to sue be given to the Violator 60 days before commencing a private enforcement lawsuit pursuant to Health & Safety Code section 25249.6, subsection (d). With this letter, Consumer Advocacy Group, Inc. gives notice of the alleged violations to Violator, the Attorney General, and the District Attorney and City Attorney of cities with populations of over 750,000, in each county and city where violations are alleged to have occurred. A Certificate of Merit has been provided to the Office of the Attorney General along with a copy of this notice.

Along with this notice, a copy of *The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65): A Summary* has been sent to Violator.

Should DuPont reformulate *Teflon*, such that no carcinogens will be emitted during consumers' use of *Teflon-coated pots*, pans, and any and all other *Teflon-coated cookware*, then Consumer Advocacy Group, Inc. will agree to forego all forms of monetary recovery, including attorney's fees and costs, for prosecution of this violation.

THE SAFE DRINKING WATER AND TOXIC ENFORCEMENT ACTION 1986 (PROPOSITION 65): A SUMMARY

The following summary has been prepared by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, the lead agency for the implementation of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (commonly known as "Proposition 65"). A copy of this summary must be included as an attachment to any notice of violation served upon an alleged violator of the Act. The summary provides basic information about the provisions of the law, and is intended to serve only as a convenient source of general information. It is not intended to provide authoritative guidance on the meaning or application of the law. The reader is directed to the statute and its implementing regulations(see citations below) for further information.

Proposition 65 appears in California law as Health and Safety Code Sections 25249.5 through 25249.13. Regulations that provide more specific guidance on compliance, and that specify procedures to be followed by the State in carrying out certain aspects of the law, are found in Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations, Sections 12000 through 14000.

WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 65 REQUIRE?

The "Governor's List." Proposition 65 requires the Governor to publish a list of chemicals that are known to the State of California to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list must be updated at least once a year. Over 550 chemicals have been listed as of May 1, 1996. Only those chemicals that are on the list are regulated under this law. Businesses that produce, use, release, or otherwise engage in activities involving those chemicals must comply with the following:

Clear and Reasonable Warnings. A business is required to warn a person before "knowingly and intentionally" exposing that person to a listed chemical. The warning given must be "clear and reasonable." This means that the warning must(f) clearly make known that the chemical involved is known to cause cancer, or birth defects or other reproductive harm; and (2) be given in such a way that it will effectively reach the person before he or she is exposed. Exposures are exempt from the warning requirement if they occur less than twelve months after the date of listing of the chemical.

Prohibition from discharges into drinking water. A business must not knowingly discharge or release a listed chemical into water or onto land where it passes or probably will pass into a source of drinking water. Discharges are exempt from this requirement if they occur less than twenty months after the date of listing of the chemical.

DOES PROPOSITION 65 PROVIDE ANY EXEMPTIONS?

Yes. The law exempts:

Governmental agencies and public water utilities. All agencies of the federal, State or local government, as well as entities operating public water systems, are exempt.

Businesses with nine or fewer employees. Neither the warning requirement nor the discharge prohibition applies to a business that employs a total of nine or fewer employees.

Exposures that pose no significant risk of cancer. For chemicals that are listed as known to the State to cause cancer ("carcinogens"), a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure occurs at a level that poses "no significant risk." This means that the exposure is calculated to result in not more than one excess case of cancer in 100,000 individuals

exposed over a 70-year lifetime. The Proposition 65 regulations identify specific "no significant risk" levels for more than 250 listed carcinogens.

Exposures that will produce no observable reproductive effect at 1,000 times the level in question. For chemicals known to the State to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm ("reproductive toxicants"), a warning is not required if the business can demonstrate that the exposure will produce no observable effect, even at 1,000 times the level in question. In other words, the level of exposure must be below the "no observable effect level (NOEL)," divided by a 1,000-fold safety or uncertainty factor. The "no observable effect level" is the highest dose level which has not been associated with an observable adverse reproductive or developmental effect.

Discharge that do not result in a "significant amount" of the listed chemical entering into any source of drinking water. The prohibition from discharges into drinking water does not apply If the discharger is able to demonstrate that a "significant amount" of the list chemical has not, does not, or will not enter any drinking water source, and that the discharge complies with all other applicable laws, regulations, permits, requirements, or orders. A "significant amount" means any detectable amount, except an amount that would meet the "no significant risk" or "no observable effect" test if an individual were exposed to such an amount in drinking water.

HOW IS PROPOSITION 65 ENFORCED?

Enforcement is carried out through civil lawsuits. These lawsuits may be brought by the Attorney General, any district attorney, or certain city attorneys (those in cities with a population exceeding 750,000). Lawsuits may also be brought by private parties acting in the public interest, but only after providing notice of the alleged violation to the Attorney General, the appropriate district attorney and city attorney, and the business accused of the violation. The notice must provide adequate information to allow the recipient to assess the nature of the alleged violation. A notice must comply with the information and procedural requirements specified in regulations (Title 22, California Code of Regulations, Section 12903). A private party may not pursue an enforcement action directly under Proposition 65 if one of the governmental officials noted above initiates an action within sixty days of the notice.

A business found to be in violation of Proposition 65 is subject to civil penalties of up to \$2,500 per day for each violation. In addition, the business may be ordered by a court of law to stop committing the violation.

§14000. Chemicals Required by State or Federal Law to Have been Tested for Potential to Cause Cancer or Reproductive Toxicity, but Which Have Not Been Adequately Tested As Required.

(a) The Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 requires the Governor to publish a list of chemicals formally required by state or federal agencies to have testing for carcinogenicity or reproductive toxicity, but that the state's qualified experts have not found to have been adequately tested as required [Health and Safety Code 25249.8)c)].

Readers should note a chemical that already has been designated as known to the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity is not included in the following listing as requiring additional testing for that particular toxicological endpoint. However, the "data gap" may continue to exist, for purposes of the state or federal agency's requirements. Additional information on the requirements for testing may be obtained from the specific agency identified below.

(b) Chemicals required to be tested by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation.

The Birth Defect Prevention Act of 1984(SB 950) mandates that the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (CDPR) review chronic toxicology studies supporting the registration of pesticidal active ingredients

The copy of this Certificate of Merit served on the Attorney General attaches to it factual information sufficient to establish the basis for this certificate, including the information identified in Health and Safety Code section 25249.7(h)(2), i.e., (1) the identity of the persons consulted with and relied on by the certifier, and (2) the facts, studies, or other data reviewed by those persons.
