## The Plants:

Unless otherwise stated, we supply well rooted cuttings. Plants in 9cm pots also occasionally available and can be specially ordered, please enquire. We aim to maintain stock levels and supply throughout most of the year but plants may have to be propagated to order. If this is the case most cultivars are available within four weeks. Plants in 9cm pots will take around six weeks and be ready from late April onwards.

Most of our plants are treated with a friendly mycorrhizal fungi root growth promoter, we find this very beneficial. The plants establish much quicker, are healthier, more vigorous and flower better with this treatment.

**Hardiness: (The RHS will introduce a new rating system, replacing this one, in 2013.)**

**H1** Plants that must be given winter protection if they are to survive, minimum temperature of 7°C. Triphylla's are particularly demanding in this respect, being very frost shy.

**H2** Plants that are frost shy but should survive a normal winter in an unheated greenhouse, with additional fleece protection. Can be described as Half-Hardy.

**H3** Once planted & properly established, plants in the ground should survive normal winter weather with no need to lift or protect. (Plants left outside in pots or containers are unlikely to survive any winter.) Top growth will die back but new growth will be made in the spring. Mulch in first winter (or every winter in particularly cold areas.) Don't prune back last year's dead growth until April, as the twigs help to protect the crown of the plant from cold.

### **Bland's New Striped**

Flower: Single  
 Tube: Amaranth red  
 Sepals: Amaranth, recurved, curly  
 Corolla: Bold purple with streaks of raspberry down the petals. ½ flared  
 Habit: Upright bush, self branching  
 Superb plant (J Bland, UK, 1872)



### **Blue Sleigh Bells**

Flower: Single med/large  
 Tube: White  
 Sepals: Bright white with green tips  
 Corolla: Lavender blue, white base  
 Habit: Upright bush.  
 Gorgeous, one of the very best blues (Barton, NZ, 1970)

### **Border Raider**

Flower: Single  
 Tube: Pink, short  
 Sepals: Pink, held ½ up & recurved  
 Corolla: White, ¼ flared  
 Habit: Bush  
 Popular exhibition cultivar, superb in containers (J Gordon, UK, 2001)

 Habit: Bush. Vigorous grower.

 Tube: Red, darker stripes, slender  
 Sepals: Red-violet, green tips.

 Sepals: Salmon pink, pale green tip  
 Corolla: Salmon orange  
 Habit: Bush, grows well, easy.  
 Elegant free flowering fuchsia (Laing, UK, 1878)

 Tube: White with faint pink blush  
 Sepals: White with faint pink blush  
 Corolla: Deep rose pink fading lighter towards base of petals

**Other Fellow Tip**  
**Overwatering your fuchsias is easy to do and understandable, but it is far better to risk under watering your plant. A plant wilted from lack of water recovers much quicker than one wilted through overwatering. Water carefully, damp rather than wet compost should be your aim.**

 Foliage: Narrowish dark green leaves which can be quite large - between 2in and 4in (5cm to 10cm)  
 Habit: Upright shrub-like bush, has been known to reach 3m in height. Flowers sparingly at the terminals, worth waiting for. Produces bright orange berries, can be epiphytic in the wild. 'Daryn John Woods' has this as a parent H1 (Kuntze, BO, 1898)



### **Lechlade Martianess**

Flower: Single. Tube: Pale orange  
 Sepals: Short, green. Corolla: Pale orange. Petals edged buttery cream inside. Habit: Vigorous lax bush, big plant, flowers freely H2 (JA & JO Wright, UK, 1985) (F.fulgens x F.splendens) x F.splendens

### **F. loxensis**

Flower: Single. Tube: Deep pink  
 Sepals: Deep pink with green tips  
 Corolla: Orange  
 Foliage: Mid green  
 Habit: Upright bush H1 (Humboldt, Bonpland & Kunth, EC, 1823)



### **F. lycioides**

Flower: Single. Tube: Smoky pink. Sepals: Pink with green tips  
 Corolla: Red purple. Foliage: Long matt green leaves. Habit: Stiff upright  
 F. lycioides grows on the edge of the Atacama Desert and is limited to a narrow coastal strip in central Chile, a rather hostile environment with only moderate winter rainfall and long dry summers. Mature specimens are drought tolerant due to the tuberous roots and this fuchsia should not be overwatered especially during winter H1 (Andrews, CL, 1800)



### **F. magellanica var. gracilis**

Flower: Single. Tube: Scarlet red  
 Sepals: Scarlet red, held ¾ down  
 Corolla: Purple. Habit: Upright bush. Slender, smallish flowers in profusion, strong wiry stems, very vigorous plant H3 RHS AGM (Unknown)

### **F. mag. var gracilis 'Aurea'**

Flower: Single. Tube: Scarlet  
 Sepals: Scarlet. Corolla: Purple  
 Foliage: Golden yellow leaves with red midrib on rich red stems  
 Habit: Bush, performs well in shade. Leaves can burn in direct sun H3 RHS AGM (Unknown)



### **F. magellanica 'Versicolor'**

Flower: Single. Tube: Scarlet red  
 Sepals: Scarlet red, held ¾ down  
 Corolla: Purple. Foliage: Grey-green, young shoots rose tinted, creamy-white variegation. Habit: Upright bush, strong wiry stems H3 RHS AGM (Unknown)

### **Nuance**

Flower: Single. Tube: Purple red  
 Sepals: Rich purple red, green tips  
 Corolla: Dark red-violet  
 Habit: Strong growing self branching bush. Flowers carried at the end of the stems H2 (de Graaf, NL, 2001)



### **F. procumbens**

Flower: Single, small. Tube: Green, yellow and red. Sepals: Green with purple tips. Corolla: None  
 Flowers are tiny, upward looking with bright blue pollen  
 Habit: Creeping trailer H2/H3 (Cunningham, NZ, 1834)

### **F. procumbens 'Wirral'**

Flower: Single, small.  
 Tube: Yellow & red  
 Sepals: Green, short, purple tipped  
 Corolla: None. Foliage: Variegated green pink & cream. Habit: Creeping trailer, flowers have blue pollen H2/H3 (Breary, UK, 1996)



### **F. regia ssp. serrae**

Flower: Single. Tube: Bold red  
 Sepals: Bold red. Corolla: Purple  
 Habit: Upright bush  
 Considered the most free-flowering of the F. regia subspecies. Very vigorous - can get to be a large bush H3 (BR)

### **Shuna Lindsay**

Flower: Single. Tube: Vermillion  
 Sepals: Pink to white to green tips.  
 Corolla: Orange, pink at the base  
 Habit: Stiff upright bush, does better in large pots or planted. Bright flowers, red veined dark foliage H2 (James Travis, UK, 1980)

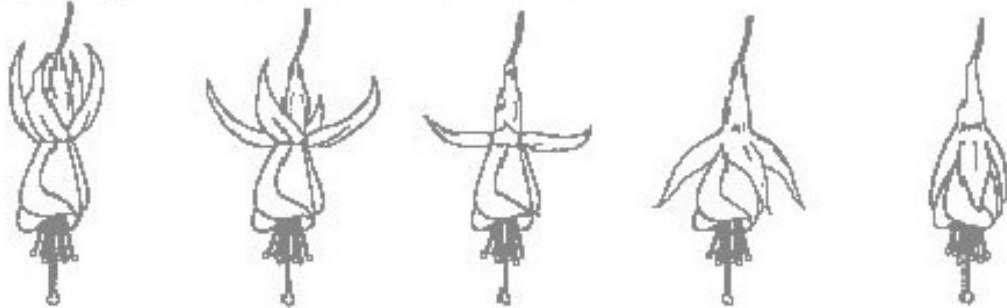
**F. splendens**

 Wide distribution in the wild, has been seen (rarely) growing as an epiphyte. (Zuccarini, MX, 1832)

**Other Fellow Tip**  
 All species and cultivars of Fuchsia are designated as "bee-friendly" by the RHS. Moths and other pollinating insects like the flowers too. You may find a huge elephant hawkmoth caterpillar eating the leaves. These look fierce (with false "eyes" and a "trunk") but are quite harmless. We move them to large hardy plants.

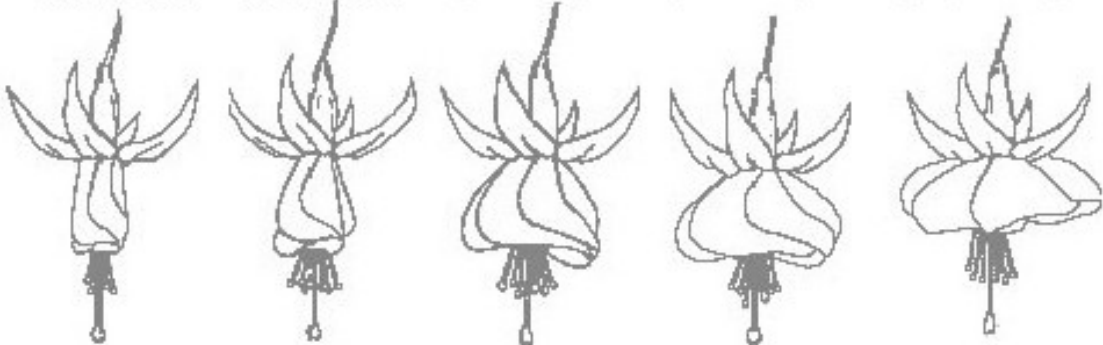

## Salvias

### Salvia 'Black Knight'



Beautiful purple/black tinted foliage and bright purple flowers emerging from deep aubergine purple calyxes. Flowers late summer right through until frosted. Real presence at 5ft to 7ft (150cm to 210cm) tall. This is a tender perennial - it won't survive a winter outside. Protect from frost or take cuttings.

### Salvia cacaliifolia



Tender herbaceous/sub-shrubby herbaceous perennial with 1in (2.5cm) hooded flowers of a rich deep blue on branching spikes, on a graceful, spreading plant. The dentate, slightly lobed leaves are unusual for a salvia, and decorative in their own right. Grows to 3ft (90cm) tall. RHS AGM

### Salvia confertiflora



Tall, shrub-like, tender perennial that flowers best in second or third year. Many tall spires, each with dozens of small flowers, individually modest, impressive en masse. Purplish brown calyx, big, oddly aromatic dark green leaves. The flowers are orangey red. Up to 5ft or 6ft (150cm or 180cm) tall.

### Salvia curviflora



Dark buds producing velvety hot magenta pink flowers throughout spring and summer and well into the autumn. Upright in habit, keeps a good shape overall. Originally from Mexico, a tender perennial - make sure you take cuttings in the autumn. Up to 4ft (120cm) height and spread.

### Salvia darcyi



Flamboyant half hardy herbaceous perennial with soft, sticky, downy leaves and large flowers of a bright red (RHS 43A). Fragrant foliage, good upright habit which keeps its shape with a little support. May survive mild winters outdoors, mulch well and protect new shoots from slugs. Up to 4ft (120cm) tall.

### Salvia elegans



The Pineapple Sage. A quick-growing tender perennial, producing a long succession of intense, rich red flowers starting fairly late in summer until killed by frost - sadly not hardy. Deliciously scented foliage, it really does smell of pineapple. A native of Mexico, where it is also used medicinally. Up to 3ft (90cm) tall.

### Salvia gesneriiflora



Tall, at least 5ft (150cm). Flamboyant tender shrub with flower spikes up to 20in (50cm) long liberally adorned with vivid reddish (RHS 43A) flowers in a glossy aubergine black calyx. Won't start flowering until late in the year. Best grown in a container and flowered in a frost-free conservatory/cool greenhouse.

### Other Fellow Tip

Salvias come from hot places (e.g. Mexico), but hardier types from mountainous areas survive lower temperatures in dry, rocky soil, with an occasional "dry" snow blanket. British weather is different! Wood not fully ripened, (lack of summer sun) is more prone to cold damage. Frozen wet soil damages roots, wet, slushy snow comes and goes. To help them feel at home & survive, give your plants a sunny spot, well-drained soil & protect from wind. And ideally, use a south facing house wall to act as a 'storage heater'.

### Salvia haenkii 'Prawn Chorus'



Slim brightly coloured flowers produced from late spring until late autumn. Intense coral red flowers and narrow, pale green leaves. Likes good drainage and sunshine. Upright, tender sub shrub, up to about 18in (45cm) tall, growth has a fairly spreading habit.

### Salvia 'Indigo Spires'



Many dark stems bearing long, gracefully curving flower spikes covered in stunning vividly intense indigo blue flowers. Another tall, tender salvia, it grows to about 40in (102cm) in good conditions and looks fabulous in late borders RHS AGM.

Salvias

**Salvia involucrata 'Bethellii'**



Sub shrubby, half-hardy (to -10°C) perennial bearing spikes of bold crimson-purple flowers from late summer until late autumn or first frost. Like many taller salvias, avoid windy sites due to brittle stems. Hairy, rich mid green leaves with a velvety feel. Up to about 5ft (150cm) tall. RHS AGM.

**Salvia x jamensis 'Hot Lips'**



The cherry red 'lips' appear most reliably and vividly during or after hot weather. Can produce all white, or all red blooms. A shrubby perennial with small leaves. Loves sun, reasonably drought tolerant. Fairly hardy, should survive most winters outdoors. Height up to 2ft (60cm), spread to 4ft (120cm)

**Salvia greggii 'La Luna'**



A beautiful small shrubby perennial with small glossy leaves and a long succession of clusters of palest creamy yellow flowers ("hood" bit tinged with apricot) in summer and autumn. Fairly hardy, should survive most UK winters planted outdoors. Grows to about 20in (50cm) height & spread.

**Salvia 'La Siesta'**



Small shrubby perennial. Plenty of striking hot pink flowers from summer through autumn. Prefers free draining soils and sunny position. Winter dormant, tolerates dry soil when established. Half hardy to -10°C. Grows to 30in (75cm)

**Salvia leucantha**



A tender perennial shrub with downy velvet like flowers and flower stems. Leaves are silvery underneath and pale sage green on top. A beautiful misty effect is created by this amethyst flowered tender perennial, upright bushy plant. Grows to 3½ft (107cm) height and spread. RHS AGM.

**Salvia 'Los Lirios'**



A small shrubby perennial with small, ovate leaves and terminal racemes of deep dusky pink, two-lipped flowers in late summer and autumn. Hardy in most of the UK it prefers south facing or east facing situations, sheltered from severe elements. Likes full sun. RHS AGM.

**Salvia 'Trelawney'**



Another half-hardy shrubby perennial with long stems bearing terminal racemes of beautiful rose pink flowers with creamy white centres. Like all of this type, should survive most winters outdoors iif in a sunny, well-drained spot. Grows to about 20in (50cm) height and 18in (45cm) spread.

**Salvia 'Mulberry Jam'**



S. involucuta hybrid with fuzzy, hot pink flowers in large spikes. Dark pink calyx. Medium sized, glossy leaves on sturdy stems turning purplish as season cools. Blooms from early summer until frost.. Old plants shoot/start later, so renew from cuttings annually. Fairly tender sub-shrub to 4ft (120cm)

**Salvia patens**



Gentian Sage. Tender, tuberous sun-loving perennial. Tall spikes of large, dazzling electric blue flowers from summer until frosts. Up to 2ft (60cm) approx H and S. To over-winter outdoors, need well-drained soil, thick mulch, and sunny spot to keep frost from tubers. Stems snap off easily, avoid windy sites.

**Salvia patens 'Cambridge Blue'**



All details as for Salvia patens, except flower colour (beautiful pale blue) - and this form has AGM. (NB All forms of S. patens can be lifted and stored frost free to over-winter, like dahlias. Slugs love their new shoots. If not protected, slugs can do what winter could not, and kill the plant. RHS AGM

## Salvias

### **Salvia x sylvestris 'Blauhugel'**



Hardy, herbaceous, sun-loving perennial to 2ft (60cm) x 18in (45cm) H and S. Long-flowering (Jul to Sep) with spikes of small, clear lavender blue flowers. Dead-head often to prolong display. Bees like most salvias but really love this one. RHS AGM

### **S. splendens 'Jimi's Good Red'**



Spectacular spikes of intense red bracts, before and after the flower buds within them open in succession from the bottom of the spike. Even one gives a terrific display in a sunny position. Great plant with real impact and grace, so different from the unnaturally dwarfed, rigid, bedding forms. 3ft (90cm) H and S

### **Salvia greggii 'Stormy Pink'**



Fairly hardy, sprawling sub-shrubby perennial with clouds of cream-tinted pale pink flowers held in dark calyces over dark green foliage. Take cuttings in autumn, just in case. To 3ft (90cm) x 2ft (60cm) H and S. Found by renowned plantswoman Derry Watkins in her beautiful Cotswold garden.

### **Salvia verticillata 'Purple Rain'**



Hardy herbaceous perennial to 18in (45cm). Spreading stems with dense whorls of small purple flowers over soft, fairly large, sage green, luxuriant foliage. Not as dramatic as tender ones, still flowers all summer and autumn, a useful plant. Copes with some shade, but prefers sun, protect from slugs.

**All Salvias are intended for ornamental use only. Leaves and flowers of *S. elegans* are edible, but others may be poisonous.**

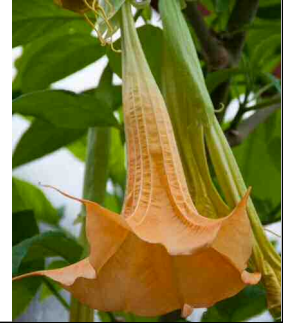

Amazing long rich pink flowers, each up to 20in (50cm) long  
 Highly Scented  
 4ft to 6ft (120cm to 180cm)  
 Hybrid of 'Pink Beauty' and 'Ecuador Pink'. A cubensis cultivar



**Brugmansia 'Morgensonne'**



Oodles of large yellow and orange single flowers (paler in cool weather), held facing outwards  
 Highly Scented  
 5ft to 6ft (150cm to 180cm)  
 Bright yellow tube blending to orange at the six pointed rim, ending in dark orange tendrils

**Brugmansia 'Painted Lady'**

Long, exquisite pink shaded single flowers  
 Highly Scented  
 4ft to 6ft (120cm to 180cm)  
 Flowers are a deep pink, almost red at the edges. Lavishly produced, beautifully shaped flowers



**Brugmansia sanguinea (Orange form)**



Can stand a slight frost and still flower, though best kept frost free  
 Not Scented  
 3ft to 5ft (90cm to 150cm)  
 This is an orange flowered version. Flowers are 10in to 13in (25cm to 33cm) long, and numerous

Unlike normal bedding lobelias, this one won't run out of steam half-way through summer. Keep dead-heading! No mish-mash of wishy-washy colours either, every plant produces the same clear bright blue flowers, RHS AGM. H1



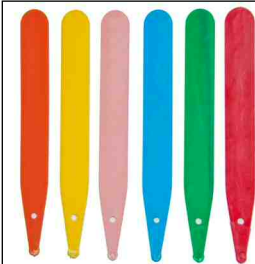
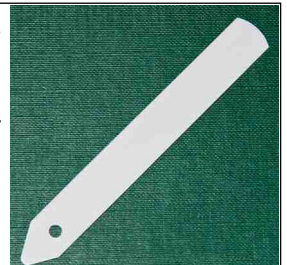
**Verbena bonariensis**  
Attracts butterflies and insects, yet rarely troubled by slugs. Its tall, slim shape fits in anywhere, best in groups (or drifts amongst other plants). Each tiny flower has a tinier orange eye. Up to 6ft (180cm) tall. Fairly hardy, RHS AGM. H2/H3
