A Message from Supervisor Kalkounos

Palatine Township is the Primary Source of Humanitarian Aid in Your Community



Many of our neighbors and school-aged kids struggle with food insecurity and daily needs. Your Township provides support through our client choice food pantry, shelter through general assistance and emergency assistance programs and transportation for our elderly and disabled. Our outreach programs provide Thanksgiving and Easter baskets, holiday gifts and school supplies. We recently expanded access to the on-site VetCenter and IL Department of Veterans' Affairs. Our Road District Department maintains infrastructure in the public right of way, such as paving, snow plowing and drainage for the unincorporated areas. We advocate for your residential property with appeals and exemptions at the Assessor's Office.

In addition to valuable in-house programs, Palatine Township supports dozens of not-for-profit agencies offering local residents assistance with senior services, mental health, day care, at-risk youth and poverty. Township government collects the lowest amount of taxes with the greatest impact in community, thanks to taxpayers, volunteers and donors.

For a third year in a row, our Township Board voted for a "0%" increase in the tax levy. We are excited to expand services like never before, while remaining fiscally responsible and exploring efficiencies in our government. As Township Supervisor and with the support of the Township Board, the decision was made to consolidate bank accounts and swiftly take advantage of high-yield interest rates greatly benefiting the people's Treasury. Moving funds to local community banks resulted in over \$189,000 of interest income. Equally significant is the ease of use and understanding of our financial ecosystem. Transparency is important for both auditors and the public.

Good news from down state! At the Annual Township Officials of IL Conference, we won "Best Innovative Program" for a pilot-program, "Donors Empowering Area Residents" (D.E.A.R.). It was created during rising inflation to help qualified residents receive a \$25 gift card at their food pantry visit to purchase necessities at local grocers and fuel stations. Over \$76,000 in gift card assistance was carefully dispersed, entirely funded by donations to the Needy Family Fund, 501c3. No tax dollars were used for this. On behalf of the staff and recipients, I would like to extend our thanks to the community for their generosity. *We are very fortunate to have a strong township team who creatively responds with timely solutions making a real impact in people's lives*. It's gratifying public-service work.

We extend an invitation for each and every one of you to join us at the Annual Town Meeting April 9, 2024. Historically, this meeting reflects the most fundamental type of government. This is a good time to meet your local officials over a cup of coffee, so please come on out. "Think Globally, Act Locally" (René Jules Dubos).



Palatine Township continues to schedule in-person and remote appointments for the Low Income Home Energy Services Assistance Program (LIHEAP) for income-eligible households. If you haven't already applied, the deadline to apply is August 15, 2024, unless funds exhaust sooner.

LIHEAP provides assistance to income eligible households with energy services during the winter months. To help alleviate a household's energy costs, a one-time payment, DVP (Direct Vendor Payment), is made directly to the utility company for one or both of the household's energy bills for heating and electric. The payment amount is determined by income, household size and fuel type.

Please call the General Assistance office at 847-358-6110 to inquire about eligibility, the specific list of documents needed to apply and to schedule your LIHEAP appointment.

TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT SENIOR & DISABLED RESIDENTS



If you qualify for Illinois' Benefit Access Program, you are eligible for free bus rides within the Township. Documentation must be provided to qualify for this state program. (Benefit Access does not apply to the T.R.I.P. bus service).

Palatine Township's transportation service is for all senior residents, ages 60 years and older and permanently disabled residents, ages 18 and older. Our bus service provides reliable, lift-equipped, curb-to-curb transport to appointments or errands anywhere in the Palatine Township, plus medical appointments in Arlington Heights. This service is available Monday through Friday.

TOWNSHIP RIDERS INITIATIVE PROGRAM (T.R.I.P.) BUS SERVICE

For eligible residents needing transportation to medical appointments outside of Palatine Township, the cost is \$5.00 or \$10.00 each way, depending on how far you are traveling. T.R.I.P. is available Monday through Saturday.

Transportation for preregistered T.R.I.P. clients travels within the seven surrounding townships plus the following locations: Glenbrook Hospital, Stroger Cook County, Hines VA, North Chicago VA, University of Illinois, Rush Medical Center and Loyola Hospital Northwestern Memorial Hospital.

FROM THE DESK OF COMMISSIONER DEL MAR

Your governmental services are paid through property taxes which are levied on your annual property tax statement from the Cook County Assessor's Office. As Highway Commissioner of Palatine Township, we once again reduced our levy, your tax obligation. By



State Statute, our 2023 Tax Levy is further split, as we receive approximately half the amount. The other half is distributed to local municipalities to fund additional road improvement and maintenance programs. Such programs include patching, crack sealing, resurfacing and complete restoration of neighborhood roadways. Also included are capital costs for new equipment, vehicles and facilities to maintain these roadways.



Our 2025 Fiscal Year Operating Budget was approved earlier this year and operates from April 1, 2024, through March 31, 2025. This operating budget is funded by the 2023 Tax Levy and is a separate ordinance. Each year is completely different from the year's past

as we account for the annual and multiyear equipment, building and infrastructure maintenance and replacement costs. Like most everyone, we continue to plan for a third year of higher inflation, ongoing supply chain shortages and energy increases. This year we plan to finish roadway improvements along the Hillside Road corridor and within the Thunderbird Estates Subdivision. Compromised concrete curb and gutter will be removed and replaced, roadways will be milled, patched and resurfaced.

Our continued services that have been scheduled this year include the Tire Amnesty Program, yard waste collection and free compost stockpiles. Early each spring, on selected Saturdays, anyone living in Palatine Township can drop off their used tires free of charge at our garage. If you are a resident of Palatine Township, stop by and unload your old tires at the Road District Garage, located at: 530 N. Smith Street, Palatine. Bookending Earth Day, the tire amnesty program will be held from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm, Saturday April 20, 2024, and Saturday April

27, 2024. We will begin our annual yard waste collection for the unincorporated areas on April 1, 2024, and will continue through Thanksgiving week, November 20, 2024. After collecting the waste, we process the material by grinding it, turning it and letting it age for a year as it breaks down into compost. We offer free compost for anyone to pick-up at the Road District Garage and Town Hall locations. Please call for availability, as this material is quickly consumed.

Strong spring storms seem to appear without much warning and usually leave a path of debris. Our road crews are dispatched immediately to ensure that any obstructed roadways have been cleared. If damage is extensive, we can focus on collecting storm damage from private properties. Please call to schedule a pickup. This will occur only through the following week or two weeks and we will only collect storm damage if the debris has been placed with branch or cut side facing the edge of the street. By doing so, they will be manageable for disposal, and we will be able to assist your neighbors more effectively and efficiently.

Thank you for your continued support and consideration. We will continue to ensure that Palatine Township Road District will be available for all your infrastructure concerns and strive to meet your expectations. ASSESSOR'S OFFICE TIME TO FILE EXEMPTIONS

Property tax exemption forms are now becoming available from Cook County. The first forms available are the Senior Citizen Exemption and the Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze. Other exemption forms will be available in the near future. To save yourself a trip, call our office at 847-358-6164 to find out which forms are currently available.

If you have lived in your home since January 1 of the current calendar year or you purchased your home in 2022, you will already have the Homeowner Exemption. If you purchased your home in 2022, you will also receive the 2022 Exemptions Booklet from Cook County. That booklet will contain all the forms you need to file any exemption.

The exemptions we receive the most inquiries about are the Senior Citizen Exemption and the Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze. The Senior Citizen Exemption applies to anyone 65 years old or older, occupies his or her residence and is the owner of record. The Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze exemption has the same requirements as the Senior Citizen Exemption and your household cannot earn more than \$65,000.00 a year. You can learn more about the different exemptions on our website under the Assessor tab or on our YouTube channel Palatine Township Assessor. If you are disabled, you may qualify for the Persons with Disabilities or Veterans with Disabilities exemptions. If you are a vet returning from an armed conflict, there is the Returning Veterans exemption and if your home was destroyed by some catastrophic event, there is the Home Improvement exemption.

In addition to exemptions, we can also help file a variance, Certificate of Error, name change, occupancy and appeals.

PALATINE TOWNSHIP HISTORIC CEMETERIES

Palatine Township maintains five historic cemeteries within its borders: Hillside, Cady, Sutherland, Wolfrum and Salem. The Township is responsible for their general care and maintenance. In 2023, Palatine Township focused on improving the cemetery maintenance and bringing all five historic cemeteries to optimal standards using best practices. All cemeteries had weeds removed, the grounds leveled and trees were trimmed. The historic cemeteries continue to be respectfully cared for and treated as sacred places.

Palatine Township contracted with a professional cemetery restoration company to clean and reset 690 headstones and straightened monuments in preparation for the Palatine Historical Society 30th Annual Cemetery Walk.

HILLSIDE CEMETERY WALK

The 30th Annual Cemetery Walk was held at Hillside Cemetery on September 17, 2023. Visitors enjoyed guided tours of the cemetery as actors played the roles of Palatine residents from our village's past. This year Cherri Wood Brown, the great-great-granddaughter of Joel Wood, attended the Cemetery Walk. Joel Wood was not only the first of the many sub dividers responsible for shaping Palatine Township, but he was also largely responsible for the village being located where it is and for its early development.



The very generous donation of land by Joel Wood for cemetery use, eventually becoming Hillside Cemetery, created a beautiful family legacy and a legacy for Palatine.
