This letter is public comment on R 12-11 (Rulemaking-Procedural)

Specifically the lack of public notice requirements on request to exceed agronomic rates.

In a recent request AS 12-2 (Terrona Farms) in the "order of the board" under "certificate of publication"it states; "Section 28.1(d)(1) of the environmental protection act (415 ILCS 5/28.1 (2010) and section 104.408(a) of the board's procedural rules (35 III. Adm. Code 104.408(a)) require the adjusted standard petitioner to publish a notice of filing of the petition by advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation in the area likely to be affected by the proposed adjusted standard. Publication must take place within 14 days after the petition is filed. See 415 ILCS."


On something like an annual application of 12" of rotting landscape waste on 80 acer's that will stink for miles whatever way the wind blows. Leachate run off in all waterways, ground water contamination, lower property values, truck traffic, litter and nuisance.

This is not much public notice for effected residence and property owners to have there voice heard prior to ruling, here is why. First off what if you don't read any newspaper let alone all the newspapers, and with phrases such as "likely to be affected" this is non specific language. Look at the example (next page) this small ad buried in the classified met the law in April of 1991 for composting permits "general circulation newspaper" despite the fact this paper is from a town 20 miles away from the site; The Daily Journal of Kankakee, even though there is a well circular paper 1 1/2 miles away "The Peotone Vedette".

This was an attempt to meet the law with minimum publicity leaving affected residents and property owners in the dark.

The time requirement does not leave much time for the community's to respond to an application if need be. Example: You received AS12-2 on 9/9/2011 and issued an order on 10/20/11 that's 41 days, subtract 14 days after petitions filing this only leaves 27 days. In the village of peotone for example, they have a meeting of the whole last Monday of month. All village officials are present and they accept public comment from the general public at that time, this is approx every 30 days. More time is needed to request and attend a hearing if necessary. Residence and effected property owners should have ample time to voice there concerns, especially on something that can drastically affect quality of life for miles away. Rock solid notification should be adopted. The enclosed petition

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

In 1990-91 our local community had a real problem with Robert DiCola/IL native nursery. Which is still owned by Dicola run by his manager Jim Kerwin now called Terrona Farms. Back then Robert DiCola was running a so called farming/composting operation under the farmer exception. This resulted in the new laws being created. House bill 2250 became effective 11-17-91 establishment of "Agronomic Rates" 20 tons per acre per year, composting on no more than 2% of total acreage and incorporated into soil within 18 months. (Enclosed is a copy of the original bill pages 8 and 9 of H B 2250 lines 320,337,355,356 and 357.)

The notification laws for composting were also tighten as follows: (Senate Bill 1702) became effective after December 31, 1990 which requires an applicant has given notice thereof (1) in person or by mail to the members of the General Assembly from the legislative district in which the proposed facility is to be located, (2) by registered or certified mail to the owners of all real property located within 250 feet of the site of the proposed facility (determined as provided in subsection (b) of section 39.2 of Act). And (3) to the general public by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the proposed facility is to be located. Unfortunately they did not foresee exceeding agronomic rates a problem. Now you have the very same person/organization that was a large part of the reason the law on agronomic rates was enacted, asking that the agronomic rate laws not apply to him and his organization.

Please look through all the documentation enclosed, including a court order (91 CH 4099) stating that "the defendant (Robert DiCola) will accept no further landscape waste on the peotone site unless issued a permit by the IL EPA". Please read the 1990, 91 and 92 Peotone Vedette articles and you will see the communities concerns on this subject.

On Terrona Farms last application AS 12-2 Sept. 9th 2011 many of us if not all were not informed of the application until after the board made a decision on 10/20/11. Thankfully the board denied the application.

Make no mistake this is about collecting dumping fees not organic farming. The going rate on 100 yard trucks, (which also hauls garbage and god only knows what else.) Is approximately \$200.00.

1000 trucks x \$200.00 = \$200,000.00 this is the motivation to exceed agronomic rates.

This is why these citizens signed the following petition. The majority of signatures are property owners within 1 ½ miles of Terrona Farms which is owned by Robert DiCola who formally called it Illinois native nursery.

The citizens here do not want to relive the nightmare of 20 years ago.

Please enact a rule that requires certified or registered mail to the owners of all real property located within 250 feet of the boundary's of the proposed site and the 10 nearest residences within 1 ½ miles of the boundary's of the proposed site.



ORDER

This matter coming on for hearing, the **PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS** present by its Attorney, **EDWARD A. BURMILA**, JR., through his Assistants, Barbara J. Smiles and Thomas M. Sealy and the Defendant, **ROBERT DiCOLA**, present in person and through his Attorney, Louis P. Yangas and the parties having reached an agreement as to disposition of all the issues in these proceedings agree that Counts I, II and III of Plaintiff's Complaint for Injunction and Other Relief are dismissed with prejudice and without leave to reinstate and with reference to Count IV the Defendant acknowledges that the conduct by him of a landscape waste composting operation is a public nuisance causing offensive smells emanating therefrom.

Now, therefore, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED as to the disposition of Count IV, that the Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, cause to be incorporated within the soil on the premises where the landscape waste is located, the landscape waste existing thereon, to incorporate said landscape waste to a depth of approximately 8 inches in the soil, which incorporation shall be completed on or before May 1, 1992. It is agreed between the parties that the Defendant will accept no further landscape waste on the Peotone site unless issued a permit by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to compost landscape waste. The parties further agree that the Defendant waive all his appeal rights to this Order.

It is also ordered that no costs be assessed to any of the parities. It is further order that this Court retains jurisdiction over the cause to ensure compliance with this Order.

This will acknowledge receipt of your Application for Permit to develop and operate a landscape waste compost facility, dated October 6, 1990, and received by this Agency on October 11, 1990.

Your permit application to develop and operate a composting facility for landscape waste is denied.

You have failed to provide proof that granting this permit would not result in violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act. Section 39(a) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 111 1/2, par. 1039(a)) requires the Agency to provide the applicant with specific reasons for the denial of permit. The following reason(s) are given:

- The applicant has indicated on application form LPC-PA12 that this is a 1. proposed operation. Will County inspection records indicate that this is incorrect because the site has received and is receiving landscape waste. Please provide information on previous receipt of landscape waste at this site, the amount received, the date of such operations, the type of waste received, the ultimate disposal of any material received, the location of any land application areas, the rate of land application, any testing conducted to determine an agronomic rate; and the specific location of such activities. (Section 21r of the Environmental Protection Act (Act))
- 2. On page four of the applicants submittal a well is described as being located 30 feet in front of the house which according to the drawing is South of the house. On the scaled survey map submitted, a well is located North of the house. Please explain this discrepancy. (Section 39m of the Act)
- Please identify the occupant of the residence on site and any rental or 3. lease agreements with the occupant. (Section 39m of the Act)

- The applicant has failed to indicate on a scaled map the exact location of 4 the proposed composting facility relative to property boundaries, the residence on site and components of the composting facility including the concrete pad, the pond, the vegetative filter, the chipper location, and the staging area for incoming waste. (Section 39m of the Act)
- The applicant has failed to provide a description of the field tile 5. drainage system under the proposed composting site including a depth profile drawing of the tile, the collection tank and connecting piping to the excess water pond. (Section 39m of the Act)
- Excess stormwater runoff from the composting site is proposed to be used 6. to irrigate nursery stock. The applicant has failed to identify the existing land use on the 80 acre farm surrounding the proposed composting site. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 7. The applicant has failed to provide sufficient information on the vegetative filter including its size, slope and whether the filter is existing or proposed. (Section 39m of the Act)
- The applicant has failed to indicate the existing slope of the proposed 8. composting site and whether any grading will be necessary to augment drainage of surface water to the vegetative filter. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 9. The applicants description of proposed operations is incomplete (35 Ill. Adm. Code 807.207). Please provide an expanded discussion on:
 - a. The intended stagging of development of the site, initial structures, roads, fencing etc.
 - Precomposting procedures such as loadout, stock piling, hand picking, b. opening bags, etc.
 - An equipment list including instrumentation or test equipment for C. measuring the composting process.
 - d. A staffing plan.
 - The number of compost rows proposed, the length of these rows and the e. direction of the wind rows in relation to the site drainage.
 - Records to be maintained on the composting process to determine f. process completion.
 - Sampling and testing methods to be used to determine an acceptable g. agronomic rate for the completed compost.
 - There is no information presented to indicate that the necessary h. equipment will be available on site to control dust.



Dear Mr. Standbridge:

This responds to your letter of January 30, 1991 requesting an Agency determination on whether a permit is necessary from IEPA for a site which has received landscape waste and is composting it.

As you are aware, Subsection 21(r)(3) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act, which became effective under P.A. 86-1026 on January 24, 1990, specifies several criteria which must be met for a site receiving landscape waste to be exempt from the purview of an Agency permit. Included in these criteria are requirements that the compost facility be operated by the farmer, the property on which the composting is located is principally and diligently devoted to the production of agricultural crops and the compost is used on land actually farmed by the compost operator.

It appears from your description of operations at the subject site, that one or more of the criteria specified under Subsection 2l(r)(3) of the Act is missing and therefore an operator not in compliance with the requirements of this subsection must obtain an Agency permit to operate a landscape waste composting facility.

COMPLAINT FOR INJUNCTION AND OTHER RELIEF

Now comes the Plaintiff, People of the State of Illinois, by EDWARD A. BURMILA, JR., State's Attorney of Will County, Illinois and complains of the Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA d.b.a. ILLINOIS NATIVE NURSERY, as follows:

COUNT I

Conducting a Landscape Waste Composting Facility Without an Agency Permit

1. This Count is brought against the Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, on behalf of the People of the State of Illinois by EDWARD A. BURMILA, JR., State's Attorney of Will County, Illinois pursuant to the authority granted him under Sections 42(d), 42(e) and 42(f) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (hereinafter referred to as "the Act") (Illinois Revised Statutes 1989 as amended, Ch. 111 1/2, Paragraphs 1042(d), 1042(e) and 1042(f)).

2. The Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, is the owner of property located west of Interstate 57 on Will County Highway 20 (also known as Joliet-Wilton Center Road, also known as North Peotone Road, also known as Joliet-Peotone Road) in Peotone Township, Will County, Illinois and commonly known by Will County P. I. N. 20-11-300-003.

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3. The Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, purchased the site in May, 1990.

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4. This Count is brought after one or more certified inspectors for non-hazardous solid waste management sites conducted inspections of the property located west of Interstate 57 on Joliet-Wilton Center Road in Peotone Township, Will County, Illinois, which consists of approximately twenty (20) acres of a parcel known by Will County P.I.N. 20-11-300-003 (hereinafter referred to as the "site"), on or about March 8, 1991, August 9, 1990 and September 19, 1990. A visit to the site also occurred on January 18, 1991 (copies of the reports are attached hereto as Exhibits A, B and C respectively).

5. This Count is brought after copies of the reports of the inspection along with the results of said inspections were sent to the Defendant.

6. Beginning in the summer of 1990 and continuing to the current time Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, has accepted for disposal certain types of landscape waste at the site.

7. On March 8, 1991, August 9, 1990 and September 19, 1990, inspections of the site revealed windrows and/or piles of landscape waste.

8. Inspectors Kevin Standbridge and Kathryn Sachtleben have corresponded with Defendant **DiCOLA** concerning violations at the site.

9. The site consists of an approximately twenty (20) acres which is a portion of an approximately eighty (80) acre parcel.

10. Glen Pauling is farming the remaining approximately sixty (60) acres of the parcel.

11. Subsection 21(r) of the Act (Illinois Revised Statutes 1989 as amended, Chapter 111 1/2, Paragraph 1021(r)) provides in pertinent part as follows:

"No person shall:

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(r) Conduct a landscape waste composting operation without an Agency permit, provided, however, that no permit shall be required for any person:

(3) operating a landscape waste composting facility on a farm, if the facility meets all of the following criteria:

 (A) the composting facility is operated <u>by the</u> <u>farmer</u> on property on which the composting material is utilized (emphasis added);

(B) the property on which the composting facility is located, and any associated property on which the compost is used, is principally and diligently devoted to the production of agricultural crops and is not owned, leased or otherwise controlled by any waste hauler or generator of nonagricultural compost materials, and the operator of the composting facility is not an employee, partner, shareholder, or in any way connected with or controlled by any such waste hauler or generator;

(C) all compost generated by the composting facility is used as mulch, fertilizer or soil conditioner on land <u>actually farmed by the person operating the</u> <u>composting facility</u>, and the finished compost is not stored at the composting site for a period longer than 4 years prior to its application as mulch, fertilizer, or soil conditioner (emphasis added);

12. Defendant **DiCOLA** is operating a landscape waste composting facility.

13. Defendant **DiCOLA** is conducting a compositing operation for landscape wastes generated by the activities of others.

14. Defendant **DiCOLA** is not directly applying landscape waste or composted waste at agronomic rates to land on which he is

conducting farming activities.

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15. Defendant **DiCOLA** has installed one concrete pad at the site. The pad is used as the dumping area for newly received landscape wastes.

16. Defendant **DiCOLA** is not operating a farm.

17. Defendant **DiCOLA** is connected with a waste hauler in that he is receiving quantities of landscape waste from Evergreen Scavenger Service, a waste hauler.

18. The site is not "principally and diligently devoted to the production of agricultural crops" by **ROBERT DiCOLA**.

19. That on or about August 6, 1990, **ROBERT DiCOLA** applied for a permit to "UPGRADE EXISTING ENTRANCE TO COMMERCIAL ENTRANCE" on the North Peotone Road entrance to the site. The permit was granted and the entrance upgraded (a copy of said permit is attached hereto as Exhibit D).

20. The Defendant **DiCOLA** has violated and continues to violate Subsection 21(r) of the Act (Illinois Revised Statutes 1989 as amended, Chapter 111 1/2, Paragraph 1021(r)) in that he is conducting a landscape waste facility without an Agency permit.

21. Defendant **DiCOLA** has continuously and repeatedly committed the above described violations since the summer of 1990.

22. That on or about October 6, 1990, ROBERT DiCOLA d.b.a ILLINOIS NATIVE NURSERY made application to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) for a permit to develop and operate a composting facility for landscape waste (a copy of said Application is attached hereto as Exhibit E).

23. That on or about December 31, 1990 the IEPA responded to **ROBERT DICOLA d.b.a ILLINOIS NATIVE NURSERY** saying in part "your permit application to develop and operate a composting facility for landscape waste is denied." (a copy of the IEPA letter of denial is attached hereto as Exhibit F)

24. The violations are continuing and will continue until enjoined by this Court.

WHEREFORE, Plaintiff respectfully requests that this Honorable Court:

A. Find that Defendant Robert **DiCOLA** has violated Subsection 21(r) of the Act continuously from at least the summer of 1990 until the date Plaintiff filed this Complaint;

B. Enter a permanent injunction directing Defendant DiCOLA

to cease and desist from further violations of Subsection 21(r) of the Act;

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C. Impose upon Defendant **DiCOLA**, pursuant to Subsection 42(a) of the Act, a civil penalty of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for each violation alleged herein, and an additional penalty of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) per day for each day the violation continued;

D. Require Defendant **DiCOLA**, pursuant to Subsection 42(f) of the Act, to pay the costs and reasonable attorneys' fees, including the reasonable costs of expert witnesses and consultants, incurred by the Plaintiff in connection with this case; and

E. Grant such further relief as this Court deems appropriate under the circumstances of this case.

GENERAL REMARKS

I arrived at the site at approximately 10:00 a.m. The temperature was approximately 35 degrees and there was an approximately 10 mph wind from the south. This site has been previously inspected on August 9, 1990 and September 19, 1990 under the site name of DiCola-Peotone (site #197000000). Inspection reports were issued for each of these previous inspections. The site was also inspected on January 18, 1991 but no report was generated.

I entered the site and drove north along the drive until I arrived at a concrete pad with landscape waste material on it (photos 1 and 2). The approximately 60 foot by 60 foot concrete pad is used as a staging area for the composting operation. Material is piled on the concrete pad until it can be placed in windrows. There was an approximately 20 yard roll-off along the south edge of the concrete pad (photo 3). I walked to the east edge of the concrete pad where there were two piles of waste material immediately east of the pad (photo 4).

I visited the site previously on January 18, 1991, and observed the amount of material at the site. Based on my observations, waste material has been dumped at the site since January 18, 1991.

The northerly of the two piles just east of the concrete pad (see site map) contained a load of what appeared to be shredded wooden pallets or stakes (see photos 5 and 6). It was clear that the material was not shredded landscape waste. I collected a small sample of portions of the material which was not shredded. The samples remain in the offices of the Land Use Department. The other pile east of the pad and the two piles on the western edge of the pad contained what appeared to be shredded Christmas trees. When I broke the surface of a pile on the concrete pad, steam escaped and there was heat emitted from the pile. The material was in the process of decomposing. The operator is operating a composting facility.

I continued north and west from the concrete pad where I

encountered twelve windrows of landscape waste material (photos 7 and 8). The windrows varied in length from approximately 100-800 feet long, by 8 feet wide, by 4 feet high. The windrows were approximately 400-500 feet long, by 6 feet wide, by 4 feet high. There was a slight odor near different parts of the windrows. The material in the windrows was being composted.

I continued north where I encountered a large area of excavation (photo 6). It appeared that a large area was being excavated and a berm or wall constructed along its south and east sides. By appearance, the excavation could be the construction of a pond.

I returned to a point just south of the concrete pad where I encountered a swale. I followed the swale to the east where there was a tank protruding from the ground (photo 7). I looked inside the tank and saw a liquid at the bottom of the tank (photo 8). There were also two pipes entering the tank from the southwest (photo 9) and a third entering the tank from the east (photo 10). Apparently, the two pipes on the southwest are drainage tiles emptying into the tank and the pipe on the east side drains out to the existing drainage tile which runs off of the property. Conceptually, it looks as though the tank is being used as a standpipe for the drainage tile system.

I then walked to the west where I saw a large pile of debris on the north side of a small barn (photo 11).

While inspecting the site I saw no indication of any agricultural activities at the site. There was no evidence of any crop under cultivation of the site.

As I left the site, I took a photo from the street looking north across the site (photo 12). At the end of the drive and to the west in the photo is the concrete pad where the material is dumped. I then went to the frontage road at the southeast corner of the site and took a photo (photo 13). Visible in the photo are: the concrete pad, the windrows, and the buried tank.



CONTROL OF LEACHATE

The design for controlling runoff is on The water table used of drinking water is 60 to 80 feet. The composting area would not effect () the water table. However the entire compost area has been tiled. The water from the tile will enter a large tank which has a pump in it. The pump will pump the water to a pond north of the compost site. The water in the pond will be used to innight the nursery stock that is to be located on the site. Any surface runoff will be directed towards large grass filter strips. These filter strips will follow United States Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service recommendations.

MEASURES TO CONTROL DUST, ODOR, AND NOISE

Dust will be controlled by spraying the area with water from the RECEIVED pond.

Odor will be controlled using a wildcat compost turner to aerate the OCT 1.1 1991 landscape waste. New compost rows will be turned within a week after the landscape waste arrives on the site. Then the rows will be turned IEPA-DLPC every one to two weeks depending on the weather. As long as the rows are aerated the odor should be held to a minimum.

Noise from equipment will only be during davlight hours six days a week. The composting site will no be open on Sunday. SEP 27 1990

The composting site will be open six days a week Monday through Saturday from six AN to six PM.

CONTAINMENT OF NON-COMPOSTABLE WASTE

Ho non-compostable waste will be accepted at the site. However some non-compostable waste may be is some of the landscape waste. This material will be picked up and placed in a large trash container and hauled to the dump.

TERMINATING THE OPERATIONS

If the composting is to be terminated then the site will revert back to agriculture. The compost windrows will be applied to the site. The soil will then be plowed and agricultural crops will be grown on the site.

RECORD KEEPING PROCEDURES

A record of all trucks and the amount of cubic vards delivered would be kept. All the rest of the book work would be accepted accounting procedures.

TYPES OF LANDSCAPE WASTE

Grass, leaves, brush and trees are the types of waste this site will knaccept.

MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES

Plost of the waste will be placed directly in the windrow. Large chunks of wood will put aside, chipped and then placed in the windrow.

Each windrow will be several hundred feet long. The windrows will be 12 feet across and six feet height in center. On each side of the windrow there will be a twelve foot wide now for the tractor to drive down.

Ho additives will be used for composting the landscape material.

A wildcat composting turner pulled by a tractor will aerate the windrows. The landscape waste will be turned within one week of it's arrival. The windrows will then be aerated once every seven to fourteen days spring, summer and fall. Aeration will not occur during the winter due to weather conditions.

The length of time for the landscape waste to turn into finished compost maternal will be three to six months.

A visual inspection of the compost will determine if the material is ready for land application. Also the material will be ready when it fails to generate heat after is has been aerated.


STORAGE AREAS

The vast majority of the landscape waste will be placed directly in the windrows. If the landscape waste can not be placed in the windrows due to the weather, it will be placed on a concrete pad that has the capacity to hold four hundred cubic vards. The material will then be moved to the windrows by a front end loader.

Finished compost material will stored in the windrows. The compost material will be moved to the surrounding agricultural land via a manure spreader.

END USE OF MATERIAL

Finished compost will be land applied to the agricultural land on the site. Hone of it will be sold or given away.







This will acknowledge receipt of your Application for Permit to develop and operate a landscape waste compost facility, dated October 6, 1990, and received by this Agency on October 11, 1990.

Your permit application to develop and operate a composting facility for landscape waste is denied.

You have failed to provide proof that granting this permit would not result in violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act. Section 39(a) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 111 1/2, par. 1039(a)) requires the Agency to provide the applicant with specific reasons for the denial of permit. The following reason(s) are given:

- 1. The applicant has indicated on application form LPC-PA12 that this is a proposed operation. Will County inspection records indicate that this is incorrect because the site has received and is receiving landscape waste. Please provide information on previous receipt of landscape waste at this site, the amount received, the date of such operations, the type of waste received, the ultimate disposal of any material received, the location of any land application areas, the rate of land application, any testing conducted to determine an agronomic rate; and the specific location of such activities. (Section 21r of the Environmental Protection Act (Act))
- On page four of the applicants submittal a well is described as being located 30 feet in front of the house which according to the drawing is South of the house. On the scaled survey map submitted, a well is located North of the house. Please explain this discrepancy. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 3. Please identify the occupant of the residence on site and any rental or lease agreements with the occupant. (Section 39m of the Act)

- 4. The applicant has failed to indicate on a scaled map the exact location of the proposed composting facility relative to property boundaries, the residence on site and components of the composting facility including the concrete pad, the pond, the vegetative filter, the chipper location, and the staging area for incoming waste. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 5. The applicant has failed to provide a description of the field tile drainage system under the proposed composting site including a depth profile drawing of the tile, the collection tank and connecting piping to the excess water pond. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 6. Excess stormwater runoff from the composting site is proposed to be used to irrigate nursery stock. The applicant has failed to identify the existing land use on the 80 acre farm surrounding the proposed composting site. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 7. The applicant has failed to provide sufficient information on the vegetative filter including its size, slope and whether the filter is existing or proposed. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 8. The applicant has failed to indicate the existing slope of the proposed composting site and whether any grading will be necessary to augment drainage of surface water to the vegetative filter. (Section 39m of the Act)
- 9. The applicants description of proposed operations is incomplete (35 Ill. Adm. Code 807.207). Please provide an expanded discussion on:
 - a. The intended stagging of development of the site, initial structures, roads, fencing etc.
 - b. Precomposting procedures such as loadout, stock piling, hand picking, opening bags, etc.
 - c. An equipment list including instrumentation or test equipment for measuring the composting process.
 - d. A staffing plan.
 - e. The number of compost rows proposed, the length of these rows and the direction of the wind rows in relation to the site drainage.
 - f. Records to be maintained on the composting process to determine process completion.
 - g. Sampling and testing methods to be used to determine an acceptable agronomic rate for the completed compost.
 - h. There is no information presented to indicate that the necessary equipment will be available on site to control dust.

- i. Odor reduction and prevention measures such as pH adjustment of the compost or the timing of odor releasing operations to coincide with favorable wind conditions.

The applicant has failed to provide details of the existing pond located North of the compost site to be used to control runoff including its location on the scaled map, its storage capacity for runoff from the proposed composting site and a description of any overflow from this pond to waters of the State. This will acknowledge receipt of your Application for Permit to develop and operate a yard waste composting facility, dated July 24, 1992, and received by this Agency on July 31, 1992.

Your permit application to develop and operate a yard waste composting facility is denied.

You have failed to provide proof that granting this permit would not result in violations of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act. Section 39(a) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act (<u>Ill. Rev. Stat.</u>, Ch. 111 1/2, par. 1039(a)) requires the Agency to provide the applicant with specific reasons for the denial of permit. The following reason(s) are given:

The following additional information is needed to determine compliance with Section 39(m) of the Environmental Protection Act:

- On page 5, item (3)(b) of the application a topographic map is referred to 1. as evidence that the proposed composting site lies outside the 10 year floodplain. A legend and source identification for this map is required.
- The plan sheet submitted indicates a residence is located within the 80 2. acre site. The occupants of this residence should be identified and their relation to proposed composting operations, if any, explained.
- On page 12, item (b) of the application, it is stated that there are not 3. more than 10 occupied non-farm residences within one-half mile of the site. Please indicate on the site plan, the location and approximate distances of buildings and residences within one-half mile of the boundaries of the 80 acre site.
- On page 7, item 4 of the application the site slope is described as a two 4. percent slope. What is the slope of the 1200 ft. x 800 ft. composting area and is any site grading or surface preparation planned? Provide the proposed elevations and topography of the composting area.
- 5. Provide additional details of the soil ridge located north of the proposed composting area.

- 6. Is the proposed vegetative filter strip currently vegetated?
- 7. On page 7, item 4 of the application a ditch along the east side of the property is mentioned which will handle excess runoff from the compost site. Provide the location, size, slope and capacity calculations for this ditch to show that it can handle present drainage plus additional drainage from the proposed facility. We recommend a 10 year 24 hour storm event be used for such calculation.
- Provide specifications for the leachate collection tank, pump and connecting pipeline to the north pond described on page 8, item (4)(b) of the application.
- 9. Low spots in the composting area where leachate may accumulate should be fixed by grading or filling in the low area with soil. The use of wood chips or odor neutralizers as discussed on page 9 of the application are temporary measures. Your proposal should be amended to include more permanent solutions to any ponding problems.
- 10. Your application should discuss whether an alternate source of water will be available for site operational needs should the on-site pond become dry.
- 11. On page 6 of the application it is proposed to place loads of incoming yard waste directly into windrows. This is an unacceptable operating practice for incoming yard waste as proposed, for the following reasons:
 - a. Grinding of the incoming material is one of the essential steps in aerobic composting to maximize the decomposition process.
 - b. Placing bagged incoming yard waste directly into windrows prevents the formation of a structured windrow because incorporating bulking agents for maintaining aerobic conditions and achieving the proposed C:N ratio was not included.
 - c. A visual inspection of the waste to remove non-compostable materials cannot be done.
 - d. Paper bags should be shredded to a size which will minimize blowing litter problems and can best be accomplished by processing all incoming bagged material prior to placement into windrows.
 - e. Anaerobic material brought to the site may go undetected until disturbed during windrow turning causing odor problems. Quick attention to incoming material to promote aerobic conditions is essential to prevent odor problems.

An amended operating plan is required including specified maximum times from receipt of material to processing, mixing and placement into windrows.

- 12. No maximum storage time of incoming material on the wet weather pad has been specified. Extended storage without processing and bulking the yard waste may cause odor problems. We recommend daily processing of incoming material and then if needed, storage in windrows on the concrete pad during wet weather until it can be moved to the designated composting area. The maximum storage time before processing and windrow formation for material received on the wet weather pad must be specified.
- 13. On page 13, under item (5)(c) of the application it is stated that equipment will be operated only during daylight hours six days a week. On the same page under item (6) operating hours are specified as 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. on Saturday. In the marketing piece (Exhibit 10) the delivery hours specified are 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. The intended hours of operation must be clarified.
- 14. On page 16 of the application, additional information is needed regarding stockpiles of leaves and wood chips which are to be used as bulking agents. Leaves placed in large stockpiles have been a source of odor problems at compost sites and large wood chip piles a fire hazard. The quantity and form of these stockpiles should be explained and the location identified on the plan sheet.
- 15. On page 19 of the application it is stated that windrows will be turned during rain events to add moisture, yet from the discussion on page 18, it appears that wet weather is expected to prohibit traffic onto the compositing area. Please explain. What type of moisture monitoring equipment will be used to determine moisture content of the windrowed material, the frequency of this testing and the target range to be maintained in the windrow.
- 16. The criteria for determining when composting material is finished must be further explained. Under what conditions will the temperature reheat test be run (i.e. moisture, oxygen, pH), the target range and how often will the test be run per volume of material.

He must also publish a notice in a newspaper of general circulation in the county.



The Peotone Vedette

Frustration reigned at an informational meeting on compost issues held at the Peotone Fire Station on Aug. 30.

The main issue was Robert DiCola and his business operations in Monee and Peotone townships. DiCola claims he is a farmer and may compost at the sites under an exemption for farmers. He is adamant that he is not violating the farm exemption at the sites. Some area residents and politicians at the meeting were just as adamant that Di-Cola's sites violate the farm exemption, and are public nuisances

DiCola's Monee Township site is 10 acres on Harlem Avenue south of Monee-Manhattan Road. DiCola grows trees on the property. He has operated the site for four years.

The Peotone Township site is 80 acres on Joliet Road west of I-57 DiCola said he plans to grow

perennials at this site. DiCola said the Peotone site is a business venture between himself and Connor Shaw of Possibility Place nursery.

A county complaint has been filed for injunction to close the Monee Township site. DiCola was cited for composting without a permit from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, and for dumping and odors at the site.

Area residents at the Peotone meeting complained of odors coming from DiCola's facilities. There were also complaints about noise, possible contamination of aquifers, and endangered property values.

Janet Jares and Luann Soucie, area residents opposing the facilities, stressed they are not opposed to composting, only to illegitimate compost operations. We want the law to be more de-

fined and enforced," said Jares. She claimed DiCola's operations



consist of "windrows and piles and shredders and turners and dumpsters and semis rolling in and that's not farming, at least in my opinion." Soucie said DiCola is operating "in a so-called gray area" of the law.

A video and photographs of DiCola's Monee Township site were shown at the meeting. They were taken by Bill Hopman who lives next to DiCola's Monee Township site. Hopman said noise pollution was one of the problems local residents face due to the facility.

Some residents said compost materials were being taken from the Monee Township site to the Peotone Township facility in an attempt to clean the area for an upcoming inspection or because of the county charges leveled against the Monee Township facility.

DiCola, was not at the meeting. In a telephone interview, he said there is no. additional room at the Monee Township site and materials are no longer being accepted there. The site will be landscaped, he said.

According to DiCola, Monee soil is clay-filled and "terrible" and needs vast amounts of organic materials. He said he prefers to use this method for growing instead of chemicals on which many farmers depend.

DiCola said he hopes to break even financially at the Peotone Township site over the course of. a year because the work is labor intensive and involves expensive equipment.

Rep. Robert Regan, (R-Crete) one of the elected officials at the meeting, said current laws regarding composting are too vague and the farm exemption particularly needs strengthening. Regan wants the law tightened to prevent abuses of it, while not hindering the operations of legitimate farmers. He hopes a compromise can be reached with the Farm Bureau,

Regan recently proposed a plan for strengthening the law as it applies to farmers. The plan includes:

 describing a compost site. applying the same penalties

for abuse of compost laws that exist for abuse of landfill laws. shortening to two years the period for storing compost mate-

rials at a site. determining the agronomic rate for each crop and limiting

composting to that rate. ·banning windrows on farms. banning grass from compost

sites until the impact of pesticides is determined. Requiring that materials

dumped at a site be used on that land.

Regan stressed he was "not at war with farmers," but "what's happening in your backyard is gonna happen all over the state of. Illinois. It's a very, very lucrative business.

Regan said he does not want to interfere with any legitimate farmer who uses leaves and grass for composting for his own benefit on his own farm." But "what is happening in Monee and now in Peotone is beyond the intent of the law, beyond the exemption for farmers to do this."

Peotone Mayor Richard Ander-son said, "We know we've got a real problem with DiCola and anyone else coming in,"

DiCola said he is performing a public service by taking and using materials that would have


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

These employees would get-benefits even though they were guaranteed employment after the summer break. "Hopefully, the bill will be defeated," Hall said, "because it will cost school districts \$5.5 million if it passes.

Another bill would grant a one time window for early retirement for employees at least 50 years of age. The bill, called Plus Five Pension Legislation, probably will not pass, Hall said, because of problems funding the early retirement.

Hall added the state is sending proration notices to the schools concerning what funding will be reduced because of the state's budget crunch.

Hall said the Peotone schools will be short \$78,000 in the transportation fund as a result of the state shortfall. These funds will be cut immediately from money the schools should receive before June 30.

The board accepted a contract for bus service for next year. Hall told the board that transportation costs for the district will increase only 1% in all categories.

The transportation budget for the 1991-92 school year was \$570,000. Next year, transporta-tion should cost the district about the same amount because of differences in some types of transportation.

Hall asked the board for permission to schedule a computer learning center open house at the schools this summer. He said one of the largest school computer firms will bring computers and software to demonstrate to the public.





I write this letter in reference to the application listed above. I understand Mr. Jim Kerwin has filed a variance application on behalf of Mr. Robert DiCola to allow land application of up to 12 inches of waste on this property. I also understand 12 inches is 24 times the rate established by state regulations.

The site of the proposed project lies just outside the village limits, but within the 1.5 mile planning area of the village. In the early 1990's, Mr. DiCola operated a composting facility that resulted in serious quality of life issues for adjacent neighbors and residents of the village. During this time period Mr. DiCola applied twice to IEPA for a composting permit (Log nos. 1990-451, 1992-216) and both applications were denied. In 1991, The Will County State's Attorney filed suit against Mr. DiCola d.b.a. Illinois Native Nursery to halt operations of the composting facility. In the Order, Mr. DiCola acknowledged operating a public nuisance and the Order (NO. 91 CH 4099) stated: "the Defendant will accept no further landscape waste on the Peotone site unless issued a permit by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to compost landscape waste".

As I stated earlier, this property is located just outside the Peotone village limits, but within our 1.5 mile planning area. The Village Comprehensive Plan does not reflect waste disposal operations on this property. If the property were located within the village limits, the operator would need to file for rezoning and possibly a special use permit.

Please let this letter serve as written notice that the Village of Peotone is opposed to the variance application filed for the property located at 8452 W. Joliet Road, Peotone.

Volunteers push for Southland Senior Services to stay open

by Karen Haave Southland Senior Services boosters are continuing their efforts to keep the facility open. with fundraisers and a second look at ways to save the organization that serves residents across a half-dozen townships in Will County.

News that the center was closing last month has generated both an outery and support from those who say it is a vital agency that meets the special needs of senior citizens and the disabled.

The program is open to seniors age 55 and older in Peotone, Green Garden, Monec. Crete, Washington and Will Townships and the villages within those townships.

SSS volunteer Dawn Clialoupka said a meeting last month reiterated claims that the facility is important to those who utiliize its services, which include transportation, Meals Wheels, congregate dining, information and assistance

"Our meeting was a success," Chaloupka said

There were over 50 people there, some from various groups, churches and members (of the center).

"The 150-plus members (said) they do not want their center to close its doors. Southland Senior Services is the only facility in Will County that serves (six townships), so there is a need for a service facility like this one."

Chaloupka, a frequent volum teer at the center, along with her husband, Dan, said the meeting produced numerous ideas for keeping the facility operational

The members suggested increasing their membership fees," she said. "Several people in attendance offered to volunteer for the Re-Sale Shop. And a retired teacher offered her expertise to possibly tutor children after school at the center.

"Now we are in the process of re-organizing. Our main issue is to collect money owed to the Southland Senior Services from various transportation agencies, such as PACE, as there is still a \$20,000 to \$30,000 shortfall to keep the center open. The shortfall was created when the Southland Senior Services lost funding from United Way, RTA and other sources," Chaloupka explained.

Despite its popularity, the center last year lost approximately \$100,000 in funding from United Way, PACE and RTA.

"Again, we are appealing to any and all, especially during this holiday season. If anyone



Neighbors fear reliving nightmare of DiCola composting operation of 20 years ago

by Lynn Dill For some neighbors of Robert DiCola, the reappearance of trucks dumping landscape waste on his property this Fall has brought back bad memories of his composting operation 20 years ago that it took two years battling in court to bring to a halt.

"Robert DiCola is up to his old tricks, dumping landscape waste on his property again, despite the fact that there is a court order." said Len Saunoris who lives directly across the road from the property owned by DiCola at 8452 W. Joliet Rd. in rural Peotone.

After a two-year court battle from 1990 to 1992. DiCola agreed that he would "accept no further landscape waste on the Peotone site unless issued a per-mit by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) to compost landscape waste." For the last 18 years, Saunoris

said, it appeared that DiCola had complied with the court order. owerer, during October and November. Saunoris noticed the reappearance of trucks, carrying yard waste. He estimated that 70 to 120 loads of yard waste were

dumped by trucks with a 100-yard capacity, weighing approxi-mately 21 to 25 tons each.

Of course, Saunoris immedi-ately contacted the Will County state's attorney office and the Will County land use department to report the violation. Imagine his surprise when he was told by both offices that DiCola had applied to the IEPA for a land application variance to allow him to apply landscape waste 12 inches thick. The application states that the variance is needed for soil enhancement to grow Buckwheat and Sudan grass to feed his cows

Local schools to file suit against

by Lynn Dill Several local school districts plan to take action against the state of Illinois for its failure to make payments.

Grant Park, Manteno and Peotone school districts have decided to take part in a lawsuit that includes a total of 18 districts statewide, seeking millions of dollars owed to them from the 2009/2010 school year. According to Manteno

Community Unit School District 5 Superintendent Dawn Russert, the suit must be filed before the state's obligation to pay 2009/2010 funding lapses on December 31, 2010. "If there is a lapse in the

appropriation, then the state could say that it's no longer required to pay us," said Russert.

As of Friday, Dec. 3, the state owed the Manteno district \$1,169,564.88 from last year. The district was owed more, but the state did make a payment of \$296,000 on November 30. Of course, the figure would be much higher if it included payments owed from the current fiscal year. Currently, Manteno is owed a total of approximately \$2.6 million.

As a superintendent of a district with 2,300 children, Russert says the continued late state payments are "worrisome and stressful." She said these children are counting on her to provide teachers for their classrooms, textbooks and all of the other resources needed for a good education.

"It's not the children's fault the state is in this pickle, but they are the ones who will suffer," she said.

Planning, says Russert, is difficult, if not impossible, without knowing the state's intention to pay its obligations in advance. "I'll be delighted if we receive

"I'll be delighted if we receive the money owed to us in the next few weeks, but it would be much better if we knew in advance," said Russert.

The law imposes a 20-tonsper-acre per year limitation – a law that was instituted in 1991 in response to DiCola's dumping of landscape waste at that time.

"He's violating a law that was passed in direct response to his actions," said Saunoris, saying that previously composting was a

very "gray area." The current land application law would result in approximately a 1/2 to 3/4 inch thick layer per acre in comparison to the 12 inch thick that DiCola is seeking in the variance.

Saunoris said DiCola has applied for the variance through Jim Kurwin, manager of Defronta Farms, the property owned by DiCola on Joliet Rd., and he believes it was done to keep DiCola's name off of the IEPA application, since he says that the IEPA was quite familiar with DiCola's past violations. Saunoris says he's "done the

math" and estimates that it would take 24 truckloads per acre to lay landscape waste 12 inches thick. Since DiCola owns 80 acres at the location, Saunoris says that would be a total of 1,920 truckloads.

He also called the company he saw hauling the recent landscape waste, KLF Trucking of Manhattan, and said that he learned it pays \$200 per load to dump these size loads. Saunoris says that figure translates into a \$14,000 to \$24,000 profit that DiCola has made this fall in just two months.

"He's getting paid – even though he's in violation of a court order," said Saunoris. If the land application grant is approved by the IEPA, Saunoris said, 1,920 truckloads at \$200 per load translate into \$384,000.

"If any of you have ever smelled rotting grass on a hot day, imagine what 2,000 or maybe 3,000 truckloads of rotting grass will smell like," Saunoris said in a letter he passed out to neighbors, encouraging them to contact the IEPA and elected officials to express

opposition to the variance. In the letter, Saunoris warns newer residents with these words: "Ask any of your neighbors that were here 20 years ago, what it is like living where

what it is like living where breathing the air will make you want to vomit." Saunoris still has copies of all

the law does not require this notification for land application. He's asking concerned residents to contact the IEPA or local representatives to express their opposition to the land application variance.

This letter is in response to your letter, received by Illinois EPA on November 16, 2010, requesting an increase to the agronomic rate for application of landscape waste in accordance with Section 21(q) of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act. In your letter you requested an application rate of up to 12" of landscape waste (leaves), to the fields of Terrona Farms.

The Illinois EPA has reviewed the information provided in your letter and determined that an increase in the land application rates above the standard 20 tons/acre per year of landscape waste has not been justified. Specific items of concern regarding your proposed operation are detailed further below.

1. Incorporation: Please note that Terrona Farms is the only site in the State of Illinois that has proposed that the landscape waste not be incorporated into the soil at the time of receipt, but instead used as ground cover over the winter with incorporation being provided by the grazing of farm animals, with the additional benefit that the leaves would help prevent damage due to livestock "pugging".

Illinois EPA has concerns that the proposed procedures for the landscape material will adequately apply the landscape waste to the soil in a manner that will result in the optimal agronomic benefit from land application. Specifically, Illinois EPA has concerns that the herd size (currently 7 animals) is adequate to sufficiently compress the leaves and that there will be excessive amounts of landscape waste present in the spring such that further incorporation by plow would be ineffective.

2. Use of Ground Cover: Section 21(q) of the Act allows an increase in the agronomic rate of landscape waste application if the owner or operator demonstrates the site's soil or crop needs requires a higher rate of application. Use of landscape waste as a ground cover is not considered under Section 21(q) and the applicant has not demonstrated that the soil characteristics or crop needs justify the increase in the application rate.

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3. Appropriate amount of landscape waste to be received: Terrona Farms is requesting the application of up to 12" of leaves during the fall. The density of leaves typically ranges between 200 and 440 lbs per cubic yard depending on the amount of compaction. A land application rate of 20 tons/acre consisting solely of leaves would therefore range between 0.75" and 1.5". The proposed depth of 12" would be an application rate between 160 and 320 tons /acre, without a sufficient justification for the application rate.

Depending upon the reference source consulted, the land application rater of physical compost is typically recommended to be no more than 5-10 tons/acre. Field reports indicate that while a 3" layer of leaves chisel plowed into the soil improved soil qualities, the application of 6" of leaves resulted in reduced crop yields.

- 4. Nitrogen-Phosphorous Calculations: Terrona Farms have not provided any calculations demonstrating that the requested amount of land application will not provide excessive amounts of nitrogen and/or phosphorous to the soil. In any future submittals, Terrona Farms should also provide calculations demonstrating that the amount of nitrogen and phosphorous that the leaves provide do not exceed crop demands.
- 5. Contaminants: Terrona Farms needs to further address how contaminants in the incoming loads will be inspected and removed. Section 32(q) of the Act does not contain an acceptable deminimus level for contaminants. While Illinois EPA does not consider the organic status of Terrona farms in our review, please note that the presence of contaminants may prevent the crops raised from being considered "organic".
- 6. Nuisances: Terrona Farms did not include procedures to address odors, vectors and litter resulting from the transportation, staging, placement, use of as ground cover, and incorporation of the landscape waste at the increased application rate.

Terrona Farms may submit a new request to increase the agronomic rate of application. Any further submissions should address the items of concern listed above.

ORDER

This matter coming on for hearing, the **PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS** present by its Attorney, **EDWARD A. BURMILA**, JR., through his Assistants, Barbara J. Smiles and Thomas M. Sealy and the Defendant, **ROBERT DiCOLA**, present in person and through his Attorney, Louis P. Yangas and the parties having reached an agreement as to disposition of all the issues in these proceedings agree that Counts I, II and III of Plaintiff's Complaint for Injunction and Other Relief are dismissed with prejudice and without leave to reinstate and with reference to Count IV the Defendant acknowledges that the conduct by him of a landscape waste composting operation is a public nuisance causing offensive smells emanating therefrom.

Now, therefore, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED as to the disposition of Count IV, that the Defendant, ROBERT DiCOLA, cause to be incorporated within the soil on the premises where the landscape waste is located, the landscape waste existing thereon, to incorporate said landscape waste to a depth of approximately 8 inches in the soil, which incorporation shall be completed on or before May 1, 1992. It is agreed between the parties that the Defendant will accept no further landscape waste on the Peotone site unless issued a permit by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to compost landscape waste. The parties further agree that the Defendant waive all his appeal rights to this Order.

It is also ordered that no costs be assessed to any of the parities. It is further order that this Court retains jurisdiction over the cause to ensure compliance with this Order.

It is further ordered that Counts I, II and III of Plaintiff's Complaint are dismissed with prejudice and without assessment of costs. DATED THIS 22 DAY OF OCTOBER, 1991
