

Cleavages and Conflicts in Israel - A Field Seminar

Thursday 16-20

The goal of this course is to provide an overview about internal division in Israel. The roots of the current situation began to appear in the pre-state period, when European Jews took the initiative and dominated Jewish life in the YESHUV. At this same time, a small community of Jewish immigrants from the Arab states and the Middle East emerged as a distinct "oriental" group. Following the establishment of the state of Israel in 1948, these identities were empowered by the immigration wave of Jews from all over the world, especially from the Arab states. In addition, the indigenous Palestinian Minority was added to Israel's diversity after 1948. After the 1967 war, the Israeli society was forced to deal also with the Palestinians in East Jerusalem, the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

The Course is designed in three phases\levels:

- First, three class meetings where we intend to discuss theoretical aspects that are related to ethnic and identity politics, including the dynamics of macro group politics. The Meetings will be conducted in the following dates: 3\11; 17\11; 24\11.
- Second, we will conduct four field seminars; each one is a full day (8-10 hours). We plan to learn and analyze different aspects of groups\identities. The field seminars will be conducting in the following Places:

1 – Mixed Cities and Mixed Regions: Acre and Galilee (Nazareth and Upper Nazareth) – 18\11.

2 – Arab Village (Majed Al-Kurum), and the Golan – 25\11.

- 3 The Negev: Bedouin community and Developing Towns $2\12$.
- 4 Jerusalem: West & East Jerusalem 9\12.
 - Third, we will hold a final meeting for presentations and discussion on January 12, 2012.

- Final research paper (A couple of two students, an Israeli and a non-Israeli, can write a joint paper) should not exceed 20 pages (40%)
