4. All growing tobacco plants should be potted in a waterproof plastic bag and placed in an attractive container before arrival at the Fair. A five gallon bucket is suggested.

5. Each exhibit of stripped Burley tobacco shall consist of two hands, each hand shall be made of twenty leaves

or more. The first, second and thurd place entries in all atripped divisions will remain at the state fair.







4-H/FFA Market Livestock Shows and Sale

General Rules

GUIDELINES:

1. Show and sale open to 4-H and FFA members in Pendleton County only. Members must show as 4-H or FFA, no crossing.

2. Animals must be accompanied by Extension or Vo-Ag Instructor or accompanied by written state of eligibility.

3. Members may show as many animals as they wish. Only one (1) animal per member may sell; members must show the species they are selling in the market show.

4. All animals must be broke to show and must be shown by member unless in the case of illness, more than one animal in a class or a conflicting 4-H or FFA event, then animal may be shown by another Pendleton County 4H or FFA member. This is subject to 4-H or FFA advisor approval.

5. Animals will be weighed as unloaded with presentation of a valid Health Certificate.

6. All exhibitors MUST participate in "Tear-Down" at the Pendleton County Fair at 1:00pm on August 2, 2020. Assistance with set-up is needed as well, for those who can help.

7. Pendleton County Youth Fair will provide a night watchman.

8. All exhibitors must indicate at weigh out the animal they intend to sell. Exhibitors will have up to 30 minutes after the conclusion of their show to change the animal they wish to sell.

9. If exhibitor wins showmanship for one specie and then goes on to win another showmanship for another specie, they will represent the first specie that they won when competing in the Round Robin. Therefore, the reserve showman of the second specie will represent that specie in the Round Robin. If the reserve showman is already representing a specie in the Round Robin from a previous showmanship win, the judge will be asked to pick a third individual to represent that specie in the Round Robin and so on.

10. If you are a Champion and/or Reserve Champion Showmanship winner, in each age division, your Showmanship animal may be picked to show in Round robin. It is your responsibility to have your animal ready to be exhibited in Round Robin. Failure to have your Showmanship animal ready would result in forfeiting your Showmanship premiums. Showmanship animals must remain at the fairgrounds until after the Round Robin, or have been released by eith the FFA advisor/4-H agent.

11. Only exhibitors, ring master, and judge will be allowed in the show ring during Market Livestock shows.

12. Prior to all livestock shows only the animals who are showing will be allowed to be moved from their pens to the wash pad or other areas. All other animals must be properly secured in their respective areas. SALE ANIMALS ARE NOT TO LEAVE FAIRGROUNDS FOLLOWING OFFICIAL WEIGH OUT with the exception of rabbits and poultry. Grand and Reserve Champion animals are to remain at the fairgrounds until after the sale. They will be on display in a designated area.

13. All grooming rules are in compliance with the KY Department of Agriculture (KDA)

guidelines. Local leaders must be identified by the local 4-H agent and/or FFA Advisors in a list submitted to their respective organization. A leader's service must be available to all members in a club, chapter or county.

14. Market Animals will be shown by weight, not breed. Weight division for classes will be determined by Show Officials. 4-H/FFA animals will show together in conformation. Each animal may only show as Market **OR** breeding.

15. If animals do not meet weight requirement, they will be able to show in weight class but not eligible for sale.

16. There will be a Rate of Gain class. Animals must have participated at the official weigh-in site for their species.

17. All classes will be judged on the Danish System. A Champion and Reserve Champion in each class and an Overall Champion and Overall Reserve Champion will be selected.

18. Best Bred and Owned will be selected from class results.

19. PENDLETON PROUD – Awards will be given to Producer and Youth exhibiting an animal purchased from a Pendleton County Livestock Producer and born in Pendleton County.

20. **SHOWMANSHIP IS MANDATORY.** In each species there will be a 4-H and FFA Novice showmanship class for first year exhibitors in respective species. Showmanship divisions will be: Novice, Junior, and Senior for 4-H and FFA. An overall Supreme Champion Showman and overall Reserve Supreme Champion Showman will be selected for each species. Each exhibitor will only show showmanship one time per specie but may choose either their market or breeding animal to exhibit.

21. Round Robin Showmanship Class will be held on night of sale. Winner will receive "traveling" trophy, belt buckle and \$50. Reserve Champion will receive \$25.

22. 4-H and FFA members must submit completed project record book (from weigh-in to county fair) on or before July 26, 2020 during county fair entry take-in to be eligible to show, sell or have animal/animals on fairground.

23. The Dale Kirsch Memorial plaque will be awarded to the most outstanding livestock exhibitor at the Pendleton County Youth Fair. The winning exhibitor will have excelled in the Skill-A-Thon, showmanship, and confirmation classes earning points in each division. The exhibitor with the highest total points will win this award along with \$100.

24. Animals will be the responsibility of the buyer at the drop of the hammer. Buyers have up to 2 weeks from the sale date to acquire animal(s) otherwise the buyer forfeits their purchase (unless prior arrangements have been made between the buyer and exhibitor).

25. There will be no resale of animals.

26. All members must also attend 6 hours of educational meetings prior to weigh in of their respective species. Exhibitors with 20 hours or more will earn ONE 1-week fair pass (excluding rides).

27. Appropriate dress is required for shows and sale. Appropriate dress is long pants, hard soled shoes or boots, appropriate shirts.

28. Exhibitor will be responsible for charge (approximately \$4.00) at weigh-in for KUIP tagging. Upon loss of KUIP tag exhibitor must immediately contact either the 4-H Agent or FFA Advisor. Small tagging will not be held in Pendleton County. Dates will be given for other sites.

29. All lambs and goats must have valid scrapic free tag/identification. All male market animals must be properly castrated by their respective weigh-in/validation site.

30. Each exhibitor will be provided with up to two photographs to give buyers. Additional photographs may be purchased if youth has more than two buyers.

31. Exhibitors will be responsible for delivering buyer flyers to their potential buyers. Buyers will need to RSVP their attendance to the Pendleton County Extension Office by the date provided in the flyer. Everyone will be charged at the gate of the fairgrounds.

32. There will be no charge to exhibitor for Buyer's Meal. Each exhibitor will also be responsible for providing a dessert to serve the buyers during the Buyer's Meal. This year the Buyer's Meal with be held at the Pendleton County Extension Office on Friday, September 25, 2020 at 6:30pm. Details will be sent to all exhibitors and Buyers prior to the event

33. All sale participants are required to turn in a written thank you letter (letters) when you pick up your buyer's picture after Sepember 1. Pictures will have a voucher (sign-off) receipt. The exhibitor will have their buyer sign the receipt when they deliver their picture. Exhibitor will then receive their check when receipt with buyer's signature is returned to the Extension Office. Pictures must be picked up from the Extension Office no later than September 30, 2020.

34. Eligibility for FFA Members will follow national guidelines until high school graduation. Upon graduation from high school students pursuing full-time, post-secondary education will be allowed to show in the four fairs past high school graduation and must be a member in good standing with Pendleton County FFA (paid membership). Members in good standing are eligible for sale the summer after graduation from high school and not thereafter if they choose to show under FFA while in post-secondary school.

35. All award winners are asked to send a "Thank You" note to sponsors.

36. Under the 4-H/FFA Youth Livestock Rules and Regulations, it is stated that the animal being exhibited must be in the possession and continuous care where youth provides the majority of care for the animal by June 1, 2020. EXCEPTION: Market Steers/Heifers must have been in the possession and under the continuous care of the exhibitor by March 1, 2020. Care for the animal would consist of but not limited to: daily feeding, halter breaking, grooming, and practicing for the show, health and other activities as desired.

37. The Youth Livestock Advisory Committee, FFA Advisor, County Extension Agent for 4-H/ Youth Development and Junior Livestock Committee reserve the right to make project visits without prior notice.

38. All livestock exhibitors, inclduing rabbit and poultry will be required to take a Skill-A-Thon test administered by Livestock Leaders on July 26, during county fair entry take-in. Exhibitors must score 50% or higher to be eligible for awards from Skill-A-Thon, winners will receive \$50 and second place winners will receive \$25.

39. There will be 4% of each exhibitor's sale check (not including add-ons) withheld for overhead costs and champions. From this amount, 3% goes back into the livestock committee fund to pay for sale costs, buyer pictures, frames, etc while the remaining 1% goes back to the champion and reserve chamion showmanship winners of their respective specie. Sixty Percent of the 1% goes to the showmanship winner of that respective specie and 40% goes to the reserve champion.

40. All State 4-H/FFA Livestock requirements not listed will be included. All State Laws for animal health are included.

41. In case of emergency, if you are unable to be at the fairgrounds prior to your species weigh-out, contact 4-H/FFA advisor or livestock leader prior to weigh-out start time for

permission to arrive late.

42. Herdsman Award sponsored by Flying ~C~ Livestock: A special prize will be awarded in the livestock barn to the 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitor who demonstrates the following criteria to the highest degree:

A. Neatness/attractiveness of exhibit, bedding, signs, etc.

B. Appearance of animal at all times

C. Cleanliness of aisle behind/around livestock stalls or pens

D. Exhibitor's behavior while at the County Fair

E. Friendliness toward other exhibitors and spectators.

43. **Violations of the Code of Show Ring Ethics:** Any violations of the Code of Show Ring Ethics or any other rules and policies associated with the Pendleton County Youth Fair and the Kentucky State Fair may result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualifications, loss of sale proceeds, probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation. Any illegal substances found at slaughter will result in forfeiture of all premiums and revenues from the sale of the animal. Violations of these rules may result in both animal and exhibitor being disqualified from the show.

A. Treating the animal internally with an irritant or other substance to artificially changed the animal's conformation. This would included injection of air, gas liquid, solid or any foreign material under the skin.

B. Surgery of any kind to change the natural conformation or appearance of the animal's body. (Exceptions include those procedures that are a part of normally accepted management program, such as dehorning, castration and tail docking.)

C. Altering or changing animal from its natural color.

D. Use of any abnormal procedure or product to change the degree of firmness, muscle tone, or mass and/or weight of the animal.

E. Use of any illegal substance or procedure that results in condemnation of the carcass of a market animal.

F. Adding of any foreign material (twine, hair, etc.) to any part of the body in attempt to disguise or alter the conformation or condition of the animal.

G. The use of graphite.

H. Administration of any substance (internal or external) that is not used according to the label instructions.

I. Excessive force of handling animals.

J. Physical abuse of an animal, either in barns, on the grounds, or in the show ring by the exhibitor or his/her parent or representatives, extension agents or agriculture teachers may result in both animals and exhibitor being dismissed from the show(s).

44. PROTEST PROCEDURE:

A. All protests must be made in writing, plainly stating the reason for the protest or appeal and must be filed with the Chairman of the Pendleton County Youth Fair, FFA Advisor or 4-H Agent within 24 hours of the species specific show. All protest must be accompanied by a \$100 cash deposit which will be forfeited if the complaint is not sustained.

B. All protests will be considered at a time set by the Pendleton County Youth Fair Executive Committee and the interested parties will be notified and given the opportunity to submit evidence.

C. In addition to the right of protest herein guaranteed to interested parties, the Pendleton County Youth Fair Executive Committee expressly reserves the right to take cognizance of fraud, which may have been consummated or attempted, and to take such action as may be deemed just and proper.

45. Any questions not covered by the above rules will be referred to KDA guidleines.

Livestock Health Requirements

All livestock/animals offered for sale or exhibition at Kentucky County Fairs shall meet the following regulatios according to KRS Chapter 257:

a. 302 KAR 20:040 (Entry into Kentucky) b. 302 KAR 20:065 (Sale and Exhibition of Kentucky Orgin Livestock)

9. All lambs must be at fairgrounds by 5:00 p.m. July 30, 2020. Weigh-out 3:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m.

10. All lambs must weigh a minimum of 90 lbs. to qualify for sale. Any animal not making the minimum weight requirement on the first weigh-out can take the animal off the scale and re-enter the scales for a second weigh-out. Animals may NOT leave the scale area before second weigh-out.

Breeding Classes:

1. Pedigrees of sheep must be recorded in the American or Foreign Record for particular breed to which they belong. All sheep in purebred classes must be registered in the flock books of their respective breeds and bear the American ear tags of their Association as required. Any lamb without papers will show as a crossbred.

2. No muzzles are allowed in the sheep barn.

 Use of artificial coloring disqualifies exhibits.
 SPECIAL RULE PERTAINING TO SOUTHDOWNS: Southdown sheep are to be shown slick sheared.

5. LAMB CLASSES: Animals shown in lamb classes must have all lamb teeth and show in the class determined by their registration papers.

6. See general rules for protests, health regulations and other information.

4. All goats must have KUIP tag, scrapie tag/ID, and health papers for show/sale.

5. To be eligible for rate of gain, animal must be weighed at an official validation site for initial weights and reported to the 4-H Agent/ FFA Advisor.

6. Goats must be born after September 1, 2019.

7. Horns are optional, but must be tipped. Tipped is defined as the end of the horn squared off to 1/2 inch in diameter or larger. Judge may make determination.

8. All market goats must be clipped to <1/4

inch hair above hocks.

9. All male goats must be properly castrated at weigh-in. (Banded or surgically removed – clamping is not allowed.)

10.Exhibitor may enter market wethers and/or market does. Induced cryptorchids (short scrotum kids) and buck goats may not be shown or any wether kid showing signs of secondary sexual characteristics may not be shown.

11. No artificial color.

12. All goats must be at fairgrounds by 5:00 p.m. July 30, 2020. Weigh-out 3:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.

13. All goats must weigh a minimum of 70 lbs. to qualify for sale. Any animal not making the minimum weight requirement on the first weigh-out can take the animal off the scale and re-enter the scales for a second weigh-out. Animals may NOT leave the scale area before second weigh-out.

Breeding:

1. Original registration certificates are required, except that a copy of a registration application, stamped with the date received by one of the listed associations, can be accepted for kids less than 3 months of age. Animals over the age of 3 months must have the original regiatration certificate in hand at time of show.

2. The documents specified above as the requirements for that age animal to be shown must be presented to the show secretary for verification before the judging begins.

3. All goats must have legible tattoos consistent with the registration certificate or the animal will be disqualified. If an animal is disqualified due to illegible or inconsistent tattoos, all lower placing animals will be moved up in placement. Point winners from each class must have their tattoos read and recorded. The judge will be responsible for ensuring that tattoos are read and properly recorded. The show secretary will be responsible for recording the tattoos and informing the judge as to which point-eligible goats will need to be checked. An exhibitor that is showing an animal with a microchip as permanent id is required to provide a microchip reader for verification of animal identity.

4. Birth dates, as listed on the registration certificate, will be used in determining class divisions. In order to calculate the class breaks, take the show date and count back to the birth date to determine the age and class for the animal. 5. Classes: All animals must be registered Purebred, Fullblood or percentage blood Boer goats. Percentage doe classes are for 50% to 88% Boer; Fullblood classes are for does that are 93.75% and higher and bucks that are 96.87% and higher. Progeny of fresh does will not be allowed in the ring with their dam. The Champion and the Reserve Champion classes will be chosen from the 1st and 2nd place animals in that division of the show.

6. At the discretion of the judge and the superintendent, the animals may be let loose in the ring as a function of judging.

7. No animal bracing allowed at ABGA Sanctioned Shows. Goats front legs must be on the ground during judging. Front feet must remain on the arena floor during judges evaluation. Exhibitors may lift feet off the ground for a period not to exceed 10 seconds when posing the goat.

2. At the time of entry, all purebred animals entered in this department, including pigs under six (6) months old, must be properly named and recorded in the Herd Book of the breed association to which they belong.

3. All Berkshire swine must be registered by the American Berkshire Association (ABA), PO Box 2436, 1769 US 52 West, West Lafayette, IN 47996. Said registration paper must be presented at time of check in.

4. The ABA is the only Berkshire swine registry recognized by the National Association of Swine Records (NASR) and the National Pedigreed Livestock Council (NPLC)

5. An exhibitor of more than one purebred breed must have an active member of each breed association for more than ninety (90) days immediately prior to the show.

6. All animals to be exhibited must be properly checked in with show management prior to the show. Registration papers for purebreds must be present at check-in.

7. All animals exhibited must carry ear notches or ear tags identifying litter to which they belong.

8. All animals exhibited must be January, February or March pigs. Purebred breeding swine will be broken into classes based on age. Commercial breeding swine will be broken into classes based on weight. Exhibitors of Commercial breeding swine will need to turn in a weight card declaring weights.

9. All hogs eligible to compete must have been owned by exhibitor for at least sixty (60) days prior to the opening day of the Kentucky State Fair. For purebred animals, the day of purchase shall be construed to be the date transfer is recorded with Record Association. 10. All animals placing will be checked for ear notches or ear tags and registration papers will be required for purebred animals.

11. All purebred pigs shown must be registered in the Record Associations of the breeds to which they belong, and must be in the name of the exhibitor. All purebred pigs must exhibit typical breed characteristics.

12. Any animal that, in the opinion of the judge, is being shown out of class shall not be awarded a prize.


