Student Council

The Student Council is the student governing body which works with the faculty in planning school work and activities. This year's officers are Ron Gibbs, president; Judy Wolgast, vice-president; and Bonnie Elliott, secretary-treasurer. The faculty advisors are Mr. Luttmann and Mr. MacMillan. Each spring, one student from each advisory is chosen to become a member of Student Council.

One of its first activities this year was that of co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce in promoting a safe Hallowe'en for high and grade-school students. A square dance was held in Lincoln School for teen-agers, while younger students had games and concessions in our gym.

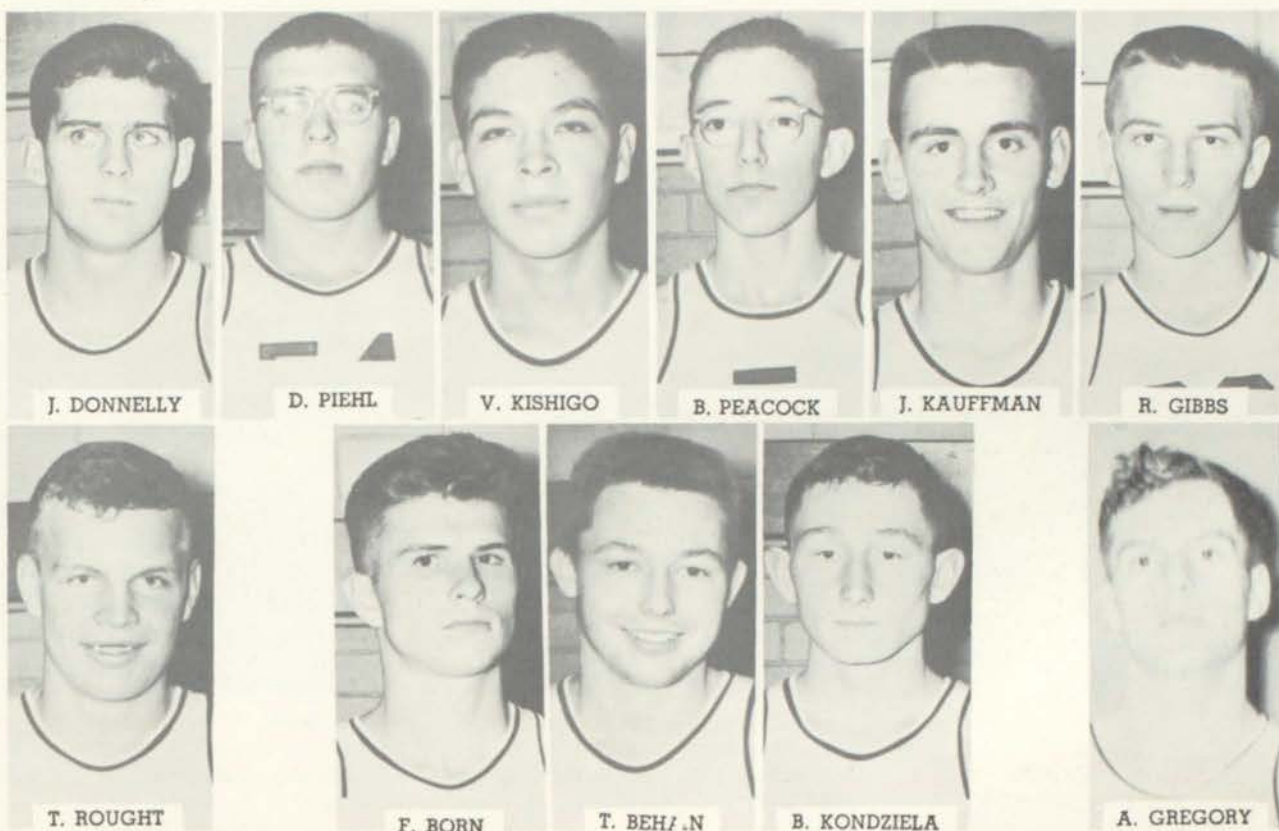
The Northmen, win or lose, have again put up a good fight. The 1953 football season proved a successful one, with Coach Schuster in command for the first time.
