These indicators were derived from data produced by the U.S. Census Bureau and may differ from data produced by other entities.

Black or African American Population in the United States, the Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), and the District of Columbia from 1950 to 2010

Introduction

The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) defines "Black or African American" as a person having origins in any of the Black racial groups of Africa. Black or African American also includes Sub-Saharan African entries, such as Kenyan and Nigerian; and Afro-Caribbean entries, such as Haitian and Jamaican. North African entries are classified as White, as OMB defines White as a person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, the Middle East, or North Africa.

This report provides an overview of the geographic distribution of Black or African American population at the national level, in the Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA), and in the District of Columbia for years 1950 to 2010.

Black or African American Population in the United States in 1950

According to the 1950 Census, the population of the United States was 150,697,361. Of this total, 15,042,286, or 10 percent, identified as Black or African American alone. In 1950, half or 51.2 percent of Blacks or African Americans in the United States lived in eight states (Georgia, North Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama, Texas, New York, Louisiana, and South Carolina). Georgia had the largest Black or African American population (1,062,762) followed by North Carolina (1,047,353), representing 7.1 percent and 7 percent of the nation's total Black or African American population, respectively. Georgia and North Carolina were the only states with Black or African American populations of at least 1 million (Table 1).

In 1950, thirteen states and the District of Columbia had proportions of Black or African American population higher than the national average of 10 percent. Mississippi had the highest Black or African American population share of its total population (45.3 percent), followed by South Carolina at 38.8 percent, and the District of Columbia at 35 percent (Table 1 & Map 1).


Black or African American Alone Population in the United States in 2010

According to the 2010 Census, the population of the United States was 308,745,538. In 2010, there were 38,929,319 Blacks or African Americans in the United States, accounting for 12.6 percent of the nation's total population – a growth of 2.6 percent since 1950 (60 years).

In 2010, half or 51.3 percent of Blacks or African Americans in the United States lived in eight states (New York, Florida, Texas, Georgia, California, North Carolina, Illinois and Maryland) – a general shift north and west since the 1950s. New York had the largest Black or African American population (3,073,800) and Florida had the second largest Black or African American population (2,999,862), representing 7.9 percent and 7.7 percent of the nation's total Black or African American population, respectively. A total of eighteen states had African American populations of at least 1 million (Table 2).

By 2010, sixteen states and the District of Columbia had proportions of Black or Africa American population higher than the national average of 12.6 percent. The District of Columbia had the highest Black or African American population share of its total population (50.7 percent), followed by Mississippi at 37 percent, and Louisiana at 32 percent (Table 2 and Map 2).




Black or African American Population in Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA) in 1990 (Data not available for 1950)

The Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA) includes 22 jurisdictions, with the District of Columbia at the hub of the region, joined by Montgomery, Prince George's, Charles, and Frederick counties in Maryland; Arlington, Fairfax, Loudoun, Prince William, Stafford, Spotsylvania, Fauquier, Clarke, and Warren counties, and the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, Manassas Park, and Fredericksburg in Virginia; and Jefferson County in West Virginia.

According to the 1990 Census, the Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area had a total population of 4,122, 914. Of the total, 1,062,696 or 25.8 percent were Blacks or African Americans. In 1990, more than two-thirds or 72.4 percent of Blacks or African Americans in the Washington Primary Metropolitan area lived in the District of Columbia and Prince George's County. The District of Columbia had the largest Black or African American population (399,604), accounting for 37.6 percent and Prince George's County had the second largest (369,791), representing 34.8 percent of the Washington Metropolitan Area's total Black or African American population (Table 3). The District of Columbia and Prince George's County also had the highest proportions of Black or African American population share of their total population (65.8 percent and 50.7 percent, respectively) in the Washington Metropolitan Area (Table 3 and Map 3).

Black or African American Population in Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA) in 2010


According to the 2010 Census, the total population of the Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA) was 5,582,170, of which 1,438,436 or 25.8 percent were Blacks or African Americans (no change in percent from 1990).

In 2010, more than half or 59.9 percent of Blacks or African Americans in the Washington Primary Metropolitan Area lived in Prince George's County and the District of Columbia. Prince George's County had the largest Black or African American population (556,620), accounting for 38.7 percent and the District of Columbia had the second largest (305,125), representing 21.2 percent of the Washington Primary Metropolitan Area's total Black or African American population (Table 4). The Black population in Prince George's County, MD increased over 185,000 in 20 years since 1990 while the Black population in the District of Columbia decreased by 94,000, in the same period.

By 2010, Prince George's County had the highest Black of African American share of its total population (64.5 percent), followed by the District of Columbia at 50.7 percent, and Charles County at 41 percent (Table 4 and Map 4).

Black or African American Population in the District of Columbia in 1950

Census 1950 counted 802.178 residents in the District of Columbia, of which 280,803 or 35 percent were Blacks of African Americans. Blacks or African Americans lived in all wards across the District, however, the highest concentrations were in Wards 1, 2, 6, and 7 (Map 5).

Blacks or African Americans in Ward 6 constituted 29.7 percent of the District's total Black or African American population, while Blacks or African Americans in Ward 3 accounted for only 0.5 percent. Ward 6 also had the highest Black or African American share of its total population (57.8 percent), followed by Ward 1 at 47.7 percent, Ward 7 at 43.8 percent and Ward 2 at 39.1 percent (Table 5).

Map 5. District of Columbia Black or African American Population as a Percent of **Census Tract Population: 1950**



Black or African American Population in the District of Columbia in 2010

In 2010, the U.S. Census Bureau counted 601,723 residents in the District of Columbia, of which, 305,125 or 50.7 percent were Blacks or African Americans. Blacks or African Americans lived in all Wards across the District, however, highest concentrations were in Wards 4, 5, 7, and 8 (Map 6) – the eastern half of the city.

According to the 2010 Census, using the 2012 Ward boundaries, more than three-fourths or 77.9 percent of Blacks or African Americans in the District lived in four Wards (Ward 4, 5, 7, and 8). Ward 8 had the largest Black or African American population (68,944), representing 22.6 percent of the District's total Black or African American population, while Ward 3 accounted for only 1.3 percent. In 2010, Ward 7 had the highest Black or African American population share of its total population (94.6 percent), followed by Ward 8 at 93.6 percent, Ward 5 at 76 percent and Ward 4 at 58.7 percent (Table 6).

Map 6. District of Columbia Black or African American Population as a Percent of Census Tract Population: 2010


