

## Eucalyptus macrorhyncha Red Stringy

A large tree, growing to 35m a with rounded canopy spreading to 20m. Thick fibrous red-brown bark that has deep furrows and glossy green lance-shaped leaves to 15cm. Profuse creamy-white flowers in summer and autumn.

Origin	NSW, ACT, Vic, SA.
Size	Up to 35 metres high, Up to 20 metres wide.
Cultural Notes	Prefers well-drained soils in full sun or part shade. Naturally occurs in well- drained clay soils or poor shallow soils on slopes and ridges. Does not like wet or compacted soils.
Tolerates	Tolerant of drought, frost and snow.
Flowers / Flowering Season	Flowing in summer and autumn. Clusters of creamy white flowers appear from small diamond-shaped buds. Fruit is large and round with three projecting valves.
Foliage Colour or Type	Adult foliage is glossy green, lanceolate and up to 15cm long. Often asymmetrical. Juvenile leaves are ovate with wavy margins and grow to 5cm in length and 3cm in width.
Soil Type	Well-draining soils are preferred. Clay soils are preferred. Naturally occurs with poorer soils and shallow soils on slopes and ridges.
Suited to	Attractive shade trees for larger

gardens or parklands.
