Activity 1: What are Calligrams?

- Calligrams are poems which create a shape.
- ❖ The shape of a calligram represents the topic of the poem.
- ❖ Calligrams are also known as shape poems or concrete poems.

Activity 3: Your turn!

You are going to choose an animal and design your own calligram.

Remember:

- ❖ Your Calligram should look like the shape of your animal
- ❖ It should include the letters of your animal
- ❖ It can include the letters more than once!

Part 2: Writing our own Calligram poem

We are going to write our own animal Calligram poem, this time using adjectives (describing words) and verbs (doing words) to describe the animal.



Look at the **verbs** used to describe this animal and the sea. Why have they been chosen?

Look at the dolphin calligram below. Write one list of all the **adjectives** you can find, and one list of all the **verbs** you can find.



Activity 2: Plan our Calligram: Adjectives and Verbs

You are going to pick an animal and write down all the **adjectives** and **verbs** you can think of to describe it. Look at the example below then try one yourself.



Activity 3: Plan our Calligram: Facts

Read the Calligrams below. They don't just use adjectives and verbs, but they also use facts about the animal!
