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PREFACE

Despite the historic significance of pamphlets in shaping and reflecting our past, they have rarely flowed into channels sifted by scholars. The reasons are not difficult to discern. Most pamphlets were privately printed, in limited editions, with local, uncertain distribution. Major universities and institutions have been unable to collect more than a fraction of the total, and even these collections have been difficult to organize. Indeed, most collections are incomplete, uncataloged, and inaccessible, leaving the scholar at sea.

Pamphlets in American History is a massive publishing effort to recapture this literature and tie it down bibliographically, so that scholars of every aspect of our national heritage can find what they need. The aim is to gather all the pamphlets on each important historical subject and publish them on microfiche with the bibliographic tools necessary for easy accessibility.

To structure the program and provide editorial balance, the program is under the direction of an editorial board of leading American historians, each noted for his use of primary sources. The members of the editorial board are:

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Under their guidance the program seeks to preserve on microfiche as many pamphlets as possible on every major period and theme in American history. This means that previously neglected voices as well as the more famous ones can be heard again, evaluated more thoroughly, and measured against words hitherto unknown to the scholarly community.

The initial source of the program is the 150,000-item pamphlet collection at the State Historical Society of Wisconsin. Collecting and cataloging began there in 1846, and have continued to this day. This initial source is being supplemented by the following collections: the Tamimant Library of New York University, the Syracuse University Libraries, the New-York Historical Society, the Kenneth Spencer Research Library of the University of Kansas, and the Walter Clinton Jackson Library of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. These libraries have contributed to the first three installments of Pamphlets in American History. Many other libraries will contribute in this ongoing program as the search for relevant historical collections continues.

ORGANIZATION OF THE GUIDE

This guide provides access to the 5,288 pamphlets in Group I of Pamphlets in American History. It is divided into five types of indexes.

First, numerical indexes list short-title citations in verified National Union Catalog form for the five subject series published in Group I:

The alpha-numeric location devices by which citations are arranged in the numerical indexes consist of the prefix or abbreviation for the subject series followed by a consecutive number. A typical citation, representing the 100th item in the "Women" series, would be:

WO 100 Curtis, George William, 1824-1892.

An address vindicating the right of woman to elective franchise . . . New York, 1858.

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The numerical indexes are followed by author, title, subject, and chronological indexes. Each of these is comprehensive for the collection as a whole. The location devices under the entries in these indexes are the alpha-numerics by which the numerical indexes and the microfiche themselves are arranged. The user should customarily refer from an entry in the author, title, subject or chronological index to the particular citation in the appropriate numerical index before turning to the actual microfiche. Below are typical entries in the author, title, subject, and chronological indexes, a citation in a numerical index to which each entry refers, and the actual microfiche in question.





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
