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FOREWORD

The Flood of 1993 was a natural disaster of unprecedented proportion for the Midwest. Flood waters covered more than 17 million acres in nine states, damaging or destroying more than 50,000 homes and forcing the evacuation of 85,000 residents. Forty-eight people were killed. The water caused extensive damage to infrastructures, including levees, roads, and bridges, and closed essential operations, such as electrical power plants, drinking water plants, and sewage treatment facilities, in many areas. Estimates of financial losses exceed \$20 billion and continue to mount.

Midwest farmers proved particularly vulnerable. They suffered the worst crop losses since the 1930's and often failed to qualify for assistance because of details related to their occupation. Flood conditions amplified health and safety risks, with rates of respiratory disease, skin infections, depression, and domestic violence more than doubling in the months following the flood. The situation was further exacerbated by the widespread disruption of health care services. The scale of this disaster tested our ability to respond, and forced a critical review of our capabilities for disaster preparedness, especially in the area of environmental health.

To address these issues, the first in a series of workshops focusing on environmental health aspects of this disaster was held at The University of Iowa on November 8 and 9, 1993. The *Farm Flood Response Workshop: Implications for Agricultural Safety and Health* brought together representatives from government, relief agencies, academia, and other organizations to: 1) delineate anticipated health risks and needs; 2) identify existing resources and gaps in resources; and 3) propose specific recommendations for ongoing recovery activities. Participants identified the need for access to information on health and safety as one of the most critical issues. Although technical assistance was available from many sources -- the Federal Emergency Management Agency, American Red Cross, Departments of Public Health, National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, and others -- the consistency, accuracy, and accessibility of this information was problematic.

This resource guide offers a first attempt for accomplishing the workshop recommendation No. 1.1: ***"...assemble a resource guide containing technical articles and inventories of services and keep it up to date."*** The document provides a state-by-state inventory of federal, state, and private organizations involved in preparedness and response to natural disasters. However, this guide will need to be updated and added to on a regular basis as contacts and phone numbers change.

The continued impact of natural disasters (e.g., earthquakes in California and flooding in Georgia and Texas) reinforces the critical need to improve our capabilities for preparedness and response. It is our hope that this resource guide will prove useful not only for the agricultural community affected by flooding, but also for the greater community in preparing for future natural disasters.

Flood Facts At A Glance -- April 1, 1994

The Illinois agricultural industry suffered:

- Flooding of 884,000 acres of cropland, mostly corn and soybeans
- \$425 million damage to crops
- \$110 million damage to farm buildings
- \$75 million damage to conservation practices and structures

The Illinois National Guard spent 126,669 person days on State Active duty between July 1, 1993 and October 31, 1993. Total costs were over \$14 million.

The Department of Corrections supplied 12,278 inmates days for sandbagging, while another 5,467 days were provided for cleanup. Inmates continue to assist communities in the clean-up process.

During the 4-week period beginning July 27th, approximately 4.2 million gallons of potable water were distributed by the Illinois Department of Public Health in the Alton/Madison County area as follows:

- 2.0 million were distributed to the general public through 20 water distribution sites.
- 1.4 million gallons were provided to the Alton Mental Health and Developmental Center (an Illinois DMHDD facility).
- 750 thousand gallons were provided to three hospitals and 19 long-term care facilities, serving 1900 patients.
- 200,000 one-gallon water jugs were distributed at the bulk water sites.
- 8,950,000 gallons of bottled water were provided to other communities that lost their water supplies or whose quality was compromised.

Illinois public facilities were effected as follows:

- 1000 portable toilets obtained for Alton, the Menard Correctional Center, and other communities.
- 36 health care facilities were directly impacted by the flood, and three long-term care facilities housing 137 residents were evacuated.
- 994 cases of ready-to-feed infant formula have been provided statewide through the WIC program.
- 53 non-community public water supplies were flooded, including 30 food establishments; all have been or will be inspected, sampled, and tested for bacterial contamination.
- An estimated 3000 private water wells and a similar number of private sewage disposal systems were flooded.

Illinois Department of Transportation trucks hauled:

- 242,800 tons of sand/aggregate -- or 22,300 truckloads
- 7,000,000 sandbags
- Flood debris from shredder sites at Hull, Valmeyer and Kampsville. (A shredder compactor is in use processing 80 tons of debris an hour reducing it by up to 70 percent.)

Other transportation facts:

- 291.5 miles of highways were closed at 64 different locations.
- Twelve bridges and four ferries were closed. Two ferries remain closed.
- Fifteen railroad sites of over 150 miles were closed.
- 610 employees with 400 trucks and 75 endloaders were involved in flood response.

The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency reported that:

- 52 Wastewater treatment plants were impacted
- 49 Public Water Treatment plants impacted.

(Flood Facts at a Glance, cont'd.)

The Illinois Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (DMHDD) and its supporting agencies and local mental health organizations have served 15,830 persons through the Crisis Counseling program. DMHDD received \$547,000 from FEMA under the Immediate Crisis Counseling Grant program.

The Illinois State Board of Education reports that:

- 1,454 school students were displaced from their normal school buildings; four of which were flooded and 62 of which were impacted by the flood.
- 49 temporary classrooms are in use.
- Four additional buses are in use.
- Impacted students have traveled an extra 84,077 miles for a cost of almost \$200,000.
- Estimated donations of cash and supplies donated to various school districts exceed \$96,000.
- The Department of Child Nutrition has made available 11,763 cases of commodities with a value of \$239,006 to feeding sites and disaster relief agencies.

The Illinois Department of Public Aid provided 183,604 pounds of surplus commodities with a value of approximately \$81,000.

The Illinois Department of Revenue identified 3,713 taxpayers affected; however, 188,900 flood relief information handouts have been distributed.

The Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs has received \$10 million to provide temporary employment to dislocated workers to assist in community clean-up and repair operations.

- 677 persons have been employed to date.
- More than 3,000 households have been assisted through the Low Income Home Energy Assistance and Community Service Block Grant programs.

The Illinois Department of Conservation has identified 23 sites (parks, conservation areas, etc.) damaged by the flood. Estimates for debris removal and restoration is \$4,111,052.

The Illinois Department of Historic Preservation reported losses of \$369,785 at three state historic sites: Kaskaskia Bell Memorial, the Pierre Menard site, and Fort de Chartes.

Levee Reconstruction Status:

- On the Mississippi River, work continues on the Lima Lake, Columbia, and Kaskaskia Island levees.
- SCS reports the Len-Small repair work is almost complete.
- Along the Illinois River, final work on the Nutwood levee is expected to be completed today.

Federal Disaster Assistance:

- The Federal share of eligible costs has been increased to 90 percent.
- The Federal Highway Administration worked with IDOT- Water Resources to coordinate the dewatering efforts.
- 729 mobile homes have been requested; 718 are already on site, and 689 are or have been occupied. (Sites are open at Red Bud, Niota, Waterloo, Grafton, New Canton, and Kinderhook.)

(Flood Facts at a Glance, cont'd.)

Mitigation/Relocation Efforts:

The State of Illinois has received \$36 million to be used for buyouts in 28 different communities (1,297 structures, 240 of which are farm residences). Twenty-three jurisdictions have been approved. Applications are still pending for Valmeyer, Grafton, Keithsburg, Niota, and Hardin. These communities have chosen to relocate, and the environmental assessments have not been completed. These applications are expected to be approved shortly. Seventy-five percent of the funds for these buyouts have come from FEMA through this agency; the 25 percent match comes from IDCCA funds under CDAP.

Another \$2.9 million is available for 16 communities to elevate 127 structures. These funds came from IDCCA (CDPA). Fourteen jurisdictions are on a standby list and will be assisted as more money becomes available.

Volunteer Agency Operations:

- The Flood Assistance Hotline generated 22,344 calls (64,275 minutes).
- The American Red Cross served over 850,000 meals, assisted over 5,300 families, and distributed over 10,000 comfort kits. They opened 31 shelters for approximately 2,900 persons.
- 38 fixed feeding sites were operated through the flood area. Fourteen services centers were opened.
- 130 families have been referred back to the Red Cross by the Disaster Field Office after receiving maximum IFG awards.
- 17,480 American Red Cross volunteers and paid staff served in the Midwest Flood Relief Operations. Eighty percent of all staff assigned were volunteers.
- The cost of providing Red Cross assistance to victims is estimated to exceed \$35 million.

Impacts of the Flood of 1993 in Illinois (and Beyond)**

D I D Y O U K N O W ?

Flood waters disrupted Illinois life in many ways. Reports indicate the disaster caused:

- Six deaths, many illnesses, and high levels of anxiety over loss and displacement.
- Displacement of more than 16,000 people.
- Loss or severe damage of more than 6,000 homes.
- Loss of income and loss of more than 10,000 jobs due to flooded employment places or inaccessibility of employment for prolonged periods of time.
- Evacuation of communities and loss of service support systems. A total of 18 Illinois communities were severely flooded, and 17 communities either lost supplies or suffered damaged systems.

On an agricultural level, the disaster caused:

- Loss of 312,000 acres of corn and 276,000 acres of soybeans, as of July 15, 1993.
- Loss of 873,000 acres total of farmland, which represents about 3 to 4 percent of the state's planted acreage.
- Damages to crops and unplanted lands totaling about \$425 million.
- Damages to buildings and farm equipment totaling about \$110 million.

Other states in the region also suffered considerable agricultural damages:

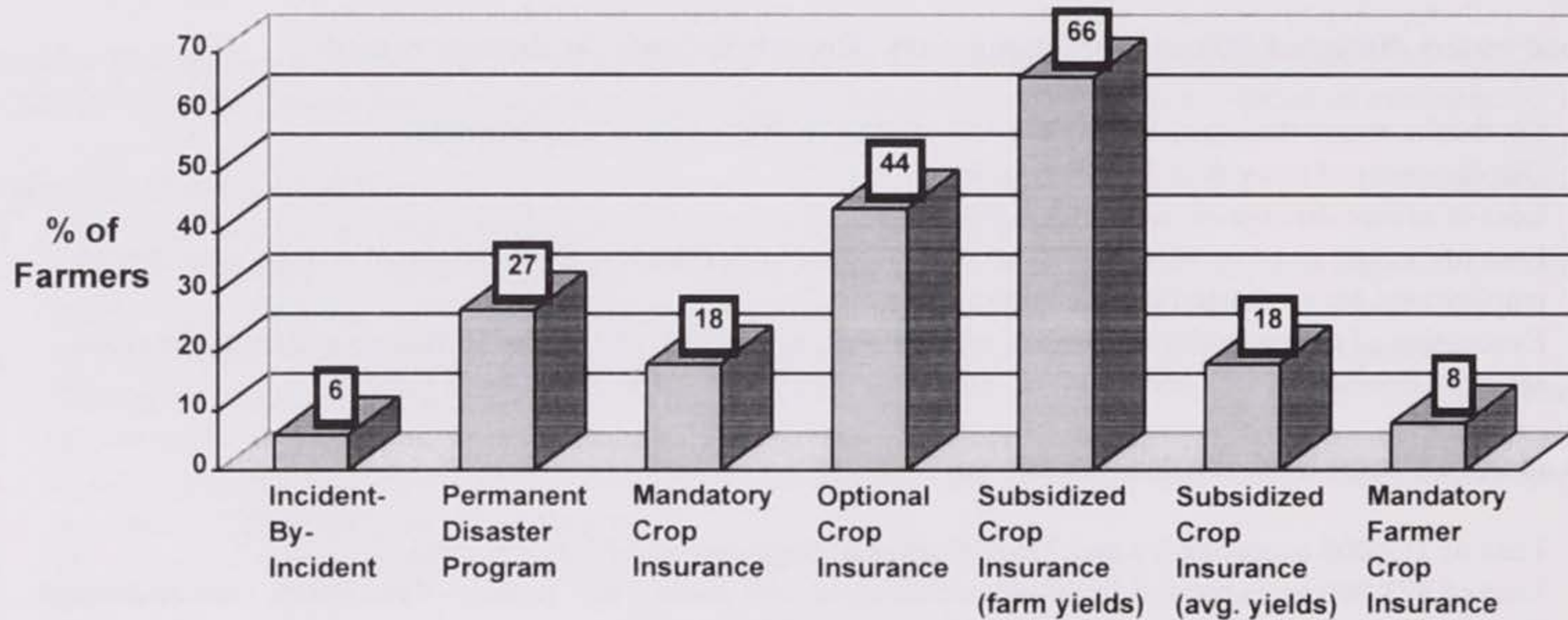
- In Wisconsin, farm damages and crop losses have been estimated between \$125 million and \$200 million.
- In Wisconsin, 7 percent of the state's cropland suffered severe erosion that will cost producers about \$10.8 million to repair.
- In Iowa, farm damages and crop losses have been estimated to exceed \$1.37 billion.

*Farmers' Opinions on Government's Role in Disaster Protection ***



According to the more than 2,000 farm operators surveyed in the *1994 Iowa Farm and Rural Life Poll*:

- Six percent of farmers polled said they wanted Congress to make disaster program decisions on an incident-by-incident basis.
- Twenty-seven percent said that government should develop a permanent disaster program for losses that exceed 50 percent and encourage farmers to buy additional private crop insurance protection.
- Eighteen percent said they wanted government to set up a mandatory crop insurance program for all farmers as a condition of eligibility for additional disaster payments.
- Forty-four percent said government should get out of crop insurance and let farmers buy optional private crop insurance.
- Sixty-six percent said if government were to offer a subsidized crop insurance program and no disaster program, that farmers should buy insurance on a voluntary basis using individual farm yields as a basis for coverage.
- Eighteen percent agreed that farmers should buy voluntary crop insurance but said coverage should be based on county average yields with no pay-off unless county yields drop more than 10 percent.
