## Christian Ethics Stressed

Bible I students studied the creation and its different theories. Following the covenant through the Old Testament, they learned about the judges, prophets, and kings of the Israelites. The sophomores used the book Who Says, which discusses a variety of questions about God, the Bible, and the Christian faith.

Church history classes observed
the growth of the Christian Church, with emphasis on the Reformation. Each student did a term paper on the history and distinctive principles of his own denomination. One of the senior Bible classes, religions, looked at major religions and cults such as the Hare Krishnas. Covered in the ethics classes were such current issues as abortion and capital punishment.

First year Latin students translated Latin cartoon and plays, and played Scrabble using Latin words after memorizing basic grammar. Sophomores learned more grammar and also translated the New Testament book of John. The junior and senior Latin "scholars" translated readings and read literature in English by Roman authors.

Freshmen taking German learned the grammar and vocabulary needed for conversation, elementary reading, and writing. To help them, they listened to tapes through headphones. Those in second year German increased their listening and speaking skills. The play "Biederman und die Brandstifter" by Max Frisch was studied by third and fourth year German students.

## Planets are Studied

The biology classes used more than their textbooks in their studies. While learning about the body and its systems, they dissected a worm and a frog. They examined the different species of plants and animals and went bird-watching. The students in physical science studied and experimented with motors, generators, electricity, and telephones. Those
taking chemistry learned about atoms and their construction and about molecules. Using experiments, they discovered many things about chemical reactions. Juniors and seniors in physics looked at planets and their movements, atoms, motion, and electricity. They also studied air waves, water waves, and light waves.

## Students Tackle Math

different kinds of equations and inequalities and worked with linear functions and relations. Mazes, string designs, and mobiles were just some of the things made for the algebra project. Advanced math, usually taken by college-bound students interested in math-related courses, dealt with trigonometry and calculus.

Freshman algebra students studied the real number system, worked with the properties of addition and multiplication and worked with polynomials. Geometry brings back memories of proofs, using postulates and theorems. Students found a lot of use for their compasses while they worked with angles and triangles. The junior algebra classes solved

## Business Skills Displayed

Students learned basic skills in personal typing and practiced forms for letters and reports. In the second year of business typing, students increased their speed. They also learned how to do specialized forms which are used in a business office. Shorthand
students typed from their notes and learned correct forms for reports and letters. Bookkeeping involved learning how to keep the financial records of a business. Students also were taught about bank reconciliations, income tax, and keeping a checkbook.

## Social Studies Emphasizes Awareness

Government class strongly emphasized that students should be aware of what is happening. Newsweek magazine was a major source of keeping them in touch with the world. Sociology and psychology dealt with how we should respond to the needs of others. Marriage and alcoholism were used as topics for open discussion. Economics and a new class, economic history, tried to
determine who should get what in today's society. Debate centered on Marxism, capitalism and socialism. Freshman students conditioned themselves to taking many notes during the one-semester world history class. As one project in U.S. history, juniors were challenged to learn the placement of each state along with the name of its capital; frequent map quizzes checked their progress.

## Literature Reviewed

The freshmen covered a variety of subjects. They studied three novels, grammar, short stories, and had experience in drama and writing Freshmen speech students fought to overcome stage fright as they prepared for their speeches. American literature classes read and studied the writings of different American authors. They also learned the correct way to do a term paper and then
they put their knowledge into practice by writing about a career. The juniors could choose from nine-week and one-semester courses grammar, literature, writing, drama, debate, and speech. Seniors studied various types of literature from different periods in English history. Along with four novels, they examined a sixteenth-century play, some ballads, poetry, and short stories.

## Practical Arts Learned

Beginning home ec students learned the basics of cooking; various concoctions were created and proved edible. The sewing machines were put to use and the girls modeled their finished products at the "Spring Carrousel." Advanced students studied family living; a day-care center was set up to provide experience with pre-schoolers.
