

Hornor To Be Lead Presenter At AP Conference


MCI Dean of Academics Jim Hornor will be a lead presenter at the 2006 AP Annual Conference this July in Lake Buena Vista, Florida.

Thanks For The Memories...

MCI's Bessey Retiring

In all his years of teaching at MCI, Ron Bessey has seen a lot. He's seen the campus change and grow, he's seen thousands of students pass through his classroom and on to become successful adults, and he's seen teaching methods change. But through it all, one thing in Bessey's life has not changed – his love of teaching.

"Teaching has always been my career, not my job," Bessey said. But after 34 years, Bessey is calling 2005-2006 his final year of teaching. He'll retire from MCI in the spring.

Not only has Bessey been a vital part of the MCI faculty for years, he's also an alum. He graduated in



1962, then went on to Bates College to get his teaching degree. College degree in hand, Bessey returned to MCI in 1966 to teach

history, and stayed for two years. He left after that to run a pharmacy in Westbrook for a number of years.

Bessey finally settled on a teaching career at MCI for good in 1973 – for \$50 a month! "I think they paid me out of the janitorial fund at the time," he recalled.

In his time at MCI Bessey has made major contributions. He was instrumental in creating the Senior Projects program as well as the Humanities program – two of his proudest accomplishments. The Senior Projects program, he believes, comes to MCI seniors at the exact time when their interest in school is waning. "They've got 'senioritis' and really need something different to work on," he said. Bessey believes the Senior Projects give the students a feeling of pride and more. "Some of them get the chance to explore the career they've chosen," he explained. "They learn self-discipline and how to work independently."

As a fitting tribute to Bessey's service to MCI, the school has established an endowed chair in his name. He said he's honored by the faculty chair. "I look at it as a way of helping the school, and that's a good thing," he said. "It's nice to have such recognition."

When he finishes his last day of teaching at MCI this year, Bessey is planning to get back to another passion – recording the history of the school where he's spent the better part of his life. He's been working on a book about MCI for about five years, but is hoping that retirement will give him the time he needs to really focus on the project. "MCI is an excellent school and has excellent potential," he said. "There's been lots of growth here and nothing has really been written about it. Besides, if anyone should know something about MCI, I should!"

After teaching for so many years, Bessey's contributions to the MCI community are too many to count. He's hoping that his students, most of all, will remember him for one thing. "I hope students can look back on their time with me and say they learned to think and use ideas," he said.

Lobster-palooza

Jeff Hazell '79 Built His Business On The Tasty Crustacean

Jeff Hazell '79 admits that when he graduated from high school, he didn't know what he wanted to do. He joined the Maine Central Institute PG football program and spent a year in Pittsfield, and it turned his life around.

"MCI got me going in the right direction," Hazell said. That direction led Hazell down a path that enabled him to become a seafood entrepreneur and restaurant owner.

Born and raised in Marblehead, Mass., Hazell went on to the University of New Haven's Hotel/Restaurant Management program after he graduated from MCI, and continued to play football there. In his junior year of college, a representative from Disney visited the campus and he was able to snag an internship at a Disney World restaurant in Orlando, Florida.

Hazell enjoyed his time in Orlando so much that after he graduated from college, he returned, working for TGI Fridays. He returned to Marblehead for his 24th birthday and spent time with his father, a lifelong lobsterman, on the open sea. "We went out lobstering one day, and when I saw the lobsters being packed up for shipping later on, I thought I should try to sell lobsters from Orlando." Hazell was inspired, and he began building a few tanks, setting them up in his garage at the time, and

wholesaling lobsters to restaurants in Florida. "Within 6 months I had moved out of the garage and stepped up to more product," he said. He rented a warehouse and the wholesaling business soon

expanded to include restaurants throughout most of Florida, from Sarasota to Jacksonville.

In 1991, Hazell opened his first restaurant, the Boston Lobster Feast. There are now three in the Orlando area. "It is, as far as I know, the only all-youcan-eat lobster and seafood restaurant," Hazell said. Between the three restaurants, they serve about 600,000 people a year.

After 20 years, Hazell still loves what he does. "I love that it's different every day. I love seeing people smiling at the restaurants, enjoying the food and telling us how much they love it," he said.

The Life of Doherty

Richard Doherty '50 Always Finds Time To Play

From humble beginnings Richard Doherty has lived a life of academia and adventure.

Born and raised on a farm in Newport, Doherty can still recall his first taste of butter pecan ice cream at the age of 2. He went into business for himself at the tender age of 7, after his father gave him a flock of chicks to raise and sell the eggs.

But it was at MCI that Doherty's life changed. He hitchhiked to school every day after milking the cows, and, though he loved school, he admitted he didn't push himself academically. He didn't really have a plan for life after high school, but Howard Niblock recognized the spark in Doherty and encouraged him to apply to Bowdoin College, where he would embark on a career in medicine.

"Niblock was my life saver," Doherty recalled. "He really felt that I would have ended up in a bad way if I had stayed in Pittsfield much longer."

After Bowdoin, Doherty went on to Amherst College, then Columbia Medical School. He continued on to his residency at a children's hospital in Boston, then Stanford Medical School to study molecular genetics. He taught in the pediatrics department, then went on to the University of Rochester to develop the medical genetics program there.

"I've lucked out to be in very good places," said Doherty. "I've had the opportunity to be a faculty member in the days when you could be very free with what you did, and had the opportunity to work with world-class staff at Stanford."

These days, Doherty is retired, but he's still in perpetual motion. "I recently decided to retire because I simply wasn't having enough time to play!" he said. He's living in Seattle, Wash with his children and grandchildren, and is busy traveling the world and exploring.

Through it all, Doherty still credits MCI and Niblock for setting him on his life's path. "MCI was my entrance into the world, a critical and pivotal lifetime experience for me, especially to be steered to college, which I otherwise thought was not in my future," he said.


