Have you ever heard of a student going P.S.E.O. and wondered what is it all about? P.S.E.O. is an abbreviation for the post secondary enrollment option program. This program gave students a chance to get a head start on their college career. Students could choose to go to a community or a state college for no cost, while the state paid for their education.

The P.S.E.O. program has been offered since the fall of 1985 . For a student to take advantage of the program they must first take an enrollment test at the college. They had to meet certain levels of achievement in order for the school to accept them with no charge. If they didn't pass/meet the minimum score for acceptance, the student was given another chance to take the test again.

Community colleges, like Century still let students attend as along as they were close enough to the minimum score. However, the student would be watched closely by the college to make sure they were keeping up.

There were almost 30 students from the school that attend college early as a P.S.E.O. student. The school of choice for most of the students was Century college because of the easy commute.

Charismatic Hill takes on the challenge and quickly convinces the townsmen that a boy's band is needed in River City. Hill earns the admiration of the school children. On the night Hill is to present the band, he attempts to abandon his promise, but his scheme is foiled by love. With a total of 1,500 books sold; the Forester Yearbook Staff knew they were off to a fantastic start. "Hardwork and detecation were the leading aspects that helped the staff meet four deadlines." commented Angela Hosfeild. Maria Kaiser advised the staff for her fourth year. Gretchen Gieske assisted in advising for her second year. For the 63rd edition of the Forester staff was enlarged; 17 people were added, with only six returning staff members. There were 13 seniors, four juniors, and six Sophomores.

Each of the four deadlines consisted of approximately 55 pages. There was also a spring supplement which was 24 pages. All together with the supplement and the 4 page tipin, the book had a total of 252 pages.

The book was a quarter bound with Red061 mylar and oatmeal with a mission grain. Applications to the cover include embossement, gold metalique text and Tan 88, with an applied compass.
