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## Heritage Festival is on for November

The future of the festival had been in doubt, but the event's organizers says the show will go on

SANFORD — It's 4-years-old and growing.

The fourth annual Sanford Heritage Festival will return to the downtown area in November. This year's celebration will include activities and events familiar to past festival-goers and also new attractions and performances, including the first Sanford Heritage Festival Regatta.

This year's festival is being produced Sanford Heritage Festival Inc. — a recent-

ly established corporation of local community leaders — in cooperation with the city of Sanford, Sanford Main Street, Hel:n Stairs Theatre and the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

"There was a community organization in the city that saw the value of the festival as a signature event in the community,"

Heritage Festival Event Consultant Ron Rose said. "They see the festival as having an impact on community development, which, in turn, has an impact on economic development."

Highlighting this year's festival is country singer Mark Wills, who made the country charts in 1996 with the song

"Jacob's Ladder." Other No. 1 hits by the reigning ACM Top New Male Vocalist include "I Do (Cherish You)," "Don't Laugh At Me," and "Wish You Were Here." Wills will perform two live concerts at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. Friday, Nov. 9.

New this year will be the Heritage Festival Regatta, a one-day event held on the shores of Lake Monroe. According to Mitty Events — the group organizing the event — the sport of rowing, once exclusive to the northeast, has exploded in the

## SCC delivers 'knockout' fun

SANFORD — The Seminole Community College campus was all fun and games Wednesday for the first day of classes.

Complete with a live band, numerous activities and free hot dogs, the first day of school looked more like a small town carnival, but that's exactly what college president Dr. Ann McGee intended it to be.

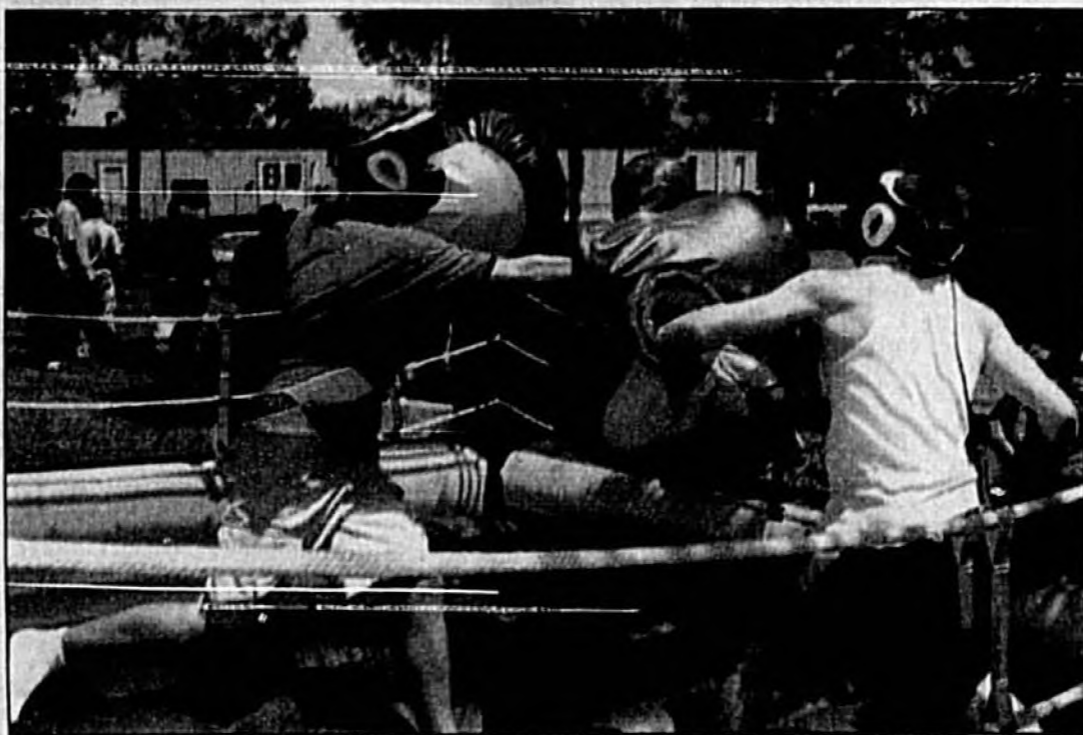
"I'm a firm believer in student activities," said McGee only minutes before entering the dunk tank to help raise money for scholarships. "The whole socialization is so important to college life. Look at these kids. This is a great time in their lives to explore and find themselves. We can help them do that inside and outside the classroom."

It only took several minutes before McGee found herself floating in the dunk tank reservoir. Other than helping raise money for scholarships, she said her participation in the traditional carnival game helped new students feel more comfortable around the school's administrators.

"I might be the president and he might be the vice president, but were just normal people," McGee said as she pointed to Dr. David Harrison as he took his turn in the dunk tank.

While most people don't envision themselves in a dunk tank anytime soon, McGee's philosophy must be paying off as the Seminole Community College increased its enrollment by 22 percent from last year.

nizations the event also proved to be an excellent recruiting tool as dozens of tables with brochures and smiling faces looked to persuade new students to join.

"We get all the students aware that Student Government Association is available on campus," said SGA secretary/treasurer Michael Torres of Winter Springs.

Student vice president Elizabeth Flor of Deltona agreed "You don't get much chance to talk to the students during the year so this is our biggest chance to recruit people."

Anthony Lewis, SGA president from Fern Park, also said the event can help "show students what's available," but more importantly, it helps students find their niche.

"A lot of these students come here with very different

backgrounds," said Lewis who changed his studies from pharmaceuticals to political science after joining SGA. "They can come here and get lost. Hopefully having them get involved in a club will help them."

## Printer foul-up causes confusion on tax bills

SANFORD — A printing error by a Volusia County company is causing concern for Seminole tax payers.

David Johnson, director of support services for the Seminole County Property Appraiser's Office, said 63,000 of the 157,000 tax bills listed the wrong phone number and some of the bills did not display the \$25,000 homestead exemption. However, Johnson said the bottom-line tax assessment is correct on all of the bills.

"On some of the bills, the printer did not display the exemptions, but those were calculated in the bottom-line figure, and those amounts are correct," Johnson said. "(Property owners) may not like the assessed value or the final amount, but the bottom line calculation is correct."

Johnson explained that the property appraiser's office contracted with DeLand based MBI Printers, which in turn subcontracted part of the job out to another company.

"Unbeknownst to us, MBI let another company do some of the printing," Johnson said. "In their zeal to win the bid, MBI later discovered they could not meet our timetable. That's when they subcontracted with the other company to finish the job on time."

When the job was transferred, Johnson said not all of the information calculated by the property appraiser's office was transferred to the new printing template.

"When you look at a tax bill, there are a lot of numbers listed," Johnson said. "That information is collected, calculated

## County cracks down on car dealers

SANFORD — Seminole County code enforcers are checking local car dealerships to see if they violate the county's land development code for displaying inflatable advertising displays, banners, pennants and flags.

The code enforcement board is sending the message loud and clear as they passed down several strict orders to two local dealerships for flying numerous advertising banners and flags. Bob Dance Dodge at 3775 North Highway 17-92 in Longwood and Bill Heard Chevrolet at 127 Oregon St. North in Sanford were both subject to code violation fines as a result of the board's recent meeting.

According to Matt West of the county planning and development department, codes permit property owners only four flags, and banners are only allowed for grand openings or by a special exemption permit.

Bob Dance Dodge was hit the hardest by fines as the board ruled that the dealership did not make changes after they were warned of violations back in January 1998. All the fines from the 1998 code violations were dropped at a July 1999 meeting, but code inspectors again found the dealership in violation of codes in May 2001.

For the dealership's repeat offenses, the board ordered a fine of \$20,500 and said the total amount will continue to increase at \$250 a day until the problem is remedied.

Bill Heard Chevrolet may escape fines, if they follow the board's order to remove banners from the maintenance shop and flags from the light poles in the parking lot by Aug. 6. However, a slight change with the current flags flying above the dealership may prevent the dealership from having to remove them.

"Their lawyers asked for an interpretation on the code for banners, flags — or what ever you want to call them," said

deputy county attorney Steve Lee.

According to Lee, the county was sued several years ago for trying to regulate the number of American Flags on a property. It was ruled unconstitutional to do so and when appealed to the Fifth District Court of Appeals the court exercised its right not to hear the case.

"It's our view that all other flags are subject to the code," Lee said. "We interpret the law but we don't make a decision on what's an American Flag and what's not."

According to dealership general manager Joe Ruth, in the next couple weeks expect American flags to replace the dozens of flags flying over Bill Heard Chevrolet.

The dealership's code violations may not end with the flags. West said inspectors were to revisit the dealership this week to check its electronic message board.

According to West, the code

Once again, plans are under way for a Depression Glass Show, scheduled for Sept. 14 through Sept. 16, in the Sanford Civic Center.

Twenty-seven top quality, knowledgeable dealers will be participating. They will be representing 11 different states.

Gene Florence, well-known author, will be the special guest. He will be on hand the entire weekend and will be offering new

books for sale. He'll have the sixth edition of "Kitchenware of the Depression Era," "40s, '50s and '60s Glassware," and "Encyclopedia of Depression Glass," as well as the sixth edition of "Occupied Japan." Florence will also be autographing books.

## Helms leaves

But, what he stands for still exists

North Carolina mossback Jesse Helms has finally announced his decision to retire in 2003, but the official declaration came as something of an anticlimax. Not only had the announcement been expected, but Helms had also been forced out of his powerful post as chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee months earlier.

Indeed, the Senate takeover by Democrats — prompted by Sen. Jim Jeffords' desertion from the GOP — probably was the final straw for Helms, who will be 80 in October. He has struggled with declining health for years. But his suffering was probably ameliorated by the pleasure he took in using his post to lambast the United Nations, harass Fidel Castro, and block diplomatic appointees who did not pass a series of right-wing litmus tests. Alas, those pesky Democrats took that away from him.

Now that he is finally leaving after a 30-year Senate career, it is tempting to celebrate. After all, Helms harkens back to the worst of Southern traditions — racism, xenophobia, and a right-wing religious fanaticism that justifies both. In the 1960s, he gained public attention as a North Carolina broadcaster who railed against the civil rights movement, Vietnam War protesters, court-ordered busing and welfare. He attacked the U.S. Supreme Court for banning prayer in public schools.

In 1990, when Helms faced opposition for his Senate seat from Charlotte mayor Harvey Gantt, who is African-American, Helms ran a TV ad showing a white hand clutching a job rejection letter. The voice-over said: "You needed that job. And you were the best qualified. But they had to give it to a minority because of a racial quota. Is that really fair? Harvey Gantt says it is." Never mind that Gantt had said nothing like that, and, besides, racial quotas are virtually non-existent.

The nation will be better off when Helms leaves the Senate. But any celebration of Helms' departure is muted by a look at the contemporary political climate: The culture war rages on. Not only in the South, but also in many other parts of the country, there are fringe extremists in positions of power and influence, railing against equal rights for women and people of color, denouncing gays and lesbians, and trying to halt immigration.

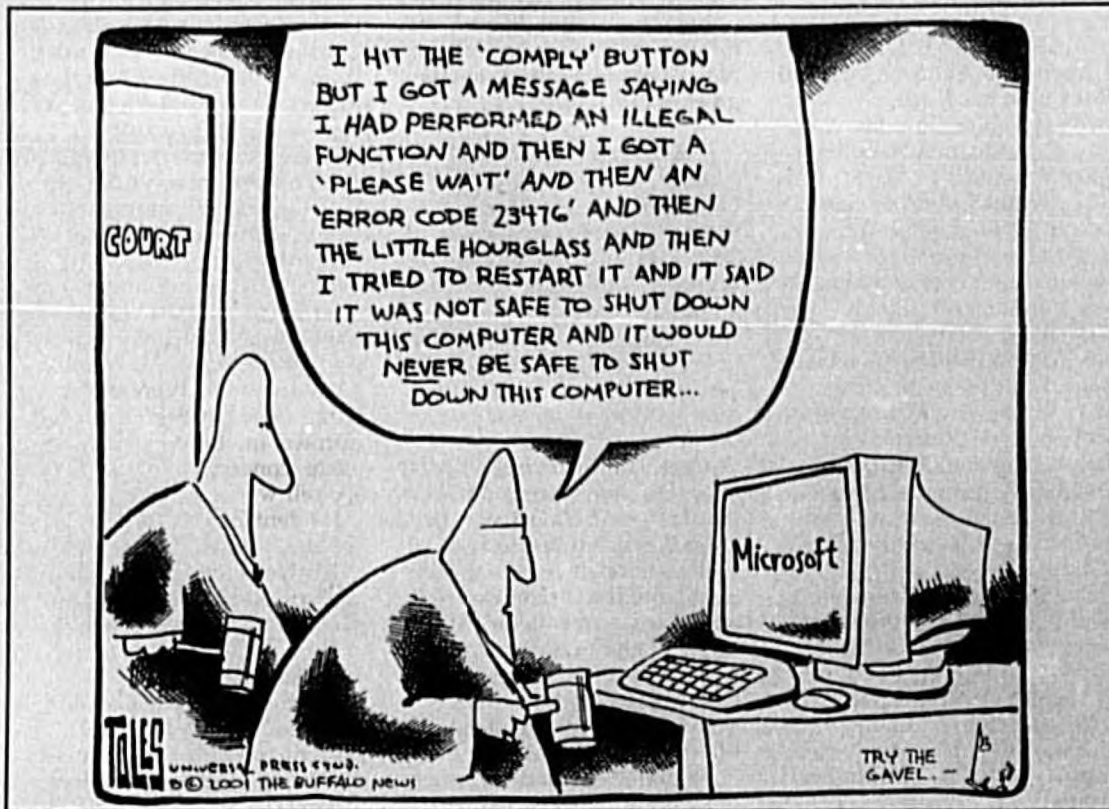
Take a look at Southern Partisan, a publication dedicated to the return of the Confederacy. You will recall that the current attorney general, John Ashcroft, wrote a piece for the magazine praising its outlook and values.

Then there is the Council of Conservative Citizens, a white supremacist organization concerned for the purity of the white race. A couple of members of the Mississippi Legislature recently met with the state chapter to plot a strategy for an amendment to the state constitution protecting the current Mississippi state flag, which prominently features the Confederate battle emblem.

Meanwhile, the Council of Conservative Citizens chapter from Helms' home state of North Carolina recently held a rally "to protest the flood of illegal aliens who are importing unemployment, poverty and disease to North Carolina," according to the C of CC Web site. That sort of ugly immigrant-bashing will only get worse if the economy continues to slide toward recession.

President George W. Bush has embraced a view of America that rejects racism and xenophobia. He has appointed African-Americans to positions beyond the traditional "black" posts; he has reached out to innumigrants; he has rejected race-baiting. But he will have to do more. He will have to make clear to the Republican Party that it cannot tolerate another Jesse Helms.

## Sharpton as a presidential candidate may spell another four years of Bush

The Rev. Al Sharpton, another minister without church portfolio, is forming an exploratory committee to run for president. Sharpton is following in the footsteps of his example and mentor, the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who has been politically damaged and sidelined due to new, uh, parental responsibilities.

Sharpton could decide the 2004 presidential election, not for himself, but for President George W. Bush. He's made two unsuccessful runs for political office — for Mayor of New York City and for the Senate seat now occupied by Hillary Rodham Clinton. But winning the White House — which might have to undergo a name change, if not a paint job should Sharpton win — isn't what his candidacy would be about. Like Jackson, Sharpton wants to pull the Democratic Party back to its leftist roots. He would use black votes he wins as bargaining chips for his issues and for himself. Republicans would run campaign commercials quoting Sharpton and demand that Democrats disassociate themselves from Sharpton and his

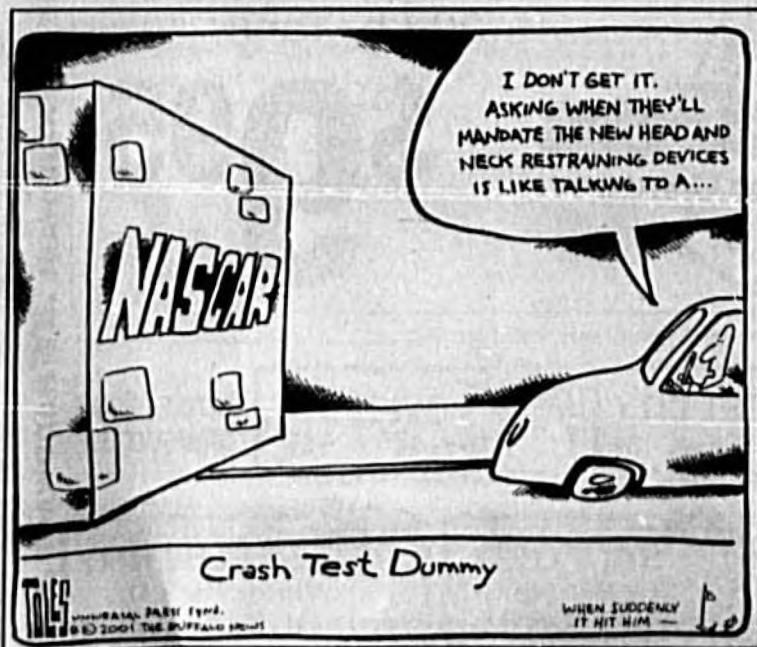
remarks. Either way, Democrats would be politically damned.  
Sharpton could be the next Willie Horton, symbolizing what many people dislike most about liberals. From the phony Tawana Brawley rape case in the '80s to his constant race-baiting, Sharpton will make an inviting political target.

Democrats will have the same trouble with Sharpton they had with Jackson. Both men are proven vote-getters. They also have proven they can drive away swing voters, which both parties need. In last year's campaign, Vice Presidential candidate Joe Lieberman had to tip-toe around Louis Farrakhan, giving the Nation of Islam leader credibility instead of denouncing him as an anti-Semitic and black supremacist. Democratic candidates also trekked up to Harlem to meet with Sharpton. Sharpton would not just bring baggage to a presidential campaign. He would bring an entire baggage car. He once called a white businessman an "interloper" for opening a clothing store in Harlem. One of Sharpton's supporters said of the owner,

"We're going to see that this cracker suffers." Days later, when the man's store was set on fire, killing seven employees and a black man police said had set the blaze, Sharpton denied any responsibility for the act.  
Columnist Clarence Page made a good point during last year's campaign. He wrote, "When principled leaders fail to rise, no one should be surprised that imperfect leaders fill the gap." Most African-Americans are not being set-upon by police but they are being set-upon by the likes of Sharpton, who make them believe that racism and "police brutality" are the biggest threats to their community. If racism and police brutality ended tomorrow, the lot of African-Americans would be little improved. That's because their primary problems have less to do with race and victimization than they do with the huge out-of-wedlock birthrate and the lack of positive father figures in the home. But you can't get TV time and headlines putting black families back together. When the lust for political power comes up against an opportunity to positively change things, the phony and fake will go for the politi-

cal power every time.  
Will successful and responsible black leaders emerge to isolate Sharpton and lead African-Americans in a better direction? It isn't likely if they haven't shown up by now. Most successful blacks are too busy doing the things that brought them success to play the blame game. They aren't singing about overcoming; they're just overcoming. They should be the example for others, including people of other races, to follow. Stories of how other groups overcame used to inspire imitators. Now, substantial numbers of the aggrieved and "oppressed" wallow in their grievances and oppression rather than climb the ladder out of the hole. The Rev. Al Sharpton is their Pied Piper.  
Republicans should rejoice over prospects of a Sharpton presidential candidacy. Democrats should be sweating blood. Republicans can start chanting, "Run, Al, run," and if he does, sing, "Happy Days are Here Again."  
Not even White House political strategist Karl Rove could have come up with a better scenario.

Principal Glenn McKay, Mary Stone, Elizabeth Earle, Lucy Smith, Mae Fort, Dorothy Sanford, Kathryn Lawton, Leonard McClucas, Richard Gillespie, Ollie Mae Harrison, Betty Burhman, Laura Chittenden, Gladys Smith, Effie Durden, Ethel Riser and Alex Johnson.

Activities of the class during their junior year included presenting the play "Professor, Hoe Could You", hosting the May Day Ball and honoring the seniors at the Junior-Senior Banquet. The theme of the latter was "Sophisticated Swing."

During their senior year they presented the comedy "False Fronts" and were honored by the juniors at the annual banquet. The Class's gift to the school was a radio communication system.

Orin Ferrell was president aided vice president David Gatchel and secretary/treasurer Elizabeth Whigham.

Natalie True, president of the Tri-Hi-Y, led this organization in many activities. In December, they honored the football team at the annual football banquet at which time trophies were awarded to outstanding players. They also entertained the Future Farmers, held a Mothers Day Banquet and a senior tea.

Editor of the Celery Fed was Monica Lippincott; her assistant editor was Herman Middleton. In addition to publishing the paper, they were also busy sponsoring the Christmas Dance and also a talent show. Winners of the latter were Gladis and Elizabeth Pippin who sang "Our Love Affair" and "Practice Makes Perfect." Second place went to David Gatche who performed a trumpet solo "Stardust".

Another journalism endeavor was contributing several articles to the Seminole County School News which was a weekly page in the Sanford Herald. A dedicated group of student, led by editor Edward Marshall, worked hard each week to meet their deadline.

A big event held on February 28 was Sadie Hawkins Day. Winner of the pie eating contest was Catherine Takach while Bob Hickson placed first in the fash-

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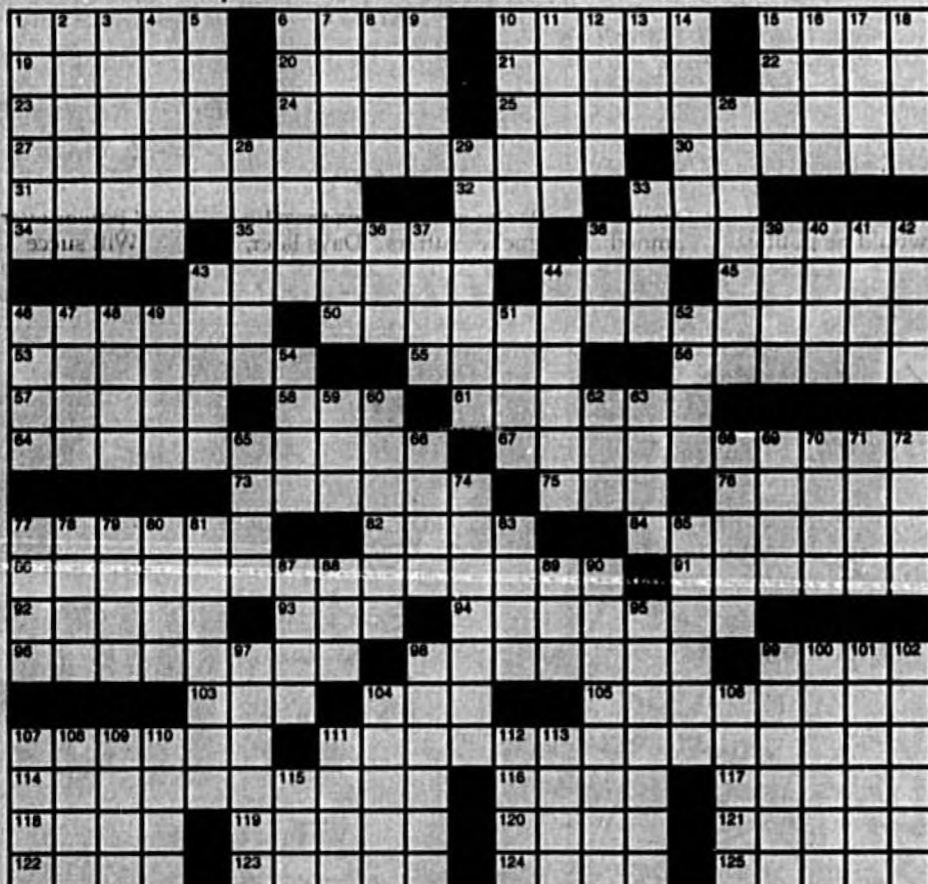

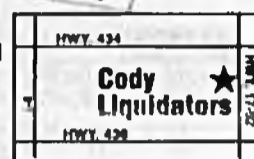

and checked by us internally, not the printer. What happened was some of the fields in the database did not transfer onto the template, and they showed up blank on the tax bill. However, that did not change the bottom-line figure. It was just a matter of not all of the information appearing on the tax bill."

Customers usually proof samples of printing jobs. However, the property appraiser's did not see proofs of those bills printed

by the subcontractor, Johnson said.

"We didn't know until they went out and we started getting calls that another printer had been involved," Johnson said.

New bills have been printed, and property owners who received the incomplete bills should begin receiving them in the mail next week, Johnson said. All of the information is listed on the bills, and the phone number has been corrected. Anyone with questions about their bill should

call 407-665-7506.

Johnson said the property appraiser's office will not use the printing companies in the future.

"We'll probably do some of it in-house," Johnson said. "We have two big mailings a year, and we have some of the high-speed laser printers to do some of the work. They can print about 8,000 pages an hour."

# Raines activated

## Expos bring veteran off disabled list

MONTREAL — The prediction of Tim Raines Sr.'s demise as a professional baseball player has once again been

proven wrong by the Sanford veteran.

Back on May 4, the senior Raines went on the disabled list with a strained left shoulder and was taking batting practice on May 23rd in preparation to return to the Expos when he suffered a tear to the labrum (the muscle surrounding the shoulder) and a torn biceps tendon in his left arm and shoulder and it was speculated that he would not only miss the rest of this season, but a minimum of one year to 16 months, which more than likely would have meant the end of his career since he will turn 42 in October.

But after consulting some of the best doctors in the business, Raines opted for arthroscopic surgery on May 31 instead

of major surgery and it proved successful as he was able to start a minor-league rehabilitation assignment two weeks ago and was returned to the Expos' big league roster on Wednesday.

Since returning to the majors, Senior is 0-for-2 in a pair of pinch-hit appearances against the San Francisco Giants and is hitting .250 on the season.

Raines Sr. hit close to .350 with a home run and a triple in a five-game stint with the Jupiter Hammerheads of the Florida State League (the Expos' Class A affiliate) and then was sent to Ottawa, Canada to continue his rehabilitation.

The Seminole Athletic Conference Golf Tournament is set for October 16th, with district being played on October 22-23.

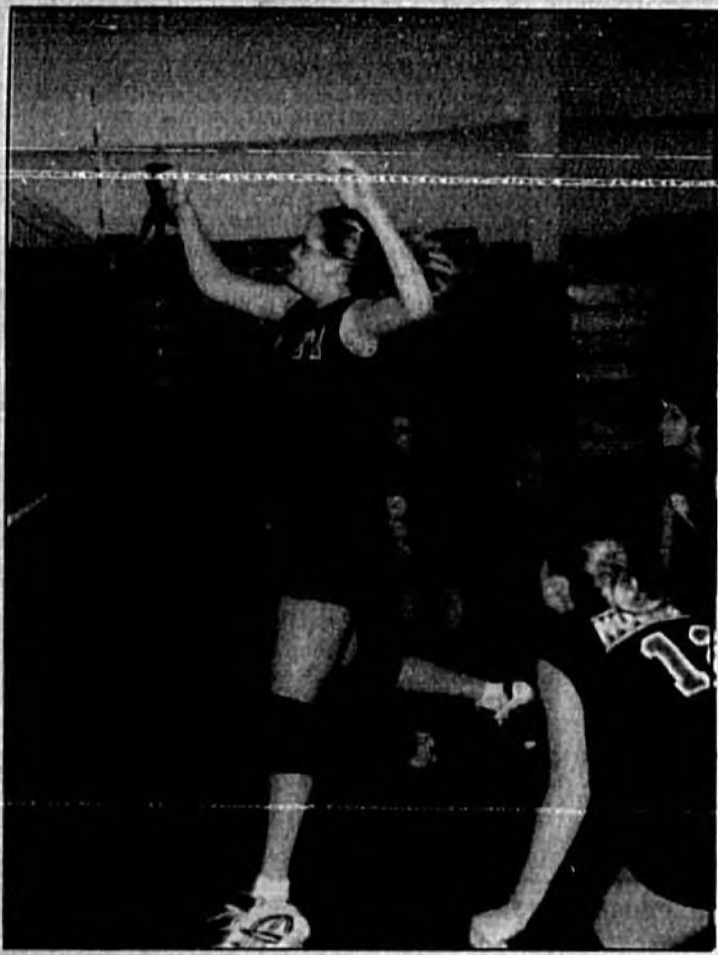

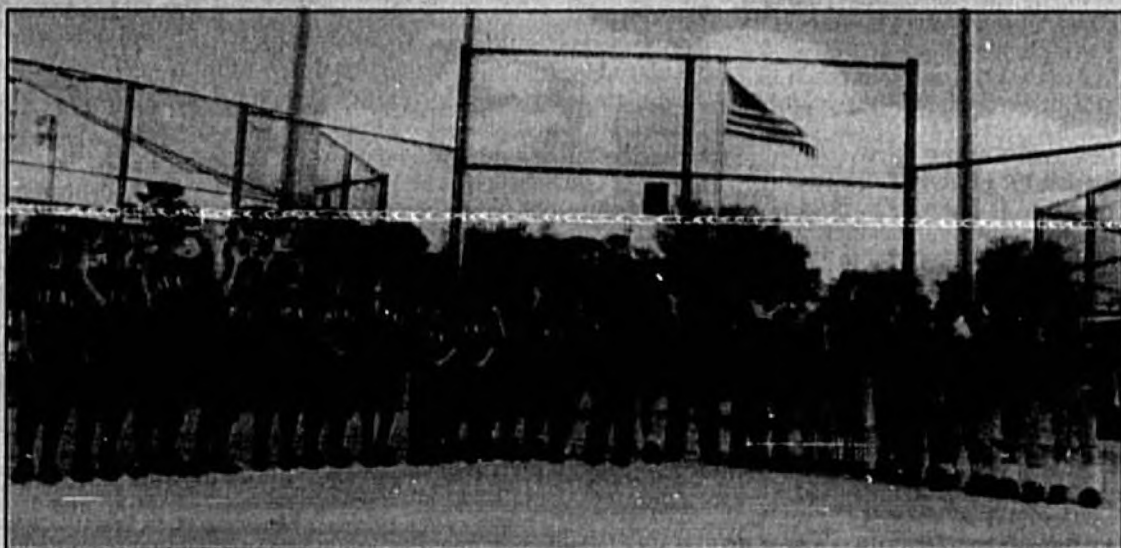
"We won't be intimidated by the atmosphere," Kruczek said. "It doesn't matter where we are playing, who we are playing in front of, or how many people are in the stadium."

the best offenses in the nation - year in and year out - and they certainly understand how good the offense we are going to face this time will be."

Chizik also singled out defensive end Rashard Jeanty (Miami/Carol City H.S.) and linebacker Gerren Bray (Ft. Lauderdale/Stranahan H.S.) as a pair of freshman defenders who have stood out during the summer practices.

Kruczek also commented on Clemson's all-star quarterback Woodrow Dantzler, and said UCF's best chance will be to keep Dantzler and the Clemson offense off the field.

"He's (Dantzler) going to make big plays," said Kruczek. "We just have to limit those plays. In this case, our biggest defense is our offense. Clemson has a lot of young people who can stretch the field and make big plays."

Senior tailback Terrance Williams (Clearwater H.S.) was able to return to practice at full speed after being sidelined and limited for most of fall camp with a sore right hip and tendonitis in his right knee. Williams redshirted last season while recovering from surgery on his left ankle.

Defensive end Marcus Clemons (Titusville/Astronaut H.S.), who suffered from heat exhaustion and had to be taken to the hospital midway through Wednesday's practice, was given fluids intravenously and

Beth Watson was named assistant softball coach at the University of Central, head coach Renee Gillespie announced Wednesday. Watson will be responsible for coaching

Watson comes to UCF following a successful career at the University of Southern Indiana, where she amassed a record of 204-119 (.632) to become the winningest fastpitch coach in school history. 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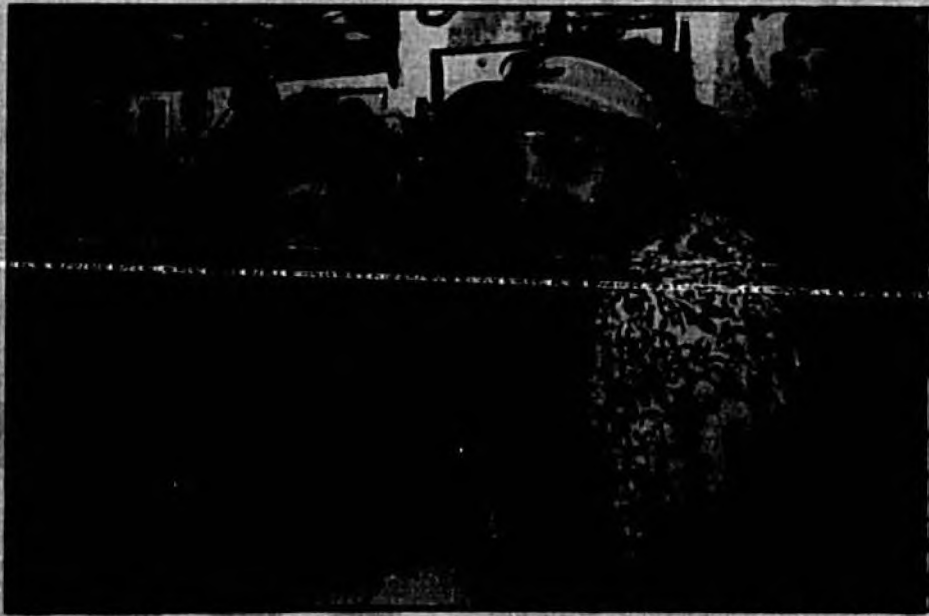

**N**estled in a building on the edge of downtown is a store that celebrates the unique styles of past decades. From bell bottom jeans to crinoline dresses, every fashion trend from the last century can be found in the confines of Volta clothing.

Through his major motion picture, "Once Upon A Time When

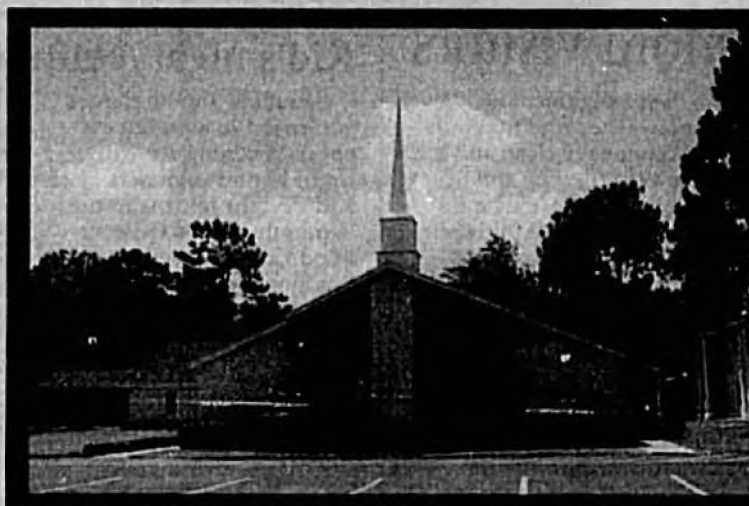

## Girl trapped in parents' bad divorce

**DEAR ABBY:** My parents have been divorced for six years. I am 11, and I have a sister who is 15.



Dear Abby

..... Since our parents divorced, my sister and I fight a lot more, but I still look up to her for everything. Mom's and Dad's sides of the family constantly question us to see which one is better. Without my sister telling me what to say, I might say the wrong thing.

I love my parents, but I hate it when each of them asks questions about the other instead of enjoying our company. It's just not fair. What do you think?

**SICK AND TIRED OF FIGHTING, GREENVILLE, TEXAS**

**DEAR SICK AND TIRED OF FIGHTING:** I sympathize with your predicament. No one wants to be caught in the middle, and to put you there at your tender age is very unfair. Your parents — and many others — could benefit from the following list of "Do's and Don'ts" for divorcing couples with children that appeared in my column years ago. Read on:

First the DO's:

- Do allow your children to ask questions about your divorce. It's unfair to make them feel like outsiders.
- Do answer all their questions about your divorce as truthfully as possible, without making the other parent the "heavy."
- Do remember that your children need the love of both parents.
- Do assure your children that they are not to blame for your divorce.
- Do encourage your children to talk freely about their feelings — even if it's painful to you. Bottling up emotions is even more damaging to children.

Now, the DON'Ts:

- Don't ask your children to keep secrets from your ex-spouse.
- Don't try to pump your children for information about your ex-spouse.

## Parents can learn to manage sibling rivalry

**QUESTION:** Why do my kids have to fight all the time? I have three of them, and they drive me crazy. Why can't they be nice to each other?

**DR. DOBSON:** Good question! All I can tell you is that sibling rivalry has been going on for a long time. It was responsible for the first murder on record (when Cain killed Abel), and has been represented in virtually every two-child family from that time to this. The underlying source of this conflict is old-fashioned jealousy and competition between children. Marguerite and Willard Beecher, writing in their book "Parents on the Run," expressed the inevitability of this struggle as follows:

"It was once believed that if parents would explain to a child that he was having a little brother or sister, he would not resent it. He was told that his parents had enjoyed him so much that they wanted to increase their happiness. This was supposed to avoid jealous competition and rivalry. It did not work. Why should

it? Needless to say, if a man tells his wife he has loved her so much that he now plans to bring another wife into the home to 'increase his happiness,' she would not be immune to jealousy. On the contrary, the fight would just begin — in exactly the same fashion as it does with children."

**QUESTION:** If jealousy between kids is so common, then how can parents minimize the natural antagonism that children feel for their siblings?

**DR. DOBSON:** It's helpful to avoid circumstances that compare them unfavorably with each other. They are extremely sensitive to the competitive edge of their relationship. The question is not, "How am I doing?"; it is, "How am I doing compared with John or Steven or Marion?" The issue is not how fast can I run, but who crosses the finish line first. A boy does not care how tall he is; he is vitally interested in who is tallest. Each child systematically measures himself against his peers and is

tremendously sensitive to failure within his own family. Accordingly, parents should guard against comparative statements that routinely favor one child over another.

Perhaps an illustration will help make the case. When I was about 10 years old, I loved to play with a couple of dogs that belonged to two families in the neighborhood. One was a black Scottie who liked to chase and retrieve tennis balls. The other was a pug bulldog who had a notoriously bad attitude.

One day as I was tossing the ball for the Scottie, it occurred to me that it might be interesting to throw it in the direction of the ol' grouch. It was not a smart move. The ball rolled under the bulldog, who grabbed the Scottie by the throat when he tried to retrieve it. It was an awful scene. Neighbors came running as the Scottie screamed in pain. It took 10 minutes and a garden hose to pry the bulldog's grip loose, and by then the Scottie was almost dead. He spent two weeks in the hospital, and I spent two weeks in "the doghouse." I regret throwing that ball to this day.

I have thought about that

experience many times and have begun to recognize its application to human relationships. Indeed, it is a very simple thing to precipitate a fight between people. All that is necessary is to toss a ball, symbolically, under the more aggressive of the two and prepare for the battle that ensues. This is done by repeating negative comments one has made, or by baiting one in the presence of the other. It can be accomplished in business by assigning overlapping territory to two managers. They will tear each other to pieces in the inevitable rivalry. Alas, it happens every day.

This principle is also applicable to siblings. It is remarkably easy to make them mortal enemies. All a parent must do is toss a ball in the wrong direction. Their natural antagonism will do the rest.
