

ur first thirty years have flown by as we move into the twilight years of this great adventure. Summer 2018 marks our first flowering of titan arum, Amorphophallus titanum 'Peter Grande'. It was an amazing occasion, drawing many new visitors to our gardens. We continue to expand and improve

the gardens here at Juniper Level, with this years' projects including plantings around the parking lot, a complete renovation of our bog garden, expansion of our trial beds, and now, installation has begun on our final section of crevice garden.

Current operations of Juniper Level Botanic Garden are solely funded by Plant Delights Nursery. An endowment has been established to receive contributions to preserve Juniper Level Botanic Garden, as any future issues with Tony's health will likely result in a shutdown of all facilities. The only way to preserve Juniper Level Botanic Garden and its plant collections for this and future generations is for the JLBG endowment to be fully funded. Funds in the endowment cannot be used, and only interest


'Rawhide' is an offering from our friend Ted Stephens, with unreal hard plastic foliage, and after many years, we're finally able to extend an encore offering of the giant flowering Aspidistra guangxiensis 'Spiderman'.

Also, after years of no availability, we are pleased to again offer the sterile Helleborus 'Walberton's Rosemary'...a superb Helleborus niger hybrid. We hope you've saved room in your shade garden for two amazing new hostas from our friend Hans Hansen. Both Hosta 'Diamond Lake' and 'Age of Gold' are uniquely large and in charge.

For tropical-garden lovers, you're going to flip over Canna 'Red Tiger'...a new variegated foliage canna that is truly unimaginable. A great companion is Colocasia 'Black Ripple'...a new, heavily corrugated jet black-leafed elephant ear from plantsman Brian Williams. To top off the combination, check out the hardy Clerodendron speciosissimum with its summer panicles of screaming scarlet-red flowers.







Several new North American native plants have stolen our hearts and are included for the first time, include two amazing groundcover junipers...the gold-foliaged Juniperus horizontalis 'Copper Harbor' and the tiny dwarf Juniperus horizontalis 'Pancake'. If you're looking for a native groundcover with a great floral show, **Conradina verticillata 'Rocky Top'** is a show stopper.

We've added some new geophytes to our fall lineup including two new dwarf crinum lilies that are quite extraordinary and unique... **Crinum ligulatum 'Star Power'** and Crinum lugardiae 'White Dove'. Alophia drummondii is a little-known Texas native bulb from the iris family that deserves wider acclaim, as does its cousin, **Tigridia pavonia 'El Salto'**. One




of the most exciting plants we've ever had the joy to offer is Howardara 'Riley Kate' ... a fascinating trigeneric hybrid of hippeastrum (amaryllis), Aztec lily (sprekelia) and rain lily (zephyranthes). There are only a handful of people worldwide who have even seen this in person, so if you're willing to splurge....

Two splendid new groundcover sedums for the rock garden that impressed us with their performance are Sedum 'Little Miss Sunshine', and its variegated counterpart, Sedum 'Boogie Woogie'...both from the great breeding work at Walters Gardens.

The dramatic upgrades in the hibiscus world continue to amaze us. Hibiscus 'Holy Grail' and 'Cherry Choco Latte' are truly superb selections for both flower, habit, and foliage. The flower saturation of Hibiscus 'Airbrush

Effect' is astonishing, as is the variegated foliage of the new rose of Sharon, Hibiscus 'Carpa'.

The parade of amazing new mangaves hasn't slowed, with eight new next generation hybrids that take the group



to new levels. Mangave 'Blue Mammoth' which we can finally offer for the first time, has been the most winter hardy selection in our trials so far, while Mangave 'Red Wing' has foliage colors that don't look real. The two-tone leaf of Mangave 'Blazing Saddles', and the variegation of Mangave 'Snow Leopard' look good enough to eat, but don't fall for the temptation.

As usual, we have plenty of really cool oddities that aren't to be missed. The hardy Cuphea cyanea 'Ashevilla' is amazing, as is the incredibly hairy Brazilian desert fern, Pleopeltis lepidopteris 'Morro dos Conventos'. If you've been looking for a truly long-lived euphorbia, check out Pat McCracken's Euphorbia 'Galaxy Glow'. Carrying through the purple theme is the purple-foliaged Yucca aloifolia 'Indigo Dagger'. Many plants from spring are also back in stock, so check out our complete offerings at Plantdelights.com

Agapanthus

The blue or white flowering South African lily-of-the-Nile are well-known for being great summer flowering perennials in warm winter climates, but our goal is to find good cold-hardy garden performers. We have trialed over 93 different agapanthus selections and offer the best from those trials for both perennial gardens and summer color bowls. Although agapanthus are drought-tolerant, they flower much better when the soil is kept moist during the summer months.

(Plant Patent 7303 expired) Agapanthus 'Elaine' is a 1990 introduction from California's Archie Amate, that's been a vigorous grower for us in NC. The wide green foliage (evergreen in mild climates) forms a fast-growing 3' tall clump of green strap-like leaves, topped in midsummer with 50" stems of hummingbird-attracting, dark blueviolet (RHS 93A), 8" wide flower heads.

NEW (aka: Agapanthus 'Midnight Star') Agapanthus 'Navy Blue' is the most popular agapanthus selection in the UK and much of Europe. This deciduous selection has shown incredible winter hardiness in open field trials in Western Michigan (zone 5b/6a). Starting in July, Agapanthus 'Navy Blue' is topped with 32" tall stalks of medium-sized clusters of dark royal blue flowers, which flower well into August.

NEW! Agapanthus 'Twister' is the latest introduction from the master agapanthus breeders at De Wet

Aloe Farm in South Africa. This vigorous selection is the pinnacle of years of breeding between Agapanthus praecox subsp. orientalis and Agapanthus campanulatus. Each semi-deciduous clump is composed of 1' long leaves, and topped, starting in mid-June (NC) with 4' tall stalks, ending in 7" wide clusters of tubular bicolor flowers; white tips with a violet blue base.

(aka: Agave 'Eye Scream') Agave 'Bluewinds' is sheer perfection. We picked up this un-named variegated sport of Agave potatorum from a grower in Thailand in 2008, only to find out later that is was named Agave 'Bluewinds'. For us, it has formed a stunning 8" tall x 18" wide symmetrical clump that makes visitors go gaga (no relation to the Lady). Each clump of Agave potatorum 'Bluewinds' is composed of 6" long x 3" wide blue leaves, each edged with a wide border

of creamy gold. Agave potatorum 'Bluewinds' grows to about half the size of the similarly colored Agave potatorum 'Snowfall'.

□□ Allium 'Pink Planet' (Pink Planet Ornamental Onion) Sun to Part Sun • 18" tall • Zone: 4a to 8b, at least • Dormancy: Winter • Origin: Hybrid

Allium 'Pink Planet' has been a superb performer in our heat and humidity tolerance trials. This Intrinsic Perennial Gardens introduction forms a nice clump of slightly twisted, thin, glaucous. blue-green leaves, thanks to the influence of Allium senescens. The vigorous, deer-resistant clumps are topped, starting for us in late June (NC) with numerous 18" tall stalks, each terminating in a 3" wide, dense flower head of pale lilac flowers...or if you're color blind (i.e. male), pink. If you don't overuse pesticides, Allium 'Pink Planet' is a great attractant to bees and butterflies (not included). Our 10-year old clumps are now 2' wide, and so far, no seedlings have been spotted. Allium 'Pink Planet' is a great rock garden plant, so a nice sunny, well-drained spot will be very satisfactory.

NEW! (aka: Trigridia purpurea) Alophia drummondii is a delightful small US native iris-relative, hopelessly confused in the trade with another Texas native,...the completely different Herbertia lahue. Alophia drummondii hails from the region encompassing Mississippi west to Oklahoma and Texas, where it can be found in sandy pinelands. Alophia

drummondii emerges from a winterdormant corm in mid-spring, forming 15" tall, narrow, pleated green leaves. The 15" tall flower stalk is topped with terminally produced, sideways-facing, intricately-decorated, purple, cypellalike flowers from May until October. We have found these very easy to grow


NEWI (Aka: Freesia laxa, Lapeirousia laxa) Anomatheca laxa 'Joan Evans' is a delightful color variant of the typically salmon red South African false freesia. The tiny green iris-like foliage emerges in late winter, forming a small, but fast-offsetting clump, topped, starting for us in April with lovely small white flowers, each highlighted with a dramatic red blotch. Dry soils in either part sun or part shade are best, and is a great rock garden plant. When happy, Anomatheca 'Joan Evans' will seed around nearby. Be sure to mark the planting spot, since it goes summer

■■ Aquilegia chrysantha 'Denver Gold' (Denver Gold Yellow-spurred Columbine) Sun to Light Shade • 36" tall • Zone: 3a to 8b • Dormancy: Evergreen • Origin: United States

Aquilegia chrysantha 'Denver Gold' is an easy-to-grow, stunning addition to the spring garden. Native from Colorado south to Mexico, the 2-3' tall stalks arise from an evergreen rosette of deeply lobed, glaucous green foliage. In late spring, the stalks are topped with clouds of long-spurred yellow flowers... great emerging through lower ground covers. This long-lived columbine will reflower if dead-headed promptly, and will reseed true if your pollinators are well-trained and if it's kept a safe distance from other horny columbines.

☐ Asclepias asperula (Antelope Horn Milkweed) Sun • 24" tall • Zone: 4a to 9b • Dormancy: Winter • Origin: United States

MEW! Asclepias asperula is a widespread US native that can be found on dry sandy/gravely soils from Oklahoma west to Southern California. Commonly known as antelope horn due the leaf shape, Asclepias asperula forms a 2' tall x 3' wide clump, adorned from March into May (NC) with amazingly intricate 2" wide, dome-shaped flower heads composed of dozens of flowers with green petals and a central purple, green, and white star...a favorite of both Queen and Monarch butterflies. If you're fascinated with the amazing patterns found in nature, Asclepias asperula is for you.

Asclepias

(Swamp Milkweed, Butterfly Weed, Butterfly Flower)

Asclepias are popular perennial flowering plants that attract butterflies and hummingbirds with their brightly colored flower clusters. Some asclepias are drought-tolerant, while others prefer soggy soils, but most grow best in full sun gardens. The attractive, long lasting flowers of asclepias are followed by spindle shaped seed pods that split open to release seeds attached to a silk-like parachute.

The 2017 Perennial Plant Association plant of the year, Asclepias tuberosa is a heat and drought tolerant US native, that can be found in all but seven Pacific Northwest states. This easy-to-grow perennial forms 2' tall x 2' wide clumps of upright stems, clothed with

fuzzy, narrow green leaves. Clumps of Asclepias tuberosa are topped with branched terminal clusters of brilliant orange flowers, which are enjoyed by guess what...Monarch butterflies! The flowers are followed by unusual seed pods that burst open to spread their silk laden seed. Good drainage and plenty of sun are the keys to success.

Asclepias tuberosa 'Hello Yellow' (Hello Yellow Butterfly Weed)

Asclepias 'Hello Yellow' is a seed strain of the typically bright orange-flowered, North American native Asclepias tuberosa, which flowers remarkably true within the range of yellow-gold. The drought-tolerant deciduous Asclepias tuberosa 'Hello Yellow' makes a 20" tall x 2' wide mound of stems clothed with index finger-sized green leaves that is topped, starting in early June (NC), with branched terminal spikes of golden to yellow-gold flowers...a favorite butterfly and hummingbird attractant!

Aspidistra (Cast Iron Plant)

JLBG Collection Contains 32 Species and 109 unique clones

We have been collecting aspidistras for many years and now have over 100 different clones, including many species new to science. We are testing and building up numbers, so expect more new selections each season (more available online). There are few plants more tolerant of deer and deep shade in the woodland garden, and dark corners inside homes, than aspidistra. A great pastime for truly boring people is to watch for the unusual soilborne flowers.

🔲 🔲 Aspidistra elatior 'Fuji-No-Mine' (Mt. Fuji Cast Iron Plant) Light Shade to Shade • 36" tall • Zone: 7b to 10b, at least • Dormancy: Evergreen • Origin: China

This superb selection of Aspidistra elatior forms a commanding 3' wide, evergreen clump in the garden with 3' tall x 5" wide, glossy, dark green leaves. Each leaf is composed of an 18" stalk topped with an 18" blade which is highlighted with narrow, central creamy-yellow streaks and a very narrow

white border at the tip. According to our friend Barry Yinger, the 'Fuji-No-Mine' means "crags on Mt. Fuji"...we'll take his word. This cast iron plant has been a great performer in our garden

🔲 🔲 Aspidistra guangxiensis 'Spiderman' (Spiderman Cast Iron Plant) Light Shade to Shade • 18" tall • Zone: 8a to 10b • Dormancy: Evergreen • Origin: China

Aspidistra guangxiensis 'Spiderman', a 2013 Plant Delights Nursery introduction is an unspotted leaf form of Chinese cast iron plant. The 18" tall leaf stalks are adorned at the leaf base in midsummer with clusters of 2" wide spider-like flowers of purple and yellow...very cool in the garden where it's winter hardy and as a containerized houseplant further north. While Aspidistra 'Spiderman' has survived single digits F in our garden, the foliage is burned to the ground, and new growth doesn't start before August.

■ Aspidistra sichuanensis 'Rawhide' (Rawhide Cast Iron Light Shade to Shade • 20" tall • Zone: 8b to 10b, at least • Dormancy: Evergreen • Origin: China

Aspidistra 'Rawhide' is one of the most unusual cast iron plants we've ever grown. Plantsman Ted Stephens of Nurseries Caroliniana brought this unusual selection of the Chinese Aspidistra sichuanensis from the garden of the late variegated plant collector/author, Dr. Yokoi of Japan. The leaves have the thickness of hard plastic, which is most likely due to a

ploidy mutation...probably a tetraploid. The 20" tall stalks include 10" long x 4" wide leaf blades, heavily spotted with yellow. Aspidistra 'Rawhide' is one of those virtually indestructible plants that actually looks and feels artificial. In the ground, we see foliage burn below 15 degrees F, so in colder climates, it's best as a house plant.

So, ol' Hart liked it both ways...straight and with a petticoat...what a kinky

dude. Back in the English Victorian era, European hardy fern collectors named several hundred crested varieties of Hart's-tongue, but only a few remain in cultivation today. Asplenium scolopendrium 'Cristatum' is a selection of the European form of Asplenium scolopendrium that makes a tight rosette of 1' long, shiny, evergreen tongue-like leaves, each ending in a crested petticoat. Remember that moist, well-drained soil and a pH toward 7.0 will help to ensure success...both in the ground and as a houseplant.

(syn: Symphyotrichum oblongifolium) We originally acquired Aster 'Fanny', a selection of the American native Aster oblongifolius, from Montrose Gardens, which acquired it from Ruth Knopf of Boone Hall Plantation in South Carolina. Ruth acquired the aster from her maid, Fanny, who acquired it as a pass-along plant from her grandmother. Aster 'Fanny' is one of the last asters to flower in our garden, usually in October and November. 'Fanny' (the aster, not the maid) makes a nice 2' tall clump to 8' in width and is smothered with 1' blue flowers starting in October (NC)... awesome! For a fall show in a hot dry site, a nice 'Fanny' is a hard thing to beat.

(syn: Cheilanthes sinuata) Astrolepis sinuata 'Parker Creek' comes from our 2005 spore collection from 5,200' elevation in Arizona's Gila County. This fascinating desert fern has been happy in our southeastern US rock garden for well over a decade, forming a 1' tall x 18" wide clump of dark-olive, narrow, upright, evergreen fronds with fuzzy brown backs. Although Astrolepis sinuata is native in alkaline soils, it has thrived in our 6.2 pH and much wetter climate, as long as drainage is good. During periods of drought, the leaves will curl inward to reduce water loss.

Canna 'Red Tiger'

Baptisia arachnifera is the most unique member of the genus. Each 2' tall x 5' wide clump is adorned with clasping, silverygrey, eucalyptus-like, hairy leaves. Baptisia arachnifera is a compact grower for a special spot in the rock garden and is topped with short terminal spikes of yellow flowers in late summer...long after most other baptisias have finished flowering. Baptisia arachnifera is also late to emerge in spring, so don't get worried when it's not the first thing out of the ground. Despite being nursery propagated from seed here at Plant Delights, this federally endangered, coastal Georgia native cannot be shipped outside of NC due to misguided Federal regulations, so you'll have to visit and pick yours up in person.

From a backyard plant breeder in Thailand, Canna 'Red Tiger' is the first of a new series of amazing variegated cannas. For us, Canna 'Red Tiger' forms a 4' tall clump of creamy yellow and green striped leaves, topped with large cherry red flowers...what a sight to behold. Supplies are still limited, so don't miss being the first on the block to have your neighbors screaming for joy...or reporting you for having plants that are too loud for your HOA sound ordinance.

no respect. These mostly evergreen clumpers add dramatic form, behave well, blend texturally with most anything, and are easy to grow. Many carex are even suited to perform such mundane garden functions as lining pathways in a woodland garden. Great companion plants to hostas, most carex perform their best when grown in a moist location, although they are somewhat tolerant of neglect and resistant to deer... give a carex a try!



□□ Carex oshimensis 'Evercream' PPAF (Evercream Weeping Sedge) Part Sun to Light Shade • 10" tall • Zone: 5a to 9b • Dormancy: Evergreen • Origin: Japan

NEW Carex 'Evercream' is the latest in the line of amazing sedges from Ireland's Patrick Fitzgerald. Carex oshimensis 'Evercream' is a creamy edged version of Carex 'Everest', but brighter than the more muted border of Carex 'Everlime'. Each flowing clump forms a 10" tall x 2' wide specimen, which is best used to create a river of color in the shade garden. Carex 'Evercream' is drought tolerant, but really thrives in a slightly moist, light shade

Carex oshimensis 'Eversheen' is the smallest growing of the new Carex oshimensis selections from Ireland's Patrick Fitzgerald. Carex oshimensis 'Eversheen' is a new twist on the standard, Carex 'Evergold', with a darker yellow central stripe instead of creamy white. Like the other Carex oshimensis selections, expect an evergreen, weeping clump, but only 6" tall x 15" wide...a great combination with variegated hostas and ferns.

Carex 'Banana Boat' is a beautiful variegated form of the deciduous Carex siderosticta from Japan that makes a slowly spreading clump of 6-8" long, bright golden leaves bordered with a dark green edge. Caryopteris 'Blue Butterflies' is a great summer border plant, but welldrained soils are particularly important for good survivability as you move into more northerly zones. In some climates, Caryopteris divaricata can seed excessively, so keep your eyes peeled if it likes your climate too much.

Despite our skepticism that it couldn't survive here in Zone 7b, this amazing clone has returned since 2003. In our climate, it emerges late, and never gets over 2' tall, although in warm winter climates, expect it to reach 7' tall. The slowly suckering plant emerges with upright woody stems, clothed in 1' wide, velvety green leaves and topped in very late summer and early fall with terminal clusters of brilliant, scarlet-red flowers along with loads of hummingbirds. Not only does Clerodendrum speciosissimum look great in the garden, but it can also be used to cure everything from arthritis to hemorrhoids. You're sure to feel a sense of relief just having this in your garden.

The attractive clumps are topped, starting in early May (NC) with numerous 2' tall stalks, each terminating in a cluster of cherry-red buds, which open to reveal pure-white, star-like, sweetly-fragrant flowers with pink petal backs and contrasting pink anthers...truly amazing. Crinum 'Star Power' is very drought tolerant, but moist rich soils still grow the best plants.

Shared cuttings have since thrived in our

garden trials since 2013, so it's time to share. Cuphea cyanea 'Ashevilla' forms a dainty-looking 1' tall x 18" wide airy mound, topped, from late summer through frost with hundreds of tiny dangling pink flowers, each highlighted by a yellow tip, and two cinnamon eyes...seriously cute. Light shade or morning sun in rich soils is best. Cuphea cyanea was the winner of the prestigious RHS Award of Merit in 1978.



Cuphea glutinosa should not be used by gardeners who need a glutin-free landscape.



If you garden in Zone 7a, you can forget flowers, which are single pink and always manage to open the day we have our first killing frost. Nevertheless, this tropicallooking gem is worth growing just for its stature and texture in the garden...and to fool all your neighbors with its identity. Have someone take your photo standing alongside your dahlia, and you're a sure-fire winner for the next Miracle-Gro commercial.

Dryopteris

(Autumn Fern, Male Fern, Wood Fern)

Dryopteris is a genus of 225 species worldwide that give us the majority of our great garden ferns. Most species prefer evenly moist soils in woodland garden conditions. We strongly recommend planting dryopteris (male ferns) near athyriums (lady ferns)...even pteridophytes need a conjugal visit every now and then!

The fast growing Omeo gum (30' tall in 10 years) has lovely, brown, exfoliating bark and oval, blue-green, juvenile foliage. The adult foliage of Eucalyptus neglecta later changes to an elongated leaf.

Omeo gum is a striking conversation piece for any garden with enough growth for years of flower arranging.

We are excited by our introduction of this new selection of the widespread Himalayan Punjab fig, Ficus palmata ssp. virgata, that's been incredible in our trials. Ficus 'Icebox' is a Plant Delights selection from a Chris Chadwell seed collection (CC6807) at 6,900' elevation in Kumaon, India. Although Ficus 'Icebox' is usually a dieback perennial in our climate, it survived 7 degrees F, unprotected, to re-grow to 12' tall x 18' wide the following summer. The large 1' long x 1' wide leaves, held along the very fuzzy stems, feel like sandpaper on the top and velvet on the back. Without a mild winter, we probably won't see the early spring-borne fruit this far



north, but the quality of the small, purple-black, slightly astringent fruit is regarded as on par with Ficus carica. In fact, some taxonomists regard Ficus palmata as a possible ancient parent of our current edible fig. While the fruits can also be used as a laxative and bladder curative, we value Ficus palmata 'Icebox' more as a large, bold-leaf, tropical accent specimen for the warm temperate garden. In warmer climates, it can reach a whopping 30' tall, so plan accordingly...no more Ficus roxburghii envy for us!

Instead of typical gaillardia flowers, Gaillardia 'Grape Sensation' is topped with an abundance of 2" wide grape flowers from May through October....good drainage always helps.

Gloxinia 'Little Red' is quite vigorous and makes a 16" tall x 3' wide patch in 4 years. Dry soils during cold winters are key to survival.

(aka: Helleborus 'Walhero') Helleborus 'Walberton's Rosemary' was one of the earliest hybrids of Helleborus niger and Helleborus x hybridus. This prolificflowering selection from the UK's David Tristram was discovered in 2000, but only released in 2009, although stock still remains very limited. In our trials, Helleborus 'Walberton's Rosemary' starts flowering in early February (NC) with rosy-pink flowers that age darker pink. The foliage and flowers are intermediate between both parents and, like Helleborus niger, the flowers face outward and are less damaged by severe freezes than Helleborus \boldsymbol{x} hybridus. Also, Helleborus 'Walberton's Rosemary' is sterile, so unlike our former Senator Edwards, there won't be any surprise offspring to deal with. We find that Helleborus 'Walberton's Rosemary' prefers a bit more sun than typical Helleborus x hybridus, so no deep shade.

Few plants have undergone such a resurgence, thanks originally to Heuchera 'Palace Purple', Heuchera 'Montrose Ruby', and more recently, to the wonderful efforts of breeders Dan Heims, Charles Oliver, and Thierry Delabroye. Coral bells are great in woodland gardens, originally grown only for their flowers (great butterfly attractors), but now for their dramatic and truly unbelievable foliage. Heucheras will tolerate a fair amount of sun, provided they are sited in a well-drained soil that doesn't hold too much moisture. We are focusing primarily on the hybrids using Heuchera villosa, which we find produce the most long-lived, humidity-tolerant plants.



PACKING: We grow all of our plants in containers. Most plants are grown in 24 oz. (3.5" square) containers, with some of the larger plants in 2 qt. (1.892 L) or 3 qt. (2.83L) pots. Most plants are shipped in their containers. Dormant bulbous plants are packed and shipped in peat moss.

pomestic shipments: Weather permitting, orders will be shipped on your preferred shipping date indicated on your order form. If you do not indicate a preferred date, we will assign a date according to your USDA Hardiness Zone. Be sure to indicate any specific dates when you will NOT be available to receive your order. Email confirmations are sent after the order is entered into our order processing system. If you are not an email-friendly customer, we will be happy to send you a paper order acknowledgment via snail mail. If your ship date arrives and we see that potentially damaging weather is predicted, we will delay shipping until conditions improve. We want to be sure you are ready to receive your new adoptees.

DELAYS: In spite of our best efforts, extreme temperatures and plants that don't grow as quickly as we had anticipated or (gasp!) die, cause snafus in our shipping schedule. When orders are delayed, we try to contact everyone prior to the ship date. One crop failure can impact many customer orders and having your email address is most helpful in facilitating timely communication regarding the delays. We will never share your email address.

SHIPPING: Before we got into this business, we thought companies were making lots of money on shipping...maybe for some, but not nurseries. After careful analysis of the staff time required to take an order, pull it from the growing area, prepare and wrap it, pack it, fill out the shipping paperwork, and acquire shipping containers (are you tired yet?), there is no profit from shipping...it is break-even at best. And, like our federal government, we are dedicated to continue this nursery tradition.

Shipping costs are listed in the chart on the order form. We offer Next Day Air, and Second Day Air premium services to all states at an additional cost. Please call for details if you prefer to have your order shipped by a premium service. For locations requiring agricultural inspection, a non-refundable \$10 phytosanitary inspection & certificate fee will apply. Any bare-rooting needs will have a fee of \$5 per plant, and cancellation will have a \$3 re-potting

FOREIGN SHIPMENTS: Yes, we ship outside the US as well, with great success. Please check www.cites.org for the latest list of endangered plants as they cannot be exported. We work closely with the USDA and shipping companies to ensure that your plants pass inspection and are allowed entry into your country. Scheduling the shipping date of your order is dependent on the inspector's visit and the volume of international orders. International plant shipments are subject to customs inspection upon arrival in your country. Unless we are at fault, we do not refund or replace plants that die due to time in transit or customs delays. Orders shipped outside the US must be paid by credit card. A \$200 plant purchase minimum is required for all international orders. Charges are as follows:

- The actual selling price of the plants
- \$100 phytosanitary inspection & certificate fee
- Bare-rooting fee of \$5 per plant
- Shipping costs are weight based & determined the day of shipping

We will not know the cost of shipping your plants until your order is bare-rooted, packaged, and weighed. The amount charged by the shipping company is the same amount that will be charged to your credit card. We will contact you with final shipping charges, less any deposit, and you must have funds available to pay the invoice on the day of shipping in order for the plants to leave our nursery.

After a long winter, if your plants look more ragged than you when you wake, just mow them to the ground and they'll reflush beautifully. If that's not enough, Hypericum calycinum is used medicinally as an anti-inflammatory treatment for wounds.

Iris unguicularis 'Winter Echoes' is a 2011 Rick Tasco introduction...a sibling to his earlier introduction, Iris 'Wishmaster'. Iris unguicularis 'Winter Echoes' starts flowering for us in November, pauses during the coldest part of winter, then resumes when temperatures moderate. The large, rich purple, sweetly-fragrant flowers are highlighted by a prominent yellow eyezone which is surrounded by nice white floral veining...outstanding!



For a fern I didn't even know a few years ago, Pleopeltis lepidopteris has quickly become one of our favorites. This sun-loving lithophyte (rock grower) fern hails the sandy, acidic coastal (restinga) habitats in Southern Brazil (Rio Grande du Sul). This offering is a Yucca Do find from a disjunct population along the beach in Morro dos Conventos, Brazil. The 18" tall x 2" wide, rigidly upright fronds emerge covered in thick silver hair, to which I can now relate. As the fronds age, the hair thins and the green leaf surface becomes more visible. Pleopeltis lepidopteris spreads slowly from surface rhizomes. We've grown this evergreen Pleopeltis in our rock garden since 2012, where it has thrived even through winter temperatures of 7 degrees F. In extremely hot climates, part sun to light shade might be best.



(aka: Synandrospadix D35-01) I'll always remember when I first met the hardy aroid, Synandrospadix vermitoxicus in person. It was 2002...

there it was, growing in the middle of the dirt road as we trekked through the Northern Argentina back country. Had a full-fledged Hortgasm...right in the middle of the damn road. Our single clone has thrived in our garden for more than a decade, and thanks to our friends at Yucca Do, we finally have enough seed-propagated plants to share. Synandrospadix 'Salta and Peppa' comes from the Salta region of Northern Argentina where it grows at 3,200' elevation...dramatically more winter hardy than the commercial green leaf form from warmer Columbia. When grown in dry, sunny sites, Synandrospadix vermitoxicus will reward you with upright, glaucous, blue-green, rubbery leaves that form a tight vase-shaped clump. The clumps are topped in late June with 1' tall stalks bearing amazing, tortoise-shell-shaped, lightly-fragrant (no, it doesn't smell like lilacs) flowers.

Each inflorescence (spathe and spadix) resembles abstract screensaver art... dark and light green stripes on the outside and dark and light purple stripes on the interior, serving as background for its alien looking, multiple impregnation point, purple sex organ. Synandrospadix doesn't emerge from dormancy until early to mid-June, so please don't call us in May wondering why your plant died. This is a very special, limited offering.

Our friends at Briggs Nursery propagation lab solved an age old mystery when a few of their tissue cultures of Yucca 'Blue Boy' mutated, only to discover that it had reverted back to the original purple-leaf form of the Southeast US native Yucca aloifolia. Since the cultivar name 'Purpurea' is hopelessly confused in the trade, this clone has been named Yucca aloifolia 'Indigo Dagger'. This spiky accent plant forms upright stalks to 4' tall, each dressed in sharp green leaves that take on a lovely mauvy-indigopurple color as nights cool in fall. The coloring is not induced by a lack of nutrition, which has been the case with most of the purple cultivars we've tried in the past. Spikes of white bell-shaped flowers top each stalk in early spring.

to capture with the camera) flowers with a white eye. The flowers change from dark reddish-pink to medium pink on day two, still highlighted by the contrasting white central eye zone. Zephyranthes 'Heart Throb' isn't fast to multiply, but we hope you'll agree it's worth the wait.
