experience, with the Kids of Courage folks.

There is always a remarkable dynamic at play at these KOC events.

It's difficult to explain what these kids so truly filled with courage have endured in their young lives and how the advent of KOC has changed and redefined what was once an existence that was confined to dealing with the limitations and difficulties



Perhaps there is an element present here that is reflective of life itself. There are serious health problems everywhere you turn here. But there is also a powerful parallel emotion of unbridled joy that is evident wherever you look. And I think that's what gives this experience a magnetic pull of sorts. It perhaps requires taking a step back to realize that this is simply a reflection, to an exaggerated extent, of life's everyday, sometimes brutal, contradictions.


that life has handed them. At these events like the week in L.A., the main focus is breaking through to the other side, to what a conventional kid's life should really be like.

One of the more outspoken young people—kind of an unofficial, free-association rambling spokesman for KOC, a young man named Boris—spoke to the more than 400 people gathered here about what it meant

for him, a kid confined to a wheelchair, to have the opportunity to travel to L.A. He said that before KOC came into being four years ago, he was more or less defined by his limitations. Now KOC has turned that all around, or upside down if you will. Now Boris says he is more defined by the things he does rather than the things he cannot or does not do.

This year's crowd was unprecedented in size. It was during the meals when just about everyone was gathered in the main ballroom of the Sheraton Gateway that one was able to absorb the scope and ambitiousness of this undertaking. The additional interesting thing about all this is the smoothness and agility with which the group gets around town.



Here they are in Disneyland, then at an Angels baseball game, then off to a water park, and so on. During two of the evenings that I was with them, they featured full-blown barbecues for about 500 people (including guests and local community members who joined for the evening) with style and panache.

The first night we were there, we were hosted by Mr. and Mrs. Steve



Spira in Hancock Park. And then on Sunday night, on the regulation-size basketball court of the Murrow family in Beverly Hills. Needless to say, both neighborhoods are very upscale, with incredibly artistic landscaping the order of the day. One got a real thrill both evenings witnessing the early evening serenity shattered when seven large coach buses, measuring in total an entire suburban block, pulled up to the front of a string of homes. In an instant the volunteer staff is out of the buses and quickly opening the hatches to break out the dozens of wheelchairs that would be needed for the evening.

As fascinating and challenging as it is to observe this exercise, it is also deeply moving and even riveting to watch how everything is seemingly so synchronized and well-practiced. The kids and their young-adult volunteer staff move pincer-style into



their hosts' expansive and lavish yards. Music is booming, either by a live band or a DJ featuring largerthan-life speakers whose sound can force you back if you get too close.

An extensive buffet dinner is presented, and after a long day in the hot sun, people seem famished and ready to dine. There is an ever-present giddiness and positive energy in the air. And those in charge are always carefully watching the clock. While everything on the surface seems free and easy and all are having an immense amount of summer fun, still there are young people here who have to have their medications administered to them on time, and they need their rest.

On Saturday night, after Shabbos at the hotel, the popular L.A.-based Marcus brothers of the 8th Day group performed to an overly animated and excited crowd. People streamed in from nearby communities to partake in the *melaveh malkah* and watch over 150 kids party so very hearty. The pizza and the ice cream were moving fast, along with the cotton candy, shakes, and other traditional nosh.

The room was rocking. A friend of mine stood nearby with both hands over his ears. You have to be able to appreciate the way in which loud music can jolt your senses and jar you out of your ennui. It was an amazing event. Kids who cannot walk were in their own way dancing, either by shaking their head or perhaps just moving their shoulders. In other words, they were into it.

The credits to put something like this together are endless. Everyone involved is in charge of something. Dr. Stuart Ditchek, a pediatrician from Brooklyn, is the medical director. He is surrounded by a staff of ten nurses and a group of paramedics that work in shifts around the clock. There is a waiting list of doctors, I was told, who want to close their practices or take off from work for a week in order to join KOC at one of these events.

As far as the one-to-one and sometimes two-to-one ratio of volunteer staff to "kid," there is also a waiting list of over 1,000 people angling to get accepted and come on one of these whirlwind trips.



When Dr. Ditchek gets up to speak to the crowd, he speaks of medical emergencies in a very routine and matter-of-fact fashion. It's Friday night after the seudah and he is urging the "counselors" not to hesitate to use their phones and dial the emergency number in case they feel there is a medical situation that requires a response from the medical team during the night.

The counselors are not trained medical professionals, though many of them are regular attendees to these getaways and the assortment of Shabbatonim that take place during the course of the year. The doctor knows that as kids who are from observant homes and who came up through the yeshiva system, there will be a natural reluctance to use their phones on Shabbos. He therefore needs to be emphatic about what is the halachically approved method to respond to an emer-

The fact is that there is so much more at play here that doesn't meet the eye. A vital element not seen from this vantage point is the respite that families receive knowing that their children are away having fun and being cared for meticulously, just the way they would be cared for at home. This means a great deal to all involved.

It is a wonderful and inspiring environment that helps just about anyone parin our lives in their proper perspective. The news is that it all ends on Thursday with a charter flight back to New York. There will be a series of smaller events between now and the next big trip this coming winter. I think Boris said it best when he referenced the next big excursion in his remarks last Shabbos. "This winter we are going to the Bahamas," he said. ❖

asherah, any tree, near the altar of G-d (Devarim 16:21) This verse includes two prohibitions: not to plant an ahseirah (idolatrous) tree anywhere, and not to plant any tree, or build any tree on the Temple Mount. (Sifri; Rashi)

You shall not plant

for yourself an

To seek to beautify the Holy Temple by planting trees around it is an insult to the holiness of the place, whose beauty derives from itself and not from external "landscaping."


This also explains the Talmud's statement (Sanhedrin 7a), that the reason the Torah places this law immediately following the law regarding the appointment of judges is to teach us that "whoever appoints an unqualified judge it is as if he planted an asheira near the altar." Often, we see people appointed to positions of authority because of their external appearance, charm, and oratorical prowess, instead of their knowledge, integrity and fear of Heaven ...

Goldstein shot up the Cave of the Patriarchs in Hebron, has the mainstream press, which is so critical of Israel, had a chance to once again proclaim the existence of Jewish terrorism.

Yes, sadly it is true. Some kids were hanging out in Zion Square at the bottom of Ben Yehuda Street in Jerusalem after midnight one night last week, and a fight broke out after some words were exchanged between Arab and Jewish youths. The Arab kids were outnumbered by the Jewish teens, and one of the Arabs absorbed a serious beating that knocked him unconscious and sent him to Hadassah Hospital, where he is recuperating.

President Shimon Peres was amongst the first to refer to the incident as "Jewish terror." Peres has been waiting since the miserable, damaging, and murderous failure of the Oslo Accords to achieve the perception of parity between terrorists on both sides of this lopsided equation. So along with the Times in New York, Peres and a few other Israeli officials have decided that this was a serious terrorist incident perpetrated by Jews on Arabs.

The message is simple: You see, we are all the same—all prone to violence—and the so-called occupation of the land is now corrupting people on both sides. But these were 14- and 15-year-old kids; one or two may have even been younger than that. Sure, an element of nationalism and prejudice may have seeped into the mix, but this

was no terror attack along the lines of what we have all unfortunately become accustomed to.

Then again, maybe terror is marked on some kind of a curve. After all, we can't have leaders around the world condemning a simple scuffle between teenagers on a city street and dub it a dangerous international incident. But then again, if it involves Israel and Jewish children, we have to take what we can get. If this is the worst terror they can dispense, then so be it. The press will just have to take it and run with it.

Peres's condemnation of this socalled Jew-on-Arab terror reminds me of the story that goes back to the founding of the new State of Israel in 1948. When it was related to Israel's first prime minister, David Ben-Gurion, that there were prostitutes working on the streets of Tel Aviv, he is reported to have expressed satisfaction with the news, explaining that he now knew that Israel was going to be a state like all the other states that dotted the globe.

At least Prime Minister Netanyahu had the good sense not to rush to call it terrorism. The PM referred to the incident on Tuesday, saying that there was no place for this kind of racism in Israel.

The events of late last Thursday evening are still under investigation, so if anything is certain, it is that it is unclear what really took place. It may have been a tussle that was tinged with long-standing attitudes that are dominant in a significant segment of Israeli society.

The so-called terrorist attack committed by as many as ten Jewish youth pales greatly when we compare it to the murder of Tali Hatuel at the Kissufim Crossing in Gush Katif in May 2004. Hatuel, who was eight months pregnant, was killed along with her four daughters, Hila, 11; Hadar, 9; Roni, 7; and Merav, 2. They were riding in their station wagon on the way to pick up her husband, David, from work in Ashkelon when real terrorists fired in their direction, hitting Tali and forcing the car off the road. Once the car came to a halt, the Islamic Jihad terrorists ran to the car and shot Tali and the girls repeatedly at point-blank range in order to make sure they were





would have died from the assault are ridiculous and need severe condemnation, but they can probably be chalked up more to stupidity and immaturity than anything else.

But terror? Mr. Peres, you have got to be kidding. This was no terror attack. A terror attack is more akin to what happened to Nava Applebaum and her dad, Dr. David Applebaum, in September 2003. It was the night before her wedding, which was to take place in Jerusalem. Father and daughter went out for coffee to Café Hillel on Hillel Street in the capital. They were there when a suicide bomber struck and, along with others, were killed instantly.

The Times reported on Tuesday of this week that seven Israeli teenagers were arrested and "accused of what police officials and several witnesses described as an attempted lynching of several Palestinian youths." That's a wonderful characterization of a teenage street fight. I seriously doubt whether any of these kids have any idea what a lynching is or how the concept works. Still, for an American readership it conjures up images of the Old South and how blacks were mindlessly and mercilessly preyed upon by racist whites and murdered for no reason other than the fact that they were black. It was a shameful time for this country.

Oh yes, the use of the term "lynching" is not exactly brand new in Is-

rael's part of the world. In October 2000, two IDF reserve soldiers, Yossi Avrahami and Vadim Nurzhitz, made a wrong turn in their military jeep into the Arab city of Ramallah, just 15 minutes outside of Jerusalem. The two were arrested by Palestinian police, and then, when a mob besieged the police station they were being held in, the police refused to protect them and they were hacked to death, their bodies mutilated. You probably remember the photograph of Palestinian policeman Marwan Maadi holding up and displaying his hands, red with the blood of the two Israeli soldiers.

Unlike young Mr. Julani, Avrahami and Nurzhitz will not be recovering from their injuries and going home after two days in a Jerusalem hospital. Well, there are terror attacks and then there are terror attacks. I believe that the thought process here has to be seriously retooled. It has to start at the top, with Mr. Peres, and someone should tell him (once again) to stop pandering to Israel's detractors and antagonists.

Those boys who beat up Mr. Julani should indeed be disciplined and taught sensitivity. They were obviously a wild bunch that need to be dealt with, and this experience should serve as a lesson for others. But if anything clearly emerges from this experience, it is that this was no terror attack and those kids are not terrorists. ❖

It has to do with retzuos, the straps that bind the tefillin to the head and to the arm.

The Talmud tells us (Menachos 35a and Shabbos 28b) that the tefillin straps must be black and this is a law that Moshe Rabbeinu handed down to us orally, straight from the mountain at Sinai. The tefillin may only be tied with their own type-in other words, the straps must also be made

For thousands of years, tefillin straps have been produced and painted black. The black paint, after years of use, will sometimes come off and people have always had some black paint handy to re-

In recent times, however, a new type of tefillin strap has emerged, apparently utilizing a different type of process to ensure that they are black. This new tefillin has on it what appears to be a peelable film of black plastic that is on the tefillin strap.

Those who claim that this tefillin is not kosher are of the opinion that this is either a plastic laminate that was placed on the tefillin, and not paint, or that even if it is paint, it is peelable and not halachically considered paint. This author had posed the question to Dayan Yechezkel Roth, the Karlsburger dayan, who tentatively answered (on Wednesday, August 22) that the straps, as described, would be definitely not kosher. However, it could be that the question



was not presented as accurately as

Those who say that it is permitted are claiming that it is a dye, not a plastic film. It is just a dye that turns into a plastic-looking film later. Rabbi Moshe Shoul Klein, the dayan in Rav Vosner's beis din in Bnei Brak, issued a ruling that the retzuos in question are definitely permitted and even those who seek mehadrin min ha'mehadrin may use it. The letter was issued this past 19th of

There are also those who are unsure, as yet, as to what the halachic status of these tefillin straps are. This is the opinion of R' Akiva Oppen, the owner of Oppen Scrolls in Cedarhurst. He quoted a ruling from Rav Mordechai Friedlander, the motz l'inyanei STAM of the B'Datz and the rav of Ramat Shlomo in Yerushalayim, as having said, "It is not

clear; the beis din has to clear the issue. Right now, it should not be announced publicly that it is forbidden." He further quoted him as having said, "A kol koreh should not be made for this. Let the beis din do their job." He stated not to publicize it yet and that he is looking into it. Rav Friedlander is known to have been Rav Elyashiv's right-hand man when it came to the halachos of STAM.

Others who have called Rav Friedlander, however, state that his position was that it was not permissible. local rabbanim have quoted this second version of Rav Friedlander's ruling.

This author called Rav Friedlander and received the following clarification: "I said that if it was peeled off already, then it is not kosher at all. However, if it was not yet peeled that is a bridge we have to cross. Rabbi Oppen's quote of me was 100% accurate and I stand behind it completely."

He further explained, "Kol z'man that it is on there, there is no din per se that the tzeva has to get into the ohr and not come out like a piece of plastic. Kol z'man that it is intact [i.e., that it comes

The local stores that have sold the new type of tefillin strap are offering free exchanges for their customers who purchased these straps. However, in the absence of rabbinic opinion claiming that they are, in fact, not kosher, they are not labeling it non-kosher. They are, however, no longer selling the product.

The halachic concerns regarding these *tefillin* straps are as follows:

1. Is this black plastic considered to actually be dying the straps if they are

so peelable? In other words, are they really black from a *halachic* perspective?

2. Is this considered a chatzitzah? Is there a need for the retzuos, the straps, to be completely clear and unblocked by anything?

The Mishnah Berurah (O.C. 32:185) cites a similar trend regarding the paint of the tefillin housing that occurred in the late 1800s when the sofrim developed some sort of coating that can actually be peeled off in its entirety. In describing it, he writes, "Its form resembles black paper." In declaring it non-kosher, the Mishnah Berurah cites the Nishmas Adam (klal 14) who forbids it.

The rationale of the Nishmas Adam is that the tefillin box must be open to the air. He cites the Talmud in Sanhedrin (89a) backing up this view. If the coloring has significant substance to it, then it would be considered a block that does not allow it to be exposed to the open air.

Rabbi Yechezkel Landau, in his Noda BiYehuda (MK OC #1) writes that even if there is substance to it, it is still permitted because since it comes to beautify it, it is considered batel to the tefillin housing. The Mishnah Berurah chooses not to rely on this view in regard to a coating that can be peeled off in its entirety, but to rely on it when the coating is still solid enough that it can be chipped off one piece at a time.

Some may be tempted to try to prove from this Mishnah Berurah that the newfangled retzuos are kosher. How so? Because the Mishnah Berurah cites the view of the Nishmas Adam to say that it is non-kosher because it is not exposed to the air. He does not bring any argument to say that it is not considered black. Others say that there are numerous distinctions between these two cases and that a proof cannot be brought from a non-statement at any rate.

Some of the people who have purchased the new straps have witnessed the black layer peeling off. Presumably, the sweat and hair oil that are on the wearer's body are causing it to come apart. At any rate, after the top layer comes off, a brown, undyed strap is left below.

Of late, a number of entrepreneurial individuals have started manufacturing tefillin straps in Brazil and Thailand. The Ukrainian ones have become more widespread.

Is there only one company that is producing problematic retzuos? Apparently not. This author was present when a well-known philanthropist came in for new retzuos. He had purchased them from a reliable sofer in Jerusalem—one that thousands of local people have purchased their tefillin from.

What is the reason for the problem? There are three major theories that insiders have been proposing, all of them involving some unfortunate tweaking to the older methods of processing. Possibility #1 is that the method of leather processing has changed from a 4-to-5-day process to an overnight process. Instead of utilizing vegetable oils in the processing, the new chemicals being used are changing the absorption properties of the leather-which explains the peeling. Others have explained that the manufacturers have purposefully changed the leather so that less paint will be necessary to make it black. Yet a third theory is that too much plastic has been put into the paint itself.

The Five Towns Jewish Times is in the process of sending the tefillin paint to check for the percentage of

What will be the final disposition of these tefillin straps? It is this author's view that the eida chareidis beis din will end up forbidding it and that they are, in fact, problematic.

Were those people who wore the tefillin reciting a berachah levatalah? The Eishel Avraham (OC 39) clearly rules that they did not. However, from now on, they should not recite a blessing over them and they should definitely wear a different pair.

Are there tefillin straps without problems? "Tefillin straps that are manufactured now under the supervision of the eidah chareidis are without problem," remarked Rabbi Abraham Berkowitz from Five Towns Judaica. "They have a mashgiach temidi present during the entire process." Rabbi Shimbarsky, who studied in the Ponevezh yeshiva, and Rabbi Dunnenfeld, who studied in Brisk, are two such manufacturers with an impeccable reputation under the eidah chareidis. 🌣

of a break for those in need of some R&R (religious respite). From the start of the Three Weeks to the conclusion of Sukkos, the message that our fate is in the hands of a higher source, that our destiny is in large part not controlled by us, is reflected in our every prayer and action. Sometimes we are summoned to action by the loud blast of the *shofar*. Other times we are enlisted by the silent whispers of the *lulav* as we wave it back and forth, up and down, side to side.

We live in a noisy world. We have been conditioned to believe that he who screams the loudest, wins. We are impressed with style over substance, looks over depth. I, for one, prefer the call of the silent *lulav* and pray that this year will be a quiet year.

I grew up in a noisy house. Eight children, two parents, and then brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, and then their children, thank G-d, made Simon and Garfunkel's "Sound of Silence" not just a song, but a prayer.

Every Thursday night, my mother, may she rest in peace, would disappear to the public library for an hour or two for a well-deserved break from the commotion. I would accompany her sometimes, sit in the huge big black swivel chairs in the newspaper section, and, believe it or not, enjoy the quiet. It's been a long time—too long—since I have had the time or opportunity to enjoy such quiet. The faint rustle of the *lulav* branch is good enough for me.

People often ask me if I display my humor in court in front of the judges. On rare occasions I do, but most often I allow the judge to set the tone. If he or she wants humor, I will toss in a good line here or there. If the judge is in a serious mood, the last thing I want to do is show him or her up by switching the mood. I read the judge. That is the first thing I do as I enter the courtroom. In fact, I will sit in the courtroom watching the judge handle other cases-instead of waiting in the hallway till my case is called-so that I can see what kind of mood the judge is in on that particular day. If the judge is in a shofar mood, I bring in the shofar. If the judge prefers the hush of the lulav, that becomes my weapon of choice.

I recall not too long ago covering a case for my partner, who was away on vacation. We basically are aware of each other's cases and spend a lot of time each day discussing the cases that I am primarily handling and the cases that she is primarily responsible for. Accordingly, I was well aware of all the facts and circumstances surrounding that particular case when I entered court that day.

The judge was in a serious, all-business mode, which I observed by arriving 20 minutes before my adversary. I had witnessed the judge "let loose" on another attorney that morning so I knew to keep it low-key. I would state my position once and only once for the record and let the judge control the courtroom.

Unfortunately for my adversary, by arriving late he did not have the advantage I had of observing the judge's mood that morning. He stated his position, and in trying to gain somewhat of

out mine. That was strike number two. The judge screamed at my adversary, who made the mistake of interrupting the judge's admonition, trying to defend himself. That was strike three.

I had won by barely stating a word. The relief we had requested was granted.

We had won! But in this noisy world, the client was so used to the fact that he who screams loudest, he who makes the bigger commotion, wins. It totally escaped her that we had been victorious precisely because I was more silent. There was no need for me to join all the yelling. I left the *shofar* at home

that day and brought the lulav instead.

To be sure, there are times when the shrill sound of the *shofar* is necessary. But more often than not, the stillness of the palm branch can carry the day.

For the next 30 days, we need the *sho-far* to arouse us from our spiritual sleep. But after that, I'm praying for a quiet year, a peaceful year, a year of whispers, and sounds of silence. ❖

"Mr. Wolfson, there is a young man that you have to meet who shares many of your goals." Mr. Wolfson had just come to my office unannounced. I had no idea who he was, and we

Y.H.: You hit it off right away?

A.D.: Actually no. At the beginning we did not get on well at all. But soon we developed very close ties and became quite close.

Y.H.: So how would you describe Mr. Wolfson's contributions to the State of Israel?

A.D.: Reb Zev Wolfson's life has to be divided into two parts. There is Zev Wolfson the askan and Zev Wolfson the gvir. [Askan means involved person and gvir means financial benefactor.] I was familiar with him in both facets of his assistance to the state. As far as his askanut, there was no one who did more for Sephardic Jewry and for their hatzalah than Zev Wolfson.

Y.H.: Specifically . . .

A.D.: Well, let me give you a typical example. As you know, he was involved in Chinuch Atzmai from the very beginning and was Rav Aharon Kotler's right-hand man. But in the very beginning, the state did not help the Chinuch Atzmai school system at all. There were some very serious financial problems in the beginning. The treasurer at the time was a fellow named Shlomo Hoffman. And no, I do not believe that he was any relation to you, though I could be mistaken.

Y.H.: No, no relation.

A.D.: Anyway, one day, Shlomo Hoffman receives an urgent phone call from the Foreign Office in Israel. "You have caused enormous damage to the State of Israel. You must come down immediately." Hoffman is in a state of shock. What had he done? What were they talking about? He went down and was told by the ambassador's staff member, "A fellow named Mr. Zev Wolfson had contacted a number of senators that all aid to Israel should be temporarily stopped until the financial problems in the religious sector of Israel's schools are resolved to the satisfaction of Shlomo Hoffman." What is the meaning of this? Hoffman answered that he had no idea. Needless to say, the Israelis fixed the problem and the aid was given. In fact, Wolfson had made sure that in the allocation there was a stipulation that the funding be exclusively for Sephardic Jews.

Y.H.: That is not the case now. I know that all the Chinuch Atzmai schools get allocations.

A.D.: Yes, Menachem Porush addressed that and had that changed to include Ashkenazim. [laughs]

Y.H.: Oh, well . . . [laughs] What other aspects . . . ?

A.D.: Oh, he did much more than this. He realized that we had to do more than the schooling system was doing, and that is when he began backing the metivtot programs. No one can possibly fathom what he did, but he was intimately involved in the creation of some 70 dormitory schools throughout Israel. He helped them

all. Rav Tenami's metivta, the Orach Chaim metivta, Rav Blechner's place, and many more.

Y.H.: This was strictly through his financial support?

A.D.: No, he was also able to take advantage of some refugee funding and helped direct it there. However, eventually they stopped the programming. Also, I just want to add that both my brother and I personally benefitted from Mr. Wolfson's efforts. I came to Israel from Morocco in 1968 with my brother. I was 9 and my brother was 11. He is now the rabbi of Be'er Sheva. Were it not for Wolfson, neither of us would be where we are today. His assistance with the buildings and such was not only through the United States. He was able to do this in France as well and was close to Chirac.

Y.H.: In what other capacity did he assist the State of Israel?

A.D.: In both loans and loan guarantees through his lobbying, he was able to shave off percentage points. Indeed, Rabin told me about him that there was never a Jew who had helped Eretz Yisrael as much as he had.

But also, Rabin told me that in 1973, during the Yom Kippur War, the Syrians were already in Tveria. Baruch Hashem we were able to push them back, but there was no more ammunition. Golda Meir reached out to President Nixon. She begged. She pleaded. She even cried. But he was not budging. Kissinger also seemed to be unmoved by her pleas. They did not want to provide Israel with material assistance, apparently because they were afraid of being cut off from Arab oil. It was Zev Wolfson who individually contacted the senators who pressured the president.

I had asked Mr. Wolfson about it later, and at first he was reluctant to describe what he had done, but he did tell me. Mr. Wolfson had posed the question to Rav Moshe Feinstein [zt'l], who had told him that he may even travel on the Shabbos to lobby the senators in person. This is exactly what he did. He traveled to Washington on Shabbos with the heter of Rav Moshe Feinstein.

Y.H.: How did he perceive his role or his mission, in your estimation?


A.D.: He looked at things as if it was not his money at all. He viewed himself as merely a gabbai. This, by the way, explains all the stories about him traveling coach instead of first class or business class. Whenever he came to Eretz Yisrael he was busy all day with meetings about what he could do to help. From morning until night. I think that also, his view of how to look at things transferred to his children. He leaves behind a family of Yerei Shamayim that are following in his footsteps.



PA Official: Israel's 'Inciting Rhetoric' Leading To Violence

The Palestinian Authority's official media outlets, Israeli media-monitoring groups allege, serve as organs promoting the glorification of terrorism, hatred of Jews, and intransigence in negotiations. Readers of the Five Towns Jewish Times are no doubt familiar with news reports quoting PA-TV and the Al Hayat Al Jadida newspaper, by way of Palestinian Media Watch (PMW). Such reports, a staple in many Israeli and Jewish media outlets, outline the ways in which Israelis and Zionism are demonized in the PA. However, less well known are the PA's incitement reports, cataloguing what the PA's leadership considers to be Israeli incitement.

Started several months ago by Ghassan Khatib, a Palestinian Arab academic and the head of the Palestinian Government Media Center (PGMC) in Ramallah, the monthly incitement report details examples of Israeli extremism, such as calling the territories captured in 1967 "Judea and Samaria," their Biblical names.

These monthly reports are distributed by e-mail to foreign journalists and diplomats stationed in Israel and the PA and have led to articles on incitement in publications such as *Haaretz*.

Khatib, who recently announced his impending return to Birzeit University, agreed to sit down with this correspondent for a one-on-one in his office in an upscale neighborhood of the PA administrative center of Ramallah.

Khatib explained why he believes Israel is the one truly engaging in incitement. "Incitement is leading to Israeli violence," he said, stating that there has been an increase in anti-Palestinian attacks due to "the inciting rhetoric that you hear sometimes from politicians and religious leaders."

"Palestinians," he said, "have always objected to certain problematic Israeli behaviors or statements that had an inciting effect," but the Palestinian objections were "unsystematic" and unorganized.

Now, in light of "the larger picture in which in Israel today there is an increase in hatred, hostility, and rhetoric of the kind that encourages violence and hatred and racism against Palestinians," it has become imperative, he said, to begin addressing the issue of Israeli racism head on.

Among the monthly incitement reports' primary recurring objections is Israel's "provocative denial" of Palestinian history. "Distorting history for political purposes is profoundly disturbing," Khatib said, "and in the context of the Middle East is an obvious incitement against those who wish to live in peace side by side."

It is especially disturbing when practiced in schools, he said. He is bothered in particular, he states in one of his reports, by comments by Education Minister Gideon Sa'ar, who

is accused of "rejecting Palestinian history" by downplaying the "Palestinian history" of Jerusalem.

Sa'ar is cited in the report as saying that "Jerusalem has never been the capital of other than the Jewish people." Khatib finds this unacceptable. It goes without saying, the report notes, that if the education minister holds these views, Israeli students would be indoctrinated in them via his education policies.

Among the alleged denials of Palestinian attachment to the land raised by Khatib is that "Israeli textbooks foster hate." Citing an Israeli textbook that refers to the disputed territories as Judea and Samaria, Khatib wrote that "insisting on using the term 'Judea and Samaria' rather than 'West Bank' or 'Palestinian territory' is nothing but delegitimizing Palestinian rights and ignoring the existence of Palestine. It not only denies

Palestinian rights to their land but contributes to unmaking Palestine in the minds of Israeli children by teaching in schools that the West Bank is theirs, and part of Israel."

Khatib elaborates that the PA "uses terms in a legal way that was agreed on, that were included in the agreements signed by the two sides. "The essence of our problem with the Israeli textbooks vis-à-vis maps is that we simply don't exist. We as Palestinians, or Palestinian territories, we don't exist in the Israeli maps and curricula."

However, statements denying Israeli history abound on Palestinian television and radio, in official newspapers and in school books, said Itamar Marcus of PMW. The PA Ambassador to Geneva, Ibrahim Kharisha, he points out, recently said on the official PATV television channel that "the Palestinians [were] in Palestine before the Jews came to us from Egypt, via Sinai."


"Before Christianity sprouted in Palestine, and before Islam arrived from

the Hijaz, Palestinians have been in Palestine. And everyone remembers that in 2010, we celebrated the 10,000th anniversary of the establishment of the Palestinian city Jericho."

Knowing that such an Israeli objection to his statements would be inevitable, Khatib points out that "Israelis started to complain that Israel doesn't exist in the Palestinian textbooks, so we just wanted to remind them that we also don't exist in their textbooks, so it doesn't make sense to criticize the absence of Israel in our textbooks at a time when we don't exist in any way in the Israeli textbooks."

This, Marcus replies, is the Palestinians "trying to create a symmetry by pretending that Israel is doing the same thing." The use of the term "Judea and Samaria" is completely legitimate, Marcus believes, stating that they were the historic designation for these regions for thousands of years and are the best non-political terms to use in describing the disputed terri-

tories, whatever one's political orientation or views on Palestinian statehood. "The same sources that call Jerusalem 'Jerusalem' and Jaffa 'Jaffa' call these regions 'Judea and Samaria.' So why doesn't he stop calling it Jaffa if that's what his problem is, using biblical terms?" Marcus asks.

"Nowhere in any accords does it say it can't be called Judea and Samaria and, most important, this land of Judea and Samaria is, according to the Oslo Accords, to be negotiated. It's not, even by the Oslo Accords, called Palestine, it's called the Palestinian Authority. By him calling it Palestine, he is trying to impose a status" that neither the Oslo Accords nor any other until now has given it.

Citing examples from the PA media such as the Al-Hayat Al-Jadida newspaper calling pre-1967 Israel "Palestine occupied in 1948" and claims that Jesus was a Palestinian, despite the name Palestine only being imposed on Judea by the Romans 136 years after his birth, Marcus asserts that "one of the most important Palestinian endeavors today is what I would call replacement: to replace Jewish history with a fictitious and fabricated Palestinian history."

When the PA claims the Western Wall was really where Muhammad tied his horse, that there was no Temple on the Temple Mount, or that Rachel's and Joseph's tombs are really mosques, and Israel declares that they are historically Jewish, Marcus alleges, the PA finds it easy to accuse Israel of incitement for calling the Arabs on their revisionist narrative.

"The Palestinians would like Israel to stop talking about its history because Israel's history means that we have a historical connection to the land, and their basic ideology said that Israel has no connection and has no right to exist and they don't want this claim to be challenged."

The book instructs Palestinians to refer to suicide bombings as "martyrdom-seeking operations" and reinforces Marcus's contention that the PA is actively endorsing terrorism.

While there has been an uptick in reported Jewish violence against Arabs, it certainly cannot be attributed to any official government propaganda on the part of the State of Israel, Marcus says. Ultimately, he believes, the biggest difference between PA inPost that incitement "is harmful to the relation between the two sides" he is correct. However, it seems that his focus on Israeli incitement may just be a fig leaf to cover his own government's failures in this area, and Marcus believes that peace demands that he own up to that fact. ❖

Marcus brandishes a recently uncovered PA publication entitled "Terminology in Media, Culture and Politics" which seeks to instruct Palestinians to replace "the Israeli and American dissemination of poisoned terms." According to this book, using Israeli terminology "turns the essence of the Zionist endeavor from a racist, colonialist endeavor into an endeavor of self-definition and independence for the Jewish People."




Store your sheitel in a place away from a lot of heat, away from humidity, and away from dust. All of these will kill your sheitel.

Discovering Their Jewish Roots

Twenty-five young Polish Jews, many of whom have only recently discovered their Jewish roots, arrived in Israel this week for a special seminar organized by Shavei Israel, an organization that aims to strengthen the connection between descendants of Jews and the State of Israel and the Jewish people. The participants, between the ages of 18 and 35, most of whom were raised Catholic, came from a variety of cities throughout Poland, primarily Krakow, Katowice, Warsaw, Przemysl, and Gdansk. For many it marks their first time visiting Israel.

"There is a growing thirst among young Poles with Jewish roots to learn more about their Jewish religious and cultural heritage," said Shavei Israel chairman Michael Freund. "This awakening would have been unthinkable just 25 or 30 years ago, but since the downfall of Communism, an increasing number of Poles have sought to reclaim and affirm their Jewish identity. We owe it to them to assist them in any way that we can."

Freund added, "With the start of the Jewish New Year just a few weeks away, it is fitting that these young Poles have come to Israel to rekindle their bond with the Jewish people. They represent the future of Polish Jewry, which despite decades of suffering and persecution is now beginning to thrive. There can be no sweeter revenge for what was done to us seven decades ago in Poland than to reconnect as many of these young Polish Jews as possible with Israel and the Jewish people."

The unique program, which is run by Shavei Israel's team of Polishspeaking rabbis and educators, is designed to assist them in discovering more about their Jewish roots and learning more about ancient and modern-day Israel. Among the topics that will be covered are the laws of Shabbos; the upcoming festivals


Not only will the young Poles delve deeper into Jewish study in the classroom, but they will also have an opportunity to tour various sites in Israel such as Masada and the Dead Sea, and the northern part of the country including the Sea of Galilee and the Kabbalistic city of Tsfat. The group will also visit the Jewish Quarter in the Old City of Jerusalem and explore the Western Wall tunnels.

Two special activities include a meeting with the Polish Ambassador to Israel, and an all-day study seminar at a local yeshiva.

Today, there are approximately 4,000 Jews registered as living in Poland, but experts suggest there may be tens of thousands of other Jews in Poland who to this day either are hiding their identities or are simply unaware of their family heritage. In recent years, a growing number of such people, popularly known as the "Hidden Jews of Poland," have begun to return to Judaism and to the Jewish people.

Shavei Israel is currently active in nine countries and provides assistance to a variety of different communities such as the Bnei Menashe of India, the Bnei Anousim (referred to as the derogatory "Marranos" by historians) in Spain, Portugal, and South America, the Subbotnik Jews of Russia, the Jewish community of Kaifeng in China, descendants of Jews living in Poland, and others. A True Visionary

This tale is a corker! I won't take offense if you don't believe what you are about to read. I solemnly promise, however, that it's true. There's a new product available in Jerusalem, as a result of which some enterprising soul over there might soon find himself making big bucks. The product is a small sticker. Your eyes don't deceive you; you've read the previous sentence correctly. A sticker!

An ultra-ultra-fringe group of Jews decided that they needed custom eyewear, in the form of a sticker that they could place on eyeglass lenses to blur the wearer's vision. The explanation for wanting to have one's vision blurred follows here, but, readers, please brace yourselves for it: It is to avoid accidental—and forbidden—contact with scantily clad women. Don't yell at me. I'm simply reporting this news bite; I'm not making it up. I couldn't. I'm not that creative.

There are other sights I would be best off not seeing, but intentionally blurring my vision isn't something I would


I can think of a few things I would rather not see, but I wouldn't mess with my vision to accomplish that.



Holocaust, Holocaust, **Holocaust**

When Palestinian Authority presidential adviser Ziad Al-Bandak paid his respects recently at the Auschwitz-Birkenau death camp, Hamas spokesman Fawzi Barhoum called the Palestinian's visit there "a marketing of a false Zionist alleged tragedy."

A newly appointed Romanian government official, Dan Sova, averred earlier this year that "No Jew suffered on Romanian territory" during World War II. (Tens of thousands of Romanian Jews were killed on Romanian territory, and hundreds of thousands others deported to their deaths. The historian Raul Hilberg concluded that "no country, besides Germany, was involved in massacres of Jews on such a scale.")

We tend to get exercised by Holocaust denial, and for good reason. The refusal to accept the facts that part of the ostensibly civilized world went on a genocidal murder spree over the years 1938-1945 and that most of the rest of the world didn't much care implies a certain regret that the genocide failed.

In the end, though, deniers of that historical truth are—at least outside the Arab world generally marginalized, recognized as either mentally deficient or depraved.

But then there are those, even among our fellow Jews, who are, if not Holocaust deniers, then Holocaust deriders. Like a writer for Tablet, an online magazine, who recently wrote (Warning: deeply offensive quote ahead) that "Each time we clapped for the old Hungarian lady who spoke about Dachau, each time Elie Wiesel threw another anonymous anecdote of betrayal onto a page, I eyed it askance, thinking, 'What did you do that you're not talking about?' I had the gut instinct that these were villains masquerading as victims who, solely by virtue of surviving (very likely by any means necessary), felt that they had earned the right to be heroes, their basic, animal self-interest dressed up with glorified phrases like 'triumph of the human spirit."

And more (if the reader has the stomach for it): "I wondered if anyone had alerted Hitler that in the event that the final solution didn't pan out, only

Like some recent blogging by a reporter for the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, the premier American Jewish news service. The blog entries are thus windows on their writers' minds.

This particular writer, who produced a short, straightforward report on the recent Daf Yomi Siyum HaShas, used his blog platform to present his followers a "real time" series of observations from MetLife Stadium on August 1. I don't mean, of course, to in any way compare Holocaust fatigue to sewage like Holocaust denial and Holocaust derision. The latter are evils, the former an unfortunate problem.

But it's a problem, a deeply discomfiting one, all the same. ❖

Judges and officers you shall place at all your city-gates . . .

(Devarim 16:18)

Do not judge alone, for no one can judge alone but the One.

(Pirkei Avos 4:8)

Monetary matters are decided by a court of three judges ... capital crimes by a tribunal of 23 judges.... From where is this derived? For it is written (Bamidbar 35:24-25): "And the community shall judge ... and the community shall save"—we need a community of judges arguing to convict the accused, and a community of judges arguing to exonerate him. Thus we have 20 (a "community" indicating a minimum of 10, as per Bamidbar 14:27). A conviction requires a majority of two (as per Sh'mos 23:2), and a court of law cannot have an even number of judges; thus we need 23 judges (22 so that there should be a majority of 2 over the 10 "saving" judges, and another judge so that the court should not be even-numbered).

(Talmud, Sanhedrin 2a-b)

Under Torah law, capital crimes are tried by a tribunal of 23 judges called a "minor Sanhedrin." After hearing the testimony of the witnesses, the judges themselves would split into two groups: those inclined to argue for the acquittal of the accused would serve as his "defense team" and seek to convince their colleagues of his innocence; those inclined to convict would make the case for his guilt. Then the judges would vote. A majority of one was sufficient to exonerate, while a majority of two was necessary to convict.

But what if all 23 judges form an initial opinion of guilt? What if the evidence is so compelling and the crime so heinous that not a single member of the tribunal chooses to argue in favor of the accused? In such a case, says Torah law, the accused cannot be convicted and must be exonerated by the court.

The Lubavitcher Rebbe explains the rationale behind this law as follows: No man is so utterly evil that there is nothing to be said in his defense. There is always some explanation, some justification, some perspective from which the underlying goodness of his soul can be glimpsed. This does not mean that he is going to be found innocent, in the legal sense, by a court of law: at times the "mitigating circumstances" result in a verdict of acquittal, and at times they do not. But if not a single member of the court perceives the "innocent side" of the person standing accused before them, this a court that obviously has very little understanding of who he is and what he has done. Such a court has disqualified itself from passing judgment on him.

Well, we wouldn't have to discuss it if our food was here already.

Okay, so there are better examples than a glass of water. Let's say life hands you lemons . . .



Do Knot Disturb

I had a friend who purchased an airline ticket using his frequent-flyer miles. Some issue arose and he needed to contact customer service while at the airport. He called the company and apologized for not having his frequent-flyer number handy and instead offered his name. The agent was having some difficulty locating his account and my friend exclaimed in exasperation, "How many accounts can one frequent-flyer program possibly have for a Steve Moss from New York?" "Well over a hundred!" was the response. Common names can sometimes lead to confusion—or sometimes actually clear things up, as seen in the following Ge-

The Gemara relates that Rebbe Chiya and Rebbe Yonasan were walking in a cemetery. Rebbe Yonasan's tzitzis were dragging over the graves. Whereupon Rebbe Chiya said, "Lift up your tzitzis, lest the departed say, 'Tomorrow they will be joining us and now they mock us." Since the departed can no longer fulfill mitzvos, dragging tzitzis over their graves is a form of mockery. The Gemara then commences a lengthy discussion regarding whether those who

are already in the next world know what is happening in this world.

The *Acharonim* discuss a tangential point. The Gemara in *Bava Metzia* (90b) records a conversation between Rebbe Yonasan and Rebbe Simai. It is clear from that conversation that Rebbe Yo-

Another major tangential point raised regarding our Gemara is the appropriateness of allowing one's *tzitzis* to drag on the ground. Apparently, Rebbe Chiya had no issue with *tzitzis* strings dragging on the ground. He was only bothered by the fact that the *tzitzis* strings were being dragged over graves. The *Shulchan Aruch* (O.C. 21:4) says that one should be careful that his *tzitzis* strings not drag on the ground. This seems to be contradicted by our Gemara.

The Yad Aharon differentiates between a tallis gadol worn during davening and tzitzis worn all day. Only the strings of a tallis gadol should not be dragged on the ground. Since a tallis gadol is designated for prayer, it ac-

drag on the ground at the time one is making a *berachah* on his *tzitzis*. At that time, since he is not yet wearing it, it could possibly appear that one is using his *tzitzis* strings to clean the floor. After one is already wearing his *tzitzis*, everyone can readily see that the dragging of the strings on the floor is inadvertent.

Another possibility offered by the *Magen Avraham* is that Rebbe Yonasan's strings were dragging on top of stones above the graves. They were never touching the ground.

Yet another possibility offered by the Aruch HaShulchan is that one must be careful that his tzitzis strings not drag on the floor where there is a possibility that they will be stepped on. That would be a real disgrace for tzitzis strings. Otherwise, the Aruch HaShulchan argues, "How is it possible for one to learn or daven and not have his tzitzis strings touch the floor?" The Aruch HaShulchan therefore concludes that if occasionally his strings touch the floor, one need not be concerned.

The Magen Avraham notes that the Gemara records that Ben Tzitzis HaKeses was a wealthy individual, possibly so named because his tzitzis never dragged on the floor. The implication is that everyone else allowed their tzitzis to at least occasionally touch the floor. ❖



Rav Aharon Kotler: Torah Lishmah

In honor of Rav Aharon Kotler's 50th yahrzeit, we begin to present a few anecdotes to help us gain more of an appreciation of this Torah giant, one whose impact on K'lal Yisrael has been immeasurable. It is with great hesitation that we embark on this task, as Rav Aharon represented the highest and purest levels of kedushah.

Rav Aharon was the acknowledged gadol ha'dor and leader of American Jewry, the prime builder of chinuch and Torah in Eretz Yisrael, and rosh yeshivah and founder of Beth Medrash Govoha in Lakewood, New Jersey in the 1940s. He infused a generation and a country with an unbridled love for learning Torah unlike what they had ever seen before. His life and his message were simple: limud haTorah lishmah. This stark revelation transformed the post-Churban Torah landscape.

Rav Aharon Kotler was a transcendent figure, one who in many ways singlehandedly drove the rebuilding of K'lal Yisrael in the aftermath of the inferno of the Churban. He was fiercely passionate. The fire of Torah consumed his persona in a manner that was visible to all who saw him; its tenets dictated his every action, word, and thought. A talmid of the famed Slabodka Yeshiva, Rav Aharon firmly believed that Torah leaves no room for hesitation, weakness, or fear. Although he was initially opposed or ignored, Rav Aharon's fire eventually warmed the frozen hearts of American Jewry, revealing newfound commitment and dedication to Torah. As one talmid noted, "The heiligkeit of Har Sinai radiated from his face."

Prior to Rav Aharon's arrival, limud haTorah existed on these shores. Yet, Rav Aharon's unbending mantra of limud haTorah lishmah took American Jewry to new, never-imagined heights of Torah learning and commitment. His message rallied a broken band of survivors, along with pre-war American Jewry, to imagine a new landscape in which Torah was the prime factor in their lives and in which the foundation of a revitalized K'lal would be limud and ahavas haTorah. Through that foundation, K'lal Yisrael would be resurgent, and through that power, they would be restored. As a result, avodas Hashem, mitzvos, acts of chesed, kiruv, and every form of ahavas Yisrael would thrive. Shuls, yeshivos, and communities would begin to flourish.

Rav Aharon's legendary acts of mesirus nefesh, dedication, and personal in-

Chia seeds also block some of the calorie absorption of the foods you eat and help reduce cravings. They are full of fiber, protein, calcium, and antioxidants. They help stabilize blood sugar and lower risk of heart disease. Add them to a smoothie or incorporate in baked goods.

Flax seeds. Coming from the same flax plant used to make linen, flax seeds are highly nutritious and low in carbs. They have a slightly nutty flavor and are full of fiber and healthy fat. They can be found as whole seeds, which stay fresh for up to a year, but need to be ground into flax meal to be digested and provide their full health benefits. The flax meal can be used to add nutrition to many dishes or as a substitute in baked goods. Mix it in yogurt, ricotta cheese, smoothies, or your pancake or muffin

Hemp seeds. Another miracle seed, hemp seeds contain a perfect balance of omega-6 and omega-3 essential oils. They are an excellent source of daily protein and are composed of more protein than any other grain on the planet! Studies show they may help prevent heart disease, cancers, Alzheimer's and even Parkinson's. The seeds can also be found in the form of milk, so drink up!

Sunflower seeds. A popular seed roasted, salted, and eaten as a snack, sun-

flower seeds are great for digestion and dieting. They are full of fiber, so they keep you feeling full, and a great source of folate, which is important in women's health. They can help prevent heart disease and cancer since they are loaded with antioxidants, vitamin E, selenium, and copper. Snack or bake with them or add them to salads as a crunchy

Sesame seeds. Usually seen on top of challahs and other baked goods, sesame seeds have long been considered a wonderful source of nutrition. Packed with calcium, magnesium, zinc, fiber, iron, B1, and phosphorus, sesame seeds are a powerful little seed. They help fight cholesterol, lower blood pressure, and protect from liver damage. They may also help prevent arthritis, asthma, migraines, menopause, and osteoporosis. 🌣

4 cups oats (not instant) 1½ cups whole almonds 1/2 cup flax seeds, ground ½ cup light brown sugar ½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. ground cinnamon 1/4 cup canola oil 1/4 cup honey 1 tsp. vanilla extract 1½ cups dried cranberries 3 cups mixed berries 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar

Directions:

1 lemon, juiced

1½ cups vanilla yogurt

Preheat oven to 300°F. Mix oats, almonds, flax seeds, brown sugar, salt, and cinnamon in medium bowl. Heat oil and honey in small saucepan over medium heat. Add vanilla and whisk. Add honey mixture to oats and gently mix well. Add dried cranberries. Spread out onto baking sheet and bake for 40 minutes. Allow to cool and break up into clumps.

Using same saucepan, cook berries with confectioners' sugar and lemon juice over medium heat until mixture is syrupy, 10-12 minutes. Let cool. To serve, layer yogurt, berries, and granola in tall glasses.



Vaccinating Your Children Before School

The beginning of the school year is a great time to make sure your children's vaccinations are up to date. Informed parents know that immunizations save lives. But even those who have dutifully vaccinated their babies and toddlers may not be aware that the recommended vaccination schedule continues through the later teen years.

Research published by the American Medical Association found that teenagers age 14 and older were much less likely to see a pediatrician than their younger-adolescent counterparts. But threats to health don't go away just because children are older. "We live in a busy world, and it's easy to forget to make appointments for an annual check-up," says Dr. Robert W. Block, MD, of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). "Let the new school season be your annual reminder to protect the health of your kids."

Here are some crucial vaccination tips and facts for parents of older children and teens:

• Check your calendar. When was the last time your child saw a pediatrician? If it's been over a year, make an appointment as soon as possible. In advance of the appointment, talk with your child and draw up a list of any concerns or questions to discuss with the doctor.

- Store immunization and other medical records in an easily accessible place and be sure to keep the records current. Bring this information to the appointment. When you see your pediatrician, ask directly, "What vaccines does my child need at this point?"
- You may wish to ask about the HPV vaccine, which is recommended for both boys and girls. While protection is most effective for adolescents ages 11 to 13, older teens who haven't yet received the vaccine can benefit from it as well. This cancer-preventing vaccine will safeguard your teen's health in the future.
- If financial considerations are preventing you from taking your teen in for visits and immunizations, talk with your pediatrician. He or she may be able to point you toward resources that can offset the costs.
- All children ages 11 to 18 should be protected against meningitis, a deadly bacterial infection that's spread easily in close living quarters. If teens are going to boarding school, college or the military, do not delay giving them the vaccine.
- Every year, more than 200,000 Americans are hospitalized because of the flu and its complications, and 36,000 die. An annual influenza vaccine is an important part of protecting your children. Health authorities including the AAP and the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-

tion recommend an annual flu vaccine for everyone, starting at 6 months of age.

Your children's health plays an important role in their academic success. Make sure you take steps to keep him or her safe from life-threatening dangers and prepare for a healthy school year. (State-Point Media) 💠

Go Outdoors For More Success In School

If your children are like most, they are spending more time indoors than ever before. A 2010 Kaiser Family Foundation study found that children ages 8 to 18 engage in over seven hours of electronic media each day.

Some experts warn that all that time indoors can take a heavy toll on children's health, contributing to attention difficulties, hyperactivity, obesity, a diminished use of senses, and even a disconnect from the real world.

"American children are losing a vital aspect of healthy development as they spend less time riding bikes, climbing trees, or doing much of anything outdoors," says Kathy McGlauflin, director of Project Learning Tree (PLT), a nonprofit organization that trains teachers to incorporate environmental education into school curricula. "Today, children spend most of their time indoors—largely because that's where all the electrical sockets are."

According to McGlauflin, teaching children to understand and value nature will improve their performance at school.

Here are some fun ways to cure "nature deficit disorder":

• Brainstorm with your children's teachers and principal about ways the school can incorporate learning in the outdoors and provide a healthier environment.

- Talk to your child's teacher about applying for a Project Learning Tree Green-Works! grant to help get started on building a school or community garden, starting a recycling program, or restoring a nearby stream. Since 1992, PLT has distributed nearly \$1 million to fund 1,000 environmental service-learning projects in communities nationwide. Apply by September 30 by visiting www.plt.org/ApplyForaGrant.
- Take a walk through a local wooded area, park, or even your own backyard. Observe wildlife and plant life, paying special attention to fallen logs to learn how decomposition works and get a better understanding of microhabitats. Look for signs of animals, including insects and plants in, on, or around the log.
- Go for a bike ride around your neighborhood for exercise, quality time, and some fresh air.
- Plant a garden together to improve your family's nutrition and create something meaningful. You'll diversify your meals with fresh local produce and teach your child about the lifecycle of plants. Choose flowers that will attract an array of hummingbirds and butterflies to ad-

This Year, Ban Boring Hebrew!

One of the many great strengths that have contributed to the miraculous revival of the Jewish State is another ancient restoration—that of the Hebrew language. Modern Hebrew has served not only to linguistically and culturally unite diverse Jewish immigrants to Israel, but is a vital link that connects global Jewry. Yet this crucial linguistic bond must be reinforced so that Jews worldwide can remain connected with each other and with Israel.

Hebrew language education has historically been, and continues to be, a large component of the majority of Jewish day school curricula, and rightly so. However, there is a constant challenge to produce—and maintain—meaningful levels of fluency among students that is hindered by the traditional methodology which is frequently used.

A new approach to teaching Hebrew must be embraced, one that focuses on incorporating modern technology. We like to say that our mission is to help students learn Hebrew at the speed of light, and we therefore use technology such as computers, smartphones, and tablets as platforms to deliver content because these tools are innovative and accessible. Harnessing new technology and using mobile devices is very important—in fact, many schools are already handing out iPads to their students, sometimes eliminating the need

to use printed books. The underlying key to success is taking Hebrew studies from grammar and memorizationbased classroom techniques to a more intuitive learning process. Students learn best by hearing the language, being exposed to fresh, up-to-date materials with constant yet creatively crafted repetition, and using it in real environalleviated with the realization that it is not necessary to fully master educational technology, but it is important to become comfortable and familiar with it.

Wariness among educators to introduce new technological methods in teaching an ancient (albeit modernized) language must be overcome if we are to revamp the Hebrew-language learning environment. Our firsthand experience

The goal is to get students engaged, involved, and excited. When students share their Hebrew-language experiences on social networks, you know that you are on the right track. In short, the key for long-term success is for them to become immersed. This kind of distinctive mindset both effectively engages today's technologically savvy youth and involves tools that are arguably more successful than many of the stale, decades-old methods.

Change is never easy. Through the course of our interaction with educators, we have recognized the existence of a certain "fear factor," but teachers also tend to acknowledge that using technology for educational purposes is critical. Their apprehension can also be

has shown that when utilized correctly, this new methodology-combined with certain existing tried-and-true techniques—can result in ease, joy, and accomplishment in classrooms. Teachers are able to better instruct, and engaged students exhibit significant language improvement.

The Hebrew language is a glue that bonds Jews everywhere. If this bond weakens, then Jewish unity diminishes. As we approach a new school year and the start of the Jewish New Year, we should embark on a new, more effective way of teaching and learning Hebrew. It is especially important in 5773 to examine just how well Hebrew is being introduced to the next generation, and to employ all means at our disposal to solidify the Hebrew language link for generations to come. ❖







"Dirty Jewish Money"

Tidbits From Israel

According to numerous polls, Obama's critical Jewish margin has been on a downward slide, as he loses major ground since the 2008 election among Jewish voters in Florida, a key battleground state. This phenomenon is evidently repeating itself in other swing states, creating not only a problem of potential loss of critical electoral votes, but also affecting the level of fundraising needed to finance Obama's reelection bid.

The Democratic Party and its head, President Obama, are unable to match the level of successful fundraising by the Romney campaign as we approach Election Day. The visibly panicky Obama campaign managers have joined forces with liberal Jewish organizations such as the New York Times and other politically left

organizations to delegitimize those donations by conservative Jews backing Mitt Romney for president by claiming that the money being donated is tainted—in other words, "dirty Jewish money."

The 2012 presidential race is evolving into a fundraising contest where the financial resources of the two major candidates and their support groups will be much more in balance than was the case in 2008. This is very upsetting to the Democratic Party and their leftist supporters. They like their party to have more resources than the Republican side, and they particularly do not like big spending by very rich Republican Jews or Jewish-owned corporations for conservative candidates. Spending by very rich Democratic Jews and by unions who support a leftist agenda seems to bother them far less, if at all. This obsession of liberal Jewish organizations with all the big-money checks

by Jewish conservatives backing Mitt Romney has in their collective minds meant that Jewish-owned corporations, and their super-rich Jewish executives, might be able to swing the election this year for the Republi-

In terms of campaign contributions, two major targets by the Jewish Liberal organizations have been the Koch brothers and Sheldon Adelson. The Koch brothers are relatively unknowns, and most Americans, Jews and non-Jews, have no clue as to who they are, despite the obsessive coverage of them in recent months. Adelson is a different story. He has not been shy about whom he is supporting (first Gingrich, now Romney) and about how much money he is prepared to spend. Adelson, whose business is casinos and hotels, is an ardent supporter of Israel and has publicly voiced his skepticism of what is commonly referred to as the "two-state solution," the current mantra of Jewish liberals and leftist organizations.


All of this has made Adelson a rich target for his Jewish liberal enemies. He is spending tens of millions to defeat the candidate of the Left. He is a supporter of Israel. He is in the gambling business, which makes for easy targeting by the Jewish Left who are busy supporting "Occupy" and other social-protest movements. The Jewish liberal Left seems to fear that Adelson could help elect a president who will be a true supporter of Israel and genuinely friendlier to Israel than Obama has been.

Even Professor Alan Dershowitz, a lifelong Democrat who is on a different page politically than Adelson on many issues, has lashed out against the smears of Adelson: "I know Sheldon Adelson and I have worked with him on several matters relating to Israel and the Jewish community. I have spoken on behalf of the wonderful school he has built in Las Vegas and have had the pleasure of teaching one of the brilliant graduates of that school. Adelson was deeply involved in the creation of the Birthright Israel program, which has had extraordinary success in exposing young Jews to Israel. It's hard to find anyone who has done as much for the Jewish community as Sheldon Adelson.

"Adelson grew up in Boston in near poverty and is a shining example of the American dream. He is a self-made multi-billionaire who has contributed significantly to the world of modern technology and to the economic growth of Las Vegas and other areas. His generosity has helped repair the world. . . . I'm sure that if the Democrats were to apply the "Adelson test" [devised by David Harris of the National Jewish Democratic Council] to all the contributions they have received from Hollywood stars and moguls and other wealthy businesspeople, they wouldn't like the results."

The attacks on Adelson and similar attacks on the Koch brothers are hard evidence that there is only one real test of decency for the Jewish liberal Left this year—whether you support Obama or not. As far as they are concerned, it is regarded as un-American to give big money to the Republicans, and any effort that helps damage the prospects of a Romney candidacy, including feeding vile anti-Semitic venom into the campaign, is "kosher." Furthermore, any Jew daring to support Romney will be accused of donating tainted "dirty Jewish money." Obama has over the past four years managed to anger many Jewish voters whose votes he now seeks, as well as quite a few Jewish donors whose wallets he now pursues. Implementing a strategy of delegitimizing American Jews who support conservative candidates is a sure way for losing support among all Americans. ❖

The Judge And The Refugee

In *Parashas Shof'tim* (*Devarim* 16:18–21:9) we read of the cities of refuge, to which a man who had killed accidentally could flee, find sanctuary, and atone

ed wherever Jews live. Why does the law extend everywhere, while refuge belongs only to Israel? And what does this imply for the month of Elul, our place of spiri-

for his deeds. The Chassidic masters note that *Shof'tim* is always read in the month of Elul; for Elul is, with regard to *time*, what the cities of refuge were with regard to *space*. It is a month of sanctuary and repentance, a protected time in which a person can turn from the shortcomings of his past and dedicate himself to a new and sanctified future.


The Lubavitcher Rebbe analyzes an important feature of the cities: they were only to be found in the Land of Israel, even though the judges and officers who executed Torah law were to be appoint-

tual refuge in the calendar of the Jewish year?

A Paradox

The Midrash *Sifri* interprets the opening verse of our *parashah*, "You shall set judges and officers in all your gates" to apply to "all your dwelling places," even those outside Israel. It then continues: One might think that cities of refuge were also to exist outside the Land of Israel. Therefore the Torah uses the restric-

tive term "these are the cities of refuge" to indicate that they were to be provided only within Israel.

Nonetheless, the *Sifri* says that someone who committed an accidental killing outside the Land of Israel and who fled to one of the cities of refuge would be granted sanctuary there. It was the cities themselves, not the people they protected, that were confined to the Land of Israel.

The fact that the *Sifri* initiates a comparison between the "judges and officers" and the cities of refuge indicates that they have a relationship to one another. It is this: The judges who applied the law and the officers who executed the sentences did not aim at retribution, but at the refinement of the guilty. And the aim of the cities of refuge was to impose on the fugitive an atoning exile—atonement in the sense of a remorse which effaces the crime until he regains his original closeness to G-d's will.

We might then have thought that if this safeguard, this place of atonement, was available in the holy environment of the Land of Israel, it would be all the more necessary outside its borders where it was easier to fall into wrongdoing. And yet only judges and officers were to be provided beyond the Land of Israel's borders—only the agents of the law, not its refuge.

Transcendence Or Empathy

There are two phases in *teshuvah*, repentance. There is remorse over what has been done, and commitment to act differently in the future. These are inextricably connected. For the only test of sincere remorse is the subsequent commitment to a better way of life. To be contrite about the past without changing one's behavior is a hollow gesture.

This the deeper significance of the law that the city of refuge is found only in the Land of Israel. For a man could not atone while clinging to the environment which led him to sin. He might feel remorse, but he would not have taken the decisive step away from his past. For this, he had to escape to the "Land of Israel," i.e., to holiness. There, on its sanctified earth, his commitment to a better future could have substance.

Judges, however, could be appointed outside the Land of Israel. For it is written in *Pirkei Avos*, "Do not judge your fellow man until you come to his place." A court which sits in the Land of Israel cannot know the trials and temptations which exist outside, or the difficulties of being loyal to one's faith in a place of exile. The Land of Israel is a land where "the eyes of the L-rd your G-d are always upon it, from the beginning of the year to the end of the year." It is a land of Divine grace. One cannot judge a man by its standards if that man lives outside its protection.

So judges had to be drawn from the same environment as their defendants. They had not only to know what he had done; they had to experience for themselves the environment which brought him to it

Rabbi DovBer of Lubavitch (the second Chabad Rebbe) was once giving private audiences, when he interrupted for some time before continuing. It transpired that a man who had had an audience wanted the Rebbe's help in setting right a particularly degrading act he had done. The Rebbe later said to one of his close disciples

that one must discover some analogous quality in oneself—on however refined a level—before one can help someone to remedy his sin. His interruption of the audiences had been to attempt to find in himself this point from which he could identify with the sinner.

It was this principle that lay behind G-d's command to Moshe when the Israelites had made the golden calf: "Go, get thee down, for your people have dealt corruptly." For at that moment, Moshe was inhabiting the spiritual heights of Mount Sinai, neither eating nor drinking, divorced from the world. The Israelites were degraded through their sin. But by telling him to "go down" to "your people," G-d created a bond between Moshe and the people, on the basis of which Moshe was able to plead on their behalf.

Three Degrees Of Refuge

Although all the cities of refuge were to be in the Land of Israel, they were not all in the same territory. There were the three in the Land of Israel proper, the Holy Land. Three were in the territories east of the Jordan, where "manslaughter was common" (Talmud, Makkos 9b). And, Le'asid La'vo, in the Time to Come, "the L-rd your G-d will enlarge your borders" and three more will be provided, in the newly occupied land.

This means that every level of spirituality has its own refuge, from the relatively lawless Eastern territories to the Holy Land, and even in the Time to Come. And this is true spiritually as well as geographically. At every stage of a person's religious life, there is the possibility of some shortcoming for which there must be refuge and atonement. Even if he never disobeys G-d's will, he may still not have done all within his power to draw close to G-d.

This is the task of the month of Elul. It is a time of self-examination, when each person must ask himself whether what he has achieved was all he could have achieved. And if not, he must repent, and strive towards a more fulfilled future. Businessman and scholar—he who has lived in the world and he who has spent his days under the canopy of the Torah—both must make Elul a time of self-reckoning and refuge.

It is the way of the Western world to make Elul—the month of high summer—a time for vacation from study. The opposite should be the case. It is above all the time for self-examination, a time to change one's life. And the place for this is the city of refuge in the "Holy Land," which, in the geography of the soul, is a place of Torah.

Each Jew should set aside Elul, or at least from the 18th onwards (the last 12 days, a day for each month of the year), or at any rate the days when *Selichos* are said, and make his refuge in a place of Torah

A refuge is a place to which one flees: that is, where one lays aside one's past and makes a new home. Elul is the sublimation of the past for the sake of a better future. And it is the necessary preparation for the blessings of Rosh Hashanah, the promise of plenty and fulfillment in the year to come. ❖

volvement in askanus, as well as his exemplary avodas Hashem, stemmed from the clarity Rav Aharon possessed— that our acceptance of Torah lishmah is our raison d'être.

And so, although we may be unable to capture the true essence of Rav Aharon, we will nevertheless attempt to glean lessons and *limudim* through a number of narratives.

Numerous vignettes illustrate Rav Aharon's insatiable desire for Torah. Rav Aharon's never-ending thirst for the *d'var Hashem* eliminated all impediments to his learning. He savored every spare moment; every second was an invaluable and cherished gift. Thus, danger was no obstacle, as *Toras Chaim* was Rav Aharon's lifeline.

One talmid, Rav Yaakov Leshinsky, recounted an unforgettable incident that highlights Rav Aharon's mesirus nefesh for every droplet of Torah. Rav

Aharon and his talmidim were on the run, with the Russian authorities in hot pursuit. Aware that the rosh yeshiva provided the fire and spiritual energy for so many, the Russians desperately sought to extinguish his flame. Yet, as Rav Aharon attempted to board the train from Kletzk to Vilna, the throngs

Rav Leib Heiman, one of his close *talmidim*, asked his *rebbi* how old he was when he'd established this *chiddush*.

Rav Aharon asked his *talmid* why he was interested in this piece of information. Rav Leib explained that he wanted to know how far removed he other worries, "poseiach lo pesachim gedolim ba'Torah-it will open for him tremendous archways of Torah." As Rav Aharon fled for his life from the Russians and unspeakable horrors of the Nazi inferno, his journey led him through the greatest archways of Torah imaginable.

"Nafshi be'chapi samid, ve'Sorascha lo shachachti-My life is constantly in my hand, but I did not forget Your Torah" (Tehillim 119:109).

Rav Aharon's whole life was anchored in the primacy of Torah, and his every action was dictated by its morals and its message; his personal feelings were irrelevant.

Quite often, after a long, exhausting day of askanus, Rav Aharon returned home hungry. Not for food, but for Torah. Because, as Rav Aharon once commented to Dr. Ernst Bodenheimer after a long grueling day of activity on behalf of the K'lal, "Es kumt nisht tzu a blatt Gemara—it doesn't come close to a page of Gemara."

While most would have felt spiritually satiated from the fact that they had advanced the cause of Torah, Rav Aharon knew that such activity and effort do not stand alone; they are rooted in a foundation of Torah, and therefore askanus alone wasn't enough. He hungered for more; he was starving for a blatt Gemara.

"Lo ra'av la'lechem ve'lo tzama la'mayim ki im lishmoa eis divrei Hashem—Not a hunger for bread nor a thirst for water, but to hear the words of Hashem" (Amos 8:11). *

who flooded the open doors prevented him from doing so.


Realizing that their rebbi's life was at stake, a group of talmidim cleared a path for Rav Aharon and lifted him through a window of the train, into the eager arms of other loving students, who pulled their rebbi inside to temporary safety. But before they had a chance to express their relief, Rav Aharon was already swept up in the rischa d'Oraissa, as the small compartment of the train was immediately transformed into the dalet amos shel halachah.

Years later, Rav Aharon delivered one of his famous, brilliant *shiurim* on a complex *sugya*. Following the *shiur*,

was from his great *rebbi*, as the *chiddush* was beyond anything he could imagine developing at his age.

Rav Aharon looked at the young Rav Leib and revealed, "When we were fleeing from the Russians, on the run from Kletzk to Vilna, I slipped away into a beis midrash. It was there that I was zocheh to be mechadeish this yesod."

Rav Aharon wrote (Mishnas Rav Aharon III: page 126), "Ki d'var Hashem yakar me'od, ve'i efshar l'hasigo b'li tzaar—the Word of Hashem is very precious, and it is impossible to grasp it properly without difficulty and pain." However, if one continues to persevere, toil, and suffer for Torah, or he removes from his mind any and all







MINDBIZ By Esther Mann, LCSW

Dear Esther,

I'm terribly concerned about my parents and I wonder whether there is anything in my power to do to make the situation any better.

My parents are wonderful people who enjoyed a beautiful marriage together for many years. About five years ago, my father started showing signs of dementia. It's still not clear to any of us what exactly is causing his decline, but he is not the person he was a number of years ago. My father is eighty years old and my mother is in her late seventies. My mother is fine mentally, but she has heart problems and other physical health issues that concern me. She is extremely devoted to my father in every which way. And that's becoming a serious problem.

My mother waits on my father hand and foot. His behavior is unreasonable and demanding. I don't know if I would go so far as to say that he is abusive, but certainly close enough. My mother takes it all in like a true soldier or maybe a victim. She feels it is her duty to now basically be his slave. It was never like this in the past. They were always very respectful toward one another and my father treated my mother like a princess. It's hard to recognize who he is these days based on his behavior. He's

definitely not the loving father we all grew up with.

My siblings and I have been begging my mother for many months already to take in help for my father. She is physically just not capable of taking care of all his needs. But my mother just says that my father doesn't want a stranger in the house, and so that's that. She just gives in to his every demand. I know that my father is not getting any better and will only get worse. But my mother still has so much life in her and I worry that she is destroying herself and giving up her ability to still enjoy her life at this point and forward.

Also, just physically, I wonder how much her body can take. As I said, she is not a healthy woman. And emotionally, I see the joy being sucked out of her.

We are all feeling very helpless as we stand back and watch this scary situation play out. Any suggestions regarding something we might be able to do to get my father the help he needs and help my mother still have some quality to her life?

Scared

Allowing him to determine that a caregiver does not belong in their house is as silly as giving a child the right to determine whether he needs to go to school.

We often try to get my parents to move into our homes for a weekend or even just a Shabbos, so that we can lighten her load for a little bit of time. But my father refuses to go. And so my mother acquiesces to everything he demands and stays home alone with him.

Dear Scared,


The situation you describe is such a hard one for anyone to see, especially children who are accustomed to seeing their parents treating one another with love and respect. It's so sad and confusing to watch personalities shift

so dramatically, almost morphing into unrecognizable strange beings. Especially when the new person appears selfish and unreasonable.

Unfortunately, sometimes illness and old age are capable of playing these cruel tricks on people, and when that happens, there is occasionally little that can be done to prevent such ravages to one's very being. I'm sure your father is receiving all of the best medical care that is available for him. Nevertheless, it sounds as though his further decline is most likely not preventable.

You correctly wonder whether there is a way to encourage your mother to save herself, despite your father's descent. It's obvious that she feels it's her job to stand by your father at all costs, particularly to herself. So, the real challenge is to help her understand that by taking care of herself, she will be in a much better position to take care of your father. Plus, it's imperative that she value and recognize the importance of her own life and her right to still have joy, despite your father's illness. If not, she stands the chance of seriously risking her own health—and what good will that do

At this point, as your father's mental well-being has continued to decline and the quality of their lives together has followed suit, it's virtually impossible for your mother to objectively process how she too has been pulled in and pulled down by this insidious process. Right now, the first and best move you can make is to try and lo-





cate a support group in your area for caregivers. I suggest you research this possibility and even if you have to literally go with her, while another sibling stays with your father, I believe she will get the necessary encouragement she needs to start viewing her situation from a healthier perspective. She may believe that you can't possibly understand what it feels like to walk in her shoes, but talking to peers in exactly the same situation is always affirming and helpful. Validation and empathy from others in her predicament are generally the most effective wake-up call a person can get.

For instance, your mother seems to have forgotten that your father, who is not of sound mind, should not be the one deciding what's best for him. He is not qualified to make such judgment calls. Allowing him to determine that a stranger who can help care for him does not belong in their house is as silly as giving a child the right to determine whether he needs to go to school. Your mother should be the one deciding what's necessary and what isn't. Again, it's hard for your mother to see the forest for the trees right now and so she's lost a grasp on who

should rightfully be in charge of her home. Bringing in an aide that can free up your mother somewhat is the second step toward a healthier situation.

Meanwhile, as your mother hopefully opens herself up to a more practical balance at home, you and your siblings should try to bring joy into your parents home as much as possible. Even though your father may be antagonistic toward you or your families, it's important to visit regularly.

Make sure Shabbos feels like a Shabbos for them by taking turns stopping by to sing zemiros or simply sitting around the Shabbos table with them. Try celebrating parties and even easy holidays at their place, if your father refuses to leave his home. Stay determined to pry your mother away from your father, even if it is for a quick breakfast or a shiur.

No one ever said this is an easy juncture for anyone involved. It's tragic to watch someone you love enter the twilight stage of life and suffer all the indecencies that often accompany this final cycle. Nevertheless, every challenge can be tweaked in some ways to make it a bit less unbearable.

All the best to your mother and the rest of you.

Nidacheinu

Recent videos of chassidic music superstar Lipa Schmeltzer in Israel reveal that he is currently working on a music video based on the track from his new album to the words, "V'kabetz nidacheinu mei'arba kanfos ha'aretz." After seeing the video, I began thinking about these words with a little more concentration.

In the video, Lipa is dressed in camouflage, with a group of dancers, seemingly members of the IDF, in middle of a busy Jerusalem shopping strip. I was enlightened by a comment on a blog saying that he has always been disturbed by people who feel that the ingathering of the exiles is relevant to the Jews of Boro Park and Bnei Brak to the exclusion of some disenfranchised, uneducated Jew somewhere out there in the world at large. He was pleased by Lipa's script to dance with members of Israel's IDF to the words and lively tune that signal the end of this long exile and freedom for all Jews wherever they may be.

I then began thinking of the words again, specifically the word "nidacheinu." The word *nidach* means to be rejected or pushed away, in this instance exiled, with the plea that G-d will gather in the exiled from the four corners of the world. Part of the problem is that we have been taught that as long as we lead lives closely in accordance with the precepts of Torah and mitzvos then we are in a sense complete and do not lack anything. What follows is, those Jews who haven't discovered their portion in Torah and the sweetness of life

as an observant, G-d-fearing Jew are truly the ones in exile.

So you ask, what is the problem? The problem precisely is that in our learning and observance of mitzvos and contentment with our lives in exile we lose our yearning to attain the real world when G-d will finally see fit to redeem us and rebuild the Beis HaMikdash and revive those that have departed throughout the ages. You see, as much as we get into learning, even if we have been exposed to all facets of the Torah, at best our learning in exile is compared to hearing as opposed to seeing. The Gemara says hearing is not comparable to seeing, and by the same token, the Torah as we know it today is incomparable with the way it will be seen and understood with the coming of Mashiach. It's important for us to realize that as sweet and enlightening as Torah is to us today, it will be so much more pleasing and appealing to us after Mashiach comes.

So when we pray that G-d gather in the exiled, do we think of ourselves, or the impoverished Jew who sadly hasn't attained the sweetness of Yiddishkeit? I recently learned a *d'var Torah* from the holy Baal Shem Tov as quoted in the sefer Degel Machane Efraim authored by his grandson, Rav Moshe Chaim Efraim from Sedlikov. The Gemara in Shabbos states, "Anyone who lives in *chutz la'aretz* is compared to someone who has no G-d. . . . And anyone who lives in *Eretz Yisrael* is compared to someone who has a G-d." I was always rather uncomfortable with this Gemara in light of the millions of Jews that live outside of Eretz Yisrael, many of whom had and have an undying love for the land and still remain outside the land.

The Baal Shem Tov reads the Gemara a little differently. He says, "Anyone who lives in chutz la'aretz seems as someone who doesn't have a G-d, but in reality does. And anyone who lives in Eretz Yisrael seems as someone who has a G-d, but in reality doesn't." The Baal Shem Tov explains that the terms chutz la'aretz and Eretz Yisrael are euphemisms for someone who feels that despite all of his striving to cleave to G-d, still sees himself or herself at a distance, or someone who has become content with his or her accomplishments in this world, confident that they have found favor in G-d's eyes as a result of all their Torah learning and mitzvah performance. The Besht says that the word domeh can mean that it "seems as if" one person is more connected than the other, but in reality it is the opposite.

This is consistent with the philosophy of chassidic thought that the more one strives to cleave to G-d, the further he actually feels from Him. The distance that one feels from G-d despite his efforts to draw near is indicative of a G-d in his or her world. However, one who feels that he has reached the top in an imperfect world is the one who doesn't have a G-d in his or her life, although it may seem that they are the most connected to G-d.

In a letter written after Rosh Hashanah to his brother-in-law, Reb Gershon of Kitov, the holy Baal Shem Tov describes some of the revelations that he was privy to during an ascent of his soul to the heavenly realms. One of the things that the Besht implies is that certain people who in

this world were accorded little respect as a result of sins that they committed were completely forgiven and allowed to enter into the most lofty mystical experiences in Heaven. The lesson is, many times the way things seem to us down here is in fact the exact opposite in the world of truth. It's not for naught that this world is called the world of deceit.

The Chofetz Chaim explained the *pasuk* in Tehillim, "Toras Hashem temimah . . . " that despite the voluminous commentaries on Torah throughout the history of this world, the Torah, which is infinite, remains unplumbed. We have to view our relationship with Hashem in the same manner. A person can never rest, saying that he has cleaved to Hashem. In reality, the closer we get the further we feel.

Last Shabbos was Rosh Chodesh Elul. Very soon we will begin reciting Selichos and Avinu Malkeinu following Shemoneh Esreih, when we will pray that our Father and King remember us in the book of redemption, among many other requests. If we live life in this world with the attitude that we lack nothing, from what exactly are we looking to be redeemed? This is a question that we must all ask ourselves. If there is one aspect of our lives in this world that we feel could be better, then we could turn to Hashem and ask Him to redeem us. But how can we raise our head in prayer and ask Hashem to redeem us when in fact we feel as if nothing could be better? If anyone finds himself in that situation, it's best he reexamine to whom he is trying to draw close. ❖




Oceanside JCC Wins Medal In Maccabi Games

An Interview With The Kosher GPS Developer

5TJT: Can you describe the Kosher GPS app?

KGPS: The app enables the users on a smartphone (iPhone and Android) to automatically see what kosher restaurant, minyan, or mikveh is in the area you are in at that moment. You can then, with a push of an icon within the app, call the place or just automatically get it to work with the GPS within the phone (or iPad) to give you directions.

You can also search for other places within the app by pushing the search icon and then pressing the location button and put in a zip code of the area you will be going to and search. It will now act like you are standing in that zip code area and give you all the same information. Great for when you are traveling. There are some discounts to restaurants and all you need to do is show the app with the discount to the manager and you get the discount. This free marketing helps bring in customers to restaurants.

5TJT: What prompted you to create this application?

KGPS: I originally had my own Garmin GPS device and found it didn't list kosher places specifically. You couldn't realize if a place is kosher by the name. So I first developed the database for myself and then opened it to the public. Once smartphones came on the market, it was an obvious need, so I created the apps version.

5TJT: What criteria do you use for the *kashrus* of the establishment?

KGPS: I confer with rabbis who work for major hashgachah authorities and

that are universally relied upon, and they have given me a list of the kashrus certifications that are considered reliable and most people will accept.

5TJT: I imagine that it has to be constantly updated. How often do you do

KGPS: Daily! I get alerts from hashgachas, and now that we have many users within the app, my users are e-mailing me when there are new places or if a place closes or loses hashgachah.

5TJT: How many kosher restaurants are there in the U.S. and Canada?

KGPS: Approx 1,300, but that number is always changing.

5TJT: Is it fully international?

KGPS: Right now only U.S. and Can-

5TJT: What kind of background do you need to develop such an app?

KGPS: Programming for iPhone is different than for Android and other platforms so you need to learn the different programming structures and languages. *5TJT*: What are your future plans?

KGPS: We plan on adding other features like dairy vs. meat categorization and websites so people can look at menus. This feature has just been implemented in the Android phone and will soon be in the iPhone. We also plan on showing advertisements and pop up alerts for people now that we have so many users using it daily. We plan on adding a bentcher and Tefilas HaDerech, etc... We may partner with other businesses to expand what we offer to our



Recalling The Founders' Legacy

Dear Editor,

First, thank you for avoiding the term "liberal" in referring to the *New York Times* or *Haaretz* ("Dealing with Haaretz," August 17). The Left seems to have adopted the "if you are not with us, you're against us" mindset. There is nothing "liberal" about this.

The New York Times, presently, follows a kind of Labor Zionist view of Israeli politics, I believe. The Israeli Left does not regard Netanyahu as a comrade in arms. It is no coincidence that *Haaretz* should be the source of comment from Israel reported in the New York Times.

Perhaps the New York Times should be renamed the Dai-

ly Demonizer. As you suggest, the paper strives to make monsters out of "those who oppose their political philosophies and agendas."

When Nixon was president, the media proudly declared that it should take an adversary view of government. I have not heard a reaffirmation of this view in recent years. When Nixon was in office, we heard outcries from the Left that he was an "imperial president." My sense is that the Left has no problem with an imperial president, provided he comes from its ranks.

You might recall the response of Peter Jennings, in an ABC News radio commentary, to the Republican congressional gains, November 8, 1994, dismissing the results to a "tantrum" by the voters.

The motto of the Left seems to me: "We assert; therefore, it is so." Stated in terms of its view of governance, for the Left the Constitution is what the Left says it is. Accordingly, our founding legacy is irrelevant.

How hateful is the Left towards its enemies? First, it is worth considering that for the Left, its enemies are domestic political opponents. In the Israel context, it is not irrational, I think, to see the Left viewing Netanyahu as the ene-

my, far more, if at all, than Ahmadinejad, or Hamas, etc. Ahmadinejad has again called for the annihilation of Israel. Does *Haaretz* think Ahmadinejad merely shares their antipathy to the Israeli right? The Left, after all, has its own very soft spot for tyrannical regimes. Indeed, can one get much more tyrannical than communism?

Alexander Hamilton, in Federalist No. 1 noted, "A dangerous ambition more often lurks behind the special mask of zeal for the rights of the people, than under the forbidding appearance of zeal for the firmness and efficiency of government." He continued, "History will teach us, that the former has been found a much more certain road to the introduction of despotism, than the latter, and that of those men who have overturned the liberties of republics the greatest number have begun their career, by paying an obsequious court to the people, commencing demagogues and ending tyrants."

It is to be expected that the Left will be zealous in its pursuit of power, and thereafter. But where is the right, responding to this zeal with fidelity to our founding legacy? What, after all, do our conservatives want to conserve?




