## SCHOOL NICKNAME

“Bronchos” was the nickname selected for Central Oklahoma in 1922 by Mrs. C.W. Wantland, wife of long-time UCO football coach C.W. Wantland. The name was chosen from a number of suggestions for the name of UCO’s football team and became the nickname for all athletic teams at the school.

Mrs. Wantland was made an honorary member of the Letterman’s Club as a result of selecting the nickname, becoming the first woman admitted to that organization.

## SCHOOL COLORS

Bronze and blue were chosen as Central Oklahoma’s school colors early in the fall of 1895 by school president Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh. The first public display of the bronze and blue was in Guthrie when a student represented UCO in the first oratorical contest ever held in Oklahoma.

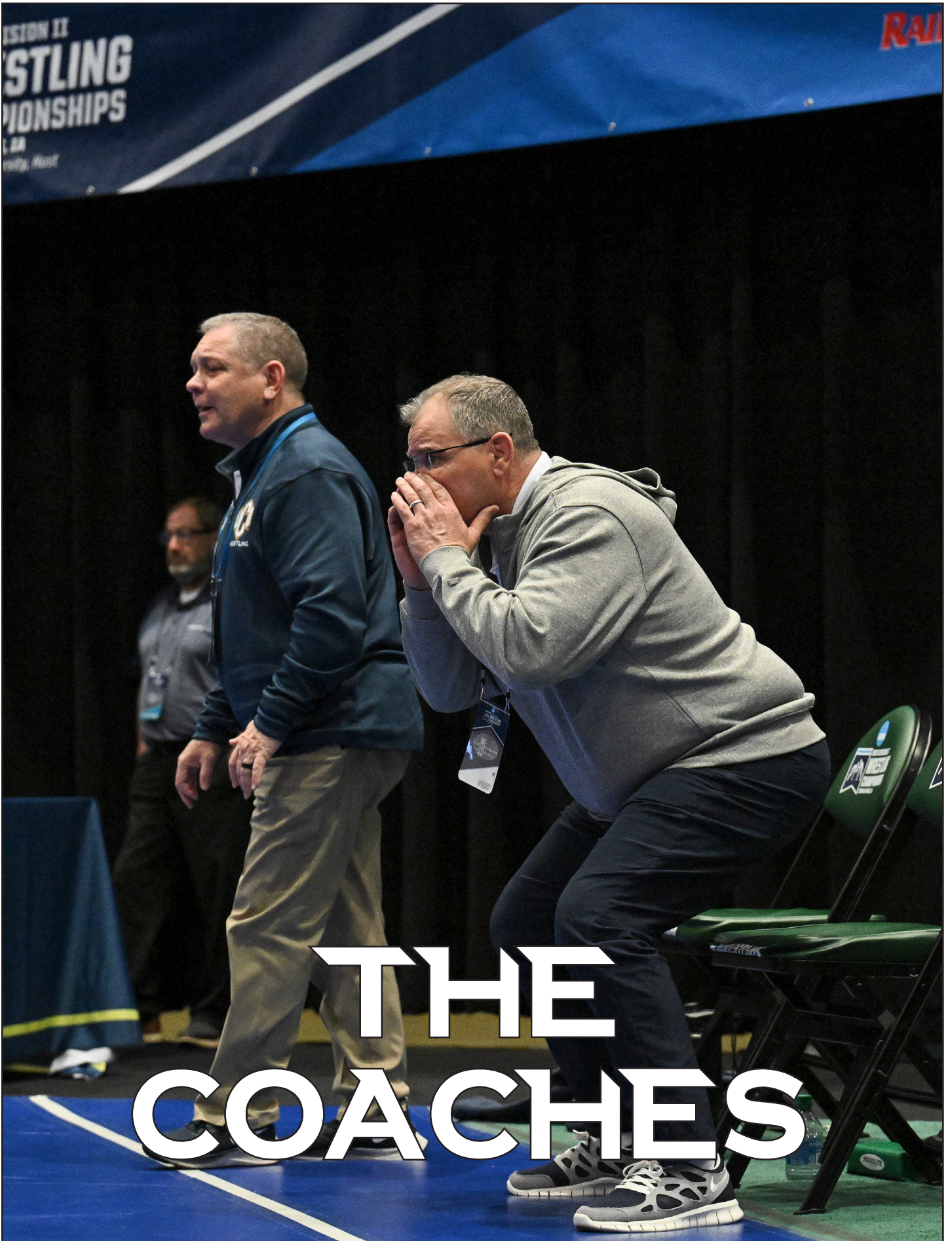

# THE COACHES





# HEAD COACH TODD STEIDLEY

Todd Steidley, a national champion while competing for Central Oklahoma, has returned the Bronchos to their glory days as head coach.

A member of the UCO Athletics Hall of Fame, Steidley guided Central to the NCAA Division II national title in 2023-- the first since 2007 and 16th overall-- after a runner-up finish in 2022.

He has amassed a glittering 86-12 dual record in seven seasons with the Bronchos while winning four Mid-American Intercollegiate Athletics Association championships and three NCAA Division II Super Regional IV crowns.

Steidley has coached 29 All-Americans at UCO, including a school-record nine in 2023. He's also mentored six individual national champions, four of those coming in the past two seasons.

Todd had an immediate impact in his first year, leading UCO to only the third undefeated dual season (18-0) in program history.

The Bronchos claimed the MIAA dual title and finished second in the league tournament. Steidley's crew finished fourth in the West Regional and qualified five individuals for the NCAA Division II national tournament, coming in 18th with two All-Americans.

Todd guided Central to a 13-5 dual mark in 2017-18, including a sixth-place finish in the Division II National Duals. The Bronchos were seventh in the West Regional and came in ninth in the national tournament behind national champion Eli Hale.

In 2018-19, Central went 12-4 in duals and finished the year 16th at the national tournament with a pair of All-Americans.

Central won its second MIAA title under Steidley in 2019-20, finishing the year 12-2 in dual matches and a perfect 4-0 in league duals. The Bronchos took second

at regionals and had six individuals qualify for nationals. Three wrestlers were named All-Americans by the National Wrestling Coaches Association after the Division II Championships were canceled by the COVID pandemic.

UCO didn't start its wrestling season in 2020-21 until the second semester and only competed in five duals as teams navigated the pandemic, going 5-0. Steidley led the Bronchos to the Super Region IV Tournament title in Hamilton Field House in qualifying seven individuals for nationals.

Heath Gray captured an individual title, four others earned All-America honors and UCO finished sixth in the team race.

Steidley guided Central to a banner campaign in 2021-22. The Bronchos recorded just the fourth unbeaten season in school history in finishing 13-0 while winning the prestigious Midwest Classic title, the NWCA Division II National Duals crown (the first since 2003), a second straight MIAA title and a second consecutive Super Regional IV championship.

UCO went on to a runner-up finish in the NCAA Division II Championships for its highest finish since winning the title in 2007. The Bronchos finished with six

All-Americans-- the most since 2013-- and crowned two champions in Gray and Dalton Abney.

Steidley led UCO back to the mountain top in 2022-23 to cap another outstanding all-around season. The Bronchos finished 13-1 in duals, losing only in the NWCA Division II National Duals finals, while setting a tournament scoring record in capturing the rugged Midwest Classic for a second straight year.

Central also claimed the MIAA and Super Regional IV titles for the third consecutive time and qualified its entire 10-man squad for the national tournament. A school-record nine of those earned All-America honors, with Abney and heavyweight Shawn Streck claiming individual titles.

A prep standout at Tulsa Union High School, Todd was a Division I qualifier at Utah State before spending his last two seasons at UCO. He went 64-11-2 with the Bronchos from 1986-88, winning the 142-pound national title as a junior and finishing runner-up as a senior.

Steidley spent two years as a graduate assistant coach at UCO, helping the Bronchos capture the NAIA team title in 1989.

He served as assistant coach at Clemson in 1990-91 before going to Enid High School as head coach for one year. Steidley moved on to Bristow High School, where he guided the Pirates to three Class 3A state championships during a six-year career.

Todd went next to Ponca City High School and coached the Wildcats to four consecutive Class 6A titles during a tenure that went from 1998-06. Steidley, who finished with a phenomenal 211-18 career dual record, served as principal at Claremore High School from 2006 until coming to UCO.

Steidley was inducted into the Oklahoma Coaches Association Hall of Fame in July of 2017 in recognition of his outstanding high school career and entered the UCO Athletics Hall of Fame in 2020.

Todd and his wife, Kelli, have two children -- Erin Delk and Garrett -- and one grandson (Loudin).

# ASSISTANT COACH

# SCOTT CHENOWETH

In his seventh year as Central Oklahoma's head assistant coach is Scott Chenoweth, a former Division I All-American and highly-successful high school head coach.

Chenoweth has helped lead the Bronchos to a 68-10 dual record the past six seasons, capped by a national championship campaign in 2022-23.

Central finished with a 13-5 dual record and ninth-place national tournament finish in Scott's first season (2017-18) and went 12-4 with a 16th-place national finish in 2018-19.

He helped UCO to a 12-2 dual record in 2019-20, with the Bronchos winning the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association title and finishing runner-up in the Super Regional IV Tournament while qualifying six individuals for the NCAA Division II Championships. The national tournament ended up being canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

UCO went 5-0 in a shortened 2020-21 dual season as teams continued dealing with the coronavirus. The Bronchos captured the Super Region IV Tournament crown in qualifying seven individuals for the national tournament and returned with a sixth-place finish behind Heath Gray's national championship.

Chenoweth helped lead Central to a banner campaign in 2021-22. The Bronchos recorded just the fourth unbeaten season in school history in finishing 13-0 while winning the prestigious Midwest Classic title, the NWCA Division II National Duals crown (the first since 2003), a second straight

MIAA title and a second consecutive Super Regional IV championship.

UCO went on to a runner-up finish in the NCAA Division II Championships for its highest finish since winning the title in 2007. The Bronchos finished with six All-Americans -- the most since 2013 -- and crowned two champions in Gray and 197 Dalton Abney.

Super Regional IV titles for the third consecutive time and qualified its entire 10-man squad for the national tournament. A school-record nine of those earned All-America honors, with Abney and heavyweight Shawn Streck claiming individual titles.

Scott enjoyed unprecedented success as head coach at perennial powerhouse Perry High School during a 16-year tenure from 1995-2011. He guided the Maroons to 12 state championships and 11 dual state titles in that span while coaching 42 individual state champions.

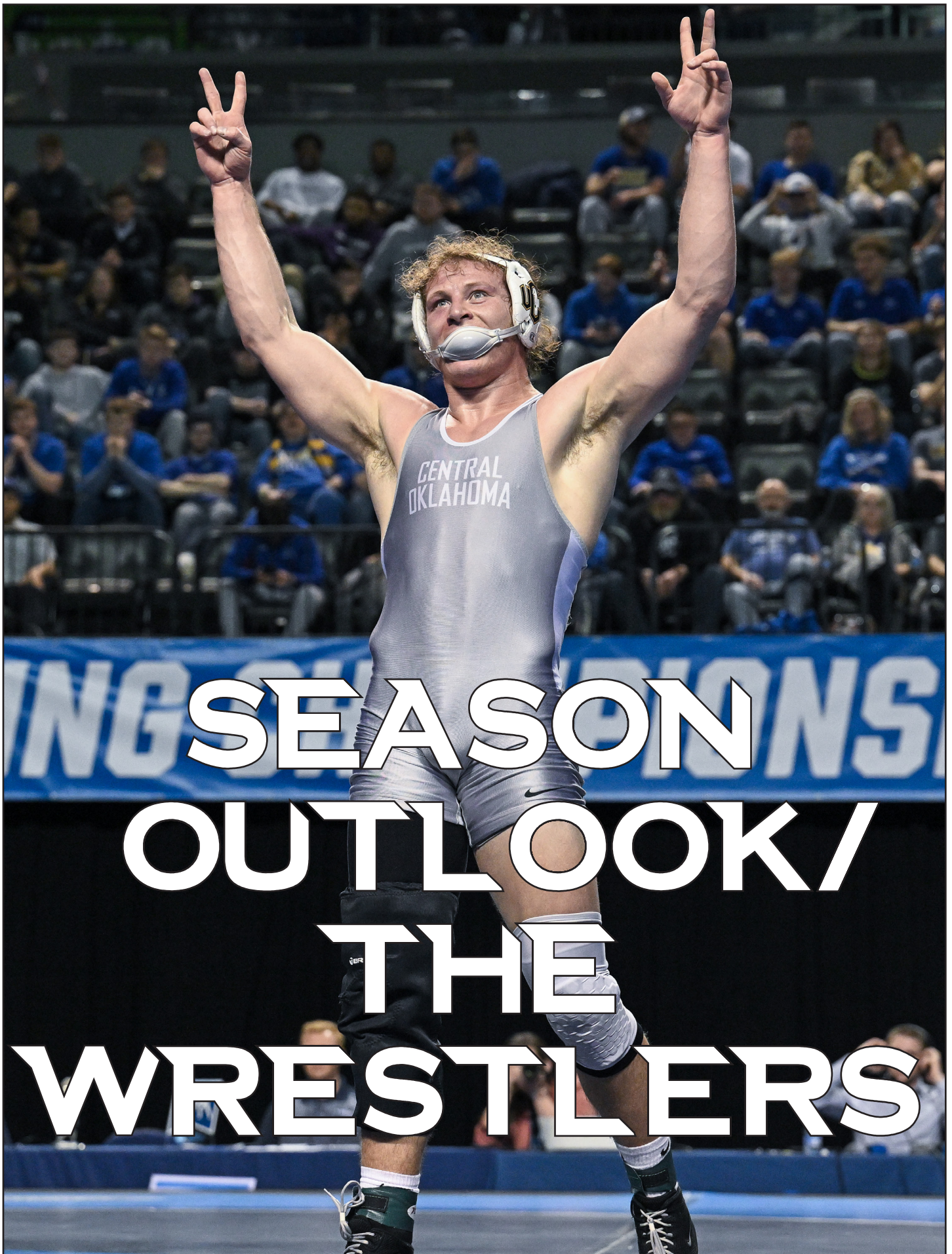
Chenoweth served as USA Junior World Freestyle team coach in 2008 and 2010 and was a National Coach of the Year finalist in 2010. He was inducted into the Oklahoma Chapter of the National Wrestling Hall of Fame for Lifetime Service to Wrestling in 2011.

Chenoweth left coaching 2011, but continued as an administrator in Perry until 2017 and then joined the UCO staff for the next season.

Scott was a three-time state champion at Perry in addition to winning a Junior National Freestyle national title. He went on to have great success at the University of Nebraska, finishing as a three-time All-American for the Huskers.

Scott is married (Sage) and has two children (Sebastian and Savannah).





# SEASON OUTLOOK/ THE WRESTLERS



## SEASON OUTLOOK

Climbing the mountain top is one thing, staying there is another. And that's the goal for Central Oklahoma in 2023-24 as the Bronchos take aim at a second straight NCAA Division II national championship.

UCO ended a long title drought last year in running away with its 16th national championship and the Bronchos appear loaded in their quest to repeat.

Five All-Americans -- spearheaded by a pair of individual champions -- and another national qualifier return from last year's squad that went 13-1 in duals before capturing a third straight regional crown and the program's first national title since 2007.

But that was last season and the Bronchos aren't interested in looking back.

"We look at it as we're in pursuit of winning the national championship this year, not defending anything," said eighth-year head coach **Todd Steidley**, who has an 86-12 dual record at UCO. "Our goal is to get better every day and to position ourselves to win the 2024 national championship.

"No one has won it this year and we don't have anything to defend. We're moving forward with that mindset and trying to be prepared for March."

Leading the Bronchos are national champions **Dalton Abney** and **Shawn Streck**, two of the best on any level.

Abney will be gunning for his third straight title at 197 pounds, while Streck returns at heavyweight looking to duplicate a season that ended with him being named Division II Wrestler of the Year.

UCO's other returning All-Americans are 141 **Dylan Lucas**, 157 **Gabe Johnson** and 184 **Anthony DesVigne**, with Lucas and DesVigne set to move up a weight this season. Also back is 125 **Studd Morris**, a national qualifier who came within one win of earning All-America honors.

There will be new faces at a few weights, but a mixture of returning squad members and newcomers will battle for those spots and Steidley is excited about their potential.

"We've got a good mix of guys who have been around a long time and younger guys looking to make their mark," Steidley said. "I'm looking forward to seeing what some of our younger guys can do. And there's a lot of changes we can make in the lineup, which is good."

So all signs point to the Bronchos making another spirited run at the national championship come next March, though plenty of challengers await.

"There's a lot of good teams in Division II," Steidley said. "I think it will be a dogfight at the national tournament, but we should be right in the middle of it."

Here's a weight-by-weight look at the Bronchos.

**125 Pounds:** UCO starts off with a senior veteran in **Studd Morris**, who really came into his own last season. Morris led the team in wins, going 34-7 with 17 bonus-point victories and capturing the regional title before coming up just short of earning All-America status.

He's back and determined to finish his career in style, though sophomore **Garrett Steidley** will push the issue. Steidley went 14-8 while seeing action at 125 and 133 last year and is certainly capable of handling the position.

Both are battling injury issues to start the season, so redshirt freshman **Guy Clevenger** and a host of rookies will look to fill the void until their return.

**133 Pounds:** UCO will have a new starter here and it looks to be a tight battle between fourth-year junior **Peter**

**Rolle** and sophomore **Caleb Tanner**.

Rolle has seen limited action during his career but has a lot of ability, while the gifted Tanner is a four-time state champion who transferred to UCO from Oklahoma at the semester break last year.

It will be interesting to see who comes out on top, though the Bronchos have confidence in both.

Redshirt freshman **Barrett Hilton** could also be a factor and a couple of freshmen provide additional depth.

**141 Pounds:** The Bronchos have the first of their five returning All-Americans at this weight in junior **Dylan Lucas**, who is set to bump up from 133 and contend for the national championship.

The explosive Lucas had a tremendous season in 2022-23 in his return to the mat after a lengthy layoff, going 23-6 with 17 bonus-point wins. He was named Outstanding Wrestler at the prestigious Midwest Classic, rolled to the regional title and finished third in the national tournament.

Redshirt freshman **Josh Taylor** and sophomore **Ryder Ramsey** will both push Lucas and have shown they can be productive. Freshman add more depth.

**149 Pounds:** Another weight that will feature a new starter, with a trio of contenders vying for the position.

Junior **Dylan Brown**, sophomore **Antonio George** and redshirt freshman **Bam West** are all in the running and it's a toss-up as to who will emerge on top.

## SEASON OUTLOOK

Brown probably rates as the favorite due to his success at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M, where he was a two-time All-American. He finished 36-7 as the national runner-up last year.

George came to UCO from Oklahoma at the semester break last year and saw action in a couple of duals, while West went 10-3 with nine bonus-point wins during his red-shirt campaign.

Several rookies give the Bronchos more depth.

**157 Pounds:** All-American **Gabe Johnson** is back and the Bronchos expect the sophomore standout to use last year's success as a springboard for bigger things.

Johnson had an outstanding season, finishing 33-7 with 12 bonus-point wins. He captured the regional crown before finishing seventh in the national tournament and should be a top title contender this year.

Sophomore **Bryce Dauphin**, a transfer from Wyoming, is capable of pushing Johnson. Sophomore **Brady DeArmond** and redshirt freshman **Aidan Boline** are also available.

**165 Pounds:** Junior **Hunter Jump** is set to take over as the starter and has the ability to be an All-American.

Jump went 22-7 as the starter in 2021-22, just missing qualifying for the national tournament with a fourth-place regional finish. He suffered a season-ending injury early last year, but is back to full strength and ready to show what he can do.

Depth isn't great here, with freshman **Kaleb Owen** the only other listed 165-pounder, though junior **Zane Coleman** or redshirt freshman **Jaxon Randall** could drop down from 174 if needed.

**174 Pounds:** UCO will have a new face in the lineup here, with a trio of challengers battling for the No. 1 spot.

Junior transfer **Zane Coleman**, sophomore letterman **Barrett Haemker** and redshirt freshman **Jaxon Randall** are the contenders and it's anybody's guess as to who will take over.

Coleman, a four-time Oklahoma state champion who came to UCO from Arizona State, probably rates as the slight favorite. Haemker went 6-2 in limited action last year, while Randall missed the season with injury.

Talented freshman **Tucker Waitman** is also available.

**184 Pounds:** Senior **Anthony DesVigne** is slated to be here after earning All-America honors at 174 last season, though he could drop back down if needed.

The powerfully-built DesVigne has competed at four weights during his career (157, 165, 174 and 184) and came into his own last season, going 31-8 with 13 bonus-point wins. He claimed the regional title before taking seventh at nationals and the confidence gained from that success should be a big boost this season.

Redshirt freshman **Garrett Wells** showed what he can do last year, going 16-1 in four open tournaments. Wells will be the starter early as DesVigne recovers from off-season surgery and his performance may dictate what happens at this weight in the second semester.

Sophomore lettermen **Kohner Gallagher** and **Kohl Owen** provide excellent depth.

**197 Pounds:** A senior star is back and has a chance to make history. Due to a COVID-induced extra year, **Dalton Abney** is looking to become what would be UCO's only five-time All-American while also searching for a third straight national title.

Abney overcame a mid-season injury to win both the regional and national championships last year, finishing 23-2 with 11 bonus-point wins. The opportunity to stamp himself as one of UCO's all-time greats has Ab-

ney focused on a fantastic finish and there's no question he'll be favored to do just that.

Sophomore **Emmanuel Skillings** went 6-1 filling in for Abney last year and definitely has the skills to be the starter. He will fill in on occasion and continue to pick up valuable experience.

Junior **Seth Sarasua** adds more depth.

**Heavyweight:** UCO's other returning national champion resides here and senior standout **Shawn Streck** made history himself last season in becoming the program's first-ever heavyweight gold medalist.

Streck was brilliant last season in going 26-0 with 16 bonus-point wins while giving up just two offensive points and was named Division II Wrestler of the Year. Expect more of the same in 2024 from this unstoppable force.

Streck will miss the first part of the season because of semester limits, but the Bronchos don't drop off much with junior **Braden Morgan** in the lineup. Morgan went 14-1 last season in a back-up role and is an All-America contender in his own right.

Freshman **Alex Sutterfield** is also here and sophomore **Emmanuel Skillings** could come up from 197 if needed.

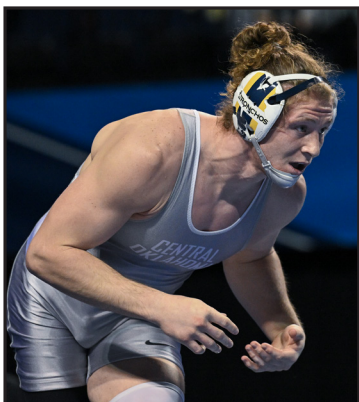
# NATIONAL CHAMPION



## DALTON ABNEY 197 POUNDS

SENIOR | 6-2 | TULSA, OKLA.

Two-time national champion and senior standout aiming to become a five-time All-American, something never before done at UCO ... Earned All-America honors as a redshirt freshman in 2019-20 after the international pandemic canceled the national tournament and then gained an extra year of eligibility when the NCAA opted not to count the shortened 2020-21 season ... National runner-up that year, then captured the past two titles ... Has wrestled every match at 197 pounds and brings spectacular 72-6 career record with 38 bonus-point wins into final season ... Tough, physical grappler who punishes opponents when in control on the mat ... Excels with positioning and extremely hard to score on ... Has been a dominating force throughout his career and poised to finish with a flourish in bid to become rare three-time national champion.



**2022-23:** Battled through injury-plagued season to climb atop the podium at the national tournament for the second time ... Finished 23-2 with 11 bonus wins ... Started 14-0 – stretching two-year winning streak to 40 in a row – in capturing titles at the Drury Open and Midwest Classic before losing overtime decision to rival Derek Blubaugh of Indianapolis in

the NWCA Division II National Duals in early January ... Claimed technical fall in next bout there before suffering severe ankle injury in loss to St. Cloud State’s Dominic Murphy ... Missed the rest of the regular season, not returning until the Super Regional IV Tournament on Feb. 26 ... Rolled into finals with 18-2 technical fall, first-period pin and 4-0 shutout before blanking Blubaugh 2-0 for the title ... Was the No. 1 seed at nationals and made that stand up with 4-0 run to the gold medal ... Opened with first-period fall and 9-1 major decision, then clipped Murphy 4-2 in sudden-victory to make the finals ... Used third-period escape to trim Blubaugh 1-0 in claiming second national crown.

**2021-22:** Put together fantastic season, finishing perfect 26-0 with 10 falls and four major decisions ... Allowed a mere 13 points in those 26 bouts, giving up 10 escapes and one takedown along with one penalty ... Eight of 10 falls came in the first period ... Was ranked No. 1 all season and made it stand up at the end with 4-0 performance at the national tournament ... Opened with 4-0 and 5-0 shutouts, scored dramatic third-period fall in the semifinals and capped unbeaten season with 6-0 finals triumph over Blubaugh ... Didn’t give up a point in beating Blubaugh four times during the year, scoring first-period fall in dual with the Grey-

hounds, winning 4-0 in Midwest Classic finals and 6-0 in regional tournament finals ... Clinched team title for UCO with Midwest Classic finals victory ... Recorded 12 shutouts on the season ... Named Super Region IV Wrestler of the Year and was one of six finalists for NCAA Division II Wrestler of the Year.

**2020-21:** Finished 10-2 with team-high five falls in making it all the way to the national finals ... Had three falls and a technical fall in shortened 5-0 dual season, then was runner-up in both the regional and national tournaments ... Scored two falls in making regional finals before dropping 2-0 decision to McKendree’s Ryan Vasbinder ... Pulled out three close wins (3-2, 2-1, 2-0) at nationals, then lost tough 1-0 finals decision to Vasbinder.

**2019-20:** Didn’t compete in the first semester while recovering from knee injury, then went 13-2 with seven bonus-point wins ... Earned All-America recognition by the National Wrestling Coaches Association after the national tournament was canceled ... # NATIONAL CHAMPION



## SHAWN STRECK HEAVYWEIGHT

SENIOR | 6-1 | MERRILLVILLE, IND.

Reigning national champion and Division II Wrestler of the Year who is a dominating force at the end of the lineup for the Bronchos ... Became UCO's first-ever heavyweight national champion last season in capping unbeaten campaign ... Will miss the first part of the season due to semester limitations, but that layoff won't affect this senior star and two-time All-American ... Agile, mobile big man who overwhelms opposing heavyweights with relentless style and is constantly on the attack, particularly on his feet ... Nearly impossible to score on and is focused on capturing a second national title ... Is 38-2 with 24 bonus-point wins in two seasons at UCO and will continue to rack up plenty of points ... Division I national qualifier at Purdue in 2017-18, then didn't complete collegiately again until coming to UCO in January of 2022.

**2022-23:** Missed first month recovering from off-season surgery, then put together perfect 26-0 record with 16 bonus wins



... Owned an astounding 103-1 advantage in takedowns, with that one takedown the only offensive points he allowed all season ... Had a string of seven straight bonus wins during one stretch ... Saw first action at the Drury Open and went 5-0 with four bonus wins to win that title ... Also took gold medal at the rugged Midwest Classic, earning

three bonus wins and clipping Glenville State's Jared Campbell 3-2 in the finals ... Went 9-0 in duals, with his closest match an 8-3 decision ... Opened Super Regional IV Tournament with first-period fall and 21-7 major decision, then edged Ouachita Baptist's Johnny Green 2-1 in the finals ... Was No. 1 seed at national tournament and went 4-0 against a loaded field to become school's first-ever heavyweight champion ... Gave up lone takedown of season in 8-3 quarterfinal win over Juan Edmond-Holmes of Lander ... Downed Green 6-3 in semifinals, then had four takedowns in cruising past Campbell 8-3 for the title ... Was named Super Regional IV Wrestler of the Year by the National Wrestling Coaches Association and followed that up by earning Division II Wrestler of the Year honors.

**2021-22:** Didn't appear in lineup until late January and went on to finish 12-2 with eight bonus-point wins while racking up

49 takedowns ... Scored falls in first three matches and lifted UCO to 18-17 win over eventual national champion Nebraska-Kearney with 5-2 win over Lee Herrington in final bout ... Didn't give up an offensive point and outscored three opponents 49-11 in winning Super Regional IV title ... Opened national tournament with 15-3 major decision in prelim match, then edged returning runner-up Western Hunt of Colorado Mines 3-2 and Herrington 3-1 in sudden victory to make the semifinals ... Dropped tough 3-2 decision there to eventual champion Darrell Mason of Minnesota State-Mankato ... Was forced to default last two matches after suffering injury early in consolation rematch with Hunt to finish sixth in earning All-America honors.

**Purdue:** Redshirted in 2016-17, then won 30 matches with six falls in qualifying for national tournament the next season ... Was named to Amateur Wrestling News' All-Rookie Team ... Placed in five tournaments, including fifth at the prestigious Las Vegas Invitational and seventh at the rugged Big 10 Championships in advancing to national tourney ... Went 2-2 at nationals, knocked out 13th-seeded Billy Miller of Edinboro in the first round 11-5 before dropping 4-2 sudden-victory decision to Duke's fourth-seeded Jacob Kasper ... Won 12-3 major decision in first consolation match, then was eliminated by eventual All-American Sam Stoll of Iowa.

**High School:** Enjoyed tremendous career at Merrillville (Ind.) High School as four-time state placer, finishing with 175-8 career record ... Undefeated (91-0) state champion as a junior and senior, pinning seven consecutive opponents at the state tournament in that span ... Was the nation's second-ranked heavyweight by all major outlets.

**2020-21:** Went 2-1 in three appearances during Central's shortened dual season ... Had 14-7 win and 15-3 major decision.

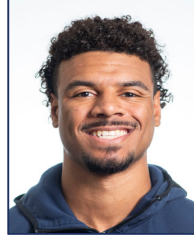

**JUNIOR | 5-6 | ARDMORE, OKLA.**

Overcame long layoff to claim All-America accolades last season and looks to take the next step in 2023-24 ... Hadn't competed since 2017 when he arrived at UCO last summer, but quickly made his presence felt and had huge impact at 133 pounds ... Set to move up to 141 this winter, but there's no question this highly-competitive junior will be a prime national championship hopeful ... Exciting grappler who thrives on big moves and is constantly on the attack ... Capable of scoring bonus points in every match and is ready for a big season ... Redshirted at Oklahoma in 2015-16, then transferred to juco powerhouse Northeastern Oklahoma A&M ... Spent the next few years working before opting to return to school – and the mat – at UCO.



**2022-23:** Showed no rust in exploding out of the gate, then bounced back from mid-season slump to finish 23-6 with 17 bonus-point wins ... Started 14-1 with 11 bonus wins, winning two tournaments and finishing

runner-up in another... Had two falls, two technical falls and a major decision in taking Dan Harris Open ... Took Outstanding Wrestler honors at the prestigious Midwest Classic after rolling to that title with four bonus wins and 9-2 finals victory ... Runner-up at Lindenwood Open, dropping wild 12-10 finals decision to Oklahoma State's Reese Witcraft ... Struggled to start second-semester schedule, losing four of six matches while also missing a few duals ... Came back strong in the postseason to capture Regional IV crown and finish third at national tournament ... Wasn't tested at the regional with a fall and back-to-back 8-0 major decisions ... Was seeded only eighth at nationals and opened with first-period fall before losing 5-3 to the No. 1 seed ... Rebounded with four straight wins to take third, beating the Nos. 2, 4 and 7 seeds in the process.

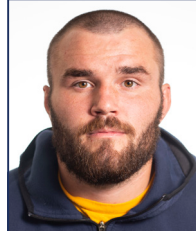

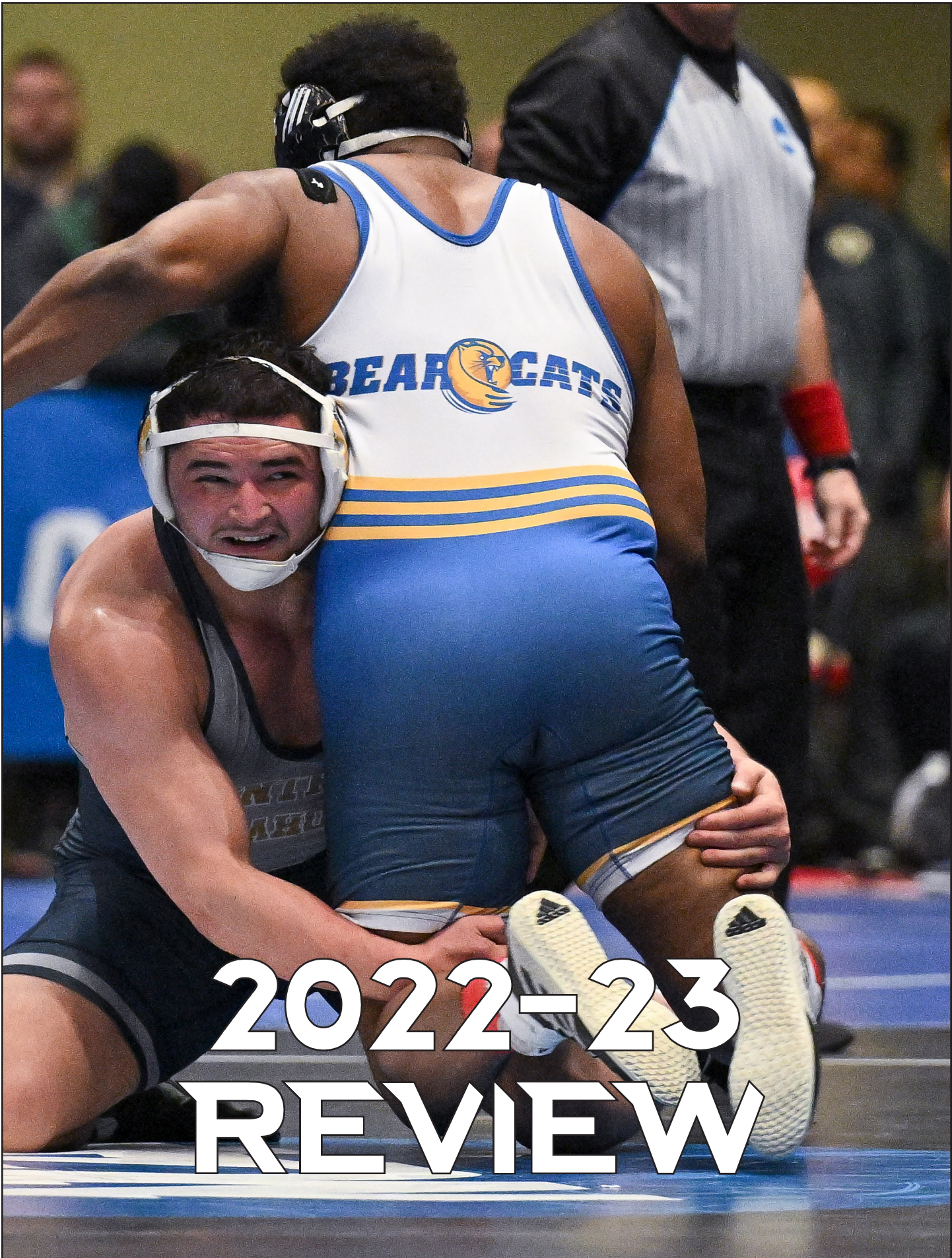

# 2022-23 SEASON RECAP

**UCO 30, Northern State 3:** Anthony DesVigne cruised to a big upset at 184 pounds to highlight Central Oklahoma's season-opening 30-3 trouncing of Northern State.

DesVigne knocked off sixth-ranked Treyton Cacek 8-2 and the No. 4 Bronchos took nine of 10 matches from the No. 17 Wolves.

UCO earned bonus points at two weights, getting a technical fall from Hvy Braden Morgan and major decision from 133 Dylan Lucas.

**Dan Harris Open:** Dylan Lucas overwhelmed the field to capture the 133-pound title and lead a parade of five Central Oklahoma champions at the Dan Harris Open Sunday.

The No. 4-ranked Bronchos also got gold medal efforts from 125 Studd Morris, 141 Ryder Ramsey, 184 Anthony DesVigne and Hvy Braden Morgan.

**UCO 30, Drury 9:** A quartet of bonus-point routs powered No. 4-ranked Central Oklahoma to a 30-9 romp over Drury.

Anthony DesVigne scored a first-period fall at 184 pounds, while 133 Dylan Lucas, 149 Brik Filippo and 197 Dalton Abney had technical falls as the Bronchos won their 21st straight dual.

**Lindenwood Open:** Studd Morris, Dylan Lucas and Anthony DesVigne had runner-up finishes to lead 11 Central Oklahoma placers in the Lindenwood Open.

Morris (125), Lucas (133) and DesVigne (174) led the way for the Bronchos in the huge one-day tournament. UCO also got a third-place effort from 157 Gabe Johnson, while 149 Brik Filippo took fourth, 141 Nate Keim fifth and 125 Garrett Steidley and 165 Ty Lucas sixth in the open division.

**Drury Open:** Studd Morris scored five bonus-point wins in capturing the 125-pound title to lead a host of Central Oklahoma champions at the Drury Open.

The Bronchos dominated the one-day tournament, winning six weights and finishing runner-up at two others.

Joining Morris as champions were 149 Brik Filippo, 174 Tre'Vaughn Craig, 197 Dalton Abney and Hvy Shawn Streck, while Nate Keim and Ryder Ramsey shared the 141 title.

**UCO 45, Newman 6:** Brik Filippo's 26-second fall highlighted another dominating dual performance for Central Oklahoma as the No. 3-ranked Bronchos blitzed Newman 45-6.

Hvy Shawn Streck also had a first-period pin, while 125 Studd Morris, 141 Nate Keim and 174 Tre'Vaughn Craig added major decisions.

**Midwest Classic:** Dylan Lucas capped off a dominating weekend by capturing the 133-pound championship and winning Outstanding Wrestler honors in leading Central Oklahoma to a record-setting performance at the 43rd Midwest Classic.

Lucas was joined atop the podium by 197 Dalton Abney and Hvy Shawn Streck and all 10 individuals placed in the top six for the Bronchos, who racked up a tournament-record 178.5 points in breezing to a staggering 83.5-point victory.

The Bronchos also got runner-up finishes from 157 Gabe Johnson and 184 Anthony DesVigne, while 165 Ty Lucas came in third, 125 Studd Morris and 174 Tre'Vaughn Craig fifth and 141 Nate Keim and 149 Brik Filippo sixth.

**UCO 22, Augustana 12:** Nate Keim (141) had a technical fall and Hvy Shawn Streck a major decision

as the defending champion Bronchos trimmed unrated Augustana 22-12 in the first round of NWCA Division II National Duals for the 600th win in program history.

**UCO 25, Indianapolis 9:** Nate Keim (141) and Hvy Shawn Streck both scored major decision to power Central Oklahoma to a 25-9 rout of No. 12 Indianapolis in the quarterfinals of the NWCA Division II National Duals.

**UCO 38, West Liberty 3:** Gabe Johnson (157) and Hvy Shawn Streck had first-period falls to highlight top-ranked Central Oklahoma's 38-3 throttling of No. 4 West Liberty State in the semifinals of NWCA Division II National Duals.

The Bronchos also got bonus-point wins from 125 Studd Morris, 149 Brik Filippo and 197 Dalton Abney in overwhelming the Hilltoppers.

**St. Cloud State 19, UCO 16:** St. Cloud State ended UCO's 25-match winning streak in avenging a loss in last year's NWCA Division II finals with a 19-14 win.

Dylan Lucas (133) had the lone bonus-point win for UCO with a major decision, while 141 Nate Keim,

165 Ty Lucas, 184 Alex Kauffman and Hvy Shawn Streck also won.

**UCO 36, Colorado State-Pueblo 0:** Garrett Steidley's first-period fall at 133 and a trio of other bonus-point wins powered top-ranked Central Oklahoma to a 36-0 whitewashing of Colorado State-Pueblo

Garrett had the lone fall of the day and the Bronchos also got major decisions from 125 Studd Morris, 174 Anthony DesVigne and Hvy Shawn Streck.

**UCO 35, Western Colorado 10/UCO 25, Chadron State 12:** Banged-up Central Oklahoma used late-match rallies to subdue a pair of NCAA Division II rivals at the Midwest Duals.

The Bronchos scored four straight bonus-point wins in a 35-10 romp over Western Colorado in the opener, then won the final four matches for a 25-12 triumph over Chadron State.

Gabe Johnson (157) led the Bronchos with a pair of bonus wins, while 125 Studd Morris, 174 Anthony DesVigne, 184 Alex Kauffman, 197 Emmanuel Skillings and Hvy Braden Morgan all won both their matches.

**UCO 41, Fort Hays State 6:** Points came early and often for Central Oklahoma as the top-ranked Bronchos steamrolled No. 17 Fort Hays State 41-6.

UCO notched three technical falls, two falls, two major decisions and a forfeit in winning their 15th straight home dual.

**UCO 30, Central Missouri 6:** Being without six starters was no problem for top-ranked Central Oklahoma in a 30-6 rout over Central Missouri.

The Bronchos used backups at 133, 141, 149, 165, 197 and heavyweight, going 4-2 in those matches.

**UCO 24, Adams State 15:** Emmanuel Skillings came through with a clutch win at 197 pounds and Shawn Streck followed with a quick fall in the final match to clinch top-ranked Central Oklahoma's hard-fought 24-15 triumph over No. 8 Adams State.

UCO got bonus-point wins from 125 Studd Morris, 157 Gabe Johnson and Streck, while 141 Nate Keim, 174 Anthony DesVigne and Skillings all won decisions.

**UCO 21, Nebraska-Kearney 13:** Studd Morris electrified the boisterous Hamilton Field House crowd in the opening match, Shawn Streck had fans on their feet again in the finale and top-ranked Central Oklahoma took down No. 3 Nebraska-Kearney 21-13.

Morris jump-started the Bronchos with a first-period fall at 125 pounds, while Streck prevailed in a No. 1 vs. No. 2 showdown at heavyweight to seal the verdict as UCO captured its third straight Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association title.

The Bronchos also got big wins from 141 Nate Keim, 157 Gabe Johnson, 165 Ty Lucas and 197 Emmanuel Skillings in finishing the dual season 13-1.

UCO pushed its home winning streak to 17 straight in beating the Lopers for the fourth straight time.

**Super Regional IV:** Nate Keim got past an old nemesis to claim the 141-pound title and lead a parade of seven individual champions that carried top-ranked Central Oklahoma to a runaway victory in the NCAA Division II Super Regional IV Tournaments.

Keim avenged three earlier losses this season to Drury's Peter Kuster with a 3-2 finals victory, while 125 Studd Morris, 133 Dylan Lucas, 157 Gabe Johnson, 174 Anthony DesVigne, 197 Dalton Abney and Hvy Shawn Streck joined him on the top of the podium.

The Bronchos also got runner-up finishes from 165 Ty Lucas and 184 Alex Kauffman and a third-place effort from 149 Brik Filippo in racking up 169.5 points to capture their third straight regional crown.

**NCAA DIVISION II Championships:** Dalton Abney and Shawn Streck captured back-to-back individual gold medals and Central Oklahoma finished with a school-record nine All-Americans in rolling to the NCAA Division II national championship.

Abney earned a tight 1-0 decision to claim his second straight 197-pound crown and Streck breezed to an 8-3 victory in becoming UCO's first-ever winner at heavyweight to highlight an incredible team performance over the two-day tournament.

UCO finishing with 121 points, 43 ahead of runner-up Lander.

Dylan Lucas (133), Nate Keim (141) and Ty Lucas (165) all finished third, while 184 Alex Kauffman took fifth, 149 Brik Filippo sixth and 157 Gabe Johnson and 174 Anthony DesVigne seventh.

The Bronchos pulled off eight upsets of higher-seeded individuals in the tournament and finished 22-6 in the consolations -- winning 12 of 13 during one stretch -- in ending a 16-year championship drought. It was UCO's 16th championship, including the eighth in Division II to tie the all-time record held by Nebraska-Omaha and Cal State-Bakersfield.

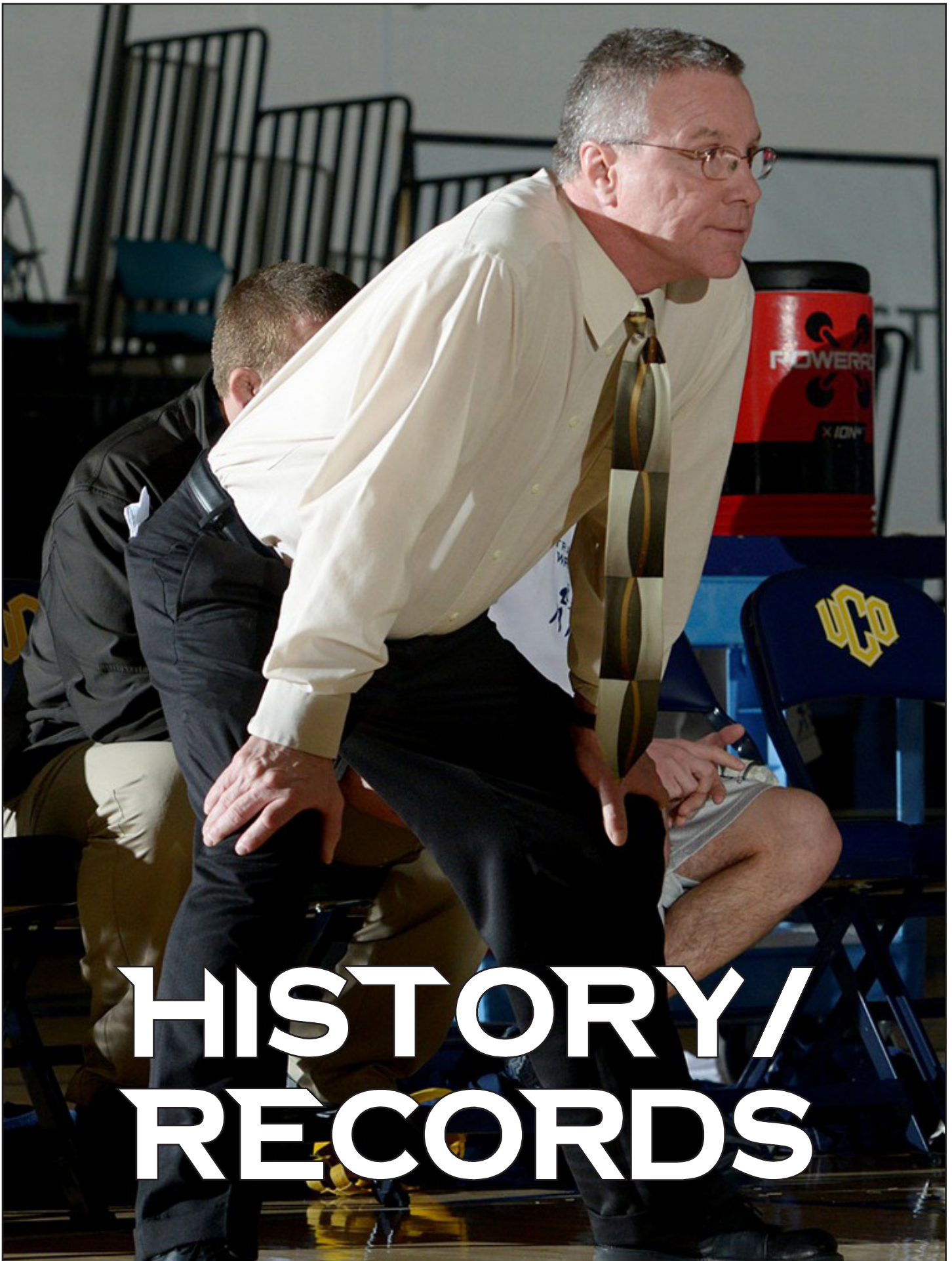

## NATIONAL TOURNAMENT HISTORY

Central Oklahoma has long had one of the most successful wrestling programs in the nation, having claimed 16 national championships in its 70-year history.

UCO has taken eight crowns since joining NCAA Division II in 1990 after capturing eight titles while members of the NAIA.

The Bronchos have also had nine national runner-up finishes in four different divisions – AAU (1935), NCAA Division I (1936), NAIA (1974 and '88) and NCAA Division II (1990, '91, '96, '00 and '22). UCO has 39 top-five national tournament finishes, including a streak of 27 straight years from 1978 through 2004.

## NATIONAL WRESTLERS OF THE YEAR

Central Oklahoma has had two individuals named NCAA Division II Wrestler of the Year since that award started in 2008 -- Chris Watson in 2015 and Shawn Streck in 2023.

Watson was a perfect 42-0 with a school-record 30 bonus-point wins at 165 pounds in 2014-15. He finished his career 130-28

with a school-record 36 major decisions and was a three-time All-American.

Streck went 26-0 with 16 bonus wins last season in becoming UCO's first-ever heavyweight national champion. He enters his senior season with a 38-2 career record.

## NATIONAL TOURNAMENT OUTSTANDING WRESTLERS

Eight Central Oklahoma wrestlers have been named Outstanding Wrestler at the national tournament, four in NAIA and four in NCAA Division II

Todd Osborn at 126 pounds was the first in 1981, with 142-pounder Ronnie James (1982), 177-pounder Benny Cole-

man (1984) and 150-pounder Johnny Nimmo (1987) the other NAIA winners.

Taking the Division II award have been 126-pounder Brian Melchiori (1994), 133-pounder Cole Province (2003), 133-pounder Casy Rowell (2014) and 165-pounder Chris Watson (2015).





## REGIONAL CHAMPIONS

UCO has captured 22 regional team titles -- including a string of 15 straight from 1990-04 -- and crowned 119 individual regional champions since joining NCAA Division II in 1990. The Bronchos had nine regional titlists in 1995 and have crowned eight champions twice (1993 and '94).

Cole Province (2001-04), Kyle Evans (2005-08) and Heath Gray (2018-22) are the only four-time champions and the Bronchos have had 17 individuals named Regional Wrestler of the Year.

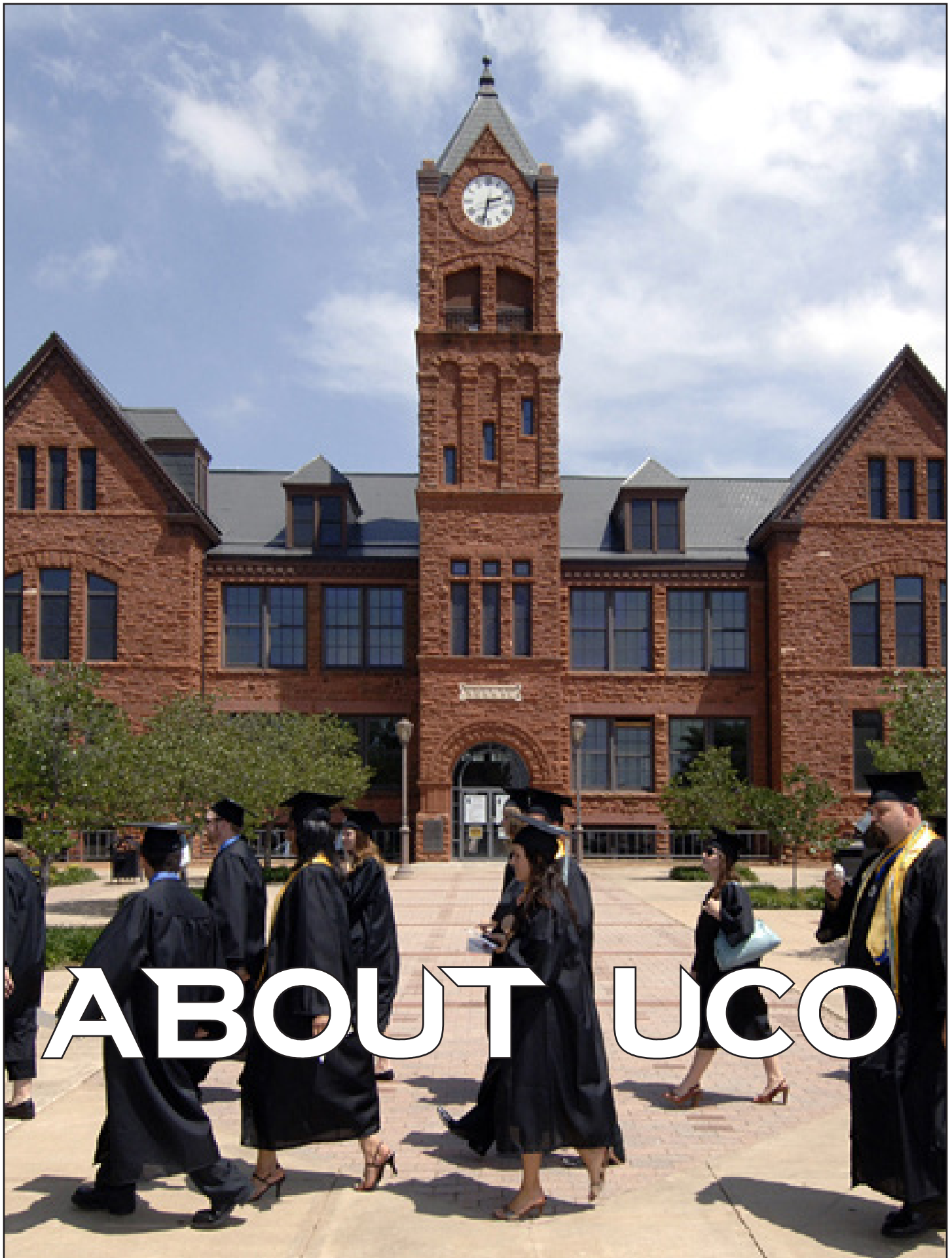

Edmond is the fastest growing, most economically dynamic city in Oklahoma. Thriving technology firms, diverse retail and commercial opportunities and small corporate office headquarters have enhanced its reputation as the affluent residential suburb to the metropolitan area.

There are many more activities in Edmond, with a variety of music, art, theatre, water and sporting events that make for spectacular family fun.

Heard on Hurd is a monthly festival where Downtown Edmond is transformed into an exciting mix of food trucks, family-friendly excitement and music that has become one of the premier, socially engaging events in the area.

Edmond also boasts one of the best Fourth of July fireworks shows in the country. More than 125,000 people attend the event. LibertyFest has been previously chosen by CNN and USA Today as one of the top 10 places to be in America on July 4.

Another Edmond attraction is Lake Arcadia. Home to the Center for Outdoor Adventure Recreation, Lake Arcadia offers trails for running, hiking, and cycling, as well as 1,820 surface acres for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing, and 26 miles of shoreline for more fun.





## OKLAHOMA CITY

The largest city in the state, Oklahoma City borders Edmond to the south and sits at the crossroads of I-35, I-40 and I-44, leaving OKC with more than 130 miles of federal and interstate highways.

More than 1.3 million people call metro Oklahoma City home.

The City, as it is commonly referred to around the state, offers numerous things to do on any given day of the week – or year for that matter. Whether it is sports, music, art, or just getting outside on a nice day, OKC offers it all.

Bricktown, the central hub of entertainment in downtown, is home to Bricktown Ballpark, where the Oklahoma City Dodgers – Triple-A affiliate to MLB's L.A. Dodgers – play ball. The ballpark also hosts high school games, collegiate tournaments, as well as concerts of its own.

There is plenty more to do, especially on the booming, Oklahoma River.

The UCO rowing team calls the river home and has a state-of-the-art boathouse on the river to prove it. Visitors can also enjoy the Riversport Adventure District, where you can challenge yourself through a white-water rapids course, zip line across the river, or bungee jump among other fun ac-



tivities.

There are also five lakes in the greater OKC metro area that offer ample fun including fishing, running or cycling trails and swimming.

Along with art museums, a science museum, and many more, there is always something to do in OKC.

The Adventure District is just 10 minutes from UCO and offers many fun things to do.

Remington Park races horses more than half of the year, the Oklahoma City Zoo is always a top-pick, and it sits right next to the science museum.

If you venture west of downtown toward the fairgrounds, you can find more fun.

Home to the Oklahoma State Fair every September, as well as shows year-round, the fairgrounds offer countless entertainment options.



Oklahoma City is in a warm southwest climate. It sees more than 300 days of sunshine on average per year.

# ATHLETIC ADMINISTRATION



## PRESIDENT TODD LAMB

Todd G. Lamb became the University of Central Oklahoma's 22nd president July 1, 2023, marking a new chapter in a distinguished career that spans public service, statewide elected office, private law practice and business ownership.

In his role leading Oklahoma's metropolitan university, President Lamb ensures the Central team remains focused on educating students through transformative learning and meeting the critical workforce needs of our state and nation.

President Lamb champions a commitment throughout campus to what he has coined "The B.R.O.N.C.H.O. Way" – Being Reflective of Our Neighborhood, Community, History and Oklahoma. This commitment connects the university mission and values to relevant action that ensures accessibility to a quality university education

for students.

Born in Enid, Oklahoma, President Lamb earned his bachelor's degree from Oklahoma State University, also attending classes at UCO during his undergraduate pursuit. He earned a Juris Doctor from Oklahoma City University.

Early in his career, Lamb was a special agent with the U.S. Secret Service. He was appointed to the Joint Terrorism Task Force and was assigned to portions of the 9/11 investigation. He also served on details protecting President Bill Clinton and President George W. Bush.

Following his tenure with the U.S. Secret Service, President Lamb worked on the staff of U.S. Sen. Don Nickles. He was elected to the Oklahoma State Senate in 2004, where he represented portions of Edmond and northwest Oklahoma City. He rose to the position of majority floor leader during his senate tenure.

President Lamb was elected as the lieutenant governor of the state of Oklahoma, a position he held from 2011 to 2019. During his time in elected office at the Oklahoma State Capitol, he served in a number of leadership roles, focusing on educational, financial and commerce matters. He also was the recipient of the Oklahoma State Regents Distinguished Service Award for his dedication to strengthening higher education in Oklahoma.

Upon reentering the private sector in 2019, he was involved in a number of private business ventures, including the practice of law, focusing on business and governmental matters.

President Lamb's diverse background in government, law, financial management and industry is helping guide UCO into the future as a leading university in career readiness.

President Lamb has been married to his wife, Monica, for 28 years. A longtime educator, she most recently taught at Cashion Public Schools. Monica stepped away from the classroom to commit herself to serving UCO students, faculty and staff as the university's first lady. The Lambs have two children.



## ATHLETIC DIRECTOR STAN WAGON

Stan Wagon took over as Central Oklahoma's athletic director in August 2020, becoming just the ninth director in the school's storied athletic history.

He came to Central following a four-year stint as commissioner of the Sooner Athletic Conference. Wagon held the same position at the Lone Star Conference, spending 11 years there within the conference's administration and as commissioner.

An Edmond native, Wagon earned his bachelor's degree from Central in 1995. His father (Skip) served as director of athletics from 1986-2003.

Wagon worked in the UCO sports information office as a student, then served as SID at Midwestern State, where he received his master's degree, and Tarleton State.

Stan moved from Tarleton to the NCAA Division II's Lone Star Conference office and eventually served as commissioner. He spent 11 years in that role before moving to the same post at the NAIA's Sooner Athletic Conference, where he served from July 2016 until returning to UCO.

At the LSC, Wagon's most noteworthy accomplishment was creation of the Lone Star Football Festival, held annually at Arlington's AT&T Stadium, home of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys. The event generated nearly a half-million dollars back to the conference office.

Throughout his career, Wagon has emerged as a national leader in intercollegiate athletics. He has served as Chair of the NCAA Division II Nominating Committee and the NCAA Men's Basketball Regional Advisory Committee. He also served on committees for the D2 CCA and College Sports Information Directors of Association (CoSIDA).

## SENIOR ASSOCIATE ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Joining the department in November 2012, Rogers served the compliance department in an assistant role before moving to Director of Athletic Compliance and Legal Affairs, overseeing all aspects of the crucial facet of the department. # HAMILTON FIELD HOUSE

Central Oklahoma's Hamilton Field House opened its doors in January of 1965, during which time the school's wrestling program was shut down.

UCO revived wrestling for the 1972-73 season and the Bronchos wrestled their first match in Hamilton Field House on Dec. 8, 1972, drubbing North Texas, 53-2.

Since then, UCO has compiled an impressive 233-63-3 home record (.784 winning percentage). Current head coach Todd Steidley is 32-2 (.941) at home.

The Bronchos will host their 300th dual at Hamilton Field House on Dec. 10 with the home opener against Newman.



Field House in 1981 and 1984, winning the championship both times. The Bronchos have hosted an NCAA Division II regional tournament seven times (1993, '98, '04, '12, '21 and '23), winning the team title six times.

Hamilton Field House was renamed from Broncho Field House on May 1, 1993 in honor of long-time UCO coach and athletic director Dale Hamilton, who helped design the building in the 1960s.

A new wrestling room that ranks as one of the finest in the country at any level was added to HFH in 2019. Four wrestling mats

cover the room, which also includes a cardio area, locker room, three coaches offices, a student-athlete lounge and reception area.
