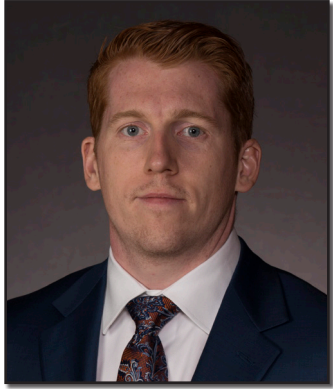

RICHARD AND KITZIA GOODMAN HEAD COACH DAVID CARLE



David Carle is in his fifth season as the Richard and Kitzia Goodman Hockey Head Coach after being named to the position on May 25, 2018. The ninth head coach in program history, Carle has led the Pioneers to Frozen Four appearances in each of his two full regular seasons behind the bench, including guiding Denver to its record-tying ninth national championship in April 2022.

At the time of his hire, Carle was youngest head coach in NCAA Division I men's hockey at age 28 and became the fourth-youngest coach in history to win a D-I national title this past spring (32 years, 5 months, 0 days). In his four years as the bench boss, he has led DU to an 86-43-13 overall record and a 49-36-9-8 mark in National Collegiate Hockey Conference play.

Carle, 32, led the Pioneers to a 31-9-1 record during the team's run to the NCAA Championship in 2021-22. Denver won its second Penrose Cup as conference regular-season champions with an 18-6-0 mark in NCHC play, and the program went 17-1-1 at home and 22-1-1 in the state of Colorado during the campaign. The Pioneers began the season by winning their first eight home games, the longest streak to begin a campaign since Magness Arena opened in 1999 and tied for the third-longest in school history. Overall, DU began the year on a 15-game unbeaten streak at home, the third-longest in program history and the longest since the 1967-68 season. He was named the Coach of the Year by USCHO at the end of the season.

Prior to being named head coach, Carle served four and a half seasons as an assistant coach with the Pioneers under Jim Montgomery. He joined the program on Jan. 1, 2014 following a season and a half as an assistant coach with the Green Bay Gamblers of the United States Hockey League (USHL).

In his first season as head coach, the Anchorage, Alaska, native guided the Pioneers to the Frozen Four with a 24-12-5 record (11-10-3-3 NCHC). After competing in the NCHC Frozen Faceoff, Denver advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 12th straight year and defeated Ohio State and American International College to earn a spot in the NCAA National Semifinals for the third time in four seasons.

In Carle's second campaign at the helm, Denver finished its 70th Anniversary Season with a 21-9-6 record (11-8-5-4 NCHC), extending the "Tenzer Streak" by winning 20 games for the 19th straight season and reclaiming the Gold Pan from Colorado College. The Pioneers were set to head to another NCAA Tournament that year, but the remainder of the season was eventually canceled due to COVID-19. Denver finished fifth in the Pairwise Rankings and sixth in the national polls with a resume that included top-10 sweeps of Boston College and UMass. The Pioneers opened the year on an eight-game winning streak, their best start to a campaign since 2001-02, and went on an 11-game unbeaten stretch from Dec. 7-Jan. 25, their best single-season unbeaten streak since 2016-17 (13).

Denver retained the Gold Pan for the 15th time (15-13) after sweeping Colorado College to end the 2020-21 regular season. In the single-elimination NCHC Tournament in Grand Forks, North Dakota, the Pioneers defeated Omaha 5-4 in the quarterfinals before falling 2-1 in overtime in the semifinals to the UND Fighting Hawks. Carle earned his 50th career victory with a 4-1 win over North Dakota on Jan. 17 (90th game, 50-28-12), accomplishing the feat in one fewer game than his predecessor, Jim Montgomery (91st game, 50-33-8). He was also at the helm for the program's 1,500th victory, a 6-1 defeat of CC on Jan. 2, helping Denver become just the fifth college hockey team to reach the milestone.

During his tenure as an assistant coach with the Pioneers, Carle helped Denver to a 115-51-23 record, a 66-32-14-8 mark in the NCHC, one NCHC regular-season title, two NCHC Frozen Faceoff titles, five NCAA Tournament appearances, two Frozen Four appearances and the 2017 National Championship. While in Green Bay, Carle assisted the Gamblers to a 37-23-4 record, a second-place finish in the USHL's Eastern Conference and a franchise-record 15-consecutive wins on home ice.

Prior to joining the Gamblers, Carle served four seasons as a student assistant coach with the Pioneers after being diagnosed with hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, the primary disease of the myocardium muscle of the heart, and being forced to retire from his playing career. Carle graduated from the University of Denver in 2012 with a business administration degree in finance.

As a player, Carle was a defenseman at Shattuck-St. Mary's prep school in Minnesota where he helped the Sabres capture back-to-back national titles in 2007 and 2008 and was recruited to play at Denver. A 2008 NHL Draft-eligible prospect, Carle was drafted that year by the Tampa Bay Lightning (seventh round, 203rd overall) despite his diagnoses.

He resides in Denver with his wife, Mellissa, and infant son, William.

ASSISTANT COACHES



ASSISTANT COACH | TAVIS MACMILLAN

Tavis MacMillan is in his eighth season with the Pioneers after being named an assistant coach on May 27, 2015.

During his tenure at Denver, MacMillan has helped the Pioneers to the 2017 and 2022 NCAA National Championships, four Frozen Four appearances, five NCAA Tournament berths, an NCHC Frozen Faceoff championship and two NCHC regular-season titles. Among his coaching duties on David Carle's staff include working with the forwards and penalty kill.

Prior to joining DU, MacMillan served eight seasons as a scout for the NHL's Winnipeg Jets and 10 seasons as a coach for his alma mater, University of Alaska Fairbanks. MacMillan spent seven seasons as an assistant coach (1996-2003) and three seasons as the head coach of UAF from 2004-2006 (46-54-15 record as head coach).

As a player, the Milk River, Alberta, native played four seasons with Alaska Fairbanks (1990-1994), recording 192 points (56g/136a) in 135 NCAA games. Professionally, MacMillan played with the Greensboro Monarchs of the ECHL in 1994-95 and the Alaska Gold Kings of the West Coast Hockey League (WCHL) in 1995-96, serving as a player/marketing director for the team.

MacMillan's uncle, John, is a Denver alum and won two national titles with the Pioneers (1958, 1960) before embarking on a decade-long pro career. John MacMillan played in the NHL for both the Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs and became the first DU player to win the Stanley Cup by raising the trophy with the Leafs in both 1962 and 1963.

MacMillan resides with his wife, Deon, and has three daughters, Taryn, Camryn and Lauryn, and grandson, Decker. An athletic family, Camryn is a graduate student and captain on the Denver women's soccer team, while Lauryn also attends DU and used to play hockey as a goaltender. Taryn also played NCAA soccer at North Dakota and Concordia University St. Paul.



ASSISTANT COACH | DALLAS FERGUSON

Dallas Ferguson is in his fifth season as an assistant coach with the Pioneers and helped the program capture its record-tying ninth national championship in 2021-22. Hired on July 3, 2018, Ferguson has helped Denver reach the Frozen Four in each of the last two full regular seasons (2018-19, 2021-22).

The Wainwright, Alberta, native's primary responsibilities on David Carle's staff include working with the defensemen and power play.

Prior to coming to DU, Ferguson served as the head coach of the Calgary Hitmen of the Western Hockey League for the 2017-18 campaign after spending the previous nine seasons as the head coach of the University of Alaska Fairbanks. He led the Nanooks from 2008-2017 and guided the team to an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2010, the first in the program's D-I history.

Ferguson began his coaching career as an assistant coach with the Fairbanks Ice Dogs junior team (2002-2004) before returning to his alma mater to serve as an assistant at UAF from 2004-2008, working under current DU assistant and then-Alaska head coach Tavis MacMillan from 2004-2007.

Ferguson played four seasons with Alaska Fairbanks from 1992-1996, serving as a captain of the squad during his senior campaign. He finished his college career with 104 points (17g/87a) and 64 penalty minutes in 138 games and graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

The defenseman went on to play four seasons of professional hockey with the Richmond Renegades of the ECHL as well as with the Alaska Gold Kings and Anchorage Aces of the West Coast Hockey League. He recorded 69 points (6g/63a) points in 159 career WCHL games.

Ferguson resides with his family in Highlands Ranch, Colorado.



DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS | TRAVIS CULHANE

Travis Culhane is in his second season at the University of Denver as the Director of Hockey Operations after helping the Pioneers capture their record-tying ninth national championship in his first year with the program in 2021-22. Culhane, 27, was hired to the position on July 12, 2021 after spending the previous two seasons with Colorado College in the same capacity. The 2022-23 campaign marks his fifth in the National Collegiate Hockey Conference.

A 2017 graduate of Western Michigan University with a degree in human resource management, Culhane was the Director of Hockey Operations for the Broncos in 2018-19. He also worked in WMU hockey operations as a student assistant beginning in 2015. Culhane and his wife, Michelle, reside in Denver.



SR. ASSOCIATE AD OF SPORTS PERFORMANCE | MATT SHAW

In his 11th year at the University of Denver, Matt Shaw was promoted to Senior Associate Athletic Director of Sports Performance in 2021 and serves as the strength and conditioning coach of the men's hockey and men's soccer programs. During his tenure, Shaw has helped Denver hockey win the 2017 and 2022 National Championships, four Frozen Four appearances, eight NCAA Tournament appearances, two NCHC Frozen Faceoff titles and two NCHC regular-season title.

Prior to coming to Denver, Shaw was an assistant strength coach at Boston University and completed internships at the University of South Carolina, Harvard University and BU. The St. Louis, Missouri, native earned his bachelor's degree in health sciences from Boston University in 2010, received his master's degree in physical education from BU in 2011 and holds certifications through the NSCA (CSCS, RSCC), CSCCa (RSCC) and 3DMAPS. In 2016, he was named the NSCA Assistant Coach of the Year. He resides in Highlands Ranch with his wife Katie, daughter Charlie, and son Lennox.



VOLUNTEER ASSISTANT COACH | RYAN MASSA

Ryan Massa joined the Pioneers staff on Aug. 1, 2021 as a Volunteer Assistant Coach after spending the previous four years training goaltenders at various levels in Colorado.

Coaching the DU goaltenders during the 2021-22 campaign, Massa guided Magnus Chrona into posting six shutouts and 27 wins--tied for the fourth-most in a campaign in school history--and helped the Pioneers capture their record-tying ninth national championship.

A graduate of the University of Nebraska Omaha with a degree in finance and investment banking, Massa was a goaltender on the Mavericks men's hockey team all four years and helped UNO reach the program's first NCAA Frozen Four in 2015. He played two seasons professionally with the Orlando Solar Bears of the ECHL from 2015-2017 before co-founding Elite Edge Athlete in the Denver area in 2018. The Littleton, Colorado, native is also the director of goaltending for Total Package Hockey and Colorado Rampage AAA.

EQUIPMENT MANAGER | NICK MELDRUM

In his 14th year at DU, Nick Meldrum is responsible for the purchase, distribution, maintenance and repair of equipment for Pioneers players and staff, as well as equipment room operations for the entire athletic department. He won national championships with the Pioneers in both 2017 and 2022. Meldrum served two seasons as the equipment manager for the United States National Team Development Program (U.S. NTDP) prior to joining the Pioneers. During his tenure with the NTDP, he worked with the under-17 and under-18 squads, winning a gold medal with the Americans at the 2009 IIHF U18 World Championship and a silver medal at the 2007 World Under-17 Hockey Challenge. In 2019, Meldrum served as a U.S. equipment manager at the IIHF World Junior Championship in Vancouver and Victoria, British Columbia, assisting the Americans in their a silver-medal win. He graduated from Lake Superior State in 2007 and resides with his wife, Debra, and daughters, Olivia and Sadie.



ATHLETIC TRAINER | AARON LEU

Aaron Leu is in his 19th year in the Pioneers' Sports Medicine Department, 18th year with the men's hockey program and 13th year as the Associate Director of Sports Medicine for the athletic department. In addition to working with the men's hockey program, Leu is the primary trainer for the men's and women's golf programs. He won hockey national championships with DU in 2005, 2017 and 2022. Prior to coming to Denver, Leu served as an assistant athletic trainer at the University of Nebraska at Kearney from 1999-04 and worked at the Sports Medicine Institute Physical Therapy Clinic and Arizona Boys Ranch in Phoenix, Arizona, from 1996-99. Leu earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Creighton University in 1994 and his master's degree in exercise science from the University of Nebraska at Kearney in 1996. He is an active member of the National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA), the Rocky Mountain Athletic Trainers Association (RMATA) and the Colorado Athletic Trainers Association (CATA).



COMMUNICATIONS DIRECTOR | RON KNABENBAUER

Ron Knabenbauer is in second first season as the Assistant Director of Athletic Communications at the University of Denver, assisting the hockey program in their national championship victory in 2022. The Evergreen, Colorado, native joined the DU staff in August 2021 after spending the previous nine seasons full-time in the NHL with the Colorado Avalanche's communications and digital media departments. In his current role, he leads the day-to-day media relations, social media and digital efforts of the Denver hockey team, as well as women's lacrosse, skiing and triathlon and assists in other athletic department initiatives. Knabenbauer graduated from the University of Colorado in 2011 with bachelor degrees in broadcast journalism and political science. During his time at CU Boulder, Knabenbauer worked in the school's Sports Information Department as a student and graduate assistant and served as a secondary media contact for the football team during the 2012 Pac-12 season.

FORMER COACHES



VERN TURNER ('49-'51)

15-24-1 (.388)

Vern Turner guided the Pioneers through their first two years of existence with a combined 15-24-1 record and 11-11-1 mark in the second season. Prior to taking the job with the Pioneers, the Stayner, Ontario native had worked as an advisory coach and manager of the Broadmoor Ice Palace in Colorado Springs, Colo. for seven years. Turner was a minor league goaltender through three iterations of the American Hockey Association from 1924-34, playing seven seasons for the Duluth Hornets.



NEIL CELLEY ('51-'56)

81-43-6 (.646)

Hired at 24 years old, Neil Celley made a quick transition from playing to coaching as the 1948 U.S. Olympian and University of Michigan standout led DU to five straight winning seasons, recording back-to-back winning percentages above .700 in his first two years behind the bench. The Eveleth, Minn. native took over for Vern Turner only one season after finishing his four-year career at Michigan where he won an NCAA title in 1951, led the Wolverines in scoring and received All-American, MVP and All-Tournament honors. Celley played against the Pioneers in 1951, posting a hat trick against DU before leading the Crimson & Gold to revenge against his alma mater the following season. He coached the program's first All-American in 1952, Eddie Miller.



MURRAY ARMSTRONG ('56-'77)

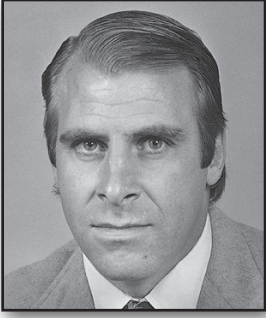

Considered by many to be of the greatest coaches to teach the college game, Murray "The Chief" Armstrong led the Pioneers to five National Championships, seven WCHA regular-season titles, 10 WCHA tournament titles and 11 NCAA tournament appearances in 21 seasons. He coached 23 All-Americans including Pioneer greats George Konik, Bill Masterton, Keith Magnuson, Jim Wiste, George Morrison and Ron Grahame and earned national recognition of his own as a two-time WCHA Coach of the Year and 1961 recipient of the Spencer Penrose Award as National Coach of the Year.

Armstrong won DU its first title in only his second year behind the bench with a win against North Dakota in the 1958 National Championship game. After a one-year hiatus, he returned the Pioneers to the national stage with back-to-back titles in 1960 & 1961, defeating Michigan Tech and St. Lawrence to cap 27-4-3-4-1 and 30-1-1 seasons. Armstrong also exposed the Pioneers to international competition during their early rise, earning a 4-4 tie with the Soviet National Team in January 1959 and tying the eventual gold-medal winning U.S. Olympic Team in February 1960.

Back-to-back National Championships became a feather in Armstrong's famous cap toward the end of the decade as he took the Pioneers to their fourth and fifth titles in 1968 & 1969. The 18-5-1 season in 1967-68 culminated with another title win against North Dakota and the 26-6-0 season in 1968-69 was capped with an upset 4-3 win against Cornell.

Armstrong, a Regina, Saskatchewan native, came to DU after five years coaching his hometown the Regina Pats. He recruited heavily in Canada, often bringing ex-major junior players to the NCAA before the NCAA abolished the practice in 1974. The NHL recognized Armstrong's contributions to the game in 1977 when the league awarded him the Lester Patrick Trophy for "outstanding service to hockey in the United States." As a player, Armstrong played for the Pats before embarking on a 10-year professional career that included 270 NHL games for the Toronto Maple Leafs, New York Americans and Detroit Red Wings.



MARSHALL JOHNSTON ('77-'81)

89-63-7 (.582)

Johnston assumed the responsibilities of his former coach, mentor and peer when he was promoted to head coach upon Murray Armstrong's retirement in 1977. The former Pioneer captain played under Armstrong from 1959-63, capturing two National Championships and three WCHA titles. Upon graduation, Johnston played 251 NHL games for the Minnesota North Stars and California Golden Seals from 1968-1974 while also representing Canada at the 1964 & 1968 Olympic Games, captaining the latter team to a bronze medal. He began his coaching career with two years at the helm of the Golden Seals from 1973-75 before returning to his alma mater as an assistant coach. Johnston earned WCHA Coach of the Year honors in his first season as head coach of the Pioneers. His 33-6-1 record in 1977-78 marked the second-most wins and second-highest single season winning percentage in program history. In 1981, he returned to the NHL with the Colorado Rockies where he served as assistant coach, assistant general manager and eventually head coach. He joined the Ottawa Senators in 1996 and spent three seasons as general manager before retiring. He was inducted into the IIHF Hall of Fame in 1998.



RALPH BACKSTROM ('81-'90)

182-174-14 (.511)

Ralph Backstrom coached the Pioneers to six winning seasons during his nine-year tenure. The Kirkland Lake, Ontario native reached the high point of his Denver career in 1985-86 when he took DU to a 34-13-1 season, won the WCHA regular season and playoff title and earned a trip to the Frozen Four. Backstrom's 34 wins set the mark for Pioneer teams and earned him accolades as the WCHA Coach of the Year and Spencer Penrose Award winner as National Coach of the Year. As a player, Backstrom was a six-time Stanley Cup Champion, six-time NHL All-Star and recipient of the Calder Memorial Trophy. His 20-year career included more than 1,000 NHL games, played primarily with the Montreal Canadiens and Los Angeles Kings, and 234 WHA games. Immediately after retirement, Backstrom entered coaching as an assistant under Marshall Johnson for three years, then spent a season in the same role with the Kings before returning to DU. Backstrom eventually left Denver to serve as the head coach of the IHL's Phoenix Road Runners. He later became the founder and president of Roller Hockey International and founder, general manager and president of the Colorado Eagles.



FRANK SERRATORE ('90-'94)

49-92-9 (.357)

Frank Serratore brought eight years of coaching experience to the Pioneers when he was named the sixth head coach in program history. Between playing college hockey at Western Michigan and coming to Denver, the Coleraine, Minn. native was the head coach of the Austin Mavericks and Omaha Lancers of the USHL, as well as assistant coach of the North Dakota Fighting Hawks. Hired in 1990, Serratore made immediate strides to improve the appearance of the DU Arena, locker room, weight room and players lounge. Additionally, Serratore worked to preserve the program's history by strengthening the alumni network, erecting a statue of Murray Armstrong statue on the concourse of Magness Arena and installing plaques to recognize All-Americans, Olympians and professional alumni. Serratore successfully elevated the attendance from sub-70-percent capacity to above 93-percent capacity during his tenure despite only one winning season. Upon leaving DU, Serratore was head coach for the IHL's Manitoba Moose from 1994-96 before accepting the same job with Air Force.

FORMER COACHES



GEORGE GWOZDECKY ('94-'13)

443-267-64 (.614)

In 19 years at the helm, George Gwozdecky helped turn DU into a program of national prominence. The Pioneers had posted losing records in four of their last five seasons before Gwozdecky's arrival brought a stretch of 17 winning seasons, six straight NCAA tournament appearances, three WCHA regular season titles, four WCHA playoff titles and two National Championships. The turnaround made the Thunder Bay, Ontario native one of the most decorated coaches in school history as well as the first to coach in NCAA history to win a national title as a player, assistant coach and head coach, having won as a player at Wisconsin in 1997 and assistant coach Michigan State in 1986.

Gwozdecky's path to DU included three years as head coach at Wisconsin River-Falls (NAIA) from 1981-1984, five years as an assistant coach at Michigan State from 1984-1989 and five years as head coach at Miami from 1989-1994 where he was the recipient of the Spencer Penrose Award as National Coach of the Year in 1993. He took the Pioneers to the NCAA tournament quarterfinal in his first season 1994-95, earning WCHA Coach of the Year honors and posting the program's highest winning percentage (.619) since 1985-86 with a 25-15-2 record. He took the Pioneers to the NCAA tournament again in 1997, then in 1999 he helped Denver rebound from a 11-25-2 campaign the previous season to go 26-13-2, marking the first time in WCHA history a team had won more than 25 games after losing 25 the year before.

Decades after winning their last National Championship, the Pioneers returned to first in the national polls during the 2001-02 season. Gwozdecky led the team to a 32-8-1 record, a WCHA regular season title and a WCHA tournament title en route to his second WCHA Coach of the Year honor. The momentum carried into the following years as Gwozdecky brought back-to-back National Championships to Denver in 2004 & 2005. Entering the 2004 Frozen Four as underdogs with a 23-12-5 record, the Pioneers captured a come-from-behind win over Minnesota Duluth in the national semifinal and held off a 6-on-3 advantage against Maine in the national title game. The following year the Pioneers became the first WCHA team since 1997 to capture the McNaughton Cup, the Broadmoor Trophy and the National Championship in one season. Gwozdecky led the team to a 32-9-2 record and victory against North Dakota in the title game to earn his third WCHA Coach of the Year honor.

Denver's bid for a third straight National Championship was thwarted in 2005-06, though it remained a milestone year for the program as defenseman Matt Carle became the first Pioneer to win the Hobey Baker Trophy. Gwozdecky took the Crimson & Gold back to the NCAA tournament in 2008, capturing the league-leading 15th WCHA tournament title. He helped Denver to a 27-10-4 record two years later, securing another WCHA regular-season title and WCHA Coach of the Year award, his fourth. The Pioneers did not miss the NCAA tournament for the remainder of his tenure. He joined the Tampa Bay Lightning as an assistant coach from 2013-15 before returning to Colorado to coach Valor Christian High School.

Gwozdecky coached 14 All-Americans and one Hobey Baker winner with the Pioneers. Off the ice, he managed DU's transition from the DU Arena to Magness Arena, constructed from 1997-99 over the course of two seasons.



JIM MONTGOMERY ('13-'18)

125-57-26 (.663)

Jim Montgomery brought Denver into a new era as the first coach for the Pioneers as members of the NCHC. During his five-year tenure, he led the third-most winningest program in college hockey while boasting back-to-back appearances in the Frozen Four, an NCHC regular-season title, two Frozen Faceoff victories, five NCAA tournament appearances and the 2017 National Championship. He coached 11 All-Americans and one Hobey Baker winner, Will Butcher in 2017.

In his first season, Montgomery took a 20-16-6 team to the NCAA tournament after winning the inaugural NCHC Frozen Faceoff. Montgomery guided the Pioneers back to the NCAA tournament with a 24-14-2 mark in his second season before elevating the program in his third and fourth years. Denver carried a 25-9-6 record to the 2016 Frozen Four, falling to North Dakota, and a 31-7-4 record to the 2017 Frozen Four, defeating Minnesota Duluth for the program's eighth national title. Denver also clinched its first Penrose Cup in 2017 as the NCHC regular-season champion with a 18-3-3 conference mark. The National Championship, Penrose Cup and second straight appearance in the Frozen Four earned Montgomery the Spencer Penrose Award as National Coach of the Year. In 2018, he led the Pioneers to a 23-10-8 record before making them the first two-time Frozen Faceoff champions in the conference tournament.

Prior to his arrival in Denver, Montgomery spent three seasons as head coach and general manager of the Dubuque Fighting Saints in the USHL from 2010-13, winning a pair of Clark Cup championships, a regular-season title and GM of the Year honors. The Montreal, Quebec native was an assistant coach at RPI from 2006-10 and began his coaching career at Notre Dame in 2005-06, serving as a volunteer coach with the Fighting Irish. As a player, Montgomery racked up 103 goals and 198 assists from 1989-93 at Maine, winning a National Championships in his senior season. He went on to play professionally for 12 years, playing 122 NHL games.

Montgomery became the fifth NHL coach hired directly from the NCAA after joining the Dallas Stars in 2018. He currently serves as an assistant coach of the St. Louis Blues.

DU Whips Nodaks 6-2, Wins Ice Crown

MINNEAPOLIS - A super-charged University of Denver team routed North Dakota 6-2 Saturday night to win the national championship of collegiate hockey.

The Pioneers, who shook off a 1-0 first period deficit, put out enough human effort to win two ordinary games as they came pounding back with three quick goals in the second period and three more in the third.

Coach Murray Armstrong's crew saved its best all-around performance of the season for its most important game.

Although beaten three times in four Western Intercollegiate Hockey League games by the Nodaks earlier in the season, the razor-sharp Pioneers skated like demons and passed with precision to defeat their old nemesis.

The pressure of a championship game had little effect on the Redshirts. All six DU goals were scored by different players, but if individuals had to be singled out, they would have to be Jim Brown and Murray Massier, the tournament's most valuable player.

A crowd of 7,878 watched the Pioneers win their first NCAA title as they played in their first tournament in the 11-year history of the event.

Denver had trouble getting started in the first period and trailed 1-0. But the Pioneers loosened up the rugged Sioux defenses with some crisp, long passes and scored three goals in 3:40 midway in the second period.

While 3,000 North Dakota fans sat in silent disbelief, Denver pounded in two consolation goals to make it "no contest."

North Dakota's first period goal came on a 40-foot shot by Ed Thomlinson, which deflected off the skate of a Pioneer defender and slid into the net.

Brown opened Denver's middle period by picking up a loose puck in front of the Sioux cage and drilling a 20-footer into the corner of the net with 7:18 gone.

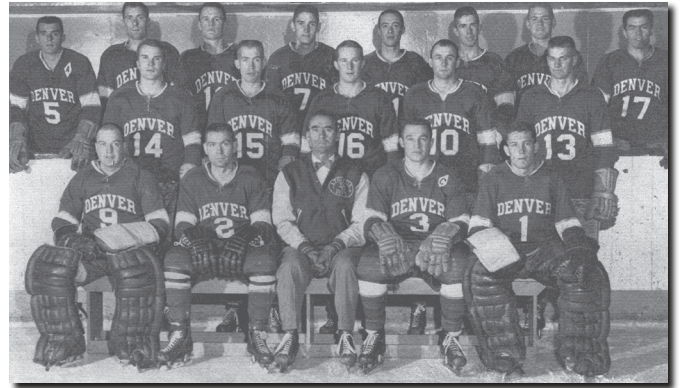
The Murray Massier-Bruce Walker-Walt Dingwell line, which had scored only three goals in Denver's last five games, scored two goals 19 seconds apart to send the Pioneers into a 3-1 lead.

Walker hit the first one as he swept in on North Dakota goalie Bob Peabody and caged a backhander from close range after a double assist from Dingwell and Massier.

Massier's nifty pass found Dingwell in front of the cage; he hit the net on a picture book play. Ed Zemrau also assisted.

Walker's goal gave DU a 2-1 lead at 10:39, then Dingwell hiked the count with his marker at 10:58.

Ron King of North Dakota got open in front of the DU cage to make it 3-2 with 5:21 gone in the last period.

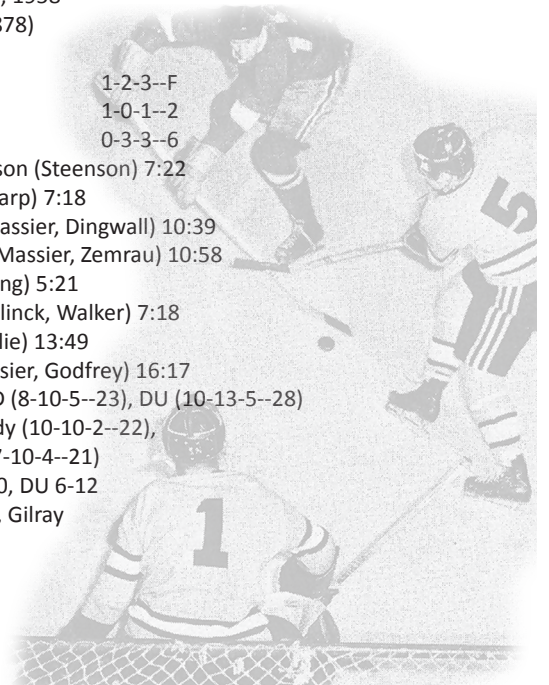
But Massier, a pressure proof 150-pound sophomore, tapped in the killing goal at 7:18 as he poked the bouncing puck past Peabody.

Barry Sharp, one of only three seniors on the Denver team, and Denny Slinn, tacked on the icing to pad out the score.

Schneck, who made 19 saves in the first two periods, was credited with only two in the final round as Denver dominated offensive play.

DU Atop Pinnacle of College Icers

BOSTON - University of Denver now stands unmatched as THE hockey power of American colleges.

The Pioneers wound up their third consecutive highly-successful season Saturday night, winning the NCAA Championship with a 5-3 victory over Michigan Tech.

Five years ago, DU's hockey program tottered precariously following years of frustration.

But then came Coach Murray Armstrong, and after one building season, one of the most impressive records in collegiate annuals.

The accomplishments in the last three seasons:

Two national championships, 74 wins against only 19 losses and six ties and 270,000 paid admissions at DU Arena.

The reasons: Good talent, good coaching, good promotion.

"In the overall picture, I had a lot of good material," Armstrong said in summing up the season. "And I think all of the boys played up to their capability."

"There may never be another college team assembled with as much ability and color as this one."

All but six players on this year's squad return next fall including three Western Collegiate Hockey Association All-stars George Kirkwood, Marty Howe and Bill Masterton, one second-team pick, George Konik, and the club's top goal scorer, Jerry Walker.

Seniors John MacMillan, Bruce Walker, Con Collie, Murray MacDonald, Ray Hamlin and Al Barnhill will be hard to replace, but up from the freshman ranks are a half-dozen topnotch prospects.

Chances of the 1960-61 team matching this season's record are slim, however. The Pioneers won the WCHA title by two full games with a 17-4-1 record, had a 3-0-2 mark against Olympic teams and were 27-4-3 for the entire season.

"We really started to play well against the Olympic teams," Armstrong said. "We got our defense working right and our record against those clubs gave us a big lift. From then on we played good hockey."

The redshirts were not at their superb best in Saturday night's championship game; yet they were the better team in the tension-filled third period.

"I don't think we made a mistake in the last period," Armstrong said, "the boys really skated hard."

Denver trailed 3-2 after two stanzas but tied it up quickly on a sizzling shot by Konik and took the lead with only 1:03 to play on a rebound goal by MacMillan. MacMillan added another tally in the final seconds after the Tech goalie had been removed.

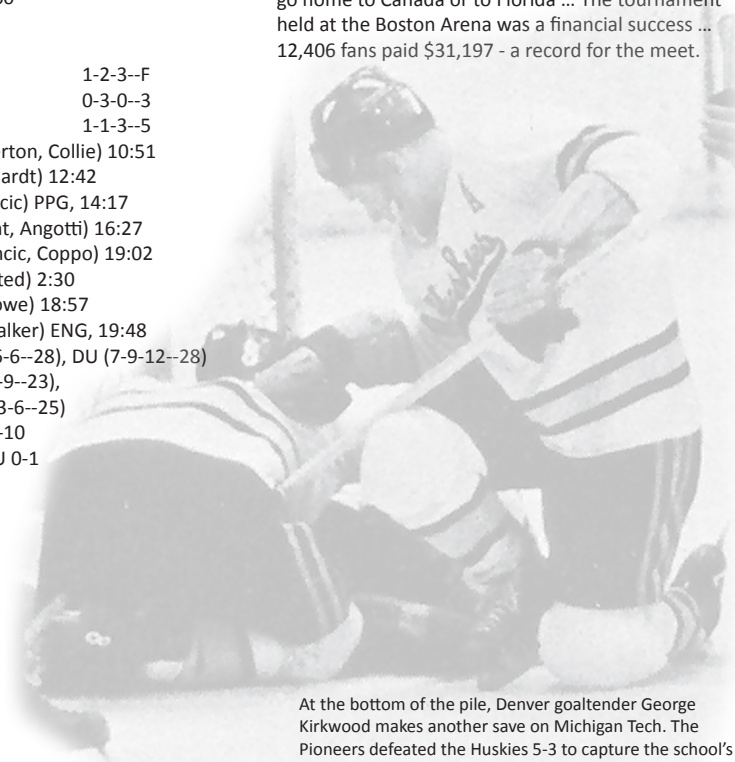

DU Breezes to Hockey Title

DENVER - Denver's "dream team" turned the 14th NCAA hockey championship finale into a nightmare for St. Lawrence Saturday night by lambasting the Larries 12-2 at DU Arena.

A deliriously happy crowd of 5,363 watched the Pioneers capture their second straight national title with their finest game of the season.

The triumph marked the Pioneers 30th win in 32 starts overall, and their 25th in a row without a defeat.

They have lost only one game over their last 52 starts over a two-season span.

Heading a host of Pioneer heroes was their all-America center and the tournament's most valuable player, captain Bill Masterton, who scored three goals and two assists.

Defenseman Grant Munro and wing Trent Beatty, both all-tournament choices, tallied two goals and two assists apiece.

Other Pioneers scoring goals in the Denver fusillade were Jerry Walker, all-tournament selection, Jerry Duffus, George Konik, Ken Williamson and Terry Lomnes.

The victory marked the third national championship in four years for Coach Murray Armstrong who has dubbed this "the finest college hockey team I have ever seen."

The Pioneers won their previous titles in 1958 in Minneapolis, and last year in Boston.

A total of 19,826 fans watched the four games in the three-day tournament, a mark surpassed only by the 22,950 who saw the 1958 tourney in Minneapolis.

Walker's goal and three assists firmly established him as the top western college scorer of all time with 85 points. Masterton equaled the former mark of 80 held jointly by Minnesota's John Mayasich and Colorado College's Bill (Red) Hay, now a Chicago Black Hawk star.

Rounding out their Denver careers was the fabulous "Senior Six," composed of Masterton, Konik, Munro, Marty Howe and Paul Josephson.

The Pioneers had 18 assists for a total of 30 points in the contest. The elated Armstrong, surrounded by well wishers in the dressing room, said "with a bunch of boys like this, you can't miss."

He said he rated the triumph on a par with the thrill he received in tying the Russians 4-4 in Colorado Springs in 1959.

Herb Gallagher, Northeastern University coach and

head of the NCAA Hockey Rules Committee said "I've seen a lot of college and amateur teams in my time, but never one that could match this Denver outfit."

The game opened at a furious tempo with seven goals scored in the opening stanza and the crowd roared its approval at the swiftness of action.

St. Lawrence startled DU supporters by taking a 1-0 lead at 1:29 when John Mason's shot from eight feet out caught the left corner of the net.

Masterton hit the right hand corner of the Larries' cage on a six-footer to equalize for Denver at the 3:19 mark.

Beatty sent Denver into the lead at 7:21 when he rebounded Masterton's shot after a similar long shot by Munro.

Walker notched his 56th goal of the season at 12:09 on a pass from Beatty for the third Denver goal of the stanza. But the Larries came right back to narrow the margin to 3-2 when Buster Dower converted all-America Terry Slater's pass on a two-on-one situation at 13:14.

Jerry Duffus blasted home a 50-footer at the 14:51 mark and Masterton grabbed hold of a Munro shot sliding past the St. Lawrence net, whirled and fired the puck past the Larries' goalie for the fifth score at 15:49.

The Pioneers exploded for four more goals in the second period with a quarter of the DU icers breaking into the scoring.

Beatty tallied his second goal of the evening at 5:33 and moments later Munro made it 7-2 when he added another marker at 6:57.

Two penalties to the Larries star defenseman Arlin Parker cost the Saints a pair of goals when Konik scored at 11:36 and Williamson ripped home another marker at 17:47.

The Pioneers added three more goals in the final stanza to complete the rout with Masterton scoring at 10:46, Munro at 12:15, and Lomnes adding the final goal at 16:57.

The period had an added fillip for the fans in the awarding of the second penalty shot in as many weeks to a visiting team.

Konik tripped the Saints' Rollie Anderson at the 5:13 mark. Anderson roared in on Kirkwood on the

DU Sextet Wins NCAA Title

DULUTH, Minn. - The University of Denver hockey team survived one of its bitterest battles to capture one of its finest honors here Saturday night, smashing four goals in the final period to beat North Dakota 4-0 and win the fourth NCAA national championship in DU history.

DU's other titles, all under Coach Murray Armstrong, were in 1958, 1960 and 1961, while finishing second twice and third once in seven appearances.

But the victory, Denver's 22nd straight to complete a 28-5-1 season, came like extracting ore from a stubborn vein.

While a crowd of 5,453 sent sound waves rolling through Duluth Arena, the two Western Collegiate Hockey Association teams slammed at each other in one of the season's most bristling defensive duels.

Then just when it appeared things were headed for a possible sudden-death showdown, Denver's Bob Trembecky crashed the Sioux defense for two goals in the third period. It was like removing the key log in a big river jam as the Pioneers, a bit shaky early, took on a vicious smoothness that left no doubts they were now back in the throne room after a seven-year absence.

Goalie Gerry Powers was brilliant in recording the first shutout in NCAA tournament history and earning the meet's most valuable player honors. He vacuumed up everything the Sioux could hurl at him and he and Mike Curran, his North Dakota counterpart, rewarded the near sellout with a tremendous show as each made one fantastic save after another.

The goalies and both defenses packed a season's worth of thrills into the fast but scoreless first two periods.

Denver opened on much the same uncertain and off-key note that featured Pioneer play against Boston College in Thursday's 4-1 semifinal win. Passing was off, DU overskated the puck, and was caught offside to break up timing. But as the game wore on the Pioneers smoothed things out and by the end of the second period, while the Sioux rosters were pleading just above him, Curran was under tremendous pressure.

Terry Abram, John Marks, Terry Ogden and the rest of the Sioux defense hurled back DU sorties at one end of the ice while Dale Zeman, Keith Magnuson, Rich Blanche, Randy Ward, Tim Gould and Ed Hamilton were battering Sioux attackers at the other.

There were frequent spots where two and three hockey sticks just slithered across the ice - with their owners prone following a vicious check. It was no place for the faint-hearted.

Curran and Powers, meanwhile, treated the

tournament's first good crowd to superb work in the nets, each meeting and mastering breakaways as well as halting the rapid-fire rebound attempts the Sioux and Pioneers got off on the rare times they could muscle through the other's defense.

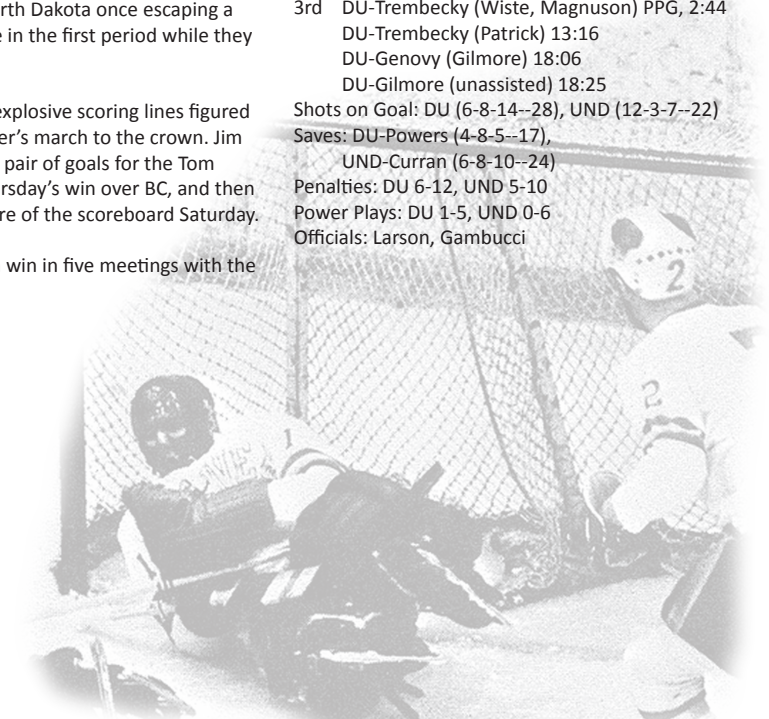
DU was outshot and outskated for one of the few times this season in the first 20 minutes when the Sioux bombed Powers for 12 shots on goal while Curran saved six. Both clubs survived penalties in both periods, with North Dakota once escaping a 25-second stretch late in the first period while they were two men down.

All three of Denver's explosive scoring lines figured in the scoring in Denver's march to the crown. Jim Shires rapped home a pair of goals for the Tom Miller line to lead Thursday's win over BC, and then the other two took care of the scoreboard Saturday.

It was Denver's fourth win in five meetings with the Sioux this year.

DU Captures NCAA Ice Crown

COLORADO SPRINGS - The University of Denver's irresistible force cracked the immovable object, and the Pioneers captured their fifth NCAA hockey championship with a pressurized 4-3 victory over Cornell here Saturday night.

Third period goals by Bob Trembecky and Tom Miller shattered a tense bitter duel in which Cornell goalie Ken Dryden and Denver's Gerry Powers frustrated the shooters.

Cornell, however, showed they can skate with anyone, as the Big Red turned this 22nd national championship into one of the tightest duels in NCAA hockey history. Cornell twice overcame one-goal leads to tie DU at 1-1 and 2-2.

They struck back late in the third period on a goal by Gordon Lowe, the hero of Friday's win over Michigan Tech. It came with 1:20 left in the game and created a finish that had a record throng of 4,625 on its feet and roaring the entire last 80 seconds.

With DU ahead 4-2 and just nursing the margin with a magnificent defense, a double penalty created an opening. It sent off both Denver's Dale Zeman and Cornell's Daniel Lodboa for roughing, leaving both teams with four men and a goalie on the ice.

Lowe's long slapshot from the left point sailed past Powers 57 seconds later to make it 4-3. Then with 32 seconds left and Denver having to contend with a faceoff to the right of its own net, Cornell's Coach Ned Harkness pulled Dryden and sent in an extra attacker.

This had the effect of leaving Denver a man short for that hectic closing minute. But the Pioneers successfully defended their title and a long clearing pass almost found the open Cornell net 10 seconds from the close.

Powers was mobbed as his happy teammates started to celebrate the Pioneers' fifth title in Coach Murray Armstrong's 13 years on the Hilltop. DU beat North Dakota 4-0 a year ago and also won in 1958, 1960 and 1961.

Cornell, in the tournament for the third straight year, took the 1967 title.

All-American Keith Magnuson and George Morrison touched off another wild roar from the fans when they treated Armstrong to a ride around the rink to a rolling wave of applause.

It was a sparkling team effort on both sides with Denver featuring many of the same architects of its 1968 win. Powers, voted to the all-tournament first team for the second straight year, refused to yield to Cornell's desperate comeback efforts.

Magnuson wrapped up a brilliant college career by leading Denver defense that smothered many

Cornell sorties, and Trembecky, who scored the first two goals in the 1968 championship game, delivered the tie-breaker to put DU ahead 3-2 Saturday after scoring twice in Thursday's 9-2 conquest of Harvard.

The clubs finished a swift first period deadlocked at 1-1 after DU seized an early lead on a goal by Tom Gilmore with just 2:41 played and Cornell struck back with a power play score by Lodboa at the midway point.

The Pioneers came out storming and slashed into Cornell to dominate the opening 10 minutes and force Dryden into a half dozen pressure stops from close range.

DU did a good job of forechecking the Cornell wide men to force defensemen to bring the puck up the middle and squeeze them there. It took away the wings the Big Red had used to advantage in Friday's 4-3 overtime conquest of Michigan Tech.

Gilmore scored when he deflected a long shot by Lynn Powis. It first caromed off a Cornell defenseman and then into the nets on the ice off Dryden's glove to touch off the crowd.

But DU's continuing control ended on a call by Referee Andy Gambucci, who whistled Gilmore for tripping behind his own net.

Where DU had failed to capitalize on an early Cornell penalty, the Big Red wasn't about to let the chance slip away. Lodboa tied things when he ricocheted a shot in off the right pipe with 13.9 played.

Cornell again used a defensive lapse by Denver to battle back into a 2-2 tie in a second period that, if anything, was even faster than the first.

Powers and Dryden both met sustained pressure. The Cornell goalkeeper finally succumbed to an overwhelming barrage with DU on the power play midway in the period. Morrison on the left corner of the crease poked home a rebound - his 40th goal of the year - from Tom Miller's three-footer on the right.

Just moments earlier, first Bill Pettinger and then

George Morrison had poured shots in on the Big Red goalie from eyeball-to-eyeball range, and Keith Magnuson had forced him in to a kick save on a hard slap from the right point.

But the Big Red, which had dominated stretches of the period, particularly at the start, then caught DU defenseman Ed Hamilton sprawled at mid-ice and sent a two-on-one sweep in on Powers. Brian Cornell, leading scorer for the team all year, was just eight feet in front when he lashed a shot home off a fine feed by Peter Tufford. The goal came with 12:28 played.

Fantastic Finish

BOSTON - It's been 35 years and, for some, too long to remember since collegiate hockey in Denver felt so fine.

With a glorious, yet outdated history in a sport that recently has been dominated in Denver with a capital "A," the Pioneers, on Saturday night, beautifully connected the past to the present with a monumental update against top-ranked Maine in the NCAA championship game.

The Black Bears' 10-game winning streak is history, and DU traditionalist and current crop of young followers feel a Mile High.

"Wow," DU coach George Gwozdecky said. "It's a great story."

Before the largest hockey crowd in FleetCenter history (18,597), DU got a goal from sophomore Gabe Gauthier midway through the first period and sensational goaltending from Adam Berkhoel (24 saves) to topple Maine 1-0 in what might be its biggest victory ever.

The Pioneers (27-12-5) are national champions for the sixth time, but first since 1969.

"We're very proud," said Gwozdecky, whose team withstood a 6-on-3 disadvantage in the final minute to preserve its lead. "The way the game finished, I thought was pretty symbolic of the way our season has been. We haven't made it easy."

DU went 5-0 since being eliminated from the first round of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoffs. The Pioneers allowed just five goals during that span, which included upsets over WCHA champion North Dakota (1-0) and league runner-up Minnesota Duluth (5-3). The Pioneers, who stood seventh in the 10-team WCHA in January, went 13-2-2 in their final 17 games.

"Looking back when it was darkest for us back in January, this team was led by our captain, Ryan Caldwell," Gwozdecky said. "He showed great, great leadership, great character and we persevered and battled back in January and February, and again tonight in that last minute and a half."

Berkhoel, a senior, was named Most Outstanding Player of the tournament, and he was joined on the all-tournament team by Caldwell, a senior defenseman, and DU senior forward Connor James.

James, who returned to the lineup in Thursday's Frozen Four semifinal after missing nearly five weeks with a broken leg, assisted on Gauthier's team-leading 18th goal 12:26 into the first period.

After James outworked a defender to gain control of the puck in the corner, he found Gauthier at the top of the crease. Gauthier, who had no defender near him, found an opening through Jimmy Howard's legs and wristed the puck past the All-American goalie. Howard, the ringleader to the NCAA's top-rated defense, led the country in goals-against average (1.19) and saves percentage (.957) coming into the game.

"Words can't describe how I'm feeling," said James, who figured his collegiate career was over after fracturing his right fibula on March 5. "We have every piece of the puzzle, every type of player, and we are a close-knit team. I'm pretty pumped up right now. It's the most exciting thing to happen to me."

DU's tally came 7:21 following Maine's disallowed goal. The Black Bears, after seemingly capitalizing on the first penalty of the game, had what looked like an honest goal by Derek Damon waved off because another Maine player had a skate in the crease.

"Anytime something like that happens it usually shifts the momentum," Maine coach Tim Whitehead said. "I haven't seen the replay so I can't comment, but there are lots of swings in momentum in the game. Not too many when the score is 1-0."

The unforgiving rule was abandoned by the NHL a few years ago.

"That was the turning point of the game, and they deserved that goal," Berkhoel said. "I'm not saying I want to give them the championship . . . but I really feel that they weren't obstructing me and scored a legitimate goal that I didn't read very well."

The Pioneers, who were 20-3 when leading after two periods, made it interesting in the waning minutes. Junior defenseman Matt Laatsch and Gauthier took penalties with 2:09 left in the game and 35 seconds later to allow Maine to finish the period on a 5-on-3 power play. The Black Bears pulled Howard for a sixth attacker with 1:18 left, doubling their arsenal compared to DU.

"Your best penalty killer is your goalie, Caldwell said. "It was fun hanging on behind him and letting him go."

Some errant Bears' passes, terrific Berkhoel saves and a few gutsy blocked shots by DU forwards,

preserved the lead and led to a wild celebration, fitting for a team that wasn't expected to be here.

"To see a group of guys come so far over a long season is just amazing to me," Caldwell said.

Maine (33-8-3) also lost in the 2002 title game to Minnesota. "Obviously, it hurts a lot to have been here twice over the last three years and come up one goal short each time," Whitehead said. "But it was a tremendous win for Denver. They showed a lot of courage and a lot of heart to even get this far and to win it in a great game."

Prodigies on Ice Repeat DU's Feat

COLUMBUS, Ohio - Back-to-back, baby!

Freshmen goalie Peter Mannino and classmate Paul Stastny watched the University of Denver capture the 2004 NCAA hockey championship as wide-eyed signed recruits.

Saturday, the rookies signed, sealed and delivered the Pioneers to their second consecutive national title and seventh in program history by spearheading a 4-1 victory over North Dakota in the finale of the Frozen Four.

Mannino had a career-high 44 saves before a Value City Arena crowd of 17,155. And Stastny, a second-line center, had two goals and one assist.

The son of former NHL Hall of Famer Peter Stastny notched the game-winner midway through the second period and gave the Pioneers a two-goal cushion 8:19 into the third.

"Our freshmen stepped up tonight and just really played well," said DU senior wing Luke Fulghum of Colorado Springs. "This is such an unbelievable feeling. I cannot put into words how special this moment feels right now."

Mannino and Stastny made the all-Frozen Four team along with DU defensemen Brett Skinner and Matt Carle and center Gabe Gauthier, who added an empty-net goal to finish as the NCAA Tournament's leading scorer with five goals and 11 points in four games.

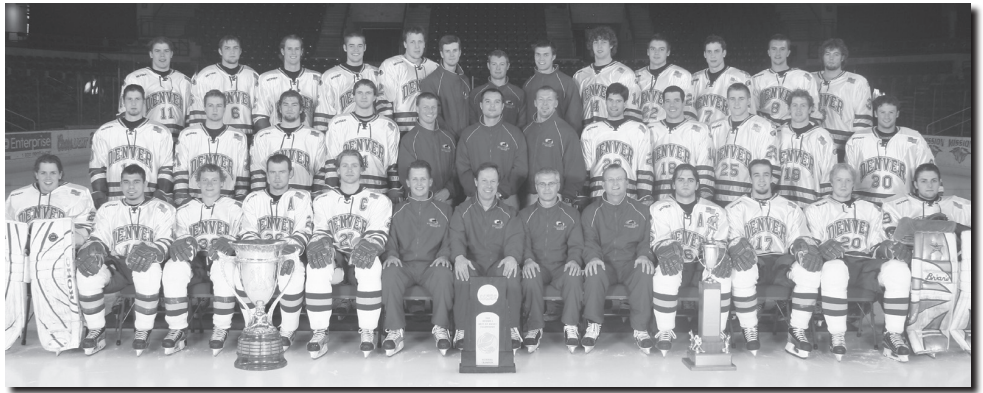
Mannino followed former DU goalie Adam Berkhoel as Most Outstanding Player.

"Seeing Berkhoel do this last year gave me a goal," said Mannino, who is 18-4-1 in his young career. "I dreamed about it. I set goals real high, especially after seeing how well our team was playing at midseason."

DU finished 32-9-2 and on a nine-game winning streak. The Pioneers, who began defense of their crown 5-5, have won eight consecutive NCAA Tournament games and are now tied with North Dakota (25-15-5) with the country's second most titles. Michigan leads with nine.

"We're kind of like Tiger Woods of golf right now," said Fulghum, who had two goals in Thursday's Frozen Four semifinal win over Colorado College. "We're really getting it done. They had a lot of doubts about us last year, and we snuck up on them. But this year, everyone wanted a shot at us and we still got it done."

DU coach George Gwozdecky started the game with Stastny's line, which includes freshman Ryan Dingle, and freshman Andrew Thomas at one blue-line position.

"Knowing the kind of player I was, I marvel at most players," Gwozdecky joked. "But kidding aside, this freshman class that Steve Miller and Seth Appert put together a few years ago in my mind is the best freshman class in our 11 years at Denver and perhaps the most effective freshmen class that I've ever had the opportunity to coach."

Denver led 1-0 early and 2-1 going into the second period. The seven-time NCAA champion finished the season 26-1-1 when scoring first and 30-0-1 when tied or leading after two periods.

Jeff Drummond also scored for DU. He followed a Kevin Ulanski shot from beside the net that caromed off Sioux defenseman Matt Smaby's skate and hammered the loose puck in to make it 1-0 6:15 into the game.

North Dakota tied it at 9:52 on the power play. Travis Zajac redirected a Nick Fuher shot through Mannino's legs. But at 10:08 of the second period, Stastny, skating between the circles on the power play, made it 2-1 with a roofed-redirect of Ulanski's slap shot from the point.

Stastny made it 3-1 with 11:41 to go in regulation with a one-timer from the right circle and Gauthier produced his team-leading 26th goal in the final minute.

Mannino made 23 saves in the third period.

"'Manno' looks older than me and he's so mature," said DU senior and captain Matt Laatsch. "He's our on-ice leader and he calms guys down and is an opposing force back there. Stastny, same type of deal. He plays like senior and he has a great touch for the puck and knack for the net. Both those guys are future NHLers."

DU improved to 7-2 in NCAA title games and 25-13 in all national tournament contests. The Pioneers are 4-1 against the Sioux on the national stage. The teams also played for the 1958, 1963 and 1968 NCAA championships.

DU has won every time but 1963.

Denver Pioneers Win Eighth NCAA Championship

CHICAGO — Jim Montgomery scored three consecutive third-period goals for a natural hat trick that lifted Maine to the 1993 national championship. The Black Bears' senior captain was named Frozen Four MVP.

Twenty-four years later, Montgomery pleasantly watched one of his pupils nearly match his extraordinary feat on college hockey's biggest stage. Behind the bench at the United Center, Coach Montgomery on Saturday witnessed sophomore wing Jarid Lukosevicius score three goals in the second period to lead the Denver Pioneers to their eighth national championship, and first since 2005.

In a No. 1 versus No. 2 national championship, the top-ranked University of Denver held on to defeat Minnesota Duluth 3-2 in a thrilling final and Lukosevicius was the easy choice for Frozen Four MVP.

"Incredible moment," Montgomery said of winning the all-National Collegiate Hockey Conference final. "I did not know that was the first hat trick (since 1993) but I'm glad I'm part of both and glad we won the championship both nights."

Lukosevicius entered the game as DU's fifth-leading scorer with 13 goals in 42 games. He scored twice in 16 seconds Saturday and his hat trick unfolded in a span of 7:39 — third fastest in championship-game history — to give the Pioneers a 3-1 lead midway through the second period. Montgomery owns the record for quickest title-game hat trick, doing it in 4:35 in '93 — the last time anyone scored three goals in this situation.

"That's pretty ironic, Lukosevicius said.

"Thanks to my linemates Troy Terry and Dylan Gambrell," Lukosevicius said of his big night. "I pretty much just stood in front of the net and got three lucky goals. 'Gams' and Troy did an incredible job and I wouldn't have scored any of those goals without those guys."

Denver's #Skate4Eight slogan was established a year ago, shortly after North Dakota defeated the Pioneers en route to winning its eighth national title. Denver slid to third on the list, stuck on seven.

Now it's eight, one behind Michigan's record of nine, and the curve chart under Montgomery has become legend. The Pioneers (33-7-4) have advanced one step further every year under Montgomery, whose first DU team lost in the first round of the 2014 NCAA Tournament to finish 20-16-6. The Pioneers were eliminated in the 2015 quarterfinals (finishing 24-14-2) and 2016 national semifinals (25-10-6).

"Ever since we lost last year in the Frozen Four to North Dakota, this is what we set out to do," senior wing Evan Janssen said. "We made it reality."

Lukosevicius scored at 4:44 and 5:00 of the second

period. He redirected a wrist shot by freshman defenseman Michael Davies to make it 1-0 before capping a great play by Terry for a rebound goal. After Minnesota Duluth capitalized with a power-play goal on Denver's first penalty at 7:16, the Pioneers regained the two-goal advantage with Lukosevicius' wrist shot from between the circles.

Just like that. Just how Denver has been doing it all season. The Pioneers never feel threatened for long. They usually regain the momentum shortly after they lose it.

"I have no words. It's unbelievable, something special," senior center Matt Marcinew said. "I just love my teammates and so happy for the seniors and Monty."

Early in the third period, DU junior defenseman Tariq Hammond was carted off the ice on a stretcher with a dislocated right ankle. Hammond, who had his leg pinned against the boards, is DU's biggest and most physical defenseman, and his presence was missed as the Bulldogs dominated possession late in the game.

Goalie Tanner Jaillet made 16 of his 38 saves in the third period. The lone goal came at 14:39, when Riley Tuftre scored to make it 3-2. But DU held on from there.

"When we lost Tariq it was an emotional hit to our group," Montgomery said. "But after playing poorly for five minutes, we regrouped well. In the last four minutes, you knew that they were going to come hard. They're a great team."

Hammond celebrated with the team on the ice with crutches, still in uniform. He was scheduled to be further evaluated by doctors at the team hotel.

"I'm just proud of these guys. I just love them to death," Hammond said while in tears. "I'm so happy right now. (The injury) doesn't mean anything right now. I'm just so happy. I love this team, love this program so much."

DU outshot UMD 8-0 to begin the game but the Bulldogs finished with a 40-28 shots advantage.

"Our guys were awesome in the third, and we gave ourselves a chance to get back in the game," UMD coach Scott Sandelin said. "We just came up one goal short."

Pioneers Crowned National Champions for Ninth Time

BOSTON — Nobody in America does hockey better than the University of Denver.

Sorry, Broncos. Nice try, Avs. But in our major-league, sports-crazy city, the Pioneers are the franchise.

They won the ninth national championship in school history, with an eruption of five — count 'em, five — goals in the third period to overwhelm Minnesota State and Hobey Baker Award winning goalie Dryden McKay.

“We faced our biggest test. You’ve got to earn this trophy. And we earned it,” Denver coach David Carle said Saturday, after a back-from-the-brink, rousing 5-1 victory inside TD Garden.

“It’s not easy to play at Denver ... It’s a big responsibility to play in our program.”

Through two periods, the Pioneers were stuck in molasses. Deep molasses. Able to produce only eight shots through two frames, they couldn’t find enough ice to make a frosty glass of lemonade, much less the time and space to challenge McKay.

The Pioneers play a beautiful game. But it was down-and-dirty grit, not to mention steely, never-surrender will, that allowed DU to shake, rattle and ultimately roll the Mavericks, who entered the night on an 18-game winning streak.

On his record-setting 168th game in a crimson-and-gold sweater, Ryan Barrow won it all.

“You come to Denver to win national championships,” said Barrow, who arrived on campus shortly after the Pios won their eighth championship in 2017, then stuck with it, through the COVID-19 pandemic and all. “It took five years, but we’re here now. Unbelievable feeling.”

It was a lunch-bucket goal by Barrow, who rolled up his sleeves and got down to business in the crease, that finally got Denver on the board at 4 minutes, 46 seconds of the final period, evening the score at 1-1. The invincibility of McKay was shattered, and soon thereafter, Pioneers defenseman Mike Benning zinged a shot from the left circle into the back of the net.

“Once we gave up a goal, we started leaking oil,” Minnesota State coach Mike Hastings said. The Pioneers, he added, “smelled blood in the water and got incredibly aggressive.”

Back at the corner of University and Evans in Denver, it was time to crank up the party.

The Pioneers scored three more times in the final 6:26 of the third period, with goals by Massimo Rizzo, Brett Stapley and Cameron Wright giving the illusion of a rout in what had been a long night of unrelenting struggle required by DU to finish the season with a sterling 31-9-1 record.

Ever try to skate on a wool blanket? Any time Denver entered the attack zone with the puck, Minnesota State threw a thick, scratchy, wet blankie at the Pioneers’ feet. Bobby Brink and Carter Savoie, the two most dangerous offensive threats in DU’s high-scoring attack, were smothered in unwanted attention by Mavericks defensemen who hammer hip checks now and beg your forgiveness later.

Thwarted in their pedal-to-the-metal transition game, the Pios played the opening 20 minutes with knitted brows, not quite flustered, but definitely frustrated, with three shots the fewest in any period this season since December.

Sam Morton, who lived in Lafayette and skated for the Colorado Thunderbirds as a teenager, staked Minnesota State to a 1-0 lead with a power play goal, the result of a careless tripping penalty committed by Benning shortly past the midway point of the first period.

“I just think we weren’t playing very well, outside of our goaltender,” Carle said.

While I’m not here to question the wisdom of Hobey Baker voters, if McKay is the best college hockey player in the country, I’m more handsome than George Clooney. The hardest-working and best goalie on the ice was Denver junior Magnus Chrona, because he had to be, stoning shot after shot by Minnesota State to give the Pioneers a fighting chance.

“I’ve got to give a shoutout to Magnus,” Barrow said. “For the first 40 minutes, I don’t think our team really realized we were in the national championship game. He stood on his head.”

After his grandmother passed away in March, “I’ve dedicated every win to her,” said Chrona, who made

27 saves, none bigger than a stop of Minnesota State center David Silye on a short-handed, breakaway chance.

They call Alabama the Crimson Tide. And Duke is synonymous with basketball excellence. But Denver is the gold standard of college hockey.

Nine championships, tying DU with the University of Michigan for the most titles won by any program? Are you kidding me? That’s success beyond the wildest dreams of most athletic programs. But nine ain’t enough for the Pioneers.

“It certainly was a goal to get to nine,” Carle said. “The ultimate goal is to be the first (college hockey program) to get to 10, I will tell you.”
