**Norman Armitage '29CC** competed in six Olympic Games: 1928, 1932, 1936, 1948, 1952 and 1956. He famously served as the United States flag bearer two times in 1952



**Erinn Smart '02BC** won an Olympic Silver Medal in team foil at the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games.

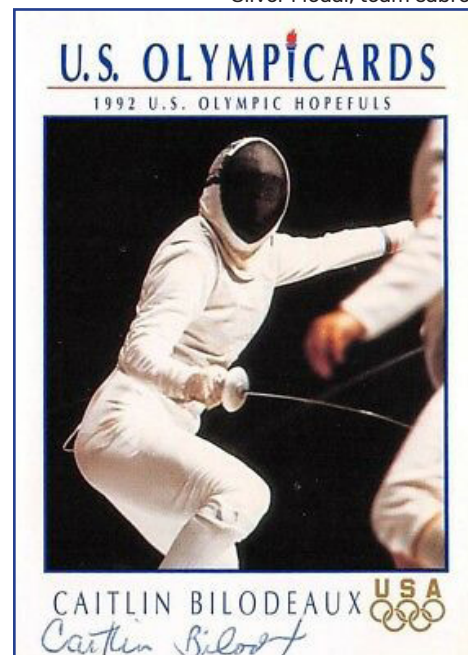

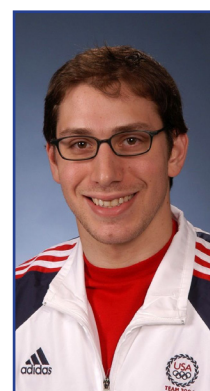
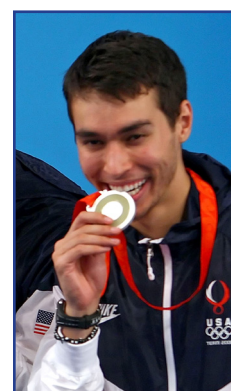

## NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

### 1951 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



In only its third year of competition in the NCAA Division I Three-Weapon Fencing Championships, Columbia claims two individual titles en route to capturing its first-ever national championship in Champaign, Ill. The Lions outscore Penn, 69-64, for their first-ever NCAA title in any sport. Robert Nielsen captures his second straight national title in foil with a 24-3 record and Daniel Chafetz takes the epee championship with a 22-5 slate. John Krajcir finishes in second place with a 23-5 record in the sabre competition. It was the first of two Columbia national fencing titles for Head Coach Jose Velarde.

### 1952 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Columbia wins its second straight NCAA Three-Weapon Team Championship as it claims a two-point victory over city rival NYU, 71-69, in New Haven, Conn. Stephen Sobel takes second place in sabre at 25-3, while Daniel Chafetz (22-8) and Alfred Rubin (24-5) both finish in third place in their respective epee and foil competitions.

### 1954 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



In a matchup of New York City fencing powers, Columbia ties NYU, 61-61, for a share of the 1954 NCAA Fencing Championship, which was held in Chicago, Ill. Columbia is led by Stephen Sobel, who wins an individual national title in sabre with a 24-3 record. Irwin Bernstein places fourth in epee with a 21-9 record and Ralph DeMarco takes eighth place in foil with a 16-10 slate. It is the first of Irving DeKoff's four national championships as Columbia Head Fencing Coach.

### 1955 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S

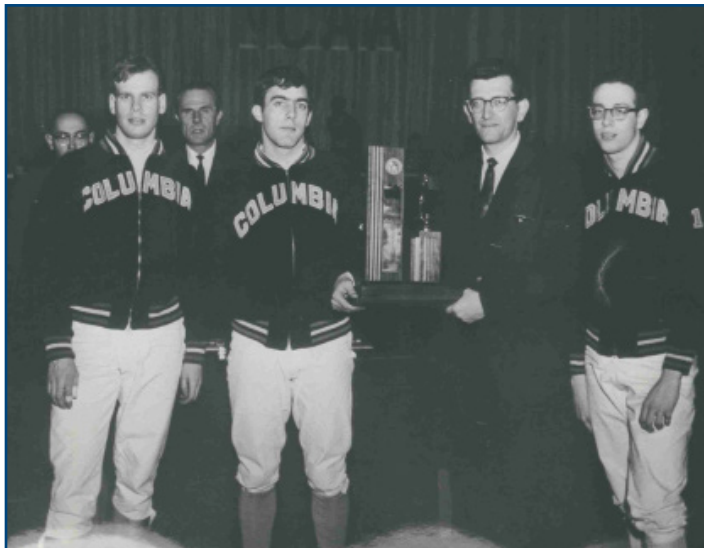


Columbia wins its second consecutive and fourth NCAA Fencing title in five years as the Lions secure a five-point victory in East Lansing, Mich. Columbia scores 62 points to best second place Cornell (57 points) and third place Navy (55). Barry Pariser wins an individual national title in sabre, finishing 20-2 at the event. Nyles Ayers takes second place with a 21-5 epee performance and Ralph DeMarco finishes fourth in foil with a 21-4 record. With four national titles in five years from 1951-55, the 1950s decade was billed the "Golden Age" of Columbia Fencing.



## NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

### 1963 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Columbia wins its first NCAA Championship in eight years as the Lions outscore second-place Navy 55-50 to claim the 1963 title at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colo. The Lions earn 20 points in foil, 19 in sabre, and 15 in epee to capture the title. Jay Lustig wins the national foil championship with a 20-2 record. Stephen Cetrulo finishes second in the sabre competition with a 19-2 mark, and Donald Margolis takes fourth place in epee with a 16-5 record. Irving DeKoff leads the Lions to his third national championship as Head Coach.

### 1965 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Behind a national title-winning performance by Joe Nalven in foil, Columbia claims its second team national team title in three years as the Lions secure a two-point victory (76-74) over NYU in Detroit, Mich. Nalven finishes 28-4 individually in foil. Also scoring for Columbia was Mark Berger, who took fifth place in the sabre competition with a 26-6 record, and Richard Holzman, who places seventh in epee (22-10). The 1964-65 Lions completed a rare grand slam: being undefeated in dual meets, winning the Ivy League championship, the Eastern's and the NCAA title.

### 1968 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



In his first year as head coach, Lou Bankuti guides Columbia to a national championship and first place finish at the NCAA Championships in Detroit, Mich. Columbia relies upon second place finishes in all three weapons as the Lions amass 92 points and edge out both second-place NYU (87 point.) and third-place Penn (84 points). Team captain Frank Lowy finishes second in sabre with a 29-4 record, Bert Pearlman went 29-7 in epee and Jeffrey Kestler finished 34-5 in foil.

### 1971 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



The two New York City fencing superpowers Columbia and NYU tied for the 1971 NCAA Division I championship as the two schools finished with 68 points. Bruce Soriano won his second-straight national title in sabre as he went undefeated in the event with a 23-0 record. He claimed the Michigan State Memorial Trophy for top sabre performance for the second straight year. Robert Berger took third in foil with a 16-7 record, and Mark Haselkorn took fifth place in epee (14-9). The title marked Head Coach Lou Bankuti's second in charge of the Columbia program.





## NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

### 1987 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Led by NCAA foil champion William Mindell, Columbia wins the team title for the ninth time by edging Penn by eight points, 86-78, in the 1987 Men's Championship event held in South Bend, Ind. Mindell (14-5) wins the foil title after defeating teammate Marc Kent (16-4). Robert Cottingham takes second in sabre with a 17-2 record, Christopher Reohr places third in sabre with a 16-3 record and Jon Michael Normile finishes fourth in epee (13-6). The title is Columbia's first in 16 years and marks the first under co-coaches George Kolombatovich and Aladar Kogler.

### 1988 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Columbia entered the year as a heavy favorite to repeat as champion and the Lions don't disappoint as they score the maximum 90 points and win individual titles in all three weapons to take their second straight men's national title. Columbia becomes just the second team in NCAA Division I fencing history and the second team since NYU in 1961 to sweep all three weapons titles in the same Championship with a convincing 90-83 win over Notre Dame. Robert Cottingham (16-2) won the sabre competition, with teammate Christopher Reohr (17-2) in second. Marc Kent (16-1) was victorious in foil and Jon Normile took the epee title with an undefeated 16-0 record.

### 1989 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • MEN'S



Columbia withstood a strong challenge from Penn to capture its third straight NCAA Men's Fencing Championship and its 11th crown overall. The Lions capture just one individual title, but earn 88 out of a possible 90 points for the victory. Columbia's Jon Normile wins his second straight epee title and finishes 20-1. Also earning key points for the Lions are Marc Kent, who takes second place in foil with a 16-4 record and David Mandell, who places second in sabre with a 15-2 mark.

### 1992 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • COMBINED



In the third year since the NCAA changed its fencing scoring system to a combined format, Columbia registers a 4150-3646 victory over Penn State for its 12th all-time national championship. Led by Anne Marsh's second place finish in women's foil with a 14-2 record, six Columbia fencers place among the field's top-10 to lead the Lions to their first national title in three years. Dan Charlick (fifth place in men's epee), Robert Conway (seventh place in men's foil), Ben Atkins (ninth place in men's epee), Marc Pavese (ninth place in men's foil), and Herby Reynaud (ninth place in men's sabre) accumulate enough points to hold off Penn State. Columbia claims the team title in men's epee.



## NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

### 1993 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • COMBINED



Underdog Columbia-Barnard claims its second straight combined NCAA Fencing title as it wins in a slim victory over Penn State, 4525-4500. Columbia rallies from a 4-2 deficit in the men's epee team final to earn a 5-4 victory. The win marked the smallest margin of victory since the current combined scoring system was adopted in 1991. Ben Atkins becomes the first fencer in 46 years to win NCAA titles in two different weapons (epee and foil) as he claims the epee title. Also contributing to Columbia's victory was women's foilist Anne Marsh, who takes third place with a 16-1 record. Columbia won NCAA squad championships in men's epee and men's sabre.

### 2015 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • COMBINED



After four days of ranking among the field's top-two programs, Columbia outscores both Penn State and Notre Dame by nine points to claim its 14th national championship and first title since 1993. Jake Hoyle wins Columbia's first individual national title in five years as he posts a 19-4 record in men's epee. The Lions also benefit from superb performances by Margaret Lu, who takes second in women's foil, Brian Ro, who places third in men's epee, and Harrison Bergman (men's foil) and Anastasia Ivanoff (women's sabre) who both take fifth place in their respective events. The national title marks Michael Aufrichtig's first as Columbia's head coach.

### 2016 NATIONAL CHAMPIONS • COMBINED



For the second consecutive year, Columbia Fencing is crowned the best team in country as it earns the 2016 NCAA Division I Fencing team title in Waltham, Mass. With the championship, the Lions become just the second team since 2000 to earn back-to-back national titles. The Lions held a 13-point lead heading into the event's fourth day and fend off Ohio State for the title, 174-167. Jake Hoyle captures his second straight men's epee national title, Jackie Dubrovich finishes second in women's foil with a 21-2 record, Mason Speta (women's epee) and Adam Mathieu (men's foil) both tie for third place, while Sara Taffel (women's foil) and Harrison Bergman (men's foil) both finish fifth.

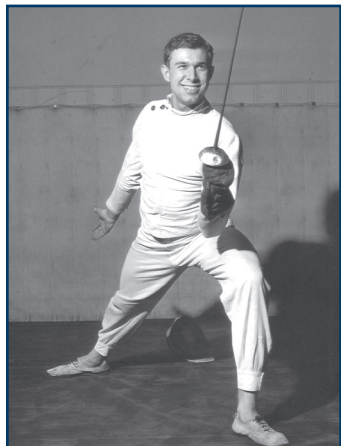


Columbia claims its 16th national fencing title and third in five years as the Lions build an early lead and never trail during four days in Cleveland, Ohio. Fueled by individual national title-winning performances from Anne Cebula (women's epee) and Sylvie Binder (women's foil), a second-place finish by Teddy Lombardo (men's epee), third-place finishes by Iman Blow (women's foil) and Sidarth Kumbla (men's foil) and fifth-place performances from Karolina Nixon (women's epee) and Calvin Liang (men's sabre), Columbia totals 178 points and outscores both Penn State (166) and Notre Dame (165) for the title. Cebula claims the program's first-ever women's epee individual national title and the first-ever individual championship by a Barnard College student-athlete.

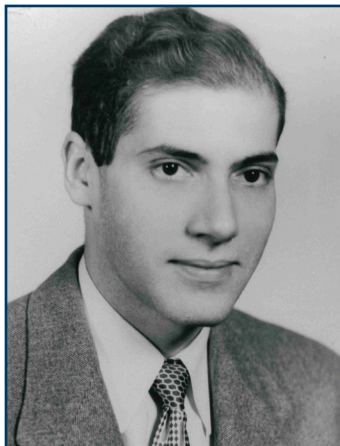

## COLUMBIA'S SUPERLATIVE NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP FEATS

### THREE-TIME NATIONAL CHAMPION



Columbia's Bruce Soriano became the first male fencer in history to win three national titles. He stands as the only fencer in school history to win three national championships in 1970, 1971, and 1972. Soriano's feat is rare as he is one of only 10 fencers in the history of collegiate fencing to win three or more individual titles in a career.

Soriano captured his first NCAA sabre title in 1970 with a dominating 21-2 record. As the favorite to repeat in 1971, he went an undefeated 23-0 as a junior to claim his second straight title. As a senior in 1972, Soriano put together a 22-1 to complete the three-peat.

A three-time winner of the Michigan State Memorial Trophy as the top sabre performer, he concluded his career with a 66-3 record in NCAA Championships.

### COLUMBIA SWEEP IN 1988



In 1988, Columbia swept national titles in all three weapons to claim its second of three straight national championships. The feat marked just the second time in NCAA Division I fencing history that a team swept all three individual titles and first time since NYU won all three weapons in 1961.

The Lions earned a possible 90 out of 90 points as only the top performer in each weapon is counted in the scoring. The Lions were so dominant that if their second men competed as a team, they would have finished in third place with 82 points.

Claiming individual national titles for Columbia were Robert Cottingham in sabre, Marc Kent in foil, and Jon Normile in epee.

It was Columbia's second straight national team title and second of three consecutive men's championships from 1987-89.

### NATIONAL CHAMP IN TWO WEAPONS



In 1993, Columbia's Ben Atkins became the first fencer in 46 years, and second -ever in NCAA history, to win an individual national championship in two different weapons. After taking the NCAA foil title in 1991, Atkins triumphed in epee in 1993 and became the fourth Columbia fencer in history, male or female, to win multiple national titles.

Atkins entered the Columbia fencing program in fall 1990 as a foillist. As a sophomore, he claimed the 1991 foil title with a 14-4 record. After the season, he switched to epee, then went on to claim the 1993 individual title with a 15-3 record.

For his efforts, Atkins was named the NCAA Fencer of the Year and USFA Fencer of the Year. A three-time All-American, Atkins helped guide Columbia to back-to-back team national championships in 1992 and 1993.

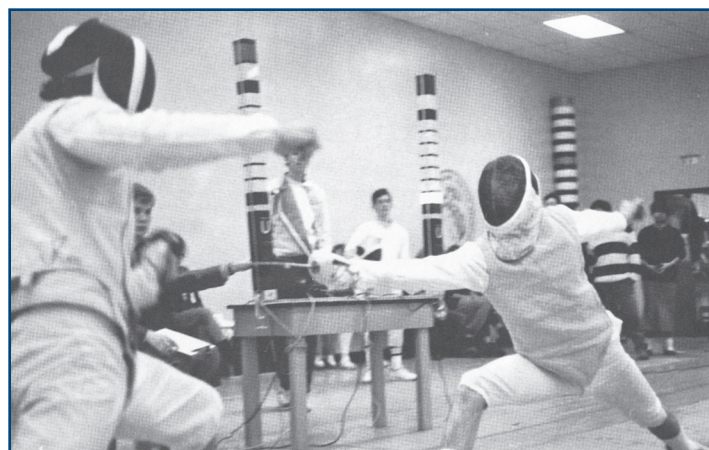

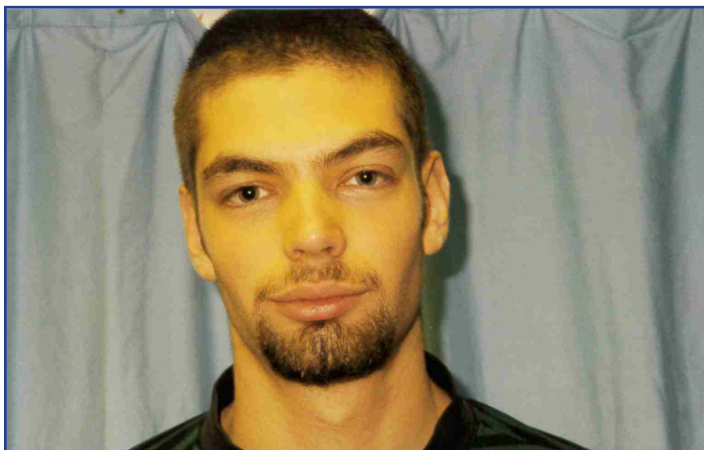

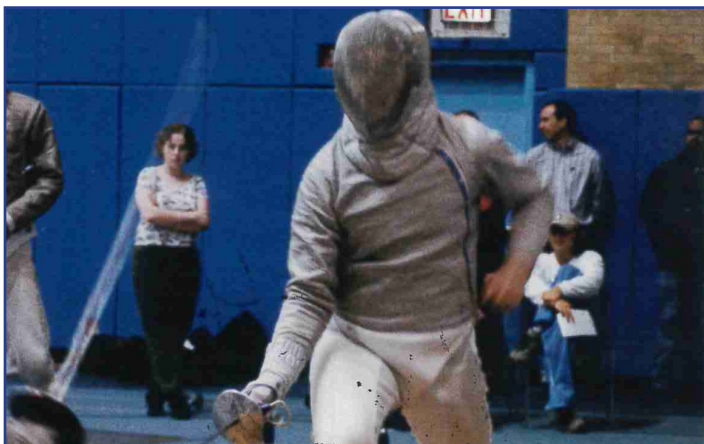

### HISTORY OF THE IFA CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Intercollegiate Fencing Association (IFA) was the oldest collegiate fencing conference in the United States. It is affiliated with the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC). Each year a fencing meet was held at an IFA-affiliated school location or neutral site. Men's competition began in 1894, while women's competition began in the 1995-96 season. The last IFA Championships were held in 2009. Current Members include Brandeis, Brown, Columbia, Cornell, Harvard, MIT, NYU, Penn, Princeton, Vassar, and Yale.



*The Little Iron Man Trophy is the oldest trophy in collegiate sports. It is awarded each year to the team that wins the Men's Foil competition at the Intercollegiate Fencing Association championships. The trophy was cast in 1893 and has been awarded to the IFA Men's Foil team champion since 1896.*

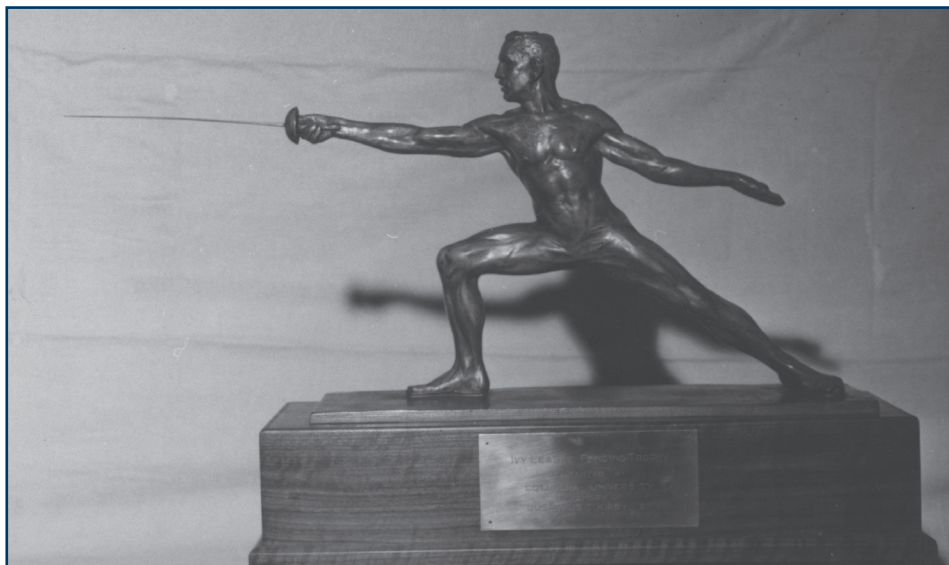

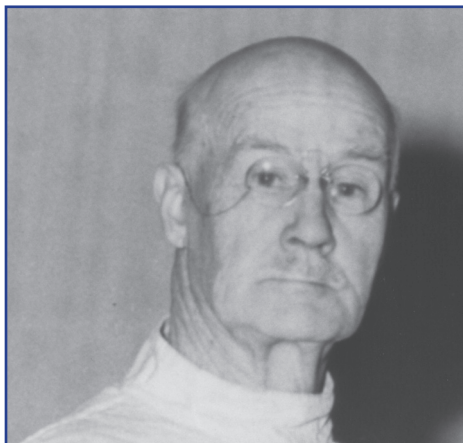

## COACHING HISTORY

### COLUMBIA'S EIGHT HEAD FENCING COACHES

**JAMES MURRAY • 1898-1948**



Nicknamed the “Dean of American Fencing” ... Served as Head Coach at Columbia for 50 years from 1898-1948 ... Retired in 1948 at the age of 74 ... Was first-ever head fencing coach at Columbia ... Finished with a 190-181-9 overall record (.512 winning percentage) ... Inducted into the USA Hall of Fame in 1963 ... Coached in a total of 380 dual matches ... Produced 17 IFA individual champions including Norman Armitage ... Served concurrently as head coach at Columbia and the New York Athletic Club ... Died at the age of 85 in 1957.

**GEORGE SANTELLI • 1948-49**



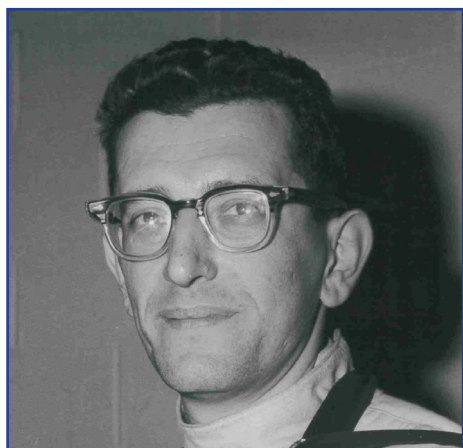
One of the most respected fencing masters in the world ... Columbia’s head fencing coach for just one year (1948-49) after working as an assistant ... Coached the United States Olympic squads of 1928, 1932, 1936, 1948 and 1952 ... In the 1920s after winning national championships in Hungary and Austria, was acclaimed as one of the sport’s greatest athletes ... Member of the 1920 Italian Olympic fencing team, which won the gold medal ... After retiring from competition and becoming a teacher, reputation remained one of international renown.

**JOSE VELARDE • 1949-52**



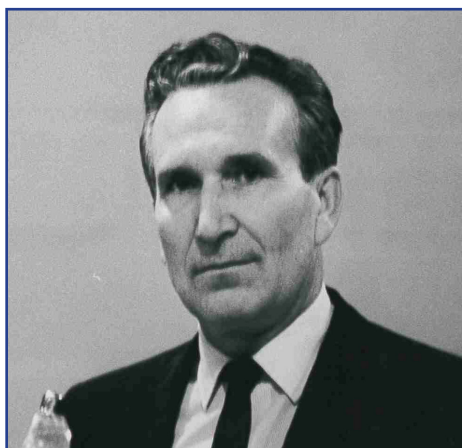
The “Progenitor of the Golden Age of Columbia Fencing” ... Laid foundation for the Lions’ national dominance ... Led Lions to their first two NCAA titles, back-to-back in 1950-51 and 1951-52 ... Major contribution to fencing are the public actions he took in November 1949 at competition venues of the Amateur Fencers League of America (AFLA) ... Adamant refusal to accede to efforts to segregate his fencers led to the end of discriminatory practices against persons of color and brought about racial integration in American Fencing.

**IRV DEKOFF • 1952-67**



In 15 years as head coach, guided Columbia to four national titles, nine team titles or runner-up honors, and 11 Ivy League championships ... Guided Lions to 11 of 12 Ivy League titles during one span ... Two-time National Coach of the Year (1958, 1963) ... Led Columbia into Ivy League competition in 1955-56 ... Registered an .843 winning percentage and 141-25 record ... Former President of the National Fencing Coaches Association of America ... Inducted into the United States Fencing Association Hall of Fame in 1967.

**LOU BANKUTI • 1967-79**



In 12 years as head coach, guided Columbia to two national titles in 1968 and 1971 ... Named the 1971 NCAA National Coach of the Year ... Five of his fencers claimed individual national titles including Bruce Soriano, who won three consecutive in sabre titles from 1970-72 ... Led the Lions to a 76-49 dual match record and five Ivy League titles ... Under Bankuti, Lions earned 26 All-America honors ... Led Columbia to five straight first, second or third place finishes at the NCAA Championship from 1967-72 ... Served as an assistant under Irv DeKoff for 10 years.

**GEORGE KOLOMBATOVICH • 1979-11**



In 32 years as head coach from 1979-2011, including 22 as Co-Head Coach with Aladar Kogler, guided Columbia to five NCAA team titles, 17 individual NCAA titles, and 27 total Ivy League Championships ... Began women’s program at Columbia in 1981-82 ... In dual matches, led Columbia men to a 286-114 record and the women to a 311-83 overall slate ... USA Hall of Fame inductee in 2017... Coached the United States team in six Junior World Championships ... Served as Coach of the U.S. teams in seven Junior Pan American championships ... Referee.

Four-time Olympian as the United States Head Coach ... Served as the USFA National Coach from 1983 to 2001 ... Coached the Czechoslovakian Olympic and National Teams from 1963 to 1981 ... 2006 USFA Hall of Fame inductee ... Hungary native.

#### MICHAEL AUFRICHTIG • 2011-CURRENT



Current Columbia Head Coach ... Guided Columbia to three national championships in 2015, 2016, and 2019 (three in a five-year span) ... Guided Lions to 12 total Ivy League team titles, including seven men's titles and five women's titles, and countless No. 1 national rankings on both the men's and women's sides ... Under Aufrichtig, Columbia has finished no lower than third place at the NCAA Fencing championships since the 2014-15 season ... Seven of his fencers have captured individual national titles ... NYU graduate ... Shreveport, La. native.

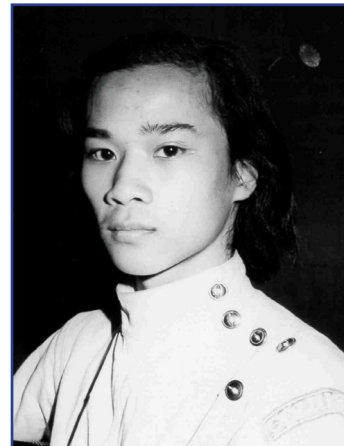

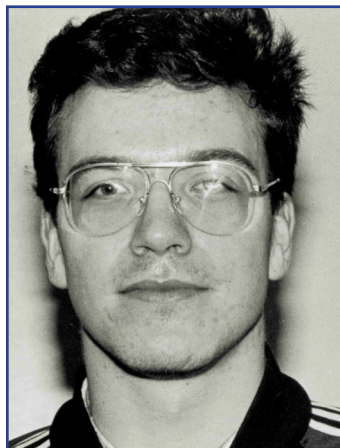

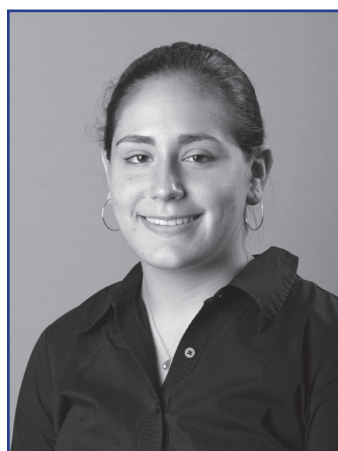

## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### HUGH ALLESANDRONI '29

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2010

As Columbia's second-ever two-time fencing Olympian, two-time United States foil champion, and seven-time team national champion, Hugh Allesandroni learned to fence at Columbia under Hall of Fame coach James Murray.

At the 1932 Olympics in Los Angeles, Allesandroni was a member of the highly successful U.S. foil team which defeated France, throwing the final into a three-way tie between France, Italy, and the United States that was decided by a series of barrage matches. Allesandroni and his U.S. teammates won the Olympic Bronze medal that year. This medal brought the United States great publicity and respect throughout the world.

A lefthanded fencer, Allesandroni went on to win the American Fencer's League of America championship (United States Men's Foil championship) in both 1934 and 1936.

Again in 1936, Allesandroni made the Berlin Olympic Games where he and the U.S. foil team tied for fifth place. His two U.S. foil titles were accomplished with eight-time U.S. foil champ Joe Levis as his adversary. He finished as a runner-up to Levis three times.

Representing the New York Fencers Club, he won seven team national championships, six with the foil and once with 3-weapon. His significance in men's American fencing history is obvious.

After earning a degree in Chemical Engineering and qualifying for two United States Olympic fencing teams, he led a team of engineers who invented the 1st electrical epee scoring device used in Olympic history (1936).

A New York City native, Allesandroni was inducted into the USA Fencing Hall of Fame in 2010. He passed away on December 8, 1977, at 69-years of age.



### NORMAN ARMITAGE '27

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 1963 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2008

One of the greatest American sabremen ever produced, Norman Armitage '27CC '29SEAS was one of the nation's most heralded fencers, a sport he picked up as an undergraduate at Columbia, and he won just about every major sabre championship over a career that spanned more than 30 years.

At his death in 1972, The New York Times called Armitage "one of the greatest fencing champions in modern competition."

For starters, he won the 1928 Intercollegiate Fencing Association sabre title—the nation's top collegiate championship at the time—and two years later won the first of 10 national titles earned between 1930 and 1945. Overall, he won 17 national championships, more than any other American sabreur, and was runner-up nine times. His AFLA national sabre championships came in 1930, 1934, 1935, 1936, 1938, 1940, 1941, 1942, and 1945 and he claimed National Outdoor Sabre titles in 1929, 1930, 1932, 1933, 1935, 1939, and 1940.

Armitage competed in six Olympics from 1928 to 1956 (there were no Olympics in 1940 and 1944 due to World War II) and was honored by being the United States flag bearer in the Olympic opening ceremony three times in 1948, 1952, and 1956. He was a member of the U.S. Olympic team in 1928, 1932, 1936, 1948, 1952, 1956. At the 1928 games, Armitage advanced to the semifinals in individual sabre and four years later, he helped the United States reach the finals in the team competition (the team finished fourth) while taking ninth in individual sabre. Armitage competed at the 1936 summer games despite chemical burns on his right hand suffered in January of that year. (he was a chemical engineer and later a patent attorney when not fencing), making it to the semifinals in individual sabre, and placing fifth in team sabre. After all those close calls, Armitage finally advanced to the medal stand in 1948, earning Bronze in team sabre.

Armitage's contributions to the sport were recognized in 1963 when he was the first individual inducted into the U.S. Fencing Association Hall of Fame.

When off the fencing strips, Armitage earned a law degree from New York University in 1937 and an additional degree in patent law two years later. He used his science and legal training to build a successful business career in the textile industry. After he graduated in 1927 from Columbia, he did graduate work to earn degrees in science and chemical engineering. Armitage passed away in 1972 in New York City.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### BEN ATKINS '93

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2008

Ben Atkins did not let his relatively small frame get in the way of an outstanding fencing career at Columbia.

Atkins became the first fencer in 46 years, and second ever, to win the NCAA national championship in two different weapons. After taking the NCAA foil title in 1991, Atkins triumphed in epee in 1993 and became the fourth Columbia fencer in history to win multiple national titles.

Despite his diminutive stature, Atkins stood only five-foot-nine inches tall, while many of his competitors hovered around six-foot-one, the New York City native and three-time All-American was instrumental in helping the Lions win back-to-back NCAA team titles in 1992 and 1993.

Largely due to his strategy and quick feet, Atkins was able to excel. "Tempo is so very important, the feeling that this is the right time to move," Columbia coach Aladar Kogler once said to Sports Illustrated. "That Ben has."

For his efforts in 1993, Atkins was named the NCAA Fencer of the Year and the United States Fencing Association Fencer of the Year. He still stands as the only man in Columbia's storied fencing history to win the USFA individual honor. Atkins helped guide the Lions to back-to-back team national championships in 1992 and 1993. The three-time All-American concluded his career with a 115-34 combined record in both foil and epee dual match bouts.

Atkins began fencing at the age of 4 1/2. He claimed the 1990 Under-19 National epee championship and was a member of the Olympic Festival Gold Medal winning team. As a high school senior at Stuyvesant High School, he ranked as the No. 1 ranked scholastic fencer, was a two-time New York City public school champion, and was the 1989 Iron Horse winner as the city's fencer of the year.

A four-year letterwinner and two-time Columbia team captain, Atkins graduated in 1993 with a degree in political science. He continued to fence, winning the 1998 Senior World Championship in men's epee. The Academic All-Ivy League selection and Dean's List earned a degree from Columbia Law School in 1998 and currently owns Atkins & Breskin, Company, a New York City-based real estate firm.



### EMMA BARATTA '96

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2012

A four-time All-American fencer at Columbia, Emma Baratta finished her impressive collegiate career with a record of 109-8. The standout sabre fencer was named to the All-American First Team in 2004 after a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championships, and then again in 2006 following a third-place finish at nationals.

Also a three-time All-Ivy League and Academic All-Ivy League selection, Baratta was named to the prestigious 2006 CoSIDA/ESPN Academic All-American Women's First Team. She became just the third women's fencer in school history to earn four consecutive All-America honors. She won the first 41 bouts of her career, the best-ever by a Lion first-year fencer.

A well-rounded leader, Baratta earned the Kestler Award in 2004 for inspiring the team and leading the way to victory. In 2006, Baratta earned the Columbia Women's Fencing Award for the greatest contribution to the team based on leadership and ability. That same year, Baratta claimed the Marion R. Philips Watch as the Barnard/Columbia senior female student-athlete with the highest cumulative grade point average.

Baratta's success continued after her collegiate career concluded, as she was one of 58 winter sport recipients in the nation to receive an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

Internationally, Baratta continued to fence with much success; so much so that her results from 2002-08 included nine national medals and two international medals. Baratta's career took off in the international fencing community in 2004 when she was a member of the 2004 United States National Team, which won a Silver medal at the World Championships and a coveted team Gold medal at the World Cup in Moscow.

In 2007, Baratta was a member of the U.S. Team at the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, during which the United States won Silver. Most recently, Baratta was a member of the USA team, which won the Bronze medal at the World Cup in Istanbul, Turkey.

A native of Somerville, N.J., Baratta went on to earn her J.D. from Harvard Law School in 2011. She currently serves as counsel in Hughes Hubbard & Reed's Intellectual Property and Technology practice group.

### CAITLIN BILODEAU '87

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2002 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2006

With fencing strips and scoring equipment scattered all over Columbia's gym floor, there never are many places for spectators to sit during a Lion fencing match. And so it was at a match against Harvard some 20 years ago, while grabbing a seat near the Harvard team, one overheard a brief conversation between two Crimson women's fencers.

One had just gone down to defeat to a Columbia fencer, five touches to none. She took a seat, and turning to a teammate, said, "Wow! What was that? I don't think I ever saw her blade on any of those touches."

"That was Katy Bilodeaux," her teammate said. "You know, the national champion."

"THAT was Katy Bilodeaux?" the first fencer asked. "I didn't think she was that quick. I didn't think ANYBODY was." She paused for a moment. "Do you think she'd mind," she said softly, "if I asked for her autograph?"

We ALL should have asked for her autograph, for in Caitlin "Katy" Bilodeaux (she has dropped the "x" from her last name) we were privileged to see one of the nation's finest athletes in the latter part of the 20th century.

Bilodeaux came out of Concord-Carlisle High School in Massachusetts as a heralded athlete, a high school All-American in lacrosse, and an all-state player in soccer. But she was recruited for fencing, and she didn't disappoint. She was a four-time All-American, four-time Northeast Regional champion, and four-time All-Ivy League selection. In both 1985 and 1987, she won the NCAA women's foil titles, becoming the first woman ever to capture two NCAA fencing crowns. She still stands as the only woman in Columbia fencing history to win two individual national titles.

On a national level, she was a four-time national champion, preceded by four years as the Junior Olympic national champion. She was a four-time Eastern Collegiate champion and a two-time medalist in the Pan American Games, including a gold medal in 1987. She was the top-ranked women's foil fencer in the United States from 1985 to 1992. She competed in two Olympic Games (1988 and 1992) and two World University Games (1985, sixth place, and 1987). The U.S. Olympic Committee chose her as the Outstanding Fencer of the Year three times. The Women's Sports Foundation named her as its Up and Coming Athlete of the Year and she was named the NCAA Athlete of the Decade for the '80s (fencing).

In 1987, she was the first recipient of Columbia's Distinguished Achievement Award in Athletics, followed the next year by Columbia College's John Jay Award for Distinguished Achievement.

Her alma mater further honored her in 1991 as the Columbia University Athlete of the Decade for Fencing and in 1999 as the Athlete of the 20th Century, also for fencing. That year she made the Ivy League's Silver Anniversary Team. In 2002, she was inducted into the USFA Hall of Fame.

Asked her fondest memory of her years at Columbia, she answers without hesitation, "Having Aladar Kogler as my coach. He has a great ability to motivate, inspire [and] encourage hard work, all while having fun at the same time."



### MONICA CONLEY '03

Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2012

New Jersey native Monica Conley was already a well-known name in women's fencing before she ever stepped foot on Columbia University's campus. Growing up a mere 30 minutes outside of New York City, Conley racked up two First Team New Jersey All-State honors, was named the 1999 High School State Women's Epee Champion and the Division II NAC New Haven Champion, and was voted "Best Sportsman-Female Fencer" at the New Jersey All-State Fencing Awards.

Conley's success continued in college. She was a four-time All-American for Columbia from 1999-2003. She continued to make headlines in her hometown while at Columbia. Conley was named a Top-Ten Fencer of the Century by the Newark Star Ledger in 2000. Amidst her numerous awards as a collegiate athlete, Conley was also a three-time first team All-Ivy honoree and NCAA first team All-American in 1999, 2000, and 2002.

As team captain for the Lions in 2001 and 2002, Conley fenced among the best, as she dueled her way to become the Northeast Regional Women's Epee Champion in 2002.

It all came together for Conley in 2003, when Columbia won the Ivy League Championships, and Conley earned the 2003 Columbia Most Valuable Player Award.

After graduating in 2003, Conley started a fencing camp in New Jersey and taught classes at the YMCA before embarking on a career in design.

Shortly after graduation, Conley became the Women's Chair of the Columbia Fencing Advisory Board. Today, Conley remains an active Columbia alumnus by helping to fundraise, contributing to the fencing social media efforts and hosting alumni events. She has also served as the Varsity C Executive Committee secretary, treasurer, and President Elect.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### ROBERT COTTINGHAM, JR. '88

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2015 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2010

Through the years Columbia has produced many of the nation's top fencers. Among them is two-time Olympian Robert Cottingham, one of the most decorated fencers in Columbia's rich fencing history.

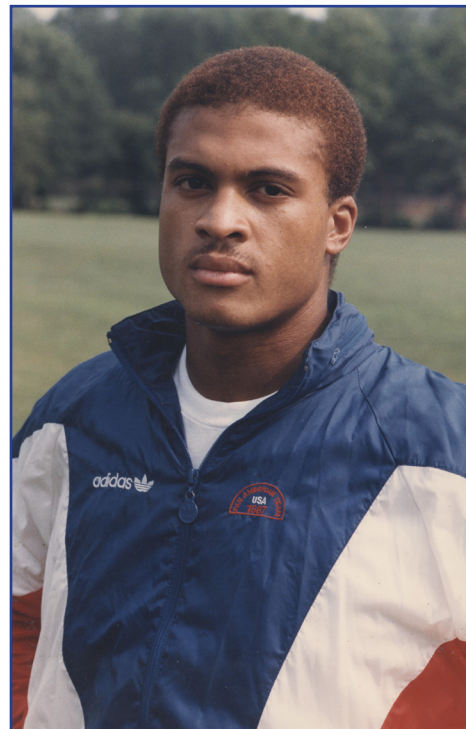
A member of the great Columbia fencing teams of the 1980s, Cottingham was a four-time All-Ivy League and All-America selection in men's sabre. Over his four-year career, Cottingham compiled an impressive record of 108-11 for a winning percentage of .907.

Respected among his teammates, Cottingham was selected as a team captain for his junior and senior seasons. During those years, he led the Lions to back-to-back NCAA titles. Individually, Cottingham came into his own during those years, as well. As a junior, he won silver in the individual sabre competition at the NCAA Championships and the Pan-American Games in Indianapolis. Building off that year, Cottingham did the unthinkable his senior year—he won a prized double, capturing an individual NCAA title, to go along with the team title. That same year he was named the NCAA Fencer of the Year and received the Columbia University Distinguished Athlete Award.

Upon graduating from Columbia with a degree in History in 1988, Cottingham went on to compete for the US National Team at the 1988 and 1992 Olympic Games. He was named the Newark Star-Ledger Fencer of the Decade for the 1980s and served as a member of the Executive Committee of the United States Fencing Association. In his distinguished career, Cottingham claimed six U.S. National Championship titles in sabre between 1986 and 1992.

Over the years, Cottingham has earned a variety of prestigious awards. He is a 2010 Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame inductee and 2015 USA Fencing Hall of Fame recipient. He was the 2013 recipient of the prestigious NCAA Silver Anniversary Award, which each year, recognizes six distinguished former student-athletes on their 25th anniversary as college graduates. In 2015, Cottingham was named by The U.S Small Business Administration as "New Jersey's 2015 Minority Small Business Person of the Year."

He owns and operates Sabre88, a global consulting firm applying capabilities in technology, public policy, international affairs, health care, and education to government and commercial clients. The company previously was listed on Inc.'s annual "Inc. 5000" list of the nation's fastest-growing private companies ranked and was listed among the top-10 fastest-growing companies led by an African-American CEO.



### IRVING DEKOFF, COACH

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 1967 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2008

Since the establishment of the NCAA fencing championship in 1941, Columbia has consistently ranked as one of the top fencing schools in the nation. One of the most successful runs in Columbia fencing history began prior to the 1952-53 season, with the arrival of Head Coach Irv DeKoff. In 15 years as Columbia's head coach, DeKoff guided the Lions to four national team championships, nine team national titles or runner-up honors, five IFA Championships, 11 Ivy League Championships, and a 141-25 dual match record (.843 win percentage). He was also a two-time NCAA Coach of the Year honoree.

Starting in 1953-54, only his second year on Morningside Heights, DeKoff led Columbia to the national championship final round in five consecutive seasons. The Lions won the national title twice and finished second three times, each time by four touches or less. Upon the start of formal Ivy League competition in 1955-56, DeKoff's Lions jumped to the top of the Ivy League, winning the Ancient Eight title in 11 of the first 12 seasons of official round-robin competition.

Under DeKoff, Columbia also claimed two more national championships in 1963 and 1965. His four national championship teams are second-most among Ivy League head coaches all-time, behind only Columbia's George Kolombatovich and Aladar Kogler. DeKoff was also responsible for the development of numerous talented fencers, including 18 All-Americans, eight NCAA individual champions, and two Olympians. He concluded his Columbia coaching career in 1967 and was subsequently appointed Dean of Eisenhower College in Upstate New York.

Born in Buffalo, N.Y., he moved to Brooklyn and attended Boys High School, where he learned to fence. After Army service during World War II, he received an A.B. degree from Brooklyn College, where he was an outstanding fencer and track and field athlete. He went on to earn an M.A. from New York University in 1949 and a doctor's degree in education from Columbia in 1962.

DeKoff began his coaching career by teaching fencing to students of the Julliard School of Music's Opera Theatre group. He was appointed assistant coach at Columbia in 1948, then left for a brief stint at CCNY and Cooper Union. When head coach Joe Velarde, a Major in the U.S. Air Force, was recalled to active duty in 1952, DeKoff returned to Columbia as head coach.

Of DeKoff, former Columbia Sports Information Director Kevin Demarrais '64CC, who was SID during much of DeKoff's tenure, says, "By many measures, Irv DeKoff could arguably be rated the most successful coach in any sport in Columbia history. His .843 winning percentage and string of Ivy and NCAA championships are unmatched. What makes the record even more notable is that the dual-meet schedule included the top teams in the country, including NYU, Navy, and several other Ivy teams. He was also a super-nice guy."

A former President of the National Fencing Coaches Association of America, DeKoff was inducted into the United States Fencing Association Hall of Fame in 1967. He is recognized as one of America's greatest coaches in fencing history. DeKoff passed away on July 19, 2015.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### EMILY JACOBSON '08

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2016 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2008

On the fencing strip, Emily Jacobson did it all for the Lions, but her most prominent contribution came in 2005. During her first year in Columbia Blue, the sabre fencer became the first female Lion to bring an individual NCAA Championship back to Morningside Heights since Tzu Moy '90CC did so in 1990.

Jacobson's success continued at the national championships throughout her four-year career. As a sophomore in 2006, she went home with the Silver medal and earned Bronze as a junior and senior, respectively. To go along with the hardware, Jacobson garnered four First Team All-America nods, to make her the second female fencer in Columbia history to accomplish the feat and first since Katy Bilodeau '87CC did so from 1983-87.

A four-time All-American and four-time First Team All-American, Jacobson built on her fencing resume at the IFA Championships. In 2007, she helped the Lions to a second place overall team finish as the Atlanta, Ga., native captured Silver in the individual tournament.

The two-time All-Ivy League First Team selection helped Columbia to three Ancient Eight Titles (2005, 2007, and 2008) including the Lions' perfect 14-0 season in 2006-07. Jacobson, who served as the team's co-captain, built a 131-16 overall dual match record throughout her collegiate career (.819 winning percentage) that included a 17-1 mark against Ivy League opponents in 2008.

Jacobson began her illustrious fencing career on top. Her outstanding accomplishments began before she even stepped on campus, as she became the 2004 Junior World Champion and was a part of the Gold medal winning team. A member of the 2004 United States Olympic Team, Jacobson ranked as high as second nationally and 11th in the world in sabre.

Jacobson graduated from Columbia College in 2008 with a degree in psychology.



### DAN KELLNER '98

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2019

A two-time United States foil champion and 2004 Olympian, Dan Kellner made a name for himself, not only in the Ivy League but on the national and international scene. He continues to make his mark as a youth fencing coach in New York City.

At Columbia, Kellner earned four All-America honors, including three First Team All-America awards, and was named the 1998 NCAA Fencer of the Year. With a 54-20 overall NCAA Tournament bout record, he finished in third place at the NCAA Championships in back-to-back years in 1996 and 1997 and claimed fourth place as a senior in 1998.

A Livingston, N.J. native, he was a three-time All-Ivy League fencer. On campus, Kellner was named the Connie S. Maniatty Outstanding Senior Student-Athlete winner and was awarded the James Murray Memorial Trophy, which is awarded to the one fencer who has made the most significant contribution to the men's team.

Kellner, who originally found out about fencing through a video game he played as a kid, Kellner was a two-time First Team All-State fencer (1993, 1994, won the 1993 NJSIA foil championship and was runner-up in 1994).

In all, Kellner was a seven-time U.S. World Championship team member, U.S. champion, U.S. Junior Champion, U.S. Junior World Championship team member, two-time U.S. World University Games team member, and a two-time U.S. Pan American Games team member. In 2003, he was the first American foil fencer to win the Pan American Games title in 28 years and also led the Americans to their first Gold medal in 32 years. He also has numerous podium and medal finishes at National, World Cup, and Grand Prix World Cup fencing tournaments.

He concluded his competitive career ranked No. 1 in the United States, No. 1 in North America, and No. 10 in the world. He was a member of the 2004 United States Olympic Team, where he placed 16th individually, and as captain of the foil team, led the U.S. squad to a fourth place finish, the team's highest in 56 years.

Since 2008, Kellner has served as the owner and operator of the Brooklyn Bridge Fencing Club. He has tutored a variety of outstanding fencers on the international stage, including Columbia's four-time All-American Sam Moelis.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### ALADAR KOGLER, COACH

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2006

Few schools in the collegiate fencing world command more respect than Columbia, and Dr. Aladar Kogler is a major reason for that respect. For 28 years from 1983–2011, when Kogler coached at Columbia with George Kolombatovich, the Lions ascended to the top ranks of collegiate fencing, finishing first or second in the nation seven times. Kogler's presence significantly influenced Columbia's recruiting, as he helped attract the best fencing talent from across the globe, while his teaching methods helped Columbia earn six national championship team titles.

In 1987, the Lions earned their first NCAA men's title in 16 years and followed that with championships in 1988 and 1989. They finished second in 1990 and 1991 after the championships were combined. In both 1992 and 1993, the team brought back two more NCAA first-place trophies. The Lions have captured eight IFA Championships, 10 Northeast Regional crowns, 17 Ivy League men's championships, and eight Ivy League women's championships under Kogler. He has also produced 17 World Cup finalists. Including his season as coach at Wayne State before coming to Columbia, he produced 18 individual national senior champions in all weapons, 16 individual NCAA champions in all weapons, and three Pan American champions.

It is little wonder Kogler has been chosen to coach the United States Fencing Team in four Olympic Games. Add this to his experience as the coach of the Czechoslovakian Olympic and National Teams from 1963 to 1981, and you have a coach with seven Olympic Rings. The U.S. Olympic Committee recognized him in 1998 as its National Coach of the Year in Fencing. In July 2006, Kogler was elected to the USFA National Fencing Hall of Fame.

Kogler served as the USFA National Coach from 1983 to 2001, and was the head coach of the USFA National Training Center at Columbia University. He coached the U.S. National Team in the World Championships for 17 years, and was selected to coach at the 1995 Pan American Games. He is a three-time Pan American coach and a three-time World University Games coach.

A native of Hungary, Kogler earned an international reputation with the Czechoslovakian National Team. While there, eight of his students were world finalists, one was a Junior World Champion and a World University Games Champion. Thirty-nine of his students won Czech, Hungarian, or Austrian national championships. Two Silver medals were earned—one in foil, one in épée—in the World Championships in Hamburg, Germany, and Barcelona, Spain.

Kogler attended the Hungarian College of Higher Physical Education and two Czechoslovakian institutions, Komensky University in Bratislava and Carl University in Prague. He has published 10 books and more than 25 scientific papers and is the director of the U.S. Olympic Committee founded Sports Psychological Research Laboratory at Columbia, which worked with several Columbia teams.



### GEORGE KOLOMBATOVICH, COACH

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2017 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2014

George Kolombatovich served as Columbia's head fencing coach for 33 seasons (1979–2011). From 1983–2005, he served as Co-Head Fencing Coach with Dr. Aladar Kogler. Overall, his coaching dual match record is 286–114 (.715 winning percentage) in men's fencing and 311–83 (.789) in women's fencing.

With Kolombatovich at the helm, Columbia sustained a long run as one of the nation's premier college fencing programs. His Columbia teams captured 17 Ivy League men's fencing titles and eight Ivy League women's fencing titles from 1979–2011. Working together with Kogler as co-head coach, Kolombatovich led the Columbia men's fencing program to the national title in three consecutive years from 1987–89. After the NCAA changed the fencing championships to a combined men and women's format, Kolombatovich and Kogler coached the Lions to back-to-back 1992 and 1993 NCAA Championships.

Seventeen Columbia fencers won individual NCAA fencing titles during Kolombatovich's tenure, including Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame inductees Katy Bilodeau '87CC, Robert Cottingham '88CC, Jon Normile '89CC, Tzu Moy '90CC, and Ben Atkins '93CC as well as Jeffrey Spear '10CC, who was named the recipient of the NCAA Top VIII award in January 2011. Many Columbians who competed for Kolombatovich also represented the United States in Olympic competition, including 2008 Beijing Games Silver Medalists Erinn Smart '01BC and James Williams '08CC.

Kolombatovich also coached some of the premier collegiate and international fencers over the past three decades. Kolombatovich helped guide many of his fencers to success on the international stage including Olympic Medalists James Williams and Erinn Smart, who both earned Silver in 2008 in Beijing.

A well-known figure in national and international fencing, Kolombatovich coached the United States team in six Junior World Championships. He also served as Chief of Mission and Coach of the U.S. teams in seven Junior Pan American championships. A Fédération Internationale d'Éscrime (FIE) A-rated referee, Kolombatovich was elected by the FIE Congress in December 2000, for a four-year term to the extremely important and powerful Commission d'Arbitrage, the Referee Commission. This is the group that selects all referees for the World Championships and is also responsible for assigning them at the Championships. Kolombatovich is the first native-born United States resident to be on this Commission.

He was reelected in 2004 to head the commission, the first non-European individual to hold that post. Kolombatovich is the author of the FIE's first written test for referees. He was also a member, since 1980, of the United States Fencing Association's (USFA) Fencing Officials Commission. He also served as a fencing referee at the 1984, 1992, and 1996 Olympic Games.

A fine fencer in his own right, Kolombatovich was a former National Masters Champion. He and his wife, Etta '98GS, have left a long legacy at Columbia as their four children earned five Columbia degrees among them.

### JAMES MARGOLIS '58

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2016

For someone who had never picked up a fencing weapon until he enrolled at Columbia, James Margolis carved out an illustrious career and went down as one of the finest epeeists the Lions have ever seen.

A New York City native, Margolis had an opportunity to take a management position at a local supermarket but opted to attend school and enroll at Columbia instead—which worked out wonderfully for the fencing program.

In 1957, his second year on the squad, Margolis led Columbia to the first-ever Ivy League fencing team championship and was the individual winner in epee. He went on to capture the IFA crown and claim the top spot at the NCAA Championships to cap his stellar campaign. Margolis capped his career with First Team All-Ivy League honors in 1958 with a 12-2 mark and another team conference title. However, an injury robbed him of a chance to repeat as national champion.

Upon graduation, he was a member of the 1960 United States Olympic Team in Rome and twice competed in the Pan American Games (1960 and 1963), where he won a Gold Medal in team epee at the 1963 games. He was the Ivy League's first Olympian in fencing. He also placed third in epee at the Amateur Fencers League national tournament in 1960.

Margolis, who also served time as a Lieutenant in the U.S. Navy, spent 40 years in the life insurance business and also served as manager at the Brookline Emergency Food Pantry, a food shelter that receives 85 to 90 visits a week from individuals, families, and seniors in need.



### ANN MARSH-SENIC '93

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2011

When Ann Marsh-Senic competed in the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia, she became Columbia's first-ever female athlete to compete in three Olympic Games. She remains one of only four athletes in school history to participate in three or more Olympics.

Always a fierce competitor on the strip, Marsh-Senic began fencing foil at Roeper High School, a private school located in Bloomfield Hills, Mich. There, she made four Junior World teams and claimed the 1990 USFA Under-19 National foil title.

The Royal Oak, Mich. native Marsh-Senic made an immediate impact at Columbia and emerged into a dominant force for the Lions. During her three-and-a-half-year collegiate career from 1990-93, Marsh-Senic was a three-time First Team All-American, two-time Bronze Medalist in NCAA women's foil in 1991 and 1993, and Silver Medalist in 1992, three-time NCAA Northeast Regional champion, and two-time First Team All-Ivy League honoree in foil. She was named the 1993 USFA Athlete of the Year and had the unique distinction of having never lost an Ivy League match during her career (perfect 48-0 record). She led Columbia to the NCAA women's foil Bronze Medal in 1992 and Ivy League championships in both 1991 and 1993.

A December 1993 graduate of Columbia University, Marsh-Senic competed for Team USA Fencing in the 1992 Barcelona, 1996 Atlanta, and 2000 Sydney Olympic Games. She placed seventh individually at the 1996 Atlanta Olympics and fourth in the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games by team. Her top finish was a World Bronze medalist in team foil in the 2001 World Fencing Championships. She competed both individually and with the team at all three Olympics. Her best international result was a Bronze medal in team foil at the 2001 World Championships. At the Pan American Games, Marsh-Senic won a team foil Gold Medal in 1991 and 1995, and in 1995, won a foil Gold and team foil Silver. One of Marsh-Senic's most memorable performances was a legendary comeback victory against the German Foil Team.

In all, she was an eight-time national champion in team foil, and won the individual United States foil title in both 1994 and 1995. Throughout her career, Marsh-Senic was ranked in the world's top-10 foilists from 1993-97. She became the first United States fencer ever to be ranked in the world's top-10. She competed in 10 World Cup finals, won three bronze medals, and was the first U.S. fencer to win a Bronze medal at a Grand Prix World Cup.

Marsh-Senic later attended medical school at the University of Rochester and then did a residency in emergency medicine at Buffalo General Hospital. She then practiced emergency medicine in Michigan. She completed medical school while still training as a fencer at the world-level.

### TZU MOY '91

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2008

Columbia Fencing has a rich history of NCAA and Ivy League titles. For Tzu Moy to stand out among the many outstanding Columbia Fencing alumni is a feat in itself. But not even that distinction can hold a candle to her many career accomplishments.

In 1990, Moy was one of two Columbians to win an NCAA fencing individual title. Along with David Mandell in men's sabre. Moy captured the national championship in women's foil, becoming just the second Columbia female to win an NCAA title in school history, following Katy Bilodeau who won a pair of NCAA individual titles in the mid-1980s.

Moy started her illustrious Columbia career on top. In fact, her outstanding accomplishments began before she even stepped on campus, as she was the 1988 National Junior Olympics champion. A two-time Junior World Championship and Junior Pan American Games team member and the nation's top-ranked high school women's fencer as a senior, Moy was Stuyvesant High School's first woman to ever win the New York City public championship. She was also the first woman ever to win the Iron Horse Award, which goes annually to New York's top scholastic fencer.

Moy did not let the Lions down once she arrived on Morningside Heights as she was named the 1988 Women's Fencing Varsity C award winner. In 1988, 1989, and 1990, Moy earned All-Ivy League honors, won the 1990 Northeast Regional title, and was a two-time All-American.

In 1988 and 1990, she added All-America First Team honors to the list, including her NCAA title in 1990, when she finished a perfect 18-0 in individual competition and was 13-2 in her team bouts. Overall during her four-year career, Moy finished with a 159-16 record (.909 winning percentage).

Moy graduated in 1991 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Pre-Medical Students and then earned a Doctor of Medicine degree from Columbia in 2002. A physician in White Plains, N.Y., Moy specializes in internal medicine.



### JAMES MURRAY, COACH

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 1963

Considered by many as the "Dean of American Fencers" and also by many historians to be the first American-born fencing coach of international significance, James Murray taught fencing at the New York Athletic Club for 64 years and coached the Columbia fencing team for over 50 years. He is credited for laying the foundation of the Columbia Fencing Program, which would go on to become a dominant national program for many years to come.

Murray was probably the first American to travel to Europe to study to become a fencing master and then make a career of it. He was trained in Paris—and was widely considered the finest American-born coach of his day, whereas most other fencing coaches in the States were foreign-born. In France, Murray studied and trained at the Salle d'Armes Jean-Louis with the best of France's classical stylists. He mastered the French language and made lifelong friendships.

Before long, Murray became one of France's immortals as an unbeatable foil champion, and upon his return to the United States, he accepted a fencing master position at Columbia in 1898.

Murray began his teaching career as a boxing instructor in his native Philadelphia where his father had been a boxer of some note. He came to New York in 1891 as an instructor at the NYAC. Shortly thereafter he took a similar post with the New Athletic Club. His professional career in New York occurred at the same time as the creation of the Amateur Fencers League of America (founded in 1891) and of the Intercollegiate Fencing Association (founded in 1894).

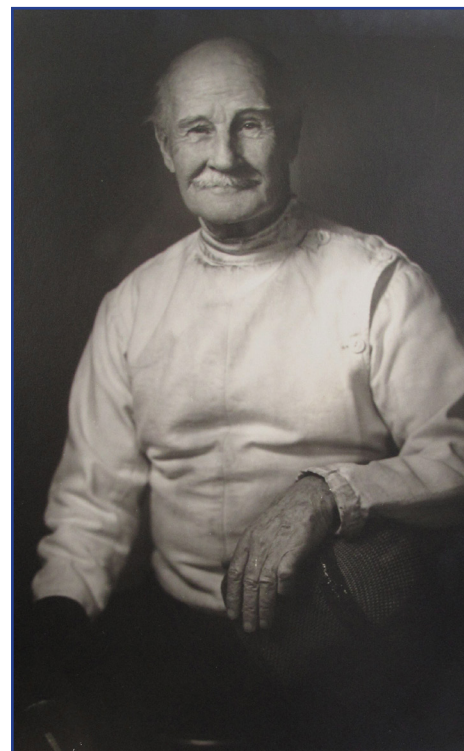
As head coach of the Lions from 1898-1949, Murray coached 365 dual matches, winning 192, losing 163 with 10 draws. From 1918-20, his teams were 16-2 and from 1935-37, the Lions won 28, lost five and tied one. His squad captured the IFA (Intercollegiate Fencing Association) title in 1932. Murray produced many great individual fencers and guided a total of 12 fencers to IFA individual championships, including Norman Armitage, who went on to appear in six Olympic Games.

In 1949 at the age of 74, Murray retired after 50 years of leading the Columbia fencing program. Among his pupils at Columbia were John Purroy Mitchell, who became mayor of New York City, Gustavus Towne Kirby, President Emeritus of the United States Olympic Association; Fitzhugh Townsend, and several other great figures in the history of New York. At a Columbia dinner honoring Murray in May 1948, it was established that over 2,500 students had fenced under his direction at the school.

Murray also tutored for many years at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in the days when Shakespearean action was a staple of the Broadway theatre, teaching sword work to such great stars as John and Lionel Barrymore and John Drew.

After Columbia and NYAC, Murray decided to exclusively teach special classes for the children of NYAC members until 1954.

Murray died on January 28, 1957.







## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### ROBERT NIELSEN '51

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2012

Newark, New Jersey's Robert Nielsen arrived at Columbia already a champion, having won the state title in the discus as a high school senior. At Columbia, the championships kept coming.

A master fencer, Nielsen was one of the best foilists in the distinguished history of the Columbia fencing program. He made Columbia history during his sophomore year in 1949 when he became the first Columbia fencer to earn All-America status.

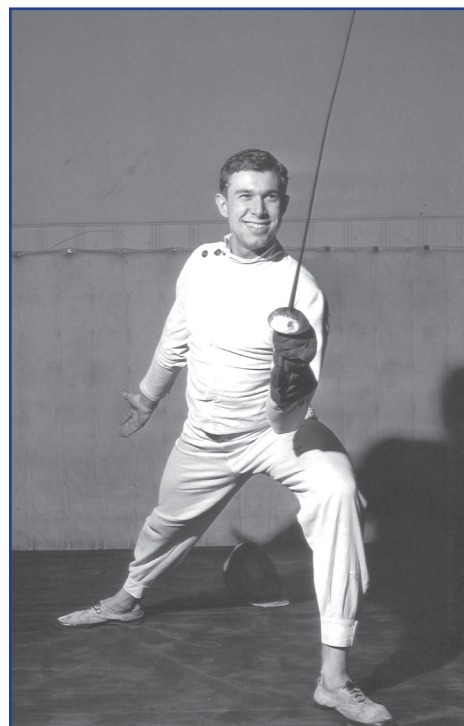
In 1950, the Columbia fencing team went 24-3 as Nielsen dueled his way to the top, winning the National championship in foil, another Columbia first.

Named captain of the 1950-51 squad, Nielsen led the Lions to their first-ever NCAA Fencing Championship and repeated as the individual national champion in foil. That same year, the Lions dominated intercollegiate play with a 31-1 record and also earned their first IFA title. Nielsen's success did not go unnoticed as he earned a spot on the Columbia College Today Dream Team for men's fencing following his collegiate run.

A three-time All-American, Nielsen continued his athletic exploits over his lifetime, competing as a senior fencer and coaching high school athletics, and local fencing clubs.

After graduation in 1951, Nielsen joined the Air Force and continued to fence, earning Texas and California Open titles, and the New England Foil Championship in 1965. He remained an avid fencer, winning the Alabama State Foil Championship at the age of 61 and the United States Fencing Association Men's Foil Senior Event Championship on two occasions. Nielsen also dedicated time to coaching high school discus and shot put and his hometown fencing club.

Nielsen passed away in 2013.



### BARTON NISONSON '62

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2018

Even not having been recruited for fencing, Bart Nisonson '62CC '66PS is one of the most notable fencers in Columbia history. Despite not being a recruited member of the 1958-59 team, Nisonson marked a 17-4 record during his freshman season. He continued to build on his momentum, noting a 23-7 overall junior record and a 14-1 Ivy League record for his senior season.

Nisonson capped off the 1961-62 season by being named a First Team All-Ivy League selection, All-American, IFA champion, and NCAA individual champion. Nisonson stood atop the podium at the NCAA Championships after a 24-5 fence off against Navy which was one of his most challenging opponents.

He continues to make an impact in the fencing community as he has served on the Fencing Advisory committee for the last 23 years and served as its Chairman from 2007-11.

His academic and professional accolades include induction into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society, and graduating Magna Cum Laude from Columbia. A graduate of the Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons, Nisonson remained close to sports during his medical career, serving as a team doctor and surgeon for both the New York Jets of the National Football League and New York Rangers of the National Hockey League for many years.

### JON NORMILE '89

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2019 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2006

They could have called them The Three Musketeers, three Columbia Lions who dominated Ivy League and NCAA men's fencing during the late 1980s. Jon Normile was the epeeist, while Chris Reohr and Bob Cottingham fenced sabre. Together, they captured four NCAA championships and countless other titles. In 2006, Jon Normile became the first to enter the Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame.

Normile came out of the Cleveland, Ohio area and stepped into Columbia fencing immortality. He helped the Lions win four straight Ivy League championships (1986, 1987, 1988, 1989) and earned All-Ivy League honors three times. Columbia won three consecutive NCAA Championships with Normile's assistance, in 1987, 1988, and 1989. In each season, he made All-American. He captained the 1989 team.

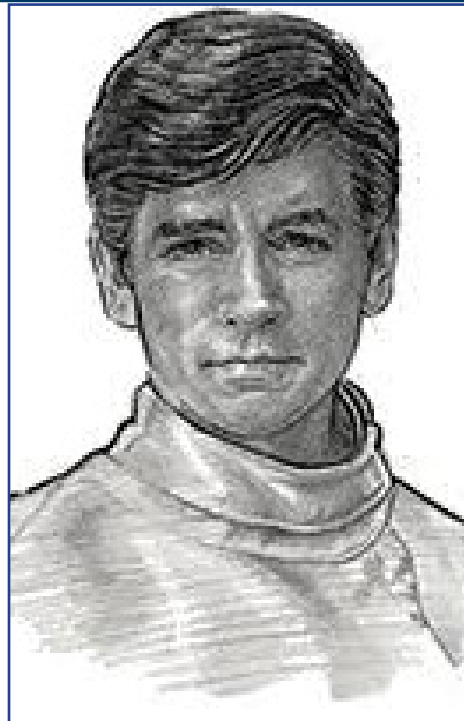
Normile captured two NCAA men's epee individual championships, as both a junior and senior, and won the IFA men's epee title his junior year. He is one of only four fencers in school history to win two or more national titles (Bruce Soriano, 3, 1970-72; Ben Atkins, 2, 1991-93; Caitlin Bilodeaux, 2, 1984-87). Normile concluded his four-year career with a 118-22 dual match record (.843 winning percentage).

Following his 1989 graduation with a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering, he continued to fence, with great success. He earned a Silver medal at the 1991 Pan American Games, and made the United States team in the 1992 Olympics. He later qualified for two World Championships, and finished third at an International World Cup event in 1999.

A three-time U.S. National Men's Epee champion, he guided his New York Athletic Club team to nine U.S. National Epee titles and also coached at the NYAC for many years.

Although he no longer competes, Normile stays in touch with the sport by coaching young children. The man they called "The Rock" remembers his years at Columbia fondly, especially "being a member of the Columbia fencing team and enjoying the camaraderie of my teammates."

Having acquired an M.B.A. from Columbia Business School, he works in risk management at Goldman Sachs and spends some of his spare time surfing, noting that he "[caught] an eight-foot wave at the Jersey Shore during hurricane season." He also is interested in experimental aviation.



### BARRY PARISER '55

Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2012

A graduate of New York City's Music and Art High School, former Columbia University fencer Barry Pariser is a true renaissance man. At Columbia, his excellence with the sabre led him to unparalleled success.

As a junior in 1953-54, he was part of Columbia's undefeated 1954 fencing team, which swept its way to the NCAA Championship, and he was an All-American in sabre, finishing as the national runner-up.

Appointed team captain for his senior season, Pariser once again dominated, winning the individual NCAA title in sabre, while leading the Lions to their second consecutive National Championship.

His contributions to the world of fencing continued after graduation in 1955. Pariser went on to become a member of the world championship team in Philadelphia, Pa. In 1959, he completed medical school with a degree from the State University of New York. After marrying in 1960, he landed an internship at Lenox Hill Hospital in New York City and soon began a four-year residency in otolaryngology and general surgery. Pariser later went on to begin a private practice in Newburgh, N.Y. in 1966.

One of his greatest achievements came in 1961 when he saved the life of former national champion, Nickolas Muray. Muray went into cardiac arrest during a friendly duel at the New York Athletic Club, but Pariser saved him just in time by performing emergency surgery with a pen

### LISA PIAZZA '85

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2006

Lisa Piazza came off of Long Island to become one of the finest fencers in the annals of both Barnard College and Columbia University.

Both Barnard and Columbia? Yes, Piazza was one of those student-athletes who spanned the period between Barnard's intercollegiate athletics program and the Columbia-Barnard Athletic Consortium for which today's female student-athletes compete.

Entering Barnard College in 1981, Piazza helped Coach Sharon Everson's Bears finish 10th in the 1982 Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) national championships. She placed second in foil in the individual competition to earn All-America honors. She also competed for Barnard in the 1982-83 season, when she earned a spot on the U.S. Junior World Championship Team.

In 1983-84, this time as a Columbia Lion, she again earned All-America honors, finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships. As a senior in 1984-85, she placed sixth, again earning All-American honors. She was also an All-Ivy League selection as a sophomore, junior and senior.

Piazza captained the Lions as a junior and senior, and in 1985 received the prestigious NCAA Scholar-Athlete Award.

Piazza continued to fence for the next seven years, much of it on a limited basis while attending medical school. She was a member of the 1985 U.S. World Championship Team and was the first alternate for the U.S. team at the 1988 Olympics.

She received her M.D. from Weill-Medical College of Cornell in 1991. Following an internship and residency at New York Hospital-Payne Whitney Clinic, she received a fellowship in psychopharmacology and went into private practice in Manhattan as a psychiatrist.



### NICOLE ROSS '13

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2023

After watching the movie *The Princess Bride*, at the age of nine, Nicole Ross signed up for her first fencing class, picked up her first foil, and the rest is history. A native of the Upper West Side in Manhattan, Ross stayed in her backyard to help Columbia's fencing program remain among the most dominant in the country and became a collegiate and national star.

Ross is just the second woman to achieve All-America status three times with the Lions, highlighted by a 2010 individual NCAA Women's Foil Championship.

As a first-year, Ross boasted a 44-5 record, was a first-team All-Ivy League selection and took third place at the NCAA Championships to pick up her first All-America nod. Ross followed that up with a solid sophomore campaign that saw her win gold at the IFA Championships, secure another first-team All-Ivy League nod and go 19-5 at the 2009 NCAA Championships for second-team All-America honors.

Ross was nearly unstoppable as a senior in 2009-10, racking up 65 regular season bout victories and winning the NCAA Northeast Regional crown to set the stage for one of the most dominant individual performances in recent NCAA Championship history.

Ross went 21-2 in the preliminary rounds and had no trouble moving on to the championship round after a 15-8 victory in the semifinals, where she faced two-time defending foil champ Doris Willette from Penn State. Fans were awaiting a bout that would come down to one or two touches, but Ross impressively earned a 15-9 decision to become the first Lion woman to win the NCAA foil title in 20 years.

On the international scene, Ross was a member of the first U.S. Women's Foil Team to win a Junior World Championship title in 2009. She went on to qualify for her first Olympic Team at the 2012 London Games and helped lead the team to three straight medals at the Senior World Championships from 2017-2019, including the team's first-ever Senior World title in 2018. In 2021, she recovered from a torn ACL to make her second Olympic appearance with the U.S. in Tokyo.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### GEORGE SANTELLI, COACH

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 1963

One of the most respected fencing masters in the world during his era, George Santelli served as the U.S. National Coach for decades and guided the Americans as Head Coach of the United States Olympic team five times. Additionally, Santelli served many years as an assistant with the Columbia Fencing program and just one year as its Head Coach in 1948-49. His name will forever be connected to Columbia Fencing.

Santelli was born in Florence, Italy, the son of Italo Santelli, a fencing master who later coached the Hungarian Olympic team and was credited with revolutionizing the teaching of saber fencing. After George won national fencing championships in Hungary and Austria in 1920s, he was subsequently named one of the sport's greatest athletes, especially for his skill with the sabre. Santelli also competed for the 1920 Italian Olympic fencing team that claimed the Gold medal. His father was such a dominant figure in the world of fencing that Santelli once said: "You know what it means to be the son of a great man. You're constantly in his orbit. You can't expand. I wanted to free myself."

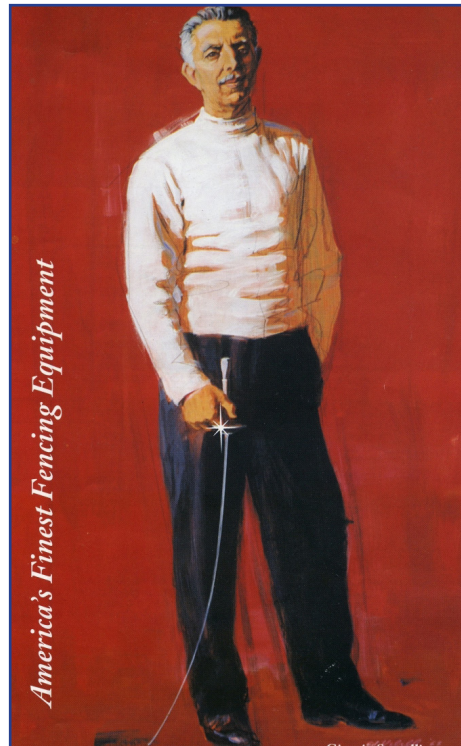
Santelli got that chance after his father was persuaded by the Royal Court of Hungary to emigrate to Budapest and teach in a subsidized academy. Italo Santelli was invited to become fencing coach at the New York Athletic Club, but instead sent his son in his place. In 1924, Santelli immigrated to the United States and with that appointment, began his coaching career. Over the years, Santelli served as the fencing master at the N.Y.A.C., the New York Fencers Club and the University Fencers Club. In the 1940's, he became an assistant coach at Columbia University, and he opened his own school, Salle Santelli, in Greenwich Village.

He also worked as the United States National Coach for decades and U.S. Olympic Coach in 1928, 1932, 1936, 1948, & 1952. From the 1940s through the 1980s, he trained many champions and a variety of prominent fencers. One of his pupils was future Columbia fencing coach George Kolombatovich.

Through his school, which moved to several sites around the city, Santelli fought racial and economic bias by encouraging black fencers and holding free classes for public high school students. He made a unique contribution by tearing down the color barrier that existed in what had been a patrician sport, inviting black fencers to his club at a time when fencing had been a segregated activity, and producing Olympians and national champions such as Uriah Jones, Ed Ballinger, and Ed Wright.

In 1934, Santelli founded and operated George Santelli Fencing Equipment, Inc., renamed in 1955 to George Santelli, Inc., the largest and most widely-known 20th-century fencing equipment company in North America.

He also tirelessly and generously promoted fencing in all aspects, including stage choreography on Broadway and providing free instruction to high school fencers. Giorgio generously supported fencing masters coming to the United States, giving them a place to teach until they established their own schools.



### DARIA SCHNEIDER '10

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2014

Daria Schneider made an impact on the strip long before she served as an assistant coach at her alma mater for four seasons.

Her contributions came immediately as she stepped on campus, as she led all Lions fencers in victories as a first-year with a 45-9 overall record. Two years later, Schneider permanently etched her name in the Lions' record book when she captured the individual NCAA sabre crown, becoming just the fifth female Columbia fencer to win an individual national title. The two-time All-American found herself on the NCAA podium again in 2009. After taking a year off to train for a spot on the 2008 United States Olympic team, Schneider claimed Bronze at the national tournament.

A three-time First Team All-Ivy League selection, Schneider was a key component of two Ivy League titles during her fencing days, including Columbia's unblemished 14-0 Ivy League season in 2006-07. A well-rounded leader, the two-time captain earned the Kestler Award in 2009 for inspiring the team and leading the way to victory. That same year, CollegeFencing360.com twice named her the National Fencer of the Week. Schneider concluded her career with the Lions with a 124-20 overall record.

Internationally, the Brookline, Mass. native made the United States Senior National Team during her senior campaign and finished 15th at the World Championships. As a five-time national team member, she won team Bronze medals in the 2011 and 2012 World Fencing Championships. She was also the U.S. Fencing national champion in 2011, and was ranked as high as second in the country and 13th in the world.

Schneider also excelled in the classroom, as the Russian literature major was a three-time Academic All-Ivy League selection.

Previously the head fencing coach at Cornell for three years, she currently serves as the Head Fencing Coach at Harvard. She was named to her post in September 2019.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### ERINN SMART '01BC

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2014 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2010

For Erinn Smart, fencing runs in the family. After participating in ballet, ice skating, tennis, and track as a youngster, Smart began fencing at the age of 11 at the Peter Westbrook Foundation. Six months later, her brother Keeth began fencing there and nearly 20 years later, both were standing atop the medal platform at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

A 2001 Barnard College graduate as an Economics major, Smart was a two-time All-American for Columbia in women's foil. Twice she reached the finals at the NCAA Championships and each time, fell just short in second place. Smart did not let that derail her fencing career as she went on to claim four United States National Championships in 1998, 2002, 2004, and 2008 and was ranked as high as No. 11 at the 2003 World Championships. She also earned a Gold Medal in team foil and individual Silver Medal at the 2007 Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro and placed 17th overall in the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, Greece. She also became the first Black female student-athlete in school history to earn All-America honors.

In 2008, she fenced for the United States women's foil team, capturing a silver medal in her second straight Olympics appearance. In that silver medal team bout, the United States team defeated Hungary, which featured three foil fencers ranked in the world's top-15. It appeared to be a daunting task for the seventh-seeded American team.

"We are usually the underdogs," Smart noted at the time, "and sometimes the big guys fall asleep on us." The Americans eventually beat the Hungarians, 35-33 on cumulative touches and six bouts to three overall. After the win over Hungary, top-ranked Russia loomed ahead for the U.S. for the gold medal. Smart defeated Evgenia Lamonova, ranked No. 10 in the world at the time, but the Russians won six straight after that bout to capture the gold medal.

A day later, Erinn watched brother Keeth bring home another silver medal while competing for the United States' men's sabre team. Erinn was one of two Columbia fencers to earn a medal at the Beijing Games, along with James Williams '07, who teamed with Keeth Smart on the U.S. men's sabre team. She also became Columbia's first-ever Black Olympic Medalist. She is also one of only four athletes and two women at Columbia to compete in three or more Olympics games.

A native of Brooklyn, N.Y. and a graduate of Brooklyn Technical High School, the 11-year-old Smart attended the Peter Westbrook Foundation's first-ever fencing class after her father read about the opportunity in the paper. Her brother enrolled about six months later. The Westbrook Foundation, a non-profit was founded by six-time Olympian Peter Westbrook to mentor inner-city kids through the sport of fencing.



### STEPHEN SOBEL '54

USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2004 | Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2010

One of the early greats in Columbia's storied fencing history, Stephen Sobel was a dominant swordsman in the 1950s, an equally accomplished lawyer, and a passionate advocate for fencing on the national stage.

A three-time All-American, Sobel was an NCAA champion in men's sabre in 1954, when he helped Columbia to a team NCAA Championship that year.

Having earned First Team All-America honors in both 1952 and 1953, Sobel's 1954 season coincided with his first year of law school, under Columbia's professional option program at the time.

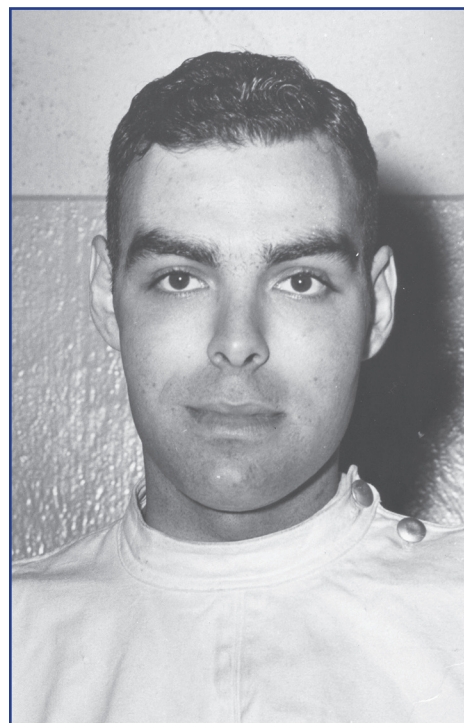
On the day he was slated to compete in the NCAA Championships, Sobel had a moot court appearance scheduled. Granted a postponement by the judge, Sobel went on to win the Gold medal, the first Columbian ever to capture the NCAA title in men's sabre. The next Monday, Sobel arrived in the moot court and was greeted by the judges with a resounding standing ovation.

Many people would give Stephen Sobel a standing ovation for his accomplishments throughout his career.

A 1956 graduate of Columbia Law School, Sobel served as a first lieutenant in the United States Air Force Judge Advocate General Department. He would later spend several years after as an attorney at New York's Hays, Sklar and Herzberg law firm.

He was President of the United States Fencing Association in the 1970s when he led the charge to allow women to compete in sabre in the Olympic Games. Thirty-six years later in Beijing, the United States women swept the sabre weapon, earning all three medals in women's sabre at the 2008 Olympics.

Sobel was heavily involved with the United States Olympic Committee in the 1980s and played a key role in the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Sobel also spearheaded the 10th Pan American Games in Indianapolis in 1987, when he served as chief of mission.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### BRUCE SORIANO '72

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2014

In just three years on the fencing strip at Columbia, Bruce Soriano not only made his mark on the Lions' fencing program, but on the national stage.

The sabre fencer became the only man to ever win the NCAA individual championship in both his sophomore and junior years when he accomplished the feat in 1971. A year later, he made history again as he captured the individual national championship crown for the third straight season to become the first collegiate fencer in history to win three NCAA individual crowns. The three-peat accomplishment is also a first for Columbia, as Soriano remains the only Lion, male or female, in school history to boast three individual NCAA Championship titles. Soriano went a combined 66-3 at his three NCAA championships for a .957 winning percentage, which remains a school-record for career NCAA Championship record. He finished a perfect 23-0 in 1971 to claim the national crown.

Soriano's fencing resume also includes back-to-back individual IFA Championships (1970, 1971). The Lions finished no lower than third place at the NCAA Championships in any of the years that Soriano fenced. Soriano also claimed the prestigious Michigan State Memorial Trophy, which goes to the yearly sabre national champion, in all three seasons of competition.

The three-time First-Team All-American was a key component to Columbia's 1971 NCAA Championship and IFA Team Championship a year later in 1972. A three-time First Team All-Ivy League honoree, Soriano led Columbia to three consecutive Ancient Eight titles (1970, 1971, and 1972).

Soriano went on to become a doctor of internal medicine. His practice is located in Metuchen, N.J., and he is affiliated with Hackensack Meridian Health JFK Medical Center.



### JEFF SPEAR '10

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2016

Behind Jeff Spear's fencer's mask hides a quintessential student-athlete, Olympian, national champion, All-American fencer, and Columbia College salutatorian.

An Evolutionary Biology of Human Species major with a 4.07 grade point average, Spear, was one of 11 Columbians and the second-youngest member of the four-person Olympic team that competed at the 2012 London Olympic Games. He is a three-time All-American, matching his tally of First Team All-Ivy League honors.

A native of Wynantskill, N.Y., Spear has fenced since the age of 12, falling in love with the tactical thrill of intense one-on-one competition.

In his first year at Columbia, he won 28 of 36 regular-season bouts, the fourth most victories of any Lions' men's fencer. Former head coach George Kolombatovich, a Columbia Athletics Hall of Famer himself, said that Spear is a "truly exceptional individual and a tremendous role model who sets the bar high, a teammate who is calm in competition and understands time management."

For his career, Spear posted a remarkable 143-46 record in sabre.

He is a two-time Intercollegiate Fencing Association Gold medalist and was awarded an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship in 2010. Of his many accolades, being the only repeat selection on the 2010 CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Men's At-Large First Team, stands out notably.

Spear remained a fierce competitor both on and off the strip throughout his career at Columbia University. In 2010, he received the NCAA Elite 88 award for fencing, which is presented to the student-athlete with the highest cumulative grade point average participating at the finals site for each of the NCAA's 88 championships. His anthropology Professor Ralph Holloway described Spear as "one of the most outstanding students I've known since I started teaching at Columbia in 1964."

Following an incredibly fruitful career as a student-athlete at Columbia University, the accolades continued to roll in for the former fencing standout. In 2011, he earned a Silver medal at the USA Fencing National Championships and was part of two Gold medal-winning teams at the 2015 Tbilisi World Cup and 2016 Warsaw World Cup.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### JOSE VELARDE, COACH

#### USA Fencing Hall of Fame, Class of 2009

In spring 2002, Columbia University's Alumni Fencing Committee acknowledged former Head Coach Jose Velarde, by honoring him at the annual Fencing Team Dinner and presenting him with a statuette of a bronze lion, inscribed with the words: "Joe Velarde, Head Coach 1949-1952, Progenitor of the Golden Age of Columbia Fencing."

Velarde served just three seasons at Columbia's Head Fencing Coach from 1949-52, but those three seasons served as the foundation for the Lions' dominance on a national scale as he guided the Lions to their first two NCAA Championships, back-to-back in 1950-51 and 1951-52.

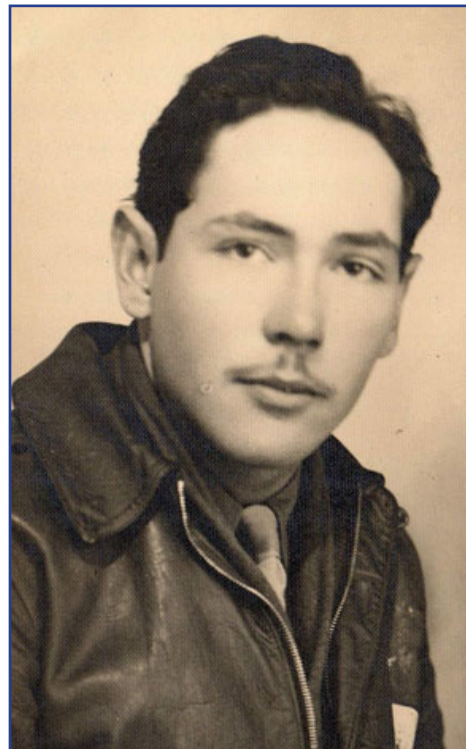
In 1949, Velarde, accepted a full-time faculty appointment and head coaching position at Columbia. In his first year, he improved Columbia's standing from a 13th place finish in the first-ever NCAA Championship in 1949 to a fifth place finish in 1950. After his first season, Velarde's teams captured the 1951 Eastern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Championship, as well as the 1951 and 1952 NCAA Three Weapon Team Championships. He also accumulated a three-year 27-11 record.

Velarde's major contribution to the sport of Fencing is widely considered by many to be the public actions that he took while coaching at Columbia University in November of 1949 at competition venues of the Amateur Fencers League of America (AFLA). His adamant refusal to accede to efforts to segregate his fencers ultimately led to the end of discriminatory practices against persons of color and brought about racial integration throughout American Fencing.

Velarde began fencing at the age of 13 at Seward Park High School and competed in the New York City's Public School Athletic League from 1936-39. He was a sophomore co-captain of Professor Joseph Smith's Brooklyn College Fencing Team when Pearl Harbor was attacked on December 7, 1941. After the attack, Velarde enlisted in the Army Air Corps and served from 1942-45 in the European Theatre of Operations, flying 60 bombing missions as a B-25 Armorer-Gunner.

When World War II ended in 1945, Velarde joined Maestro Julio (Pop) Martinez Castello's national championship fencing teams at New York University. In 1946-47, co-captained by Velarde, NYU won both the Eastern and National Collegiate Three-Weapon Team Championships. After completing a Master of Arts Degree in Education at NYU, Joe accepted a seasonal appointment as fencing coach of the U. S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y. (1947-49). His team shared First Place with Rutgers University in the 1949 NCAA Three-Weapon Team Championship.

For 25 years after his disability retirement from active military duty, he dedicated his efforts as an activist, advocate and organizer toward enhancing the quality of life and work of migrant farm workers, immigrants, refugees and other "working poor," who comprise some six million disenfranchised members of California's population. In 1991 he served as editor of The Education of Adult Migrant Farmworkers, published by the US Department of Education. In 1992, he developed a national issues policy paper, "America's Farmworkers and Their Quality of Life," at the behest of then President-elect Bill Clinton's Transition Team.



### 1950-51 COLUMBIA FENCING TEAM

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2018

No Columbia team has been as consistently successful over the years as the fencers, but the 1950-51 squad was special, even by Columbia Fencing standards.

The Lions, who had a 5-8 record during the previous year, started the season with seven victories, but second-year Coach Joe Velarde, writing in Lines on Lions, the athletic department newsletter, warned alumni not to get too carried away because the toughest part of the schedule was ahead.

And Velarde was right. The Lions did defeat Harvard and arch-rival NYU, but dropped close matches to Navy and Penn. But that was just the warm-up for the postseason and there the Lions were unbeatable, capturing seven Eastern Intercollegiate Fencing Association and NCAA championships, including the first NCAA team title ever won by Columbia in any sport.

The team was led by senior captain Bob Nielsen, who posted an incredible 27-2 regular season record before repeating as NCAA and IFA foil champion. During his Columbia career, Nielsen won 105 of his 112 bouts and was inducted into the university's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2012.

But this was no one-man show, as junior Dan Chafetz finished first at the NCAA Championships and second at the IFA in epee; junior Johnny Krajcir, who won the deciding bout in Columbia's regular-season 14-13 victory over Army and placed second in sabre at both championships, junior Al Rubin, who took fourth in foil at the IFA, and sophomore Bob Schafer, who finished fourth in sabre at the IFAs. Velarde also received strong efforts during the dual-match season from Jay Leibel in sabre and Gene Winograd and Jaromir Sevcik in epee.





## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### 1953-54 COLUMBIA FENCING TEAM

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2016

Head Coach Irv DeKoff had high expectations heading into the 1953-54 fencing campaign. And why wouldn't he? The Lions brought back 11 seniors from a squad that finished the previous year 10-2 in dual meets, so there was plenty of reason for optimism.

Leading the charge were returning All-Americans Stephen Sobel (sabre) and Irwin Bernstein (epee). Columbia also boasted strong depth in sabre with Ted Reuter, Henry Weinstein, future Columbia Athletics Hall of Famer, Barry Pariser, and Harvey Turner.

The Lions opened the season with a flourish, topping their first three opponents by a combined score of 63-18, including a 21-6 triumph over Ancient Eight rival Penn. Columbia continued to rattle off convincing victories and had its sights set on the program's first undefeated season.

Columbia's most challenging regular season test came against Cornell, but the Lions were able to hold off the Big Red, 14-13. They took their perfect 11-0 record into the Intercollegiate Fencing Association Championships after an 18-9 victory over Navy to wrap up dual-meet season.

At IFA's, Columbia rolled to the three-weapon championship, the first for the program since 1926, winning the event by 12 points. Sobel, Pariser and Reueter swept the medal stand in sabre as the Lions won each of the individual weapon portions of the competition. The Lions finished day one of NCAA's tied for first with Cornell. However, they had a subpar performance to their standards, the following day, and DeKoff was unsure of the results until the very end of the meet.

"Only at the end, when I asked Hugo Castello, NYU's coach, how many points he had, did I find out where we were," DeKoff wrote in the April 1954 edition of Lions on Lions. "He said 61. I replied that I had that too, so we concluded we tied for the title."



### 1992-23 COLUMBIA FENCING TEAM

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2023

In one of the most stunning upsets in NCAA fencing history, Columbia captured its second consecutive combined national championship by the slimmest of margins in 1993.

Despite being the defending NCAA Champions and winning both the men's and women's Ivy League crowns weeks earlier, the Lions were not the favorites to repeat in 1993. That moniker went to rivals Penn State, who finished second to the Lions a year prior.

The Nittany Lions had a seemingly insurmountable lead heading into the men's sabre portion of the event when Columbia began to rally.

First-year Ray Wong broke a pair of ties against Penn and Penn State to lead the sabre squad to key wins to close the gap to 300 points.

Still, the Lions needed help - and got it - from none other than the Penn Quakers, who knocked off Penn State in men's epee to open the door for Columbia to remain in the hunt.

As Captain Ann Marsh told the Columbia Spectator after the event, "Reports of our death were greatly exaggerated."

The Lions then showed a flair for the dramatic, coming from behind on seven occasions, including the clincher from junior Ben Scott, who was down 4-2 but rattled off the final three touches to give Columbia the lead for good by 25 points - the minimum differential during that format of the NCAA Championships.

Individually, Ben Atkins won the national title in epee, becoming just the second fencer to win NCAA crowns in two different weapons in his career after taking first in foil two years prior. Marsh also shined at NCAA's, earning a bronze medal to claim All-America honors for the third time. Also picking up All-America accolades were Dan Charlick, Marc Paves, Steve Kovacs and Herby Raynoud after standout performances.







## COLUMBIA FENCING HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

### 1987-88 COLUMBIA FENCING TEAM

#### Columbia Athletics Hall of Fame, Class of 2012

The 1987-88 Columbia men's fencing team had one of the most successful collegiate fencing seasons in program history.

Under the direction of co-head coaches George Kolombatovich and Aladar Kogler, and assistant coach Joel Glucksman, the 1988 team saw enormous success, fencing their way to a second consecutive NCAA Championship, an Intercollegiate Fencing Association Championship and an Ivy League Championship.

The Lions finished the 1987-88 season with a perfect 13-0 mark, including an unbeaten 5-0 Ivy League record, to win Columbia's third consecutive Ivy League title. As defending champions, all eyes were on Columbia at the 1988 NCAA Fencing Championships. On the first day of competition, March Kent won the individual foil, starting the Lions off on the right foot.

Bob Cottingham followed suit on the second day of competition with an individual sabre title. On the final day of competition, Jon Normile won the individual epee with a 10-2 victory over Notre Dame's Todd Friffey to complete a sweep of the individual crowns for the Lions. Columbia finished with a perfect 90 points. It was the first time in 27 years that one school won all three events at the NCAA Championships.

Individually, the three NCAA Champions—Cottingham, Kent, and Normile—were named NCAA Fencers of the Year and earned All-America status. Columbia added three more to the All-American team, with Chris Reohr (Men's sabre), Bill Mindel (Men's foil), and Marc Oshima (Men's epee) earning the distinction. Cottingham and Ivan Fernandez-Madrid (Men's Foil) were also IFA Individual Champions that season.

In the Ivy League, the Lions claimed six of the First Team All-Ivy League spots. In the foil competition, Bill Mindel earned his fourth First Team selection after dueling his way to an impressive 12-3 mark. Kent (11-4) and Fernandez-Madrid (10-5) represented Columbia foil as second team All-Ivy League picks.

The epee team was led by Jon Normile, a First Team All-Ivy League selection, who finished with a 13-2 record against conference foes. Marc Oshima was also named to the epee first team.

Columbia swept all three of the sabre All-Ivy League first team selections. Cottingham garnered his fourth selection with a perfect 12-0 mark to lead the honorees. Reohr and Jon Abbey also earned First Team honors with 14-1 and 12-3 records respectively.

The Lions defeated 12 of their 13 opponents by double digits. The closest bout of the season was versus Penn State, which Columbia won 15-12.

# NEW YORK CITY'S FENCING RIVALRY

## COLUMBIA VS. NYU SERIES

Each year, team winners of the Columbia-NYU Fencing matchup earn rights to two respective trophies: Irving Martin Preschel men's fencing trophy and the Katy Bilodeau '87CC women's trophy. The Preschel Trophy dates back to 1945 and is named in honor of Preschel, a former manager and member of the NYU fencing team who was killed in action at Heidelberg, Germany on March 30, 1945. Bilodeau was a four-time All-American, two-time NCAA foil champion (1985 and 1987), two-time Olympian (1988 and 1992), and was named NCAA Athlete of the Decade for the 1980s.
