

All HBU football games can be heard live through the Legacy Sports Network and can be accessed on HBUHuskies.com. Live statistics are also available for every home game.



Lonnie King is in his second year as the playby-play voice for HBU football and also serves as the play-by-play voice for Huskies basketball. He is in his sixth year with Legacy Sports Network, and has been broadcasting Houston-area sports for 12 years.

Prior to his work with HBU, King provided play-by-play for LSN's production of high school football broadcasts on Comcast Sportsnet Houston. He has also worked LSN productions for Fox Sports Houston and Fox Sports Southwest of HBU, San Jacinto College and high school sports. He has also previously done work for UIL Radio state tournament broadcasts and ISP/ IMG on their University of Houston baseball, Notre Dame University baseball and University of

Washington women's basketball broadcasts. King and his wife, Dawn, have three children: Sarah, Tyler and Hunter. Working Credentials: Requests for press credentials should be directed to the Houston Baptist University Media Relations office and received no less than 48 hours prior to the contest. Upon acceptance of application, the appropriate passes will be held for pickup at the HBU Stadium ticket booth. All working press members will be seated in the press box only as space allows. Seating is not first-come, first-served – outlets that regularly cover HBU Football will be given priority.

Radio Broadcasts: Application for broadcasting permission must be made in writing to the HBU Media Relations office at least one week prior to the game and is available on a reciprocal basis. Seating will be provided for no more than four people. Any station other than the designated official station of each visiting school will be charged a \$100 rights fee.

Player Interviews: All requests for player interviews, either in person or by phone, must be arranged no less than 24 hours in advance through the HBU Media Relations office. No player interviews will be granted from Thursday afternoon through Saturday until after the contest. HBU players will be available after games following a brief cooling-off period.

Coach Interviews: Head coach Shealy will meet with the media in the designated media area after each game, following a short post-game meeting with the team. Please contact HBU Director of Media Relations Russ Reneau for Coach Shealy's availability during the week.

Head Coach Second Year at HBU Record at HBU: First Official Season Career Record (4 Years): 27-14-1 Alma Mater: Richmond, 1984; M.E. - Baylor, 1986

Vic Shealy was named the first head football coach in Houston Baptist University history on April 9, 2012. Shealy won an NAIA national championship while head coach at Azusa Pacific University, and served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of Kansas in 2010 and 2011.

With two-and-a-half years on campus already under his belt, Shealy will lead HBU as it enters its first official season of NCAA FCS and Southland Conference football this fall. The Huskies will also open their new on-campus stadium during the 2014 season.

In 2013, the Huskies took the field for the first time, playing a seven-game developmental season and going 3-4 (record does not count toward Shealy's career total). HBU saw several bright spots in its first campaign, averaging 24.4 points per game with a balanced attack of 165.9 rushing yards per game and 161.3 passing yards per game. Running back B.J. Kelly, defensive back Taylor Thompson, and punter David Dunkin each earned national recognition.

In addition to serving as head coach at Azusa Pacific, Shealy was an assistant at Kansas, Richmond, UNLV, Air Force, Austin Peay State, Mars Hill College and a graduate assistant at Baylor.

Shealy served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach at Kansas last season and was the secondary coach for the Jayhawks in 2010. He was the defensive coordinator at Richmond in 2009 and at Austin Peay in 1994. At UNLV, he was the assistant head coach from 2005-08, after serving as secondary coach at Air Force from 1999-2004. Shealy was also assistant head coach at Austin Peay from 1988-89.

Shealy was the head coach at Azusa Pacific from 1995-98, leading the Cougars to the NAIA national championship in his final season. He posted an overall record of 27-14-1 at Azusa Pacific, including a 12-2 record during the championship run. His first team went 4-4-1, followed by a 7-3 season in 1996, the program's first winning season in seven years. Shealy was named NAIA Coach of the Year and the Shutt National Coach of the Year in 1998.

While at Richmond, the Spiders were ranked No. 1 nationally for seven weeks and ranked ninth in scoring defense en route to an 11-2 season. Shealy helped Air Force to a pair of bowl appearances in the Silicon Valley Bowl in 2000 and the San Francisco Bowl in 2002. He also appeared with Baylor in the Liberty Bowl in 1985 and has seen six of his former players go on to careers in the National Football League.





Shealy earned a Bachelor of Science in physical education from Richmond in 1984, then a Master of Education in physical education from Baylor in 1986. He was born in Nashville, Tenn., but grew up in South Carolina and graduated from Auburn High School in Auburn, Ala. He initially attended Liberty University, where he played quarterback, before transferring to Richmond and serving on his father's staff as a coach. His father, Dal, was the head coach at Mars Hill in 1969, at Carson-Newman from 1970-73 and at Richmond from 1980-88, compiling a 79-74 record. Dal also had stints as an assistant at Baylor, Tennessee and Auburn from 1974-1978.

Shealy and his wife, Holly, have four children: Dal, Jake, Will, and Kate.

SCOTT SMITH

Associate Head Coach - Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Baylor, 1981; M.S., 1982

Scott Smith was named associate head coach, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at HBU on Dec. 5, 2012.

Smith was a four-year letterwinner at Baylor from 1977-81. During his freshman season, he went 3-0 as a quarterback, then redshirted the following year. He played strong safety from 1979-81 as the Bears appeared in the 1979 Peach Bowl, then won the 1980 Southwest Conference championship and appeared in the 1981 Cotton Bowl.

After he graduated from Baylor, Smith's coaching career began at Howard Payne University in 1981, then he coached the defensive backs at North Texas in 1982. From 1983-84, he coached the secondary at his alma mater, Highland Park High School, where he was captain of the football and baseball teams and was an all-district, all-metro and all-Greater Dallas quarterback in 1977. He took his first head coaching position at Garland High School in 1985 and was named District 9-5A and Dallas-Ft. Worth Coach of the Year in 1987.

Smith then returned to the college ranks, coaching wide receivers then running backs at SMU from 1988-89, the secondary at Baylor from 1990-92 and the linebackers at Arkansas in 1993. Baylor's secondary was ranked 16th in the nation in 1990 and 23rd in 1992. He became athletic director and head coach at Duncanville High School, then at Highland Park, where he posted a 35-7 record from 1996-98 and made three-straight playoff appearances.





Smith's second stint at Baylor was from 1999-2002, when he held the position of assistant head coach and also coached the special teams and tight ends. He was head coach at Odessa Permian from 2003-04 and has been the head coach at Rockwall High School for the last seven years, making three playoff appearances.

Smith earned a Bachelor of Science degree in education from Baylor in 1981, then a Master of Science degree in education in 1982. He and his wife, Kelly, have two sons, Shea and Braden.



SHANNON KELLEY

Assistant Head Coach - Running Backs Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Texas, 1989

Shannon Kelley, a Houston native, serves as assistant head coach, primarily working with the running backs, and joined the HBU staff on May 11, 2012.

After several years as a successful partner in an investment firm and real estate developer in Houston, Kelley chased his dream of becoming a college football coach and landed as the quarterbacks coach at Fairmont State University, in his wife's hometown of Fairmont, W.Va. He coached the Fighting Falcons during the 2009 and 2010 seasons, while also spearheading fundraising efforts for the athletic department. Quarterback Logan Moore threw for 1,874 yards and 18 touchdowns, while rushing for 352 yards and five touchdowns in 2010 to earn West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Offensive Freshman of the Year honors.


Kelley most recently coached at California (Pa.) University, where he was the director of athletic fund raising and the running backs coach. Last season, junior running back Lamont Smith earned all-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Western Division honors for the Vulcans, rushing for 1,113 yards and five touchdowns and catching 33 passes for 275 yards and three touchdowns.

Kelley played football at the University of Texas from 1984-88, lettering as a junior and senior. The Longhorns made three bowl appearances during his career, including a victory in the Blue Bonnet Bowl over Pitt. He graduated from Texas in 1989 with a degree in communications, then earned a master's degree in business administration from the University of St. Thomas in Houston.

Kelley and his wife, Mary Lou, are the proud parents of four daughters: Shayla, McKenna, Skyla, and Emma.







Roger Hinshaw

Assistant Coach Co-Defensive Coordinator/Safeties (Recruiting Coordinator) Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Appalachian State, 1972; M.S., 1974

Roger Hinshaw, who heavily recruited the Houston area as an assistant at Rice and Lamar, joined the HBU coaching staff as co-defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator on May 1, 2012.

Hinshaw, who will work with the defensive line and defensive front for the Huskies, was the defensive coordinator at Lamar in 2010, after one season director of operations at Duke. He served as an assistant coach under Ken Hatfield for 23 years at Air Force (1983), Arkansas (1984-89), Clemson (1990-93) and Rice (1994-2005) with a combined record of 138-101-3, 10 bowl appearances and four conference championships.

While coaching the defensive backs at Rice in 11 of his 12 seasons, Hinshaw saw six players earn all-conference honors seven times. In 1990, the Clemson defense ranked first in the country in total defense and outside linebacker Levon Kirkland was a finalist for the Butkus Award and the following season, the Tigers ranked fourth in total defense and Kirkland earned All-America accolades. During four of his six years at Arkansas, the Razorbacks ranked among the top 20 in total defense.

Hinshaw earned a Bachelor of Science in health and physical education from Appalachian State in 1972 and was a graduate assistant for the Mountaineers while earning his Master of Science in physical education in 1974. He began his coaching career at Watauga High School in Boone, N.C., then moved to Georgia were he was an assistant coach at Newton County High School (1975-77) and Newnan High School (1978). Hinshaw moved to Alabama and was the secondary coach for one year, then the defensive coordinator for three years at the University of West Alabama.

Hinshaw and his wife, Lynn, have three daughters, Beth, Lindsey and Jamie, and two sons-in-law, Ryan and Dane.







BRENT VIESELMEYER

Assistant Coach Co-Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Concordia (Wis.), 1999; M.A. - Univ. of Phoenix, 2005

Brent Vieselmeyer joined the HBU staff on Jan. 16, 2013 and will serve as co-defensive coorinator and linebackers coach during the Huskies' inaugural season.

Vieselmeyer was the head coach at Valor Christian High School in Highlands Ranch, Colo., since March 2007, when he started the program from scratch. He compiled a 55-12 record, leading the Eagles to fourstraight state championships in 2009 (3A), 2010 (4A), 2011 (4A) and 2012 (5A). He was named Denver Post Colorado Coach of the Year in 2009, 2010 and 2011 and was All Sport Jefferson County Coach of the Year in 2010.

Vieselmeyer brings 13 years of coaching experience to the Huskies' staff, beginning his career at Orange Lutheran High School in Orange, Calif., where he spent eight years as defensive coordinator. The Lancers won the 2006 California state and CIF Southern Section state titles. They also won the 2004 CIF Southern Section championship and were finalist in 2000, 2001 and 2003. During his career, he has seen 31 of his student-athletes earn college football scholarships.

He played linebacker at University of Redlands in Redlands, Calif., and Concordia University in Mequon, Wis., earning a Bachelor of Arts in education from Concordia in 1999, and a Master of Arts in educational administration from University of Phoenix in 2005.

He and his wife, Marnie, have two daughters, Payton and Quinn.





AARON FLETCHER



Assistant Coach Cornerbacks/Nickels Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Texas A&M-Commerce, 2003

Aaron Fletcher serves as assistant coach, specifically working with the cornerbacks and nickel backs, and joined HBU on July 12, 2012.

In 2011, Fletcher served as assistant head football coach and defensive coordinator at David W. Carter High School in Dallas after a stint at DeSoto High School as secondary coach. He was the secondary coach at Lancaster High School from 2006-11 and was also the assistant track and field coach from 2006-09. Fletcher began his coaching career as an assistant at Lyndon B. Johnson High School in Austin.

Fletcher received his degree in health education from Texas A&M-Commerce in 2003 and played one season for the Lions in 1997. BURL JORDAN

Assistant Coach Defensive Line Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: Texas A&M, 2009; M.E. - Sam Houston State, 2012

Burl Jordan joined HBU on Aug. 15, 2012, as the Huskies' defensive line coach.

Jordan spent two seasons as a graduate assistant at Sam Houston State. In 2011, he helped guide the Bearkats to an 14-1 finish, including an undefeated regular season, the Southland Conference championship and a berth in the FCS Championship game. Sam Houston State had the top-ranked defense in the Southland, ranked No. 1 nationally in rushing defense, scoring defense and first down defense and No. 2 nationally in total defense, pass efficiency defense and turnover margin. In 2010, the Bearkats' defense was the top-ranked unit in the Southland and ranked seventh nationally in rushing defense. They also tied the school and Southland record with 12 sacks in a single game.

Assistant Coach Receivers Second Year at HBU Alma Mater: UCF, 2006

Jeff Love joined HBU on Aug. 8, 2012, and serves as assistant coach, working primarily with the wide receivers.

Love spent 2011 as the secondary coach and recruiting coordinator at Occidental College in Los Angeles. The Tigers led the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in turnovers created, interceptions, red zone interceptions and fumbles recovered, while cornerback Ayrton Bates earned first-team all-conference honors under Love's guidance.







a model of innovation, stability and consistent achievement as it celebrates the academic and athletic accomplishments of its member institutions.

Having commemorated its 50th anniversary in 2013, the Southland Conference has transformed itself into a dynamic and respected consortium of 13 member universities in three states. Beginning with a historic meeting of five institutions in Dallas on March 15, 1963, the Southland Conference set on an extraordinary course that has proven successful well into its five decades of existence.

The successful transformation continues, as the Southland Conference welcomed four additional members in 2013: Abilene Christian University, Houston Baptist University, the University of Incarnate Word in San Antonio, and the University of New Orleans.

In addition to its newest members, the Southland also consists of the University of Central Arkansas, Lamar University, McNeese State University, Nicholls State University, Northwestern State University, Sam Houston State University, Southeastern Louisiana University, Stephen F. Austin State University and Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.

An original Southland member from 1963-73, Abilene Christian rejoined the league as one of the most decorated athletic programs in NCAA history, and the addition of HBU, UIW and New Orleans gives the Southland a regular competitive presence in the key metropolitan areas of Houston, San Antonio and New Orleans. Southland cities encompass approximately 14 million people, and six of its television markets rank among the top 100 in the U.S.

All told, the membership of the Southland encompasses nearly 140,000 current students and an alumni base of nearly 800,000. Famous alums from current Southland Conference schools include former CBS news anchor Dan Rather (Sam Houston State), NBA executive Joe Dumars (McNeese State), ABC news anchor Robin Roberts (Southeastern Louisiana), Major League Baseball star Wade Miley (Southeastern Louisiana), NBA legend Scottie Pippen (Central

Arkansas), and track and field Olympians Kenta Bell (Northwestern State), and Bobby Morrow and Billy Olson (both Abilene Christian).

Other notable alums from current members include Grammy Award-winning musicians Frank Ocean (New Orleans), Don Henley and Rodney Crowell (both Stephen F. Austin), and Ronnie Dunn (Abilene Christian), television personality and actress Ellen DeGeneres (New Orleans), current NFL standouts Lardarius Webb (Nicholls State), Terrence McGee (Northwestern State), and Daniel Manning (Abilene Christian), professional golfers Shawn Stefani and Chris Stroud (both Lamar) and Colin Montgomerie (HBU), award-winning filmmaker Richard Linklater (Sam Houston State), American Idol winner Kris Allen (Central Arkansas), NFL Hall of Famer Jackie Harris (Northwestern State), former NFL standouts Bobby Hebert (Northwestern State), Gary Barbaro (Nicholls State), Wilbert Montgomery (Abilene Christian) and Gary Reasons (Northwestern State), former MLB stars Darryl Hamilton (Nicholls State) and Kevin Millar (Lamar), NCAA football coach Charlie Strong (Central Arkansas), actors John Larroquette (New Orleans), Ricardo Chavira (UIW) and Jesse Borrego (UIW), and the late NFL coaching legend O.A. "Bum" Phillips (Lamar and Stephen F. Austin).

The Southland sponsors 17 championship sports, all at the NCAA Division I level. The eight men's sports include baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field. The women compete for nine championships in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball. The conference earns automatic qualification to NCAA championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's golf, women's soccer, softball, men's and women's and women's tennis, and volleyball.

Continuing its tradition of innovation, the league launched the Southland Conference Television Network in the fall of 2008 and has broadcast more than 160 events. The network has expanded its reach to roughly 13 million households throughout Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma in recent years, and has also gained national viewership through ESPN3 and Fox College Sports. In its first six years, the network has received recognition for its work, earning numerous College Sports Media and Telly Awards.

The Southland Conference, in conjunction with the city of Frisco, Texas, and Hunt Sports Group, also serves as the host to the NCAA Division I Football Championship Game in Frisco, which has been home to the conference headquarters since 2006. The game is played at Frisco's Toyota Stadium, and after a successful three-year run, the partnership was rewarded with a three-year renewal to serve as the national championship host site through the 2015 season.

Southland Conference football ranks among the best Football Championship Subdivision leagues in the nation, and enjoys an annual expectation of competing for the national championship with multiple teams advancing to the NCAA playoffs each year. In 2013, three Southland teams – Southeastern Louisiana, McNeese State and Sam Houston State – all qualified for the NCAA Division I Football Championship, and in 2011 and 2012, Sam Houston advanced to the national championship game. Also, in 2002 and 2003, McNeese State finished the regular season ranked No. 1 in the nation, and advanced to the 2002 national championship games since the league joined the FCS (formerly I-AA) in 1982. All told, Southland teams have played in 109 Division I playoff games in 32 years, winning 53 of the contests.

Historically, the Southland's successful football heritage has sustained itself through numerous membership and classification changes. The Southland joined the NCAA College Division in 1964, and was designated as NCAA Division II in 1973 before joining Division I in 1975. The Southland was an NCAA Division I-A league from 1978-81, before joining the ranks of FCS in 1982, its home ever since.

During its tenure as a Division I and I-A conference, the Southland Conference initiated the startup of the Shreveport, La.-based Independence Bowl in 1976. The Southland representative served as the host team of the bowl until 1980, compiling a 2-3 record in those contests.

The Conference can lay claim to five national championships, including College Division championships through former members Arkansas State (1970, UPI) and Louisiana Tech (1972, National Football Foundation). Louisiana Tech also won the first NCAA-sanctioned national title, winning the Division II playoffs in 1973. Tech followed that with the UPI's Division II national championship in 1974. Louisiana-Monroe won the 1987 Division I-AA national championship.

McNeese State, which has made 15 appearances in the national playoffs, also played in the 1997 NCAA Division I Championship game, while Stephen F. Austin played in the 1989 title contest and has six playoff appearances, including 2009 and 2010. Sam Houston State has earned seven trips to the football, while North-western State has played in the playoffs six times. Nicholls State has participated three times in the playoffs, and Central Arkansas has made consecutive playoff appearances in 2011 and 2012. On five occasions, the Southland has placed three teams in the NCAA playoffs.

The Southland has produced 172 first-team football All-Americans during its history and in 2010, Stephen F. Austin quarterback Jeremy Moses became the

first player in Southland history to receive the Walter Payton Award, which is presented annually to the most outstanding football player at the FCS level.

The Southland is one of five FCS conferences with at least 200 selections (206) in the National Football League draft. There have been 26 Southland players taken in the draft since 2000, including Southeastern Louisiana defensive back Robert Alford, who was picked as the first FCS player in the second round of the 2013 draft. There are over 20 former Southland players on NFL rosters heading into the 2014 season.

Southland Conference alums in the NFL include Buffalo's Terrence McGee (Northwestern State) and Chicago's Josh McCown (Sam Houston State), who have each been in the league for the last 11 seasons. Other recent NFL additions from the Southland include Green Bay's Kevin Hughes (Southeastern Louisiana), St. Louis' Jabara Williams (Stephen F. Austin) Washington's Devin Holland (Mc-Neese State), Atlanta's Marcus Jackson (Lamar), Cleveland's Dominique Croom (Central Arkansas) and New Orleans' Tim Flanders (Sam Houston State).

The Southland has seen former Nicholls State players win Super Bowl rings in recent seasons, as former Colonel Antonio Robinson was a member of the Green Bay Packers' Super Bowl XLV champions. And, Nicholls-ex Lardarius Webb was a member of the Super Bowl XLVII champion Baltimore Ravens.

Among the former NFL stars from the Southland include Fred Dean, who was inducted to the Professional Football Hall of Fame in 2008 to become the first former Southland Conference player to earn induction in Canton. Other great NFL players from the Southland include Super Bowl XXIX quarterback Stan Humphries, Bill Bergey, Mike Barber, Fred Barnett, Bubby Brister, Ray Brown, Roger Carr, Larry Centers, Bruce Collie, Jackie Harris, Buford Jordan, Tim McKyer, Kavika Pittman, Billy Ryckman, Rickey Sanders, Eugene Seale, Rafael Septien, Terrance Shaw, Leonard Smith, Marcus Spears, Pat Tilley and Marvin Upshaw. Both Dean and Smith are recent inductees to the College Football Hall of Fame.

The Southland Conference has also seen its share of great coaches during its history in Maxie Lambright, Ernie Duplechin, Sam Goodwin, Jack Doland, Bennie Ellender, Bobby Keasler, Larry Lacewell, Bill Davidson, Dennis Franchione, Pat Collins, and Ron Randleman.

The Southland Conference has repeatedly demonstrated its commitment to the academic and athletic success of its student-athletes. With the F.L. McDonald Postgraduate Scholarship Award, the league annually honors one male and one female scholar-athlete with a stipend for postgraduate study. The Scholar-Athlete Award is given to each institution's male and female student-athlete with the highest grade-point average. Also, student-athletes with grade-point averages above 3.0 are honored on the Southland's annual All-Academic teams and Commissioner's Honor Roll. A total of 856 student-athletes appeared on the honor roll following the 2013 spring semester, and total of 1,553 student-athletes earned a spot on the honor roll at the end of the fall and spring semesters during the 2012-13 academic year.

While successful on the fields and courts, the Southland Conference has repeatedly demonstrated its commitment to the academic and athletic success of its student-athletes.



2013 Game Recaps

GAME 1 + Aug. 30

Sam Houston State 74, HBU 0

HUNTSVILLE, Texas – It was not the beginning HBU was hoping for, but it was a beginning nonetheless and Huskies football is now a reality.

Fourth-ranked and national runner-up the past two seasons Sam Houston State handed HBU a 74-0 defeat in the Huskies' first game in program history Saturday night at Bowers Stadium.

Freshman running back B.J. Kelly gained 53 yards on 13 attempts for the Huskies (0-1), while freshman quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 6-of-15 passes for 33 yards and an interception. Sophomore wide receiver Trey Sudds caught one pass for 20 yards, while freshman Wesley Lewis caught two for 15 yards. Freshman safety Cody Moncure led HBU with 11 tackles, while Taylor Thompson added nine and Terrell Brown and Garrett Dolan had seven each.

Sam Houston State piled up 370 yards on the ground for the game. Steven Hicks rushed 17 times for 99 yards and a touchdown, while Richard Sincere had three carries for 64 yards for the Bearkats (1-0). Tim Flanders rushed nine times for 52 yards and a score, while Cory Idlebird had six carries for 51 yards. Brian Bell completed 5-of-9 passes for 90 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Torrance Williams made two receptions for 72 yards and a touchdown for the Bearkats.

In the first quarter, SHSU opened the scoring as Flanders scored a four-yard touchdown with 11:27 left. Keshawn Hill added a four-yard touchdown run of his own to put the Bearkats ahead, 14-0, with 8:58 to go. Bell hooked up with Torrance Williams for a 66-yard touchdown pass with 6:19 left.

The Bearkats went up 28-0 when Josh Lyons made an eight-yard reception out of the backfield for a score with 13:12 left in the second quarter. Shelby Davis intercepted a pass by Fleming and returned it 48 yards for a touchdown to give SHSU a 35-0 lead with 11:38 remaining in the half. Bell kept the ball on an option and ran two yards to put the Bearkats ahead, 42-0, with 6:28 to go. Steven Hicks scored on a rush from four yards out as SHSU took a 49-0 lead at the half.

SHSU got on the board in the second half on Luc Swimberghe's 48-yard field goal to take a 52-0 lead with 10:44 left. The Bearkats quickly scored again when Tristan Eche intercepted a Baker pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown. Don King III added a three-yard run for a score with 4:03 remaining. The Bearkats added a safety and Cory Idlebird had a three-yard touchdown run with 3:58 to go in the game.

GAME 2 • Sept. 14

HBU 52, Wayland Baptist 28

PLAINVIEW, Texas – After a back-and-forth first half that saw the score tied at the break, HBU scored 24 unanswered points and shut out Wayland Baptist in the second half for a 52-28 victory Saturday night at Greg Sherwood Memorial Bulldog Stadium. The win marks the first in this inaugural season for Huskies football.

B.J. Kelly had 26 carries for 182 yards and a touchdown as the Huskies (1-1) piled up 347 total yards on the ground. Craig Bell Jr. rushed 14 times for 87 yards and three touch downs to help HBU average more than six yards per carry.

Quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 16-of-23 passes for 262 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Running back Tanner Peavy also added a TD pass to Wesley Lewis on a trick play. Junior Darian Lazard had seven receptions for 118 yards and a touchdown, while Terrance Hawkins also caught a touchdown pass.

Kendall Roberson led the Pioneers (0-2) with 138 yards on 21 carries and two touchdowns, but was held to only 15 yards in the second half. Braden Hudson completed 8-of-16 passes for 61 yards and a touchdown. Brendan Pegg made four catches for 55 yards and a score.

HBU piled up 626 yards of total offense, dominating time of possession, 40:34-19:26. WBU had 274 yards of total offense.

HBU got the ball to open the second half, and Kelly piled up 40 yards on the drive, while Lazard caught a 20-yard pass to get the Huskies to the 15. The drive stalled out, and HBU settled for a Travis Shinn 32-yard field goal to take a 31-28 lead.

The Huskies forced a three-and-out after Kafo Tuha batted a pass back to Hudson, which resulted in a seven-yard loss, but Higgs flipped the field with a 68-yard punt. After a short gain by Kelly, Baker found a wide-open Lazard down the right sideline for a 70-yard touchdown reception to put HBU ahead, 38-28, with 2:00 left in the third quarter.

HBU forced another three-and-out, then Hawkins forced a fumble on the punt, which the Huskies recovered at the WBU 20 with 36 seconds to go in the third. On third-and-15, Baker found Kwadré Wilson for a 21-yard gain to the WBU four. On the next play, Bell found the endzone for the third time to put HBU ahead, 45-28, with 13:37 remaining in the game.

Kelly capped the scoring and his huge day with a five-yard touchdown run with 3:31 to go on the clock.

HBU 34, Oklahoma Baptist 3

HOUSTON – For the second-straight game HBU shut out its opponent in the second half, scoring three times on defense and scoring 34 unanswered points for a 34-3 victory over Oklahoma Baptist in the Huskies' first-ever home game before a crowd of 3,166 Saturday night at Strake Jesuit College Preparatory's Crusader Stadium.

Quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 16-of-27 passes for 206 yards for the Huskies (2-1). B.J. Kelly rushed for 43 yards and two touchdowns, while Craig Bell Jr. added 58 yards on the ground. Wesley Lewis made five catches for 92 yards, and Ethan Fry had five catches for 62 yards.

Cole Grauer completed 17-of-38 for 152 yards and threw four interceptions for the Bison (0-4). Jordan Barnes ran for 61 yards, while Cody Miller made three catches for 41 yards.

Baker completed a 26-yard pass for a first down to the OBU 21 on the Huskies' first drive of the second half, but Lewis fumbled, giving the Bison the ball back.

However, HBU didn't waste any time turning the tables, and Terrell Brown picked off Grauer and returned it 26 yards for touchdown to give the Huskies a 7-3 lead with 9:17 to go.

On the ensuing kickoff, Eli Oldham fumbled and HBU's Ore Bankole recovered the ball at the OBU 26. Baker completed a 20-yard pass to Lewis down to the six, then three plays later Kelly found the endzone from three yards out to put HBU ahead 14-3 with 7:29 left.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Grauer was sacked by Keith Ewing, fumbled the ball, which was picked up by Kameron Lecoq and returned 25 yards for a touchdown as HBU led, 21-3.

After the Bison got the ball back, Grauer found Derek Serowski for a 30-yard gain to the HBU 25, but on the next play, Thompson came up with his second interception of the game at the 1-yard line and returned it 24 yards to the 25.

On the Huskies' next drive, Baker's 23-yard completion to Kenneth Bibbins gave HBU a first down at the OBU 35. Bell rushed four-straight times down to the 5-yard line, then Kelly punched it in from three-yards out again as HBU went ahead, 28-3.

In the closing moments, OBU drove down to the HBU 32, but Grauer was intercepted by Garrett Dolan, who took it back 80 yards for a touchdown with seven seconds left to give the Huskies a 34-3 lead.

Abilene Christian 69, HBU 12

HOUSTON –Abilene Christian piled up 589 yards of total offense, using a balanced attack with 306 passing yards and 283 rushing yards to down HBU, 69-12, in the matchup of future Southland Conference foes in front of a crowd of 3,935 Saturday night at BBVA Compass Stadium.

HBU running back Craig Bell Jr. had 12 carries for 79 yards and a touchdown, while B.J. Kelly had 46 yards on 11 carries for the Huskies (2-2). Quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 15-of-22 passes for 80 yards and had one interception. Tight end Kenneth Bibbins made six catches for 35 yards.

Taylor Gabriel had seven catches for 174 yards and three touchdowns for ACU (4-3). Quarterback John David Baker completed 16-of-20 passes for 273 yards and four touchdowns. Adrian Duncan led the Wildcats on the ground, gaining 82 yards on 13 carries for two scores, while Darrell Cantu-Harkless had 62 rushing yards and a pair of touchdowns.

After ACU took the opening kickoff and returned it to the 34, the Wildcats churned out 62 of their 66 yards on the opening drive. Cantu-Harkless took it in from 14 yards out to give ACU a 7-0 lead with 11:22 left in the first quarter.

HBU answered back on their first possession with Kelly running for 30 yards on the Huskies' first play of the game. Baker completed 5-of-6 passes on the drive, which stalled out at the 5-yard line, but Shinn knocked through a 22-yard field goal to make the score 7-3 with 7:59 remaining in the opening frame.

The Wildcats marched down the field on the ensuing possession, with Cantu-Harkless capping off the drive again with a 1-yard run to put ACU ahead 14-3 with 4:39 to go. When the Huskies got the ball back, Ka'Darius Baker overthrew Lazard and it was intercepted by Justin Stewart, who returned it 31 yards to the HBU 36. Four plays later John David Baker hit Gabriel for a 9-yard touchdown. On the point after, ACU went for two, but it was fumbled, scooped up by Moncure and returned 98 yards to give HBU two points instead and make the score 20-5 with 21 seconds left in the quarter.

John David Baker scored on a 7-yard quarterback keeper around the left side and the Wildcats took a 27-5 lead with 10:07 remaining in the half.

Bell scored on a 32-yard run after breaking a tackle at the line of scrimmage, then outrunning the defense the rest of the way as the Huskies cut the score to 27-12 with 5:00 left on the clock.

GAME 5 + Oct. 26

Incarnate Word 24, HBU 3

SAN ANTONIO – Incarnate Word running back Junior Sessions rushed for 115 yards on 18 carries as the Cardinals downed HBU, 24-3, in a matchup of future Southland Conference rivals Saturday night at Benson Stadium.

HBU quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 16-of-33 passes for 175 yards and had one pass intercepted. Junior tight end Kenneth Bibbins made four catches for 67 yards, while junior wide receiver Darian Lazard made five receptions for 64 yards. Without leading rusher B.J. Kelly, who did not play due to an injury, the Huskies were held to only 41 yards on the ground.

UIW quarterback Tyler Brittain was 13-for-21 for 164 yards and a touchdown, with Clint Killough making five receptions for 67 yards and the score. The Cardinals totaled 197 yards rushing for the game.

HBU forced a three-and-out on UIW's first possession, but Fry muffed the ensuing punt, setting the Cardinals up at the Huskies' 32. UIW drove down to the HBU 4, but Brown sacked Brittain on third down for a 17-yard loss all the way back to the 21. Jake Wilcox followed with a 38-yard field goal to give the Cardinals a 3-0 lead.

In the second quarter, UIW went on a 10-play, 82-yard drive that was capped by Brittain's 31-yard touchdown pass to Clint Killough to put the Cardinals ahead 10-0 with 8:55 remaining in the half.

On the following drive, Baker hooked up with Lazard for a 34-yard completion into UIW territory, but the drive stalled out and the Cardinals took over at their own 12. Matt Bass's 34-yard run took UIW to the HBU 46. UIW did not run a pass play on the drive, ending with John Oglesby's 4-yard touchdown run to put the Cardinals up, 17-0.

UIW had the ball for 20:51 in the first half, gaining 245 yards, compared to 60 total yards for HBU.

The Huskies received the second-half kickoff, and Baker's 41-yard completion to Bibbins took HBU to the UIW 36. Lazard followed with a 19-yard catch, then took a handoff from Baker, dropped back and couldn't connect with Wesley Lewis in the back of the endzone. Bell ran for seven tough yards, and Baker gave HBU first-and-goal at the 3 with a keeper on an option. After two failed runs and an incompletion, HBU settled for a 19-yard field goal by Travis Shinn.

HBU 49, Texas College 7

HOUSTON – HBU freshman running back B.J. Kelly had 16 carries for 111 yards and a touchdown, while freshman safety Taylor Thompson had two interceptions, returning one for a touchdown, and a fumble recovery as the Huskies rolled past Texas College, 49-7, Saturday night at Strake Jesuit College Preparatory's Crusader Stadium.

The Huskies (3-3) totaled 269 yards on the ground for the game with Jackie Robinson Jr. rushing for 60 yards on three carries and a touchdown, Larry Day Jr. carrying 10 times for 46 yards and a pair of scores, and Craig Bell Jr. getting 11 carries for 54 yards and a touchdown.

Freshman quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 5-of-10 passes for 87 yards and a touchdown and did not have his favorite target, junior wide receiver Darian Lazard, who was out with an illness. Junior tight end Kenneth Bibbins had two catches for 25 yards, and Wesley Lewis made his second touchdown catch of the year. Even though the Huskies dominated the game, they totaled only 356 total yards in large part to starting six drives in Texas College territory.

The HBU defense allowed 238 total yards, with Texas College (1-7) rushing for 123 and passing for 115. In addition to Thompson's three takeaways, defensive end Kameron Lecoq forced and recovered a fumble. Freshman linebacker Garrett Dolan posted his third double-digit tackle effort of the season, leading the Huskies with 13, including 10 unassisted and two for losses. Terrell Brown III made nine stops, with Ore Bankole and Najee Bissoon chipping in six apiece.

Taylor Gray had 90 yards on 20 carries for the Steers, while quarterback Curtez Griffen rushed 15 times for 53 yards and a touchdown, but only netted nine yards due to the Huskies' five sacks. Ja'Marius Allen had four catches for 30 yards, and Jamaal Johnson had 48 receiving yards for Texas College.

The Huskies received the opening kickoff, ran the ball on 10-consecutive plays, and capped the four-and-half-minute drive with a four-yard touchdown run by Bell. On the drive, Kelly rushed three times for 42 yards.

On Texas College's first possession, Taylor Thompson picked off Griffen near midfield and took it back 46 yards for a touchdown to give HBU a 14-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Baker completed a 15-yard pass to Max Brown down to give the Huskies a first-and-goal, then Kelly scored on a nine-yard run to put HBU ahead, 21-0, with 3:56 remaining in the half.

Texas A&M-Commerce 55, HBU 21

HOUSTON – HBU freshman running back B.J. Kelly had 16 carries for 118 yards and a touchdown, his third 100-plus-yard game of the season, but the Huskies came up short in a 55-21 loss to Texas A&M-Commerce in the season finale on Homecoming Saturday at Strake Jesuit College Preparatory's Crusader Stadium.

Freshman quarterback Ka'Darius Baker completed 18-of-31 passes for 192 yards and a touchdown for HBU (3-4), while junior wide receiver Darian Lazard had five catches for 53 yards and freshman wide receiver Wesley Lewis had three grabs for 33 yards and a touchdown. Terrell Brown III and Garrett Dolan each had 10 tackles to lead the Huskies defensively.

Harrison Stewart hit 23-of-40 passes for 383 yards and five touchdowns, while Deric Davis hit 6-of-10 for 91 yards and a score for A&M-Commerce (7-3). Vernon Johnson made 10 catches for 180 yards, Seth Smith had six catches for 115 yards and three touchdowns, while Hayden March and Stacy Howard each caught a touchdown pass for the Lions.

The Lions received the opening kickoff and wasted no time scoring, as Stewart found Smith for a 45-yard touchdown just 56 seconds into the game. The Huskies looked to have an answer as Taylor Thompson returned the ensuing kickoff 50 yards to the A&M-Commerce 44, then freshman wide receiver made a 26-yard gain on the first play from scrimmage. Two plays later Baker fumbled and Pablo Vasquez returned it 84 yards for a touchdown to give the Lions a 14-0 lead with 12:34 to go.

After each team had a quick three-and-out, HBU got the ball back on a punt to the 19. The Huskies took a deep shot down the sideline for incompletion on first down, but Kelly ripped off a 75-yard run down to the six on second down. Larry Day took it in from six yards out to make it 14-7 with 9:38 left.


A personal foul and a fumbled snap had A&M-Commerce facing a third-and-40, but only picked up three yards, and a poor punt set the Huskies up at the Lions' 49. To cap the drive, Lewis made a one-handed basket catch for a 25-yard touchdown to tie the game at the 4:19 mark of the first quarter.

A&M-Commerce took the lead for good on an 11-play, 66-yard drive that was capped by Marsh's 12-yard touchdown catch from Stewart.

In the third quarter, Lazard's 14-yard run set up Kelly's fourth-and-goal, one-yard leap over the top for a touchdown cut the deficit to 41-21.

Compliance

The goal of the Athletics Compliance Office is to educate, monitor, and verify NCAA rules compliance with regard to each sport and component within the Athletics Department. The compliance office strives to be proactive with education along with having monitoring systems in place that are effective and user friendly. HBU compliance embraces open communication with faculty, staff, student-athletes and the community at large. It is compliance office's position that all questions and requests for rules interpretations shall be answered in a friendly and timely manner. In addition, it should be known that no rules violation is too minor to be reported. In responding to rule violations, the compliance office will determine whether the violation was incidental or intentional and to what effect the violation will have on the involved coach, student-athlete or administrator.

The compliance office maintains an open-door policy and is designed to be student-athlete friendly. The compliance office functions as an office within the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at Houston Baptist University. It is the mission of the compliance office to provide a service to HBU which is in alignment with the overall mission of the University.

Mission Statement

The HBU Athletics Compliance Office is committed to creating and fostering an atmosphere of compliance throughout the HBU community. Operating with integrity and accountability, the Athletics Compliance Office will educate, monitor and promote all aspects of rules compliance in accordance with NCAA, Great West Conference, and HBU rules and regulations.

Rules & Regulations

Effective institutional management and integrity in intercollegiate athletics through compliance with, and enforcement of, the rules and regulations of Houston Baptist University the NCAA, the Great West Conference, and the standards of fair play and appropriate conduct for student-athletes and institutional representatives.

Amateur Sportsmanship

The call to honesty, integrity, commitment, hard work and social responsibility resounds from the Department's administrators, coaches and student-athletes. Through participation in athletics, student-athletes are provided opportunities to develop essential life skills in leadership, teamwork, discipline, goal setting, respect for self and respect for others, as demonstrated both on and off the field of play.

HBU's Commitment to Rules Compliance

Houston Baptist University has made the commitment to operate and support a Division I athletics program. Along with this commitment is the pledge that the program is administered and operated with the highest level of integrity, respect and regard for all rules and regulations that govern its operation. It is every coach and staff member's responsibility to operate his/ her program in full compliance with all NCAA, Great West Conference and Institutional rules and regulations. Ignorance of these regulations cannot be used as an excuse for failure to comply.

Coaches and staff members have an affirmative duty to the following: Knowledge of all NCAA and Great West Conference regulations and policies including but not limited to, recruiting, eligibility, amateur status and sporting behavior, as well as all rules interpretations, observance of all NCAA and Conference regulations and HBU policies. Self-reporting of all known or potential violations to the Assistant Athletic Director Compliance or the Athletic Director. Full cooperation with NCAA, Conference and HBU in all investigations and provision of any of these entities with truthful and complete information concerning involvement in or knowledge of any violation of NCAA, Conference and regulations.

As a member of the NCAA, Houston Baptist University is accountable for the actions of its boosters and fans. Even the best-intentioned action on a fan's part may be a violation of NCAA rules. Please contact the HBU Athletics Compliance Office if you have any questions concerning what is permissible.

PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETES

Who is a prospective student-athlete?

A "prospective student-athlete," better know as a "recruit" or "prospect", is a student who has started classes for the ninth grade, with the exception of men's basketball which is a student who has started classes for the seventh grade. In addition, any younger student-athlete who receives any benefits from the institution would be considered a recruit.

Recruiting

Only coaches and athletic department staff may be involved in the recruiting process. Athletics representatives are prohibited from contacting a prospective student-athlete or members of his/her family by telephone, letter, e-mail, or in person for the purpose of encouraging participation in athletics at Houston Baptist University. This prohibition remains in effect even after the prospect signs a National Letter of Intent (scholarship offer). NCAA Recruiting Definitions

NCAA Recruiting Calendars

Visiting HBU

An "official visit" is a visit paid in whole or in part by the university and cannot exceed 48 hours in length. A prospect can make a total of five official visits, with a limit of only one per university.

Official Visit Checklist (link to .pdf file)

An "unofficial visit" is a visit made at the prospect's own expense. The university may provide (a) three complimentary tickets to an on-campus athletics event in which the university's team is competing and (b) transportation to view off-campus practice and competition sites within a 30-mile radius. Prospects can make as many unofficial visits as they want.

National Letter of Intent

The National Letter of Intent (NLI) is a binding agreement between a prospective student-athlete and an institution in which the institution agrees to provide a prospective student-athlete who is admitted to the institution and is eligible for financial aid under NCAA rules athletics aid for one academic year in exchange for the prospect's agreement to attend the institution for one academic year. All colleges and universities that participate in the NLI program agree to not recruit a prospective student-athlete once he/she signs an NLI with another college or university. Therefore, a prospective student-athlete who signs an NLI should no longer receive recruiting contacts and calls and is ensured an athletics scholarship for one academic year. The NLI must be accompanied by an institutional financial aid agreement. If the student-athlete does not enroll at that institution for a full academic year, he/she may be subject to specific penalties, including loss of a season of eligibility and a mandatory residence requirement.

Who is a "Representative of Athletic Interests?"

A "representative of the institution's athletics interests" or Booster can be an individual, independent agency, corporate entity or other organization

All awards must conform to NCAA regulations and must be approved by HBU.

DO NOT allow a student-athlete, his/her friends or relatives to use your telephone to make long distance calls even if it is a free call. THIS INCLUDES CELL PHONES!

DO feel free to invite an HBU team for dinner or to meet with a group of alumni in a city where they are competing. The NCAA permits student-athletes, AS A TEAM, to receive special benefits not permitted as individuals. Arrangements for such events can be made in advance with the head coach or Athletic Department.

Have contacted, in any manner, students in grades 9-12 regarding Husky athletic programs. Be assisting or to have assisted in providing benefits to enrolled student-athletes or their families. Prospects prior to enrollment as freshmen and to enrolled student-athletes during the summer and semester breaks. Stringent rules apply in these instances and written records must be kept regarding employment.

- Are or ever have been a Husky season ticket holder (NCAA bylaw 13.02.13)

- Provide gifts of any kind (e.g. birthday) or free services (airline tickets, laundry, meals in restaurants).
- Provide discounts for goods or services.
- Provide use of an automobile.
- Provide hospitality or lodging in your home.
- Provide them transportation within or outside of the campus area. (e.g. from campus to your home, from the airport to campus, to summer job, etc.)
- Entertain or contact a prospect or prospect's parents on or off campus.

DR. ROBERT B. SLOAN, JR.

University President

Dr. Robert B. Sloan Jr. is in his eighth year as President of Houston Baptist University, the third president in the school's history. He came to HBU from Baylor University, where he served as both Chancellor and President.

HBU has seen tremendous growth in Sloan's first seven years as President. Enrollment has increased, building is happening all over campus and the Huskies have moved back to NCAA Division I. This is all part of Sloan's vision to make HBU one of the premier Christian institutions in the country.

Born in Coleman, Sloan grew up in Abilene before attending Baylor and earning a bachelor of arts degree cum laude, graduating "With Distinction." In his freshman year, Sloan was a member of Baylor's baseball team. He then earned a master of divinity degree magna cum laude from Princeton Theological Seminary before conducting postbaccalaureate research in church history at the University of Bristol, England, and earned the Doktor der Theologie degree insigni cum laude from the University of Basel, Switzerland.

Before returning to Baylor to join the faculty of the Department of Religion, he taught at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and adjunctively at Hardin-Simmons University. He was the first to hold the position of chair of the George W. Truett School of Evangelism at Baylor and became founding Dean of Truett Seminary in 1993. Two years later, Sloan was named President of Baylor University. Ten years later, in 2005, Sloan was named Chancellor.


While holding a full-time academic position, Sloan served as interim pastor of more than 20 churches throughout Texas and Oklahoma. He has also authored two books, edited several and published more than 50 articles during his career.

Sloan has held memberships in many professional societies and learned organizations. He has held numerous civic positions in the Waco area and has served on the board of Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas, the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities, the Big 12 Athletic Conference Board of Directors, and the Group of 6 (six major athletic conferences). He was inducted into the Little League Hall of Excellence in 1996.

Married to the former Sue Collier, the Sloans have seven children, a daughter-in-law and three sons-in-law: Charissa, Bryan and Amy, Eraina and Bryan, Michael, Alathea and Justin, Sophia and Mac, and Paul.

STEVE MONIACI

Director of Athletics

Steve Moniaci became the director of athletics at HBU on Feb. 1, 2010 after serving as interim director since May 2009. In his role, he oversees the day-to-day operations of the athletic department and its 17 NCAA Division I sport programs. He came to HBU in January of 2007 as the associate director of athletics, after 26 years across town at Rice University.

During his four-plus years as director of athletics, HBU has successfully transitioned back to NCAA Division I, joined the Southland Conference, and started an FCS football program.


He began his tenure at Rice as the executive director for the Owl Club and director of athletic promotions. He was elevated to assistant athletic director in charge of operations in 1985, associate athletic director in 1997 and rose to the position of senior associate athletic director in 2001, a position he held until 2006.

Moniaci was the administrator at Rice directly responsible for volleyball, baseball, tennis, golf and women's soccer. During his tenure with the Owls, he played an integral role in the success of the baseball team's 11 conference championships and five College World Series appearances, including the 2003 NCAA National Championship.

He was also the administrator responsible for academic advising, sports information, marketing and athletic fund-raising, concessions and facilities maintainence. Moniaci has extensive experience in overseeing facilities renovations and construction. He oversaw renovations to historic Rice Stadium and to Rice Track to accommodate the addition of women's soccer. He also played an important role in the expansion of Rice's Reckling Park.

Moniaci graduated summa cum laude with a bachelor's degree in physical education and a minor in mathematics from Ball State University. He went on to attain his master's degree in education with an emphasis in athletic administration from Ohio University.

Moniaci and his wife, Cathy had two daughters, Alyssa and Andrea.





RON COTTRELL

Associate Director of Athletics/ Head Men's Basketball Coach

Ron Cottrell is in his sixth year as associate director of athletics after serving 16 years as director of athletics for the Huskies. Cottrell worked very closely with HBU President Robert Sloan in leading HBU's transition back to NCAA Division I.

Under Cottrell's leadership, HBU athletics became one of the premier NAIA programs in the country, winning 42 conference championships and competing in national tournaments 32 times.

Cottrell then led the Huskies back into NCAA Division I as a member of the Great West Conference, building on the successes of the past.

Under his guidance, HBU produced 96 All-America and 62 Academic All-America honorees while maintaining a graduation rate above 90 percent. Cottrell was honored by his peers as the 2001 NAIA Region Athletics Director of the Year.

Cottrell also has served Houston Baptist University as head men's basketball coach for 22 years and led his last 10 NAIA teams to national championship appearances. He recorded his 400th career victory in 2011-12 and has been named Conference Coach of the Year five times. In 2002-03, Cottrell was chosen Basketball Times National Coach of the Year after leading the Huskies to a 31-3 record and the nation's top ranking. He also was chosen as a coach for USA Basketball in 2006, helping select the U18 team that won the gold medal at the FIBA Americas Championship.

A native of Arkansas, Cottrell attended Houston's Westbury High School. After graduating from Westbury, Cottrell attended the University of Arkansas, where he served as a volunteer coach for Nolan Richardson, his mentor, while earning his degree in industrial engineering. He also served as sports director for Fayetteville, Ark., ABC affiliate KT-VP-TV. Cottrell then spent a year as an assistant coach at North Dakota State College of Science before returning to Arkansas and joining Richardson's staff as an assistant coach. During Cottrell's years as an assistant at Arkansas, the Razorbacks won two Southwest Conference championships and went to the NCAA tournament three times, culminating with the Hogs' appearance at the 1990 NCAA Final Four.

Cottrell is married to the former Jacque George, and they have two daughters: Scottlyn Rose (18) and Sydney-Anne (16). Scottlyn is a freshman at HBU and is a manager for the women's basketball team. He also serves as a deacon at Sugar Land Baptist Church.

Tom Payne enters his fourth year at HBU and his first as associate athletic director for business and operations. He has worked in a variety of capacities over the course of his 14-year career and has had the luxury of gaining valuable experience in fiscal management and planning, facility management, internal operations, project management, strategic planning, student development, fundraising, marketing and promotions, sports camps, human resource management, and coaching.

As the associate athletic director for business and operations, Payne will be responsible for oversight of all intercollegiate athletic department fiscal operations. Mary-Ellen Hall is in her seventh year as Senior Woman Administrator at HBU. Hall's duties at SWA is to coordinate and/or provide support of all woman's sports teams at HBU, attend home and away games and conference championships as appropriate to represent the department, participate in the hiring and evaluation of sports coaches, disseminate pertinent information to coaches, provide insight and information regarding women's issues and programming at all levels, as well as support for all woman's programs. Graduate Assistant


Jennifer Cadwell is entering her second season as an athletic performance graduate assistant.


