MEDIA CREDENTIALING CRITERIA

The University of Missouri's decision to issue credentials to a media outlet for the purposes of covering a Mizzou Athletics event is determined by a variety of factors. They include the following:

- Space availability
• Distribution/size of outlet: free, subscription, sale on newsstands, website traffic, etc.;
• Length of existence of the publication, amount of original copy generated, number of full-time employees of the publication and the journalistic experience of the reporter[s];
• Radio or TV station program format and audience size;
• Amount of coverage given to Mizzou through the season;
• Intention/ability to cover all 20 sports at Mizzou;
• Attendance at Mizzou media sessions, including Olympic sport opportunities;
• Professionalism, which includes but is not limited to conduct at games, press conferences, practices, on social media, etc.;
• Compliance with SEC media policy

The University of Missouri has the right to deny or revoke credentials under its own discretion.

CREDENTIAL REQUEST PROCEDURE

Mizzou Athletics will only offer single-game credentials to affiliated media at home soccer games. Media wishing to apply for a single game credential should email jmcnr9@missouri.edu, of the Mizzou Athletics Strategic Communications office, by end of day Tuesday prior to contest.

INTERVIEW POLICIES

All interviews with University of Missouri student-athletes or staff members must be arranged through the Athletics Communications office. Media are asked to never contact a player or coach directly. All post-contest interviews must be made at least 24 hours in advance through the Communications office. Interviews will be scheduled when student-athlete and staff schedules allow. Playing fields, team locker rooms and other team quarters are private team areas. Media members are not permitted in these areas.

Mun Y. Choi is the 24th president of the University of Missouri System and, as of July 2020, now serves in a dual role as chancellor of the University of Missouri.

In this new role, President Choi oversees the academic, business, and financial aspects of the four universities, as well as a health care system and statewide extension program.

In partnership with the University of Missouri Board of Curators and university leadership, President Choi introduced a new collective vision for the system in 2018: to advance the opportunities for success and well-being in Missouri, the nation and the world through transformative teaching, research, innovation, engagement and inclusion.

This effort strengthened collaboration among the four universities and created a more efficient environment. He has worked tirelessly to transform the perception and value of higher education with the university community, alumni, legislators and Missourians.

Since his arrival, MU has celebrated three consecutive years of substantial enrollment growth, the highest graduation rate in the university's history and a record 90 percent retention rate for first-year students returning their sophomore year. This fall, MU also jumped up 15 places in the U.S. News & World Report rankings.

Choi has led efforts to strategically invest in UM System research, particularly through NextGen Precision Health with the anchoring facility set to officially open in Fall 2021 on MU's campus. In addition to attracting top scientists, NextGen Precision Health has the potential to make key discoveries — with treatments for prostate, breast and pancreatic cancers, traumatic brain injuries and rare musculoskeletal diseases — as well as increase health care access for rural Missourians.

Building a climate that promotes diversity and strengthens inclusion, is another key priority for Choi. For the first time ever, the entire university community is required this fall to complete cultural competency training. The American Council of Education recently cited MU as a national example for increasing its capacity to improve campus culture. In 2020, MU had the highest percentage of Black/African American students (7.7%) among all 11 Midwest flag-

ship universities and, over the last four years, has increased its minority tenured-track faculty hires by 26 percent.

Choi strongly and continually advocates for every member of the university community to take personal responsibility for addressing discrimination when witnessing it - no matter how subtle or unintentional. The burden of raising awareness and creating a more inclusive culture falls on everyone's shoulder.

Choi came to Missouri in 2017 after nine years at the University of Connecticut where he served as a provost and executive vice president (2012-2017) and earlier as a dean of engineering (2008-2012). His 25-year career in higher education also includes serving eight years as a department head of engineering at Drexel University and six years as an assistant and associate professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

A product of and passionate champion for public higher education, he earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Illinois. He secured his master's and Ph.D. degrees in mechanical and aerospace engineering from Princeton University. His parents brought their family to the United States from South Korea when Choi was 9 years old. His parents' initial U.S. jobs making uniforms for Taekwondo students and teachers evolved into a highly successful family business. The Choi Brothers in Chicago, where Choi worked as a young man, is now run by his sisters and is one of the country's largest suppliers of martial arts uniforms. Choi is married to Suzanne Choi and they have three children.

Since her appointment in 2021, Reed-Francois has begun to transform Mizzou Athletics in every way: from department culture to the student-athlete experience; from facility enhancements to fundraising; and from community engagement to the fan experience.

Among her early accomplishments is the construction of the Stephens Indoor Practice Facility for football, the hiring of Dennis Gates as the new Whitten Family Men's Basketball Head Coach and Caroline Westrup in women's golf, dozens of enhancements to the football game-day fan experience, the implementation of Black & Gold Fridays across the state, a retooling of the Tigers' NIL program and the creation of the 24-stop Come HOME Tour which covered more than 7,500 miles.

In 2021-22, success came on the field and in the classroom for the Tigers, with the wrestling team winning the Big 12 Championship and both gymnastics and wrestling earning Top 10 finishes in the NCAA Championships, with wrestler Keegan O'Toole winning the National Championship. Football played in the Armed Forces Bowl and later secured the best recruiting class in program history, men's golf earned its first NCAA Regional bid since 2018 and softball played host to an NCAA Regional for the second-straight season.

Academically, the Tigers posted a school-record department GPA of 3.22 in Fall 2021, along with a 3.20 in Spring 2022. Mizzou posted a combined NCAA Academic Progress Rate mark of 990 with football posting its best-ever score and four programs (women's basketball, women's cross country, women's golf and women's tennis) earning perfect scores of 1,000.

The Tiger Scholarship Fund raised over \$41-million, the fourth-most productive year in TSF history and the highest production total in a year which did not contain a capital campaign.

Reed-Francois came to Mizzou after serving four years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Nevada Las Vegas. During her time with the Rebels, she completed or implemented more than \$70 million in facility upgrades, hired seven head coaches – three who earned Conference Coach of the Year honors early in their ten-

ures and oversaw the completion and opening of a \$35-million on-campus football training complex and successfully negotiated a joint-use agreement with the NFL's Las Vegas Raiders and opened the new \$2-billion Allegiant Stadium.

An adept fundraiser, Reed-Francois led a \$60-million development drive at UNLV, including an \$8-million estate gift, the largest estate gift in the school's history. Football season ticket sales and premium revenue jumped by 200 percent and 70 percent, respectively, and Reed-Francois introduced a new apparel agreement with Nike.

Prior to arriving at UNLV, Reed-Francois served as the deputy athletics director at Virginia Tech, overseeing external relations, the day-to-day operations of the department and football and as a senior associate athletics director at the University of Cincinnati. At the University of Tennessee, she became the first woman to oversee a men's basketball program in the SEC, which followed stints at California State University-Fresno, Santa Clara University, San Jose State University, the University of California Berkeley, and the University of San Francisco.

Reed-Francois earned a Bachelor's Degree from UCLA and a Juris Doctorate from the University of Arizona College of Law. She is a member of the State Bar of California and taught law classes at the University of Tennessee and at Santa Clara University. Prior to her work in college athletics, Reed-Francois worked as a legal associate for the Oakland Raiders and the NFL's Management Council.

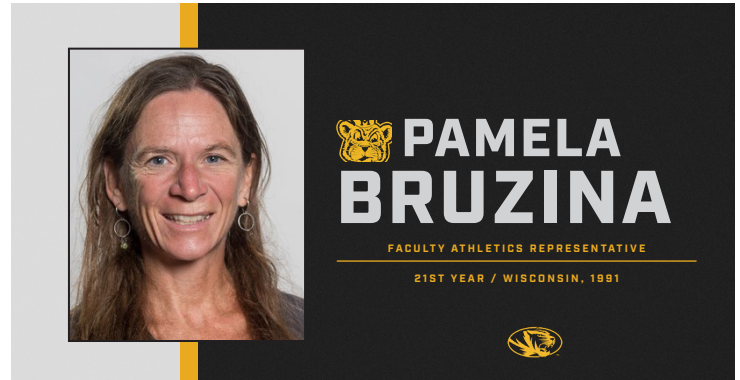
She is a board member of the National Coalition of Minority Football Coaches, recently served as vice chair of the NCAA Baseball Selection Committee and formerly was a member of the College Football Playoff Committee's operations committee. In addition, Reed-Francois is a member of the LEAD1 Association, the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators and National Association of College Directors of Athletics and has been a presenter at NACDA, NACMA, Women Leaders in College Sports, and Sports Business Journal's annual conventions. She has also participated in the Division I Athletics Directors Leadership Institute and Fellows Program and the Women Leaders in College Sports' Executive Institute.

A former rowing student-athlete at UCLA, Reed-Francois is the first female athletic director in Mizzou's history, the first female athletic director in a public institution in the SEC and was the first Hispanic female and woman of color athletics director at the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) level.

She and her husband, Josh Francois, are the parents of current men's basketball student-athlete Jackson Francois.

Dr. Pam [Hinton] Bruzina was appointed Faculty Athletics Representative by Interim Chancellor Hank Foley in May 2017.

Previously, Dr. Bruzina served as an executive member of the Intercollegiate Athletics Committee (IAC) and was the IAC Compliance Subcommittee Chair and the Student-Athlete Welfare Subcommittee Chair. Her dedication to the welfare of our student-athletes was evident during her time on the IAC.

Dr. Bruzina currently serves on the NCAA's Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sport (CSMAS), as well as the Administrative, Practice and Prevention, Drug Testing and Research CSMAS Subcommittees. In addition, she is the Division I FBS representative on the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association Executive Committee.

Pam was a student-athlete at the University of Wisconsin, which provides her with firsthand knowledge of the demands placed on student athletes. Pam was a track and cross-country student-athlete, going from walk-on to All-American. She earned a bachelor's degree, with distinction, in molecular biology; she then completed her PhD in Nutritional Sciences at Wisconsin and postdoctoral training in Maternal and Child Nutrition at Cornell University.

Dr. Bruzina joined the Department of Nutrition and Exercise Physiology at Mizzou in 2000. She is a Professor of Nutrition and Exercise Physiology, and her lab investigates the interactive effects of nutrition and physical activity on bone health.



Beginning his career as Missouri's seventh Head Wrestling Coach, Brian Smith sat down with his team and made a list of goals that he hoped would help the 1998 squad and future Tiger teams. Over the past 25 years, Smith and the many men that have come through the Mizzou wrestling program have slowly but surely checked items off that original list. Individual Big 12 and MAC Conference Champions, improved grade-point averages, record-setting attendances, a No. 1 national ranking and Missouri's first-ever NCAA National Champion in wrestling were all on Smith's "to-do" list.

Smith has checked off each task on his list except one, and he continues to take the program to unreachable heights. Since being introduced as Missouri's Head Wrestling Coach on May 5, 1998, Smith has demanded nothing but the best from himself, his coaches and his wrestlers.

During his quarter-century tenure in Columbia, the Tigers have made a remarkable turnaround. Inheriting a program that had not seen a winning record since the 1991-92 campaign, his unique "Tiger Style" training program has molded today's team into a national powerhouse that continues to pursue the program's first team NCAA title. Missouri is now continuously ranked among the top 10 in the nation.

In his time in charge, Smith has led the Tigers to 21 consecutive seasons with a dual record at or above .500, beginning with the 2001-02 season. He has also coached 29 All-Americans to 60 top-eight performances and six wrestlers to nine national championships.

At least one Tiger grappler has been selected to compete at the NCAA Championship event in each of Smith's 25 seasons at Missouri and his squads have finished among the top-20 programs at the NCAA Championships in 19 of the last 20 seasons. At the 2009, 2015, 2017 and 2023 national tournament Missouri has had a program-high five Tigers earning All-American acco-

lades.

The demands that Smith puts on his wrestlers extend well beyond the mat. Since he took the reins in 1998, 21 wrestlers have been recognized by the National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA), Big 12 and College Sports Communicators (formerly CoSIDa) for their academic achievements. Among that list is Tyler McCormick, a 2008 graduate and two-time All-American. In 2006, McCormick headlined the Big 12 All-Academic first team as the only grappler in the conference to post a 4.0 grade-point average. The Tiger All-American went on to become the first wrestler since Shaon Fry (1993) to earn ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America first-team accolades and was later awarded one of 29 prestigious NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships in 2008.

The program's success has built excitement and interest for the sport of wrestling, not only in Columbia but across the nation, Smith and his team have helped turn out record crowds in the Hearnest Center. The team's attendance consistently ranks among the top 25 programs in the country, drawing an average of over 1,000 spectators for home duals. On Feb. 15, 2023, competing against No. 3 Iowa State, the Tigers packed 4,819 fans into the Hearnest Center, setting the dual attendance record in the facility.

Smith has compiled a 326-116-4 record at Missouri over his 25-season tenure. He became Missouri's first 300-win coach in program history, eclipsing the milestone on Jan. 8, 2021, in a 30-6 triumph over No. 21 Central Michigan.

With a .746 career winning percentage, Smith holds the highest winning percentage in Mizzou wrestling history. Upon his return to the Big 12 in 2022, Smith picked up his second and third Big 12 Coach of the Year honors in 2022 and 2023 after earning the award in 2012, Mizzou's final season in the conference before departing for the MAC. After venturing into the MAC, Smith continued to rack up accolades by winning five consecutive MAC Coach of the Year honors from 2013-17.

Six Tiger wrestlers have reached the pinnacle of collegiate wrestling, collecting 10 NCAA Championships under Smith's tenure, beginning with Ben Askren. During Askren's Tiger career, Smith guided the 174-pound grappler to the program's first



back-to-back National Championship titles (2006 and 2007).

On March 21, 2009, Mark Ellis became the second Missouri wrestler in program history to collect top honors. Wrestling at heavyweight, Ellis bested his opponent, 3-2, in overtime with Smith coaching from the corner.

In March 2010, Max Askren became the third national champion in the history of the program, as he dominated the No. 1 seed in the 184-pound weight class by a 10-3 score.

After a four-year drought, true freshman J'den Cox claimed the program's fifth national title in 2013-14 after defeating Ohio State's Nick Heflin, 2-1. On March 19, 2016, Cox returned to the top of the podium at Madison Square Garden, becoming the second two-time NCAA Champ in program history. Cox defeated No. 1 seed Morgan McIntosh (Penn State), 4-2, to capture the title at 197 pounds. Cox then became the program's first-ever three-time national champion when he defended his title in 2017, defeating Minnesota's Brett Pfarr, 8-2, to finish his incredible Mizzou career.

In 2014-15, redshirt senior Drake Houdashelt concluded his historical Tiger Style career with a 149-pound National Championship at the 2015 NCAA tournament. In his final match in the Black and Gold, Houdashelt took home the title with a thrilling 3-1 SV1 decision victory over No. 3 seed David Habat (Edinboro).

On March 19, 2022, freshman Keegan O'Toole became the Tigers' first national champion at 165 pounds while completing the fourth undefeated individual season in program history, joining Askren (2006-07) and Cox (2017). O'Toole went on to defend his title in 2023, defeating David Carr (Iowa State) in the finals match, 8-2, in Tulsa, Okla.

Additionally, Smith has helped guide two wrestlers to the Olympics. Ben Askren was the first wrestler in program history to compete in the Summer Games, with an appearance in the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics.

J'den Cox followed as the second Tiger to earn a spot in the Olympics. The three-time National Champion continued his strong career with a bronze-medal finish at the 2016 Rio Summer Olympics. The whirlwind summer for Cox included trips to Iowa City, New York City, Los Angeles, Mongolia and Germany, all serving as qualifying or tune-up tournaments leading up to Rio. In four Olympic matches, Cox was not taken down once, an incredible feat for a wrestler who had under

five months to prepare for freestyle competition after the completion of the folkstyle wrestling season.

A competitor himself, Smith was a three-time All-Big Ten wrestler and a four-time letterman at Michigan State from 1986-1990. Competing at 126 pounds, Smith finished fifth at the Big Ten Championships in 1988, third in 1989 and second in 1990. Smith stands among the top-25 on Michigan State's all-time wins list with 84 career victories as a Spartan. He also stands tied for 19th on MSU's single-season wins list with 32 victories in 1990, the season in which he was named Michigan State's Most Outstanding Wrestler.

A native of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., where his father coached football, Smith was a two-time wrestling state champion in 1984 with Oviedo High School and in 1985 while competing at St. Thomas Aquinas High School.

Smith graduated from Michigan State with a degree in education and married the former Denise Dean in 1993. Brian and Denise, have three children, Quinn, Kylie and Braden. In the spring of 2009, Smith received his Master's Degree in Athletic Administration from William Woods University.



Tyrel Todd enters his fifth year as the Associate Head Coach of Missouri wrestling in 2023-24. Since joining the staff in the spring of 2019, he has coached numerous All-Americans and a multi-time national champion.

In the 2022-23 season, Todd helped guide the Tigers to one of their best seasons in program history. Mizzou won its 12th consecutive conference title and five Tigers had All-American finishes at the NCAA Championships, led by Keegan O'Toole, who won his second consecutive national championship at 165 pounds. O'Toole, Brock Mauller (149) and Rocky Elam (197) each earned their third-career All-American finishes while Peyton Mocco (174) and Zach Elam (285) both secured All-American status for the first time in their career as the Tigers took fifth at NCAA Championships weekend.

During his first few seasons at Missouri, Todd helped coach three wrestlers to five All-American finishes in NCAA tournament competitions, and five conference champions in two different leagues (Mid-American Conference and Big 12). Additionally, he assisted in leading the team to a ninth-place finish at the 2022 NCAA competition, including an individual national champion in O'Toole.

Prior to joining the Tigers, Todd worked as an assistant coach for Purdue for four seasons, elevating the program thanks to a tireless work ethic on the recruiting trail. He helped put together three consecutive top-25 recruiting classes, starting in 2016 when he was elevated to the program's lead assistant role. He secured nine top-100 recruits over his four seasons at Purdue as the program reaped the benefits of that in 2017-18. That year, the Boilermakers turned in their best Big Ten Championships performance in six years with 59.5 points to finish ninth in the team standings. The 59.5 points were the most at Big Tens for Purdue in nearly a decade. He coached six place winners at the meet, the most since seven Boilermakers landed on the podium in 2012.

Todd is a native of Bozeman, Montana, and hails from a six-generation dairy farming operation. He received his bachelor's degree in secondary education from Michigan in 2009, majoring in history and minoring in psychology. He and his wife, Loni, have two daughters, Jacy Clair and Reyn Lindsay.



After a distinguished collegiate and freestyle wrestling career, Kendric Maple enters his fifth year with the University of Missouri wrestling team and second as an Associate Head Coach.

Maple was hired in the summer of 2019 as an assistant coach and entered the program as an NCAA Champion, multi-time All-American and a U.S. Freestyle Open Champion. Following his first three seasons with the program, he was promoted to Associate Head Coach in the summer of 2022.

Maple most recently guided the Tigers to one of their best seasons in program history, as Missouri captured its 12th consecutive conference title and earned five All-American finishes at the NCAA Championships. The squad was led by Keegan O'Toole, who won his second consecutive national championship at 165 pounds. O'Toole, Brock Mauller (149) and Rocky Elam (197) each earned their third-career All-American finishes while Peyton Mocco (174) and Zach Elam (285) both secured All-American status for the first time in their career.

During his first few years at Missouri, Maple helped lead three wrestlers to five All-American finishes in NCAA tournament action, and five conference champions in two different leagues (Mid-American Conference and Big 12). He played a role in leading the team to a ninth-place finish at the 2022 NCAA competition, including an individual national champion in O'Toole (165).

In the time he has been on staff, the Tigers have yielded four team conference championships, seven individual conference champions, 10 All-American honorees and two individual national titles.

Prior to joining Missouri, Maple served as an assistant coach at Nebraska for two seasons (2017-19), helping the Huskers to a ninth-place finish at the 2017-18 NCAA Championships and a 10th place finish the year after.

Originally from Wichita, Kan., Maple earned his bachelor's degree from Oklahoma in health and exercise science, May 2013. He received his master's degree in adult and higher education, with an emphasis in intercollegiate athletic administration from OU, May 2015. Maple and his wife, Jordin, have two sons, Kiner and Kyro.



After a stalwart tenure as a wrestler with Missouri Wrestling, two-time All-American Dom Bradley enters his fifth season as the Tigers' volunteer assistant coach.

Bradley was a key fixture on the staff in 2022-23 as the Tigers to one of their best seasons in program history, as Missouri captured its 12th consecutive conference title and earned five All-American finishes at the NCAA Championships. He worked extensively with Zach Elam (285) to earn his first All-American placement, as the redshirt junior finished sixth at NAAs. Elam became the first Missouri heavyweight to claim All-American honors since Bradley accomplished the feat in 2013, and just the third wrestler at 285 pounds to earn that distinction in program history.

The former Tiger Style great also aided in the development of Keegan O'Toole, who won his second consecutive national championship at 165 pounds. O'Toole, Brock Mauller (149) and Rocky Elam (197) each earned their third-career All-American finishes while Z. Elam and Peyton Mocco (174) both secured All-American status for the first time in their careers.

During his collegiate career, Bradley posted a 105-15 record over four seasons as the team's heavyweight, giving him the program's fourth-best career winning percentage (.875, 100-win minimum).

Bradley was a staple in the lineup for Coach Smith during his career in Columbia. He placed third at the 2011 NCAA Championships and followed that with a fourth-place nod as a senior in 2013, giving him a pair of All-America honors. He claimed a Big 12 title in 2011 and followed that with a MAC title in 2013, winning his 100th career bout to open his MAC title run that year. In 2010, Bradley earned the program's Hap Whitney Coach's Award, given to the wrestler who displays dedication, commitment, sacrifice and unselfishness to the team on a consistent basis. He was also the program's Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman in 2009 and the program's Most Outstanding Wrestler in 2011.

Bradley is tied for eighth in Mizzou history with his 39 wins during the 2012-13 season while his 11 major decisions that year are fifth-most in a single season at Mizzou. He lettered at Mizzou from 2009-13, taking an Olympic redshirt in 2012.



Keenan Hagerty, the former men's and women's wrestling coach at William Jewell College, joined the University of Missouri staff as director of operations, Head Coach Brian Smith announced July, 2022.

Hagerty joins the Tigers program after serving as both the men's and women's wrestling head coach at William Jewell. Hagerty joined Jewell in Aug. 2020 and was tasked with starting a women's program while revitalizing the men's program after a 27-year hiatus.

During Hagerty's head coaching stint, he showed his mettle as a recruiter, bringing over 30 new student-athletes into the wrestling programs. Hagerty led the women's program its first-ever national ranking of No. 15 while Emalie Olson earned the first individual national ranking at No. 8 in the 116-pound class. Five student-athletes from the women's program advanced to the NCWWC National Championships and freshman Sarina Bertram was tabbed as the William Jewell Women's Newcomer of the Year honors.

Prior to his stint with the Cardinals, Hagerty spent four years as the top assistant at Maryville University. During that time, he has helped Maryville to 19 All-Great Lakes Valley Conference selections, 15 NCAA-II national qualifiers, seven All-Americans and one national champion.

Hagerty spent his own collegiate career at Maryville and his list of accomplishments is long. He compiled a career record of 125-28, was a four-time national qualifier and three time All-American. He opened his career in 2012 with a 33-7 mark and finished as the national runner-up at 149. Following that season, he was named the Maryville University Male Athlete of the Year and Newcomer of the Year. Throughout his career he set school records for wins in a season (42) and career (125), was a three-time Super Regional finalist, winning the title in 2013 and a NWCA All-Academic selection.

Although, he competed collegiately across the state, Hagerty's wrestling roots run deep in Kansas City. He attended Blue Springs High School where he won a state championship under his father, Mike, a 2016 inductee into the National Wrestling Hall of Fame.

Ben Askren - 2006 - 174 pounds

Ben Askren defeated No. 2 Jake Herbert [Northwestern] by major decision, 14-2, to claim the first individual national title in the history of the Missouri wrestling program at the NCAA Wrestling Championships in Oklahoma City, Okla., March 18, 2006. For his efforts, Askren was awarded the 2006 NWCA Most Outstanding Wrestler award for the tournament, leading Missouri to a 15th-place finish with a then-school record of 45.0 points. The junior's victory clinched a 45-0 season, the only undefeated season in the history of the Missouri wrestling program. Askren also set season records for falls [25], consecutive wins [45] and most career falls at Missouri [61]. The Wisconsin native became the first recipient of the Dan Hodge Award in program history following the season, an award equivalent to the Heisman Trophy and given to the best wrestler in the NCAA for that season.

Ben Askren - 2007 - 174 pounds

On the heels of seniors Ben Askren and Matt Pell, the Mizzou wrestling team earned its highest team finish at the 2007 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships when it took third place on March 17, 2007, in Auburn Hills, Mich. The Tigers finished with 80 points, giving the University of Missouri its first NCAA team trophy since 1965 when the indoor track & field team took home the national title. Askren topped Keith Gavin [Pittsburgh] for the third time to earn his second national championship. With the win, the senior became the Tigers' only back-to-back national champion in wrestling and the first for the University of Missouri overall since track star Derrick Peterson in 1998-99. The grappler has never finished lower than second in the nation at the NCAA tournament, closing his career with an 87-match win streak and a 42-0 senior season. Askren pinned three opponents during the tournament and earned a technical fall in his pigtail match, as he did not lose a match in his final two seasons at Mizzou. The Mizzou legend was awarded the Dan Hodge Award for the second consecutive season following the perfect campaign.



Mark Ellis - 2009 - HWT

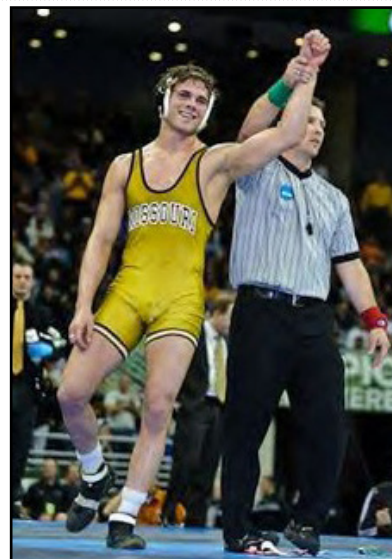
completion of junior heavyweight Mark Ellis' 3-2 overtime victory over Duke's fifth-ranked Konrad Dudziak on March 21, 2009, in St. Louis, Missouri. Ellis managed a reversal with 10 seconds remaining in the second 30-second overtime period to capture his first career All-American honor and national title. Ellis and Dudziak were scoreless in the first period, although the Duke Blue Devil was hit with stalling early in the bout. The junior chose down to start the second and escaped in 1:05, while Dudziak opted to start down in the third and escaped in 20 seconds. The two heavyweights pushed through the one-minute sudden victory period and scrambled on the edge of the mat for the first 30-second tiebreaker. The second 30-second period in which Ellis chose down proved the difference in the match and marked the Kansas City, Missouri native's third win of the season in overtime.





Max Askren - 2010 - 184 pounds

Mizzou crowned its third wrestling National Champion after senior Max Askren's 10-3 victory over top-seeded Kirk Smith of Boise State on March 20, 2010, in Omaha, Nebraska. Askren started the match strong, racking up seven points in the first period to counter Smith's sole escape. With a 7-1 lead, the Hartland, Wisconsin, native began the second period in the down position, earning a point for an escape. Smith made a run at Askren, picking up a takedown to start the third period, with the senior escaping again at the :30 mark. With a point for riding time, Askren won the match by decision, 10-3, and became Mizzou's first National Champion at 184 pounds. After going 20-2 on the season, the wrestler finished his career with a record of 104-16.



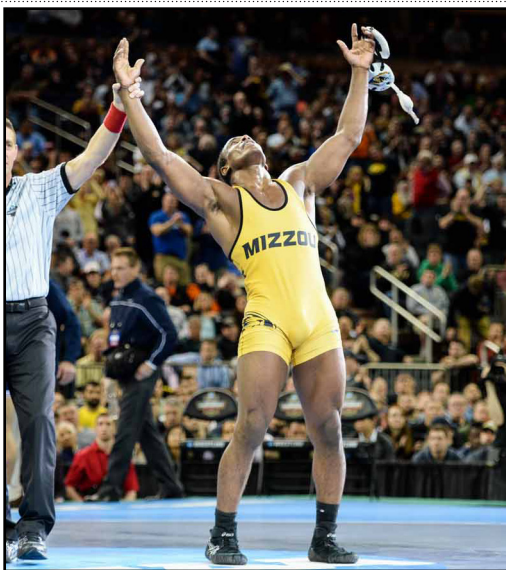
J'den Cox - 2014 - 197 pounds

True freshman J'den Cox stormed to the top of a 197-pound weight class that featured three seniors in the final four, engraving his name in Mizzou lore with a 2-1 decision over No. 1 Nick Heflin March 22, 2014, in Oklahoma City, Okla. Cox became the youngest wrestler in program history to capture an NCAA title and 14th true freshman to capture a title in NCAA history. The Mizzou champion's .950 winning percentage (38-2) in 2013-14 was the best mark posted by a freshman in program history, surpassing Ben Askren's 32-5 freshman campaign in 2003-04.

Drake Houdashelt - 2015 - 149 pounds

Drake Houdashelt tallied a thrilling 3-1 SV-1 win over No. 3 David Habat (Edinboro) on March 21, 2015, at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Missouri, becoming the fifth individual and sixth overall National Champion in program history. The O'Fallon, Missouri, native outscored his five opponents, 30-3, at the 2015 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships. Two of those wins came by major decision shutouts, while the other three victories came by decision. The final resume for Houdashelt at Mizzou is one for the records books. He leaves a four-time conference champion (2012 Big 12, 2013-2014-2015 Mid-American Conference), making him the first individual in Mizzou wrestling history to accomplish that feat. Further personal accolades include ending his career with 134 wins, a .854 career winning percentage (sixth place), and 39 career major decisions, which are the most in Tiger wrestling history.





J'den Cox - 2016 - 197 pounds

J'den Cox became the second two-time NCAA National Champion in program history with a 4-2 win over Penn State's Morgan McIntosh at Madison Square Garden in New York City on March 19, 2016. The hometown Tiger finished the season 33-1 and recorded seven technical falls on the year, tied for fifth-most in a season. Cox became the fourth three-time All-American in school history, following Ben Askren (2004-07), Max Askren (2008-10) and Drake Houdashelt (2013-15). The junior became the 24th member of the 100-win club with a 16-7 major decision victory in a 19-14 win over Nebraska in the NWCA National Duals Series on Feb. 21. The Missouri native reached the century mark in 105 matches, the fastest to 100 wins in program history. Cox also owns the best win percentage of any wrestler in program history, over 100 wins at .956 (108-5), slightly ahead of Ben Askren's mark of .950 (153-8).

J'den Cox - 2017 - 197 pounds

With an 8-2 win in the NCAA Wrestling Championships, J'den Cox became the first three-time National Champion in Mizzou Athletics history. Cox again upended Minnesota's Brett Pfarr to capture the top prize in collegiate wrestling. The Columbia, Missouri native finished the season with a record of 28-0, becoming just the second Tiger wrestler to finish a season with a perfect record (Askren 2006, 2007). Of Cox's 28 victories, he scored 19 bonus point victories with six falls, six technical falls and seven major decisions. For his career, the senior finished with the best winning percentage among any wrestler with over 100 wins (.965, 136-5), tied for second-most wins with Alan Waters (136), second in technical falls (20), third in major decisions (31) and tied for eighth in falls (27). He is one of two wrestlers in program history to record four All-America honors (Askren, 2004-07).



Keegan O'Toole - 2022 - 165 pounds

Keegan O'Toole became the second freshman to win the NCAA Championship in program history, joining J'den Cox (2014), following a 6-5 victory against returning national champion Shane Griffith of Stanford at Little Caesar's Arena in Detroit on March 19, 2022. The Hartland, Wisconsin, native is Missouri's third national champion to hail from Wisconsin, joining the Askrens, Ben (2006, 2007) and Max (2010). O'Toole finished the season with an unblemished 25-0 record, following Ben Askren (2006, 2007) and J'den Cox (2017) with only the third undefeated season in program history. He was the lone freshman to make the finals at the NCAA Championships, all the while not surrendering a point until the final match. His five total points were the least given up at the 2022 tournament. Following the season's conclusion, O'Toole received the Hammer Award, given to the national champion who won the most challenging weight class at the national tournament. He was also a finalist for the Dan Hodge Award, the only freshman to be included in the final eight voting.





Keegan O'Toole - 2023 - 165 pounds

Keegan O'Toole became the third wrestler in the history of Missouri wrestling to win multiple national championships on Saturday, March 18, at the BOK Center in Tulsa, as he knocked off No. 1 seed David Carr of Iowa State in an 8-2 decision to earn his second consecutive individual NCAA title at 165 pounds. On his road to the final, O'Toole outscored his opponents 43-11 with two bonus-point victories. The defending champion knocked off two All-Americans, Carson Kharchla of Ohio State (19-4 tech fall in the quarterfinal) and Michigan's Cameron Amine (6-0 decision in the semifinal), in rematches from the 2022 NCAA Championships. After taking a pair of defeats against Carr in dual competition and the Big 12 championship final, the sophomore exacted revenge against the Cyclone on the nation's biggest stage, taking a decision as he led wire-to-wire. The Hartland, Wis. native secured a takedown in the first period to open the scoring, then notched another takedown on a scramble with just over a minute remaining in the match. He secured his victory with a two-point near fall with under 20 seconds to go, taking the top spot on the podium.

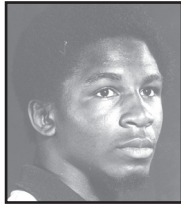




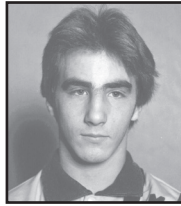

**1. BEN ASKREN**

Record: 153-8-0, 2003-2007
Win 100: Feb. 5, 2006 - Wes Roberts (Oklahoma) Decision, 8-6

Ben Askren became the first Missouri wrestler to reach 100 wins prior to his senior campaign. As a junior, Askren recorded a perfect 45-0 season, during which he earned his 100th career victory at home in the Hearnes Center against Wes Roberts. After becoming Missouri's first wrestling national champion in 2006, the four-time All-American and three-time Big 12 Champion capped off his collegiate wrestling career with another individual NCAA title in 2007. Finishing a perfect 42-0, the Hartland, Wis., native sealed his career at Missouri riding an 87-match winning streak. Askren became only the second wrestler in NCAA history to win the coveted Dan Hodge Trophy multiple times (2006, 2007). Missouri's most outstanding wrestler in 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007, Askren also earned the Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman Award and Big 12 Championship Most Outstanding Wrestler honor in 2004. Askren finished second at the NCAA Championships as a freshman (2004) and sophomore (2005) before earning the 174-pound titles in 2006 and 2007.

**T-2. J'DEN COX**

Record: 136-5-0, 2013-2017
Win 100: Feb. 21, 2016 - Aaron Studebaker (Nebraska) Major Decision, 16-7

J'den Cox became the fastest wrestler in program history to reach 100 wins, doing so in 105 matches, with a 16-7 victory over Aaron Studebaker in Mizzou's win over Nebraska in the NWCA National Duals Series matchup, Feb. 21, 2016. In 2014, Cox became the first wrestler in program history to capture an NCAA title as a true freshman. In 2016, he returned to the top of collegiate wrestling by defeating Penn State's Morgan McIntosh at Madison Square Garden. Cox would then become the first ever three-time national champion in program history with another NCAA title in 2017. Among the career records list, Cox

**4. DRAKE HOUDASHELT**

Record: 134-23-0, 2010-2015
Win 100: Nov. 8, 2014 - Kevin Cooper (Ellsworth CC) Fall, 2:52

Drake Houdashelt concluded a decorated career in style, clinching the 2015 NCAA title at 149 pounds to earn his 134th and final victory. Houdashelt was a four-time NCAA Championship qualifier and three-time NCAA All-American, placing sixth overall in 2013 and fifth in 2014 before winning the national title as a redshirt senior. He was named 2015 MAC Wrestler of the Year after going 37-1 in his final collegiate campaign. Houdashelt was the leader and catalyst for Tiger Style during the best season in program history in which Mizzou went 24-0, secured an NWCA National Duals title and a fourth-place team finish at the NCAA Championship.

**5. WES ROPER**

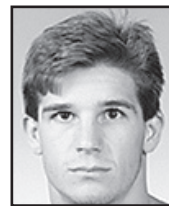
Record: 131-37-0, 1978-1982
Win 100: Dec. 4, 1981 - Craig Cox (N.C. State) Default

Wes Roper is fifth best in program history with 131 career wins at Missouri. Twice named Mizzou's Most Outstanding Wrestler (1980, 1982), Roper was selected as team co-captain three times. He earned All-America honors in 1982 after finishing fourth at the NCAA Championships in the 150-pound weight class. He previously held the Missouri record for wins in a season by a junior with 40 victories during the 1980-81 campaign, and set a MU record that stood for 25 years for most career points (461). Roper served as Mizzou's head coach for 12 years and compiled a record of 73-94-4 from 1986-94. In 2006, Roper became the sixth wrestler inducted into the Missouri Hall of Fame.

**T-2. ALAN WATERS**

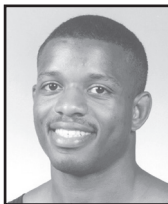
Record: 136-14-0, 2010-2015
Win 100: March 22, 2013 - Matthew Snyder (Virginia) Decision, 4-0

Alan Waters reached the 100-win mark during the NCAA Championships in his junior season, where he defeated then-No. 8 ranked Matthew Snyder of Virginia, 4-0. He has many produced accolades through four seasons as a Tiger, including being a four-time NCAA qualifier, as well as a Big 12 and Mid-American Conference (MAC) champion. Waters' highest finish in his career was third place at the 2015 NCAA Championships.

**T-6. SHAON FRY**

Record: 127-36-0, 1990-1994
Win 100: Dec. 29, 1993 - J. Koss (West Virginia) Decision, 8-5

Shaon Fry won 127 matches as a Tiger, and stands tied for sixth on the all-time wins list at Missouri with Kenny Liddell. Fry won two Big Eight Championships (1993, 1994) and reached the final match at the NCAA Championships in 1993. In 1994, he was 38-3 and placed third at nationals. Fry was selected as the Tigers' Most Outstanding Wrestler in 1993 and 1994. Inducted into the MU Hall of Fame in 1999, Fry was a three-time Academic All-Big Eight selection and two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American.

**T-6. KENNY LIDDELL**

Record: 127-44-0, 1990-1995
Win 100: Nov. 19, 1994 - Pete Miller (William Penn) Fall, 6:00

Kenny Liddell is one of 12 MU wrestlers to earn multiple All-America honors. Liddell finished fourth at the 1992 NCAA Championships, then took sixth at the 1995 event. He was one win away from earning All-America honors in 1994. Tied for sixth with Shaon Fry on the all-time wins list at Missouri with 127 career victories, he was a Big Eight champion in 1995. Liddell was named Missouri's Most Outstanding Wrestler twice (1992, 1995) and still holds the record for most wins by a Tiger sophomore with 39 in 1991-92.

**T-9. LAVION MAYES**

Record: 122-24-0, 2014-2017
Win 100: Nov. 13, 2016 - Michael Hayes (Old Dominion), Decision, 9-4

One of eight, three-time All-Americans in program history, Lavion Mayes was one of the most consistent wrestlers in Mizzou history during his career. In four years as an attached wrestler, Mayes recorded 29-or-more wins three times and advanced to the NCAA Championships all four seasons. After finishing seventh at 141 pounds as a sophomore in 2015 and third at 149 pounds as a junior in 2016, Mayes saved his best season for his senior campaign, where he won the MAC title at 149 pounds and made it to the NCAA Finals. Mayes finished his career with the seventh-best win percentage in program history (.836) and the fourth-most major decisions (29).

**8. RAYMOND JORDAN**

Record: 123-29, 2005-2009
Win 100: Dec. 13, 2008 - Todd Noel (Cal-Fullerton) Fall, 1:56

Raymond Jordan was the sixth wrestler in the Missouri Century Club to earn win No. 100 by way of fall, doing so in 1:56, the fastest of the Tiger's 100-Win Club members. A two-time All-American, Jordan was the fourth Missouri wrestler to earn All-America honors in two different weight classes, doing so first in 2008 (fifth) at 184 pounds and again in 2009 at 174 pounds (third). He was named Missouri's Most Outstanding Freshman in 2006 and was recognized as the Ed Lampitt Total Tiger honoree in 2008. As a senior, Jordan was awarded the Hap Whitney Coaches Award.

**11. KENNY BURLESON**

Record: 119-34-0, 1999-2004
Win 100: Jan. 4, 2004 - Matt Lebe (West Virginia) Decision, 7-4

One of several in-state wrestlers to go through the program, Neosho native Kenny Burleson ranks 11th on the Mizzou win chart, totaling 119 victories throughout his four years of college. Burleson hit the century mark against Matt Lebe of West Virginia in his senior campaign, Jan 4, 2004. Burleson was a three-time recipient of the Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award (2001, 2002, 2003) and was named the Most Improved Wrestler in 2001. A captain in 2004, the two-time NCAA qualifier finished seventh at the 2004 NCAA Championships at 157 pounds after taking first at the Big 12 Championships. Burleson led the 2004 squad in technical falls with four and had the most wins on the team during the 2002-03 (31) and 2003-04 (35) seasons.

**T-9. MATT PELL**

Record: 122-35-0, 2003-2007
Win 100: Nov. 16, 2006 - Chris Vondruska (Ohio St.) Major Decision, 15-5

A two-time All-American in two different weight classes, Matt Pell earned his 100th career win in the opening match of his senior campaign. Besting Ohio State's Chris Vondruska, 15-5, in St. John Arena, Pell went on to finish his career with 122 wins, his final victory coming March 17, 2007, when he pinned Michigan's Eric Tannenbaum in 3:15 for third place All-America honors. Recording four wins by fall during the three-day NCAA Tournament, Pell was awarded the Gorarrian Award and returned home to receive Missouri's Most Outstanding Wrestler honor alongside teammate Ben Askren. Pell earned his first All-America nod as a sophomore at 184 pounds. Pell's third-place finish at the 2007 NCAA Championships helped propel Missouri to its highest team finish ever, third.

**12. DANIEL LEWIS**

Record: 118-17, 2014-2019
Win 100: Dec. 16, 2018 - Jake Lanning (Buffalo), Fall (2:59)

Daniel Lewis turned in a storied Mizzou career, finishing with 118 career victories. He is the program's third, four-time All-American after taking fourth place at 174 pounds during his senior season. Of his 118 wins, 53 came via fall, including a team-high 17 during his senior season in 2018-19. His 53 career falls are second-most in program history, trailing only Ben Askren (91). He won the Gorarrian Award for the most pins at the 2019 NCAA Championships.

**13. NICK MARABLE**

Record: 116-25-0, 2006-2010
Win 100: Dec. 29, 2009 - Mike Finch (Iowa State) Major Decision, 10-2

Two-time All-American and three-time Big 12 champion Nick Marable joined Missouri's 100-Win Club with a 10-2 major decision over Iowa State's Mike Finch at the 2009 Midlands, Dec. 29. Marable wrestled to a third-place finish at the 2008 NCAA Wrestling Championships, the highest finish amongst Tigers that season. As a senior, the Tiger grappler posted a 35-5 record, which included a 13-1 dual mark, and became the 17th Missouri wrestler in program history to join the elite 100-Win Club. Marable finished his career with 116 wins, tenth-most in Missouri history, and was awarded Missouri's Hap Whitney Coaches Award in 2007, as well as collecting 2008 Most Improved Wrestler accolades.

**14. JOEY LAVALLEE**

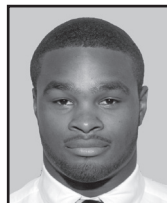

Win 100: Dec. 29, 2017 - Kennedy Monday (North Carolina) TF, 17-2 (7:00)

Joey Lavallee picked up his 100th win half-way through his senior campaign at the South Beach Duals, defeating North Carolina's No. 19-ranked Kennedy Monday by technical fall (7:00), 17-2, Dec. 19, 2017. Lavallee was a four-time NCAA Championships qualifier for Mizzou, and finished runner-up at the 2017 NCAA Championships. Among program records, Lavallee ranks in the Top-10 in both major decisions and technical falls.

**15. BRENT HAYNES**

Record: 113-34-0, 2009-2013
Win 100: Jan. 2, 2013 - Scott Schiller (Minnesota) Fall, 3:57

Brent Haynes picked up his 100th career win via the fall against Minnesota's Scott Schiller, Jan. 2, 2013. The win took place while the Tigers were participating in the 2013 Southern Scuffle in Chattanooga, Tenn., where Haynes battled to a third-place finish. Haynes' 113 wins ranks 15th all-time in Mizzou Wrestling history. He capped off his Tiger career with a 32-10 record during his senior year campaign, but unfortunately fell just short of All-America honors at the national championships.

**16. TYRON WOODLEY**

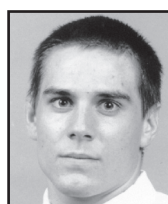
Record: 110-38-0, 2001-2005
Win 100: Jan. 15, 2005 - Christian Arellano (Cal-State Bakersfield) Decision, 7-4

The first Missouri wrestler to claim a Big 12 Conference title (2003), Tyron Woodley was a two-time All-American and three-time NCAA qualifier. After qualifying for the NCAA Championships as a true freshman, the 165-pounder was named the 2001 Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman and Woodley went on to captain the team three times under Head Coach Brian Smith. Woodley picked up his 100th win, Jan. 15, 2005, against Christian Arellano of Cal-State Bakersfield in a 7-4 decision, later earning recognition as the recipient of the 2005 Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award.

**17. BRAD CIELESKI**

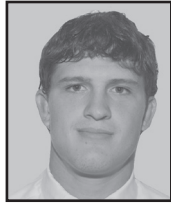
Record: 109-30-0, 2001-2005
Win 100: Jan. 2, 2005 - Tanner Cowan (Utah Valley State) Major Decision, 11-1

A four-time NCAA qualifier, Brad Cielecki spent his senior season of eligibility in Columbia, Mo., after earning 84-career wins for Slippery Rock University in Pennsylvania. Reaching the 100-win mark at the Missouri Duals, Jan. 2, 2005, Cielecki beat Tanner Cowan of Utah Valley State in impressive fashion with an 11-1 major decision. In three years at Slippery Rock, Cielecki earned two NCAA Division I East Regional Championships as well as two Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) titles.

**T-18. JOHN KOPINSKY**

Record: 106-37-0, 1997-2002
Win 100: Feb. 13, 2002 - Lee Gatlin (Central Missouri State) Fall, 2:22

John Kopinsky reached the 100-win mark during the 2001-02 season after pinning Lee Gatlin of Central Missouri State, Feb. 13. Kopinsky is tied for 18th on Missouri's all-time wins list after finishing his career at Missouri with a 106-37 record. He was a three-time NCAA qualifier and won Missouri's Marshall Esteppe Award as the Most Outstanding Freshman on the 1997 squad. Kopinsky was selected as Missouri's Most Outstanding Wrestler for the 2000-01 season. He was also the recipient of the Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award following the 2001-02 campaign.



T-18. JEREMY SPATES

Record: 106-38-0, 1999-2004
Win 100: Feb. 18, 2004 - Josh Wooten
(Northern Illinois) Decision, 12-6

All-American, three-time captain and three-time NCAA qualifier, Jeremy Spates became the 10th Missouri wrestler to reach 100-wins, Feb. 18, 2004, against Northern Illinois' Josh Wooten. The 2000 Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman honoree, Spates closed his career by earning the Hap Whitney Coaches Award in 2004. Wrestling at 149 pounds, Spates finished fifth at the 2004 NCAA Championships in St. Louis. Totaling 106 wins, Spates stands tied for 18th on Missouri's 100-wins list.



T-22. JOE SPINAZZOLA

Record: 102-31-6, 1979-84
Win 100: March 9, 1984 - Wayne Jackson
(Michigan State) Fall, 5:38

Joe Spinazzola compiled a record of 102-31-6 as a Tiger and became the third Missouri wrestler to reach the century mark in wins in 1984. Selected as Missouri's Most Outstanding Freshman in 1980, Spinazzola was an All-American as a senior, finishing fourth at the 1984 NCAA Championships. Spinazzola held the record for 23 years for most points earned in a season by a sophomore after compiling 139 points in the 1980-81 season. He is currently tied with teammate Dave Young for 22nd on Mizzou's all-time wins list.



20. DOM BRADLEY

Record: 105-15-0, 2007-2013
Win 100: March 10, 2013 - Jared Torrence
(Northern Illinois) Decision, 4-0

Bradley tabbed his 100th career victory during the first-ever Mizzou appearance at the Mid-American Conference (MAC) Championships. He would win five additional matches following the milestone bout against Jared Torrence, to finish out his collegiate career with a total of 105 wins and a fourth-place All-American finish in the 2013 NCAA Championships. Bradley was also an All-American in 2011 with a third-place finish. His 105 wins to just 15 losses gave him a career winning percentage of .875, fourth-highest in Mizzou Wrestling history for wrestlers who have tallied 100-or-more wins.



T-22. DAVE YOUNG

Record: 102-39-0, 1978-1982
Win 100: March 12, 1982 - Keith Foxx
(Michigan State) Decision, 2-1

Dave Young was a two-time NCAA All-American and finished with a career record of 102-39-0 while at Mizzou. He finished fifth in the 1981 and 1982 NCAA Championships, and was chosen as the Tigers' Most Outstanding Wrestler twice (1981, 1982). Young is tied with teammate Joe Spinazzola for 22nd on Missouri's all-time wins list with his 102 victories.



21. MAX ASKREN

Record: 104-16-0, 2006-10
Win 100: March 6, 2010 - Clayton Foster
(Oklahoma State) Decision, 10-6

Max Askren put together a record of 104-16 during his four years at Mizzou, good enough for the sixth-highest winning percentage in program history (.867). He picked up his 100th career win at the 2010 Big 12 Championships, earning a 10-6 decision over Oklahoma's Clayton Foster. A three-time All-American, Askren capped off his career by claiming the 2010 NCAA title in the 184-pound class after beating Boise State's Kirk Smith 10-3, becoming the fourth Tiger to be crowned a national champion.



T-22. ZACH SYNON

Record: 102-44-0, 2013-17
Win 100: Feb. 4, 2017 - Alex Hrispoulos
(Michigan State) Major Decision, 8-0

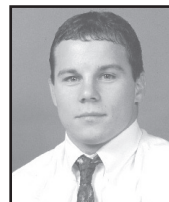
Zach Synon went the unconventional route to reach 100 wins in his Tiger career, wrestling in six open tournaments and 36 total matches in his last season to reach the 100-plateau. Synon recorded win No. 100 in a 8-0 major decision win over Michigan State's Alex Hrispoulos in the quarterfinals of the Edinboro Open. In his Mizzou career, Synon was a two-time NCAA qualifier at 133 pounds and captured the 2015 MAC Championship at 133 pounds.

Jarrett Jacques became the 29th Tiger to join the 100-Win Club and closed his Tiger Style career 102-40-0. Jacques was a five-time NCAA qualifier, earning the nod from 2019-2023 at 157 pounds. In 2019 he became a Mid-American Conference Champion during his freshman year. Jacques went on to become a five-time NWCA Scholar All-American and two-time Academic All-Big 12 First Team member. Furthermore, the hometown Tiger closed out his career with 15 technical falls, which tied for fifth all-time in the program in 2023. Jacques was awarded the Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award in his final season for being a leader both on and off the mat.



T-27. JEFF URBAN

Win 100: March 16, 2000 - Dennis Whitby
[Old Dominion] Fall, 2:01

Jeff Urban was a two-time NCAA Tournament qualifier and had three consecutive 20-wins seasons at Missouri. Missouri's lone qualifier for the 1999 NCAA, Urban returned the following season going 2-2 at Nationals in 2000. Urban finished with a 101-49-0 record as a Tiger. He picked up win number 100 at the 2000 NCAA Championships, pinning Old Dominion's Dennis Whitby in the second round. Urban was twice named the Tigers' Most Outstanding Wrestler (1999, 2000) and was the recipient of the 2000 Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award.



T-22. BROCK MAULLER

Record: 102-12-0, 2018-Present
Win 100: March 16, 2023 - Chance Lamer
[Michigan] Decision, 4-1

Brock Mauller reached his 100th win during his redshirt junior season at the 2023 NCAA Tournament, becoming the 30th Tiger to join the illusive club. Mauller is a three-time All-American (2019, 2021, 2023) with his highest placement coming in 2021 when he claim fifth at 149 pounds. The Columbia native is just the 11th Mizzou wrestler to earn the All-American distinction three times. Furthermore, Mauller was a three-time Mid American Conference Champion, completing the three-peat 2019-21.



T-29. MICHAEL CHANDLER

Record: 100-40, 2005-2009
Win 100: March 21, 2009 - Matt Moley
[Bloomsburg] Decision, 2-1

Michael Chandler wrapped up his college wrestling career by earning win No. 100, as well as All-America honors, at the 2009 NCAA Championships. The 157-pound starter was a four-time NCAA qualifier and earned his first top-eight finish at the National Tournament after defeating Matt Moley of Bloomsburg, 2-1, in the fifth-place match. Chandler was a two-time team captain and was awarded both the 2006 Most Improved Wrestler and Hap Whitney Coaches award.



T-27. MIKE LARSON

Record: 101-49-0, 2010-2013
Win 100: March 21, 2013 - Daniel Rinaldi
[Rutgers] Decision, 5-2

Larson was a four-time NCAA qualifier during his collegiate career and finally made his way onto the podium in his senior season with an eighth-place finish. Larson wrestled for the Black & Gold for three seasons after transferring from Cal-State Bakersfield following his 2010 campaign. While at Mizzou, Larson posted 77 wins at 184 pounds and was crowned a 2012 Big 12 Conference champion.



T-29. RICK ROMEO

Record: 100-47-0, 1979-1982
Win 100: March 11, 1982 - Bill Paxton
[Indiana] Fall, 3:30

Rick Romeo was the second Tiger to reach the 100-career win mark, finishing with exactly 100 victories. Dominant at heavyweight, Romeo holds the record for the quickest pin in Missouri history, 13 seconds, and held the record for most career falls by a Tiger with 36 pins until a new record was set in 2004 and reset in 2006. Romeo led his team in pins at the close of the 1981-82 season with 16 and in 1982-83 with 14.

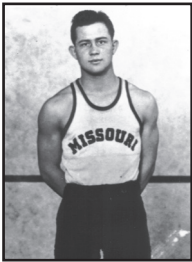
Charles Fisher | 1923-36

The first wrestling coach at the University of Missouri, Charles Fisher, began the program from scratch. He posted his only winning season in 1925-26, the program's third year, going 4-1-0, including a win over border rival Kansas. In 13 years at the helm of Missouri wrestling, Fisher posted a 22-44-1 record and coached one wrestler to All-America status as Van Robbins finished third at 175 pounds in 1930.



Bob Kopnisky | 1974-86

The second-winningest coach in program history, Bob Kopnisky coached the first NCAA All-American in program history, helping guide Terril Williams to a fourth-place finish at 150 pounds in 1977. Mizzou recorded its first NCAA top-10 finish under Kopnisky, as the Tigers finished 10th in 1983-84. Nine wrestlers earned 11 All-America honors under Kopnisky.



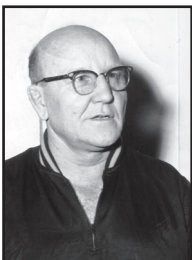
Guy Sappington | 1936-37

The head coach for one season, winning his first match against Illinois State but dropping the next five for a record of 1-5. Unfortunately, wrestling was suspended because of the depression and did not return for two decades.



Wes Roper | 1986-98

In 12 seasons under Wes Roper, Mizzou went 73-94-4 as nine wrestlers earned 11 All-America honors. The best NCAA finish under Roper happened in 1991-92, when the 8-6 Tigers finished 16th, with Kenny Liddell earning All-American honors at 142 pounds, finishing fourth.



Marshall Esteppe | 1959-64

Marshall Esteppe helped bring wrestling back to the University of Missouri in 1959. In the 1963-64 season, Esteppe led the Tigers to their first conference win since 1936 when Mizzou beat Kansas 26-5. In five seasons under Esteppe, Mizzou went 20-31. Mizzou's top freshman award, the Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman of the Year, is named after Esteppe.



Brian Smith | 1998-Present

Mizzou has reached incomparable heights since Smith took over the reins of the Mizzou program. Under Smith, the Tigers have finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships 12 times since 2007, while six Tigers have captured 10 NCAA National Championships under Smith. In total, Coach Smith has coached 31 wrestlers to 67 All-America finishes. Mizzou has won 12 consecutive conference championships, dating back to 2012 when the Tigers won the Big 12 in their final year in the conference. After joining the Mid-American Conference,



Hap Whitney | 1964-74

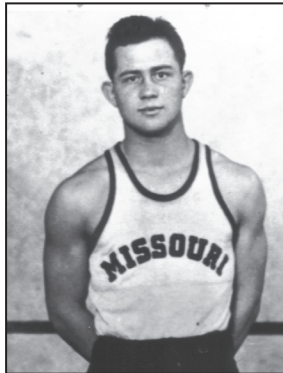
Under the direction of Hap Whitney, Mizzou recorded its first undefeated season in program history, going 18-0-1 in 1967-68. Whitney won 59.2 percent of the duals he coached in 10 seasons, finishing with an 85-55-3 mark. Annually, the Hap Whitney Coaches Award is given to the wrestler who displays dedication, commitment, sacrifice, and unselfishness to the team on a constant basis.

Mizzou won the conference tournament each year (nine straight). Coach Smith has won eight conference Coach of the Year and two National Coach of the Year honors. The Tigers returned to the Big 12 in 2021-22 and won their 11th consecutive conference title, with Smith winning Coach of the Year. Coach Smith was named the Dan Gable Coach of the Year in 2007 and the NWCA Coach of the Year in 2017. Under Smith, six wrestlers have won 10 individual national titles. Additionally, Ben Askren won Dan Hodge Trophies back-to-back in 2006 and 2007. Two Mizzou athletes who wrestled under Smith's direction have competed in the Olympics, Askren in 2008 and J'den Cox, who won Olympic Bronze in 2016.



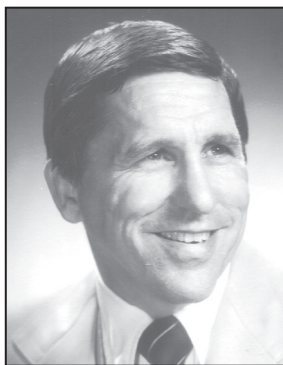
The University of Missouri Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame was made possible by the 1989 bequest of \$100,000 from the estate of the late A.C. [Ace] and Mary Stotler. Located on the south side of Mizzou Arena, there are more than 150 individuals and two teams in the Hall of Fame, including nine former members of the MU wrestling program. The first class was enshrined in 1990.

The first wrestler to earn a letter at the University of Missouri, Guy Sappington was also the first Tiger to win a conference championship when he took the 135-pound title at the 1928 Missouri Valley Conference meet. Sappington later won a Big Six Conference crown at 145 pounds in 1932. In 1933, prior to the institution of the NCAA wrestling championships, he won the national Amateur Athletic Union [AAU] title at 145 pounds. Sappington was the first recipient of the Schutte Award, donated by a Kansas City lumberman and wrestling enthusiast, in honor of Missouri's Most Valuable Wrestler in 1932. Sappington passed away Jan. 20, 1994 in Fresno, Calif.

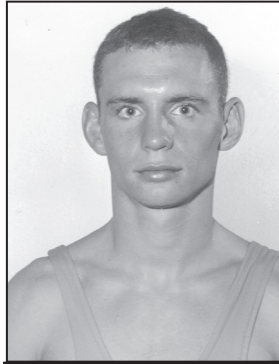


Guy Sappington

A charter member of the Missouri Wrestling Hall of Fame, Hap Whitney coached the Tigers from 1964-74, managing an 88-55-3 record. The St. Louis native became the first wrestler in Missouri High School history to win four state titles. Whitney went to Purdue University, winning a Big Ten Conference title in 1956, later placing third at the NCAA Championships. An alternate to the 1956 U.S. Olympic team, his MU squads accomplished a number of notable firsts: the first to place in the Big Eight Championships (1966), the first finalist at the Big Eight Championships (Steve Cavanaugh, 1967), the first undefeated season (1967-68) and the first nationally-ranked team (1968). After his tenure as wrestling coach, Whitney became assistant athletic director at Missouri, serving until 1981, when he became director of physical education and athletics for Columbia Public Schools. In 1993, he was the Missouri Athletic Director of the Year and the Kiwanis Club's choice as Columbia Sports Person of the Year.

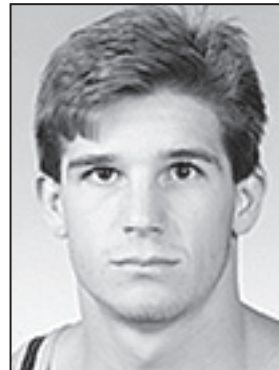

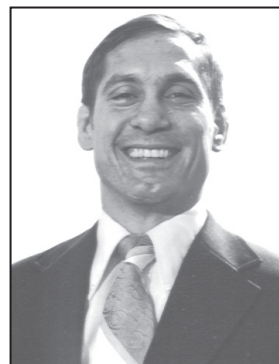
Ed Lampitt

Ed Lampitt became the first Tiger to place at the Big Eight Conference Tournament doing so in 1966. Lampitt captained the first undefeated wrestling team at MU in 1968, and set school records that stood for many years. Graduating with honors in civil engineering, Lampitt became a dentist in 1977, later suffering from a debilitating brain tumor. Two surgeries rendered him unable to speak and totally paralyzed. Through rehabilitation, he recovered but was still paralyzed on one side of his body. Lampitt returned to private practice after learning to perform his duties with one hand. On June 7, 2003, Lampitt received the Wrestling Medal of Courage for overcoming seemingly insurmountable challenges. Lampitt passed away in 2020. The cardio equipment in the wrestling room is named after him.

The only MU wrestler to win two Big Eight Conference titles (1993, 1994), Shaun Fry placed second at the NCAA Championships in 1993 and third in 1994. Fry had a career record of 127-36, which is tied for the sixth most wins in MU history. As a senior, he went 38-3. Fry was a three-time Academic All-Big Eight and two-time Academic All-American selection. With a 3.80 cumulative grade-point average, Fry graduated with honors from MU's physical therapy department. Fry is now the site coordinator for Peak Performance in Jefferson City.

An NCAA champion wrestler at the University of Maryland (1965), Bob Kopnisky came to Missouri as head coach in 1974, and led the Tigers to national prominence. From 1974 to 1986, Kopnisky amassed a wrestling record of 125-72-3. During his 12 years at Mizzou, his teams placed nine times at the NCAA Championships. Kopnisky's 1984 squad finished 10th at the NCAA meet, representing MU's best finish at the time. Prior to his arrival, MU had never had an all-american wrestler, but Kopnisky coached 11, including MU's first-ever Big Eight Conference Champion, John Sonderegger (1984). His son, John Kopnisky, was a standout on the Missouri wrestling team from 1999-2002.



A Missouri standout, 2006 inductee Wes Roper was both a student-athlete and head coach with the Tiger wrestling program. Competing at 150 pounds, the three-time co-captain earned Missouri's sixth All-America honor at the 1982 NCAA Championships after finishing fourth in his class. The winningest wrestler in Missouri history for 25 years, Roper now stands fifth in the Missouri 100-Win Club with 131 victories collected throughout his career. Between 1978 and 1982, the William Chrisman High School graduate was 131-37 and set a new high for most points in a career (461) and most victories by a junior (40). Both records stood for 25 years and were broken by 2006 NCAA Champion Ben Askren (174). Roper began his 12-year Missouri coaching career in 1986 and finished with a 73- Askren (174). 94-4 record that included eight All-Americans, two Big Eight Champions (with Shaon Fry earning honors in both 1993 and 1994), and five Academic All-Americans. Roper still lives in Columbia and serves as an investment broker.

Arguably the most dominant athlete to ever compete in an individual sport in Mizzou history, Ben Askren owned his weight class on a national basis over his final two seasons. He went a combined 87-0 in his junior and senior seasons (42-0 and 45-0, respectively) and won NCAA Championships at 174 pounds in 2006 and 2007 after finishing as NCAA runner-up in his first two years (2004-05). Askren finished his career with a sterling 153-8 record and is the winningest wrestler in Mizzou history. He was also a three-time Big 12 Champion, and became Mizzou's first-ever four-time All-American. In 2006 and 2007, Askren won the Dan Hodge Trophy - given to the nation's top wrestler - becoming just the second wrestler in NCAA history to win the award twice. Askren ended his MU career holding numerous records, including 91 falls (44 more than the old record), and 15 technical falls, among many others. Also a top-notch student who was a four-time first-team Academic All-Big 12 selection, as well as a four-time NWCA Academic All-American. He became the first Tiger wrestler to qualify for the Olympics (Beijing, 2008), and he served for two years as a volunteer assistant on the Mizzou staff before beginning a career in Mixed Martial Arts fighting, where he became the Bellator Welterweight Champion after posting a 9-0 record.

Khris Whelan was a two-time All-American for the Tigers, finishing 7th at 126 pounds in 1980 at the NCAA Championships, as well as fourth at 134 pounds in 1983. He compiled a 97-19-3 career record and was a member of the Mizzou team that placed 12th at the 1982 NCAA Wrestling Championships, which was the highest finish in school history at the time. In Whelan's four years, MU finished 26th (1980), 28th (1981), 12th (1982), and 16th (1983) in the nation. A native of Granite City, Ill., he was named Missouri's Most Outstanding Wrestler in 1983 when he posted a 32-3-1 record. He spent most of that season ranked No. 1 in the nation in his weight class, which was a first at the time for the Tiger program. Whelan was the first MU wrestler to win the prestigious Midlands Tournament (1982) and was MU's first grappler to win the East-West All-Star Classic where he was voted the meet's most outstanding wrestler. He won Mizzou's Marshall Esteppe Most Outstanding Freshman Award in 1979. He later served as the lead assistant coach for Mizzou under Hall of Fame coach Wes Roper from 1988 to 1993. He helped train and develop seven MU All-Americans and two Big Eight Conference champions as a Tiger assistant coach. He also served as a coach for the Great Britian National Team and served as the head coach of the Great Britian women's team. He coached two World Champions, as well as the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta. Since 1997, he has developed more than 20 place-winners and three state champions in the prep ranks, and his 1999-2000 Hazelwood Central team took second place in the Missouri state championships. He was the head coach at SIU-Edwardsville from 2005-07. He also coached at Cahokia (Ill.) High School and at Belleville (Ill.) Althoff High School. He was inducted into the Illinois Wrestling Coaches and Officials Hall of Fame in 2001.

One of the most decorated wrestlers in Mizzou history, who is one of six Tigers all-time to win an individual NCAA Championship, when he claimed the 184-pound title in 2010 as a senior. He was a three-time NCAA All-American, starting with a seventh-place finish at 197 pounds in 2008, followed by a fifth-place showing at 197 in 2009, then wrapping up his career by dropping to the lower weight class, where he closed out his stellar career by going 20-2 overall and helping lead the Tigers to a 10th-place team showing in the championships in 2010. Askren helped Mizzou to three top-11 team finishes at the NCAA Championships, including a seventh-place team finish in 2009, 10th in 2010 and 11th in 2008. Finished his career with a stellar mark of 104-16 overall (.867) which is the sixth-best career winning percentage in program history. His 104 career victories rank as 21st-most in MU Wrestling history. Askren was a two-time Big 12 Conference Champion at 197 pounds (2007, 2008) and a standout in the classroom as well, as he was a four-time National Wrestling Coaches' Association Academic All-American (2007-10), while he also took home first-team Academic All-Big 12 honors in each of those seasons. Won the team's Most Outstanding Wrestler Award for his 2010 title-winning season, three years after he began his career by winning the team's Most Outstanding Freshman award in 2007. Was preceded in the Mizzou Athletics Hall of Fame by his older brother, Ben, who was also a national champion wrestler for the Tigers.



Two-time NCAA All-American, who won the 2009 national title as a heavyweight during his junior season, becoming the first Tiger heavyweight to win a national title. Went 31-3 overall during his national championship season. Also won All-American honors as a senior in 2010, with a sixth-place finish in the heavyweight division to cap a 22-13 campaign. Helped Mizzou to three top-11 team finishes at the NCAA Championships, including an 11th-place showing in 2008, a seventh-place finish in 2009 and a 10th-place finish in 2010. Had a career record of 90-39 (.698), including a 16-11 mark as a freshman in 2007 and a 21-12 record in 2008. Is one of six Mizzou wrestlers to claim a national championship to this point, and his 30 career falls ranks as eight-best in program history. Won the 2010 Mizzou Wrestling Ed Lampitt Total Tiger Award for his well-rounded academic and athletic success, as well as his outstanding citizenship and how he represented Mizzou. Also was named the team's 2009 Most Outstanding Wrestler.

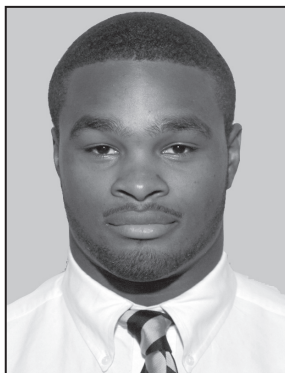

Without question, J'Den Cox is one of the most accomplished and successful athletes in the long history of athletics at the University of Missouri. Wrestling for Coach Brian Smith, Cox became the first three-time NCAA champion in any sport by winning wrestling titles at 197 pounds in 2014, '16 and '17. He was a four-time champion of the Mid-American Conference and only the program's second four-time all-American, joining Ben Askren. He finished his career with a school-record .965 winning percentage (136-5) and tied for second in all-time wins. He won a bronze medal in the 86-kilogram weight class at the 2016 Rio de Janeiro Olympic Games to become Mizzou's seventh Olympic medalist and first since 2008. He won world championships at

92 kilograms in Budapest, Hungary in 2018 and Nur-Sultan, Kazakhstan in 2019. He is qualified to compete at the 2022 World Championships – his fifth appearance – in mid-September in Serbia. A legend at Columbia's Hickman High School, Cox won four state high school wrestling crowns at four different weight classes during his prep career, and never lost a match after his freshman season.

Mizzou's first Big 12 Conference wrestling champion, Tyron Woodley was a two-time All-American for the Tigers, playing a key role in helping Coach Brian Smith elevate the program to one of national prominence. He compiled a career record of 110-38 as a Tiger, ranking him fifth on the school career wins list at the time of his departure. He was a three-time NCAA qualifier and turned two of those appearances into NCAA All-America honors. An outstanding leader, he was a three-time team captain. He won academic All-Big 12 first-team honors as a senior and was a leader among the Mizzou student-athlete population, serving as the Student Athletic Advisory Council (SAAC) president for one term. Woodley went on to a very successful MMA career, eventually winning the UFC Welterweight Championship belt and successfully defended his title four times. He also boxed professionally and worked as an actor on television and in film. He grew up in Ferguson, Missouri.

Drake Houdashelt tallied a thrilling 3-1 sudden-victory decision over No. 3 David Habat of Edinboro, March 21, 2015, at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, to become the fifth individual and sixth overall national champion in Missouri wrestling history. The O'Fallon, Missouri native outscored his five opponents, 30-3, at the 2015 NCAA Wrestling Championships. Two of his wins were major decision shutouts. He left Mizzou as a four-time conference champion (2012 Big 12, 2013-2014-2015 Mid-American Conference), making him the first individual in Mizzou wrestling history to accomplish that feat. He had a career record of 134-23 (3rd most victories), including a 57-9 record in conference duals. His 39 career major decisions are the most in Tiger Style history.
