

## **RATING SYSTEMS**

To settle arguments, *Sports Illustrated* in 1967 researched the first and only complete and wholly accurate list ever compiled of college football's mythical national champions. Every recognized authority that ever presumed to name a No. 1 was included:

Associated Press (1936-current): Poll of sportswriters and broadcasters from across the nation.

Parke H. Davis Ratings (1889-1935): Chosen by Davis, a player at Princeton in 1889 and a former coach at Wisconsin, Amherst and Lafayette, and first published in the 1934 Spalding's Football Guide.

**Dickinson System (1924-40):** Chosen by University of Illinois economics professor Frank G. Dickinson; based on system that awarded various point totals for wins over teams with winning or non-winning records.

Dunkel System (1929-current): A power index rating system devised by Dick Dunkel and syndicated to newspapers around the nation.

Football Writers Association of America (1954-current): Chosen by a panel representing membership.

Helms First Interstate Bank Athletic Foundation (1889-1982): Originally founded in 1936 as Helms Athletic Foundation and changed in the early 1970s to Citizens Savings Athletic Foundation before the most recent name was adopted in 1981.

Illustrated Football Annual (1924-41): An "azzi ratem" system published in this highly regarded magazine by William F. Boand.

Litkenhous System (1934-1984): A "difference-by-score" method syndicated by Fred Litkenhouse and his brother Edward.

National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame (1959-1995): Chosen annually by committee representing membership.

The Football Thesaurus (1927-58): System devised by Duke Houlgate and published in book of same title.

**United Press International (1950-1995):** Poll of 35 college coaches that became the *USA TODAY* coaches poll.

Williamson System (1932-63): System of syndicated power ratings chosen by Paul Williamson, a geologist and member of the Sugar Bowl committee.

The Bowl Championship Series (BCS) (1998-2013): Determined a national champion by matching the country's two top-rated teams in the BCS Standings against each other in a title game.

College Football Playoff (2014-current): For the 10th consecutive season, the Football Bowl Subdivision will utilize a four-team playoff format to determine the national champion. A selection committee will choose the four playoff teams based on their performance during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other. This year's semifinals will be played at the Rose Bowl and Allstate Sugar Bowl on January 1, 2024. The College Football Playoff National Championship will be played on January 8, 2024, at NRG Stadium in Houston. Texas.

Los Angeles Rams defensive tackle Aaron Donald, a three-time NFL Defensive Player of the Year, was the most decorated defensive player in college football in 2013.

Pitt tailback Tony Dorsett was selected as the winner of the Heisman Trophy in 1976, the same season he led the Panthers to the national title with a 12-0 record. While Dorsett is Pitt's lone winner of the Heisman, the Panthers have had nine total players finish in the top five in the final balloting.

Pitt players have also finished in the top 10 of the Heisman voting 15 times.

## PITT IN THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

JIMBO COVERT was called to Canton as part of the special 20-member Centennial Class of 2020 commemorating the NFL's 100th season. The sixth-overall pick in 1983 by the Chicago Bears, Covert earned consensus All-Rookie recognition and spearheaded a Bears' attack that led the NFL in rushing yards in four consecutive seasons (1983-86), with Walter Payton calling Covert, "the best offensive tackle in the NFL." He was a vital part of Chicago's famed 1985 team that went 15-1 and demolished New England in Super Bowl XX, 46-10. A four-time All-Pro, Covert played eight seasons in Chicago and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.

The fourth-overall pick in 1985 by the Minnesota Vikings, CHRIS DOLEMAN played 15 seasons in the NFL and holds status as one of the most productive pass rushers of all time. Doleman was an eight-time Pro Bowler, earning six berths as a member of the Vikings and one each as a member of the Atlanta Falcons and San Francisco 49ers. He was a first team All-Pro three times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1990s. Upon his retirement in 1999, Doleman's 150.5 career sacks ranked fourth in league history. He was enshrined in 2012.

MIKE DITKA became the first tight end elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame when he received enshrinement in 1988. Chicago's No. 1 draft pick in 1961, Ditka had a 12-year career for the Bears (1961-66), Philadelphia Eagles (1967-68) and Dallas Cowboys (1969-72). The 1961 NFL Rookie of the Year, he was All-NFL each of his first four years and made the Pro Bowl his first five seasons. He was part of Chicago's 1963 NFL title team and the Cowboys' 1971 squad that won Super Bowl VI. Ditka then spent 11 seasons as Chicago's head coach (winning Super Bowl XX) and spent three seasons as head coach of the New Orleans Saints.

When TONY DORSETT retired from the NFL after 12 seasons (1977-88), he was the league's second all-time leading rusher with 12,739 yards. He became the first player to win the Heisman Trophy, a collegiate national championship and a Super Bowl, and make the Hall of Fame on both the college and pro levels. Taken by the Dallas Cowboys second overall in 1977, he topped 1,000 yards in eight of his first nine seasons and played in two Super Bowls (helping Dallas win Super Bowl XII) and four Pro Bowls. Dorsett received his "Canton Call" in 1994.

A third-round draft choice of Washington in 1981, RUSS GRIMM went on to start 11 seasons (1981-91) for the famed "Hogs," which included another Pitt great, Mark May. The dominating offensive front helped lead Washington to four Super Bowl appearances, including victories in Super Bowls XVII, XXII and XVII. He was voted to four Pro Bowls (1983-86) and was named to the 1980s All-Decade Team, Grimm received his induction in 2010.

A 1981 second-round draft pick by New Orleans, RICKEY JACKSON spent 15 seasons in the NFL (1981-95) as one of the most disruptive defenders in the game. Upon his retirement, he ranked third all-time in sacks (128), second in fumble recoveries (28) and fourth in forced fumbles (41). Jackson made six trips to the Pro Bowl and was first team All-Pro four times. He helped elevate the Saints from doormat to contender and his final two seasons were played in San Francisco as he helped the 49ers to a victory in Super Bowl XXIX. Jackson was called to Canton in 2010.

When he finished his legendary 17-year career with the Miami Dolphins, **DAN MARINO** was by far the most prolific passer in NFL history. Upon retirement, Marino held an incredible 25 NFL records and was the career leader in pass attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420). Miami's first-round pick in 1983, Marino earned NFL Rookie of the Year. He also was one of the NFL's winningest quarterbacks, earning 147 regular-season victories. A nine-time Pro Bowler and eight-time All-Pro. Marino was enshrined in Canton in 2005.

A third-round draft selection of New England in 1995, CURTIS MARTIN spent three years with the Patriots (1995-97) before joining the New York Jets (1998-2006). At the time of his retirement, he ranked fourth all-time among NFL rushers with an astonishing 14,101 yards. Martin was only the second player to begin his career with 10 consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons. In 2004, he was the NFL rushing champion with 1,697 yards. Martin was named to the Pro Bowl five times and All-Pro three times. He was inducted into Canton in 2012.

Dubbed "Revis Island" for his lockdown cornerback play, **DARRELLE REVIS** became Pitt's 10th Pro Football Hall of Fame member in the Class of 2023. Going 14th overall to the New York Jets in 2007, Revis played 11 NFL seasons, making seven Pro Bowls and earning All-Pro four times. When teams dared to challenge him, Revis made them pay, tallying 29 interceptions, defending 139 passes and recovering 12 fumbles. The Aliquippa native won Super Bowl XLIX with the New England Patriots and also played for Tampa Bay and Kansas City over his 145 career games.

JOE SCHMIDT became the gold standard for NFL middle linebackers during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions. A seventh-round draft pick, Schmidt earned All-Pro 10 times, played in 10 Pro Bowls (tied for a Lions record) and was named to the 1950s All-Decade Team. He served as team captain for nine seasons and totaled 24 career interceptions. The Lions won two NFL titles during Schmidt's career. He later coached the team for six seasons, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance of the 1970s. Schmidt was inducted in 1973.

In 2015, Pitt and NFL great Ruben Brown was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. Brown, a 1994 All-American for the Panthers, became the 24th man associated with the University of Pittsburgh to be selected by the National Football Foundation for enshrinement in the Hall of Fame in Atlanta.

# LARRY FITZGERALD WIDE RECEIVER | 2002-03

- Named the 2003 Walter Camp Player of the Year, becoming the first sophomore to earn that prestigious honor, and also won the Biletnikoff Award as the country's top receiver. Was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming the first Pitt sophomore to be selected unanimously.
- Was the 2003 Heisman Trophy runner-up, finishing behind Oklahoma quarterback Jason White by just 128 points. Fitzgerald carried three voting regions, an unprecedented achievement for a sophomore. It was the highest Heisman finish by a wide receiver since Michigan's Desmond Howard won the award in 1991.
- Compiled 92 catches for 1,672 yards (18.2 avg.) and 22 touchdowns in 2003, leading the nation in receiving yards per game (128.62 avg.) and TD catches.
- In just 26 collegiate games, Fitzgerald totaled 161 catches for 2,677 yards (16.6 avg.) and a Pitt-record 34 touchdowns.
- His freshman season he had 69 catches for 1,005 yards (14.6 avg.) and 12 TDs. Fitzgerald was the first player in Pitt history to compile multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons.
- Caught a touchdown in 18 consecutive games to set an NCAA record. In total, he set or tied four NCAA marks, eight Big East records and 11 Pitt marks.
- Was the third overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft by Arizona and spent his entire 17-year career with the Cardinals.
- Named to the NFL 100 All-Time Team and made 11 Pro Bowl appearances. He ranks second in NFL history in receiving yards (17,492) and receptions (1,432).



# DAN MARINO QUARTERBACK | 1979-82

- While at Pitt from 1979-82, broke nearly every major passing record in school history, including career marks for passing yards (8,597), completions (693) and touchdown passes (79).
- Led Pitt to four consecutive Top 10 finishes, including a pair of No. 2 rankings.
- Enhanced his reputation for delivering in the clutch in the 1982 Sugar Bowl, when he threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to tight end John Brown with 35 seconds left to give Pitt a come-from-behind 24-20 victory over Georgia.
- Named a 1981 All-American and finished fourth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that year.
- A first-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 1983, Marino went on to gain recognition as one of the greatest quarterbacks in NFL history with a record-breaking 17-year career.
- He retired following the 1999 season as the league's all-time leader in passing attempts (8,358), completions (4,967), yardage (61,361) and touchdowns (420).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2002 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2005.



# TONY DORSETT RUNNING BACK | 1973-76

- Winner of the 1976 Heisman Trophy, Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award.
- Was selected an All-American in each of his four seasons (1973–76).
- First player in NCAA history to reach 6,000 career rushing yards. Including bowl games, rushed for 6,526 yards.
- His NCAA-recognized total (not including bowls) of 6,082 yards stood as the Division I record for 22 years (1976-98).
- Gained 100 or more yards 36 times, including 20 consecutive games.
- Remains Pitt's all-time leading scorer with 380 points.
- Holds Notre Dame opponent records for rushing yards against the Irish in a career (754) and game (303).
- Led Pitt to the 1976 national championship with a 12-0 record.
- In 1977, was the first-round pick of the Dallas Cowboys where he
  played 11 seasons (1977-87), including two Super Bowls and four
  Pro Bowls.
- Played his final year with the Denver Broncos (1988) and finished his career as the second all-time leading rusher in NFL history (12,739).
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1994.



# MARSHALL GOLDBERG RUNNING BACK | 1936-38

- Earned back-to-back All-America honors as a halfback (1937) and fullback (1938).
- Member of the famed "Dream Backfield" at Pitt, considered one of college football's greatest back tandems ever.
- Was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy in 1938 and placed third in the Heisman balloting in 1937.
- Led Pitt to national championships in 1936 and 1937 with a combined 17-1-2 record.
- Spent seven years in the NFL playing halfback for the Chicago Cardinals (1939-42, 1946-48).
- Member of the Cardinals' 1947 NFL championship team and had his No. 99 jersey retired by the franchise.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1958.



- Earned All-America honors as a senior linebacker in 1952.
- As both a collegian and professional, Schmidt was considered the era's prototype for linebacker play—instinctive, aggressive and smart.
- Played in 10 Pro Bowls during his 13-year career (1953-65) with the Detroit Lions, which included two NFL championships.
- Served as the Lions' head coach from 1967-72, leading Detroit to its only playoff appearance in the 1970s.
- . Elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1973 and College Football Hall of Fame in 2000.



OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1977-80

- In 1980 was named a unanimous All-American and Pitt's first winner of the prestigious Outland Trophy.
- Did not give up a sack his final two collegiate seasons.
- Was Pitt's "go-to" player on third-and-short situations, earning him the nickname "May Day."
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- Was selected by Washington in the first round of the 1981 NFL Draft and was a standout member of the team's "Hogs" offensive line from 1981-90. Helped the franchise to three Super Bowls (1982, 1983 and 1987), including world championships in '82 and '87. Finished his pro career with the San Diego Chargers (1991) and Arizona Cardinals (1992-93).
- · Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2005.



OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1978-82

- A fixture on Pitt's punishing offensive front from 1980-82, surrendering just three sacks during that span. As a senior, he did not give up a single sack.
- A two-time first team All-American, earning consensus status as a senior.
- Pitt went 31-5 during Covert's three years as a starting offensive tackle, finishing in the nation's Top 10 each season. The 1980 and 1981 teams each went 11-1 and finished as high as No. 2 in the national polls.
- Was chosen in the first round of the 1983 NFL Draft (sixth overall) by the Chicago Bears and was a consensus All-Rookie pick. He played eight seasons in Chicago (1983-90), earning All-Pro honors four times, two first-team All-NFL selections, two Pro Bowl invitations and was twice named the NFL Offensive Lineman of the Year (1985 and 1986).
- With Covert as a spearhead, the Bears led the NFL in rushing four consecutive years (1983-86). He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2003 and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2020.



OFFENSIVE TACKLE | 1981-84

- A three-time first team All-American, including unanimous status as a iunior and senior.
- Became the first offensive lineman to twice finish in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy balloting, placing sixth in 1984 and eighth in 1983.
- His collegiate career led to the creation of the "Pancake." a statistical barometer for each time Fralic put an opposing defensive lineman on his back.
- The second player taken overall in the 1985 NFL Draft, Fralic went on to an exceptional pro career from 1985-93, playing eight years with the Atlanta Falcons and his final season with the Detroit Lions. He was selected to the Pro Bowl four times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1980s.
- Was elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1998.



- Was a unanimous All-America selection at end in 1960.
- Led Pitt in receiving three consecutive years and was also a standout defender and punter. He additionally played baseball and basketball at Pitt and was the intramural wrestling champion.
- In 1961, he was a first-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears and was a member of their 1963 NFL Championship team. He was also a member of the Dallas Cowboys when they won Super Bowl VI and earned All-Pro four times.
- . Spent 11 seasons as the head coach of the Chicago Bears, leading them to victory in Super Bowl XX, and later coached the New Orleans Saints.
- . Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1986 and Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1988.



DEFENSIVE END | 1977-80

- A three-time first team All-American and won the 1980 Lombardi Award, Maxwell Award and the Walter Camp Award.
- Finished second in the 1980 Heisman Trophy balloting, an unprecedented finish for a purely defensive player.
- Was the first-ever defensive player to win the Walter Camp Award.
- Named to Pitt's All-Time Team after just his sophomore year.
- Remains Pitt's all-time sack leader with 49.
- Helped lead Pitt to a four-year record of 39-8-1, including four bowl games and three Top 10 finishes.
- First-round selection by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 1981 and played 11 years in the NFL.
- Elected into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1996.



Erick Hallett II had two interceptions in the 2021 ACC Championship Game and received the John D. Swofford Most Valuable Player Award after Pitt's victory.

Pitt's first bowl trip resembled a politician's whistle-stop tour-wherever Pitt was at lunchtime during its trek west, it practiced. The routine was simple: deboard the train around 11:15; explore the day's town until noon; lunch at 12; walk lunch off, then practice; reboard the train. So it was that Pitt practiced in Dodge City, Albuquerque and Winslow, Arizona, on the way to Pasadena. The game had a sentimental storyline: the coach against his mentor. Panther Head Coach John B. "Jock" Sutherland had played for Stanford Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner when the latter was at Pitt. Amidst all that, the game, although close. was controlled by Stanford. Pitt grabbed a 6-0 third-quarter lead when Jimmy Hagan scooped up a Cardinal fumble and ran 20 yards for a touchdown. The extra point was missed. Stanford, which made several marches deep into Pitt territory, finally scored on an unusual play, On fourth-and-goal at the two, Stanford quarterback Biff Hoffman completed a pass to Bob Sims, but it was short of the goal line. Sims was hit and fumbled, but Frank Wilton picked up the loose ball and carried it in to tie the game. Hoffman's extra point won it, 7-6. Pitt, a slight favorite entering the game,

If vintage football films give you the impression that the game of the 20s and 30s was run, run, and run again, think again. USC's Trojans bombed Pitt with an all-out passing attack. The game started on a bright note for "Jock" Sutherland's team when Toby Uansa rushed 68 yards on Pitt's first play. Pitt failed to score, then the walls caved in. Gaius Shaver connected with Henry Edelson for a 55-vard touchdown, Later in the guarter, Shaver hit Ernest Pinckert for a 28-yard score, capitalizing on a Pitt fumble. Another fumble led to USC's third touchdown, a short run which opened the score to 19-0. Two Jesses set up the Trojans' next score when Jesse Mortensen and Jesse Hill teamed for a 51-yard pass play. Russell Saunders helped convert a USC interception into a 33-0 lead with his 13-yard scoring run. Pitt finally broke through in the third quarter when Uansa threw a 28-yard pass to William Wallinchus. Southern Cal sandwiched two more long touchdown passes (38 and 62 vards) around a Tom Parkinson-to-Paul Collins 36-yard TD pass for Pitt to arrive at the final score. In all, the Trojans scored the most points against Pitt since 1903. It would be Sutherland's second-worst margin of defeat in his 15 seasons at Pitt; the worst would come three years later, also against USC in the Rose Bowl.

#### ROSE BOWL • JAN. 2, 1933

John B. "Jock" Sutherland tried a new ploy after two Rose Bowl losses, taking his team to Tucson to practice for a win, Instead, Sutherland suffered the worst loss in his Pitt career. It was the first time since 1928 that the Panthers were shut out in a defeat. With 83,000 in attendance. Pitt staved close until the fourth quarter before collapsing. USC's Homer Griffith threw, and later caught, a touchdown pass as the Trojans built a 14-0 lead through three quarters. After Irvine Warburton scored to make the score 21-0, Pitt fumbled the kickoff, and Warburton scored again shortly thereafter. A blocked punt set up the final touchdown. Several Panthers were singled out by the crowd with standing ovations: Ted Dailey, Joe Skladany, Charles Hartwig and Warren Heller. who rushed for 63 yards in the final game of his brilliant Pitt career.

ROSE BOWL . JAN. 1, 1937

Pasadena, Calif., Rose Bowl

"Jock" Sutherland was intent on winning the Rose Bowl in his fourth try. To that end, Pitt spent two weeks working out on the west coast, for Sutherland was not going to accept 0-4 in Rose Bowl play. His tactics worked, and captain Bobby LaRue led Pitt to a 21-0 victory, LaRue's running set up the first touchdown of the game, which. fittingly, he scored. LaRue's 50-yard run in the third quarter, which would have gone 75 yards for the touchdown if not for a diving tackle, set up Frank Patrick's touchdown. Pitt led, 14-0, after three quarters. The defense added a late touchdown, returning an interception. So elated was Sutherland that he substituted every player who made the trip, so each could forever relate the experience of playing in a Rose Bowl victory. After four tries, the coach had finally overcome one of the few obstacles in his remarkable career.

#### SUGAR BOWL • JAN. 2, 1956

New Orleans, La., Tulane Stadium

GEORGIA TECH 7 0 0 0 - 7 PITTSBURGH 0 0 0 0 - 0

A controversial pass interference penalty against Pitt's Bobby Grier, the first black man ever to play in the Sugar Bowl, put Georgia Tech on the doorstep for the game's only touchdown. Pitt, under new coach John Michelosen, had several chances to tie the game but hit a wall of futility. Grier's penalty gave Tech the ball on the 1, from where Wade Mitchell snuck in. A fumble killed a first-quarter drive, then quarterback Corny Salvaterra was stopped on a fourth-and-goal just before halftime. Pitt's Ray DiPasquale intercepted a pass to squelch a fourth quarter threat by Tech. In the final moments, Pitt made a furious attempt to tie the game. The Panthers were on Tech's 5-yard line when time ran out.

#### **GATOR BOWL • DEC. 29. 1956**

Jacksonville, Fla., Gator Bowl

Coach John Michelosen's team had wanted a rematch with Georgia Tech, but the result was the same—a seven-point loss. Pitt outgained Tech by 106 yards, 313-207, but was plagued by turnovers. Tech converted an early interception into a 7-0 lead. Pitt was stopped on a goal-line stand at the start of the second quarter, and Tech increased its lead with a halfback-option TD pass. Pitt quarterback Corny Salvaterra hit Dick Bowen with a 36-yard TD pass before the half, and Pitt trailed, 14-7. Bowen's fumble on the second-half kickoff set up the clinching touchdown. Pitt pulled to within seven on Salvaterra's sneak, but could draw no closer.

#### FIESTA BOWL • DEC. 21, 1973

Tempe, Ariz., Sun Devil Stadium

A new era in Pitt football was ushered in with the Panthers' first bowl appearance in 17 years. Coach of the Year Johnny Majors had revived a struggling program and Pitt was 6-4-1 entering this game, Freshman Tony Dorsett was a big part of the turnaround, rushing for 1,686 yards. Pitt struck first, with Dorsett scoring two plays after Tom Perko recovered Arizona State quarterback Danny White's fumble on the first play of the game. But the Sun Devils, playing on their own field, proved too tough, Woody Green scored four plays after Dorsett's touchdown to tie the game. Arizona State scored three touchdowns in 6:04 of the fourth quarter, and although Pitt blocked all three extra points, the game ended one-sided after being tied at halftime. Dorsett rushed for 100 yards, but Pitt turned the ball over seven times. Both quarterbacks, White and Pitt's Billy Daniels, threw three interceptions.

#### SUN BOWL • DEC. 26, 1975

El Paso, Texas, Sun Bowl Stadium

KANSAS 0 0 7 12 - 19 PITTSBURGH 7 12 0 14 - 33

A player rushing for 100 yards is impressive. Two players on the same team is remarkable. Three is unheard of, but that is how Pitt beat Kansas, Elliott Walker (11 carries for 123 yards. 11.2 average) got the ball rolling with a 60-yard touchdown run in the first quarter. Tony Dorsett (27-142) scored two touchdowns in the second quarter. Pitt had nearly 300 rushing yards at the intermission. Quarterback Robert Haygood ran the veer offense to perfection, rushing for 101 yards (14 carries) when he wasn't busy pitching out to Dorsett, Havgood also connected with Gordon Jones for a touchdown after Walker scored his second of the game. Jones set up his own touchdown with a 63-vard kickoff return. With eight wins. Pitt had its best season since 1963. Dorsett rushed for 1,686 yards on the season, matching his 1973 total.

The many remarkable accomplishments that Tony Dorsett achieved in his four years at Pitt were punctuated by his role in this win, one that gave Pitt its first national championship in 39 years. Dorsett, quarterback Matt Cavanaugh and a marauding defense just would not be denied. Cavanaugh, named the game's MVP, scored from six yards out to give Pitt a 7-0 lead. The celebration of that touchdown became an iconic Sports Illustrated cover that can be seen at several sites around Pitt's campus. The photo headline simply read: "PITT IS IT!" Gordon Jones turned a short pass into a 59-yard touchdown excursion in the second guarter. Dorsett's 10-yard TD late in the half cemented the win. He was far from through, however, After gaining 65 yards in the first half, the Heisman Trophy winner exploded in the second to finish with a Sugar Bowl-record 202 yards rushing, including 67 on one run that set up one of Carson Long's two second-half field goals. The defense created six turnovers and limited the Bulldogs to 181 yards. Pitt defenders actually caught more Georgia passes than did Georgia receivers (four interceptions, compared to three completions in 22 attempts). Vince Dooley, Georgia's head coach, said this about the 12-0 Panthers: "They proved today they are the best in the country. They have amazing balance; they are the best defensive team we've seen. I think that is obvious. They are also the best offensive team we've faced." Pitt coach Johnny Majors, who completed his four-year stint at Pitt with a 33-13-1 record (after a combined 13-29 mark in the previous four years) was named Coach of the Year for the second time at Pitt.

**GATOR BOWL • DEC. 30, 1977** 

Jacksonville, Fla., Gator Bowl

Pitt set five Gator Bowl records for offensive proficiency in a demolition of the highly regarded Clemson Tigers. Matt Cavanaugh completed 23-of-36 passes for 387 yards and four TDs as Pitt outgained Clemson, 566-268. Three scoring tosses went to fullback Elliott Walker, who joined Tony Dorsett as the second Pitt back ever to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. Gordon Jones scored the other TD on one of his 10 receptions for 163 yards. Cavanaugh threw for 211 yards and two touchdowns in the first half alone. Clemson's vaunted passing combination of Steve Fuller-to-Jerry Butler was rendered ineffective by a Pitt secondary which swooped in for four interceptions, two by senior safety Bob Jury. Cavanaugh, a 1977 All-American, missed part of the season after suffering a broken wrist against Notre Dame in the first game of the year. "I shudder to think what he could have done had he stayed healthy," said Coach Jackie Sherrill, who finished his first year at Pitt with a 9-2-1 mark.

TANGERINE BOWL • DEC. 23, 1978

Orlando, Fla., Tangerine Bowl

7 10 3 10 NC STATE PITTSBURGH 0 0 3 14

The Panthers saved their worst performance of the season for this bowl outing with North Carolina State. Primarily a running team in 1978, Pitt attempted to open it up on this night, throwing 48 passes. Four were intercepted, however. The Wolfpack, led by star running back Ted Brown, rolled up a 23-3 fourth quarter lead before Pitt quarterback Rick Trocano tried to bring the Panthers back. An 18-play drive featured four fourth-down conversions, the last of which resulted in a Freddie Jacobs touchdown. Pitt moved to State's 34-yard line with five minutes remaining, but an interception settled the issue. Trocano was intercepted twice more before the game ended, but he also led Pitt to the game's final touchdown, "Execution on our part was our biggest problem," Coach Jackie Sherrill said. "We didn't play well...and the turnovers hurt us." Pitt finished 8-4.

FIESTA BOWL • DEC. 25, 1979

Tempe, Ariz., Sun Devil Stadium

Pitt finished the 1979 season with a 10-game winning streak, built in part around the arm of freshman quarterback Dan Marino. The season finale came on Christmas Day, with the Panthers rounding out an 11-1 campaign with a 16-10 win over Arizona. The Wildcats, coached by former Pitt radio commentator Tony Mason, threatened often but did not score a touchdown until the game's waning moments. Junior cornerback Terry White intercepted two passes. One set up the second of three Mark Schubert field goals; the other allowed Pitt to run out the clock. Two of Schubert's kicks were from 46 yards out. Pitt's only touchdown came after a 12-play drive, with Marino hitting Benjie Pryor from 12 yards out. The last three plays of the drive: Marino to Mike Dombrowski for 34 yards. Marino to Ralph Still for 24 vards, and the touchdown.

Pitt's defense wanted this game badly. Its leader for four years, Hugh Green, finished second in the Heisman Trophy voting behind South Carolina's George Rogers. With the chance to avenge that result, Pitt smothered the Gamecocks with a swarming defense and an efficient offense. Rick Trocano and Dan Marino split time at quarterback; each threw a touchdown pass and Trocano added a short TD run. Although Rogers gained 113 yards, his two fumbles were more of a factor in the game than his rushing output. Tom Flynn recovered Rogers' fumble on the first play of the game, leading to Trocano's score. Randy McMillan scored two touchdowns as Pitt rolled to a 37-3 lead. The defense was led by Rickey Jackson, who made 19 tackles (14 solos). Pitt finished the season 11-1.

SUGAR BOWL • JAN. 1, 1982

New Orleans, La., Superdome

One of the most dramatic finishes in Pitt football history gave Pitt its second Sugar Bowl win over Georgia. Pitt trailed, 20-17, with 42 seconds remaining. It faced a fourth-and-5 at the Bulldog 33. Coach Jackie Sherrill disdained the potential 50-yard field goal attempt. "With five minutes to go I said we were not here to tie, we were here to win." Sherrill said. Dan Marino wanted to throw a short pass to a running back to get the first down, but a Georgia blitz left tight end John Brown in single coverage down the middle. Marino was right on target for the touchdown, his third of the game. The Panther defense limited Herschel Walker to 84 yards on 25 carries.

COTTON BOWL • JAN. 1, 1983

Dallas, Texas, Cotton Bowl

The Panthers' season came to a dismal end as Pitt lost to Southern Methodist in the Mustangs' own backyard. Dan Marino, in his last game at Pitt, was plagued by dropped passes on the cold, rainy day. He completed 19-of-37 for 181 vards. Fumbles were the story of the first quarter. Joe McCall lost one at the SMU one-yard line, but Mustang QB Lance McIlhenny returned the favor with a fumble at the Pitt seven. Eric Schubert's missed field goal attempt left the game scoreless at the half. Marino completed five straight short passes to set up Schubert's 43-yard kick, which gave Pitt its only points. SMU's "Pony Express" backfield (Eric Dickerson and Craig James) led an 80-yard drive, which McIlhenny capped off with a nine-yard run. Pitt's last chance ended when a Marino pass was tipped and intercepted in the end zone.

John Congemi completed a school-record 31 passes for 341 yards, but a late Ohio State touchdown pass spoiled Congemi's, and Pitt's, afternoon. Congemi's second-quarter touchdown pass to tight end Clint Wilson tied the score at 7-7, but the Buckeyes led, 14-7, entering the fourth quarter. Wilson fell on Joe McCall's fumble in the end zone to tie the score early in the fourth quarter. Ohio State's Keith Byars scored his second touchdown by returning the ensuing kickoff 99 yards. Congemi was six-for-six on Pitt's next touchdown drive, which culminated with an 11-vard pass to Dwight Collins, Congemi. who completed 19-of-27 in the second half, had his conversion pass broken up, and Pitt trailed, 21-20. A 17-play drive later in the quarter ended with Snuffy Everett's 37-yard field goal to put the Panthers on top. Quarterback Mike Tomczak led Ohio State back, ending an 89-yard drive with a 39-yard bomb to Thad Jemison, who scored with 39 seconds remaining. Head Coach Foge Fazio's Panthers drove to the Buckeve 24, but could get no further.

#### BLUEBONNET BOWL • DEC. 31, 1987

Houston, Texas, Astrodome

TEXAS 14 3 3 12 — 32 PITTSBURGH 7 0 7 13 — 27

Despite late heroics from Larry Wanke, Pitt was grounded in this aerial circus, as Texas quarterback Brett Stafford and split end Tony Jones set Bluebonnet Bowl records. The New Year's Eve crowd was treated to an action-packed game from the start. Stafford connected with Jones for a 77-yard touchdown on the first play from scrimmage. Pitt retaliated quickly: Billy Owens returned the kickoff 45 yards, Billy Osborn hit Reggie Williams for 45 more yards on a trick play: then Craig Heyward tied the score with a four-yard burst. Six plays later, the Longhorns took the lead for good as Stafford hit Jones on a short pass that he broke for a 60-vard touchdown. Stafford finished the first quarter with 202 yards passing on the way to a 368-yard night. Jones set records for receiving yards and longest reception. Wanke replaced Darnell Dickerson early in the third quarter after Dickerson suffered a knee injury. Wanke completed 8-of-20 passes for 172 yards and three touchdowns, including two late in the fourth quarter that cut the Longhorns' lead to five. Heyward rushed for 136 yards, winning his personal battle with Texas star Eric Metcalf, who finished with 95 yards rushing. Heyward ended the season with 1.791 vards, the second-best in Pitt history. Pitt finished the year at 8-4, their most successful season since 1983.

#### JOHN HANCOCK BOWL • DEC. 30, 1989

El Paso, Texas, Sun Bowl Stadium

TEXAS A&M 7 3 12 6 — 28 PITTSBURGH 7 10 7 7 — 31

Led by bowl MVP Alex Van Pelt's 354 vards passing, Pitt parlayed a John Hancock Bowlrecord 530 yards in offense into a 31-28 comefrom-behind victory over Texas A&M. It was a day of firsts for the Panthers, Paul Hackett, named head coach moments before kickoff, won his first game as a head coach. It also was Pitt's first bowl win since the Panthers' 24-20 Sugar Bowl victory over Georgia in 1982. Van Pelt, who completed 20-of-40 passes and threw for two touchdowns. rallied the Panthers from a 28-24 deficit, when he connected with Henry Tuten on a 44-yard touchdown strike with just 2:19 remaining in the game, giving Pitt a 31-28 lead. Tailback Curvin Richards rushed for 156 yards on 23 carries and scored the first points of the game with a 12-vard TD. Texas A&M countered with a nine-yard touchdown run by quarterback Lance Pavlas, tving the score at 7-7 to end the first quarter. With the score tied at 10 late in the first half, Van Pelt threw an eight-yard touchdown pass to Ronald Redmon, giving Pitt a 17-10 halftime lead, Flanker Olanda Truitt completed his freshman season in stellar fashion, catching four passes for 124 vards, including a key 59-vard reception that set up Redmon's score. Carnel Smith finished the game with 10 tackles and Barry Threats had a game-ending interception, which ended Texas A&M's final drive and secured the Panthers' victory. The Hancock Bowl win marked the end of another decade in Pitt football history and the dawn of the Hackett coaching era. The Panthers finished the 1989 season with an 8-3-1 record.

# AXA/EQUITABLE LIBERTY BOWL • DEC. 31, 1997

Memphis, Tenn., Liberty Bowl

Playing its first postseason game in eight seasons, Pitt fell victim to an opportunistic Southern Mississippi defense and suffered a 41-7 defeat in the 1997 AXA/Equitable Liberty Bowl. It was the Panthers' first-ever appearance in the Liberty Bowl and their first bowl game since a 31-28 victory over Texas A&M in the 1989 John Hancock Bowl. Pitt threatened early, driving to the Golden Eagles' 13 on its initial series, but failed to score any points. Southern Miss responded with a pair of touchdown drives for a 14-0 second-quarter lead. The Panther offense, held in check for most of the game, had its lone shining moment when quarterback Pete Gonzalez connected with Jake Hoffart on an 89-yard pass-and-run touchdown as Pitt trailed 14-7 at halftime. Hoffart, who finished with five catches for 121 yards, set a Liberty Bowl record with his touchdown catch. The Panthers. however, would come no closer. USM's defense returned a fumble and two interceptions for touchdowns in the second half to roll to its first victory ever over Pitt.

Phoenix, Ariz., Bank One Ballpark

Making its second postseason appearance under Walt Harris, Pitt rolled up big offensive numbers but fell in a shootout to Iowa State, 37-29, in the Insight.com Bowl. The Panthers held statistical advantages in total offense (491 yards to 375), passing (347 to 308) and rushing (164 to 107). The Panthers struck on their very first possession of the game when John Turman hit a streaking Antonio Bryant for a 72-vard touchdown and 7-0 lead. The Cyclones, however, responded with 27 unanswered points, including 20 in the second period. Pitt pulled within 27-14 when Rod Rutherford snuck in from two yards out. Bryant then made a brilliant diving catch for a 44-yard touchdown and the Panthers trailed 27-20 with 2.05 left in the third. The Panthers' momentum. was slowed when Iowa State's JaMain Billups returned a punt 72 yards for a score early in the fourth. Kevan Barlow, who finished with 114 rushing yards, bulled in from the three to make it 34-29 at the 9:45 mark. But the Panthers could draw no closer. The contest marked the first football game ever played in Bank One Ballpark, home of Major League Baseball's Arizona Diamondbacks.

# VISIT FLORIDA TANGERINE BOWL • DEC. 20, 2001

Orlando, Fla., Florida Citrus Bowl

Pitt captured its first bowl victory since 1989 with a 34-19 win over NC State in the Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl. The victory gave the Panthers their strongest close to a season since 1980 by winning their final six games. Hobbled by an ankle injury, Antonio Bryant went on to earn Most Valuable Player honors after catching seven passes for 101 yards and two touchdowns. David Priestlev put up MVP-like statistics himself, completing 18-of-32 passes for 271 vards and the two scoring strikes to Bryant. The duo propelled the Panthers to a 24-10 halftime lead. The Pitt defense held strong and limited Wolfpack quarterback Philip Rivers to just 189 yards through the air and sacked him four times. NC State closed to 27-19 in the fourth quarter but blitzing Lewis Moore quelled the threat when he sacked Rivers and forced a fumble. Tyre Young picked it up and ran 16 yards untouched for the clinching TD. Moore, who finished with seven tackles (all solo), including two for losses, was named Pitt's Defensive MVP.

Phoenix, Ariz., Bank One Ballpark

Pitt achieved its finest season in two decades with a 38-13 triumph over Oregon State in the Insight Bowl. The Panthers finished 9-4, their winningest season since 1982, and secured a spot in the final national polls for the first time since 1989. The win marked the Panthers' second consecutive postseason victory. A stifling defensive effort, efficient offense as well as a special teams gem keyed the result. Tied at 10 at halftime, OSU quarterback Derek Anderson was intercepted by Tez Morris, who returned the ball 36 yards to the Beavers' 23 early in the third quarter, Rod Rutherford completed a 22-vard pass to Larry Fitzgerald to the one before rushing up the middle for a 17-10 lead just three minutes into the second half. The Panthers broke open the contest later in the third when Shawn Robinson fielded a punt at the Panthers' 34, ran wide to the right and sprinted down the sideline for a 66-yard touchdown. It was the first punt return for a TD in Pitt's bowl history. Pitt iced the game with a 44-vard touchdown drive climaxed by Brandon Miree's seven-yard burst. Miree, who earned the game's Offensive MVP honor, finished with 113 vards rushing on 20 carries (5.7 avg.). In contrast. OSU tailback Steven Jackson-who entered the game as the nation's fifth-leading rusher—was held to a season-low 34 yards.

CONTINENTAL TIRE BOWL • DEC. 27, 2003

Charlotte, N.C., Ericsson Stadium

A skillful and methodical opening drive that moved 69 yards to the Virginia one-yard line ultimately failed to produce any points, setting the tone in Pitt's 23-16 loss in the Continental Tire Bowl. Virginia scored the game's first touchdown four plays later and went on to win its second consecutive Continental Tire Bowl, Missed opportunities were the theme for Pitt, which finished 8-5 for the season, with a missed extra point, missed field goal, an interception and a lost fumble on a potential game-tying drive. Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald saw his NCAA record touchdown streak end at 18 games, but the All-American still led the Panthers with five catches for 77 yards. Brandon Miree rushed for 110 yards and added four receptions, including one for a 17-yard touchdown. The scoring pass from Rod Rutherford was his 37th of the season. tying Dan Marino's school record set in 1981.

TOSTITOS FIESTA BOWL • JAN. 1, 2005

Tempe, Ariz., Sun Devil Stadium

PITTSBURGH 0 0 7 0 7 7 21 0 UTAH - 35

Making its first appearance in the Fiesta Bowl since the 1983 season, Pitt fell victim to a lethal Utah passing game and equally potent pass rush in a 35-7 defeat. Tyler Palko was sacked a Fiesta Bowl-record nine times and the Panthers' offense was grounded most of the evening. The Utes finished the 2004 season with a 12-0 record and ranked as high as fourth in the final polls. Pitt finished with an 8-4 mark and ranked No. 25. Utah scored touchdowns on five of its first seven possessions, including all three in the third quarter. Pitt advanced into Utah territory three times in the first half but four sacks and a blocked field goal kept the Panthers off the scoreboard. The Panthers' lone score came on a beautiful over-the-shoulder grab by Greg Lee that went for a 31-yard touchdown with 4:28 left in the third quarter. Lee had seven receptions for 93 vards, while fellow wideout Joe DelSardo had nine catches for 109 yards.

BRUT SUN BOWL • DEC. 31, 2008

El Paso, Texas, Sun Bowl Stadium

OREGON STATE 0 3 0 3 PITTSBURGH 0 0 0 0

Making its first bowl appearance since the 2004 season. Pitt failed to take advantage of a masterful defensive performance, falling to Oregon State, 3-0, in the Sun Bowl, The Panthers (9-4) held the Beavers to 273 yards and forced three turnovers. Unfortunately Pitt's offense was also bottled up, managing only 178 yards and never penetrating Oregon State's 36-yard line. The Panthers appeared poised to pull out another fourth-quarter comeback when T.J. Porter returned a punt 36 yards to the OSU 42 with 12:39 left in the game. A sack and forced fumble by the Beavers' Victor Butler, however, ended the threat. Pitt's final scoring opportunity came with 2:02 remaining when Conor Lee attempted a 57vard field goal, but the kick fell just short of the crossbar, Linebackers Scott McKillop and Austin Ransom led Pitt with 11 tackles each. McKillop also had an interception in the end zone to end the first half. Greg Romeus was named the Jimmy Rogers Jr. Most Valuable Lineman after collecting four tackles and two sacks. Oregon State (9-4) placekicker Justin Kahut accounted for the lone points of the day on a 44-yard field goal with 2:18 left in the second quarter. It was the lowest scoring bowl game since 1959, a 0-0 tie between Air Force and TCU in the Cotton Bowl.

Dan Hutchins kicked four field goals, including a 33-yarder with 52 seconds left, to lift Pitt past North Carolina in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. The victory climaxed a 10-3 season for the Panthers, their winningest campaign since 1981. Freshman running back Dion Lewis was named the bowl's MVP after rushing for 159 yards and a touchdown against the nation's No. 6 overall defense. Lewis finished his spectacular debut season with a Pitt freshman-record 1,799 yards, surpassing Tony Dorsett's 1973 frosh total (1,686). Hutchins set Pitt records for single-season field goals (23) and kick scoring (115). His four field goals also set a Meineke Car Care Bowl record. Linebacker Max Gruder had a game-high 11 tackles, while defensive tackle Mick Williams had two sacks. Freshman linebacker Dan Mason, making a surprise start, had a key interception on the goal line late in the first half. As a unit, the Pitt defense limited the Tar Heels to just 264 total yards, including a mere 81 on the ground. It was Pitt's first postseason victory since the 2002 Insight Bowl. The win clinched a final national ranking of No. 15 in both polls for Pitt, its highest since 1982. The Tar Heels finished 8-5.

BBVA COMPASS BOWL • JAN. 8, 2011

Birmingham, Ala., Legion Field

Pitt utilized a punishing running game and forced two Kentucky punting miscues to defeat the Wildcats, 27-10, in the BBVA Compass Bowl played at historic Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. Andrew Taglianetti blocked a punt to set up Pitt's first touchdown late in the second quarter, giving the Panthers a 13-3 lead. Pitt then forced an incomplete pass on a Kentucky fake punt early in the third, setting up Tino Sunseri's 13-vard TD pass to Brock DeCicco that made it 20-3. The Wildcats countered with their only touchdown, a one-vard run by Moncell Allen later in the period that cut the deficit to 10. But the Panthers answered with a long drive that was capped by a two-yard touchdown run by Dion Lewis to seal the result. Lewis rushed for 105 yards and a TD to earn his second consecutive bowl MVP award. Defensively the Panthers held Kentucky well below its average of 33 points per game. Defensive backs Dom DeCicco and K'Waun Williams had nine tackles each. Pitt, playing the game under acting head coach Phil Bennett, finished 8-5, while the Wildcats fell to 6-7.

Birmingham, Ala., Legion Field

SMU 21 0 7 0 - 28 PITTSBURGH 0 3 3 0 - 6

Playing in Birmingham's BBVA Compass Bowl for the second consecutive season, Pitt fell into a big first-quarter hole and never recovered in a 28-6 loss to Southern Methodist. SMU led 21-0 after one period with quarterback J.J. McDermott throwing for one TD and rushing for another. The Mustangs' third score of the opening quarter, a two-yard run by Rishaad Wimbley, came after a Pitt fumble at its own 27. Placekicker Kevin Harper accounted for all of Pitt's points with a pair of field goals. The Panthers produced just 205 yards in offense on the day and gave up seven sacks. SMU managed 300 yards but was sparked by the passing combo of McDermott and receiver Darius Johnson, who had seven catches for 120 vards, including a 50-vard TD to open the game's scoring. Pitt was led by interim head coach Keith Patterson. The Panthers finished 6-7 on the year. SMU improved to 8-5. It was the first meeting between Pitt and SMU since the Jan. 1, 1983 Cotton Bowl (also won by the Mustangs, 7-3).

#### BBVA COMPASS BOWL • JAN. 5, 2013

Birmingham, Ala., Legion Field

PITTSBURGH 0 10 0 7 — 17 MISSISSIPPI 14 10 7 7 — 38

Bo Wallace threw three touchdown passes to lead Mississippi to a 38-17 victory over Pitt in the BBVA Compass Bowl, the first-ever meeting between the two schools. Wallace, the game's MVP, skillfully directed the Rebels' no-huddle, up-tempo attack. Ole Miss rolled up 23 first downs and 387 yards. Pitt was held to 266 yards, its second-lowest total of the season. Pitt's 1,000-yard rusher, Ray Graham, did not play due to a hamstring injury. Fielding a shuffled offensive line, the Panthers mustered just 81 rushing yards. Pitt (6-7) fell behind early after Tino Sunseri threw his first interception since September and Ole Miss capitalized with a TD pass less than five minutes into the game. The Rebels built leads of 14-0. 31-10 and, by the final period, 38-10. As a unit, Pitt's defense struggled to slow Ole Miss (7-6) down, but safety Jason Hendricks had an exceptional day, collecting 17 tackles, two TFLs and an interception.

# LITTLE CAESARS PIZZA BOWL • DEC. 26. 2013

Detroit, Mich., Ford Field

PITTSBURGH 7 10 3 10 — 30 BOWLING GREEN 3 7 10 7 — 27

Sparked by freshmen James Conner and Tyler Boyd, Pitt edged Mid-American Conference champ Bowling Green, 30-27, in Detroit. Conner rushed for 229 yards, while Boyd caught eight passes for 173 yards and also scored on a punt return. Conner broke Pitt's bowl rushing record held by Tony Dorsett (202 vs. Georgia in the Jan. 1, 1977, Sugar Bowl). Conner also played on defense as a pass rusher-drawing a key holding penalty on Bowling Green's final possession-and was named the game's MVP. Boyd broke Pitt's bowl record for receiving vards (surpassing Gordon Jones' 163 vs. Clemson in the Dec. 30, 1977, Gator Bowl) and had the Panthers' first punt return TD since 2006. A third freshman. Chris Blewitt, provided the winning points on a 39-yard field goal with 1:17 remaining. Chad Voytik, playing the entire second half in relief of injured Tom Savage, completed 5-of-9 passes for 108 yards and had a five-yard TD run. In his final Pitt appearance. Aaron Donald had a game-clinching sack in the final minute and was named the bowl's Most Valuable Lineman. With its first bowl win since 2010. Pitt finished 7-6 and dropped the Falcons to 10-4.

#### LOCKHEED MARTIN ARMED FORCES BOWL • JAN. 2, 2015

Fort Worth, Texas, Amon G. Carter Stadium

HOUSTON 0 6 0 29 — 35 PITTSBURGH 0 17 7 10 — 34

Pitt fell victim to a furious fourth-quarter rally in a 35-34 loss to Houston in the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, The Panthers (6-7) held leads of 31-6 and 34-13 in the final period. Houston quarterback Greg Ward fueled the rally by throwing three touchdown passes in the final 3:41—the last two after the Cougars (8-5) recovered onside kicks-and then completed the game-winning two-point conversion to cap the largest comeback in an FBS game in 2014 and largest ever in a bowl game that didn't go into overtime. Ward finished with 274 passing yards and also rushed for 92. The Panthers led by 21 points with 6:14 left when Chris Blewitt kicked a 29-yard field goal. Blewitt also had a career-long 52-yarder as time expired in the first half to give Pitt a 17-6 lead. The Panthers were under the direction of interim coach Joe Rudolph, who replaced the departing Paul Chryst.

#### MILITARY BOWL • DEC. 28, 2015

Annapolis, Md., Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium

Navy's record-setting quarterback Keenan Reynolds ran for three scores and threw for another to lead the Midshipmen to a 44-28 win over Pitt in the Military Bowl. Revnolds rushed for 144 yards, threw for 126 and even had a 47-yard reception on a trick play. Pitt began the game in exciting fashion as Quadree Henderson returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a 7-0 lead. Navy responded with three unanswered touchdowns to seize a 21-7 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 31-7 midway through the third quarter before the Panthers struck back. Pitt scored two touchdowns in 17 seconds—a four-vard catch by Qadree Ollison and 22-yard fumble return by Jordan Whitehead—to close to 31-21 entering the final quarter. After Navy scored another TD. Ollison ran for a 45-yard score to make it 38-28 with 9:35 left. That would be as close as Pitt would get as Reynolds iced the game with a nineyard TD run on Navy's subsequent possession. The game was played before an overflow crowd of 36,352 in the Midshipmen's home stadium. Pitt completed Pat Narduzzi's inaugural season with an 8-5 record, its best mark since 2010. Navy finished 11-2 and earned a No. 18 ranking in the final polls.

# NEW ERA PINSTRIPE BOWL • DEC. 28, 2016

Bronx, N.Y., Yankee Stadium

PITTSBURGH 3 7 7 7 — 24 NORTHWESTERN 0 14 7 10 — 31

Pitt closed the 2016 season on a sour note. dropping a 31-24 decision to Northwestern in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl. The Panthers were foiled by an effective Northwestern rushing attack led by Justin Jackson, who ran for 224 yards and three touchdowns. Failed red zone opportunities and untimely injuries also keyed the final result. Pitt penetrated the Wildcats' 20-yard line seven times but only cashed in on three of those possessions. The Panthers (8-5) also lost five starters to injuries during the game, including tailback James Conner late in the second quarter and quarterback Nathan Peterman in the third. Still, the Panthers claimed a 24-21 lead early in the final period when Ben DiNucci, who came on in relief of Peterman, passed to George Aston for a six-yard score. But Northwestern (7-6) would seize control for the balance of the game, turning a 4th-and-1 into a 21-yard play-action TD pass that made it 28-24 and then hitting a field goal for a seven-point lead. Pitt's final two possessions ended in interceptions, sealing the victory for the Wildcats.

In the first meeting between the two programs since 1932, Pitt dominated nearly every statistical category but fell to Stanford, 14-13. Making their fourth all-time Sun Bowl appearance, the Panthers (7-7) outgained the Cardinal by a 344to-208 margin yet couldn't muster enough points to capitalize on the stellar defensive performance. Pitt didn't allow a Stanford first down until the second quarter. Alex Kessman's 29-vard field goal at 14:14 of the second period gave the Panthers a 3-0 lead. The Cardinal (9-4) responded with a 64yard drive capped by Cameron Scarlett's one-yard TD run. With tailback Qadree Ollison sidelined due to an early injury, Darrin Hall carried the load for the Panthers' rushing attack and finished with 123 yards on 16 carries. Hall's six-vard scoring run with 2:32 left before intermission gave Pitt a 10-7 lead. Kessman increased the advantage to 13-7 with a 28-yard field goal in the third quarter. Stanford's decisive touchdown was a fortuitous one—Dewayne Hendrix forced a fumble from Cardinal QB K.J. Costello, but the ball flew right into the hands of Scarlett in the end zone. The subsequent extra point put Stanford ahead for good with 11:28 to play. Pitt's final serious threat ended with a missed 55-yard field goal.

#### QUICK LANE BOWL • DEC. 26, 2019

Detroit, Mich., Ford Field

PITTSBURGH 0 17 3 14 E. MICHIGAN 10 10 0 10

Pat Narduzzi's first bowl win as a head coach was a thrilling and fitting way to end the Panthers' 2019 campaign. After Pitt had played eight onescore games during the regular season, Narduzzi's team yet again went down to the wire-this time with Eastern Michigan in the Quick Lane Bowl. The Panthers didn't lead until guarterback Kenny Pickett connected with receiver Taysir Mack in the end zone for a spectacular, one-handed catch that proved to be the winning TD with just 47 seconds remaining. The Panthers (8-5) earned their first postseason victory since 2013. The Eagles (6-7) jumped out to an early 10-0 lead before Alex Kessman put Pitt on the board with a 44-yard field goal. Then the Panthers found an offensive spark with a 96-yard TD from Pickett to Maurice Ffrench—the longest passing play in Pitt history. EMU quickly responded with a 50-yard scoring pass from QB Mike Glass to Quian Williams and took a 20-17 lead into halftime. The teams traded scores in the second half in front of a Quick Lane Bowl record crowd of 34.765. The Eagles took a 30-27 advantage when Chad Ryland booted a 48-yard field goal with 6:00 to play. After consecutive three-and-outs, the stage was set for Pitt's dramatic 10-play, 91-yard drive that concluded with Mack's decisive touchdown. Pickett completed 27-of-39 passes for 361 yards and three scores to earn Most Valuable Player.

CHICK-FIL-A PEACH BOWL • DEC. 30, 2021

Atlanta, Ga., Mercedes-Benz Stadium

7 7 7 0 PITTSBURGH MICH. STATE 10 0 0 21 - 31

Pitt's historic 2021 season concluded with a loss to Michigan State in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl. The Spartans rallied from an 11-point deficit in the final quarter to seize the win. Payton Thorne threw two fourth-quarter touchdown passes, including a 22-yarder to Jayden Reed that put Michigan State (11-2) up 24-21 with less than three minutes remaining. Pitt marched to the Spartans' 26-yard line with 36 seconds to play, but Cal Haladay's 78-vard interception return for a score sealed the result. Without the services of All-America quarterback Kenny Pickett, the Panthers (11-3) tapped Nick Patti as their starter. Patti accounted for Pitt's first score-a 16-yard scramble that made it 7-7 at the 7:57 mark of the opening period—but was injured as he dove for the end zone and would not return. Davis Beville, making just his third appearance of the season, came on in relief and completed 14-of-18 passes for 149 yards with a TD and INT. Beville threw his first career touchdown, a four-varder to Jared Wayne, to give Pitt a 14-10 halftime lead. The advantage swelled to 21-10 early in the third period when John Morgan forced Thorne to fumble and Cam Bright returned it for a 26-yard TD. Unfortunately those would be the final points Pitt could muster, setting the stage for 21 unanswered points by the Spartans in the game's final 8:06.

TONY THE TIGER SUN BOWL • DEC. 30, 2022

El Paso, Texas, Sun Bowl Stadium

PITTSBURGH 6 8 7 16 7 14 7 7 — 35 LICI A

On a windy El Paso day, Ben Sauls kicked five field goals, including a 47-yarder with four seconds left, to lift Pitt to a 37-35 win over No. 18 UCLA in the Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. Pitt twice rallied in the second half—trailing 28-14 in the third quarter and then 35-34 with 34 seconds leftto claim victory. The 14-point second-half deficit was the largest Pitt (9-4) had ever overcome to win a bowl. It was Pitt's fifth consecutive victory on the season and came despite being down no fewer than seven regulars due to injury or participation decisions. Quarterback Nick Patti was the biggest supporting cast member to step up in this game. Making just the third start of his college career, Patti directed Pitt to 20 unanswered points and a 34-28 lead late in the fourth guarter. UCLA (9-4) reclaimed the lead with 34 seconds left with a 70-yard TD drive. But Patti, with no timeouts, led a final march—completing two passes for 35 yards and scrambling for 11—to set up the game-winning kick. Patti accounted for 297 total vards (225 passing and 72 rushing), while bowl MVP Rodney Hammond Jr. rushed for 94 vards and two TDs. Pitt's defense forced five crucial turnovers. including four interceptions.



Ben Sauls' game-winning field goal in the final seconds of the 2022 Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl lifted Pitt to a thrilling 37-35 victory over No. 18 UCLA in El Paso. The Panthers improved to 15-22 all-time in bowl games.


