2020 Season Canceled due to COVID-19

NSIC CANCELS FALL COMPETITION & CHAMPIONSHIPS; SUSPENDS ALL SPORTS COMPETITION THROUGH DECEMBER 31

BURNSVILLE, Minn. – In light of the NCAA Board of Governors’ decision to direct all institutions and conferences to meet specific requirements to conduct fall sports and the NCAA Division II Presidents Council’s announcement that all NCAA Division II fall championships are canceled, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference’s Board of Directors has canceled NSIC fall competition & championships, and has suspended all athletic competition through December 31, 2020.

The NSIC recognizes the value an NCAA championship experience provides for student-athletes and that was a factor in the analysis. However, health and safety concerns prevailed in the league’s decision. Additionally, current recommendations for testing, exposure, and quarantine make it very difficult for a season to be successfully completed at an institution or across the conference without severe disruptions.

“The league’s initial decision to delay the start of fall sports was made with the rationale to allow campuses the ability to focus solely on reopening safely for their broader university communities,” said NSIC Commissioner Erin Lind. “In light of the recent decisions made by the NCAA Board of Governors, it is no longer feasible to conduct outside competition this fall semester. Our student-athletes deserve a competitive experience that provides a greater degree of safety and certainty than current conditions would allow. We believe now is the right time to provide clarity to our student-athletes so we can turn our efforts towards helping institutions reopen and ensuring a safe return to campus to start the academic year.”

Although the NSIC will not conduct a league schedule for 2020 fall sports, competition is an integral part of the student-athlete experience, therefore, the membership is committed to exploring meaningful opportunities and experiences for fall student-athletes in the spring, if it can be done reasonably and safely.

The conference will continue to monitor the landscape and conditions surrounding the pandemic, locally, regionally, and nationally, and make any decisions or announcements, as necessary.

ABOUT WAYNE STATE COLLEGE



Wayne State College has been a vital part of Northeast Nebraska since James M. Pile founded the college as Nebraska Normal College in 1891. From the early days as a private higher education institution with a handful of faculty and students until today, as a strong and proud member of the Nebraska State College System boasting more than 4,000 students and 450 faculty and staff, Wayne State has served as an educational, economic and cultural engine for Northeast Nebraska and beyond.

Wayne State College is a leading comprehensive college in Northeast Nebraska distinguished by providing quality academic programs in a personalized setting. We're located on a 128-acre campus and boast a 20:1 student-to-faculty ratio. Wayne State College is best known for our friendly atmosphere, affordability, academic excellence, and successful graduates. Wayne State is nationally ranked and has received recognition for affordability, academic excellence, and community service. We strive to produce graduates who will become successful, productive, and contributing members of society.

WSC began as a college primarily for teacher education but now offers more than 130 undergraduate programs and several graduate programs. Education students are provided with valuable opportunities for hands-on teaching experience. Business, criminal justice and pre-professional programs are also popular at WSC. We have a solid reputation in educating future healthcare professionals as well, thanks to a high placement rate in the allied health fields at University of Nebraska Medical Center, as well as other regional schools.

Service-Learning is an important component of education at Wayne State College. Students lead community projects designed to integrate meaningful community service with instruction and reflection to enrich the learning experience, teach civic responsibility and strengthen communities.

Wayne State inspires students through access to affordable, high quality academic programs, personalized support services, and a culture committed to diversity, sustainability, and creativity. The College strengthens communities by engaging students in experiential learning and leadership opportunities. Wayne State serves the region through cultural opportunities, strategic partnerships, and innovative economic development programs.

WSC takes pride in the success of its extra-curricular activities as well, including performing arts and athletics. Rice Auditorium is the home to the WSC indoor sports programs. It seats approximately 1,700 for basketball and volleyball events. In addition, the auditorium, through the use of its stage, can accommodate 2,500 to 3,000 for commencement, theatrical performances, lectures and other similar events.



Memorial Stadium/Bob Cunningham Field: The stadium is used for seating up to 4,000 spectators for Wayne State College and Wayne High School football games. It also houses a press box and concession stand. WSC also hosts many high school track meets at this facility.

Ley Theatre, located in Brandenburg Hall, has fixed seating for 150. Additional seats may be added to accommodate up to 220. Ramsey Theatre, located in the Peterson Fine Arts Building, can accommodate 650 people on its main floor and balcony.

We are proud to offer exceptional education at an affordable cost. With low tuition rates and financial assistance given to most of our students each year, WSC is the most affordable and best quality four-year college in the region. Our value, combined with personalized attention from caring professors and staff, a friendly campus community, and opportunities to learn in and outside the classroom, makes WSC a great place for students to thrive and advance their futures.

Wayne State's four academic schools, Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Behavioral Sciences, and Science, Health, and Criminal Justice, offer more than 130 programs of study and 55 minors in 15 academic departments, awarding bachelor's, master's and education specialist degrees in a variety of programs and fields. There are 121 full-time, ranked faculty, 118 part-time faculty, and 18 graduate assistants.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's track and field (indoor and outdoor), men's and women's cross country, baseball, softball and women's soccer. Two new sports were added for the 2019-20 season - women's golf and beach volleyball.

Wayne State continues to invest in upgrades to athletic facilities. The most recent additions include the completion of the Kirk Gardner Indoor Athletic Complex (formerly the Carlson Natatorium). A new state-of-the-art press box was completed in the summer of 2018 at Bob Cunningham Field. In the last two years Rice Auditorium has installed a videoboard and new branded playing surface to enhance the Wildcat fan experience.

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Willow Bowl, Student Center, Ramsey Theatre, Studio Arts Building and Connell Hall.

Each WSC academic building contains more than one smart classroom, also known as technology enhanced classrooms, which create new opportunities in teaching and learning by integrating networking, digital and audio visual technologies.





WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Marysz Rames President

Dr. Marysz Rames was appointed the 13th president of Wayne State College by the Nebraska State College System Board of Trustees on June 18, 2015. She came to Wayne State from Dakota State University in Madison, S.D., where she had served as interim president since Aug. 15, 2014.

Rames earned her education doctorate in adult and higher education in 1997 from the University of South Dakota in Vermillion. She earned her bachelor of science degree in business administration and communication studies, with a minor in economics, in 1982, and her master's degree in educational administration in 1986, from University of Northern Colorado in Greeley, Colorado.

She spent one year (2014-15) as interim president at Dakota State University (DSU) in Madison, South Dakota. During this time she was instrumental in promoting a strong shared governance system, finalizing the university's five-year strategic plan, revitalizing the university's Foundation and actively raising funds to increase scholarships. Rames also worked with the legislature and others in several major new construction and renovation projects.

Prior to her interim appointment, Rames served as the vice president for student affairs from 2000 until June 2015 at South Dakota State University (SDSU) in Brookings. As the senior student affairs officer, Rames oversaw numerous university divisions and initiatives - including but not limited to - enrollment management, student success, strategic planning, fundraising/fiscal management, diversity and inclusion, collaborative partnerships, leadership development and increasing efficiency and effectiveness for students.

Rames served as an assistant professor of education at SDSU, teaching courses in administration and leadership in student affairs; serving on master's and doctoral students' graduate committees; and conducting research in financial trends in higher education, student retention and completion, and affordability and access to higher education. Rames also served as the interim associate vice president of student affairs (1997-1999) and the interim director for diversity enhancement (1999) at SDSU.

Prior to her arrival at SDSU, Rames worked at Aims Community College in Greeley, Colo., and the University of Wyoming in Laramie. Her scholarly presentations include topics such as student services, retention efforts, and working with today's college students.

Rames and her husband, Steve, have two children - Matthew and Jessica.



Mike Powicki Director of Athletics

Mike Powicki is in his 10th year (2021-22) as Athletic Director at Wayne State College. Powicki began his duties at Wayne State College on July 23, 2012 and has been instrumental in improvements to athletic facilities and staffing during his first eight years at the institution.

Over the past nine years at WSC, over \$9 million has been invested in facility improvements, staffing and operations enhancements.

Wildcat student-athletes continued to excel in the classroom during the 2020-21 school year. All 15 sports at Wayne State posted a cumulative grade point average over 3.00 during the COVID-19 pandemic. WSC had 244 Presidential Scholar Athletes and 139 NSIC All-Academic selections with 54 student-athletes posting a perfect 4.00 GPA in either the 2020 spring and/or fall semester. Wildcat athletics also recorded an all-time high 16 seniors who received the NSIC Myles Brand All-Academic With Distinction Award and for a 16th straight season Wayne State athletics had an Academic All-American (Erin Norling - Women's Basketball).

Powicki was instrumental in the addition of two sports to Wayne State athletics in 2019-20 with the addition of beach volleyball and the re-instatement of the women's golf program. He also orchestrated the renovation of the former natatorium into the Indoor Athletic Complex that

will benefit all Wildcat athletic programs. Powicki also helped orchestrate the largest single scholarship gift in the history of Wayne State as the Gardner Foundation announced on October 3, 2019 a \$1.8 million gift to the school. Included in the gift was a one-time donation of \$300,000 toward the Indoor Athletic Complex along with \$150,000 toward athletic operations and \$925,000 toward athletic scholarships to WSC.

In the summer of 2019, Rice Auditorium benefitted with the addition of several upgrades that included new (hanging) baskets, hallway graphics of current and past Wildcat athletes to enhance the look of Rice Auditorium and a newly designed floor/playing surface.

The Bob Cunningham Field Press Box Replacement project covering \$3.9 million was done in 2018. The project increased the amount of work space for media and staff working home events at Cunningham Field. The new facility also provides universal space on the lower level that will give WSC athletics an opportunity to host special events and create additional revenue through corporate sponsorships and donor stewardship.

In the fall of 2018 new Daktronics video scoreboards and a sound system totaling over \$200,000 were installed in Rice Auditorium to enhance the game day experience for Wildcat fans and student-athletes.

The first major athletic project that was completed under the guidance of Powicki was the Bob Cunningham Field/Memorial Stadium Renovation project. The project began in May, 2013 and was highlighted by installation of artificial turf, ornamental fencing, press box graphics and new goal posts. The \$1.6 million project also included the widening, lengthening and re-sodding of the Wildcat Soccer Pitch, along with installing new irrigation and facility fencing, scoreboard and making the facility ADA accessible. The Dr. LeRoy Simpson Track at Memorial Stadium was re-surfaced and painted in the summer of 2014 as the final phase of the project.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Division II Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President, Vice President of the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committee.

Powicki currently serves on the NCAA Division II Athletic Directors Association Board, NCAA Central Regional Advisory Committee for baseball and is on the Northern Sun Conference Hall of Fame Committee. He also serves locally as the Wayne Kiwanis Board President along with the Wayne Area Economic Development Board of Directors and Revitalize Wayne Committees.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Powicki served as Assistant Athletic Director at Minnesota State University in Mankato, Minnesota. He was the Assistant Athletic Director for Marketing and Corporate Partnerships from 2008-10 and was promoted to Assistant Director of Athletics for Development and Strategic Partnerships in 2010 where he served in that role until July 2012 when he arrived at Wayne State.

While at MSU, Powicki successfully developed and executed the athletics department revenue generation plan, responsible for generating \$1.7 million annually. Powicki managed all fundraising, development and marketing operations while overseeing the athletic department marketing/fundraising staff. Powicki also served as the athletic department's senior development officer functioning as a liaison to the MSU Foundation and the Vice President for Advancement, focusing on major gifts and special projects.

Powicki also served as Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs at Upper Iowa University from 2004-2008 where he was a part of the Peacocks transition from NCAA Division III to NCAA Division II status and into the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. While at Upper Iowa, Powicki monitored all team operations, recruiting and fundraising budgets. Powicki oversaw the UIU Recreation and Fitness Center staff, budget and overall operation.

In his time at Upper Iowa he created and sold athletic corporate sponsorship opportunities, supervised and coordinated all athletic department fundraising activities, developed and implemented the Peacock Club for donors and successfully completed the "Road to Glory" athletic facility capital improvement project. He also served as tournament director for various national and regional NCAA Division II Championship events.

During his tenure at UIU, Powicki served as an adjunct professor for the Exercise and Sports Studies within the Department of Education. Powicki obtained his bachelor degree from the University of Iowa in exercise science and earned his masters degree in exercise and sport science/sport administration from Wisconsin-La Crosse.

Mike has two daughters - Faith and Elle (pronounced L) - and resides in Wayne.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box underwent a complete renovation with replacement done in 2018. The new structure is 5,220 square feet and includes an elevator along with club level seating/viewing for corporate events.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans. New bleachers were installed on the east side of the field in the fall of 2007 with seating for another 750 fans. Cunningham Field underwent a renovation in the summer of 2013 with synthetic turf replacing the natural grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college's main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track and three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams and offices for the WSC athletic department.



WSC Soccer Complex

Located east of Memorial Stadium/Cunningham Field, the WSC Soccer Complex made its debut in the fall of 1997 just in time for the inaugural Wildcat soccer season.

During the spring and summer of 2013, the Wayne State College Soccer Complex underwent major renovations that were part of the \$1.5 million athletic improvement project. Improvements to the soccer field included a new scoreboard, fencing and widened playing surface.





WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Pete Chapman Baseball & Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The complex was necessary after the previous softball field was converted into a parking lot. In addition, the baseball team played its games off campus at the local American Legion field.

The baseball field received a facelift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand and press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field prior to the start of the 2005 season.

In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was built at the softball field. A new 10-inning scoreboard was placed at the baseball field in the fall of 2007 in right-center field. In the summer of 2009, a new wood fence was installed on the softball field.



Rice Auditorium

Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad. Recent upgrades to the arena include: new baskets and rebranded playing surface in 2019, a new scoreboard, videoboard and sound system in 2018 and new lights in 2011.

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College's president from 1951-'56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships, the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic and the 2012 NCAA Division II Central Regional Women's Basketball Championships.





ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris *Head Athletic Trainer*



Dr. Muffin Morris is in her 14th year (2021-22) at Wayne State College as the Head Athletic Trainer. She oversees athletic training for all 15 sports at Wayne State College and is the head athletic trainer for football and men's basketball.

She also serves as an advisor to the WSC Student Athlete Advisory Committee and worked three years (2013-16) as senior women's administrator.

Prior to arriving at Wayne State, Morris worked four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, swimming/diving, track and field/cross country and volleyball programs with the Coyotes.

Morris, a native of Chariton, Iowa, earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. She received her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and obtained her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris resides in Wayne.

The Wildcat Sports Medicine Center, which opened December 1, 2005, is a 4,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility. The center is located next to the Wayne State College Recreation Center and serves as the hub for therapy and athletic training services.

Dedicated to quality care, the Wildcat Sports Medicine Center provides the finest in sports rehabilitation, physical therapy and athletic training services to Wayne State College student-athletes, campus community.

The Wildcat Sports Medicine Center represents excellence - a total commitment by Wayne State College to the health of its' students and student athletes.

Dr. Joseph Carreau *Board Eligible Orthopaedic Surgeon*



Dr. Joseph Carreau joined CNOS in 2016 after completing fellowship in Orthopaedic Sports Medicine at the University of Iowa. He is originally from Colorado where he attended Colorado State University for his undergraduate education. Thereafter, he pursued medical school at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska and in 2005 traveled to San Diego to complete his orthopaedic surgery residency at the University of California, San Diego. There he received

extensive training in adult and pediatric trauma and joint replacement surgery. He developed a special interest in advanced arthroscopy and the treatment of athletic injuries, thus chose to pursue fellowship training in Sports Medicine through the University of Iowa.

At the University of Iowa, Dr. Carreau was trained by national leaders in the practice of advanced arthroscopic techniques, cartilage transplantation, shoulder instability, patellofemoral problems, ligamentous injury of the knee and shoulder replacement surgery. He also received extensive training in the treatment of all athletes at the University of Iowa and was assistant team physician to the Hawkeye Football Team during their historic 2015 season.

Carreau currently serves as Orthopaedic team physician to the Wayne State Wildcats and assists with multiple local high schools. Dr. Carreau has published papers on various orthopaedic topics and is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgery, the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine and the Arthroscopy Association of North America. Dr. Carreau and his wife have four children. He is an avid fisherman and enjoys the outdoors.

Wildcat Strength/Conditioning Center

Recognizing the importance of first-class facilities for their student athletes, the Wayne State College athletic department completed a state-of-the-art renovation to its athletic facilities in the 2008-09 school year, including a new weight room constructed at Memorial Stadium.

All Wayne State student athletes have utilized the benefits of new weight room equipment that features 18 platforms and racks, dumbbells and selectorized machines. The facility allows 72 student athletes to work out at the same time.

The locker room features custom-built wooden lockers made by Wayne-based Heritage Industries along with new showers and restroom facilities for the Wildcat football players.





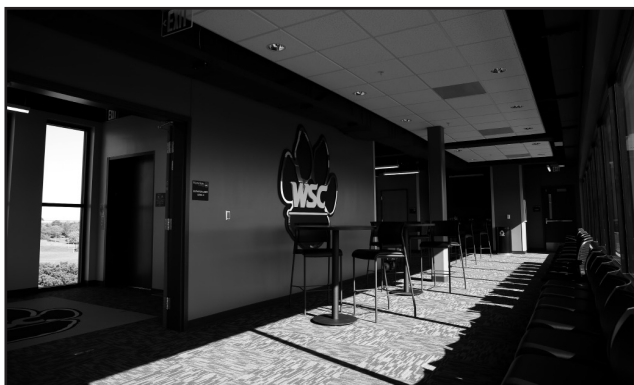
NEW PRESSBOX / ERNEST AND LYLA SWANSON CLUB ROOM

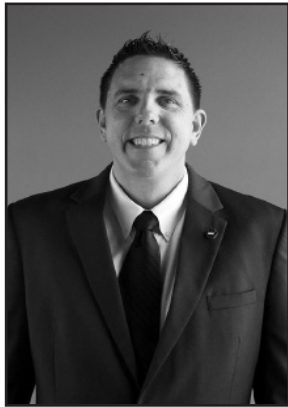

HEAD COACH JOHN MCMENAMIN



John McMenamin is in his second year (2021) as head football coach at Wayne State College. The 2020 season was canceled due to COVID-19. He was introduced as Wayne State's 22nd head football coach in the 103-year history of the program December 10, 2019 replacing Dan McLaughlin, who announced his retirement on November 21, 2019 after 15 years on the Wildcat sidelines posting a 79-88 record.

McMenamin is a former Wildcat assistant coach who has spent the last five seasons as offensive coordinator at Central Missouri where he turned

the Mules into an offensive juggernaut and ranks as one of the top offenses in NCAA Division II during his team at UCM.

In his five years at Central Missouri, McMenamin helped the Mules to a 42-17 record with two NCAA Division II playoff appearances and a trip to the Mineral Water Bowl. This season, Central Missouri tied a school record with 11 wins, going 11-2 while reaching the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Under McMenamin this season, Central Missouri had the top ranked offense in NCAA Division II averaging 547.5 yards per game, ranked second in passing offense (346.2 yards per game) and was sixth in scoring offense at 44.8 points a contest. He coached two AFCA All-Americans this season that includes a Harlon Hill finalist at quarterback.

McMenamin's 2017 offense at Central Missouri ranked second in NCAA Division II averaging 524.4 yards per game and set the top two single game school records for total offense that season while going 9-3 and earning a win over Minnesota Duluth in the Mineral Water Bowl 38-28.

His 2016 team reached the NCAA Division II playoffs going 9-3 while leading the MIAA and ranking ninth in NCAA Division II in pass offense. In his first season at Central Missouri in 2015, the Mules ranked second in the MIAA and 22nd nationally in total offense while posting an 8-3 mark.

Prior to serving as offensive coordinator at Central Missouri, McMenamin served four years as the offensive coordinator at Wayne State College from 2011-14 with two winning seasons. His 2014 team at Wayne State ranked in the top 25 in NCAA Division II in seven different categories.

McMenamin also served as offensive coordinator at Midland University (2009-10) where he helped turn around a Warrior program that was 8-3 in 2010 and ranked #22 nationally in total offense for its most successful year in 16 seasons.

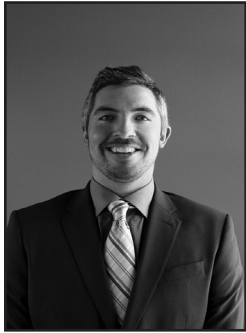
McMenamin began his collegiate coaching career at Nebraska-Omaha as an assistant coach from 2006-08 and prior to that was an offensive coordinator at Omaha Central High School in 2004.

A graduate of Northwest Missouri State in 2002, McMenamin played quarterback at NMSU and helped set 27 school records earning All-American honors in 2002 while playing at NCAA Division II National Championship teams in 1998 and 1999.





WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES



Logan Masters *Offensive Coordinator*

Former Wildcat standout receiver and assistant coach Logan Masters returns to Wayne State College and will serve as offensive coordinator in the 2021 season.

Masters returns to the Wildcat sidelines after spending the last three seasons at Chadron State College where he was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2019 and served as wide receivers coach and game operations manager the previous two years. He coached Chadron

State's first-ever 3,000 yard passer in 2019 and was a part of three straight winning seasons with the Eagles (6-5 in 2019, 7-3 in 2018 and 6-5 in 2017).

Masters got his coaching start working six years on the Wayne State sidelines from 2010-16. He started as tight ends coach in 2010, was a graduate assistant/wide receivers coach in 2011-12, served as wide receivers coach in 2013 and '14 and was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2015 when John McMenamin departed WSC for Central Missouri and served in that role for two more years before moving on to Chadron State College.

A native of Storm Lake, Iowa, Masters attended Wayne State College and had a standout playing career at wide receiver from 2006-09, helping the Wildcats make two post season appearances while setting nearly every receiving record at WSC. He finished his career as the all-time leader in receptions (258) and receiving yards (3,863) and caught at least two passes in every game (46) he played in a Wildcat uniform. As a senior, he was First Team All-NSIC South Division and one of 24 candidates for the Harlon Hill Trophy, given to the top player in NCAA Division II. In his junior season (2008), Masters hauled in a career-best 80 catches for 1,179 yards and was First Team All-NSIC South Division and Daktronics First Team All-Super Region #3 while helping WSC to a 9-3 record and the schools' first-ever trip to the NCAA Division II playoffs.

Masters and his wife Amber reside in Wayne with their three sons - Lincoln, Langston and Leyton.



Brian (BK) Smith *Special Teams Coordinator / Defensive Backs Coach*

Brian Smith II is in his first season as football coaching assistant at Wayne State and will serve as Special Teams Coordinator while also coaching defensive backs.

Smith II comes to Wayne State after serving two seasons as a graduate assistant defensive backs coach at Central

Missouri. He helped coach the 2019 team to an 11-2 record, the best team in school history that advanced to the NCAA Division II quarterfinals and finished the season ranked 13th in the final AFCA Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll.

Smith II began his collegiate coaching career in 2018 serving as the inside linebackers coach at East Central University.

Smith II played college football for two seasons at Central Missouri and one at Lincoln University where he ranked fourth on the team in tackles in the 2013 season with 51.

A native of Kansas City, Mo., Smith II graduated with a bachelor's degree in sport management from Central Missouri in May, 2018.



Scott McLaughlin *Defensive Coordinator*

Scott McLaughlin is in his 15th year as an Assistant Football Coach and the Defensive Coordinator and seventh season as Defensive Coordinator at Wayne State College. McLaughlin also works with the Wildcat linebackers.

McLaughlin was promoted to defensive coordinator following the 2014 season after serving six seasons as special teams coordinator and linebackers coach. He also worked with the defensive line for four seasons prior to being special teams coordinator.

In 2018, the Wildcat defense notched its first shutout since the 2011 season with a 34-0 victory at Minot State. Under McLaughlin, Wayne State ranked second in the NSIC in pass defense allowing just 199.8 yards per game and featured the NSIC's top tackler in junior linebacker Tyler Thomsen, who averaged 10.9 tackles per contest.

Under McLaughlin in 2017 the Wildcat defense tied for the most interceptions (24) in NCAA Division II in the regular season and created 32 total turnovers to rank third nationally while helping WSC to a 6-5 record.

Scott is a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Omaha and played defensive line for the Mavericks. He also served as a student assistant at UNO and worked as the team's video coordinator for three seasons before coming to Wayne State College.

McLaughlin earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha in continuing education and received his master's degree at Wayne State College in sport management in May, 2009.

Scott and his wife Lindsay reside in Wayne with their sons Cooper and Noah.



Neil Novak *Defensive Line Coach*

Neil Novak is in his first season (2021) as football coaching assistant at Wayne State College and will coach the defensive line.

Novak comes to Wayne State after serving the previous two years as defensive coordinator at Mid America Nazarene in Kansas where he helped the Pioneers to a 7-4 record in the

2019 season.

Other coaching stops for Novak include two years at Northwest Missouri State where he worked with the defensive line and assisted with special teams, helping the Bearcats to three NCAA Division II playoff games in his two seasons.

Novak began his coaching career at Black Hills State where he was a graduate assistant coach working with safeties for two years.

A native of Rock Springs, Wyoming, Novak played collegiate football at Chadron State (1 1/2 years) and Black Hills State and earned a bachelor's degree from Black Hills State in December, 2014 majoring in physical education.

Andre McCall
Defensive Ends Coach

Andre McCall enters his fourth year (2021) as an assistant football coach at Wayne State College and will coach defensive ends. He began his Wildcat coaching career as a graduate assistant coach and worked with running backs before moving to the defensive side

Prior to arriving at Wayne State McCall served the 2017 season as Defensive Coordinator at Webster County High School in Kentucky where he also worked with linebackers and offensive line. In the 2016 season he was Offensive Coordinator and Head JV Coach working with the offensive and defensive lines.

McCall played football for Kentucky State University from 2010 to 2015 and graduated in 2015 with a degree in physical education.

McCall is pursuing a master's degree in exercise science at Wayne State College.

Offensive Line Coach

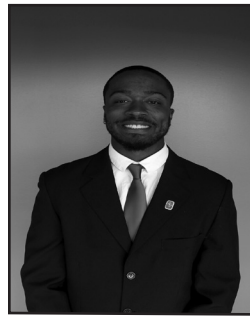
Quincy Griffith is in his first season as football coaching assistant and will coach the offensive line.

Running Backs Coach

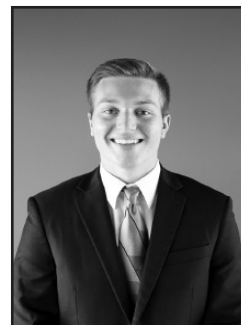
Mark Wright enters his first year (2021) as a football coaching assistant at Wayne State College and will work with running backs.

Wright comes to Wayne State after coaching the last two seasons (2019 and 2020) at Mid America Nazarene in Kansas where he served as wide

receivers coach, helping the Pioneers to a 7-4 record in 2019. In the 2020 season, Wright coached two wide receivers who earned post season honors - Kobe Hardin NAIA All-American Honorable Mention and Caleb Tanis Heart of America Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year.

Prior to coaching at Mid America Nazarene, Wright played three years of professional football in Europe after completing a stellar four year career as starting quarterback at Langston University where he earned All-Conference honors each season capped by All-American honors in 2014 when he was also named Central States Football League Offensive Player of the Year.

A native of New Orleans, Louisiana, Wright earned his bachelor's degree from Langston University in 2016 majoring in health, physical education, recreation and wellness (HPER).



Tanner Krueger
Tight Ends Coach

Tanner Krueger is in his second year (2021) as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College serving as tight ends coach.

Krueger comes to WSC after a successful career at Simpson College in Iowa where he was a four year letter winner and two year starter at quar-

terback for the Storm.

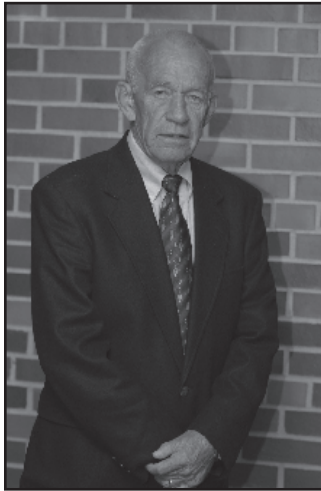
A graduate of Waverly-Shell Rock High School in Iowa, Krueger earned All-American Rivers Conference honorable mention honors as a junior and senior. Krueger threw for 2,721 yards as a senior, completing 199 of 362 passes with 22 TD's. The 2,721 yards passing in 2019 were the third-most in the league and the third-most in a single season in program history.

Krueger closed his Simpson career with 5,360 passing yards, ranking fifth all-time.

Krueger is pursuing a master's degree in sport management at Wayne State College.

The late Del Stoltenberg, inducted into the WSC Athletic Hall of Fame in 2004, was the second-longest tenured coach in Wayne State football history, serving 14 seasons (1969-82).



Dennis Wagner posted a 44-37-1 record in his eight seasons as head coach of the Wildcats from 1989-1996. Wagner left Wayne State to become offensive coordinator at Fresno State. He later coached the offensive line at Nebraska and served as head coach at Western Carolina from 2008-2011, offensive coordinator at Liberty and most recently the head coach at Briar Cliff University (2017-20).

2021 SEASON OUTLOOK



Thanks to COVID-19, second-year Wayne State College head football coach John McMenamin will finally make his debut this season with the Wildcats after taking over the reigns from long-time head coach Dan McLaughlin who retired at the end of the 2019 season.

Controlled scrimmage wins last spring over in-state rivals Nebraska-Kearney (14-7) and at Chadron State (12-3) have Wildcat fans anxiously awaiting the 2021 season.

“Wayne State College will play with passion,” remarked McMenamin. “These guys have done everything we have asked and continue to come back for more. We have not played an actual game since we have been here but in the few flashes we have competed against other squads I really liked what I saw.”

Senior Ryan Kennedy is listed as the Wildcat Offensive Player to Watch this season. The two-year-starter at center was an All-NSIC South Division honorable mention selection in 2019 and anchors an offensive line that returns three starters. Other returning starters include senior right guard Randy Gehl (6-2, 280) and junior right tackle Nick Gray (6-4, 300).

Sophomore quarterback Tavian Willis (Ferguson, Mo.) returns under center for the Wildcats. Willis played in eight games during the 2019 season, completing 31 of 65 passes for 397 yards with two TD’s and three INT, but is coming off a strong spring season for WSC.

New Mexico State senior transfer Matt Romero and Central Missouri freshman transfer Nick Bohn will also vie for playing time at the quarterback position.

Newcomers will battle for running back duties led by senior Anthony Watkins (Dodge City CC) and Hartington Cedar Catholic freshman Jacob Keiser, who had a strong spring season. Senior Deshawn Massey, redshirt freshman Noah Scott and freshman Darren Jordan will also look for snaps in the backfield.

Wayne State returns its top two receivers from the 2019 season in junior Mason Lee and senior Taurean Grady. Lee, a Wayne native, had 32 catches for 465 yards and five TD’s followed by Grady with 27 grabs for 406 yards and five scores. South Dakota transfer Trystn Ducker stood out in fall 2020 drills and will add depth to the wide out position with senior Kalei Aukai

and freshman Shane Orr expected to battle for playing time.

Former quarterback Alex Thrasher moved to tight end and was listed #1 on the spring depth chart while freshmen Trey Miller and Gage Dengel added depth to the tight end spot.



On defense, the Wildcats return plenty of experience with five starters back.

Senior safety Kevin Ransom was tabbed as the Wildcat Defensive Player to Watch this season as the most experienced defender. He tied for third on the team in tackles in 2021 (57) while recording a team-high six passes defended. Senior CJ Burress and junior J’Von France are other returning starters in the secondary for the Wildcats.

Dakota Valley junior Ryan Parker is the lone returning starter on the Wildcat defensive line, recording 34 tackles, 6.5 tackles for loss and four sacks. Seniors Mike Monette and Josh Taylor had solid springs and bring experience to the Wildcat defensive front.

The linebacker position is led by junior Nicholas Joynt, who notched a team-high 92 tackles in the 2019 season. Junior Jaylan Scott started spring scrimmages at outside linebacker along with former quarterback Grayson Garey, who played the Will linebacker spot last spring.

Blake Kaiser returns at punter for the Wildcats while Iowa Western CC transfer Alex Powders will handle place kicking duties entering fall drills.

Wayne State was picked to finish fifth in the NSIC South Division and 10th overall in the Preseason NSIC Football Coaches Poll released August 2nd.

“2021 is tough for us to forecast from a win/loss perspective but I know that we will play the game the right way and give ourselves a chance to compete in this conference”, McMenamin added.

The Wildcats open the 2021 season at home on Thursday, September 2nd hosting the University of Mary in a 6 p.m. contest at Bob Cunningham Field. WSC faces four teams that are either nationally ranked or receiving votes in the AFCA Division II Top 25 Coaches Poll – at #2 Minnesota State, at #23 Minnesota Duluth and home games vs. Augustana and Sioux Falls both receiving votes.

THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



From its modest origin as a six-team alliance over eight decades ago, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has matured into a 16-team union of upper Midwest colleges and universities to form arguably the strongest affiliation in NCAA Division II. The NSIC can trace its roots to 1932 when six schools, including Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University, Mankato, Minnesota State University Moorhead, St. Cloud State University, University of Minnesota Duluth and Winona State University signed on as charter members. All remain active subscribers of the league today.

Southwest Minnesota State University was added in 1969, followed by Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (NE) in 1998, Concordia University-St. Paul and the University of Minnesota Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006, Augustana College in 2008 and Minot State University and the University of Sioux Falls in 2012. Minnesota State, St. Cloud State and Minnesota Duluth left the league to join the North Central Conference but returned to the NSIC in 2008. University of Minnesota, Morris and Michigan Tech University were once part of the NSIC family as well.

In 1992 the NSIC became a true athletic showcase for both men and women with the merger of the traditional Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) and the Northern Sun Conference (NSC), the home of women's athletics since 1979. Before NSIC affiliates became certified for championship competition in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in 1995, its member institutions filled prominent roles in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). NIC and NSC clubs annually dispatched qualified student-athletes to national tournaments and captured several NAIA teams and individual championships.

The NSIC continues to make a major imprint nationally, winning 21 national titles since 2006. Winona State men claimed NCAA II Basketball Championships in 2006 and 2008 and narrowly missed a third crown, falling in a last second shot in 2007. In addition, the Warriors established a NCAA II record of 57 consecutive victories.

Concordia University launched an ongoing streak of seven consecutive NCAA II Volleyball Championships in 2007. In 2008 the Golden Bears won 37 straight matches after a season opening loss on their way to a second consecutive title and scripted a marvelous encore in 2009 with a perfect 37-0 finish, a third straight national crown and a winning streak of 74 straight matches. In 2010 the Golden Bear extended that NCAA record win streak to 75 before dropping their second match of the season. They started 2010 with a 10-4 record before ripping off 22 straight wins on their way to their fourth straight national title. In 2011, after overcoming midseason injuries, the Golden Bears hit their stride. The Golden Bears knocked off No. 1 and undefeated Cal State San Bernardino to become the first team in the history of NCAA Division II women's volleyball, to capture a fifth consecutive NCAA Division II Championship. Then in 2012, the Golden Bears again made a late season and championship match surge as they defeated Tampa 3-2 after trailing 0-2 to win their sixth straight NCAA DII Volleyball National Championship. In 2013 Concordia-St. Paul won the NSIC regular season title, but was defeated in the NSIC Tournament Championship by Minnesota Duluth. But from there the Golden Bears ripped off six straight NCAA postseason wins, extending their streak to 42, on their way to a 3-0 sweep of BYU-Hawaii to win another NCAA National Championship. After a two year hiatus, the Golden Bears return to the top of Division II volleyball as they won the 2016 and 2017 national championships.

In a most surprising run, Minnesota Duluth completed a perfect 15-0 season by winning the 2008 NCAA Division II Football Championship. The Bulldogs, limited to only 24 scholarships by league rule, swept a field of fully-funded teams, including top ranked Grand Valley State and number three Northwest Missouri State. Two years later, in 2010, the Bulldogs repeated that feat, going 15-0 again to win the national championship. The Bulldogs became the first NCAA DII football squad to win two national championships with undefeated records.

Minnesota State added more luster to the league by finishing 32-2 and claiming the 2008-09 NCAA II Women's Basketball Championship. The Mavericks rolled to a wild 103-94 victory over Franklin Pierce to set a NCAA record for total points in the title game.

In 2017 the Maverick softball team went 64-7 to win the National Championship. The Mavericks went 10-1 in NCAA play, including 5-0 in Salem Virginia as they defeated Angelo State 5-1 in the championship game.

Augustana got into the mix of national championships in 2011 when their women's cross country team turned in a true team performance in Spokane, Wash. All five Viking runners earned All-American status as Augustana won the first cross country national championship in NSIC history. The Vikings men's basketball team won the 2015-16 National Championship after going 34-2 and defeating Lincoln Memorial 90-81 in Frisco, Texas. The Augustana baseball team became the first NSIC institution to win a national championship in baseball, as the Vikings had an impressive post season, going 8-1 in NCAA play and a perfect 4-0 in Cary, North Carolina to finish the season 52-9.

In 2019 it was the Augustana Softball team that made a run to the national championship as the Vikings went 61-11 and defeated Texas A&M Kingsville twice by the score of 6-4 to win the National Championship.

After multiple runner-up finishes, the St. Cloud State Huskies finally captured the national championship in wrestling in 2015. They repeated in 2016 and then took home the title again in 2018, 2019 and 2021.

The NSIC has now had 16 student-athletes awarded with the NCAA Elite 90 Award on 19 occasions. Earning the award were Rachel Rairdon (AUGIE, WCC, 2021), Ryan Schlichte (MSU, FB, 2019), Sasha Hovind (NSU, ODTF, 2018), DJ Pollard (NSU, Men's Basketball, 2018), Grant Pulver (UMD, Cross Country, 2017), **Leisa McClintock (Wayne State, Volleyball, 2015)**, Tavia Rutherford (Sioux Falls, Golf, 2015), Claire Sames (SMSU, Volleyball, 2014), Kara Pioske (Concordia-St. Paul, Volleyball 2013), Billy Brockmueller (Sioux Falls, Cross Country 2012, 2014 & IDTF 2014), Ben Keller (Minnesota State, Baseball 2012 & 2013), Cody Lensing (Augustana, Wrestling 2012), Kendra Huettl (Minnesota State, Softball, 2011), Matt Braithwaite (Augustana, Cross Country, 2010) and Lauren Brown (Winona State, Outdoor Track & Field, 2010).

Member schools continue to emphasize the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. The NSIC is committed to providing rewarding experiences for its student-athletes, and while the challenges that loom are sizable, indeed, the NSIC is surely well positioned for the future.

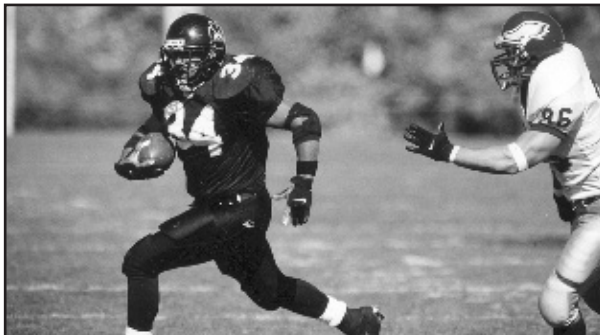

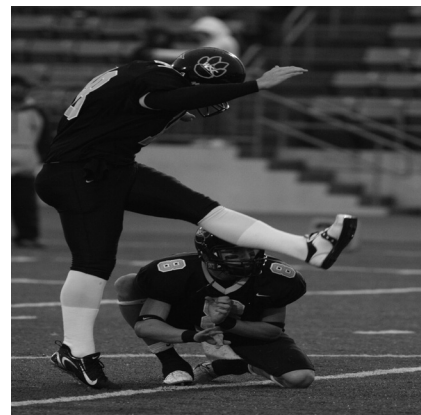

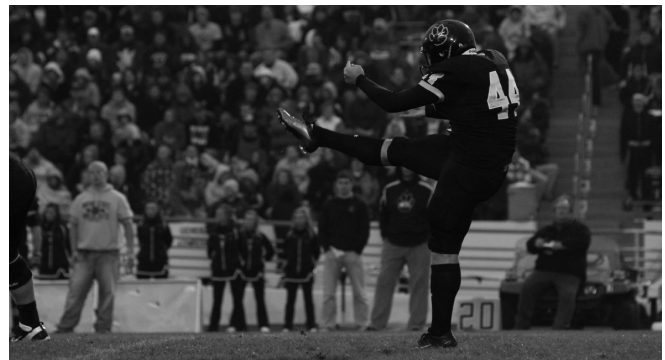
