



Landscaping in the Shade in Alachua County

Fact Sheet #66

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Alachua County is known for its beautiful tree canopy. However, finding the right plants to grow in constant deep shade can be a challenge. To help solve this dilemma the local Master Gardeners have compiled a list of plants that, in their observations, can thrive in shade in Alachua County.

The plants listed are easy to grow, noninvasive, and can be purchased from retail garden centers and local plant shops (some seasonal availability). Additional sources are local farmers markets, Kanapaha Botanical Gardens festivals, semi-annual native plant sales at Morningside Nature Center, and the annual Master Gardener plant sale.

Plants must be in the right location ("right plant, right place") to grow well, so consider these factors before going shopping:

- Is there sun on the area at any time during the day? If so, then you have partial shade and there will be even more plants available for you to choose from.
- Is your site moist or dry?
- Is the site covered with exposed roots? Cover with mulch or soil not to exceed 3 inches in depth, then add plants. It may be easier to plant in pots positioned among the roots.
- Do you want flowers or just plants to cover the area? In general, plants in deep shade tend to be dark green with few flowers. Selecting plants with variegation or green and white leaves will make the area more interesting.

- Do you want the plants to fill an area or hide an object? Check out how tall and wide a plant grows prior to planting. Generally, the taller plants should be in the rear of the planted area. Shrubs growing in shady areas can get leggy, so position carefully.
- When planting under trees that lose their leaves, select plant varieties that bloom early in winter or early spring while the tree is bare for greater visual effect.
- Several varieties of a plant may be available.
 Detailed information about these varieties can be found with research. Use the scientific names to be certain of a specific plant.
