4. How is it possible to evaluate the threshold of the "good enough" beyond which supererogatory acts lie?

5. The relationship between Supererogation and moral praiseworthiness. Is a supererogatory act always to be considered praiseworthy?

6. What is the relationship between the performance of a supererogatory act and moral character?

The issue will include both original papers by invited contributors and contributions selected through this Call for Papers. All the papers will undergo *blind evaluation* before acceptance or rejection. Scholars at any career stage are invited to submit a paper.
