

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Shri Shakti Degree College sponsored by Shri Shakti Shikshan Sansthan registered under Society Registration Act 1860, with Reg. No K-29828 was established on 8th Aug, 2002 in a village named Sankhahari, Post-Harbaspur. Distt Kanpur Nagar at a distance of -50- Km from Kanpur city in a remote locality. Renewal of Managing Committee of Degree College by C.S.J.M.University,Kanpur was granted on 01.11.2010 for five years .The institution is registered under section 2(f) and 12 (B) of UGC Act, 1956.Institution was started with B.Ed faculty in 2003 but at present ,faculties of B.A., B.Sc, B.C.A and B.T.C. are also operating. Now, it is from 2014-15, that institution has started M.Sc. in Botany and Chemistry.

Institution has a clear and specific vision and mission which are made known to all stakeholders through various channels and same are evaluated also by them every year. Institution emphasizes for free and unbiased. "SWOC" analysis which is conducted through internal mechanism. For SWOC analysis, internal audit, external audit and academic audit play vital role.

Institution is happy to submit that its Teachers Education department was assessed and accredited by peer team of NAAC on 12th 13th September 2012 and 'B' grade was awarded with CGPA 2.78 .Many of the recommendations given in PTR have already been implemented .Institution was recognized as study centre of IGNOU on 21.01.2005 and, at present -5- courses are available for our students and community. Jan Shikshan Sansthan a unit of H.R.D. is conducting Skill Development courses like Stitching, Knitting, Computer Courses which are job providing courses not only for our students but also for community especially for poor girls of S/C, S/T category. NCC , NSS ,Scouting and Red-Cross are contributing for social and national development through various extension activities. IQAC is one of the most important factors which has brought this institution to to-day's glorious point.

The Performance Appraisal Report of Institution is given below:-

1. Curricular Aspects:

Institution being a Self-Financing Institution has to follow the curriculum provided by our C.S.J.M.University, Kanpur.Institution sends suggestions to university for consideration at the time of designing and developing the curriculum.For effective implementation of curriculum, time table is prepared keeping in view the guidelines issued by University Grants Commission like number of teaching days in a year, teaching hours per day etc.Annual Plan,Unit Plan and daily dairy are maintained by teachers.Assessment and Evaluation is conducted as per written policy framed at institutional level.This schedule of Assessment and Evaluation is observed over and above the guidelines of university for annual and semester examination.

Feedback on curriculum is obtained from students ,alumni and community. Views received through feedback are compiled ,analyzed and conclusions are informed to university if so required for consideration.

Institution is a recognized study centre of IGNOU which conducts five courses. All these courses are useful not only for students but also for community who cannot attend traditional system of education. These courses are used as add-on courses and are useful to provide job in market. Another area for skill development courses is the courses conducted by Jan Shikshan Sansthan sponsored by HRD Ministry of Central Government. Courses are very much useful to the girls of SC/ST and poor families as after completing the courses, these girls may stand on their own feet and may select for self-employment. Courses conducted by Jan Shikshan Sansthan are Basic Computer Course, fashion designing with speciality in stitching, knitting, candle making and beautician courses etc. In fact, courses conducted by IGNOU and JSS contribute as supplementary educational courses. Institution also provides education of moral and ethical values through NCC, NSS, Red-Cross and Scoting.

2. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

Admission to the programmes is by a transparent, well-administered mechanism, complying with all the norms of the concerned regulatory/governing agencies including state and central governments. The institution ensures equity and wide access by following the policy of government and is well represented by students

from different geographical area and socio-economic, cultural and educational backgrounds.

The college has adequate in-built mechanisms which are continually updated to achieve the goals of academic excellence. The college plans and organizes teaching, learning and evaluation schedules by strictly following the University Academic Calendar, by maintaining diaries of the academic events and co-curricular activities.

Fully aware of the extent and significance of institutional accountability in the teaching learning and evaluation process, individualized teaching-learning programmes are conducted to cater to the broad spectrum of academic calibre of students admitted. Term tests are conducted to assess the academic needs of the students. Slow learners and advance learners are identified through an analysis of the formative tests. Remedial classes are arranged to help the slow learners to adapt to the rigorous teaching learning process and to make credible academic progress. Specialized classes are organized for enhancing the competence and performance of advance learners.SC/ST ,OBC,Minority and economically backward students are given remedial coaching. Student mentoring and guidance services are provided for the academic, personal and psycho-social needs. The college also organizes programmes to sensitize the faculty and students on gender inclusion and environment.

The college maintains a student-centric atmosphere to achieve the desired learning outcomes. The teachers employ interactive and participatory approach creating a feeling of responsibility in learning and make learning a process of construction of knowledge. ICT based facilities are used extensively for dissemination of knowledge and evaluation. Interactive instructional techniques like focussed group discussions, projects, internship in professional courses, brain storming sessions, experiments, Power Point Presentations and application of ICT resources enrich the teaching learning experience and engage students in higher order _thinking and investigation.

3. Research , Extension and Collaboration:-

Though institution is not a recognized centre for research but a Research Committee has been formed .This committee has given certain relevant recommendations and most of the recommendations have already been implemented just to encourage research element amongst teachers and students. Institution has implemented some of recommendations like to pay TA/Duty Leave and registration fees for attending and contributing in seminar/workshop, to pay Rs. 1500.00 for publication of research paper in reputed journal, to promote action research, to organize group discussion, quiz, class-room seminar, science exhibition etc. Institution allocates survey, project work to develop creativity, critical thinking and scientific temper. ICT facilities, library with SOUL and laboratories are made available to students and teachers.

Besides providing technical support services to farmers through farmers club, teachers and students gain experience of soil testing and water testing which create and develop research and scientific temper. This activity is also a part of our community services.

Institution provides informal consultancy to farmers in the matter of soil, irrigation.water and plant `s diseases.This consultancy is provided by the teachers of Botany .Teachers of Zoology and Home Science provide consultancy regarding child care and nutrition. Candidates doing B.Ed. through IGNOU get consultancy from our B.Ed. Department particularly in the area of Practice-Teaching .Nearby schools are provided consultancy in science practicals and ICT.Agriculture scientists are invited by institution for direct consultation by farmers in the matter of agriculture and allied services.Eye Camp and Veterinary Camp are organized every year .Institution is conducting literacy programme for the children of workers of one brick field at a distance of 12 kilometer from the institution. In fact, our collaboration with village panchayat ,IGNOU and Jan Shikshan Sansthan contributes for social and national development.

4.Infrastructure and Learning Resources:-

Infrastructure facilities are key facilities for quality education .Besides adequate number of classrooms, institution is having language lab,computer lab,Labs for Home Science,Physics,Chemistry,Zoology and Botany.Facilities of co-curriculur and extra-curricular activities ,art and craft ,basic health needs, mobility aids for physically disabled persons , music instruments , LCD and OHP have also been

provided .Institution is having CCTV in campus in certain places as per need, effective MIS , public address system and sound system in the hall.Institution has a library advisory committee wherein there is representative of students .For the benefit of local persons , Village library has been established wherein apart from study material looking to the interest of village citizens, study material with latest technology ,seed and fertilizers etc. has been provided .On 5th and 6th October, 2014 , NAAC sponsored seminar on "Opportunities and Challenges of the Institutional library in Rural Areas" was organized. Library is having the facility of OPAC and NLIST(Inflibnet). To encourage optimum use of library , Best User's Award is provided. Institution has a committee to look after maintenance work of building , computer, furniture and other equipments.

5.Student Support and Progression:-

To apprise students with their rights and duties, student charter, UGC guidelines for students have been placed in the campus. Anti-woman harassment cell, Anti-ragging committee, students grievance redressal cell, a cell to look after the interest of students of S/C, S/T, minority and OBC below creamy layer as per UGC guidelines have been established and all are active also. Apart from college magazine(Pathik **Prerna**), institution has started to publish its own news letter(**Prerna**) and journal named Vigyan Shakti .Institution has a registered Alumni association .Teacherstudent mentoring and student-student mentoring aim at the all-round progress of students. Mentoring system with 25 mentees under each mentor aims at and ensures their professional ,physical ,personal and psychosociol well-being. Student Grievance Redressal Cell effectively functions in the campus. Sports day, Annual Fete, and celebration of different national and international days ensure the participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular events. The college promotes inclusive practices for social justice and better stakeholder relationship. The SC/ST/OBC and economically needy students are provided equal opportunities by award of scholarships and fee refund from social welfare department .The college is differently-able friendly and pays special attention in terms of support services. Events at the departmental level are designed to supplement quality teaching and

personality development of students. College is encouraging student's participation in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities alike.

6.Governance and Leadership:-

The college has a visionary and transformative leadership which has steered the college to its present status. Rooted firmly in the belief that education is the pathway to self-improvement and self-realization and eventually the empowerment of society, the enlightened administration provides clear vision and mission of the institution which is in tune with the higher education policies of the nation and facilitates in building the organizational culture. Regular meetings of IQAC offer a platform to present and discuss the perspective plans of the college and help in effective implementation of institutional policies.

The Principal, who works closely with administrative team comprising faculties, Co-ordinator IQAC, and senior teachers of the department, offers effective leadership by setting values and participative decision-making process, co-ordinating the academic and administrative planning and implementation. The institution adopts quality management strategies in all academic and administrative aspects. The administration ensures professional development of the employees by sanctioning study leave and providing training to faculty and staff by experts in various fields. The faculty is recruited by the C.S.J.M.University, Kanpur. Professional competence of the staff is updated regularly and monitoring for regular performance appraisal of staff has been evolved to ensure academic excellence.

Institution has a well defined plan, planning and policy ,codified administrative and financial rules and employees service conditions. Every year, annual report is published and is put up before general body for its approval. For professional development, teachers are sent to ASCs for orientation and refresher courses and to attend seminar etc.

Institution is enjoying good reputation in the entire locality. Community is having full trust and respect for the institute and community members are frequently invited in functions and meeting of the college.

Institution has adopted the concept of participative management. Teaching and non-teaching staff representatives are the members of the Managing Committee. Staff contributes for the development and smooth running of the institution. Any responsibility with accountability is pleasurely accepted and discharged by them.

7.Innovations and Best Practices:-

The college is highly conscious of its responsibility to environment. In order to fulfil social responsibility of the institution and to foster that spirit in students, a variety of community development programmes are conducted through NSS and NCC. The conduct of the activities in the college campus, programmes on Ozone Day, Earth Day, Water Day, Environment Day show an affection for nature and a desire to conserve energy and water. Proposed Rainwater Harvesting System and restricting use of plastics are some of the initiatives that motivate the students to protect the environment.

SWOC Analysis

2.Weaknesses:

- a) Discouraging element of disparity between private and aided/ government colleges so far any assistance financially or otherwise from UGC is concerned.
- b) Lack of flexibility to adopt locally need based courses recognized by University.
- c) Shortage of eligible and competent faculty with professional commitment at university level itself.

3.Opportunities:

- a) Encouraging for "Science –led Value -education."
- b) Transformation from traditional to innovative system for educational, social and agriculture reformation at grass root level leading to national development.

4.Challenges:

- a) Exhibition/Presentation of degree of our loyality to the commitment for quality education before all stakeholders with the element of "Awareness and Accountability".
- b) Transformation of knowledge into Science, Technology and Innovation as desired by our Central Government.

- Providing education for enhancing the acceptability of our students in any employment market.
- d) Conversion of weaknesses and opportunities as aforesaid in-to strength.

SWOC analysis is based on informal deliberations with internal and external experts. While conducting SWOC analysis, feedback from all stakeholders on Institutional Performance is taken in-to account. Normally, this exercise is conducted once in every year. For conversion of weaknesses in-to strength and to meet the challenges identified, following efforts have been made:-

- I. To remove weaknesses mentioned under 2 (a and b) matter has been taken up with University Grant Commission (UGC) and Central Government.
- II. Institution has decided to attract the teachers by providing better service conditions. Institution has published a booklet containing service conditions of staff. Our affiliating University has started the process to restore Ph.D. Courses. Now, this weakness is likely to be removed shortly.
- III. To meet the challenges mentioned under 3 (a and b), Institution has started to send the teachers to Academic Staff Colleges (ASCs) for Orientation Program. Teachers are encouraged through persuation necessary for Professional Development to undertake minor and major project especially relating to the benefit of local community.

Submission:

One booklet on "Staff Service Condition" and one booklet on "Assessment and Evaluation" is provided to every teacher ,through which he is made aware about institutions' concern for their professional development, teaching—learning effectivity including assessment and evaluation. Teachers are guided how to prepare annual plan, unit plan and daily diary.

At the start of new session, teachers discuss amongst themselves about development and deployment of action plan for effective implementation of curriculum based on their previous experiences.

A group of teachers under the guidance of principal, prepare academic calendar and time-table. Every teacher prepares annual plan ,unit plan mentioning outline for

effective implementation of curriculum. They also maintain daily diary to ensure quality of teaching and accountability.

Time-table is prepared in such a way so that syllabus is completed within stipulated academic session. Adequate time is prescribed for teaching other than syllabus like remedial teaching ,counselling,co-curricular ,extra-curricular activities.

There is a Curriculum Implementation Committee which looks into all above. This committee also considers to introduce any course beyond syllabus which may be useful to meet the vision of the institution .Monitoring of effective operationalisation of curriculum including assessment and evaluation is also the function of this committee. Committee consists of principal and one senior teacher from every faculty.

Institution also prepares tentative annual schedule of co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Entire process mentioned above is looked after by IQAC.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and /or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Submission:

Support Services like library, laboratories ,ICT and other infrastructural facilities are provided to the teachers by Institution whereas facility of curriculum, sharing of knowledge in seminar and workshop and participation of students in university level extension games and sports, assistance for activities and session-end Assessment/Evaluation resources, career guidance and placement assistance on request, are provided by university for effective translating the curriculum and improvement in teaching-learning process. Institution sends its teachers to Academic Staff College for orientation to enable them to know how to handle curriculum and how to plan its operationalisation effectively using innovative methods of teaching. Institution also provides TA and duty leave for attending seminar for their professional development which is expected to make the teaching effective and useful for students.

Submission:

For effective curriculum delivery, institution prepares plan as narrated under K.A 1.1.2. Institution has provided internet facility, Liquid Crystal Display (LCD),Over Head Projector (OHP),T.V. model and charts by way teaching aids. Teachers are encouraged for orientation programmes in Academic Staff College (ASCs).Provision has been made for enrichment courses ,counseling,remedial teaching ,co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and to organize the seminar and workshop, to invite guest speakers and to send students outside for exposure of advance knowledge. Initiatives are taken to ensure that knowledge transfer and the application of the same wherever is possible into practical goes simultaneously.

Submission:

For effective operation of curriculum, institution arranges the visit of prominent guest speakers to our institution and also the visit of students to industrial and scientific places like "Anvesika", botanical garden, Banks, BSNL offices just to gain practical knowledge about various topics of curriculum. Institution interacts with industries like Research & Development of Lohia Machine Limited. Chandrashekhar Ajad Agriculture University (CSA), Kanpur and their suggestions are sought about modification in curriculum about its effective operationalisation. Our alumni also contribute as a link between our institutions and community for networking and interacting with them. Institution has written to University for proper weightage to Action Research, extension activities and games/sports etc in annual examination.

With a view to provide supplementary system of education which aims to empower individual through appropriate skill development leading to entrepreneurship and gainful employment and also which makes the individuals life long learners ,following additional courses have been made available in the institution:-

IGNOU courses have been started for catering the needs of unreached population to remain life long learners (LLR) and also as a supplementary system for 'learning while earning'. This also meets the need of 'Continuing Education' as a social responsibility of the institute. Our teachers may use IGNOU courses for their professional development also. IGNOU courses are useful for enhancing gross enrollment ratio (GER).

Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and the Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Submission:

Institution is bound to follow the curriculum provided by the University .To supplement the university's curriculum,institution arranges the lecture of Guest Speakers and Workshop/Seminar inviting external experts. However, looking to the need of students and also in view of ground realities of life, Institution has introduced courses as mentioned in K.A. 1.2.1 at its own level only with a view to achieve vision and mission of the institution integrating academic progress and has collaborated with IGNOU and Jan Shikshan Santhan etc. so that valid certificates may be issued to students. To ensure that academic programmes and vision and mission of the institution are integrated, teachers are sent for orientation courses at ASCs, students are deputed at other organizations for exposure of advance knowledge and they are given maximum possible experience in laboratories and through community orientation.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify ,enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

Submission:

For modification in curriculum ,Institution sends suggestions to University on the basis of feedback received from various stake holders and also on the basis of seminar recommendations.For the efforts made by the institution for enrichment of curriculum, please refer to and K.A. 1.2.5 and 1.3.1.

Institution is conducting co-education system. To deal with gender related problems, students grievance redressal cell, anti-women harassment cell and anti-ragging committee are established to sensitise the staff and students through meetings about needs and importance of human rights and gender parity. These committees/cells take proper care to protect human rights. Adequate arrangement has been made for health care, first aid and to develop competency in the field of ICT. Seminars are also arranged to meet the challenges of human rights and environment. Institution celebrates national days like Math Day, Science Day and Environment Day every year. These committees /cells take proper care to protect human rights.

Adequate arrangement of CCTV camera has been made inside the campus to ensure safe working, teaching and learning environment for lady staff and girl students.

Institution is ensuring career progression ,assignment of equal responsibilities, payment of negotiated salary ,sharing of information ,granting autonomy etc. to our lady teachers.

For women empowerment, following other steps taken by institution are noteworthy:-

- 1) Granting admission to girl students particularly coming from marginalised section even after providing fee concession to the needy students.
- 2) Starting Home Science subject for girls only.
- 3) Introducing Skill Development Courses as mentioned under K.A. 1.2.1(2,3,4,6) keeping in view the need of girls to enable them to go for self-employment.
- 4) Participation of girls in the unit of Scout Guide and NSS.
- 5) Encouragement to participate in games, sports and cultural activities.
- 6) Arranging special tour and training to gain knowledge beyond class –room.
- 7) Encouraging to go to community for survey and social activities removing hesitation and to encourage frankness and boldness.

All the courses mentioned under K.A 1.2.1 have been introduced which take care of the issues like Gender, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT. The university has also made compulsory for every student to qualify in Environment paper.

- **1.3.4** What are the various value- added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 - Moral and ethical values
 - Employable and life skills
 - Better Carrer Options
 - Community Orientation

To ensure holistic development of the students in the areas mentioned in this key aspect, following courses/activities are offered:-

a.) Moral and Ethical Values:-

- i. Institution has established the units of NCC,NSS,Red-Cross and Scouting.
- ii. Institution develops the awareness about Fundamental Rights and duties of a citizen as per constitution of India.
- iii. Every Year in January "Khichri Bhoj" is organized in the locality of Schedule Caste to develop feelings of brotherhood, affection and untouchability.
- iv. Display of views of great thinkers on moral values.
- v. Documentary/Project Work on "Why need Ashrams for old parents.".
- vi. Awareness about human rights especially gender disparity.
- vii. Class room seminars on social evils and diseases like dowry and AIDS.
- viii. Inculcation of critical thinking and scientific temper.

b.) Employable and Life Skills:-

Institution conducts job-oriented courses in co-operation with Jan Shikshan Sansthan as mentioned under 1.2.1 (2) .Courses are not only useful for employement but also empowers for self-employment. Institution is conducting Under Graduate courses in B.C.A.and B.Ed. which are useful in job market.

Institution's aim is to prepare students suitable for the job and not only eligible for the job. Institution develops entry level skills like "how to pass a

test and how to face an interview ,Communication skill development course and computer related courses are conducted to enable students to meet the needs of employment market .For entry level skill development, guests are invited from ICT companies, placement agencies and from service sectors like Banks and agriculture to develop employment skill .

To develop living skills ,loving skill is encouraged through various cocurricular and extra-curricular activities. Theses activities enable the students to accomplish life ambitions and to develop self-confidence, social orientation/ tolerance. Girl students face disproportional challenges which are barriers for enjoying inherent talents in their lives. NCC, NSS, Red-Cross, Scouting and Guiding play vital role to develop life skills for boys and girl students and to provide strength to face any challenge of their lives.

c.) Better Carrier Options:-

Carrer guidance and placement services are related with ground realities. Though for carrer guidance ,information services of library are available but our placement cell also provides information on competitive exams choices available for carrier avenues of information ,preparation for examination imparting soft skill motivation .Our cell develops skills required for successful entry in employment market. Placements agencies and guests from banks etc. are invited for entry level skill development.Now institution is preparing to organize job fair in campus itself so that campus selection may also be encouaraged.

Institution has established a link with placement cell of CSJM University Kanpur.Institution has established its own placement cell which organizes coaching class to prepare students for competitive examination of NET,Banks,Military and Nursing.

Course for Communication Skill Development, Web Designing, Interior Decoration, Painting and Art has been started at the institution level looking to the need and demand from the students for skill development and career orientation. Value-added courses like yoga has also been introduced to develop good citizenship and to provide social and national orientation.

Job-Oriented courses with the co-operation of Jan Shikshan Sansthan have been started to develop entrepreneurship and self-dependency in students and community.

Certificate –in- Guidance Course of IGNOU has been started in 2012 to develop the knowledge about guidance and counseling. Other IGNOU courses were introduced much before four years.

Institution has started M.Sc classes from the session 2014-15 looking to the local needs and demand. Moreover, this would meet the objective of access and equity for the students mainly girls from disadvantaged and marginalized category as there is no institution offering this programmes in near locality.

Due to increased pass-percentage of Intermediate Examination from 2012-13, local demand for admission has increased and ,therefore, to meet this demand, additional seats were sanctioned in the state as a policy decision in B.Sc.I. Admission in B.A. faculty has now decreased due to opening of two new degree colleges within a

distance of -8- kilometer. Students do not show interest in IGNOU courses because of English medium and high fees.

Institution makes the assessment of student's need in terms of knowledge and skill before the commencement of the programme .For this purpose, institution has introduced its own admission form wherein students are required to give certain details about themselves. Over and above, a short written objective test is also used to assess the level of knowledge and skill. Entire details so received are compilled, analysed and area of deficiencies are identified in respect of every student for remedial treatment.

Submission:

Institution has a structured system to provide remedial teaching to bridge the knowledge gap of students to enable them to cope with the programme .Carrier guidance and placement cell services also bridge the gap between the institution and job market.Time slot is fixed in regular time-table for remedial teaching so that about the schedule of remedial teaching, students may know well in advanc.For example-Students for BCA come from science stream in Intermediate(10+2) but in BCA, they are required to opt Accountancy and Principles of Management as compulsory subjects.For these subjects being new, bridge teaching is arranged by holding separate classes.Institution has the provision of Add-on and Enrichment courses by way supplementary educational system as detailed under K.A. 1.2.1 and 1.3.4.Also please refer to K.A.2.2.2

Institution has a system to provide remedial teaching for slow learners and for those who remain absent in the class due to any reason .Separate class of maximum -20-students if so required is organized. Such arrangement is a regular process and is properly monitored, recorded, assessed and evaluated.

There is a co-education system where boys and girls join with each other during teaching-learning and in various other activities without any gender differences or without any discrimination on the basis of caste ,colour and religion .The environment of the institution remains very peaceful and congenial as institution has a mission to encourage the concept of "Mahavidyalaya Pariwar".

Institution sends teachers and students to Kanpur city, wherein a laboratory named "ANWESHIKA" is established .ANWESHIKA is recognized by Indian Association of Physics Teachers and in Kanpur, it is working under guidance of Prof. H.C. Verma, I.I.T. Kanpur In 2014-15 also, our students had been there from 1st to 3rd December, 2014 and on 27th Feb 2015 and have got experiences about:-

- 1. Characteristic of magnetic lines by three polar magnetic
- 2. Step up and Step down transformer manufacturing.
- 3. Elasticity of rubber plants.
- 4. Temperature reading by therma couple
- 5. Two/Three other things.

ANWESHIKA was invited in institution to camp on 20th December,2014 to give exposure to the students and teachers of nearby schools also along with our own students by way of in-house training. Experts of Anveshika also visited the institution on 28th Feb ,2015 being "Science Day".

Basic knowledge of survey and Action Research is also given to students so that they may be aware how to collect data, analyse, interpret and derive the conclusion. This also nurtures critical thinking and creativity.

The Institution starts days` teaching —learning through morning assembly. Students on rotation are required to address morning assembly for 1-2 minutes with new quotation

relating to life skill development which nurture critical thinking , creativity . .Every day "A word of the Day" and "A question of the day" is written on Notice Board which student ponders and memories.

Through inter-face session ,spirit of asking the question, listening the question, analysing and concluding the outcome is generated as this is a basic need to create scientific temper

Over and above,informal education through IGNOU courses keeps students as life long learner .On-going process of learning enables students to remain ready to adopt any change any time in life or in employment market .

Inshort, institution makes serious effort to generate and develop the basic element of research through discovery of causes and delivery of solution.

experimental basis for teaching-learning. Institution has suggested to encourage self-learning for which one unit in every subject is to be left for students for self study but assignment is to be given by the teacher to assess the achievement level. By way of innovative method. Institution has proposed to use a scheme of micro scale technology in chemistry lab which would reduce the consumption quantity of chemical and would reduce the expenditure on it. The scheme when introduced would save time and energy of students while performing practicals. This would also avoid the wastage of chemicals.

Evaluation is done mainly about teaching attributes, knowledge and degree of professional commitment.

Institution has evolved its own evaluation system as under:-

The Institution has made the provision for entry level assessment as per KA.2.2.2. Under formative assessment, the institution has inter-active system wherein last ten minutes are to be spared for question-answer through which, day-to-day assessment of every student becomes easy. It gives an opportunity for "on-the-spot rectification" of any defficiency for the teachers and students. This is known as "Period -end Assessment". This system helps in identifying slow and advance learner and it enables the teachers to review his teaching plan and strategy. By way of unit-end assessment, normally, after teaching a fixed number of units, assessment/ evaluation is made through inter-face session and/or objective test. Mid-term examination may be conducted and if so in that case answer sheets are to be shown to the students after they are checked by the teachers so that they may also know about their performances and if they find any grievance, they may discuss with the teachers or/and Principal for the redressel of any grievance. Assessment of field work, co-curriculur\extracurriculur activities like classroom seminar ,group discussion quiz,debates,extension activities and activities relating to the development of scientific temper and creativity is also to be made as per following grading system:-

During Induction Course itself, students are informed about time gap, method of assessment, weightage system, feedback process and proposed remedial measures.

However, institution, as far as possible ensures feedback immediately after the performance of any activity. Self-Evaluation Form is used by student for assessing his own achievement level. This form is also utilized as a feedback to identify the deficiencies of student and to remove them.

Under summative evaluation ,the assessment/evaluation for practical and theoretical knowledge is made at every session end by the university. University has introduced the system of objective type question paper for every subject in annual examination from session 2013-14 for first year of every faculty. Coding system and to make available answer sheets on line has been introduced by University.

However, University has discontitueed the practice of mid-term examination and has introduced on –line:-

In short, the institute and individual teachers use the process to observe as to which extent , Vission and Mission of the institution could have been achieved. Evaluation outcome is also used by teacher to assess his teaching methods to prepare effective teaching plan , remedial plan to remove deficiencies wherever so required and to enhance students' competency. For example: deficiencies noted about computer awareness and communication in English, special arrangement has been made by institution and this arrangement has shown positive impact.

There is a crisis to meet minimum requirement of Ph.D. holder teachers at University level because our university has not conducted Ph.D. course since 2009 on the one hand and on the other hand, new degree colleges are being established which is causing heavy demand for Ph.D. holder teachers.Now, it is from 2015-16 that university has started the process to start this course.

Institution is of considered view that the institute-industry relationship is like a relationship between producer and consumer .Inspite of the best efforts, industry does not prefer to have any collaboration in a structured manner may be because of our being self-finance college.Institution has, therefore, made a strategy to reach the desired industry through placement/training agencies like Oracle,BTPS,BSNL who co-operate the institution to give training to the students on the topic of interest of

industry as these agencies appear to be related with the industry directly. Institution provides a forum for interface to the executives of ICT Companies ,Placement Agencies,Banking Industry,Health Industry particularly from eye hospitals of Chitrakoot, Scientists from Agriculture University and experts of education field. Institution also organizes the tour of students to banks and other places to strengthen institute-industry interface and to make it meaningful in developing employable skills and to narrow down the gap between the institution and workplace. Institution has informal understanding with industries like BTPS who permits our students of B.C.A. to conduct and complete their project work . Such industries also suggest the area and nature of improvements required to be brought in students to make them fully employable. In BSNL, students of BCA have gone for training during summer season.

Institution has established consultancy cell under the guidance of Principal.As a policy decision, institution is to provide consultancy not for revenue but for human service.

Being a college established in rural area ,as per Mission of the Institution,need has been assessed to promote consultancy in agriculture field and allied area on priority basis particularly for soil testing ,drinking and irrigation water testing, vermy compost. Consultancy is provided for cleanliness, child care, nutrition socio- economic problems for career guidance, skill development activities, employment, self-employment and Web Designing. However, academic forum is provided to nearby schools to consult on any matter relating to science laboratories. Consultancy about IGNOU courses /computer courses is also being provided by the institution. To encourage consultancy ,publicity is made in nearby local area. There is always proper co-ordination between consultancy services and extension activities. Area of consultancy has been placed on website of the institution to make it publicised.

This project is now in progress (Serial No – SL4741).

Institution promotes networking with community through IGNOU courses also which are affordable ,accessible and convenient for those who could not be a party to traditional education system and thus contribute in creation of good citizenship and service orientation and meets major social responsibilities. For the application of theoretical knowledge relating to social oriental in to practical, society is used as a Resource Centre and a laboratory where students get first-hand training.

Appropriate provision is made in the budget to meet the expenses of extension activities."To meet the mission of our Prime Minister for "SWACHH BHARAT" our staff and students have launched a massive move by going door-to-door in villages and encourages people for home cleaning ,body and cloth cleaning ,food and water cleanliness ,lane and drain cleanliness.Our students have prepared small play –Mime has been presented at a frequent interval in nearby villages subject matter of which is "Swachh Bharat".They are also encouraging to provide ready made toilets with the assistance of village panchayat in their homes.Lastly on 26th January,2015, this move

was again organized and this will continue in time to come also. To meet the objective of "Beti Bachao"not only village-to-village awareness has been developed but even door—to-door awareness has been developed. For this activity, assistance of senior citizens have been taken. Torturing to Old Parents" has been identified as the most painful social evil in many families. Institution has decided to eradicate this evil and therefore, a documentary has been prepared to develop awareness emotionally about moral, constitutional and social responsibility to serve the parents at all times with special attention during old age. Days' teaching—learning work starts with 'Prayer to Parents' in morning assembly and institution has adopted the efforts as its 'Best-Practice' Details of other major extension, outreach programmes and impact on students are given below:-

- 1) Formation of Farmers' Club facilitating for water testing etc
- 2) Establishment of Village library
- 3) Organizing Veterinary Camps

On the basis of this project report, Institution has started to literate the children of workers of brick field in village Amauli District Fatehpur.

Another survey was conducted under government scheme "Save the Water" to study the water level going down in college village.On the basis of this report, Government sanctioned one tube well for unirrigated area and now large acres of land is brought under irrigation.Government has conducted re-boring of many hand pumps which could make the positive effect.Tank of about -15- acres has also been selected for improvement only after this report.Under the same scheme of "Save the Water" on 18th May,2013, a workshop was organized which was shared by Hon'able Central Coal Minister Shri Sriprakash Jaiswal and Padamshri Prof. Rajendra Singh "Jal Purush" and Vice-Chancellor of C.S.J.M. Univeristy Prof. Ashok Kumar.

Adequate arrangement for Rain Harvesting is on priority for implementation.

- 2.) -44-Villagers have been provided readymade latrines from government fund after collaborative persuation with village panchayat. Persuation at block is still going on to provide such latrines to remaining villagers.
- 3.) The greatest achievement of the institution is to get completely stopped very long practice of throwing dead animals by villagers on the back of tank area which was not only polluting the environment with bad smell for days together but also was causing many diseases .Now private contractors are coming to collect dead animals on information.
- 4.) Beti Bachao abhiyan has developed awareness about need and importance of girls for the survival of human being .

One cell named "Care Cell for Special Category " has been set up as per guidelines of UGC to oversee the implementation of reservation policy, fee refund and scholarship distribution to the students of SC/ST/OBC/Minority and economically weaker section. This cell makes the arrangement for suitable academic, personal and carrier counseling to the students of above category. To develop the feeling of unity and brotherhood amongst these students ,co-curricular, extra-curricular activities are organized with active participation of students including girls of above category. In addition to Government Assistance by way of fee refund and scholarship, Institution has provided financial assistance also to those SC/ST/economically weaker students who have opted any course conducted by IGNOU. This cell also makes the arrangement for remedial teaching and coaching for the progression/employment of students belonging to above categories. Slow learners of these categories feel complex if separate remedial classes are held. Therfore, mainstreaming is preferred instead of segregation in this respect.

Students with Physical Disabilities:-

For students with Physical disabilities, lift facility mobility aids, moving ramp on ground braille and lences for visually disabled students have been provided. Details of such mobility aids are given in K.A.2.2.1.

Any problem relating to Physically disabled students is also attended by this cell named Care Cell for Special Category.

Such students are provided free and friendly library services and transportation service. Co-curricular, extra-curricular activities/facilities are provided looking to their abilities.

Institution would like to quote the example of one Shri Manish of B.Sc of Session 2006-07 and Shri Abhinesh of B.Sc of session 2004-05. Manish is crippled whereas abhinesh is deaf and dumb.Both were provided fee concession,free bus services, regular remedial teaching, counseling and guidance. After clearing the B.Sc. Shri Manish has cleared B.Ed. from here itself. Now Shri Manish is appointed as teacher in Government Basic School whereas Shri Abhinesh is doing own job of photography.

Overseas Student:-

There is no overseas student in the Institution.

Students to participate in Various Competitions/National and International:

Institution has appointed a sport teacher who prepares students to participate in any competition of games and sports. Institution grants time off for regular practice.TA/DA is paid for going outside to participate in competition .separate classes are arranged to meet the gap in teaching-learning.

Medical assistance to students: health centre, health insurance etc.:-

Provisions for Group Insurance Scheme, first aid facilities and arrangement for immediate treatment in a nearby nursing home without demanding for money on the spot has been made. An expert is available to provide relief against mental stress of any student. Adequate arrangement has been made for clean drinking water, polluted free environment, games and sport and cultural activities.

Organizing coaching classes for Competitive Exams:

Coaching Classes for some competitive examinations like NET,B.Ed ,T.E.T and Banking are arranged.

Skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.,):-

English Speaking Course and Computer awareness program are arranged as an Addon Course .Institution is having a language lab which is run under guidance of an expert engaged exclusive for this purpose.Please also refer to K.A. 1.2.1

Support for "slow learners":-

Slow learners are provided Remedial teaching /mentoring,guidance and counselling facilities. Teachers are easily available for remedial teaching, mentoring ,guidance and counseling. About twenty five students are allotted to one teacher for remedial and mentoring. Tutorial classes for slow learners are organized at a time convenient to both teacher and student. Acheivement level is assessed at regular interval. Monitoring record is put up in the IQAC also for any suggestion. Parents are also free to discuss with teachers frankly about their children who are slow learners and appropriate guidance and counseling is also provided for parents. Effective Remedial Teaching is specially provided for upliftment of slow learners with special attention to improve academic skill of SC,ST and OBC (below creamy layer). This system also helps in raising the level of comprehension of basic subject.

Exposures of students to other institution of higher learning/corporate/business house etc.:-

For the exposure of students to advance knowledge ,Students are sent to other Institutions like BSNL,Anvesika and BTPS.Institution also arranges the visit of botanical garden, Bank Branches and oil/floor factories etc. for knowledge exposure.

Extension activities are a part of extra-curricular activities. Same way debates, cultural activities ,quiz etc. are the co-curricular activities. Though these activities are not a part of syllabus and do not carry any weightage in annual examination but to develop the good citizenship, to stress the social orientation, to develop awareness about positive elements through sports, institution provides necessary guidance and facilities to students to participate in the activities.

To meet the vision and mission of Institution, students are encouraged to participate in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities for which required infrastructural facilities are provided .Students are provided TA/DA and leave for attending any competition outside.

For NCC students, a small refreshment is also provided by the Institution. There is a provision of Inter-face session, debate and cultural activities to be organized on last day of every month. Annual competition is arranged during youth festival at institution level from 12th to 15th January every year and prize distribution is done on 15th January.

Coaching and Guidance is provided by our teachers under placement cell to prepare the students for NET,B.Ed and T.E.T. entrance examination. However, full details could not be collected inspite of best persuation/efforts.

Submission:

Institution provides academic,personal and psycho guidance to the students Under academic counseling, students are assisted in removal of deficiencies in learning, catering to individual deficiencies, need of advance learners, develop skills required for employment in the selection of progrmmes /courses, participation in extension and other co-curricular activities, expected behaviour pattern in campus. Personal counseling by senior teachers or an expert has been very useful to needy students. Sociol etiquettes dealing with other students and campus staff, change in behavior in family to remove hesitation and shyness especially from girls that too from marginalized category are covered under personal counseling. Institution provides psycho counseling in addition to personal, academic and career guidance. For psycho counseling, an expert on part-time has been appointed. Institution has evolved a format to be used by students for Self-evaluation. On the basis of details given by students in this format, personal and academic counseling is done. Time to time, guest speakers are invited to provide career counseling. Career Counseling is arranged by Placement Cell.

Institution conducts one camp during every session under the leadership of Dr. L.K.Singh ,an Expert Psychologist of central government of Kanpur zone for guidance and counseling.Recently ,two days` counseling camp was organized on 9th and 10th December,2014 in campus wherein about 66 students had participated, career guidance was given much insistence on 9th itself.One seminar was also organized on 12th October,2008 on Guidance and Counseling and on the basis of recommendations in seminar ,part- time counselor has been appointed in the institution.Two days

induction programme at the beginning of a new session has proved to be an effective source of quality counseling.

Institution observed that maximum students belong to farmers' families and they are not interested to go outside in the search of job . Looking to rise in opportunities in agro-industry ,(crop production, grain processing dairy ,input suppliers like banks ,technology providers), institution has strengthened its consultancy cell to provide knowledge and skill to willing students in different components of agro-industry . This would equally develop entrepreneurial skill also in the students.

- 4.) **Grievance** Time of students in games and sports should not be wasted because it has got no weightage in annual examination.
 - **Redressal-** Aggrieved students were called separately and they were Counseled by explaining the importance of such activities in life.
- 5.) **Grievance-**Principal should consider the request and not to increase work load by assigning Action Research as it is not provided in the syllabus.
 - **Redressal**-Students were educated by principal suitably and they were encouraged to learn about research activities.
- 6.) **Grievance-**Teacher should not pressurize for extension activities.
 - **Redressal-**Students were told that it is part of education and such activities are useful for future growth.
- 7.) **Grievance** English teacher is not punctual in the class.
 - **Redressal-** Concern teacher has been suggested properly.



Submission:

There is a provision for granting status of autonomy by the University to the Institution. However, institution would make efforts to obtain autonomy subject to the outcome of grading by NAAC.

Submission:

Institution analyses grievances and complaints and they are settled immediately and it does not allow to shake the best relationship with the stakeholders. There is a grievance committee consisting of three managing committee members to attend the grievances of any stakeholder in case his grievance is not settled locally. A booklet containing grievance handling procedure has been published by the institution. Institution organizes open meetings of community members to deliberate upon their grievances and if possible on the spot solution is also given. Institution has provided the facility to refer the grievance 'on-line' also.

Submission:

There has been no court case during the last four years relating to the institution.

Submission:

The Institution has a appropriate system for analyzing student feedback on Institutional Performance .Students feedback is obtained through prescribed format to be filled every year and also through the proceedings of meetings of Student Quality Management Council and grievance registers . Feedback is obtained from more than one channel to confirm the authenticity ,same is amalgamated, analysed and conclusion is derived.Most of the suggestions relating to the Institutional Performance have been implemented at this level. Institution has strengthened its infrastructure facilities and also has set up units like NCC,language lab and placement cell etc. in the Institution as a response to the feedback received from students.

Submission:

Institution has sent some teachers to Academic Staff College (ASCs) for orientation and refresher programme whereas others have applied for such training .Teachers are encouraged to attend seminars ,workshop and gosthies for which T.A . and leave are sanctioned .Guest speakers are invited with whome innovative ideas are shared.Institution also oraganizes the seminar and workshop for professional development of teachers.

Debates and group discussions are oragnised in the campus through which screening of work culture and teaching learning is done. Bank authorities are invited to provide training to identify forged currency and to apprise with loan and deposit schemes. Training on communication skill, computer literacy, office-work, interpresented relationship, discipline etc. is also given to non-teaching staff by senior executives of other concerns.

To motivate for professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff, following other measures have been taken:-

- a) Deputing our library staff to other institutions of relevance for gaining experience for library working.
- b) Payment of Rs. 500.00 per month to non-teaching on acquiring knowledge of computer operation and English speaking.
- c) Grant of Rs. 1500.00 by way of incentive for publication of every article in journal of national level and Rs. 5000.00 for publication of a book.
- d) Encouraging to undertake at least mini -research work./Action Research/ Survey
- e) To handle community- oriented activities.
- f) To guide students for employment progression
- g) Arranging training by inviting experts as guest speakers.
- h) Providing the internet ,library and laboratories.
- i) By encouraging to seek the membership of reputed organizations.
- j) To go through reports of educational commissions.
- k) To make full use of INFLIBNET.
- 1) To think and act upon new teaching pedagogy.
- m) To develop relation with experts and reputed academicians.
- n) To go through relevant blogs and books may be for professional pleasure.
- o) To use the courses of IGNOU as institution is a study centre.

Managing Committee has decided in meeting held on 21st October,2007 to grant a special increase in the salary by Rs.500.00 to clerks and peons in case they improve working knowledge of English and Computer.

About 90% Staff have taken advantage of one or the other welfare scheme out of -11 schemes during last four years.

Submission:-

Better service conditions ,negotiation based salary and opportunity for professional development are provided to attract and retain the faculty.

To ensure effective and efficient use of financial resources, Institution has its own codified administrative and financial rules , budget and planning system, decentralization of financial powers and audit system.

Submission:

External audit is conducted by the chartered accountant whereas internal audit is conducted by members of government body who are coming from banking sector. Last internal audit was done on 8th September,2014 and external audit was done on 28th September,2014..

Introduction of Administrative and financial rules and decentralization of financial powers are major outcome because of internal audit objection.

Though Institution is registered under 2(f) and 12(B) of UGC Act but even then inspite of all efforts ,it could not get any assistance from UGC for any purpose including for holding the seminar etc.However for our Teachers` Education Department ,NAAC has sanctioned Rs. 75,000.00 for organizing a seminar on 5th,6th October,2014 on "Opportunities and Challenges of the Institutional Library in Rural

Areas"as this department has been assessed and accredited by NAAC as "B" grade with CGPA 2.78 points.

 - Formulation of Farmers` Club establishment of village library and other Extension activities have been introduced as per suggestion of Shri Sita Ram whereas computerization of office work and Accounts has been done under guidance of Shri P.K.Mishra. Free membership of library for alumni has been started at the instance of Shri Arvind Mishra.
 - d.) Students and alumni contribute in creation of student-centric environment for quality education. There is a representative of students in IQAC,Students contribute for Quality Enhancement through SQMC wherein council members apart from other matters discuss as to which extent, vision and mission have been achieved and what are deficiencies and barriers. Students contribute through other various committees also wherein their representatives are there like Library Advisory Committee,Student Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-Women Harassment Cell.Feedback reports from students on curriculum,teachers evaluation and evaluation of institutional performance are also put up in IQAC.

Alumni keeps informed about community views and market needs which are taken into account to formulate or review teaching-learning strategy.

Alumni send their views on curriculum and institutional performance every year which are analyzed, evaluated and considered for implementation in IQAC meeting. In fact, alumni contributes as a link between institution and community etc.

e.)There is one representative of every constituency in the cell and through him communication is made .Newsletter published periodically is also used for this purpose .Work allocation by IQAC keeps staff of every constituency engaged in the process of Quality Enhancement.Institution has provided special window for IQAC in its website which is used for information dissemination.

Institution submits AQAR to NAAC for our teacher education department which has already been assessed and accredited.

Agenda, Minutes and Action Taken report are properly recorded and maintained.

Periodical Self- Evaluation forms filled by students, reports from department, Management own monitoring system and proceedings of SQMC are main mechanism for the review of teaching-learning. This review is done in the meeting of IQAC regularly.

Submission:

Institution conducts a environmental supervision of its campus and facilities. This environmental supervision is conducted by our internal team consisting of following teaching and non-teaching staff under the supervision of Dr. V.K.Sachan -Scientist-C,B-Wing,PickUp Bhawan,Central Pollution Control Board,Northern Zone,Vibhuti Khand,Lucknow:-

Team has pointed out certain deficiencies and has given recommendations to meet the defficieincies .Institution is implementing those recommendation in a phased manner. To make institution environmental friendly and to provide opportunities for research to students and faculties, efforts have been started to develop a botanical garden for which co-operation has been assured by Botanical Survey of India, Calcutta.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- * Energy conservation
- * Use of renewable energy

Submission:

To make college campus eco-friendly, following initiatives have been taken:-

- * Energy conservation:- Use of solar power for the light in the campus and CNG in place of diesel/petrol for college vehicles is being encouraged wherever it is possible. Due to very poor and irregular power supply ,institution is bound to use the generator.Institution also encourages the use of invertor which derives energy from electricity and generator both when it functions.Following other measures are taken for energy conservation:
 - a) Use of CFL in place of bulbes.
 - b) Regular greesing /oiling of fans ,water pumps etc.
 - c) To keep main switch off if power is not required.
 - d) Not to open /close fridge door frequently.
 - e) Use of only standard equipments.

Provision of adequate number of windows on the walls in the building of institution is very much useful for energy conservation.

- * Use of renewable energy:- Energy received from sunlight is used through solar system. Energy received from earth is used for preparation of fertilizer and for trees /plants.
- * Water harvesting:-Adequate Water harvesting arrangement has been proposed to be done inside the campus. Rain water is passed on to the nearby village tank/pond where water is used for livestock and other purposes by village citizens. Some water also is stored in symbolic pond inside college campus. Gosthi was organized on May, 2013 under the leadership of Padamshree Prof Rajendra Singh "Jal Purush" and as per his suggestions, few measures have been taken for water harvesting. Institution has also taken up the matter with government authorities for facilitating the water storage in village tank. Awareness about water treatment was also developed among the participants through this gosthi.
- * Check dam construction:- Not Applicable .
- * Efforts for Carbon neutrality:- Generator with canopy is provided for limited purpose to operate computer lab and other electrical equipments during college time. Oxygen from trees/plants neutralises carbon effect and does not effect the environment adversely. Trees like neem, peepal, banana, papaya and tulsi in campus give maximum oxygen and absorb pollution to great extent.

* Plantation:- There is a small garden outside the campus adjacent to college boundary wall in addition to college own garden inside the campus. Adequate number of trees and plants are available inside the campus and also on backyard side.

* Hazardous waste management:-

- a) The college uses very less corrosive chemicals to conduct practicals.
- b) Chemicals are purchased only on need base to avoid expiry and disposal.
- c) Disposal in drain is kept in minimum after practical.
 Also please refer to K.A. 2.3.8.

Old newspapers ,home examination answer notebooks , practical notebooks, old files, waste rough papers are sold in the registered shop where stock is recycled.Broken furnitures are repaired for reuse. Till disposal or repairing ,old stock is stored in a separate store room.

* e-waste management:-

For effective e-waste management, following steps have been taken:-

- a.) Old computers after necessary repairing work ,are used for basic computer learning.
- b.) Only need based standard items with eco-friendly level are to be purchased.
- c.) As far as possible ,items are to be purchased against "Take and Back" facility.
- d.) E-waste, when required to sell, is sold separately and not with any other garbage.
- **e.)** Discharged torch cells are returned back to supplier who re-use

7.2 Innovations

The best practices of our institution which have contributed for the achievement of vision and mission are as under:-

Best Practices in Value-Added Education

(PARENTS' PRAYER)

1.)Goal:-

Institution felt its moral duty to create and develop the awareness amongst all students about their sacred duty to serve their parents at every time but particularly during old age. Institution, therefore, started "Parents' Prayer" in morning assembly as a part of value- added education mainly with following objectives:-

- 1) To charge the students to understand the status of parents who are next to Almighty.
- 2) To educate students about their moral duties towards their parents.
- 3) To encourage the students to develop awareness in society also to respect and serve their parents and not to humiliate them.

2.)Context:-

Sufferings of aged parents in many families, may be rich or poor, prompted the institution to charge its students emotionally for commitment to the service of their parents particularly in their old age as they are next to Almighty."Old Age" is the most delicate and fearful period when many parents are treated as neglected and burden whereas this is the time when parents want someone near to them who may care ,who may offer one glass of water and who may talk to them atleast for half-an hour in a whole day. These old parents in many families are so tortured that are forced to pass the days of their remaining life in Ashrams leaving their homes.

3.)Practice:-

Institution provides prospectus to every student and "Parents' Prayer" is printed on first page with the instruction to every student to participate in morning assembly. This prayer has also been placed on Notice Board near the prayer ground. Immediately

after Parents` Prayer, prayer to Almighty and then National Anthem follows. After that, 2-3 students are required to address the gathering by a thought provoking quotation relating to life- management which develops creative thinking in every student.

In class-rooms ,whenever any opportunity comes,teachers talk to students about this prayer and encourage students to popularize it amongst community members.Institution has sent the text of Parents` Prayer to all nearby schools either on demand or at its own.

Students may be a boy or girl ,may be belonging to any religion or caste are free to pay respect to their parents as they want i.e. by touching the feet or the way they want before they depart from home to college.Institution wants to inculcate the feelings of moral duty towards parents .Institution encourages the students to commit to their parents respecting them as next to Almighty .Through this prayer, students are taught that every son and daughter remain whole life indebted to the parents and, therefore, they pray to Almighty to provide moral and physical strength enabling them to serve parents even at any cost

4.) Evidence of Success :-

This prayer is being hailed every where. Village citizens appreciate this prayer recognizing as moral ethical- value- oriented (SANSKARIK) education related with ground reality of life. The result is that nearby schools have taken the text of the prayer from institution and they may start this prayer in their schools subject to the consent of their management. This shows the acceptability of spirit of prayer. Moreover, many students are now coming to college after taking blessings from their parents as has been communicated by many guardians.

It was the practical experience of the institution that students were not coming after taking blessings of their parents but now, students have realized the value of respect to their parents and they come with blessings of their parents. Earlier, students were treating their parents only as elders, their supporters and caretakers but now they are respecting as next to Almighty.

5.) Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

Shri Shakti Degree College/Self-Appraisal Report

Whenever our students try to convince the community, some of even educated boys

and girls take it as interference in their family affairs and such so-called young,treat

our students as 'extra-smart' and 'showy' .In certain families, wives do not permit

their husbands to touch the feet of parents even in festivals. These wives treat this

OUR BEST PRACTICE IN EXTENSION

TECHNICAL SUPPORT SERVICES FOR AGRICULTURE THROUGH FARMERS` CLUB

Goal:-In the most theoretical level ,technology is the application of knowledge for practical purpose, technology is used to improve the human conditions, natural environment or to carry out other socio -economic activities. The goal of the practice is ,on the one hand ,to provide technical support services for farming and allied services and on the other hand ,to encourage creativity, critical thinking and scientific temper amongst students through such support services. Its objective is also to prepare the students to face the challenges of emerging job markets and to build entrepreneurship spirit both in farming and allied field. Practice is effective kind of experimental learning and is also covered under the activities of Extension and Institutional Social Responsibilities (ISRs).

Context:- Existing Scenario of the employment market reveals that job opportunities in public sector are declining but those in private industrial agriculture (production, processing and value addition in every aspect) and allied i.e. service sector (input supply, banking, consultancy and e-technology are increasing. The variation demands that students should acquire and develop knowledge and skill both in farming and allied services and should develop entrepreneurial spirit to opt for self-employment independently in the field of production and advisory services. Producers are required to be enriched with that knowledge and information with which they may solve their locational specific problems.

Continuous two way interaction through Farmers `Club between farmers and experts in a structured manner is the most critical component of the Best practice. Agriculture sector needs to grow at a faster rate than in the past to allow for higher per capita income and consumption. With this back drop institution has set up a Farmers` Club which would provide all technical support system (soil ,water testing ,pesticides, insecticides ,pathological guidance,)fertilizers,verterinary services ,consultancy and knowledge. It has been proposed to start these services not all at a time but within a span of two years in a phased manner. Most interestingly, all proposed activities would inculcate and encourage critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper

amongst students and that would also provide community orientation and true contribution for social responsibilities.

Practice:-

Farmers Club is a forum which provides technical support services like soil and water testing through government lab ,preparation of vermy compost khaad ,seed distribution ,veterinary related consultancy and bee-keeping .It also provides knowledge and skill about agriculture production and banking facilities relevant to the field. Transfer of knowledge about latest technology ,seed fertilizers and irrigation facilities receive top priority as these factors help in the increase of production and services directly.Periodically veterinary camps are organized where treatment of sick animals is done,medicines are prescribed as precautionary measures and detailed consultancy is provided for upkeep of live stock.

In case of need ,scientists of agriculture field and dairy field visit the campus to interact with farmers directly and to convince them in their simple local language. Villagers do not agree to any change easily . They also do not like to hear any critism of their traditional methods and customs . Sometimes instution has to offer its own land and other belonging to be used for experiment.

Any interested person is required to fill up one small form detailing therein what he wants. This format is obviously in local language. Query is satisfied face-to-face or over telephone or through internet , Pamphlets, posters and pocket books are supplied to the Farmers Club from CSA Agriculture University, Kanpur which are distributed amongst farmers for knowledge and information dissemination. Agriculture exihibition is organized wherein innovative technology is presented for the selection and purchase .

Bank officers are invited to apprise the citizens about various loan and deposit schemes including the use of credit cards. Every year seed of selected variety is distributed in college campus. All these activities are organized by our Farmers Club which has been established in the name of Shri Shakti Farmers Club under the guidance of CSA Agriculture University, Kanpur. Members of the club have been enrolled by University Farmers Club which is a central office of our farmers club. Our

representative goes on 6th of every month to attend this meeting. Only faremers are the office bearers of this club. Our representative goes to attend the monthly meeting after collecting problems of various farmers and he brings the solution and communicates to concerned farmers. This situation comes only if problem can not be settled locally to the satisfaction of any person.

Evidence of Success:-The practice has following impact which is evidence of success:-

A:-Impact on community:-A forum is now available locally for continuous interaction between farmers and experts directly and indirectly.

Now transfer of technology model may not be any challenge in near future with the free access of experts. Farming and allied services may be improved through the on- spot technology support services.

Community members are using this forum as and when they need without wastage of time, money and energy.

B.Impact on teaching-learning:-Practice inculcates creativity, critical thinking and scientific temper amongst students as students and experts in government lab offer technical support services individually or in group. Students develop confidence, competence and entrpreneural skill to set up any unit in the field of agriculture services and consultancy.

C.Impact on Institution:- Institution –community network is enlarged through this forum of consultancy.It discharges social responsibilities by contributing in rural development leading to national growth because agricultural prosperity is the foundation for economic growth of the country.

Problems Encountered:-Rigidity for traditional practices and customs is the main hurdle. Some farmers desire that club should remain operative round the clock so that they may utilize the services any time day or night. Electrical /power availability is another problem for internet availability.
