

## 1st MEB puts finishing touches on Team Spirit '88

Having advanced the complex art and science of Maritime Prepositioning Force operations significantly during Team Spirit '88, members of the 1st MEB are now putting the finishing touches on one of the biggest training exercises in which Hawaii Marines have participated in recent years.

This week, Marines continued returning to Kaneohe from Pohang, Republic of Korea, and more will return later as the brigade's involvement in the 13th annual exercise comes to an end. Already, after-action reports are being drafted, outlining the unprecedented accomplishments of the 1,300 Hawaii Marines who joined some 200,000 ROK and U.S. servicemembers for the ROK-wide exercise.

This was only the second time 1st MEB has participated in the Team Spirit series of exercises since the brigade was assigned the MPF mission in 1986. But the MPF portion of TS '88 was remarkably more ambitious than last year, when the MEB concentrated on offloading a small amount of equipment from the Maritime Prepositioning Ships at pierside.

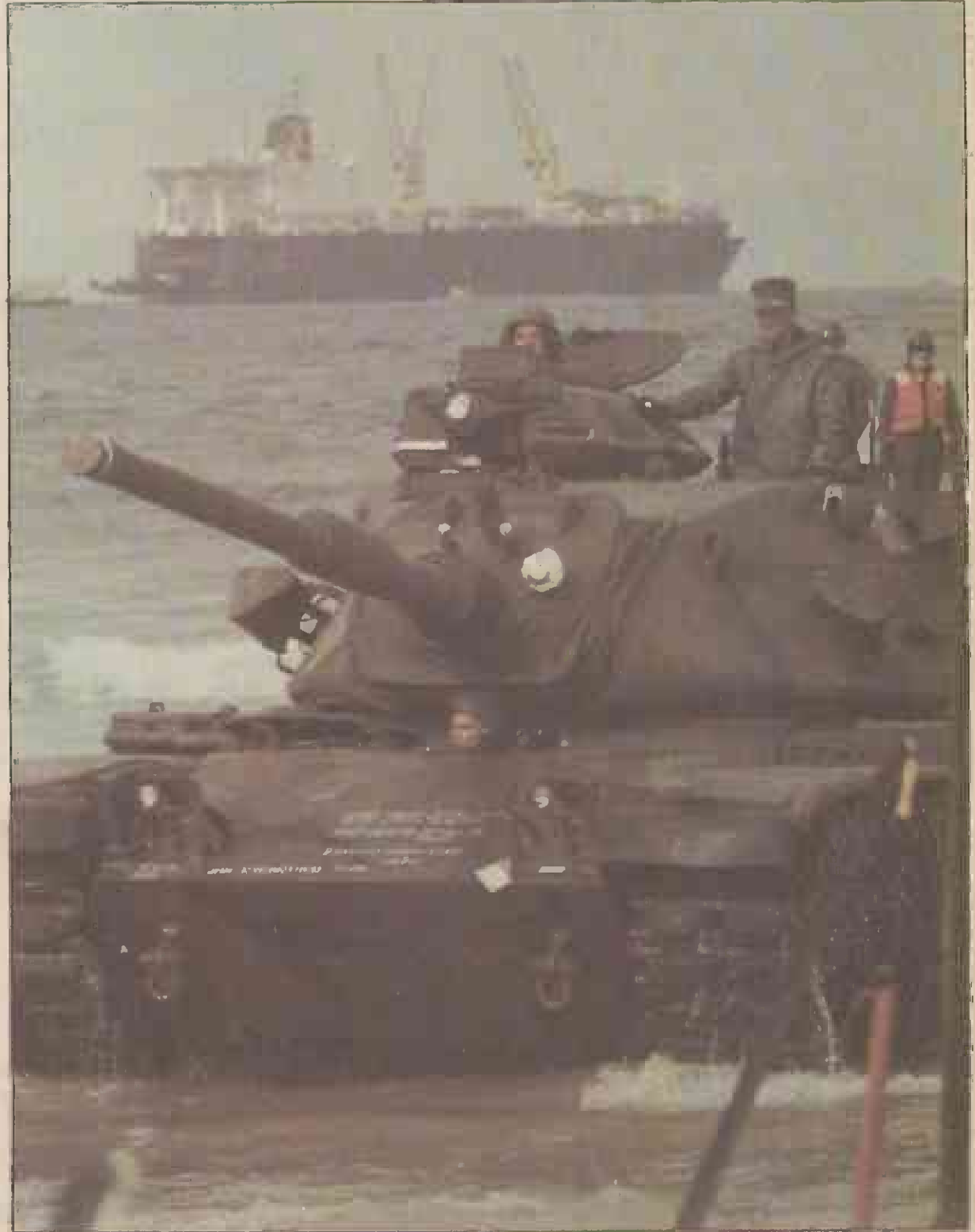
The "in-stream" offload of one shipload of gear from two of the four ships of Maritime Prepositioning Squadron-3 was a unqualified success and a "first" for Team Spirit, according to exercise planners. The weather and sea-state in Pohang's unprotected harbor made unloading the anchored ships a challenge. The two other MPF Brigades — the 6th MEB from Camp Lejeune

and the 7th MEB from 29 Palms — had conducted partial in-stream offloads before, but never in an exposed harbor in inclement weather.

Other important "firsts" during Team Spirit '88 included the "marrying-up" of heavy equipment with the MEB's ground combat element, 3d Marines (Reinforced), and significant maneuver ashore with the regiment's mechanized infantry, tanks, light armored vehicles and assault amphibians. That the tankers and LAV crewmen had the opportunity to live-fire and set "battle-sight-zero" with their main guns was also believed by planners to be another MPF first.

Near the end of their involvement in the exercise, ele-

## Lawmakers urge speedy auto finance reform talks; military studies options

Although auto finance reform legislation remains stalled in the state's House Judiciary Committee, efforts continue on several fronts to reform practices that victimize servicepersons financing autos through Hawaiian lending institutions.

The legislation — Senate Bill 1581 — will "die" until the 1989 legislative session unless it is acted upon by April 21. The bill is designed to allow creditworthy servicemembers to ship their financed vehicles from Hawaii without having to prepay their loans, refinance their loans, or forfeit their vehicles.

In the State Senate, three senators have introduced a resolution calling for the financial institutions to "negotiate with all deliberate speed an interim agreement which protects the interests of creditworthy members of the armed forces." The resolution also calls for these institutions to work with the military to develop "mutually agreeable legislation" for the next legislative session.

The Senate resolution, sponsored by Senators

Jimmy Wong, Mary George, and Steve Cobb, will be voted on by the state legislature within the next two weeks.

To date, lending institutions have failed to set a meeting date to resolve differences with the military. However, one of the four Hawaii lending associations has indicated its willingness to at least meet with the military on the issue.

The executive vice president of the Hawaii Bankers Association has written to the Air Station Staff Judge Advocate that he will schedule a meeting with the military after a lending institution conference "in the near future."

In other developments, the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board (AFDCB) began studying the auto finance problem Tuesday, and is considering several options. The board has the authority to place business establishments "off limits" to military personnel.

Traditionally, businesses have been placed "off limits" for involvement in such activities as illegal sale of alcohol to minors, drug trafficking, sale of drug paraphernalia,

and prostitution. However, businesses engaged in "unfair commercial practices" can also be placed "off limits," according to Capt. Carl Woods of the Legal Services Center here.

"Unfair commercial practices adversely affect morale, welfare, and readiness," said Woods. "It's hard for a lance corporal to deploy to combat if he is worried that his wife and child will have to forfeit their car if they must move to the mainland."

Options available to the board include sending offending lending institutions a "letter of concern," to holding hearings that can lead to a business being placed "off limits."

"While placing local banks and lending institutions 'off limits' would be a last resort," according to Air Station Staff Judge Advocate LtCol. T. Hess, "it may be required by DoD Standards of Fairness (See color box). The impact could be devastating." Deposits to local banks from MCAS, Kaneohe Bay, alone total more than \$110 million a year. Total deposits from all the services in Hawaii would be significantly more.

"In testimony before the House Judiciary Committee on March 29, lender lobbyists provided obscure testimony as to how much they lose a year on cars they allow to be taken off-island," said Hess. "Their estimates ranged from hundreds of thousands of dollars to several million dollars. But these claimed losses did not distinguish between losses due to civilian and military borrowers."

The banks estimated losses would be insignificant if compared to the millions of dollars at stake if the military responded as a unified economic power within the state.

**Editor's Note:** The Hawaii Marine incorrectly reported last week that \$4 million is infused annually into Hawaii financial institutions by Kaneohe Marines through direct pay deposits. The actual amount is \$48 million. In addition, in 1987, the Marine Corps Exchange and the clubs and recreation activities collectively deposited \$62 million.

### Case study

## Another car loan victim

Sgt. Sheree Derocher, 27, single, received orders to Hawaii in May 1985, and is currently stationed at MCAS, Kaneohe Bay. In December 1985, she purchased a 1986 Honda Civic from Windward Honda.

Financing, at 13.99 percent, was arranged through First Hawaiian Bank. The total sales price was \$10,447, minus a downpayment of \$1,300. At the time of contracting, Derocher signed a separate agreement stating that the car could not be shipped off-island without the consent of First Hawaiian Bank. She never received a copy of the no-removal agreement, and was never informed that consent would be unreasonably withheld by the bank.

In the fall of 1987, Derocher approached First Hawaiian Bank for the required consent because she was anticipating orders to Camp Pendleton, Calif. She had never been late or missed any payments. Further, credit reports classified her credit worthiness as excellent. She expected the granting of consent to be a routine procedure.

To her amazement, the bank informed her that consent would not be granted unless she paid off the entire balance on the note. Like most servicemembers on fixed incomes, the pay-off was virtually impossible.

She is currently attempting to accumulate the funds necessary to pay the remaining balance of \$3,100 but, to date, has been unsuccessful. This

amount is 25 percent of her annual base pay.

## Lenders violate Federal Regs by withholding auto shipping rights

Hawaii lending institutions that refuse servicemembers permission to ship their financed vehicles out of state violate the Code of Federal Regulations, according to the Staff Judge Advocate here.

LtCol. Ted Hess provided the following excerpt from Volume 32 of this code:

The military member shall have the right to remove any security for the obligation beyond the State of national boundaries if the military member or family moves beyond such boundaries under military orders and notifies the creditor, in advance of the removal, of the

new address where the security will be located. Removal of the security shall not accelerate payment of the obligation. (32 CFR, Ch. 1, Part 43a.9(d) Standards of Fairness)

"This regulation provides a standard upon which to base other actions," said Hess. Such actions could include placing violators of these Fairness Standards "off limits."

Hess added that military lawyers continue to study a full range of options to remedy the current problem with the lending institutions and Hawaii law.

## News In Brief

### Marine killed in Panama

A Marine sentry in Panama was shot and killed on the morning of April 12 — apparently by accident.

Corporal Ricardo Villahermosa, India Company, 3/4, was pronounced dead just after 1 a.m. Villahermosa was part of the security force patrolling a fuel tank farm near Howard Air Force Base.

After an apparent intrusion into the tank farm, security forces split into two elements. While regrouping, a trip flare was set off. Mistaking the sound of the flare for gunfire, both elements of the patrol opened fire discharging seven rounds before the on-scene commander ordered a cease fire. Villahermosa was hit once in the abdomen. Initial indicators are that the wound was not caused by hostile gunfire, but by crossfire from the U.S. shots fired.

An investigation into the facts surrounding the incident is continuing.

### Code of Conduct Reworded

The Code of Conduct was recently reworded by order of President Ronald Reagan, in order to remove references to the gender-specific "American Fighting Man."

The change deletes the word "man" from article I, II and VI of the six-paragraph code which provides guidelines for servicemembers who may become prisoners of war. The original code, written in 1955 and amended in 1977, applied to men and women in military.

The old language in the code described a servicemember as: "... I will never forget that I am an American Fighting Man ..."

The new language says: "I am an American ... I will never surrender the members of my command ...; and, ... I will never forget that I am an American ..."

# Inspectors to award cleanest work, living areas

Through a joint effort, the Station and Brigade Inspectors Office personnel are encouraging Kaneohe Bay Marines and sailors to take pride in, and clean up their areas by announcing an "Area of the Quarter" competition.

A new Air Station Order (ASO 11014.16) "encourages superior maintenance and overall appearance of grounds and buildings in work and billeting areas among all Brigade and Air Station units." The

area that is kept in a highest state of cleanliness and repair will receive a commendatory certificate for this effort, presented by the Air Station Commanding Officer and the 1st MEB Commanding General.

The Area of the Quarter competition is designed to get the personnel here involved in a friendly competition to foster pride in their work spaces and barracks on the Air Station, as well as cleaning up the base, according to LtCol.

James Plantz, Station Inspector.

"The important thing about our jobs as the Station and Brigade Inspectors, is we are aware of what areas need to be cleaned up; the areas that show the most improvement; and which areas are consistently immaculate and well groomed, since we are out there on a daily basis," said Plantz.

Mowing lawns, pruning trees, removing grass and weeds from hedge lines, policing the immediate and adja-

cent areas, and the overall appearance of the area are a few of the areas that will be rated by a selection committee comprised of members from the both offices.

"I think it is important that no one is overlooked," Plantz said. "Some people have an area that is naturally beautiful with trees and shrubs, while others have concrete and asphalt to work with. Even though a large part of the order speaks of lawns, bushes and grass, it is the overall appearance of the work spaces

and barracks that will be rated and selected."

The selection committee, composed of two officers, two staff noncommissioned officers, and headed by Plantz, discuss and vote on which area is most deserving of the award. The paperwork is then submitted to the 1st MEB Commanding General, Air Station Commanding Officer and the unit's commanding officer, notifying them of the Inspector's decision. The quarterly awards will be presented during the month

following the end of the quarter. The first quarter award will be presented later this month.

"We want the units to maintain a standard of excellence for an extended period of time," said Plantz. "At the present time we are looking at areas for the second quarter award. We hope everyone gets into the spirit of good healthy competition, with the weaker areas improving themselves and the better areas maintaining their high standards."

## Defense Secretary urges servicemembers to buy savings bonds

The Department of the Navy will be conducting its 1988 U.S. Savings Bond Drive until May 1. The campaign is a reminder to servicemembers to review or update their savings program.

Secretary of Defense Frank Carlucci recently addressed the importance of the Savings Bond program:

"The Department of Defense is conducting the 1988 Savings Bond campaign. During the campaign, a savings bonds canvasser will be contacting you to explain the benefits of savings bonds and invite you to increase the amount of your present bond allotment.

"The payroll savings plan for U.S. savings bonds is an easy and convenient method of savings regularly that offers tax advantages and market-based interest rates for small sums of money. When you join the plan, you select an amount to be set aside from each paycheck to buy bonds. The rest is automatic; you save payday after payday without interruption.

Bonds held for five years earn market-based interest. The market-based rate is adjusted every six months. The current rate is 7.17 percent. Bonds held a minimum of five years will not earn less than the current minimum rate in effect at the time of purchase. The current minimum rate is six percent. Interest is exempt from state and local income taxes, and Federal income tax can be deferred until bonds are cashed or they reach maturity.

I urge all military and civilian personnel to take advantage of the savings bonds program. It provides an opportunity to build personal security through convenient and systematic savings with the added advantages of tax breaks and market-based variable interest rates."

# Legally Speaking

April 15 is D-Day! Obviously, the easiest way to avoid penalties is to file a timely return. To be considered on time, your return must have no later than a April 15 postmark. The two post offices on board the Air Station will be open until 4:30 p.m. All returns brought inside these two post offices before 4:30

p.m. will be postmarked April 15.

The drop boxes on board the Air Station are controlled by the Kailua Post Office. If you put your return in a drop box on April 15, make sure it is before the last pick-up time listed on that box. Your return will receive that day's postmark only if picked up on April 15.

For those who really like to

cut it close, the downtown Honolulu post office (at Richards and Merchant Streets) and the main post office (near the airport) will be receiving tax returns until midnight, April 15.

## Extensions

If, despite your best efforts, you have not been able to get your taxes done, do not despair. First, if you, or your

spouse, if you file jointly, are on military duty outside of the United States you can get an automatic extension of two months.

When you eventually file, simply attach a statement explaining why you were entitled to this extension.

All taxpayers, whether in or out of the country, can get an automatic four month extension. All you need to do is file Form 4868 by April 15, 1988.

Once you have filed for the automatic extension, you cannot file on Form 1040EZ or have the IRS compute your tax for you. At the end of the extension, you must file either Form 1040A or Form 1040.

You must pay your tax by April 15 even if you are filing an extension.

To put it in the IRS's words, an extension of time to file is not an extension of time to

pay. Make an estimate of the tax you owe, in addition to what was withheld during the year, and send that amount in with Form 4868.

Err on the safe side when estimating the amount you owe because you will have to pay interest on the underestimated amount. If your estimate of tax liability is off by more than 10 percent, you may have to pay penalties.

## Penalties

If you do not file either a return or an application for extension by April 15, you may be subject to a failure to file penalty. In addition, you may also be penalized for

failing to pay your taxes on time. The penalty is 0.5 percent of your unpaid taxes per month up to a maximum of 25 percent of your unpaid balance.

The Internal Revenue Code also has penalty provisions that let people know that this is no joke and that stupidity is no excuse. You can be penalized for filing a frivolous return and for negligently calculating your tax bill.

Do not let April 15 pass by without having filed either a return or an extension. Contact your VITA representative or the Legal Assistance Office for help with your tax problems.

## Drug/Alcohol Incidents

A civilian was detained for fraudulent use of a DoD decal, open container, trespassing, and possession of marijuana. The man was stopped for a traffic ticket for expires state registration. Several open beer bottles were on the floorboards of the car, and suspected marijuana was seen in the open ashtray. A search of the vehicle revealed a partially burnt marijuana cigarette, a cellophane wrapper with suspected marijuana, and an open bottle of vodka.

A records check found that the man had been permanently barred from the Air Station in 1982. The man told MPs that he gained access to the Air Station with the decal that was on his car when he bought it, and that he was going to North Beach to surf.

A dependent wife was detained for DUI and having an open container after she was stopped for speeding. While initiating the traffic stop, the MP's observed an open bottle of rum. A breath test resulted in a .07% blood alcohol content.

Three Marines, a sergeant and two lance corporals were arrested in Honolulu for disorderly conduct. When the three were asked to leave a nightclub due to their obnoxious behavior and spitting,

one of the lance corporals threw a glass at a window. All three were released on \$25 bail and scheduled to appear in court.

## Miscellaneous

A corporal was the victim of a burglary after someone entered his secured room and stole a cassette player, compact disk player and \$100 from his wallet. While an investigator from the Criminal Investigation Division was questioning residents of the barracks, a lance corporal admitted to taking the items, because, he said, that they did not belong to the corporal. A search of the lance corporal's room recovered the stereo gear, but not the cash.

In addition to these events, of the 24 larcenies reported this week, 3 were solved by the recovery of the missing property. There were 3 DUI/DWI of military personnel reported off station, and 2 incidents of domestic disturbances.

Unit sweep urinalysis testing resulted in two Marines being investigated for marijuana use and one for cocaine use.

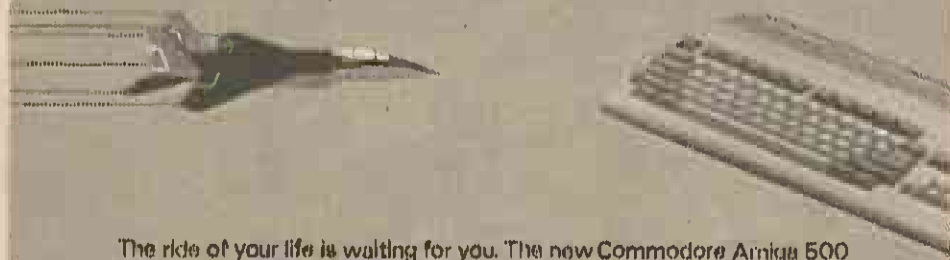

# New legislation will let civilians transfer leave

Fellow workers in need will benefit

The Department of Defense's 2.1 million civilian workers will soon be able to transfer annual leave to fellow workers who find themselves in need.

Although it has not yet been implemented on the Air Station, the program was made possible by a provision in recent legislation.

The government tested the concept on a selective basis last year and has extended this concept to all federal agencies and employees.

A computer analyst at the Army Personnel Information Systems Command in Alexandria, Va. participated.

In this case, a woman with a seriously ill child had used all her leave and borrowed as much as regulations would allow. Her daughter still needed treatment, and she would have had to quit work or take leave without pay at a time when her medical bills were mounting. Her co-workers donated more than 2,500 hours of their leave to her. The leave-sharing program has allowed her to continue with the government and get through a difficult time for her family.

Only annual leave can be donated under the program, with the Office of Personnel Management expected to release guidelines for DoD to implement soon.

"The program will benefit those who are seriously ill or have family members who are

seriously ill," said Martha Hoehn, an Office of Personnel Management official. "In many cases, leave is exhausted well before the illness reaches a final stage. Those employees in this situation who wish to continue in the employ of the government need leave. This program allows co-workers to donate annual leave to the person who needs it."

Under the program, only employees in an emergency situation can participate, said Office of Personnel Management officials.

"This is not a case where someone has just used up their leave and wants to borrow some to go on a vacation," said Hoehn. "Only those in absolute need will be able to participate, and only annual — not sick — leave can be used in the program."

If the employee or family member dies, any leave not used will be "recredited" to the donors' accounts.

The Office of Personnel Management is unsure about how the program will be administered. "We will give the agencies the leeway in determining who is eligible," said Hoehn. "We are working to get regulations to the agencies as fast as we can."

Defense civilian personnel officials will determine how to handle the program when they receive the Office of Personnel Management guidelines.

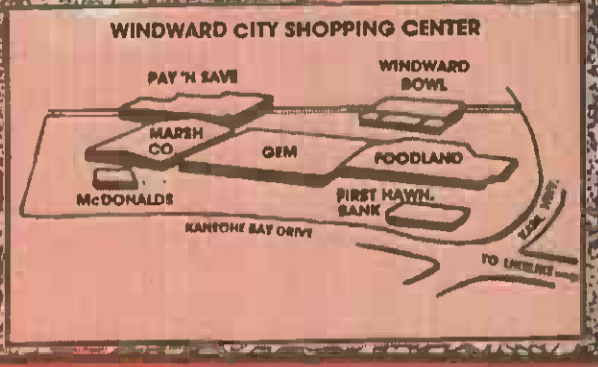

**'Dr. Davis' hoax continues**  
*Obscene calls shrouded behind physician's title*

The fake "Dr. Richard Davis" is making obscene and nuisance phone calls again revolving around a false survey into people's private lives.

The fake "Dr. Davis" is very convincing when talking to his victim and has recently added a new gimmick when challenged by his victim. He uses a female to convince his victim the call is legitimate. "Dr. Davis" has been successful in persuading women to answer many personal questions before they realize that the call is fake as he starts asking more obscene questions. The questions that he poses are not normally the type asked over the phone.

There are certain things that people can do if they receive a call from "Dr. Davis", or any obscene or nuisance phone call.

In most cases, the caller is seeking an emotional reaction from the victim. By denying him this response, you

might deter him from calling back.

- If you receive such a call, don't say anything—just hang the phone up gently.
- Try not to show any emotion that might prompt him to call back.
- Make a log of the exact time and date that you receive obscene or nuisance calls.
- Don't list your wife's first name in the phone book; use initials if you like. A woman's name may attract unwanted attention and the caller can use her name during his obscene call, adding to the emotional trauma.
- Never volunteer information to a person that you don't know on the phone, such as "my husband is out of town for a few weeks."
- Never give your name, number or address to a stranger, either over the phone or otherwise.
- Most important is to report the call immediately to the Military Police or, if you live off base, the Honolulu Police.

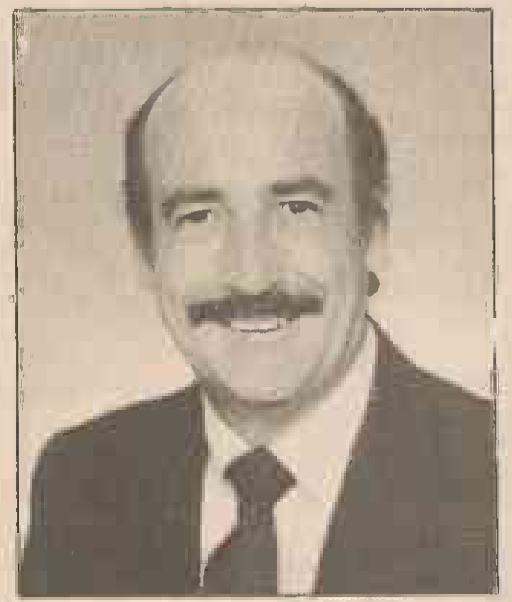

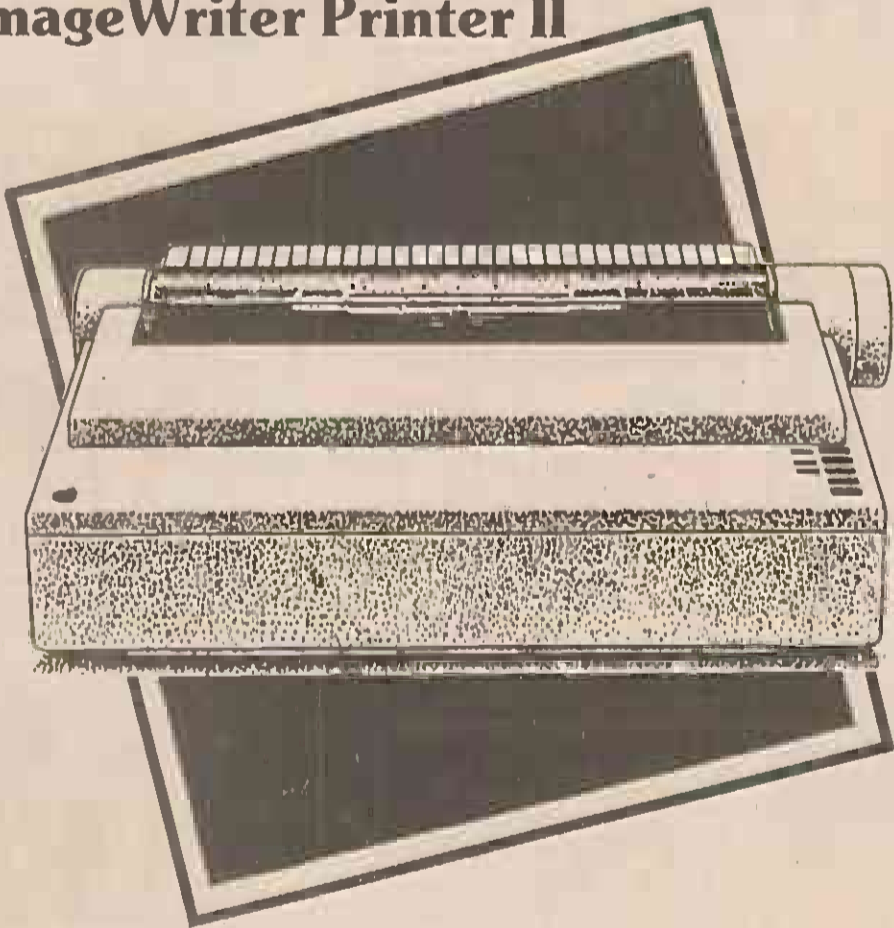

# Urban Warfare K Co. assaults ROK Marine combat town

POHANG, Korea—With the chatter of small arms fire and hoarse shouts from fire team leaders echoing off concrete walls, small groups of Marines rushed from building to building, engaging an elusive enemy for control of the streets.

The mock combat was all part of 3d Bn., 3d Marines' recent participation in exercise Team Spirit '88 in the Republic of Korea.

While there, a squad of Marines from Co. K, 3/3 took advantage of the presence of a combat town on the 1st ROK Marine Division base in Pohang to get some realistic training in urban warfare.

The town, consisting of 14 one- and two-story buildings arranged along either side of a dirt road, required exceptional teamwork and almost con-

stant communication from the Marines involved, according to squad leader Sgt. Norman LeGault.

"Making this kind of assault, I have to rely on my fire team leaders and they have to communicate with each other because I lose sight of my men in the different buildings," said LeGault.

"This is good training for them though, since it requires more individual action and

thinking on their parts," he added.

One drawback to this particular combat town was the fact that only two of the buildings had four walls. "These aren't full buildings, so it isn't realistic to the extent that the Marines can just enter or exit through the back where a wall would normally be, instead of trying to make their way through a door or window," said LeGault. "Still, this is a

type of training we don't get to do too often," he added.

Other training that 3/3 Marines conducted while in Korea included a live fire and maneuver course, an infiltration course, the Mountain Warfare Training School, and a lot of long humps in freezing cold and rain.

"This is all a big change from Hawaii, but it's all good training," said LeGault.

# UDP Marines link with 1st MEB at Team Spirit '88

POHANG, Korea—Two units from 1st MEB, currently assigned to Okinawa-based units under the Unit Deployment Program, temporarily returned to their parent unit to take part in exercise Team Spirit '88.

The two units, HMM-364 (Composite) and 1st Bn., 3d Marines, were returned to form part of the air and ground combat elements for the 1st MEB in its Maritime Prepositioning Force role during the exercise.

The "Purple Foxes" of HMM-364, along with a detachment from HMH-463, formed a composite squadron that provided support to both U.S. Marine and Republic of Korea forces, according to Maj. D. T. Shoemaker, the squadron operations officer.

Known as "the pineapple guys" to some of their MAG-36 counterparts, the squadron performed a number of missions, including reconnaissance, resupply, reconnaissance insertions, and troop movements, as well as extensive boat operations with the amphibious transport fleet supporting the beach assault phase of the exercise.

Being back with the MEB meant the pilots got to do what they're used to — supporting Kaneohe Marines. "We've been doing a lot of short hops moving troops," said 1stLt. John Pioli, a pilot from '364. "It might only be a 2,000 meter walk for these guys, but we'd rather pick them up. They've been out

there a long time, so they're glad to see us."

The "groundpounders" of 1/3, who also temporarily rejoined 1st MEB for this exercise, took up their accustomed role as part of the ground combat element for the Hawaii brigade.

Operating to the north of the city of Pohang, 1/3, along with a company of tanks from 1st Tank Bn. from Camp Pendleton, dug into defensive positions, covering one of the avenues of approach to the city. Meanwhile, Co. C was cross-attached to 1st Tanks to

act as a mechanized infantry team, according to Maj. E.J. Hagan, S-3 for 3rd Marines.

Their responsibility during this operation, along with the rest of 3rd Marines, was to defend the port and city of Pohang prior to D-Day. Both units were to remain in Korea for the duration of Team Spirit, then return to Okinawa to finish their six-month deployment before returning to the sunshine of Hawaii — a welcome change from some of the miserable weather they encountered during "Team Spirit '88."

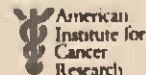

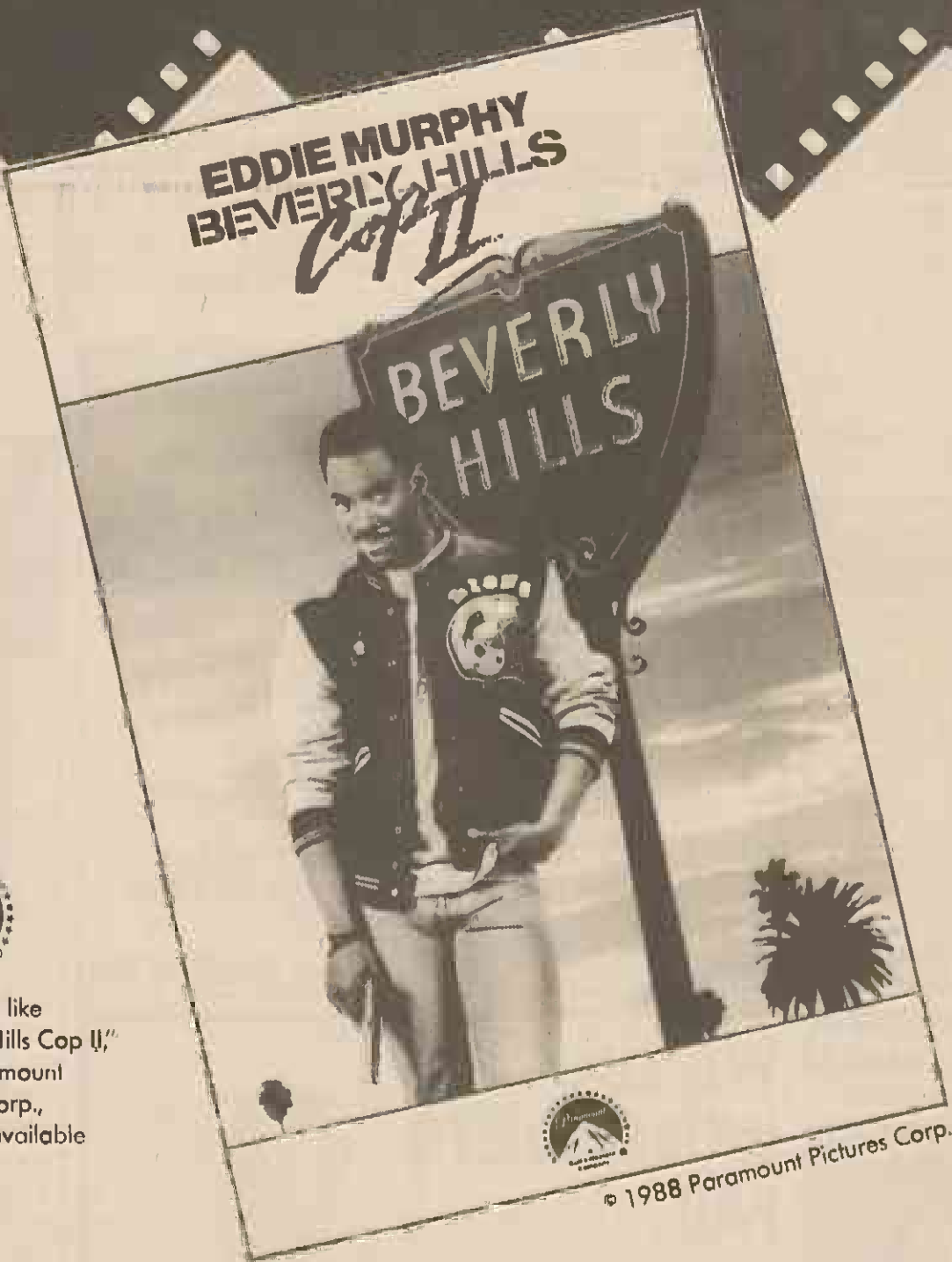

# Marine Corps sports program to expand

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C.— The Marine Corps Sports Program is developing to allow the growth of four new sports.

Field Hockey, lacrosse, rugby and team handball will be introduced to the program, adding what Col. Peter Angle, director of the morale support division, HQMC, says are active, fast-moving team sports that anyone can play and

enjoy the first time out.

Rugby has become popular at many Marine Corps bases and is now scheduled as an intramural sport with Regional and All-Marine competition by popular demand.

Field Hockey and lacrosse are being introduced to get more people involved in outdoor intramural sports, says Maj. Robert Wolf, sports section, HQMC. Both games are alternative choices for Marines uninterested in the more

widely played basketball and football.

As an alternative to basketball, team handball combines basketball and soccer, though it has very little in common with court handball. Since team handball can be played on an indoor basketball court, it's an ideal sport for all seasons and can easily be used for unit physical training.

"Team handball and field hockey will be introduced to the east coast during May,"

said Col. Angle. The introduction will continue later on the west coast and in the Western Pacific.

Once a sport is introduced in an area, it's up to the individual Marine to express an interest in the sport. "Athletic directors can offer, but Marines must show an interest," said Maj. Wolf. "The beauty of the Marine Corps Programs is that commanders or their designated representatives have the freedom to tailor their

sports program to the preferences and needs of the Marines stationed at that particular base."

The Marine Corps sports program is organized on seven different levels. The most widely used is the self directed level, where Marines use fitness centers, running tracks, cross country courses and other services as individuals or as part of a unit. Most publicized is the intramural program, with teams within an organization competing against each other in a wide variety of sporting events.

can advance through the Regional, All-Marine, and Armed Forces level, to national and international competition."

The result of a strong sports program, said Col. Angle, is to enhance combat readiness and provide emotional release from stress. He explained that the main emphasis of a sports program is on the unit level, where troops can develop leadership, team spirit and moral character through sports.

Major Wolf said it bluntly, "Competitiveness at all levels is a controlled state of aggression. This controlled aggression is what it takes to make the first strike. Technical training, whether sports or MOS related, gives the skill, but competition hones the edge."

Less than one percent of all Marines participate in more advanced levels of competition, said Maj. Wolf. But Marines with talent, who have an interest in competing,

**DRUNK DRIVING CONVICTION REVERSED!**

**Panel invalidates drunk driving test**

By Ken Kobayashi

The Hawaii Intermediate Court of Appeals yesterday threw out the results of a blood alcohol test in a Maui case and reversed a drunk driving conviction.

But attorney Jim Richards, who specializes in drunk driving cases, said the appeal court's decision "confirms" Law's handling in her case.

The court held that when a "team administrator" used as one of the technicians did not constitute a valid test.

Richards estimated that 11 Law's ruling is upheld by a Hawaii Supreme Court decision that binds all judges, more than 2,000 cases will be affected because judges still have not changed their procedures in interpreting the Intoximeter machine.

A recent decision by the Hawaii Intermediate Court of Appeals indicates that the police may NOT use BREATH TESTS as evidence. 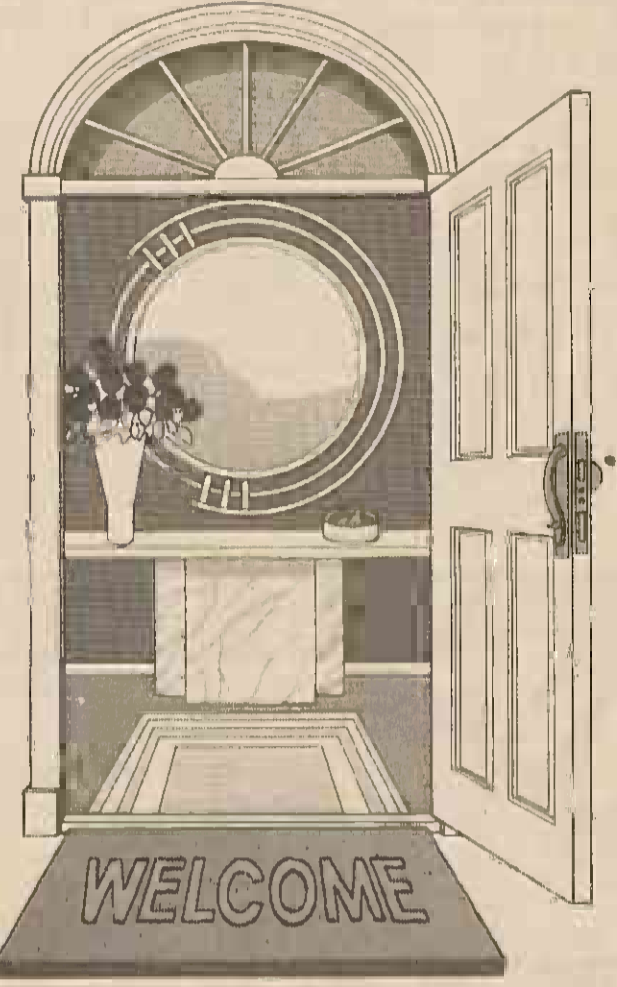

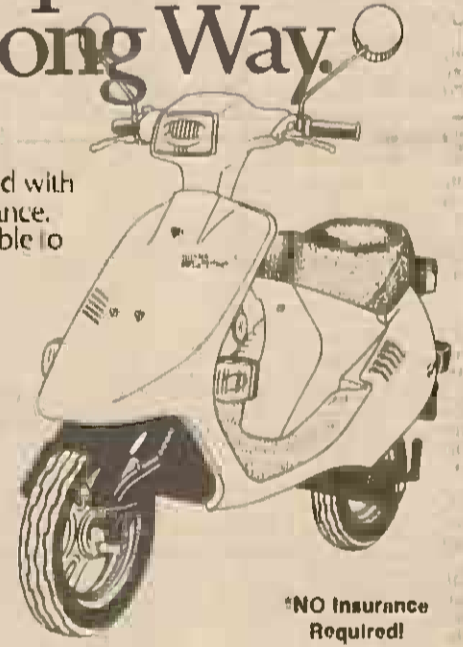
