MarForPac commander, several Hawaii Marines prepare for deployment

The leader of all Marine forces deploying to the Persian Gulf says it's full speed ahead for the plan to counter the current Iraqi threat along the Kuwait Border. The plan includes deployment of up to 300 Hawaii-based Marines, and 18,000 more from I Marine Expeditionary Force from Camp Pendleton, Calif.

LtGen. Charles Krulak, the Marine component commander for the Commander in Chief, U.S. Central Command (USCINCCENT), will command all Marine forces in U.S. Central Command's area of responsibility.

"The mission at hand is to deter that aggression takes place, the Arabia, as well. mission is to close with and destroy "The off-load (the enemy). Whether or not we're forced to go into the destruction phase is really dependent on whether we're successful in the de-terrence phase."

At this point, the planned deployment will not be affected by the Iraqi pullback from the Kuwaiti border region, and according to LtGen. Krulak, it will not change any of the planning processes for

deployment.

'You have to perceive that the deployment is going fully forward. There is absolutely no change in our (the Marine Corps) preparation to support CinCCent's current operational plan," said the MarForPac commander. "We are watching, as everyone is, but as far as backing off even a little, we are not backing off. We will continue preparations not only military-wise, but also on the personal preparation side, with the preparation of wills and powers-of-attorney as well as ensuring the Marines' families are taken care of.'

MWR moving forward with changes, improvements

As Marine Corps Base Hawaii changes, so do the Morale, Welfare and Recreation activities that support Marines, sailors and their families. Many new things are being planned for the near future, to include upgrades and new facilities at MCB Hawaii.

'We have a number of different projects in the works," said Walter H. Skierkowski, the director of the MWR department.

One of the improvements planned for MWR is the addition of a new furniture outlet which will be located next to the base theater.

"The furniture outlet is like a show room," said Skierkowski. "What we are trying to do is make it very convenient for the customers."

The furniture show room will display the new furniture that is currently in the exchange, plus it will be adding more items and different brands.

"We have a construction team coming out to start on the design," Skierkowski said. Ground breaking is scheduled for May 1995 and completion approximately one year later

"We have asked for additional outlets in there. This would co-locate things like a barber shop, beauty shop, and optical shop in the Exchange/Commissary Complex,'

MWR circulated surveys throughout the base to identify the needs of its customers. At the top of the list, patrons asked for a new fitness center and more beach cottages. In response to the survey, the command is submitting a request to build a new 12,000 square ft. fitness center adjacent to the Main Gym.

"We just got approval to build another duplex beach cottage," said Skierkowski. "Our beach cottages are very popular with young Ma-

rines and sailors. "That will give us an inventory of 14 beach cottages."

In addition to a full range of intramural sports, MWR supports team activities like the varsity baseball team.

"The athletic program is expanding; we are looking into eight-man tackle football," said Skierkowski. "There are start up costs for any activity but if the command supports the program it will be added.

"One of the big innovations this year is the Commanders' Fitness Series, and Commanding General's Cup series for all team sports," he said.

(Editor's Note: October is **Domestic Violence Prevention** Month. This the second of a three-part series on domestic violence issues.)

In the past several years, society's understanding of spouse and child abuse has steadily increased. One kind of domestic violence continues to be overlooked.

It is the harm caused to children who witness spouse abuse. This witness may have physical scars; he or she is left with emotional and psychological wounds that no band-aid can cover up.

Although research has only begun to examine the relative effects of children witnessing parental violence, it appears that children who are both physically abused and witness abuse experience the most profound adverse effects. Children who only witness violence, though, manifest similar behavioral and emotional after-effects, according to the Journal of Family Violence.

Studies show that witnessing spouse abuse may cause children to suffer from low self esteem, depression, fear and anxiety, according to the Department of Defense Office of Family Policy Support and Services.

Child witnesses also display a variety of acting out behaviors.

"One time a school-aged child told me that it was her fault that her daddy hit her mommy. insisted in telling her that it wasn't. She continued to say it was her fault," explained Chris Powell, New Parent Support Program, Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Kaneohe Bay.

Powell explained how the young child then proceeded to act out the abuse she had witnessed.

"First she got on the floor and pretended as if she was being abused. Then she got up and pretended as if she was the abuser," Powell added.

"Children are egocentric and because they feel as if everything around revolves them, See Children A-9,

First female close combat instructor

SSgt. Kim L. Cross, Co. B, 9th Communications Bn., created another first for the Marine Corps recently by becoming the first woman to successfully complete a five-day close combat instructor course at the Marine Combat Training School, School of Infantry.

When Cross' unit called to find out information about seats available for the course, they were told to send a physically fit Marine. Cross was the obvious choice. On the first day of class, a female staff noncommissioned officer reported.

"I was so surprised, I didn't know exactly how to tell her how tough it really was," said SSgt. Kurt Grinstead, staff noncommissioned



1 U.S. returns to the Gulf

U.S. troops continue to buildup in the Persian Gulf in response to the massing of Iraqi troops on the border of Kuwait. The U.S. is sending 364 more fighter planes to the Gulf Region adding to the 200 already there.

The additional air power announced Monday includes a squadron of B-52 heavy bombers, a squadron of F-117 stealth fighter-bombers, plus additional AWACs surveillance planes and A-10s.


The latest additions will bring the number of U.S. aircraft in the region - including Navy warplanes on the aircraft carrier USS George Washington in the Red Sea - to 661.

In addition to the 36.145 U.S. ground troops already being sent to the Persian Gulf area, Gen. John Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, disclosed that another 113.000 soldiers and 42.000 Marines would be placed on alert for possible deployment to the area.

White House officials cited the possibility of pre-emptive air strikes day that Iraqi troops were already if Iraq refuses to move its troops. Another possibility was seeking a new U.N. resolution limiting the number of troops that Iraq could place on the Kuwait border. Existing resolutions prohibit Iraq from sending aircraft into its southern regions, but not troops.

Tuesday, Iraq began withdrawing some of its forces from the Kuwaiti border, but the Pentagon placed another 155,000 U.S. ground troops on alert in case additional forces are needed to meet the Iraqi threat.

Following signs of movement by most of the 80,000 Iraqi troops in the border area, with many units loading their equipment onto rail cars, President Clinton expressed guarded optimism that Iraq was backing down from a possible military confrontation.

Reacting to intense U.S. pressure Cedras submitted his resignation just two days short of the formal end of his three-year term as Haiti's military chief and five days before the expected return of President Jean-Bertrand Aristide who was forced from office Sept. 30, 1991.

From the front veranda of the military headquarters and flanked by a demoralized Haitian military, Cedras was drowned out as an emotionally-charged crowd shouted and sang curses in disapproval when he appeared under the watchful escort of U.S. commander Lt.Gen. Hugh Shelton.

When Cedras departed the humiliating scene, Haitians hurled stones at his Jeep. In response to the aggression from the crowd, Cedras bodyguards opened fire, sending two bursts of automatic gunfire into the air. Hundreds of Haitians and a few reporters dived for cover, everyone escaping injury.

Accompanying the military commander in his loss of power was BGen. Philippe Biamby, the army chief of staff. Biamby, who had told friends he would die before quitting, resigned to Cedras Oct. 8 and then disappeared

Cedras has indicated he will leave Haiti, but has not yet set a time for his departure or his destination.

Following Cedras' departure from the headquarters, U.S. troops occupied Haiti's National Palace, preparing the country's center of power for the expected return of exiled President Jean-Bertrand Aristide on Saturday.

Prior to Sept. 26, 1992, any repairs be-yond the intermediate level would normally be shipped to Barstow, Calif., or Albany, Ga. The innovative program has not only saved the Marine Corps money but also a lengthy turn-around time because of Hawaii's location. Using previous procedures, shipping equipment could take as long as six months to arrive, repair and return.

> One of the more routine tasks performed by Maint. Co. is corro-sion control. However, corrosion control maintenance plays a large role in reducing government cost.

It fights a never-ending battle against the effects of Hawaii's salt air. For example, spending only a few dollars to patch and paint a rusted area on the hood of a HMMWV, saves a replacement cost of \$389.

"Since this in-house repair pro-gram began, we've saved the Marine Corps more than \$4.5 million and serviced more than 767 pieces of equipment, 731 of which have been returned to their respective units," said Cpl. Peter Burgett, lead body and repairman, and one of only three on hand who are critical to a successful corrosion control pro-



their parent being abused often feel they must intervene. They may in turn get hurt while trying to protect their parent.

When domestic violence is present in the home, another form of abuse may also be present ... neglect.

When the mother is being abused, she may have a low degree of empathy towards her children. Being battered may make her less of a good parent," explained Powell.

The abused mother usually has very little to give her children emotionally; therefore the child may suffer from emotional

neglect. "Because the parents are more caught up with themselves, the child is paid little to no attention, and provided with fewer resources. The kids end up falling through the cracks," Powell said.

Additionally, mothers who are battered may be more likely to physically abuse their children than are non-battered women, according to a survey of 100 wife battering cases conducted in 1975.

In order to prevent this cycle from happening, society needs to

be aware of the emotional effects : and distress child witnesses may incur.

Many people fear that reporting or admitting child abuse will destroy a family. In reality, facts show that getting help not only protects the children from further damage but it also helps families face their problems and return to being healthy and functioning.



Listen for the roar of thunder coming soon as America's fastest jet-powered hydroplanes return to the historic waters of Pearl Harbor for the fifth annual Outrigger Hotels Hydrofest, Saturday and Sunday.

Hawaii's largest hotel chain, Outrigger Hotels Hawaii, will again join the U.S. Navy to sponsor the state's biggest water sports event. This year, in addition to the thrill of the hydroplanes' 200-mile-an-hour speeds, race enthusiasts will appreciate the decision by the co-sponsors to open Hydrofest '94 to the general public free of charge.

"This event conveys the strong ties between the military and civilian communities in Hawaii,' said Capt. Kraig M. Kennedy, commanding officer, Naval Station Pearl Harbor. "We want to give everyone a chance to experience the excitement of world-class racing without having to wor purchasing tickets." worry about

The Hydrofest is sanctioned by Unlimited Racing the Commission (URC), member of the American Power Boat Association (APBA), and features

two days of racing by unlimited class hydroplane boats. These state-of-the-art hydroplanes are powered by jet turbine engines capable of speeds nearing 200 miles per hour.

Nationally, the hydroplane series consists of eight races spanning the continental U.S. and finishes with the championship race in Hawaii. The various races carry purses of more than \$150,000 each.

This year, all event-related activities and spectator viewing areas will be concentrated on Ford Island. Free ferry boat transportation to Ford Island from both the Pearl City Peninsula and the Arizona Memorial ferry landing will be available continuously throughout the Hydrofest weekend. Spectators will be allowed to tour the unlimited hydroplane "hot pits" and watch drivers and crews fine-tune their boats. Fans will enjoy prime viewing and grandstand seating next to the start tower. features continuous live entertainment on the main stage and a host of exciting activities and attractions to enjoy between race heats. Adding to the excitement is the "HydroJam" featuring contemporary



"This is long overdue," said CWO-4 Bill Stimax, S-3 Officer, Head-quarters and Service Battalion, Marine Forces Pacific. "These problems have been germane to the Ma-rine Corps and the general popula-tion for some time."

According to Stimax, who is also the battalion Semper Fit liaison officer and coordinator, information related to the eight objectives will be passed to Marines in classroom meetings much like professional military education instruction. Attendance will be mandatory for all active duty Marines. "Our target audience includes the choices."

preventive program called Semper cal problems, and curbing medical active duty Marines, their spouses, civilian workers and retired mili-tary," Stimax said. "Obviously, we can require the Marines to attend the classes but for the others it will be voluntary."

"For each objective, we will have medical experts give the instruction and answer questions," he said. "For example, November has the Great American Smokeout, so that's when we plan to give our tobacco cessation training."

Semper Fit has a number of goals planned for each of the eight objectives, with the year 2000 as a target date. This includes 100 percent education on health subjects and preventive measures, which, according to Stimax, will ensure Marines are at least informed and can make the proper choices.

"Soon, Marines will have much more information available about how to get and stay healthy," he said. "They won't be able to say they didn't know the consequences of some of their unhealthy lifestyle
