What I flowered around Christmas 2019 By Alan Pleitner.

Most of November and all of December and January is that period when there are no shows or club meetings so what orchids have I and my visitors enjoyed during this time? I am writing this near the end of January when the temperature is up and the smoke haze is a real problem.

The challenge at this time of the year has been to keep the moisture up to them with the very hot summer we are starting to have. On the 43-45 degree days I have been spraying or dipping them up to four or five times a day. The Sarcochilus have been very good, with four of my *S. hillii* still flowering beautifully. They may not be very big but gee they really are beautiful, and they just keep on coming one after the other down the raceme. I have couple of *S. ceciliae* seedlings which John Stubbs bred and gave me. One of these flowered for the first time last year and now the other one is following suit. The flower is a beautiful pale pink so John will be very pleased when I tell him.

Of course, the Cymbidiums have all done very nicely except the *C. madidums* which suffered badly in the prolonged heat early in 2018 but I had eight *C. suave* flowered beautifully (one had fourteen racemes each with about 40 flowers) with the last one finishing just before the New Year. I had several plants of *C. canaliculatum* flowering (over 40) until just before Christmas and I have a couple of hybrids coming to the end of their time. The trick with these now is to keep up the right amount of water to keep them going and not too much to cook the roots.

I had a good showing from the Bulbophyllums which I have on hardwood mounts. The little piece of *B bowkettii* which I was given four or so years ago is now starting to make reasonable growth and flowered nicely while *B. sladeanum* didn't have as many flowers as last year the plant is still increasing in size and the flowers were borne on pedicels (spikes) mostly around 4 centimetres in length which is very good for my environment. *B. elisae* has been flowering for about four weeks now which is quite a bit later than the ones which had finished back in November. Just the same the two racemes bearing ten green flowers each with their dark reddish purple labellum are quite striking. This very recognisable orchid has the colloquially very appropriate descriptive name of pineapple orchid.

I have a number of plants of *Plectorrhiza tridentata* (tangle root orchid) in my collection and a number of them had been flowering since September and two late performers are flowering now and their perfume is very noticeable when the breeze stops. I also have two *Vanda falcata* and one of these produced four beautiful flowers. This lovely Japanese/east Asian native is most unusual with the spur on the rear of its perfumed white flowers.

I was given a tiny piece of *Mobilabium hamatum* about three years ago with the challenge to see if I could grow it. Well I have it mounted on a piece of hardwood and it had two little yellowish flowers so I was quite pleased

with it seeing as how it is endemic to the rainforests of north Queensland.



Finally, the Dendrobiums provided me with some variation. *D. linguiforme* surprised me with two bunches of flowers in the beginning of December and these lasted about three weeks. All the other of that species which I have had finished flowering early in November. *Dendrobium trilamellatum* flowered right through to just before Christmas. The pleasant perfume of the flowers remained until I removed the last of them. *D. cucumerinum* (the cucumber orchid) produced its usual beautifully perfumed bunches of flowers but these only lasted a few days when a heat blast got them. *D. hercoglossum* again produced a good number of pink flowers with the striking white labellum. Last year I transferred my *D. prenticeii* from a tree fern slab to a piece of hardwood fence paling and while it is taking a while to attach itself it appears to be quite happy as it has produced two creamy yellow flowers each with the very noticeable orange labellum and has started to produce a couple of new growths.

A number of the orchids which I have flowered at this time would be available at shows in the region and in Melbourne. The Warringal Orchid Society Show has a very big sales area which generally has a wide variety of genera. It's also easy to get to from the Hume Freeway to the Metropolitan Ring Road and to North Greensborough. Their spring show has a very large range of orchids on display and for sale and is well worth while going to see.

You can see even though there were no shows or club meetings I still had a good number of orchids to delight me and my visitors over the holidays. I will look at telling you a bit more about them in the future newsletters if the editor will allow me. In the meantime, keep your eyes open as you might see some of the orchids I have mentioned on the bench at shows or club meetings, because if I can get them to flower in our climate, you know you can too. Some of their flowers may only be tiny but gee, they make a great display.





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
