ABOUT ME

My name is Caillum and I'm an 18-year old from the beautiful county of Limerick. From a young age, I have been a passionate advocate for what is right. Whether it be climate justice or sustainable development, student's rights or youth involvement, I have spent the past number of years ensuring the voice of young people is at the forefront of debate and decision making.

I am a sixth year student in John the Baptist Community School, in Limerick, where I sit as President of our Student Council and work with students and staff across the school to ensure student's issues are addressed.

One area that I never planned to become a part of my advocacy journey, which evidently did, was the ever-so important topic of mental health. At the beginning of the first lockdown, I noticed our collective struggle with that overwhelming feeling of worry as we passed the first two weeks of restrictions. I started a conversation series called 'Shur I'm grand' to address the questions fellow young people had surrounding their mental health. The series ran for seven episodes, with seven incredible and well-known guests, with over seventeen thousand views across the series. I was later awarded an individual Garda Youth Award for the impact this series had. This series was where I witnessed the power of normal conversations through accessible platforms, an element of my life I hope to carry into my Presidency.

PAST EXPERIENCE

To be a successful President, you need relevant experience and the proven ability to represent those that elect you. I believe I would bring this, along with a proven track-record of sustained advocacy for students and young people. I have also worked on governance structures on a national and global level, especially young people's engagement in organisations, which I believe would be invaluable in the role of President.

At the age of seven, I joined the scouts where I developed a passion for leadership along with the importance of protecting and appreciating our environment.

Through the years, I have been an advocate on a local, national and international level for sustainable development.

In early 2020, I was appointed an external representative of the World Scout Movement, where I lobby European policymakers and institutions to address issues facing young people.

Last Summer, I was elected the youngest-ever public representative to a Local Council, where I now advise Limerick Council on Strategic Policy regarding climate action, biodiversity and the environment.

Throughout the Leaving Cert 2021 debate, I was an outspoken voice for students, hosting live conversations with key politicians and debating across radio, TV and other media outlets. With a group of fellow students, I now host 'The Student Perspective' Podcast, where our goal is to provide a space for students to debate issues facing them with the tagline, 'if you're prepared to educate a voice, you must be prepared to listen to it'. I am also a panelist on Spin South West and Spin 1038's radio show 'Spin Ar Scoil', where I share my opinion on Leaving Cert related debate.

Within the ISSU, I held a seat on the Department of Education's Advisory Group on Education for Sustainable Development, where, alongside the Sustainability Officer, we advised and developed national policy to support students to learn the value of active citizenship.

I am also a member of the Youth Engagement Strategy team of World Scouting, where we work on global policy to ensure young people's voices are heard in decision making bodies.

MY PLANS

I would like to create a more ambitious, bigger and connected Union. Our values reflect the importance of uplifting all student voices, but I believe we only uplift a small minority of voices.

To be ambitious, we need to be proactive, not reactive. Education should never be politicised, but it has been, so we should utilise that. As a non party affiliate, I would ensure we work with all political parties and bodies to address student issues in the most pragmatic manner. We need a commitment to Senior Cycle Reform, alongside other issues, and I believe with my experience, I am the most suitable candidate to do so.

To build a bigger Union, the rhetoric of membership growth will not solve it, it is about broadening who we represent. We need to formally represent students with SEN, students living in Direct Provision and from a socio-economic disadvantaged background. We have the opportunity to not only address issues for students on the ground, but solve them on an international level, through structures such as OBESSU and the European Youth Forum, bringing a pan-European approach to solving the issues of Irish students.

The most important element of change is a collective voice, which we can achieve through reforming our current structure. After observing the structure at work for the past year, I have several ideas which would ensure every issue is addressed, giving everyone from member schools to NSE officers the opportunity to work on said issues. That is just one step. We need to give Regional Officer's more scope in their role, taking on a leading role in their region to ensure every student is heard. This will be done through my commitment to monthly consultations in every region.

ABOUT ME

My name is Adam Lambe, I'm a 6th year student in Monaghan and I am running to be your president. I have been involved in the ISSU for almost two years now and it has been the most rewarding thing I have ever been involved in. This organisation has allowed me to grow immensely as a person by giving me the resources to help those within my region; Cavan and Monaghan. The aspect of this organisation that I love the most is how it is completely student led. I think this is the most inspiring part of our union, the fact that this is open to all students to get involved in. However, I am more than aware of how difficult it can sometimes be to get involved in, and this is something I will definitely work on as president.

I had never heard of the ISSU before getting involved with it. This is a massive problem for the Union as although we have over 500 member schools, I am sure that the most of the students in these schools have never heard of the ISSU, with better events and increased focus on opening up the union we can boost our engagement!

I am running for president not because I want any publicity or power but because I want to work to make a change for the better and give back to this union in the way of good leadership! The idea that student voice should be at the centre of education and should inform the way in which we learn is a no-brainer, yet there is still a long way to go until we can say that student voice leads our education.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I have gotten involved in many organisations fighting to bring youth voice into the centre of the discussion. My ambition and dedication to education reform has brought me to OBESSU which is the European umbrella organisation over the ISSU. In this organisation, my role as a trainer is to deliver workshops and webinars to students all across europe on how to run and grow student unions, this means I have a mature knowledge of the core principles of good leadership!

On top of this I have given all of my free time volunteering for causes I believe in such as ending direct provision, fighting for climate justice and lobbying for rural mental health supports.

As a member of the Spunout National Action Panel, I am always looking at creative ways we can provide youth information, tying in very closely with the education system. No matter what organisation I have worked with over the past couple of years, the ISSU has always been my central focus. I have consistently enjoyed doing ISSU work and as a friend pointed out, whether happy, sad, stressed, busy or bored, I would always be talking about my students union.

My experience within the ISSU is something that will be most beneficial during my presidency. Through my two terms as regional officer I have had the opportunity not only to start my own initiatives to make student life better in Cavan and Monaghan but I've also been able to contribute at a national level. I have happily devoted so much of my time working on many projects in the ISSU. I wrote up many articles of our fundamental governing document the constitution during both of our constitutional reviews, I wrote into our constitution the role of the regional officer and changed many structures within the union.

MY PLANS

During my presidency I will move the needle for student representation in our education system, I have three main goals; to Reform, Unify and Engage. It's clear that the education system has needed substantial change for years, recently the ISSU has begun to quantify the changes needed with the Senior Cycle Reform Report of which I contributed to. I will work tirelessly for changes to our assessment model and our senior cycle curriculum with special attention to mental health alongside relationship and sex education. One immediate item that needs to be on the agenda is ensuring a fair standardisation model for this years leaving certs, it's our future on the line.

Our union also needs some reforms of its own, I've made huge progress in pushing for an expansion of the regional officer body within the union. I have successfully passed Article 11 of the constitution where I gave the regional officers many important rights and responsibilities. I also wrote the regional officer guide which is a handbook for all of our officers on how to be effective in their roles. I will continue this work of restructuring our decision making to make us more democratic by investing in our grassroots! This also includes boosting our engagement by creating spaces where any and all students can contribute to our work and give us feedback, this opening up of the union needs to be a priority!

Some of the things that set me apart are my experience, my passion and my commitment to you. I am dedicated to this union and all the students we represent, this is why I have decided upon taking a Gap Year. I want to work full time to make sure you are spoken up for with a loud and passionate voice.



MY PLANS

To try and put what I'd like to achieve for second-level students in under 300 words is a difficult task, to put it shortly, I want to unite them.

Over the last year, students have been divided and it's time we had a union that represents ALL students, not just some students.


I want to make Leaving Cert Reform and the Leaving Cert 2022 priorities of the union, to ensure that we begin reforming the flawed system that is the leaving certificate and to also ensure that the class of 2022 do not undergo the stress and uncertainty faced by the classes of 2020 and 2021.

I want to create a helpline specifically for second-level students who are victims of Image-Based Sexual Assault and who are too often forgotten when discussing this topic.

I want to ensure the Regional Officer Body is used to their highest ability to improve the grassroots of the union because without them we would be nothing.

Most importantly, I want to create an ISSU for YOU. I want to work with you to build a union EVERY student knows about and has full access to, this is to ensure that we accurately represent second-level students across the country.

For far too long the union has been closed off to only those who were active, I want to change this, to ensure that the ISSU is what it says it is, a representative body for second-level students.

A union for you:

Sturdy and tangible policies need to be implemented in order to ensure our union is a union. We need to get union status, a difficult task is given that we are completely student-led; however, a letter from the Department of Education and Skills would be just as effective.

Student Empowerment:

Every elected officer should receive training in the following areas: advocacy and dealing with decision-makers, leadership, teamwork, policy writing, interacting with media. However, we need to extend this training to our membership.

Effective Engagement:

We need to effectively engage with our grassroots, our ROB, our ISSU School Reps and most importantly our membership.

The Presidential Vote:

A president should work to unite the NSE they lead. Therefore, I believe that a president should only vote in the event of being a tie-breaker vote and should remain neutral in all other votes.

Leaving Cert Reform:

Following the launch of our Report on the Senior Cycle and Senior Cycle reform, the union needs to be focused on working with the Department and relevant stakeholders to ensure that reform is at the top of the educational agenda.

Transition to a Post-Covid Era:

As we emerge from an incredibly stressful and uncertain time for students, the ISSU needs to be strong and organised with clear goals and aspirations in mind.

Gaeilge, Culture and Language:

As the representative body of English-medium and Irish-medium schools, we need to continue our transition to a bilingual union.

Image-Based Sexual Assault:

We need to protect survivors of IBSA. Let's link with organisations such as CEARTAS, Text 50808 and End IBSA Ireland to create a helpline specifically for second-level students.




Some Issues/Campaigns I Want to Work On



Thanks to this realization I grew confident and proud of who I was but decided to change I knew something was wrong but the problem was finding out what and what I wanted to do. Luckily I matured and started developing and improving. I became more confident and interested in helping people. This change is why I'm here today even considering a role like this. I feel guilty for not doing more up to now and now that I have this opportunity to really make some change and make up for those years I've wasted I have to do my best to take it. I don't want to be just someone who grew up like everyone else I want to make a mark and I feel that this position is my best way of doing so.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I've tried to get involved in as much as I can. I play a lot of sport which has provided me with passion, drive and responsibility but at the same time has also taught me humility and the feeling of losing. ABOUT ME

My name is Matthew Ryan and I'm a 6th-year student from Cork re-running to be your Welfare Officer of 2021-22!

I have had a passion for the advocacy of student welfare for a number of years now. I began by working on a local level and in my own school. I organised and undertook projects such as the "Amber Flag" initiative, organising Metal Health week, working with my Board of Directors to create up to date student welfare policies.

I believe welfare is more than just an in-school, education issue. Welfare is about students lives and the quality to which they can live them. School is an already immensely confusing and stressful time for young people. We need a system that gives us more than just academic knowledge. We need a comprehensive and inclusive Relationship and Sexuality Education that gives students the necessary tools to discover their own sexual identities. We need a holistic and diverse approach to physical education instead of just telling us students that we can only play one or two different sports in a year.

We also need to reform our mental health support systems in schools, in particular our referral system. Students need to be taught how to handle the stress and pressure that comes with secondary school. Our education system should help students build a strong mentality and then help them maintain it. We also need proper care and help when we struggle with our mental health. Students should not be placed on month long waiting lists before they can see a psychologist.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I have lots of experience and values that I could bring to this program.

I was elected to the ISSU NSE as Welfare Officer at the 2020 Annual Assembly. Since then, I've worked on many projects. I set up a Period Poverty Working Group near the start of my term. This group has worked throughout the year to help lobby for the provision of free period products in schools around Ireland. They have met with TD's and senators and have produced a survey that is to be launched nationwide.

I also set up the unions first "Welfare Team" who have worked with me on projects such as our Oireachtas Submission on Bullying and its impact on student mental health.

I'm currently in the process of becoming a Text50808 crisis support volunteer which will give me a deeper understanding of the issues facing students and the tools I'll need to tackle these.

I was elected as my schools student councils secretary 2018-19 and then elected as president 2019-20.

I was also elected as my schools Meitheal team chairperson 2019-20. meitheal is a program all about contributing to and improving the welfare of fellow students in my school.

I have achieved both bronze and silver Gaisce Awards.

MY PLANS

I have many plans for the role of Welfare Officer.

I will work with the Institute of Guidance Counsellors to lobby the government for a complete reform of our referral system in second-level schools. The current system is outdated and ineffective. I will strive to ensure that student voice is at the heart of this process as only students know what we need.

I want to establish a "Welfare Ambassador Scheme" with the ISSU. This would be an award program that students can apply for and be trained in ways they can improve the welfare of their fellow students in their own schools. I hope to create a network of Welfare Ambassadors across the country who will be empowered to work with their schools to improve their peers' lives.

I will continue to work with the Education Officer to input into the RSE Curriculum reform. I want to continue working with organisations like the NCCA and Active* Consent towards the improvement of our sexual education in Ireland.

I want to create a series of welfare resources that will be available to students. These will take different forms, such as short videos or flyers. These will contain the information that students need. Things like "What are my rights as a worker?", "How do I get tested for STD's?", "Where can I go if I feel I need help with my mental health?" and many more.

MY POLICY

1. Setting up a "Welfare Ambassador" scheme

• This would be a national programme designed to train students interested in Student Welfare Advocacy. These students would then work to make a positive impact locally in their schools and communities. At the end of the year, they would be awarded a cert from the Welfare Officer for successfully undertaking the role of a Welfare Ambassador.

2. Work to Reform the Referral System.

• The current referral system in Ireland is failing students. Students who need help urgently due to struggles with mental health are being put on ridiculously long waiting lists before they are referred to a professional to get the help they need. This is unacceptable and students deserve better. I will work with the Institute of Guidance Counsellors to lobby the government for a reform of the referral system.

3. Working with Active Consent + RSE Reform

• I want to continue working to maintain ISSU's very strong relationship with the NUI Galway based research program "Active* Consent". I want to work to continue building and furthering this relationship. This also leads into my plans for RSE Reform. We are in <u>dire</u> need of an RSE curricular reform. Students need <u>accurate</u> and <u>realistic</u> education on sex, sexuality, gender, relationships and everything else RSE.

4. Welfare supports for Gaelcholáistí

• It is vitally important that gaelcholáistí are not left out when it comes to the provision of resources. I will work with the Oifigeach na Gaeilge to ensure that all of the resources I produce are available bilingually for the students who may need them. I will also work to lobby the NEPS and DES to produce their Student Welfare resources fully bilingually.

5. Student Workers Rights





PAST EXPERIENCE

I had been blessed with the opportunity to get involved in Climate Activism in late-2018, and since have gathered a deep and wide experience of movement building, campaigning, sustainable development and grassroot movements. Starting off with the Schools Climate Action Network (SCAN), I gained an immeasurable amount of experience. From working on the team organising climate rallys, to speaking at them (with 20,000 people attending the largest event), I have been engrossed in the world of sustainable development through attending talks, speaking to experts, and advocating logistical solutions for some of the biggest issues facing our society today. 

- Implement a plant based day of the week in canteens to explain why our diets matter and make eating less meat less daunting by making half the menu vegetarian or vegan every day. Introduce a strategy to reduce food waste and use 100% biodegradable packaging e.g. coffee cups etc.
- Promotion of bringing your own cup and cutlery to school. Ensure there is ,at very least, a small area for wild flowers all year round in each school while using herbicides and weed killers that are organic.
- Create a guide with eco friendly electricity companies and sustainable ways of heating the buildings to encourage schools to switch their energy suppliers.
- Issue a nature handbook to help students reconnect with the natural world in a very simple way with names of flowers, animals, insects and so on.
- Organize an environmental assembly with a student panel and guest panel to discuss climate change and how we fight for our futures in every school much of which I have achieved in my school and I will continue in my own activism to fight for just transition along with climate action which I believe this manifesto represents.

Because of my International, as well as ISSU experience, I believe that I have what is necessary to propel the ISSU into the future on an International front.




PAST EXPERIENCE

I have worked in smaller support based roles such as being a Cinnire in the Gaeltacht or on local Scouts committees.



ABOUT ME

I have noticed the gradual decline of rural areas throughout my lifetime, the school I attend especially, has outdated resources. Having previously spoken to a member of the KDYS in Kerry, they told me they had never visited rural schools but is continuously in urban schools. this highlights the divide between town schools and schools such as my own situated in the countryside. I have become chairperson of the student council, to amend and right these injustices. I also volunteer with a local charity, the Social Action Group, to work with vulnerable people in the community, such as the elderly.

Since I was a mere small child in a hat, I have been picking up signs and protesting for what is right! As the years has progressed and my morals have developed, I have gained a strong sense of justice, becoming involved in the Comhairle na nÓg, Climate Live, beginning a Podcast, discussing matters that affect young people, and working with the NYCI. My greatest Honor is representing Ireland at the European Union Youth Conference. Where an idea I worked on is being passed through the European Parliament. I ama confident person who believes they can represent a large group of underrepresented people, such as rural people, members of the LGBT community and individuals living in poorer funded schools.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I attended my first protest at age 4 in my local village if Rathmore. In primary school I was head of the Green Schools committee, which continued into Secondary school. I began volunteering for the Social Action Group at this time, spending a few hours at the Day Care Centre. Keeping Rathmore clean, gardening, once a year we would cater children from Chernobyl and spend the day with them in Killarney.

This year I have become chairperson of the Student Council and have used tis role for the school to join ISSU, work with green schools and KDYS for workshops that benefit students. In green schools we would spend a lot of time cleaning and delittering the grounds, we have also received the Green Schools flag. Earlier this year I had the privilege of representing Ireland at the EUYC (European Union Youth Conference)

I worked on a project, which is now working through the European Parliament, which will fund grassroots organizations for social activist groups, such as LGBT groups, anti-racism groups among others. I became a member of Kerry Comhairle na nÓg this year and I am PRO of it, I have begun several social media campaigns, such as #Kerry's fitness fortnight and organized a virtual Zumba session which is still available on YouTube. After losing my bid for Head Girl I learned from this by being more motivated which led to me becoming Chairperson of Student Council.


MY PLANS

ABOUT ME

My name is Eoghan O' Mahony and I study in Colaiste Pobail Bheanntrai, in West Cork. Living in a rural area I have developed an innate sense for community and how group effort gets work done. I was involved with the local Tidy Towns and was a member of my local Scouts troop for many years. I have strong beliefs in community building and to me, the ISSU is a student community. I believe in freedom of self-expression and I want to ensure that this freedom I feel, can be shared.

I wanted to run for Welfare Officer in 2020 but I felt that undertaking an extra year of school and further ISSU experience would allow me to enter the 2021 Annual Assembly as a stronger candidate.

Outside of school and the ISSU I try to keep myself balanced through walking and reading. I also do baking. Surrounding my town there are many trails and walks which allow for reflective thought, and to develop plans of action. Reading allows me to broaden my mindset which gives me an advantage in group settings allowing me to work while placing myself in my fellow committee members shoes.

Growing up with a disability, hearing loss, I have learnt to adapt and to undertake challenges in ways that I can overcome and achieve my aims. I have a grit and tenacity that I want to bring to this officer role.

PAST EXPERIENCE

In terms of past experience within the ISSU I have been a voting delegate at Annual Assembly 2020, Cork Regional Council of Schools 2020, and Extraordinary Assembly 2021. Within my school I have served as student chairperson of the Green Schools Committee for the past 4 years, and currently am assisting in a survey to ensure that disabled students can access local amenities surrounding the school campus. In 2019 I was awarded the title of Ireland South Water Ambassador 2019 with Irish Water for my work on water conservation and campaigning with my school for clean water access in all businesses in my town.

In 2019 I attended the RTE Youth Assembly on Climate, and in 2020, the ISSU Skills Academy. These events allowed me to develop policies, enacted with support from both my Student Council and Green Schools. I have been the 2020 Student Council chairperson in my school and as chair I have lead many progressive campaigns,

such as a uniform review, renewal of the mobile device policy, and refreshed an opened discussion with senior management surrounding the inclusion of gender non-conforming students into the school's student welfare policy. This gender inclusivity discussion will continue into the coming school year.

Within the Student Council we have established a new working group, in cooperation with the chaplaincy staff in the school, to ensure that all students of equal years have an opportunity to access the supports and services provided in the school. As chairperson I also began contact with relevant teachers on refreshing the schools period poverty campaign by providing free sanitary products to students under the school welfare policy. Alongside the sanitary product media campaign, we also established an open form for student concerns and have encouraged class tutor discussion over any discrimination faced within school.

MY PLANS

I would engage with the student body of Ireland and NSE to cooperate to enact an effective plan to tackle equality issues. I will ask all regional officers to facilitate the creation of regional specific period poverty campaigns to ensure that all students of Ireland are aware of resources available to them in relation to sanitary products.

I intend to cooperate with the Education Officer to raise the unfair system of Leaving Cert Non-Curricular language options. Currently this list only allows for European languages. I would like to query the addition of Igbo, Malayalam, Tagalog and other student languages to the non-curricular list to equalise the unfair advantages created by the Leaving Cert Non-Curricular list, allowing students from greater ethnic backgrounds to receive an examination in their native language.

In conjunction with the Disability Officer I will look into a working group to investigate existing barriers and stigmas affecting the education of disabled students. Relevant students will be included in discussion and I aim that we will act alongside existing disability organisations. Once we have established the current barriers I will contact the Comms Officer and material to raise awareness of what affects the students of this demographic. I am committed to the creation and continuation of an equal educational space for all students, inclusive of those with disabilities.

I will ensure that all school-reps receive information on how to cater to and create accessibility for gender Non-Conforming students. Pre-existing curriculum material must be scrutinised to ensure that they do not cause harm through outdated or religiously stifled norms such as the Relationships and Sexuality Education and Social Physical Health Education courses. Through consultation with the Welfare Officer I plan on using the current RSE reform to ensure it includes and respects students of differing gender identity and expression.

ABOUT ME

I believe I can utilize this role to bring about long-lasting and far-reaching change among the student body in relation to the Irish Language. I believe that, in order to inspire students to engage with the Irish language, opportunities must be created for them to speak it. Beatha teanga í a labhairt!

The Irish language has always been a central part of my life, attending Irish-medium schools for both Primary and Secondary education has provided me with an insight into the triumphs of the Irish language. However, through my years of experience among different youth-led projects, I have also seen the failings of the Irish language among the student body - the anger towards the curriculum, the lack of motivation and perhaps most pervasive, the indifference felt towards the language.


MY PLANS

The Irish Language Working Group led by the previous Oifigeach has been working on a survey for the past few months however I believe it's imperative that this survey is released to the students to receive a representational response as soon as possible. It's imperative the ADIÉ represents students on this matter and I plan to work closely with the Education Officer to ensure this is achieved.

PAST EXPERIENCE

MY PLANS

If I am privileged enough to be elected to serve on the NSE as Education Officer, my three keys areas of focus would be continuing on the work completed by the current Education Officer concerning Leaving Certificate and CAO reform, establish a review into the new Junior Cycle to determine its effectiveness and whether it achieved the desired objectives from a student perspective, and developing a comprehensive science strategy for the ISSU.

With respect to LC reform, I would ensure the report developed by the current Education Officer is the policy pursued by the ISSU. This would be done through close collaboration with the NSE and the incoming Education working group, as well as relevant stakeholders. In relation to CAO reform, I would advocate for the inclusion of extracurricular activities and a personal statement style question on the CAO, as well as, calling for apprenticeships to be included on the CAO application form. This would be done through collaboration with other relevant stakeholders, such as the Department of Further and Higher Education.

Concerning the establishment of a review into the new Junior Cycle, I would establish a separate working group to look at this issue. A survey would be launched, as well as, conducting several town halls to hear from students directly. At the end of this process, a report would be published detailing the findings of this review.

Finally, with regard to the development of a comprehensive science strategy, I would establish a working group to look at this issue and work with outside experts to ensure that this work follows the conscience of the scientific community. The goal of developing this policy is to ensure that the ISSU and members of the NSE are better equipped to deal with scientific matters, such as the pandemic and climate change.

PAST EXPERIENCE





ABOUT ME

My name is Grace O'Duffy, and I am a 17 year old Irish/American student in Dublin. We need a plan for long term engagement in the reform process, and during my term I will design and initiate a strategy to earn students a seat at the table.

I will be the ideal candidate for this position because I am dedicated and hard-working, and I believe in the power of collaboration and representation. I have strong public speaking and written communication skills and I will approach this role with professionalism and integrity.

Above all, my priority is the long term success of the union in engagement with the stakeholders in the reform process. PAST EXPERIENCE

I have been involved in education and education reform from a variety of perspectives. I attended primary school and middle school in California, and secondary school here in Ireland. I will bring unique insight from my observations and experiences of both systems. In Transition Year, I took university classes in law and politics at DCU one day a week. I have first-hand experience of the expectations of a third level course, which gives me a more complete view of the education system as a whole. Additionally, I am an experienced Maths, English and Science tutor, which gives me a balanced perspective and allows me to engage with teachers and other

stakeholders in a more meaningful way. Most importantly, I have been heavily involved with all of the union's work on Senior Cycle Reform this year. As a member of the Education Working Group, my group members and I were responsible for designing and distributing the Senior Cycle reform survey and analysing and writing up all of the data we received. The results and analysis were published in our Senior Cycle Reform Report. I have the experience needed to take the next steps in the reform process and work with the other stakeholders.

Additionally. I have been involved in politics for years. When I lived in California, I volunteered for Hillary Clinton's campaign. I made phone calls, sold buttons, and registered voters. In fourth year, I studied both Irish and American politics in DCU and wrote two academic papers. In the 2020 US election I phonebanked and textbanked, and sent hundreds of handwritten letters to voters. The role of education officer is policy heavy, so my political experience is directly relevant and valuable to this position.

Overall, my experience in education and politics makes me the ideal candidate for Education Officer.

MY PLANS

I will devote my term to Senior Cycle Reform. It is crucial that the next officer addresses this issue, as we have a unique opportunity to influence the incoming policy. Our union has many strengths, however our annual change of leadership makes it more difficult for us to bring a consistent approach to the reform process. During my term, I will design and initiate a 5 year Senior Cycle Reform Engagement Strategy to guide future officers in maintaining our momentum at this critical time. The strategy will help the union to build long term relationships with the stakeholders and earn a permanent seat at the decision making table.

To provide support to our advocacy, I will write a comprehensive position paper on student perspective on Senior Cycle Reform. It is much easier for the stakeholders to work with us if we can hand them a clear picture of our objectives, rather than coming to the table with various disconnected ideas and goals.

While high level advocacy is effective, and crucial in making lasting change, it is key that we approach this issue from a grassroots level as well. I will run three additional projects during my term to help address specific areas that need grassroots support. I will design and introduce a civics engagement award, in the form of a school flag, to raise the perception of the value of civics education by schools and wider society. I will also run a three tier RSE initiative to help make RSE more widely available to students, and I will design and pilot a TY Life Skills Module to show the government that life skills can, and should be included in the Senior Cycle.

PROGRESS, PURPOSE, POWER

Experience

I'm Grace and I'm a 5th year student in Dublin. I am passionate about education reform and I believe it is crucial that students are involved in the decision making process. As a member of the ISSU Education Working Group, I've worked closely with the Education Officer, and understand the unique demands and challenges of the role. I was one of the core authors of the Senior Cycle Reform report and was heavily involved in the design and planning of our survey and symposium. I have a broad perspective and deep understanding of the Senior Cycle and the reform process, and I will bring professionalism, dedication, and collaboration to this role.

Reform Strategy

During my term, I will take a comprehensive approach to Senior Cycle reform. This issue must be addressed by the incoming officer, as the changes are already underway. I will engage with the reform process at a government level, a union level and a student level.

Our union has many strengths, however the annual change of leadership makes it difficult for us to bring a consistent approach to the reform process. During my term, I will design and initiate a 5 year Strategy for Engagement in the Reform Process, to take the first steps in earning a permanent seat at the table.

I will also deliver a comprehensive position paper that details student perspective on all aspects of Senior Cycle reform.

Life Skills

I will advocate for the inclusion of life skills (paying taxes, registering to vote, etc.) in the Senior Cycle in all of my work with the NCCA and in the paper that I write, and I will design and pilot an 8 week TY Life Skills module, to show the department this is both possible, and in demand.

RSE

We need RSE to be more widely available - I will address this at a government level, advocating for a legal minimum time for RSE, an organisational level, working with the HSE to organise remote classes, and a grassroots level, by running an event to help students lobby their schools.

Civics Education

Civics education needs to be central to the reformed curriculum - to bring this issue to the forefront of the conversation and to help schools and wider society realise the value of civics, I will design and initiate a Civic Engagement Award for schools.



hat was the most significant thing we the students were able to achieve with student voice? For me, it has to be the choice on the Leaving Cert. It shows that anything is possible when you have the right people representing you. If I was to describe myself in three words, they would be; young, genuine & hard-working. I'm in 3rd year, I'm a student just like you. Do you want second-level students representing second-level students? I genuinely want to promote student voice, I genuinely feel I am the best candidate to do so. Most of all, I'm hard-working. Some would say I'm a work-a-holic, but I can't leave a task incomplete, I have to finish it! I'll be in TY if elected, so I will be able to devote my time to the ISSU and you, the students. Thanks for reading and enjoy your AA:)

PAST EXPERIENCE

Currently, I'm serving as Secretary of the Education Working Group (the Education Officer's team). This means I am already well aware of the responsibilities of the Education Officer, and was able to assist in some areas. In addition I work extremely closely with the Education Officer. The two main issues we worked on this year were the Junior Cycle & Leaving Certificate exams 2021, running a Senior Cycle Reform Survey and subsequently creating the ISSU Senior Cycle Reform Report 2021. This Senior Cycle Reform survey was produced in conjunction with the ESRI and used a sample pool to ensure we get representative data. We very recently presented our report to educational stakeholders launched by Ruaírí Quinn, Former Minister for Education and Skills.

Senior Cycle reform is something that is extremely important to me, especially noting that the Junior Cycle is reformed but the Senior Cycle isn't - I believe it needs to be dealt with immediately. From my work as Secretary of the Education Working Group I've gained invaluable knowledge on all things related to Senior Cycle Reform. I understand what the students want and I also understand what the other education stakeholders want. I'm also 100 serving on the ISSU Religion Working Group (under the International Officer and the Deputy President), and on the ISSU Presidential Support Team (a close-knit team that supports the ISSU President).

MY PLANS

A big part of the next Education Officer's role will be the State Exams 2022. These students have missed out on 2 full academic years of school, and this needs to be reflected in the exams they sit. I plan to lobby the Minister, DES, SEC and all the other educational stakeholders (teacher's unions, ect) to reduce the amount of questions on both the JC & LC.. This will give students more time to spend and think through each question. I always believe there is no point in lobbying for unrealistic asks (like for the 2022 exams to be cancelled), but we could really achieve reduced questions!

In the unlikely event that schools move online for the 2021/2022 school year, or if the State Exams 2022 are cancelled, we need to have Contingency Plans in place before October 2021. We cannot have a situation where students are worried and frustrated about their future because the Minister failed to plan ahead. Clear and concise Contingency Plans offer student clarity, something the ISSU fights extremely hard for students.

I also wish to carry on the excellent work the Education Officer, Education Working Group & I have completed this year on Senior Cycle Reform. In early April we launched the groundbreaking report on Senior Cycle Reform which was hugely successful. Furthermore we are now writing a research paper, also in conjunction with the ESRI. This groundbreaking data will be crucial to the ISSU's position on Senior Cycle Reform in the coming years, and it's important the next Education Officer is well-versed in this area, like I am. I plan to look closely at TY reform, LCA reform, the CAO points process & continuation to higher or further education, and to work closely with the USI and consult third level students as well.



AKENO "GOOSE" BARRETT

Coláiste an Chroí Naofa 6th Year



ABOUT ME

My name is Akeno Barrett, commonly referred to as Goose. I am a seventeen-year-old Leaving Certificate student from Cork County. I am a so-called qualified underdog. Since the age of ten, I wanted to make a difference. I am the minority of the minorities, and I have had my ups and downs. Being a disabled, Taiwanese, queer, and transgender immigrant living in the Irish countryside is an achievement in its own right.

When I began my journey into activism, my core focus was to become a lawyer. Almost eight years later, and unsurprisingly, I still want to be a lawyer. Previously, I believe that the hefty salary and the concept of "being paid to argue" were my incentives to study law. Now, I have a lot more perspective. I am appalled by the overwhelming amount of atrocities committed every day. The horrific stories of racist attacks, the disheartening vote against climate protection, war, and so many more. With my keen interest in literature, I know that I want to use my words and create change. There are many elements of my very being, but writing is my everything. From freelance journalism to lengthy poetry, I put everything into my artistry. Society often ignores the several elephants in the room, but I use my words to convey messages of substance. I may not change the world, but I want to make it a more equitable environment.

Of course, I am so immensely passionate about representing disabled students from around the country. I have cerebral palsy (left hemiplegia), and I know first-hand how hard secondary school is when you deviate a tad from the typical student. I want to protect students from scenarios that I certainly could have avoided if I had the right support system: I want to make a difference.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I am the current Student Council Vice-Chairperson and ISSU School Representative for Coláiste an Chroí Naofa. I took the initiative last year to formally involve my school with ISSU and apply for membership. As Vice-Chairperson, I try my best to uplift the student voice. I am always running a fundraiser or awareness campaign. Of course, because of COVID-19, the duties of the Student Council changed. I became the coordinator of the sixth-year representative team designated to represent the year group during online learning. We entered weekly discussions with our principal, deputy principal and year head to help ensure the facilitation of the virtual classroom was running smoothly. It was a rare experience, but these engagements benefited our school's Leaving Certificate students.

Before the beginning of Fifth-Year, I underwent a week of mentorship training at Scala Cork. I served as Chairperson of our Meitheal team in 2020. The Meitheal Youth Leadership Programme facilitated by Scala was an excellent opportunity to build my leadership skills. It enhanced my negotiation, mentoring, communication and time management abilities. Concurrently, I served as an Amber Flag Committee Member during my term as Meitheal Chairperson. Our school received an Amber Flag in 2020 for our proud efforts of raising awareness, dismantling stigmas, and educating our peers.

Because of the lockdown, I participated in the digital version of this year's Munster Regional Session of the EYP. In 2019, I also partook in NatMUN at UCC. Since 2013, I have an involvement in the guiding and scouting community. I earned a silver Chief Commissioner Award with CGI in 2018. My project consisted of various tasks including, applying the Sustainable Development Goals to my personal life and locality. I count this project as my formal introduction to activism. I could bring my existing skill-set to the role of disability officer.

MY PLANS

As an elected official, I can bring a fresh perspective to the NSE. I would use my position to create a healthy and equitable climate for disabled students. I have adopted the phrase "Enable the Disabled" for campaign purposes. My main concern is to enable disabled students to have an above-average school experience, like most physically able and neurotypical teenagers. I aim to bring more recognition, equity, and protection to the disabled community.

With my background, experiences and knowledge of various disabilities, I believe it is possible to implement comprehensive accessibility guidelines for all second-level educational facilities. The importance of accessibility is often under-recognised as its definition varies from person to person.

My younger brother and I both suffer from disabilities. Whereas my brother has Tourette syndrome, a classified neurodevelopmental disorder, I have a permanent movement disorder. Hemiplegia is a type of cerebral palsy that results from damage to the parts of the brain that control muscle movements. Tourette syndrome is a disorder that involves repetitive movements or unwanted sounds (tics) that are excessively difficult to control. Although our disabilities are different, we both understand the hardships of academic life as disabled students. Whether a student is neurodivergent or has a physical disability, accessibility is vital in our academic life. With the aid of a working group, I can develop external guidelines as the disability officer by examining the various disabilities.

Discrimination is something many of us face during school, whether it is intentional or not. Part of the duties of the disability officer is to protect disabled students from harmful exclusion. I aim to adhere to this duty with the utmost respect. Education is one of the easiest methods of preventing discrimination. By collaborating on awareness campaigns with experts, I can help avert bigotry in the second-level education setting.

My name is Akeno Barrett (commonly known as Goose), and I am a sixth-year student from Cork County. After years of feeling ashamed of my disability, I finally understand there is no shame, just stigma. I want all disabled students to live free of embarrassment and to witness the dismantling of stigmas.

RECOGNITION

One of my main objectives as the disability officer is for disabled students in Second-Level Education to receive better recognition. By identifying issues unique to the disabled community, I can help ensure we receive the vital supports that we require. Appropriate acknowledgement of disabilities, notably uncommon disabilities, will ensure that all teaching staff can assist all students.

EQUITY

Another one of my aims as the elected officer is to advocate for equity among disabled students. All disabled students are unique in their own right and deserve fair and desirable treatment. Equity ensures that all students receive a just education that draws the individual's potential to its fullest.

PROTECTION

My final main objective is to protect disabled students from discrimination as best I can. Additionally, defending our opinions is equally as important. By uplifting and encouraging disabled voices to join leading discussions, I will protect our right to be involved in decisions that directly concern us.

Policies: As disability the officer I would...

- Engage with organisations like Enable Ireland and the Cope Foundation to collaborate on awareness campaigns.
- Implement a working group to develop external accessibility guidelines for students.
- Operate alongside the International and Equality Officer to coordinate efforts across OBESSU.
- Lobby for intersectional representation for students as stakeholders in education.
- Provide a medium for both neurotypical and physically disabled students to present their issues.
- Propose public consultations with students.
- Support students with resources to foster inclusive environments at schools.
- Help ensure that all students have equal access to second-level education.

You're probably asking yourself, why vote for me? I'm asking for your vote at ISSU Annual Assembly as I have a raft of experiences in activism and working with students with disabilities. I have the ideas, the plans and policies, and the ability to see them implemented.

PAST EXPERIENCE

I won't lie to you, I won't bluff out a false list of engagements. I want to be an officer who is honest with the students I will represent.

I have worked as a young leader in scouts, assisting with the youngest sections, Beavers, and Cubs. Additionally, within Scouting, I was part of the smallest successful patrol at Phoenix Challenge, achieving silver in 2019. After the Covid-19 pandemic hit in 2020, I started to engage with the ISSU. 





ABOUT ME

Having been actively involved in ISSU and youth activism for the last two years, I want to use my experience and drive to work towards improving the union and assisting its development.

I am the current Sustainability Officer of the ISSU, serving the first full term of the role. During the term, I have worked to develop the role and the presence of sustainability within the Union. I have created and coordinated two Working Groups. Amongst other projects, I gained the ISSU a seat on the Department of Education Advisory Group on Education for Sustainable Development and organised the Sustainability Consultation. This experience has given me insight into the workings of the NSE and Union as a whole, as well as the importance of engaging membership and a wide variety of students in our work.

Alongside this, I worked actively on the Constitutional Reform WG as we prepared the proposed Constitution for this year's EA, which enabled me to understand the workings and nuances of the ISSU Constitution and structures. This also highlighted to me possible areas for reform within the Union, and ways in which officers can be assisted to ensure the voice of our membership is fully implemented across all work. I have also been providing team support, giving me experience in working as part of a team within the ISSU and an appreciation of the wider context of work done by individual officers in the Union.

Outside of this, I have worked with Fridays For Future, SpunOut, EYP, the Comhairle National Executive and various other youth organisations. I believe this gives me a blend of the necessary grounding in the ISSU, as well as a fresh perspective from work outside of the ISSU which would assist me in delivering for students as a member of the MAC.

WORKING WITH ISSU STRUCUTRES

Our most fundamental structure is our member schools and the students we represent. These are the driving force behind all other ISSU structures and decisions, and form our highest decision-making body: our Annual Assembly. It is imperative that this structure is effectively engaged in the Union, that all structures are accountable to them, and that we continue to grow engagement with members.

The Regional Officer Body is the Union at a grassroots level. Their role is to lead and represent the Union at a

local level, developing student voice and the presence of the ISSU across the country. They play a crucial role in communicating with the NSE and supporting student voice in their region, and are central to our growth as a grassroots union and movement for student voice.

At a national level, the NSE leads the Union through a collaborative and representative approach. It is their role to ensure the views of students are effectively represented at a national level, and to above all else act in a representative manner in all decisions and stances. They should liaise with the ROB and member schools throughout their decision-making, and work to lead the Union throughout their elected term.

The MAC works to ensure our work is constitutional, in line with Directive Policies, and to ensure accountability to membership. They work to provide support and guidance for officers through reports and recommendations to strengthen the work of the Union, and to give feedback and advice on the development of the organisation. They are central to ensuring the voice of the membership is heard in the Union.

These structures interact with one another to deliver an effective Union, and as a MAC member, I hope to work to develop engagement with and effectiveness of each structure to allow us to provide the best platform for student voice possible.

WORKING WITH ISSU DOCUMENTS

Working as an NSE member and on Constitutional Reform has given me a deep insight into the workings of our two main documents.

Our Constitution is the Union's guiding star. It is the voice of the membership at the roots of all workings of the ISSU and its elected officers. Its importance is demonstrated by the - majority needed to pass an amendment at AA, and it is central to all functions, decisions and structures of the ISSU. It has undergone great reform in the last number of years, mirroring the development and evolution of the ISSU itself. If elected to the MAC, I will work to ensure its implementation and that each officer understands its gravity and workings within the Union. It is fundamental to the role of the MAC to oversee the implementation of the Constitution and to provide guidance for how it can be properly observed by all officers, which I will work to deliver in the role.

The Directive Policy book serves to further the voice of the membership within the workings of the Union and its officers. The policies passed by a simple majority at AA provide direction and priority for the work of officers, giving a clear roadmap of what our members feel the Union must deliver on. As a member of the MAC, I would hope to aid officers in understanding their respective DPs, and work to ensure they are effectively prioritising and incorporating them into their work as an elected officer.

Our documents place the voice of the membership at the forefront, and as a representative organisation it is crucial that every officer understands and is able to fully implement these documents into their work. Therefore, as a MAC member, I would work to provide officers with this and support them to implement them in their work.

WHY ME?



ABOUT ME

My name's Eiman, I'm currently a Leaving Cert student from Kildare and I'm hoping to study Law next year. I served on the NSE of 2019/20 as Communications Officer. I ran for Communications Officer as I wanted to ensure that every member of the union is fully aware of the Trojan work ISSU do each year. I wanted to spread awareness to ISSU as I found that a lot of people didn't even realise that they were members and therefore missed out on all the incredible opportunities ISSU had to offer.

During my time, I ran the social media pages and our Instagram following increased greatly. My aim was to allow our followers to see what the NSE got up to and to see more than infographics but the faces of the NSE and our members at events. We were able to maintain professionalism but also a sense of informality and friendliness.

A big achievement for me, was getting to re-vamp the ISSU website. We gave it a fresh modern look and updated it regularly with events, blogposts and publications. As well, I set up ISSU's first ever email newsletter, which is sent out monthly to hundreds of subscribers. It is the go-to place to and easiest way to reach out to our members and make sure they were aware of the work that got on in the union and to avail of any opportunities. Overall, I'm very proud of my year on the NSE and I want to ensure that the strong foundations that have been put in place in recent years are still standing as well as supporting new ideas.

WORKING WITH ISSU STRUCUTRES

First and foremost, the ISSU is student-led. Student Councils can opt to join the ISSU through a membership, making the whole school body a member of ISSU.

Membership allows schools to avail of student council training, can be represented by the union, can having voting rights at AA and an EGM as well as nominate a student to run for elections for any of ISSU's structural bodies.

The Board of Directors govern the ISSU and uphold the constitution and set the budget. They are representatives from the education sector, past ISSU officers and anyone else who would have relevant experience to fulfil the role.

The MAC, ensure that elected officers are upholding the constitution and are in line with ISSU policy. The MAC also provide guidance and support, since the MAC is comprised of past NSE officers, ROB officers and Working Group Members.

The NSE are the public representatives of the union. They work to represent members within their assigned remits. Each individual role reflects a different aspect of students lives. The NSE ensure that student voice is heard at every occasion when it is needed. Any NSE member can set up a working group to aid them in tackling a certain issue within their mandate.

Each region is represented by 2 elected Regional Officers. They work alongside the NSE to achieve our union's mission statement but on a regional level. They deal with student issues that are occurring only on a regional level. They recruit new schools to ISSU membership and are vital for ensuring a regionally balanced union.

The secretariat are staff members that support the administrative and operational work that is needed to be carried out on a day to day basis. The NSE will have a say in any changes to the secretariat

WORKING WITH ISSU DOCUMENTS

A new constitution has been passed at the EGM that took place during the Easter break. The constitution outlines ISSU's vision statement and aims and specifically how these aims are to be achieved. This new constitution, is what I would be using as the basis of my work as a member of the MAC. I will use it to ensure that the elected officers are representing students in line with the procedures outlined in the constitution. I understand that this constitution can be amended by a two thirds plus one vote at either AA or at an EGM.

The Policy Book outlines ISSU's stances on certain student issues. The policy book is made by members and is always subject to updates and proposals at AA and an EGM. As a member of MAC, it would be my job to ensure the Policy book that any tasks carried out by elected officers are in line with the policy book.

The Directive Mandates book mandates tasks for elected offices to complete within their term. A mandate expires after 3 years of being passed, so the mandate would carry through for the next elected officer. As a member of MAC, it would be my job to support the implementation of the directive mandates.

Both the Directive Mandates book and the Policy Book, must not invalidate the constitution. If there are any conflicts between either two documents and the constitution the MAC has the power to deem any appeals invalid.

WHY ME?

As a recent member of the NSE, I know how necessary it is for every member of the executive to be held accountable for their tasks. It is an honour but also a big responsibility to be elected to represent students either nationally or regionally. I want to ensure that the officers are taking their role seriously. I want to make it as easy as possible for elected officers to report to the MAC, when I was on the NSE, I found the methods of communication between the NSE and MAC to be slightly tedious. I want to change that. I will work with my fellow MAC members to crest a simple but comprehensive method for elected officers to update the MAC on their work which will make our job easier and can improve efficiency within the organisation.

My past experience will allow me to have empathy for the officers. I understand fully what it is like to receive burn out or fee overwhelmed or uninspired. I can approach this role with compassion for the officers and can guide them through their low points by being considerate.

I want ensure that the NSE and ROB feel no worries over coming to the MAC for help or assistance for fear of being judged. I can approach this role with full confidentiality and with a smile. I will work to establish a strong relationship with the elected offices to make sure that they can come to me for support and guidance. The welfare of the officers are my number 1 priority.

If elected to the MAC, I would do my best to help other officers as they fight a fair system on behalf of students on both a regional and national level. I would strive for an increased level of accountability and transparency, with an emphasis on welfare. I understand, from my own experience as an officer, the stress and pressure that can be felt during the term; I want to help others, as others have helped me, to ensure that every officer reaches their potential and receives the support they need, while making sure that the NSE as a whole keeps the promises on which they were elected.

WORKING WITH ISSU STRUCUTRES

The ISSU is led from the ground up - led by our member schools who mandate the NSE and ROB respectively to achieve certain tasks for the second-level student body of Ireland.

In terms of representation, the Regional Officer Body is made up of 22 different regions, with two officers representing each region. The role of ISSU School Representative has recently been created, with networks of students from all across the country - with a stronger emphasis than ever on the union at a grassroots level. As the ROB itself as a functional body is relatively new, its progress will need to be monitored closely. The ROB has never been stronger and more effective, which is why it should also be held accountable to its respective regions.

The NSE is the body that represents second-level students on a national level, made up of thirteen elected officers each mandated to work on different topics and aspects of the education system and union. It is

imperative that the NSE be held accountable and that the work of the body is as transparent as possible, especially during national campaigns such as the Leaving Cert. 2020/2021 campaign.

The MAC monitors and holds these two bodies to account, as well as any working groups created during its term. The Board of Directors upholds the ISSU Constitution and passes the budget; this body consists of former ISSU officers, education stakeholders and student representatives.

WORKING WITH ISSU DOCUMENTS

The ISSU's official documents include the Constitution, the Directive Policy book and the Annual Assembly Procedure. The Constitution and Directive Policy book are the two most important documents of the ISSU. They mandate and dictate the work of the NSE based on what has been voted on by the member schools of the union. It is absolutely imperative that these documents be upheld to the highest standard to ensure that the ISSU is as representative and member-led as it can be. I am extremely familiar with these documents, as I have sat on the NSE and have worked on the recent reform of the ISSU Constitution, sitting on the Constitutional Working Group. These documents guided me time and time again when I was an elected officer on both the NSE and ROB, and if elected to the MAC, I will ensure that they remain the guiding light of the union for all elected officers and working group members.

WHY ME?

In my opinion, the two most important qualities of any member of the MAC are experience and knowledge of the union. I first got involved with the ISSU when I was in third year, and four years later I have experience sitting on working groups, the ROB and the NSE. I have experience on a grassroots level, with three years of Student Council Chairperson under my belt in Meánscoil San Nioclás sa Rinn. I also have experience representing the union abroad, and I understand how other European student unions work through my experience with OBESSU. I have been involved in this organisation for years and I really understand just how important transparency and communication are. If elected to the MAC, I will ensure that the bodies representing you are held accountable, but also that officers are provided with the advice and support needed.

Progression

The internal recently created MAC regulations have transformed the role of the body, allowing a structured and analytical approach that benefits both elected officers and the membership. This approach needs to continue, while effectively tailoring their approaches to the next NSE to allow for the different dynamic a new team inevitably brings.

Communication

communication **ISSU** between Open structures is absolutely imperative to the smooth functioning of the union, especially in an online environment. I understand, from my own experience as an officer, the stress and pressure that can be felt during the term; I want to help others, as others have helped me, to ensure that every officer reaches their potential and receives the support they need. Communication is the key to achieving this; which is why, if elected, I would hold open advice sessions for Regional Officers as well as members of the NSE.





Accountabilty

It is imperative that the NSE, as a whole, keeps the promises on which they were elected. It is also important the ROB is held to the same standard. If elected to the MAC, I will ensure that officers are held accountable to their manifestos, the constitution and the membership.

These 13 members of the NSE are elected at AA, and a president (An Uachtarán) is elected to represent ISSU and all students that fall under it. The 22 Regional Officers are elected at Regional Council and make up the ROB. These ROs are elected to represent local students at a national basis. The Monitoring and Advisory Committee acts as the 'standing orders committee' of the union. It's job is to oversee the work the elected officers, particularly the NSE. These 5 elected members are elected at AA to monitor the work of the NSE and analyse regular reports from them.

WORKING WITH ISSU DOCUMENTS

I view the ISSU Constitution as a important document in the structure of ISSU, it is the backbone of the decisions made, the representatives that it governs and the members that follow it. I believe that enforcing it is a very important role to ensure decisions is allowed and issued under the structure that holds our union together.

WHY ME?

As mentioned in my opening statement, I believe that I possess skills and qualities that would help me in this role, including knowledge of internal structure and understanding of documents that help govern the decisions made. ABOUT ME

I'm turning eighteen at the beginning of June and I'm a sixth year student at Athy College. I have conditional entry for a PLC course in Liberal Arts at Liberties College and I hope to study politics in university.

In regards to my experience, within the ISSU, I've served as a Regional Officer for KIldare/Wicklow after being coopted to the position in May 2020 but unfortunately was defeated in a bid for re-election at that year's Regional Council. I've been a member of two working groups, the Sustainability Consultation Group (who I have been nominated by) and the Equality Team. I was involved in the organising of the recent National Sustainability event and the Leinster regional session.

My interest in politics came about in 2015 with Marriage Equality and the anti-Water Charges campaign and from there, I've been involved in activism on issues across the board. These campaigns include the campaign to ban conversion therapy, the campaign against the CETA trade deal, joining the picket alongside the Debenham's Workers who have been fighting for their agreed on redundancy, environment/Just Transition and a number of other issues.

Outside of politics, I'm interested in cycling, history, reading and nature.

WORKING WITH ISSU STRUCUTRES

I'm running for Monitoring Committee because I believe that I have a good understanding of our internal structures, having been involved in a number of them.

To begin, the ISSU is registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee (CLG) and we are registered with the Charities Register as a charity, meaning our activities must be in the remit of our charitable statement.

First off, we have our elected bodies, the Regional Officer Board (ROB), the National Student Executive (NSE) and the Monitoring and Advisory Committee (MAC). The ROB is elected from the twenty two regions across the Republic, with their role being to represent students in the area on a local and national level, to organise Regional Council and they are the largest elected body in our Union. The NSE is the elected national officers of the Union, all with a specific remit who act as public representatives for the Union. The MAC is made up of five members who have experience in the Union, with their role being to monitor the activities of the ROB and the NSE, to provide constructive criticism/feedback and to hold those bodies to account.

All three of these bodies are elected directly by delegates from member schools using the PR-STV electoral system, with the ROB being elected at respective Regional Councils while the NSE and MAC are elected at the Annual Assembly, the Union's highest governing body.

In the background, there is the Board of Directors (who govern the legal aspect of the Union), the Secretariat (made up of the Managing Directors and staff) and the Senior Leadership Team (composed of the President, Deputy President, Honorary President and staff).

WORKING WITH ISSU DOCUMENTS

Our official documents; the Constitution, the Annual Assembly Procedure Document and the Directive Policy Book, all have one thing in common: they're voted on by our members.

Our Constitution, which was recently passed at the March 2021 Extraordinary Assembly, is the document that lays the foundations and the rules and procedures of the ISSU. The Constitution is where the different structures in the ISSU derives their basis and power, where everything from membership to elections are dealt with. This is the highest governing document of the Union.

The Annual Assembly Procedure Document, which was also adopted at the March 2021 Extraordinary Assembly, is the standing orders document for Annual/Extraordinary Assembly. The document lays out the rules and procedures for such assemblies, with the Chairperson(s) of the Assembly enforcing this document.

The Directive Policy Book is the collation of all the Directive Policy motions passed at Annual/Extraordinary Assembly, with motions being valid for three years from passage. Directive Policy motions cover officer remits (Welfare, Equality, Sustainability etc.), National Policy and Union Organisation.

It is the job of the Monitoring and Advisory Committee to ensure that these documents and policies are adhered to.

WHY ME?

I believe that my experience within and outside the ISSU, as well as my positive and hard work ethic make me a suitable candidate to monitor the work of the ISSU.

I'll start with my experience. Within the ISSU, I was co-opted into the position of Regional Officer for Kildare/Wicklow last May and served in the position until the beginning of 2021. During my time as a Regional Officer, I provided contributions to constitutional review, which gives me first hand experience with procedural and constitutional matters. I've also been a member of the Equality Team and the Regional Sustainability Consultation Working Group. Outside the ISSU, I've been involved in Kildare Comhairle na nÓg as a member for the Athy area and as Public Relations Officer. I've also been involved in a number of grassroots campaigns and I'm a member of People Before Profit. This has all given me experience with teamwork, organising and policy issues.

Regarding myself, I believe that I have a hard work ethic that would make me a good candidate for the MAC. I'm looking forward to getting to work, providing help wherever I can and ensuring that our Union is working to the best of its ability and that our officers are accountable to our members.
