Vale Dr. Berenis (Benny) Alcorn

Benny Alcorn was Patron of Nambour Orchid Society for 17 years from 1997-2014. Benny attended all our shows and presented the prizes to all the winners until suffering a stroke in April 2011. She was an avid supporter of the Society and its members. Benny's association with Nambour went back to the start of the Society. Her late husband Bill was one of the founding members of the original North Coast Orchid Society and although Benny was not an inaugural member she did join soon after. During her time as Patron, she wrote the book 'A Blooming Success North Coast Orchid Society' which was released for their 50th anniversary in August 2015. She was passionate about orchids and had a great love for our Australian Native Orchids. Benny was a local historian, conservationist and a passionate volunteer. She was awarded a PhD in history one day before her 84th birthday. She was a finalist for the Qld Senior Australian of the year in 2011 and was President of the Sunshine Coast Wetland Sanctuary Advisory Group for 20 years. During this time she was instrumental in saving a mangrove swamp from development. Thanks to Dr Alcorn's efforts the Bli Bli Wetlands Sanctuary boasts the largest diversity of mangrove species in southern Queensland.

Throughout her many years on the Sunshine Coast, Benny worked extensively to document, survey and research historic sites around the Sunshine Coast and has written and contributed to many books accessed by historians around Australia.

'Maroochy River and its People, published in 1994, and 'Moreton Sugar Mill 1997' are just two of her contributions. Benny contributed her local knowledge of history to an interpretive sign for Settlers Park near Twin Waters, documenting the history of the area along with students from Pacific Paradise State School which was unveiled in May 2011

Her lifelong commitment to learning was acknowledged when Pacific Paradise State School named it's new hall in her honour.


Benny moved from the Coast to Oakey to be closer to her daughter after suffering a stroke in April 2011. She passed away in December 2021 aged 97.

Phalaenopsis

Very few things bring more pleasure to one who grows orchids as a hobby than to see the time spent in the shade house producing spectacular flowers on healthy plants. Obviously this is to be expected, as the old saying goes the more dedication to the task the better the result. The photo of this Phalaenopsis goes to prove given the right conditions nature will determine the outcome, as there was little dedication to achieving this result.

The plant was purchased by Rhonda along with a white flowering Phalaenopsis from Bunning's three years ago, both in very damaged condition, broken leaves and looking worse for wear. They were only eight dollars each on the throw out table. Rhonda certainly had faith in my ability to restore both orchids to a healthy flowering condition.

I chose to utilize some old panty hose (I might add not mine), and attach them, utilizing sphagnum moss to retain moisture while they were attaching their roots to an old mango tree. Both struggled for several years, as watering and fertilizing was very spasmodic. They have both grown into strong healthy plants and produced significant flowers this year.

This spike has been out for three months with the slight damage on one of the petals caused last night during the 140ml downpour. Roger.

Schoenorchis fragrans

common name The Fragrant Schoenorchis.
Synonyms Gastrochilus fragrans,
Schoenorchis fragrans var. seidenfadenii,
Saccolabium fragrans,
Schoenorchis manipurensis, is a species of the genus Schoenorchis.

This species was described by Gunnar Seidenfaden & Tem Smitinand in 1963.

Schoenorchis fragrans is found in North-eastern India (Assam state), Thailand, Myanmar, China (Yunnan state) and Vietnam, where it grows in semi-deciduous forests at an altitude of 600-1200 meters.

It is a miniature sized, monopodial, warm to cool growing epiphyte with a short, branching stem carrying fleshy, narrowly elliptic leaves.

I bought this orchid 3 years ago with almost no roots and did not immediately realize that there were two

plant because it was a very small plant. But a month later I noticed the growth of roots and it bloomed for the first time with 8 flowers.

I really like unusual plantings and I planted it in a bonsai pot.

Walking in the park after the rain I saw moss and decided to add it to my baby. So they have been growing together for three years.

Last year it blossomed with 5 flower spikes and received an award in honour of my youngest daughter.

It grows under 70% shade cloth and loves spraying, both it and the moss. Of course the orchid would like it if I left work and sprayed it all day but for now I spray it in the winter in the mornings and in the summer in the evenings. **Luda.**









Botanical interest - Species Meeting Dendrobium toressae

Common names are Sparkle, Mica or Grain of Wheat Orchid. It is found in the northeast of Australia growing in low to moderate altitudes in rainforests and nearby open forests as an epiphyte or lithophyte, in semi shade and humid conditions. The foliage turns red in high light.

My plant of this came from Wayne's collection, so it is very precious to me. It is mounted on a piece of ironbark and is growing under 50 percent shadecloth. I water it daily in warm weather, less often over winter. It has a different foliar fertiliser once a week and alternate sprays of systemic and contact fungicides and pesticides as needed.



Judges Choice - Species Meeting

Cleisostoma quinquefidum

This unusual orchid is found in New Guinea and the Bismarck Archipelago. It grows at elevation 10 to 350m. A small to medium size hot growing epiphyte with a stout heavy leaf plant. It flowers on a 50cm long branched inflorescence with many small flowers. Sepals and petals are yellow with a broad brown red margin. Lip is white with violet markings. This orchid came from the collection of the late Wayne Harris at the end of 2020. Potted in bark in a basket, it hangs with the Vandas and seems to be doing very well.
