USAID is cofinancing the project with US\$30.0 million representing foreign cost for production of PVC pipes.

SECTION 6: SUMMARY OF PROJECT STATUS, TREND, AND MAJOR PROBLEMS:

An area of 3,300 feddans has been selected in Beni Suef for the installation of a pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes. All preparatory works have been completed. The procurement of 200,000 m of ready made PVC pipes is underway. The contract for the construction of the one pumping station of the project has been awarded. Action is being taken for the procurement of the project equipment. A technico-economic study to determine the number, capacity and location of PVC pipe making plants is being conducted by a consultant firm, appointed by the co-financier (USAID) and it is expected to be completed in May. Procurement of chemicals and equipment for the Bilharzia control program is underway.

Section 7: Actions Taken or Recommended

Letters have been sent to the Chairman of EPADP (Annex 1-A) and to the Undersecretary of the Ministry of Health (Annex 1-B and 1-C) raising various points related to the findings of the supervision mission.

Cables have been sent to the Chairman of EPADP asking to accelerate the formalities for the award of ready-made PVC pipes required for the pilot drainage scheme (Annex 1-D), approving the award of the pumping station (Annex 1-E) and asking to provide additional transportation facilities to the Ministry of Health (Annex 1-F).

We wish to express our appreciation and thanks for the assistance and hospitality extended by you and your staff to Messrs. Economides and Schumacher on their recent visit to review progress on the drainage projects.

We were very pleased to learn from the mission, and subsequently from the Egyptian delegation, that the main problem that EPADP faced in the past, the allocation of local funds, was on the way to being solved, and that sufficient funds had been allocated by the Government for this fiscal year. This, we trust, will allow EPADP to proceed with the implementation of the program without further delays.

We were also pleased to hear from the mission that action had been taken for the implementation of the pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes. We understand that an area of about 3,300 feddans has been selected near Beni Suef, all preparatory works have been completed and that a local contractor has been appointed for the execution of the project. Unfortunately, we understand that no decision had been made for the award of the contract for the procurement of the pipes, even action will be taken in this direction and that we will soon receive pilot drainage scheme of Beni Suef be implemented as soon as possible to allow EPADP's staff and contractors to gain experience in the new drainage technique before large-scale application.

Another matter of concern is the delays which occurred in the preparation of tender documents for the procurement of equipment for remodelling of open drains under the Upper Egypt Drainage II Project. Since remodelling of open drains is work that should precede the installation of field drainage, we recommend that immediate action be taken for the procurement of the required equipment in order to proceed according to the implementation schedule of the project.

We also believe that action needs to be taken soon for the preparation of tender documents for the installation of field drainage through ICB. We understand that the technico-economic study conducted by USAID for determining the number, size and location of the PVC pipe plants is being completed. The tender documents for the installation of field drainage could, therefore, be prepared as soon as the final decisions are made for the production of PVC pipes.

We were glad to learn that a decision had been made for the construction of a store for spare parts in Asyut and that the location of the store had already been selected. A similar decision needs to be made for the establishment of a training center for EPADP's staff in Upper Egypt, preferably in the Minieh area.

The mission also informed us that the cost accounting unit for drainage works is in the process of being established. We are looking forward to receiving the plan of work of this unit, promised for April 1977.

The importance of establishing a monitoring and evaluation system on the effect of drainage works on crop yields is a subject which we have repeatedly discussed. In our letter of January 21, 1977, we suggested a way in which a long-term monitoring and evaluation program might be organized. We were happy to learn from Mr. Economides that the results of the crash program, being carried out in the Governorates of Menufiya and Minieh, will be made available to us before June 1977. I would also like to draw to your attention the fact that, as agreed at the Nile Delta Drainage II negotiations, a complete evaluation report of the Nile Delta Drainage I project is expected to be received before June 30, 1978.

Concerning the socio-economic study, the mission informed us that a general socio-economic survey is now being carried out by Professor A. Goueli in collaboration with the Ford Foundation and that this survey will be completed by October 1977. We understand that a supplementary study of the ability of the beneficiaries of the drainage works to pay for the investment, operation and maintenance costs will be conducted subsequently and be completed before June 1978. We would appreciate receiving the terms of reference and the draft questionnaire for this supplementary study for review before June 30, 1977.

Finally, we would like to express our concern for the delays in the procurement of field drainage maintenance equipment and, in particular, flushing pumps. We believe that the field drainage maintenance units should be provided with this type of equipment, and we urge you to take the necessary action.

Draft Paragraph for President's Report

The credit/loan became effective on January 31, 1977. An area of 3,300 feddans has been selected for the installation of a pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes. All preparatory works for this scheme have been completed. The procurement of 200,000 m of ready made PVC pipes is underway.

The contract for the construction of the one pumping station of the project has been awarded. Action is being taken for the procurement of the project equipment.

Execution of the Project

- 1. Pumping station. One small pumping station (Menshat-El-Dhahab) is included in the projects works. Government has suggested and IDA/Bank approved to award the construction of this station to the contractors of the four pumping stations of the Upper Egypt Drainage I Project. Agreement was reached on the unit prices and works are expected to start soon.
- 2. Pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes. During negotiations, agreement was reached that EPADP will install during the first year of the project a pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes on about 10,000 feddans for the purpose of carrying out technical and costing studies and of gaining experience on the use of PVC pipes. Due to delays occurring in the preparation of tender documents for the PVC pipe making plants, financed by USAID, it was agreed by the Bank to procure through ICB an amount of 200,000 m of ready-made PVC pipes to be used for the pilot drainage scheme on a reduced area of 2,000 feddans. procurement of the pipes is underway while an area of 3,300 feddans near Beni Suef has been selected for the installation of the pilot scheme. The reason 3,300 feddans have been selected for this purpose instead of 2,000 feddans is that soil conditions in this particular area allow a larger field drainage spacing of 60 m. Two main open drains serve the selected area (Ehnasia Khadra and Bani Bekhit). The two drains have been already remodelled, therefore, the scheme is ready for implementation. EPADP has appointed a local contractor (High Dam Co) for the execution of the project. It is expected that works will start by August 1977 and completed in three months. The mission stressed the need for organizing an intense training program for EPADP's staff on the new drainage technique and for establishing a system for monitoring the function of field drainage with PVC pipes and its effect on crop yields and soil proper-

PVC pipe making plants. A technico-economic study to determine the number, capacity and location of PVC pipe making plants is being conducted by a consultant firm appointed by the cofinancier (USAID) responsible for the production of PVC pipes. The study is expected to be completed in May 1977. According to preliminary findings of the study, three plants will be required: one in Beni Suef, one in Asyut and one in Qena. The areas for the installation of the plants have already been selected. All of them are located close to the main road and are provided with electricity and water. In each plant two extruders will be installed of a capacity each of 180 kg per hour (1,000 m of pipes per hour per plant). Operation is expected to be 20 hours a day or 5,000 hours a year. Therefore, the annual capacity of each plant will be 5,000,000 m of pipes which is sufficient to cover about 50,000 feddans per year. The building required for each plant is a 60 x 30 m simple structure with traditional steel frame. The construction of the buildings will be done by EPADP using local contractors. Discussions are underway between Government and USAID about the operation of the PVC plants. It appears that an agreement is underway with the National Plastic Co, an Egyptian nationalized firm, to run the factories.

Three expatriate technicians (one per plant) and one expatriate consultant will be required to provide the necessary expertise and training. The tender for the procurement of the plants is scheduled for issue in July 1977 and it is expected that at least one plant will be operational in October 1978.

- 4. <u>Procurement</u>. Preparation of tender documents and specifications for the procurement of draglines, excavators and other equipment for the remodelling of open drains is underway. Preparation of tender documents for the installation of field drainage through ICB will start as soon as final decisions on the production sites of PVC pipes are made.
- 5. <u>Bilharzia control</u>. Snail control operations in the area between Dariut and Asyut Barrages (120,000 feddans) have started for the first time in March 1977. On the mission's departure an area of about 40,000 feddans commanded by Naghamedi West canal had been treated. A concentration of 1.6 mg/l of molluscicide was applied. It is expected that this phase of snail control will be completed by end of April 1977.

Organization and Management

- Organization and staffing. The Chairman of EPADP, Eng. Mahmoud Saad El Din El Guindy, has been appointed as Vice Minister of Irrigation while still keeping the post of Chairman of EPADP. The Design Section has been strenthened to cope with the increased needs for field drainage design work. At present 20 engineers are working in this Section. Forty technicians graduated from the Technical Institute for Survey have been recruited by EPADP. After a short on-the-job training, these technicians will replace engineers in the supervision of field drainage installation. A special new allowance, varying from LE 15 to 40 per month, is now paid to the engineers working with EPADP. In view of the above measures, no serious problem of shortage of engineers is foreseen.
- 2. Office facilities. No progress was made with the construction of new offices for EPADP, the buildings being still in the foundation stage.

Thank you for your letter of May 17th. Dr. Mobarak, while here for negotiations, requested inclusion of at least 40 jeeps in the project equipment list and Desmond agreed. The number of pickups was reduced to 20 but as you will notice in the list of additional equipment under the ongoing projects we have increased the number of pickups from 20 to 30. Finally, for the trucks we have requested EPADP to deliver immediately one more truck to the Ministry of Health and we have included in the list of additional equipment under the ongoing projects one more. So in total four trucks will be provided under the ongoing projects and two more under the new project.

The allocation for Bilharzia under the new proposed project was US\$10.40 million. After deduction of US\$2.00 million for contingencies (for which we had to use the Bank's formula) an amount of US\$8.40 remained for equipment, chemicals and freight and insurance. In order to accommodate the increased number of jeeps in this restricted budget I had to reduce the molluscicide to 600 tons. I was encouraged to do this by your remarks that they will have savings under the ongoing projects.

We wish to express our appreciation and thanks for the assistance and hospitality extended by you and your staff to Messra. Economides and Schumacher on their recent visit to review progress on the drainage projects.

We were very pleased to learn from the mission, and subsequently from the Egyptian delegation, that the main problem that EPADP faced in the past, the allocation of local funds, was on the way to being solved, and that sufficient funds had been allocated by the Government for this fiscal year. This, we trust, will allow EPADP to proceed with the implementation of the program without further delays.

We were also pleased to hear from the mission that action had been taken for the implementation of the pilot drainage scheme with PVC pipes. We understand that an area of about 3,300 feddans has been selected near Beni Suef, all preparatory works have been completed and that a local contractor has been appointed for the execution of the project. Unfortunately, we understand that no decision had been made for the award of the contract for the procurement of the pipes, even though the opening of bids took place six weeks ago. We trust that action will be taken in this direction and that we will soon receive your recommendation for award. It is extremely important that the pilot drainage scheme of Beni Suef be implemented as soon as possible to allow EPADP's staff and contractors to gain experience in the new drainage technique before large-scale application.

Another matter of concern is the delays which occurred in the preparation of tender documents for the procurement of equipment for remodelling of open drains under the Upper Egypt Drainage II Project. Since remodelling of open drains is work that should precede the installation of field drainage, we recommend that immediate action be taken for the procurement of the required equipment in order to proceed according to the implementation schedule of the project.

We also believe that action needs to be taken soon for the preparation of tender documents for the installation of field drainage through ICB. We understand that the technico-economic study conducted by USAID for determining the number, size and location of the PVC pipe plants is being completed. The tender documents for the installation of field drainage could, therefore, be prepared as soon as the final decisions are made for the production of PVC pipes.

We were glad to learn that a decision had been made for the construction of a store for spare parts in Asyut and that the location of the store had already been selected. A similar decision needs to be made for the establishment of a training center for EPADP's staff in Upper Egypt, preferably in the Minieh area.

The mission also informed us that the cost accounting unit for drainage works is in the process of being established. We are looking forward to receiving the plan of work of this unit, promised for April 1977.

The importance of establishing a monitoring and evaluation system on the effect of drainage works on crop yields is a subject which we have repeatedly discussed. In our letter of January 21, 1977, we suggested a way in which a long-term monitoring and evaluation program might be organized. We were happy to learn from Mr. Economides that the results of the crash program, being carried out in the Governorates of Menufiya and Minieh, will be made available to us before June 1977. I would also like to draw to your attention the fact that, as agreed at the Nile Delta Drainage II negotiations, a complete evaluation report of the Nile Delta Drainage I project is expected to be received before June 30, 1978.

Concerning the socio-economic study, the mission informed us that a general socio-economic survey is now being carried out by Professor A. Goueli in collaboration with the Ford Foundation and that this survey will be completed by October 1977. We understand that a supplementary study of the ability of the beneficiaries of the drainage works to pay for the investment, operation and maintenance costs will be conducted subsequently and be completed before June 1978. We would appreciate receiving the terms of reference and the draft questionnaire for this supplementary study for review before June 30, 1977.

Finally, we would like to express our concern for the delays in the procurement of field drainage maintenance equipment and, in particular, flushing pumps. We believe that the field drainage maintenance units should be provided with this type of equipment, and we urge you to take the necessary action.

I apologise for the delay in replying to your letter of March 22 in which you refer to my letter of January 7 in regard to the procurement of drainage machines to be purchased by the Egyptian Drainage Authority in connection with the Bank's drainage project in Egypt. I also acknowledge receipt of the attachment to your letter in connection with the terms of USAID tenders.

The USAID tenders refer to the procurement of equipment and materials for the production of plastic pipes for underground drainage being procured under the USAID-whotly-financed component of the Upper Egypt Drainage II project. Consequently, the Bank's international competitive bidding procedures do not apply to this procurement which is wholly financed by USAID. Re: Consultative Group Project List

We have been reviewing the Memorandum on Programs and Projects Suggested for Foreign Financing, prepared by the Ministry of Planning in February 1977 for use by participants in the meeting of the Consultative Group for Egypt, to be held in Paris on May 11 and 12. We would welcome your assistance, and that of the other high officials to whom we are sending copies, in reconciling the projects for agriculture and drainage with those for which the World Bank has made loans or credits, or for which it has been asked so to do.

We should also be grateful if you could tell us whether the projects mentioned, that is, those in the project list and those for which loans have been requested, are included in the draft national five year plan. In addition, it would be helpful if you would indicate the time frame in which you expect these projects to be carried out.

Agriculture Projects

The project list includes three general headings (plant production, and animal production in the old lands, and horizontal expansion projects). For plant production, estimated local and foreign exchange investment costs of LE58.2 million and LE 9.1 million are shown. Please could you tell us whether this heading includes the Schag-Minufiya Agricultural Development Project, being prepared by the Ministry of Agriculture and the PAC/World Bank Cooperative Program. We understand that this project is estimated to have a foreign exchange cost of about LE 20 million. We understand that USAID has also been asked by the Government to finance an agricultural development project in the old lands, and should like to know whether this project is reflected in the project list. In any case, we should welcome further details of the "project" included in the list.

Drainage Projects

The project list includes the following statement: "Implement covered drainage projects covering 900 thousand feddans and open drainage projects covering 966 thousand feddans. Complete 15 pumping stations in

the Delta and Upper Egypt serving an area of 800 thousand feddans. Construct an additional 13 pumping stations serving an area of 550 thousand feddans. Investment costs of LE 155 million local currency and LE 15 million foreign exchange are shown.

The World Bank is, as you know, contributing to three ongoing projects and one for which a proposed loan and credit have been negotiated. The areas proposed to be drained are as follows:

Please could you tell us whether the item in the project list refers to part of the program of the Egyptian Public Authority for Drainage Projects, financed by the World Bank, or whether the areas are additional to this current program. If they are included, please could you tell us which parts of which projects are included. If they are additional, please could you indicate whether it is the Government's intention that the work be carried out by EPAD, and if so what extra resources will be given to EPAD to enable it to increase its program in this way.

In order to enable us to discuss the project list with potential

financiers at the Consultative Group meeting, we should welcome your urgent response to the above comments. We are in process of reviewing the other items on the list, and shall be writing to you again in the near future.

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Granting small-holders exemptions from agricultural EGT-Nil Hello (2) land tax, and related supplementary taxes and dues, as well as

Defence and National Security Taxes*

On behalf of the People,

The President of the Republic,

The People's Assembly has approved, and WE hereby promulgate the following Law, the text of which reads:

Article 1 - Without prejudice to the exemptions granted by Law No. 370 of 1953, alleviating the tax on small-holders of agricultural land, any landlord whose total holdings in all parts of the Republic shall not exceed three feddans, shall be exempted from the agricultural land-tax and all related supplementary taxes.

Any landlord whose holdings throughout the Republic shall not exceed three feddans shall be exempted from the Defence and National Security taxes.

Such exemptions shall not apply, if such person's property and holdings shall exceed three feddans.

In all cases, such exemptions shall not apply to any acreage under fruit-bearing trees, nor shall they apply if it shall be proved that the taxpayer receives any income from other than agricultural activity.

Article 2 - The Minister of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade, in agreement with the Ministers of Justice and Agriculture, shall determine * Official Gazette - No. 28 (bis) dated July 14, 1973.

the rules of application of such exemptions, formalities establishing property ownership and holdings within the context of this Law, method of verification, manner of appeal, and times of regulation of such (exemptions).

- Article 3 Exemptions provided for in this Law shall fall due on the basis of property or holding on January 1 of each year, regardless of any changes or modifications that shall occur during the year.
- Article 4 Any taxpayer who owns, or holds, three feddans or less, in

 one location or more, the total acreage of which shall not be

 under fruit-bearing trees, and who shall have no source of

 income from other than agricultural activity, shall submit to

 the competent Property Tax Commission, notification of such,

 within two months of the date of publication of this Law.

Any landlord or landholder whose property or holding or source of income undergoes any change entailing lapse of the exemptions shall submit such notification in December of each year.

Article 5 - Any taxpayer who shall enjoy such exemption, without being rightfully entitled thereto, by deliberately giving erroneous information in the notification provided for in the preceding Article, or who resorts to illegal means resulting in enjoyment of the exemptions without being rightfully entitled thereto, shall be liable for double the tax he sought to evade, in

accordance with the rules and procedures to be determined by Decree of the Minister of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade. Such decree shall establish how and when appeals shall be lodged.

Article 6 - This Law shall be published in the Official Gazette, and shall come into force on January 1, 1973. The Minister of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade shall enact the Becrees in implementation thereof.

This Law shall be stamped with the Seal of the State, and implemented as one of the Laws of the Land.

Issued at the Presidency of the Republic on Gumada II, 14, 1393 (July 14, 1973).

Explanatory Memorandum Draft Law No. 51 of 1973

The agricultural land tax comprises certain exemptions granted by Law No. 370 of 1953 to certain (categories) of small-holding landlords. These can be summarized as follows:

- a Any taxpayer whose assessed land tax does not exceed LE 4 per annum shall be exempted from land-tax.
- b Taxpayers whose assessed land tax exceeds LE 4, and is less than LE 20 per annum, shall be exempted from LE 4 of the tax per annum. This exemption shall include taxes supplementary to the land tax (Governorate Council Dues).

These exemptions have not, in fact, achieved their purpose. Small farmers are still contributing to overall imposts, a share that far exceeds their abilities, which is incompatible with the concept of the socialist community the State is striving to develop. It is essential that tax burdens and general imposts must be redistributed in a manner that is consistent with the socialist policies pursued by the State.

It is therefore very relevant, at this phase in our people's history, that the tax system be reviewed, particularly agricultural land tax, because of its obvious impact on the life of the toiling mass of farmers. This can be done by providing for more exemptions for small-property owners to attain an equitable distribution of the tax burden.

To this end, it has been seen fit to exempt any taxpayer who owns or holds no more than three feddans throughout the Republic, from the

agricultural land tax and the Defence and National Security taxes and any taxes supplementary to the land tax (Governorate Council Dues), if such property or holding is not under fruit-bearing trees, since such lands provide remunerative income. A further condition is that the taxpayer should have no income from any source other than agriculture, such (new exemptions) to run parallel with those provided for in Law No. 370 of 1953.

The attached draft Law has therefore been drawn up. Article 1 stipulates that any taxpayer whose total property, in all parts of the Republic, does not exceed three feddans shall be exempted of the agricultural land tax and all related supplementary taxes (Defence, National Security and Governorate Council Dues), in addition to the exemptions provided for in Law No. 370 of 1953. Paragraph 2 of the same Article provides that any person whose landholding does not exceed three feddans shall be exempted from the Defence and National Security Taxes. Consequently, a land-holder whose holdings exceed three feddans shall not be exempted, even if taxes are governed by the provisions of paragraph 1. Paragraph 3 of this Article stipulates that such exemptions shall not apply if total property owned, and holdings held, by the taxpayer exceed three feddens, nor shall such exemptions apply to acreage under fruit-bearing trees. Paragraph 4 lays down, as a condition for benefiting from exemptions from agricultural land-tax and Defence and National Security Taxes, that the taxpayer earn no income from other than agricultural sources.

To ensure flexibility and simplify formalities, Article 2 provides that the Minister of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade, in agreement with the

Minister of Justice, shall by decree, determine the principles defining properties governed by the context of this law, and shall regulate verification and appeal formalities.

Article 3 provides that exemption shall be assessed on property or holdings on January 1 of each year, regardless of any changes to the property or holding during the year.

Article 4 makes it incumbent on any taxpayer, who owns or holds three feddans or less in one location or more, whose property or holdings are not partly or wholly under fruit-bearing trees, or who has no income from any other source save agriculture, to notify the competent Property Tax Commission of such (property or holding) within two months of publication of the Law. It also provides that any landlord or land-holder, whose property or holding undergoes any change, or who acquires a source of income making him ineligible for the exemptions, to submit such notification in December of each year.

Article 5 determines the penalties for any taxpayer who benefits from the exemptions, without being rightfully entitled to them, and who does not submit notification, or who sets down erroneous information in such notification, or resorts to illegal means resulting in benefit from such exemptions without being rightfully entitled thereto.

In view of the possibilities of any difficulty to detect deception and fraud which might be practiced in order to benefit from the provisions of the law without rightful entitlement, Article 6 provides for a reward to any person who can give information on any taxpayer who enjoys such exemptions without being rightfully entitled thereto, in order to encourage

detection of such persons.

Article 7 stipulates that this Law shall be published in the Official Gazette and shall come into force on January 1, 1973 (in order to tally with the Taxation year) and to bring out the impact such exemptions will make on the farming masses anticipating all corrective and rectificative action.

The Law also provides that the Minister of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade shall enact decrees needed to implement the Law.

The Ministry of Finance, Economy and Foreign Trade has the honor to submit the draft Law attached, with the request that all necessary action be taken to have it promulgated.

During the recent Appraisal Mission in Egypt, H. E. The Minister, Dr. Ibrahim Badran, stated that health centres and units in Upper Egypt needed strengthening in relation to the proposed expansion of Bilharzia control under the Delta Drainage II loan.

Dr. Mobarak, Under Secretary of State at the Ministry, considers that the necessary strengthening can come from improved communications - for the purposes of delivery and supervision of chemotherapy under the project. I fully agree with this since it is clear that the health services are generally very variable in quality!

It may well be that Dr. Mobarak will want to discuss a possible programme for Rural Health service development in Egypt when he comes to the loan negotiating meeting later this month. I thought you might like to know the background of the issue. In my opinion the Minister was not well informed about all the existing services and Snail Control units in Upper Egypt, but he is, of course, right about the need for better ones - or rather better quality personnel!

Dear Desmond,

I am writing this short note because my reports may arrive too late for your deliberations with Dr. Mobarak at the negotiation meeting. I had a round-up meeting with him before leaving Cairo and expressed our concern regarding the apparent lack of management control of transport, about which I am sure Paris has informed you.

There are also, it seems, difficulties about payment of local costs which can affect our programme, for example fuel costs: incentive payments for drivers; payment of adequate labour. I don't know whether this is a matter of a real cash-flow problem or simply poor administration.

Dr. Mobarak will probably now ask for some more transport to strengthen communications in certain districts of Upper Egypt in relation to proposed chemotherapy there. This has really arisen out of the Minister's idea that health units and centres might be improved in number and distribution from this loan. Dr. Mobarak clearly understands that this cannot be and considers them adequate for the present chemotherapy, although he now wishes to improve communications by increasing the number of vehicles under the loan. I think that this might amount to 6-8 jeeps at the most and I believe they can be obtained out of our contingencies.

As Paris will have told you, I am concerned about their management of the existing transport - although much of it was purchased from local resources and is therefore regarded as fair game for everyone to use. Dr. Mobarak assured me that a strict control would be maintained in future!

The present snail control work is progressing well as is the chemotherapy and evaluation although greater supervision must be generally applied.

Loan Committee Clearance

1. Apart from the question regarding cost recovery which was the subject of a special Loan Committee meeting and which will be covered in a separate note, the following comments were received from Mr. Horsley on behalf of Mr. Knapp on March 17, 1977, on the terms and conditions of the project, submitted to the Loan Committee under cover of Mr. Benjenk's memorandum of March 11, 1977:

UNDP - Water Master Plan

- 2. Referring to para. 4 of Mr. Paijman's memorandum to Mr. Benjenk, dated March 4, 1977, which mentions the Bank's contribution of \$850,000 to the UNDP Water Master Plan study, Mr. Knapp would like to be informed (i) as to when he had authorized financing for the study under a Bank project and (ii) why the \$850,000 are referred to as the Government's contribution to the study.
- 3. As to (i) above, Messrs. McNamara and Knapp had approved Bank financing on November 30, 1976. As to (ii) above, the Project document for the UNDP study, which was signed on January 16, 1977, specifies that as part of the Government's input to the project it would borrow as distinct from obtaining a grant from UNDP for the remainder of the foreign funds from the Bank/IDA the foreign funds not covered under the UNDP grant. The \$850,000 are considered as the Government's foreign exchange cash contribution which in turn will have to be paid back to the Bank/IDA under the legal arrangements for the proposed drainage project.

Special Fund

4. Referring to para. 4 of Mr. Paijman's memorandum which calls for the establishment of a special fund to help ensure the timely allocation of local funds for the project, Mr. Knapp requests that in case the Egyptian delegation should not accept such special fund the matter would have to be referred back to him.

Condition of effectiveness of co-financing

5. Mr. Horsley explained Mr. Knapp's preference for having cross conditions of effectiveness with respect to the proposed US AID co-financing under the project. The loan documents call for the signing — as distinct from the declaration of effectiveness — of the US AID loan as a condition of effectiveness of the Bank/IDA loan/development credit agreements. I explained that this had been proposed since US AID financing — which would be used for the production of PVC pipes for field drains — would not be required until some time in 1978, about one year after disbursements

under Bank/IDA loan and credit will have started. Mr. Horsley conveyed this explanation to Mr. Knapp who accepted it.

Disbursements

6. Mr. Knapp would like to see a specific mentioning in the President's and Appraisal reports of the way in which the IDA, Bank and Third Window funds will be disbursed. These reports will therefore reflect the disbursement mechanism already spelled out in paras. 4(b), (c) and (d) of Schedule 1 to the draft Development Credit Agreement.

Procurement under Bilharzia control program

7. Mr. Sella on behalf of Mr. Broches raised a question as to the appropriateness of international competitive bidding for molluscicides and drugs for chemotherapy for Bilharzia (para. 69 of President's report). At present, only one manufacturer (in West Germany) is known to produce both these products and a licensee (in the US) is known to produce the molluscicide. Mr. Sella suggested therefore that procurement of these items which are estimated to cost about \$9.2 million should be treated as proprietary in character. After checking with Mr. van der Tak and Dr. J. Lee — the latter confirmed that the molluscicides and drugs for chemotherapy produced by the above mentioned manufacturer and licensee have proven to be the only effective ones and are the only ones accepted by WHO for use in Egypt — the legal documents for negotiations will reflect this procurement procedure.

we were glad to learn that the Bilharzia Control project came into life and progress has been made in the treatment of a larger part of the population in the project area.

The very good acceptability and a very low rate of negligible adverse reactions were of special interest to us.

Under the assumption that you may consider the continuation of that project we deem it advisable to inform you about the actual costs and terms of delivery concerning BILARCIL (metrifonate).

Referring to our letter of 14th November 1975 we were forced to adjust the price for BILARCIL due to the well-known increased costs of production up to DM 50,- FOB per tin of 1.000 tablets (which is equivalent to US\$ 20,83 according to the present rate of exchange).



This price has been invoiced to all customers world-wide since the beginning of 1976. For the Bilharzia Control project, however, we have, as an exception, maintained the price of US\$ 16,- FOB per tin of 1.000 tablets, as pointed out in our a.m. letter, until August 1976.

Our today's quotation is, as mentioned above, DM 50,- FOB (= US\$ 20,83) per tin of 1.000 BILARCIL tablets for all shipments/deliveries carried out during 1977 and 1978.

Being of the opinion that again larger quantities of BILARCIL may be requested for the project, we would appreciate very much to learn the approximate amount of tablets as soon as possible.

This information will facilitate our forward production-planning.

The estimated time of delivery for large quantities is 7 months after receipt of the order. In general we will be bound to the following timing (our letter of 14.11.75 refers):

1 month to prepare production

4 months for manufacturing

1 month for packing, transport to German port and loading

1 month for transport to Egyptian port of destination.

In this connection we would be grateful to know the total requirement and also whether shipment has to take place in one lot, or whether it has to be split, as it has been the case in 1976.

With this information at hand we can try to influence Dr. Saif to place order(s) well in time.

It might be possible, however, that he will not be the only one to decide on those rather commercial arrangements. If the order would be placed too late, shipment might be delayed which would possibly jeopardize the timely availability of the drug in the project area.

It would therefore be in the interest of the project and its uninterrupted continuation if the necessity of timely ordering will be brought to the attention of the Egyptian authorities concerned also by your Advising and Coordinating Board of Project Management.

Every comment from your side on any of the afore-mentioned considerations will be highly appreciated.

1. Inadequate provision of local currency has been a serious and delaying problem since early 1976 for several Bank/IDA-supported projects in Egypt. Projects mainly affected are Population, Tourah Cement, Talkha Fertilizer and the drainage projects. During my recent visit to Cairo I discussed the local currency problem with the Ministers of Finance, Economy and Planning. We discussed the matter on the basis of Bank staff estimates of local currency requirements from the central budget for all Bank/IDA-financed projects.

For calendar year 1977 the requirements are as follows:

- 3. The Ministers (Finance, Planning, Economy) confirmed that the required amount had been included in the 1977 budget and that a procedure had been agreed upon whereby the disbursement of these budgeted funds required approval from the Ministry of Economy to avoid situations where operating agencies allocated these funds for other projects.
- 4. The information I handed to the Ministers also included estimates of local currency requirements for Bank/IDA projects under implementation for four years. It was agreed that this should be updated annually in the light of revised implementation schedules and added project prior to the ratification of the budget.

> Following discussions with Mr. Haynes on March 4 on the documents being prepared for the Loan Committee for the Nile Delta II project, it was decided to recall Mr. Kiermayr to Washington following the completion of his second visit to Greece scheduled for early next week with a view to having Mr. Kiermayr here for the Loan Committee discussions which is anticipated to take place next Thursday or Friday. Following the Loan Committee discussions, Mr. Kiermayr would be involved in revising the yellow cover with change list in preparation for negotiations and gray cover. Consequently, I rang Mr. Hardison in Damascus on March 3 to inform him of the above and asked him to convey to Mr. Kiermayr this decision. I stressed that Mr. Kiermayr should proceed to Greece on March 6 as scheduled, should endeavor to complete his work on the Evros Project on Monday and return on Tuesday. However, if necessary he can extend his stay in Greece in order to complete his work but should make every possible effort to return to Washington on Wednesday next. He should cable his return to Washington so that his family could be informed.

I informed Mr. Hardison that I very much regretted having to recall Mr. Kiermayr which would mean that he would have to carry out the Supervision of the Afghanistan Livestock projects on his own.

I received a telephone call from Mr. Kiermayr from Salonica reporting on his evaluation of the operational projections for the sugar company. He said that he had reviewed all the data prepared by the company with Mr. Gregory, Loan Officer. The assumptions used were acceptable. However, the projections did not include the expansion of the Orestias factory included in the project. Consequently, he had requested them to rework the figures to include the expansion of the Orestias factory by Saturday, March 5. Mr. Kiermayr proposed to proceed from Damascus to Afghanistan via Athens on Sunday, March 6 spending one or two days in Salonica reviewing the revised projections which the

sugar company stated they would have completed by March 5. I agreed with this proposal and indicated that on completion of his review, he should cable his findings to the Bank and have his detailed findings and projections airmailed.

Mr. Kiermayr indicated that in all projections the company had included 9% physical contingencies but price contingencies were not included and these applied also to figures which had been given to Mr. Hussain prior to his departure from Greece. He requested that Mr. Hussain be informed of this situation which I have done. Mr. Kiermayr mentioned that, prior to his leaving Egypt, he had written a report and handed it to Mr. Eschenberg to be brought to the Bank. Mr. Eschenberg is expected back on March 6.

In regard to the financing of the Egyptian drainage projects for 1977, Mr. Kiermayr informed me that when he left, the situation had not been finalized and that it was hoped that prior to Mr. Eschenberg's leaving Egypt, confirmation that adequate local funds had been provided for 1977 for the drainage projects, including Nile Delta II project presently under appraisal, would have been approved by the Parliament.

In regard to the inclusion of the Upper Egypt and the Nile Delta Drainage projects in the five-year plan under preparation, Mr. Kiermayr confirmed that this had been done.

Dear Desmond,

On the eve of my departure from Cairo I will give you a brief run down on the first leg of my mission.

The work with EPADP becomes increasingly difficult. Mr. El Guindy has become Vice-Minister of Irrigation. That means he only spends part time on EPADP's business. He has an office in the Ministry and is away from EPADP's office. But worst, he has taken EPADP's best man with him. Mr. Sawaf, a man trained by EDI who is best familiar with the Bank's work is now Mr. El Guindy's technical assistant and is also away from EPADP. Mr. William a man of limited use became a member of Parliament and has also left. Once Dr. Osman has been installed as the Chairman of the Water Master Plan, EPADP has been drained of its last strong hold.

I had intended to follow up on the cost recovery developments. This was not possible because there was nobody who could have accompanied me and in the Land Tax Department nobody speaks either English, French or German. To all other places I went alone. I made this situation well understood to Mr. El Guindy during our final meeting.

On Budget: EPADP has requested for 1977 LE 56.9 million. This included funds for weeks outside the three Bank projects. In the official budget proposal EPADP had been allocated LE 22 million. Mr. William has found some support among the members coming from the rural areas. He has introduced a motion to increase EPADP's budget to LE 35 million. Mr. El Guindy has been assured that EPADP's LE 10 million debt from the 1976 budget will be settled outside its present budget proposal. But that will have to be followed closely. Anyway today the Parliament will decide on the final budget. Mr. Eschenberg will bring home the news. For January - February 1977 EPADP has been given an advance of LE 2.2 million (10% of last year's budget). Mr. El Guindy is confident that with LE 35 million he would be able to carry out EPADP's program for 1977. If he would get less he would be in bad shape! So much on the budget.

On the socio-economic study: My working paper for the study was well received and cleared. The study has been commissioned to Dr. Ahmed A. Goueli, Professor and Chairman of the Department of Agr. Economics of Zagajig University. On paper an impressive fellow. With him I discussed the study. He will now prepare the detailed outline of the sutdy. Mr. El Guindy has asked me to stop in Cairo on my way back to have a look at this and clear the final design of the study. I expressed reservations because I will be away long enough. Any way he told me that he would contact you in that matter. The study has become overnight an important issue.

Mr. Imam, the Minister of Planning and outspoken opponent of EPADP has suggested that if drainage is as useful as EPADP claims it is, than farmers should pay for it. How about that? According to his suggestions, farmers should make a down payment and pay the rest in 3 - 4 years! He argues if these projects have rates of return of more than 20% and yields are expected to increase by about 20% than farmers should be able to pay. The recovered money should be channeled into a special fund out of which EPADP could draw resources for its drainage works. How about that! Now everybody has been on the study although this plan is still top secret after the riots a couple of weeks ago. Anyway El Guindy wants the study to determine the beneficiaries ability to pay. So if you want me to have a look of what the professor finally comes up with fair enough. Preferably not. It could only beafter Afghanistan if they are furnished by them. Let me know. My honest opinion is that if we do not find people who are willing to live in the bush for sometime and find out at the grass roots what is happening, we should not be too optimistic. Intelligent guesses we can do ourselves. Anyway we should continue to press for this study.

On the exchange rate: Mr. Eschenberg, has discussed this issue with all Ministries concerned, including Finance and Economy. They all have agreed to use the parallel rate all the way. I explained the implications to Mr. El Guindy. Particularly the issue of exchange rate for the local cost component, we intend to finance. I made it clear to him that on the negotiating team there must be somebody who has the authority to speak on behalf of the Government on this issue.

On cost accounting: Obviously something has been done! EPADP has sent two engineers to the Netherlands to get acquainted with cost analysis of field drainage installations. Today EPADP received your letter dated February 9, on this issue. I was promised that the letter will be answered soon. The Dutch team intends to conduct a cost accounting exercise in their two pilot areas. Mr. Riesebos, a former Bank staff member, is here at the moment to install two Dutch experts who will implement the Dutch project during the next two years. This should be highly useful to us, as they are supposed to work out a cost accounting system which would then be applied to all of EPADP's drainage works.

On the Agricultural Development Project: I have received a policy paper from the Agricultural Bank in which our particular points of interest are treated. This is quite useful. They would like very much to use this project as vehicle to launch the new village bank approach which has been approved by the Cabinet and the Parliament. That should be enough for now. Tomorrow I shall proceed to Greece, to deal in sugar for a change.

Dear Dr. Webbe,

we herewith refer to your letter dated 4 february, 1977, by which you indicate that there may be an extension of Bilharzia control programme in Egypt and that our Eayluscide might be included in these schemes.

Concerning the likely cost for our product, we would like to point out the following: our price for Bayluscide 70 % w.p. has practically not been changed since 1974; this is also in line with our letter dated 3 December 1975 by which Bayer promised not to raise the price until 31 December, 1976. This information was passed on to the "Ministry of Public Health" in Cairo.

In 1977, we still maintain the price of DM 28,25 per kg, FOB European Sea port. This quotation will remain valid for the total quantity of 450 metric tons which should be supplied this year, according to the statement of Undersecretary of State Dr. Moubaragh on 17 January 1977 in Cairo to Mr. Brandt.

As we have been informed, the first letter of Credit for 100 tons will be opened by GONKOM in the next days.

After 3 years of maintaining our price on the same level, we are now obliged - due to increases in material, wages, packing material an other cost since 1974 - to change our quotation as follows:

Bayluscide WP 70 % at DM 29,66 per kilo FOB European Port packed in 50 kg fibredrums.

This quotation will become effective after we have executed the a.m. orders of 450 tons at the lower price of DM 28,25 per kilo FOB and will remain valid until 31 December 1978 provided that no essential increases of material, wages, packing material and other cost will influence our calculation.

Concerning the test kits, we may inform you that we have delivered already 10 kits and additionally 10.000 bags of Safranin by plane in order to avoid any problems during the application of Bayluscide.

SUBJECT:

EGYPT - Provision of Local Funds for Ongoing Drainage and the Proposed
Nile Delta II Drainage Projects

- Nile Delta II Drainage Project with Mr. El Gamhry, Deputy Chairman of the Egyptian Public Authority for Drainage Projects (EPADP). Mr. El Gamhry indicated that EPADP was in agreement with the Bank's proposal for reducing the scope of the project in order to take into account EPADP's implementation capacity for tile drainage. An agreement had already been reached in principle with USAID as to its participation in the project. The only "bottleneck" in proceeding with the project, as Mr. El Gamhry puts it, was the Minister of Planning who did not allocate the necessary funds to cover the local costs for the ongoing drainage projects (Nile Delta I, Upper Egypt I and Upper Egypt II) and the proposed Nile Delta II Project.
- 2. In a meeting with the Minister of Planning, Dr. Imam, he indicated that he had already informed Messrs. Benjenk and Paijmans during a meeting a few days earlier, that he saw no way of allocating more than LE 22 million during 1977 for drainage projects. He was aware that according to the Bank's estimates LE 47 million were required to finance the local costs of the ongoing Bank Group-financed projects and another LE 4.5 million for drainage projects exclusively financed by the Government. Although the Government gave highest priority to agriculture, no additional funds could be made available unless the People's Assembly decided to take them away from some other sector. Because of the large gap (LE 22 million versus LE 47 million) he did, however, not believe that possible shifts could close the gap. The logical conclusion therefore was to postpone the proposed Nile Delta II Project by at least another year. This was also justified because he had serious doubts that -- based on past experience -- EPADP could in effect meet the implementation schedule prepared by the Bank of 250,000 feddans of tile drainage in 1977 and of over 300,000 feddans thereafter.
- 3. Speaking in more general terms, Dr. Imam complained about the practice being followed in Egypt whereby Ministries (he mentioned the Ministry of Economy in particular) and agencies negotiated loans and credits with international and bilateral aid agencies without informing the Ministry of Planning and without taking into account overall budgetary constraints. The result was that projects were being appraised and in some instances loan agreements were negotiated and signed without the necessary local funds being available. Consequently, projects were delayed, cost increases occurred and Egypt had to pay large amounts of

money in commitment fees on loans undisbursed. The only solution to alleviate somewhat the shortage of local funds was for outside lenders to also provide local cost financing and to extend the project implementation period, thus reducing the burden on the annual budget.

4. I informed Dr. Shindy, Undersecretary, Ministry of Economy and Economic Cooperation, about the above discussion. His reaction was that we should not "worry" and that he would find "ways and means to make the necessary funds available." I told him, however, that based upon my discussions with the Minister of Planning, I did not believe that the Bank would be agreeable to invite for negotiations on the simple assurance that all funds required would be made available. We would most probably insist on some evidence that the LE 47 million mentioned above had been included in the 1977 budget and that specific amounts be included in the budgets for the following years. Dr. Shindy promised an answer within the next two to three weeks.

Terms of Reference - EGYPT - Supervision of Nile Delta I (Credit 181-EGT); Upper Egypt I (Credit 393-EGT); and Upper Egypt II (Credit 637/Loan 1285)

- On or about March 18, you should arrive in Egypt-for about two 1. weeks to supervise the subject projects.
- You will inspect work in the field and hold discussions in Cairo with the Egyptian Public Authority for Drainage Projects (EFADF), Ministry of Agriculture and Ministry of Health. On this occasion you will also discuss with the Government the issues of the Nile Delta Drainage II Project. You will be accompanied during some of your field visits and discussions by Mr. Schumacher of Rural Development Division; who will be familiarizing himself with the country with a view to subsequent identification of possible rural development projects or project components.
- Mr. Economides, during his field trip in Nile Delta and Upper Egypt, will pay particular attention to:
 - (a) progress with installation of tile drainage and remodelling;
 - (b) installation of machinery on the pipe making plants in Lower Egypt;
 - (c) construction of pumping stations both in Lower and Upper Egypt;
 - (d) use of gravel envelope in field drains;
 - (e) progress with the testing of collector pipe laying machine;
 - maintenance of drainage works and weed control measures;
 - (g) problem of cultivation of cotton and rice in the same plot and progress made with block cropping; and
 - (h) progress with evaluation of drainage works.
- Mr. Economides will discuss with EPADP in Cairo the problem of availability of local funds, progress with procurement, revision of construction schedule if necessary, management, organization and staffing, participation of the Extension Service in the drainage programs, progress with recovery of O&M and capital costs, and the impact of using the parallel exchange rate on EPADP's budget, on the transfer of equipment to contractors and on the cost recovery. He will also discuss with officials of the USAID regional office progress made in preparation of contracts for the procurement and installation of plants for the production of PVC pipes.

- 5. With the Ministry of Agriculture, Mr. Economides will discuss the concept of the Agricultural Development Project, prepared by the Government and IBRD/FAO Cooperative Program, and in particular the agricultural credit aspects. He will ascertain what further work needs to be done to make an early appraisal possible.
- Or. Webbe, during his field trip in Upper Egypt, will inspect the mollusciciding operations, the implementation of the chemotherapy orientation trial and the recording system at health centers and units. He will pay particular attention to the treatment with molluscicide of the small drains and tertiary canals and measures taken by the Ministry of Health for the followup of patients failing to complete their treatment with metrifonate. In Cairo Dr. Webbe will discuss the required logistics for carrying out the Bilharzia control program and he will help the Ministry of Health in revising the project list of equipment and materials.
- 7. The responsibilities of the mission members will be as follows:
 - (a) Mr. Economides will lead the mission and be responsible for drainage works; and
 - (b) Dr. Webbe will be responsible for the Bilharzia control programs.
- 8. Dr. Webbe is expected to leave Egypt on or about March 31. He will complete his contribution to the supervision's reports on his return to Egypt and will have it dispatched to Washington by April 10, 1977.
- 9. Before leaving Egypt the mission will discuss its findings with the Government officials. On its return to Washington, on or about April 4th, Mr. Economides will prepare a Back-to-office report focusing on matters of immediate concern, making recommendations for any urgent action necessary, and attaching drafts of letters and cables to be sent. Full Supervision Reports on the ongoing projects will subsequently be prepared.

Dear Dr. Mobarak:

We are happy to inform you that the loan and credit for the Upper Egypt Drainage II Project became effective on January 31, 1977. Consequently, disbursements of the allocated amount of US\$5.1 million under this project for the Bilharzia program, (including the US\$4.2 foreign exchange cost overrun of the Upper Egypt Drainage I Project), can start immediately. The total amount now available for the Bilharzia control program in Upper Egypt (up to Asyut Barrage) is shown below:

and services required for the completion of the Bilharzia control program under the two Upper Egypt Drainage projects, with the corresponding estimates for each item. The total amount should not exceed the amount available of US\$6.28 million, including contingencies. An example of this table is attached to this letter. Please note that the cost of the 20 pickups under procurement has not yet been disbursed, therefore, their value should be included in the cost estimates in the table.

We would also like to draw your attention to the following points, necessitating action on your part, which were agreed upon between Government and IDA/Bank during the negotiations of the Upper Egypt Drainage II Project:

- (a) The Ministry of Health shall prepare, not later than six months after the Effective Date, a plan for operation of the Bilharzia control program, acceptable to the IDA/Bank. Adequate provision should be made in the plan for the technical supervision of the snail control program. (Section 3.07 of Dev. Credit Agreement)
- (b) The Ministry of Health shall maintain a supervision and evaluation unit, satisfactory to IDA/Bank, which shall be responsible for the supervision and evaluation of the overall Bilharzia control program. (Section 3.10 of Dev. Credit Agreement)
- (c) The Ministry of Health shall maintain separate accounts for the Bilharzia control program, which should be audited by independent auditors, and furnish to the Bank the audit reports not later than four months after the end of each fiscal year. (Section 3.12 of Dev. Credit Agreement)

Please note that a supervision Bank mission to Egypt, including Dr. Webbe, is scheduled for March 18 to 31. The mission will further discuss with you all the above and any other matters.

EGYPT - Local Costs for Drainage Projects

After writing my memorandum of February 1 on our discussions in Cairo on local costs for drainage projects. I received a cable from Mr. Kaps in Cairo suggesting that the problem was far from solved. I telephoned Mr. Kaps who told me that the Minister of Planning had been informed by Mr. Kaissouni, Deputy Prime Minister. that he had told Mr. Benjenk that appropriate provision would be made in the plan both for the existing projects and the future project. The Minister of Planning had pointed out that this would only be possible if comparable reductions were made in other sectors and projects, since it would not be wise to increase the size of the plan. The Minister of Planning told Mr. Kaps that although some increase in the amounts allocated for drainage might be possible, he doubted whether the full amounts shown in the tables provided by the Bank would be available. In particular he felt that it would be difficult in the next two or three years to provide adequate funds for the existing projects, let alone any additional funds for the new project. The matter has now been referred back to the Ministry of Economy, which will presumably refer it again to Deputy Prime Minister Kaissouni. Mr. Kaps said he expected to have further information before he left Egypt.

Nile Delta Drainage II Project - Discussions

- 1. On February 18, 1977 you will go to Egypt for about three days. During your stay you should discuss with Government and project authority officials particularly the following matters:
 - (a) the socioeconomic study concerning the recovery of costs for field drainage installation; you should assist the staff of EPADP in preparing the terms of reference of this study along the Bank's guidelines for cost recovery of public sector projects and the Egyptian legal requirements;
 - (b) clarification of the following questions concerning the appraisal of the Nile Delta Drainage II Project:
 - (i) how are IDA/Bank financed project components treated in EPADP's budget and cost accounting;
 - (ii) at what exchange rate are they entered into EPADP's budget; how is equipment valued when it is transferred to contractors;
 - (iii) the exchange rate on which cost recovery calculations are based;
 - (iv) how are salaries treated in EPADP's budget;
 - (v) how are these matters likely to be affected by the proposed shift of all capital and intermediate goods imported to the parallel market;
 - (c) in anticipation of the Agricultural Development Project you should discuss with the managements of the Egyptian General Organization for Agricultural and Cooperative Credit and the Agricultural Credit and Cooperative Banks their plans for institutional changes and developments; you should indicate that the Bank is considering an Agricultural Development Project and discuss how such a project could become instrumental in the strengthening and reorganizing of these two organizations.

SUBJECT: EGYPT - Drainage Projects

- 1. Messrs. Benjenk, Paijmans and I discussed a number of problems on our existing and forthcoming drainage projects during our visit to Cairo in the latter part of January.
- 2. Local cost allocations for existing projects. The shortage of local funds for our three existing projects was discussed with the three economic ministers, the Minister of Planning and the Prime Minister. The table showing the local funds required for the projects, which had been attached to Mr. Eschenberg's letter to the Minister of Finance of January 18, 1977, was given to all concerned. We made the point repeatedly that the shortage of local funds was the major problem faced on a number of projects in Egypt, and that the shortfall was most accute on the drainage projects. The economic ministers had apparently not realized that the ₩E 50 million requirement of local funds for 1977 was purely for the existing projects, and that the proposed Nile Delta II project would not require funds until 1978. On this basis Deputy Prime Minister Kaissounl said that he would ensure that sufficient funds for the existing projects were included in the 1977 annual plan and budget. This may have to be done against the advice of the Minister of Planning, who seems to doubt that the drainage authority has the capacity to implement the volume of works envisaged for 1977. The Minister of Economy also told us that he would see to it that all the projects, including the Nile Delta II project, would be included in the medium-term plan. Mr. Benjenk made clear that we would need confirmation that the proposed project was in the plan before we negotiated it. I was not able to meet with the drainage authority, but left a note for Mr. Kaps reporting on our discussions with the economic ministers and asking him to inform the drainage authority of them.
- I also discussed the forthcoming project with Mr. Bakley in USAID. He had initially been worried that funding in 1977 for pipe manufacturing facilities would be premature, since the tile drainage program would not begin until 1980. However, after further discussions with some of his technical people, he concluded that it would take two years from the time of a USAID commitment to the time the manufacturing facilities were in operation. On this basis he asked whether a USAID commitment in October 1977 would be too late for us. I said that provided we were reasonably satisfied that it would be forthcoming, we could probably go ahead and present the project to our Executive Directors, making the commitment of USAID funds a condition of effectiveness. Since all our recent projects have taken at least four months to become effective, October 1977 looked alright. Mr. Bakley said that he thought USAID would probably have little difficulty in making the funds available, since a number of other projects in their program looked rather weak.

- 4. As requested, I checked on the signing of the agreement to release PL480 counterpart funds which could be used for the drainage projects. The agreement was signed while I was there, but the counterpart funds can apparently only be used for rather restrictive purposes, such as consultants for the preparation of feasibility studies.
- for the next project. He was distinctly unenthusiastic and said that provided the funds were in the budget we should have no difficulty. I pointed out that adequate budgetary provision was not always made and even when it was funds were sometimes not released, as in 1976. The Minister of Finance agreed that this had been a problem in the past, but he hoped to remedy it and negotiate a special fund, recognizing that we may find considerable opposition to it.

After writing my memorandum of February 1 on our discussions in Cairo on local costs for drainage projects, I received a cable from Mr. Kaps in Cairo suggesting that the problem was far from solved. I telephoned Mr. Kaps who told me that the Minister of Planning had been informed by Mr. Kaissouni, Deputy Prime Minister, that he had told Mr. Benjenk that appropriate provision would be made in the plan both for the existing projects and the future project. The Minister of Planning had pointed out that this would only be possible if comparable reductions were made in other sectors and projects, since it would not be wise to increase the size of the plan. The Minister of Planning told Mr. Kaps that although some increase in the amounts allocated for drainage might be possible, he doubted whether the full amounts shown in the tables provided by the Bank would be available. In particular he felt that it would be difficult in the next two or three years to provide adequate funds for the existing projects, let alone any additional funds for the new project. The matter has now been referred back to the Ministry of Economy, which will presumably refer it again to Deputy Prime Minister Kaissouni. Mr. Kaps said he expected to have further information before he left Egypt.
