No getting away from big games

A fter the euphoria of the All Ireland Senior and Under 21 Hurling successes over the past two weeks, it is back to the bread and butter of the club championship and what better way to start the closing stages with two big finals in Nenagh today.

From a North Bórd point of view, playing their two showpiece finals on the same day is not ideal but after a busy and expensive period for Tipperary supporters over the last three months or so, getting something back in terms of two big finals for the price of one is a reward for their loyalty.

First up is the intriguing Denis's Meats Intermediate Hurling Championship Final clash of Lower Ormond neighbours Borrisokane and Shannon Rovers.

At the start of the championship, you would have got long odds on this being the final pairing but both deserve their places in the final with the winner set to end a long wait for the Intermediate title.

It is a remarkable turnaround in fortunes for both sides.

Borrisokane didn't win a game in the 2008 Championship and appeared to be going nowhere despite having a talented squad. However, they have shown what we all knew was in them and have improved consistently over the past two years and their progression continued with a superb come from behind win over Newport last week.

While Borrisokane were a good outside bet to reach the final, Shannon Rovers wouldn't have featured on many people's potential final lists, that is outside the club itself. The club has suffered its fair share of heartache over the last three years or so and while it would have broken many a club, the Rovers have united and the scenes on the field following their semi-final win over Silvermines were worthy of the final itself. The first game today has plenty of potential storylines even before we get to the big game of the year in the division, the Hibernian Inn Senior Hurling Championship Final between Borris-Ileigh and Toomevara.

Because of Tipperary's successful run to the All Ireland Senior and Under 21 titles, the closing stages of the senior club championship will be congested so for the winners today not only will they collect the Frank McGrath Cup, they will also avoid potentially two extra rounds of the county senior championship by going straight to the quarter finals.

Borris-Ileigh come into the final with an unblemished record of six wins from six, including a four-point win over Toomevara in the very first round at the same venue on April 11th.

As the year has gone on the maroons have become stronger by the game in terms of the squad at their disposal so they will have plenty of options to choose from today. They have also shown a good level of maturity in winning many tight games with their defence playing a major role to date but they will need their forwards to fire in a big way if they are to win the championship for a 15th time.

Toomevara are looking for their 32nd North title but you have to go back to before 1991 when their current golden era of success began for the last time they went as long without winning the divisional title with 2006 being their most recent success.

Ominously they have improved as the campaign has gone on with their quarter and semi-final wins over Moneygall and Kildangan being particularly impressive though without being spectacular but the experience and know how of getting the job done was there for all to see.

The Morris Code and that 1982 unfinished business

uestion? What team won the 1982 North senior hurling final? The record books use one word to tell us and that word is not the name of any club. The word is 'unfinished'. Yes,

there was a final and played in Gardiner Park Borrisokane it was between Roscrea and Éire Óg and it finished all square, 3-8 to 0-17. But alas no replay. An accumulative set of circumstances brought about the stalemate and whatever was behind it all, the Éire Óg viewpoint is soon to be revealed in a book The Morris Code to be launched in the Hibernian Inn on Thursday 30th September by GAA President Christy Cooney.

The author is Borrisokane native and long-time stalwart of both Borrisokane and Éire Óg clubs Jimmy Morris. Now residing in Canada Jimmy has penned what he describes as the musings of a Tipperary GAA club man.

A fascinating delve it is into his long association with both his native and adopted clubs. It is packed with reminiscences of the players, fellow administrators, great characters that crossed his path, contentious issues like the MacDonagh Park saga, and his forthright views on the GPA. He also has some hilarious stories to tell about players lending their services to clubs other than those to which they were legally attached!

Nor does Jimmy pull any punches and when it comes to the unfinished business of 1982 and here's what he has to say;

The records show that Éire Óg did not agree to replay the game. Why? It was felt that the club had been wrong footed. The final was played on August 1st the replay fixed for the 29th. Two issues then came into play. Ros sought a postponement, citing young Donal Kealy, a member of the Tipp minor team, it being unfair to him to play the match on the Sunday prior to the All-Ireland minor final against Galway (which Tipp won), even thouah he hadn't worn the club colours in the senior championship. They felt the club was entitled to a 'free' Sunday prior to that All-Ireland.

But there was more to it than that. You see, both


Tadha and Kevin O'Connor had been sidelined in a county championship match and would be out of bounds for the 29th. Still with me? Right! The Board rejected a proposal for a postponement-heavily 1 might add, and the replay was to go ahead. Then came the decision that all games involving members of the Tipp minor team be called off. This came following a directive from the County Board and whereas we were aareeable to play on the 29th without our player, Roscrea were not.

Fair play to Roscrea, they pulled all the strings at their disposal to ensure the O'Connors received the minimum suspension only, which indeed was their right

to strive for. Whatever chance Éire Óg had of agreeing to replay the game was blown out of the water when North Board chairman Denis Floyd proposed the minimum suspension.

Now don't for a minute think that I was anti-Tadhg O'Connor or Kevin for that matter. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Roscrea club was perfectly entitled to make their case as best they could. However, that said, it was quite difficult to stomach the fact that the minimum suspension should apply in that particular instance. The Board chairman obviously thought otherwise and Éire Óg, feeling quite sore about it did not agree to replay the final.

And just to illustrate his personal admiration for Tadhg O'Connor – and emphasising that it is not meant as a sop – the author describes him as 'pound for pound one of the best defenders to come out of North Tipperary. He had speed, steel, wrist work and controlled aggression, We were all so proud when he led Tipp to All-Ireland victory eleven years earlier'.

North Final Wins

Toomevara won the Frank McGrath Cup more times than any other club during the Noughties. They brought the Cup to the parish in 2000, 2001, 2003 and 2004.

Nenagh Éire Óg and Borris-Ileigh won two each with Nenagh winning the North Board Centenary Final in 2001 and claimed their second in 2009 while Borris-Ileigh earned a brace in 2005 and 2007.

Overall, five teams brought home the Frank McGrath with Roscrea successful in 2004 and Kildangan in 2008.



Brendan Maher, Borris-Ileigh ... destined to greatness

t was like cutting the twine on a catapult five summers ago (Sunday, August 7 2005) Borris-Ileigh unleashed Brendan Maher on the world.

Then, as now, Borris-Ileigh faced into a North Tipperary senior hurling final as slight underdogs, but on that occasion against Éire Óg Nenagh. Not many knew much about the 16-year-old Brendan at the time, but, by God, after that final they did - Borris-Ileigh won 1-12 to 0-13 and Brendan Maher turned that final.

Pucking around before the game the blond-haired Brendan Maher didn't look like an instrument of fate; he looked immature and unused; like a hand without calluses. But when experienced hurling men saw what he was capable of they knew then how a racehorse trainer feels when he sees something special on the gallops. What was it Belfast scout Bob Bishop wrote in a telegram to Matt Busby after he fixed his eyes on George Best all those years ago: "I have found you a genius".

Besides the 2005 north title Brendan Maher added another in 2007, but he is perhaps better known for his Tipperary exploits. He hurled for three years as a minor, winning two All-Ireland titles (2006 and 2007), the second of which as captain. This summer represents his fourth as an under-21 during which time he has won two Munster titles (2008 and 2010) and an All-Ireland just last weekend while the recent All-Ireland final success over Kilkenny marked his eleventh senior appearance since his debut was a substitute against Cork in 2009.

Normally, as with a talented young player in any sport, it is the technique and the talent that gets you first, the revelation of character comes later.

When a player is young it is relatively

simple to say whether he has the ability to do this or that, but only time will tell whether an individual has the bottle, the ambition and all those other intangible ingredients which make sport such an endless fascination.

In recent years Brendan Maher has sharpened his skills and strengthened his body right before our eyes. We know he can hurl and we know he could punch a horse to its knees, but what we also know is what kind of man he is: Brendan Maher is not just a man around whom you can build a team, he's the kind of man around whom you could build a country.

Player of the Past Martin Bourke, Curaheen, Toomevara

artin saw the first light of day, breathed in that fresh and healthy mountain air in 1923. From an early age his Grandfather Michael, his father Jack and Uncle Tom reared and regaled him with stories of the 1890 Toomevara who joined "the elite of Gaeldom" when winning their first County title. He had heard all about Tom Gavin, Jer Larkin, Jer Dwyer, Pat Kennedy, Tim and Ned Feehan, Tim and Jack Hackett, Ned Meagher and many more.

A ken follower of the game, he remembers learning how to hurl as a youngster as if it were yesterday. "All the training was done between the Rock and the Tower, below near the wooden bridge where we would hurl with the Ryan Roches, the Cummins lads, the Sheas, Tom Dunne and the neighbours".

Martin walked to school with schoolbag and crook, developing his upper body strength, swinging and timing by cutting the tops of daisies, jumping up and smashing a few conkers off the chestnuts. There was no schoolboy hurling teams in Martin's days and the first team he aspired to making was minor.

"I walked the six miles from home to Toome to get a lift and play Kilruane, but when I got there, Mick Burke and the boys had left on a couple of pony and cars. The walk home up by the Long Stone seemed like eternity," he said.

Stephen Hackett and Jack Harty were the two biggest influences on his career. They showed him how, to kill a ball stone dead on the hurley and when to hold the hurley "firm" and "soft. "They constantly preached, ground hurling, first time pulling, drop pucking, overhead striking, and how to snap a ball from the air over your opponent's head. At training or on match day the consistent mantra was "mark your own man, don't stray too far up the field, don't be bunching, get out first to the ball, don't dillydally and criss cross your ball." He added, "The heat of battle was where you cut your teeth and the local rivalry was wicked competitive and when Pake Younge and Philly Ryan would meet there would be "hell on earth".

Martin went through his long career which started in earnest in 1941 and his last game in his beloved green and gold was in 1959. The highlight of his career was the North Final of



1946 win over Roscrea which brought to an end 15 barren years. Martin's displays throughout the '46 campaign drew attention from the Tipperary selectors and even though the "Swans winged the Greyhounds" the Walls of Carrick would remember Martin Bourke, Sean Ryan (F) and Tommy Russell when they had the County Team Selection.

"In my heyday, 1947, I was playing his best hurling, never caught on my wrong side and could cut a ball over the bar from 50 yards". I was lucky to play with Tipp in London and in a few league matches as well as the Oireachtas," he admits.

He goes on to say, that the differences between hurling now and then are. "Fellows are fitter and faster, the ball is lighter and travelling longer and quicker, the referees are better able to keep up with the play, and the hurlers nowadays are almost professional. The new rules have the game destroyed, there is too much bunching.

Martin is worried that youngsters have too much competition too early and end up being burnt out and his advice to younger lads today would be to "Listen and heed what is being told to you, practice your weak side more, concentrate on pure hurling, and watch the county lads that play in the same position on the field as you and see how they handle different situations"

Liam Hackett, Coole, Toomevara

iam Hackett was well equipped to be a great hurler when he trotted into Master Jack Donovan in Toomevara N.S. in 1952. His pedigree was impeccable as his Grandfather and Grand –Uncles were heavily involved in The Toomevara hurling Club foundation in 1885 and subsequently in their first County Final of 1890. Matt Hassett had resuscitated schoolboy hurling in Toome and the strongly built young Hackett was to line out in 1957 at the age of 9 with the local Juvenile team.

As well as having plenty respect for Matt Hassett, the former Toome defender, was very praiseworthy of the late Tom Ryan. "Tom Ryan as the most complete hurler that I played with. He had it all and he had to compete with Wall, Roche and Theo for his place on the Tipp team. Tom would always do the hard work making it easier for his team-mates and always played the younger hurler into the game whilst mentoring and nurturing them," said Liam.

Liam entered the Vocational School in Nenagh in 1962 and played both hurling and football each year up to completion of his studies in 1965, winning three All-Ireland medals and Captaining North Tipp Vocational School team to an All-Ireland victory in 1965.

In the meantime he studied his other idols. "Whilst Toomevara had an array of stars in the 60's: Matt, Tom Shanahan, Roger Mounsey, Neil Williams, Jack Hough, I had a special admiration for Matt O'Gara and Phil Shanahan and studied their styles quite a bit," he adds.

Liam gave twelve years sterling service of senior hurling to the "Green and Gold" and played inter county with Tipp but was prematurely forced to retire from the game he loved through a very serious injury he received in a match in 1976 against Kildare. He had given of his best to Tipperary and wearing the blue and gold with distinction at Minor, Under 21 and Senior in hurling and football but with one regret. "I regret not having won a North Senior and County with Toome and not being picked on the Tipperary panel in 1971. My favourite position was centre back or centre field and I rated Seamus Hogan of Kildangan or Tommy Dwyer of Borris-Ileigh as his most difficult opponents.

As a result he well equipped to look at today's game and suggests the players and the Association of today deserve much praise and admires the speed and commitment that young players produce. "The speed of the game, players fitness levels, their dedication and commitment to training, protection of goalkeepers, the genuine attempt by most players to play the game fair, hard and honest and general all round improvement in playing facilities and conditions are better for all of the players," he says

Of course he has a few dislikes. Who doesent? "The intensity and length of warm ups, weight of sliotar, players faking injuries, lack of use of all of the skills and virtual disappearance of ones like, drop-pucks, overhead striking and first time hurling. Bunching is leading to needless melees and eventual throw-ins, over use and flippancy of yellow cards and gross inconsistency in referee's interpretation and understanding of the rules. There seems to be a real lack of ability on modern day hurlers to be able to read the game and hence not to be in the right place at the right time," said the Toome man

He can now sit back and encourage his grandchildren to continue that great tradition and unbroken service to "The Greyhounds" a tradition that spans three Centuries involving playing, administrating, selecting, spectating and sponsoring Toomevara teams. He is also very proud of his sons Bernard, Ray and Padraig who won North, County and Munster titles with Toomevara at Juvenile and Adult level.

Outside of hurling Liam has interests in horse racing and golf, "It was a proud moment when my horse Beau Ranger won his second bumper in Limerick and to see my three sons win the J. P. McManus Pro-Am in Adare, this year," he concludes.

immy Delaney is probably the sweetest back in Tipperary hurling never to win an All-Ireland Senior medal. He is absolutely thrilled, as a very proud Borris-Illeigh man, that Paddy and Brendan are now added to the roll of honour of "Borris" men who have won Celtic crosses. Timmy dreamed from the day in went in to an all female teacher school in 1953 that one day he would join all the greats that went before him, Jimmy Finn, Billy Devanney, Sean, Paddy and Phibby Kenny, Tim and Ned Ryan and the bould Philly Ryan in winning those much coveted medals.

Timmy is loud in his praise, admiration and thanks to Mick Prior who was the driving force behind schoolboy/juvenile hurling in their parish and was a very special and successful mentor to Timmy and his peers. They won a great under-15 north title in 1963 when defeating Kilruane in a "Titanic" struggle. Timmy was to miss the county semi-final as a result of a bad gash received whilst "following a horse drawn hay gatherer" The injury necessitated 22 stitches and despite robust protestations from the young Timmy and his father John, Dr.Joan Power insisted that he couldn't play.

Timmy had a very successful period whilst hurling with Templemore C.B.S. winning, Corn Padraig, Kinnane Cup, and Croke Cup under the genial tutelage of Brother Tynan from Rathmoy. Timmy wasn't long coming to the notice of the County Minor selectors and was a prominent member of the 1966 and 67 panel. He hurled 4 years with the under-21 squad and had the unusual distinction of playing in and winning an Under-21 All-Ireland while still a Minor and was chosen as Captain in 1970. Timmy got a run in a couple of league matches with the Tipp. Seniors but according to Paul Byrne," the then Selectors would not have been aware of this humble mans performances in St.Pats. College which would have guaranteed him walk on to any

County team".

Timmy is a hugely passionate, proud and committed Club man who carries and displays all his traditional qualities in his movements through Borrisoleigh whiter as a key player

> or as a highly respected and much loved team official. Timmy played his first game for Borris Seniors at the age of 16."You wouldn't get within an asses roar of any senior team that time unless you could display consistently the entire array of skills required to wear the Club Jersey. You had to be able to hurl left and right, overhead hurling and doubling on dropping balls, batting down the puck out to a better placed colleague, be able to effect the drop puck, blocking, hooking, first time pulling, and the be able to hurl the Borris way of criss-crossing balls. The door was left

open for you, off you go on your own, and if you're good enough you will be alright." Those times we were naturally fit going up to the field and we spent 90% of our time learning and developing our trade. Today the fitness levels are far higher, the speed of the games is unreal, and the lads are now making better use of the ball with pin point accuracy. Free taking and side line touches have improved immensely. I would prefer to see less running with the sliotar and let the ball do the work, players hold their positions. There are far too many yellow cards dished out and I am genuinely afraid that our lovely national game is heading in the direction to a noncontact sport."

"My greatest moments were every time I pulled on my club jersey. My biggest regret was been injured for the 1986 All-Ireland Club final and my biggest disappointment was when we lost the 1977 county final replay"

After retiring, Timmy was highly successful in management with Borris-Ileigh, Clonoulty-Rossmore, Upperchurch-Drombane and Burgess.

A supreme artist and an absolute gentleman.

"In Borrisoleigh, dogs and horses were always a way of life. In Toomevara the Greyhound is tattooed on your soul the moment you are born."

Thomas Lanigan Ryan and Mary Dwyer of Carrigdawson were married in 1966 and it was to be the beginning of among other things a united commitment to sport. Mary coming from a very old and well respected traditional family came in to the home of "faction fighting" where the "black hens" and "magpies" were well known throughout the land. Whilst the "Bantam" would respond to the Borrisoleigh supporters cheers at local matches, Mary would never "crow" but would smile inwardly and bask in the may great display's and victories of her beloved Toom. In all the great men that wore the green and gold Mary has a "soft spot" for that talented family from Curraheen, the Dunnes, with Tomas being her "white haired boy".

Thomas's father Jack and his uncle Thomas played hurling with Borrisoleigh, or the "Bush Team" as they were known locally and were selected on the Tipperary Junior team along with local team-mates Jack and Mick Hammonds. They were all on the County team from 1910-1916 winning 4 Munster and 2 All-Irelands as well as Thomas's father Jack captaining the Tipp. Team in 1913 and was thus the first of a long list of giants of men to bring silverware for a national title to Borris-Illeigh.

Thomas himself was at his first North final in Nenagh in 1947" when on 31st August Borrisoleigh beat Kilruane by 4-03 to 2-06 to claim their first North Title with Paddy Kenny captaining the side. Incidentally the Borris men wore Blue and White then. Borrisoleigh were beaten in the County Final played at Clonmel by Carrick-swans powered by the Walls. Thomas was there in 1949 when on the 30th of Oct. In Thurles, Borris-Illeigh beat Knockavilla Kickhams by 4-06 to 2-01 to win their first ever County Senior Hurling title and Sean Kenny brought home "Dan Breen" to "The Strangers Paradise". This famous victory is recorded in folklore by " the seven stones of octogenarian genius, Pat Mahon", in his famous, "Up Borrisilleigh".

Thomas and Mary have travelled the County and Country supporting and "roaring on the boys" of Borrisoleigh, Toomevara, and Tipperary. They have contributed to every fund raiser, double you money investment, 10 year tickets, training funds etc.etc that has existed . They both agree (?) that with all the success of Tipperary Teams that their most "memorable and emotional day" was when the Seniors of Borris-Illeigh who won the Dan Breen in the Clubs Centenary year, 1986, and followed it up with a fantastic "day of all days" in the spring of 1987, whenon St. Patrick's Day they defeated Rathnure in Croke Park on a score line of 2-09 to 0-09 to win the All-Ireland Club Title.

Thomas and Mary are sports fanatics and they look forward to each Christmas when they together do the *Farmers Journal* bumper crossword/quiz. Whether it is at the Mart, Creamery, or on the Streets of "Naynagh" there is great comradely between the Borris and Toom Supporters and as Mary says "Toom will still pull in Borris this October on their way back home with" Dan" no matter what happens in the North Final.

This was a remarkable achievement because counties rarely win two-in-a-row at that grade as the Brocka man lined out with other well-known players like Jim Keogh and Michael Fitzgibbon both Silvermines, Noel Seymour, Ollie Killeen, Willie Moloney of Kildangan and John Costigan and Jim Kehoe.

Kehoe, from Kilsheelan, later collected a National League medal in 1979 alongside Patrick McLoughney. Jim Keogh, Silvermines, was to become full back

with Tipp seniors throughout the 'seventies and John Costigan lined out at right corner back in the 1968 senior final against Wexford.

In his earlier years, Sean Cahalan played



in the attack and scored three goals (Pat Foote scored three more) in the big intermediate win over Toomevara in 1967. One year later he made the goalkeeping position his own in the North final win over Kildangan and later against Latten Cullen in the county decider.

Having sampled senior grade in 1969, Rovers returned to intermediate the following year. They finished runners up to Kildangan in the 1971 final. Three years later Sean played in his next North final. This time it was at full back when he helped Rovers defeat Borrisokane and the following year he fulfilled the role once again to see off Ballinahinch.

Tribute to Jimmy Conroy

(Nenagh Éire Óg) 1938-2009

Today we pay tribute to Jimmy Conroy, who passed away earlier this year. Jimmy was a regular contributor to souvenir match programme on North Senior Hurling Final day.

As news filtered through of Jimmy Conroy's passing, his neighbours, friends and his large Éire Óg family were numbed into disbelief that this very fit man was taken from us so unexpectedly.

Jimmy Conroy was the ultimate family man, a great Gael, an immensely proud Galway man, a tremendous Éire Óg man and an ardent G.A.A supporter and a passionate lover of the National game of hurling.

where he was born in 1938. He played schoolboy hurling for his native parish before he went on to win two Connacht senior colleges medals with St. Mary's of Galway. His club



performances at a young age in his beloved red club jersey attracted the attention of the county selectors and Jimmy was selected on the Galway minor hurling team for 3 consecutive years, 1954, 1955 and 1956. He made his debut with the Galway senior team in October 1958 at Semple Stadium Thurles when he donned the maroon and white, lining out with no.13 as the Tribesmen beat Wexford in the Oireachtas final to win the Thomas Ashe trophy.

Jimmy Conroy was an automatic choice on the Galway hurling team from 1958-1968 when for the most part they partook in the Munster Senior Championship.

He joined An Garda Siochana and during his many postings, he helped local teams. He played with Whitegate and Éire Óg Ennis. One of Jimmy's proudest moments in the Banner was when he assisted Feakle to win the Clare Cup. Jimmy was a popular, well respected and highly regarded acquisition by the "Toomevara Greyhounds" as he was stationed in the local village from 1966-1971. His many battles with the North Tipp teams are often spoken about.

He transferred to Nenagh in 1972 and started a family there. Jimmy became a member of Éire Óg, taking on roles as administrator, team manager, selector, and in later years a keen player in that exclusive den of roques the "45" club. Jimmy was one of the prime instigators of setting up the Éire Óg Juvenile Committee in 1982 and was elected vice-chairman with Bro. Pat Madigan as chairman. Over the next 3 decades his role as administrator, tremendous attention to detail, he will be fondly remembered by the scores of youngsters that passed through his hands and under his tutelage they all blossomed.

Jimmy along with fellow selectors were to be part of an enormously successful period for Eire Og juveniles in both codes hurling and football, being a familiar sight at our matches with his daughter Breda. Jimmy was looking forward to seeing his grandson Billy O'Brien lining out with pride for "The Blues".

Jimmy was a selector on the two-in-a-row North Tipperary Under 16 hurling Munster final winning teams in 1989 and 1990. He was also a selector with the Tipperary county under 16 teams. Jimmy served as an officer with both North Tipperary Bord na nOg and County Tipperary Bord na nOg.

One of his biggest disappointments was when he was Tipperary Minor hurling selector which failed at the last hurdle in the All-Ireland final against Kilkenny in Croke Park in 1991.

Jimmy was laid to rest in Lisbonney graveyard on Sunday 22nd Nov. Jimmy will be leaving behind him a hugely loving and grieving family. To his family we extend our deepest sympathy.


